## THE JEWS AT ASSOUAN.

Some Aramaic papyri have just been publish ed which shed a most interesting light on a very old Jewish settlement at Assouan. In the spring of 1904, Mr. Robert Mond, Hon. Secretary of the Davy Farady Research Laboratory (Royal Institution), acquired certain Aramaic papyri which had been found near Assouan These have just been edited by Professor Savei se have just been edited by Professor Sayo and Mr. A. E. Cowley, together with other papyri acquired by Lady William Cecil and by the Bodleian Library, and form one of the most important discoveries that Aramai epigraphy has as yet produced. Through the ence of Mr. Mond, they have been published in the completest possible manne with bibliographical information by Mr Seymour de Ricci, and Egyptological notes by Professor Spiegelberg. Professor Sayce himself Cowley has undertaken the wearisome task of deciphering the papyri, and has given full philological and exegetical notes and glossaries The papyri have been photographed and repro duced with entire success—in every respect the "critical apparatus" is all that could possibly be desired.

These papyri afford the proof that some tim after the disastrous murder of Gedaliah, the governor whom Nebuchadnezzar had set over Palestine, a colony of Jews had made their way to Assouan or Syene, the southern end of Egypt, and had settled down into trading unities. The evidence seems to show the they refrained from intermarrying with Egyp tians, although exceptions are certainly found as when a widow-lady named Mibtah-yah confidence of Yah[weh]) marries an Egyp-tian whose name showed him to be a devotee of the god Horus. Again, it is extremely in teresting to find references to the shrine of the god Yahu, by whose name oaths are adminisered. It is obvious, therefore, that the Jews enjoyed religious freedom. Further, the term (yéhûdi) actually occurs, and it is curious that in some cases the same individuals in other papyri are termed Aramaeans. Professor Sayce, in the course of his excellent pre-

liminary remarks, explains the interchange as due to the fact that they spoke Aramaic, then the official language of the government in Egypt as also throughout the western half of the Persian empire. "The Jewish scribes," he observes, "accepted and employed the term just as readily as the scribes of any other nationality, evidently regarding their fellowcountrymen as merely a division of the Aramacan family." The Jewish colonists were not true citizens like the native Egyptians, and the descriptive terms applied to the tunately the phrasing is of obscure interpretation -has suggested that they were in a position similar to that of the Roman "clients," The papyri deal with legal affairs and hence

contain numerous proper names. We meet with a considerable number which are obviously Jewish: Ethan, Gedaliah, Gemariah, Haggai, Hodaviah, Isaiah, Jezaniah, Malchiah Menah Meshullam, Nathan, etc., are familiar to everyone There are other names which cannot be exactly paralleled but are unmistakably of a Hebrew type. As was found to be the case with the contract-tablets found by the expedition of the University of Pennsylvania to Nippur, there is a considerable mixture of population. Some of the names are undoubtedly of Persian origin, others are certainly Babylonian; even Arabian names may be suspected. Egypt was evidently as cosmopolitan twenty-five centuries ago as

The Jews in that old settlement at Ass were much interested in land and it is interesting to observe that papyri, with one exception, des with property in Yeb (Elephantine) in which this little colony of Jews is concerned. It is no other than the property which Dargman had claimed, and whilst one papyrus contains the deed which Mahseish gave his son-in-law, the other is for the daughter, and in it he hands her Dargman's deed of renunciation with the advice "Do thou keep pessession of it. If to-morrow or any later day Dargman or his son shall bring an action concerning this ouse, produce this deed, and institute an ction against him therewith." Thirteen years later, in 446 B.C., Mahseial makes over to his daughter the house-property which he had bought from Meshullam, son of

Zaccur, together with the deed of sale. It lay to the east of their houses and was bounded or the south by the house of Ye'ô(r), son of Penuliah, on the east by that of Gadol, son of Hoshi and the street, to the north lay the shrine of the god Yahu, whilst to the west lived the son of Paltu, the priest of (as it would appear) certain Egyptian gods. is tempted to enlarge, but perhaps enough has been said to demonstrate the very great importance of the papyri not merely philologist, but for the biblical student. It is a very real gain to be able to obtain some idea of conditions under which the Jews lived in the fifth century, and these most welcome finds throw much light upon the life and custom of fifth-century Judaism. For we may not unreasonably expect that the evidence which is gradually being collected, whether in Egypt or in Babylonia, will enable us to stand the internal conditions in Palestine itself, and the mere fact that these bus its have come to light inspires the hope that other papyri, perhaps of more vital im-portance, may yet be discovered in the near

ARABIC IN THE GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS.

### ( Gazette's Special Service. )

LONDON Thursday.

Mr. J. M. Robertson asked Sir Edward Grey n the House of Commons last night, whether the decree of June, 1898, enacting that Arabic should be the medium of teaching in the Boyptian schools, had been abrogated, and whether the scarcity of teachers (the alleged reason for the lack of instruction in Arabic) was a result of British policy pursued in disregard of the decree.

In reply Sir Edward Grey said that the decree provided that the programmes of the schools should is clude instruction in Arabic in as large a measure as possible so as to ensure a thorough knowledge of the language and no certificate could be granted unles the candidate could show possession of a knowledge of Arabic. He had no information s to the abrogation of the decree.

### MILITARY SYSTEM OF EGYPT.

The following is the text of the question and answer in the House of Commons last Thursday in reference to the military system of Egypt, as reported telegraphically by our London Correspondent :Mr. J. M. Robertson (Northumberland

Tyneside) a ked the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs whether, in view of the repeated fficial avowal that the present system o military conscription in Egypt, with exempti by porchase from ballotage, was a bad one, which could not be defended on principle, as stated in Lord Cromer's reports for 1904 and 1905, and in view of the fact that numbers of poor Egyptians annually sell their small possessions in order to purchase execution, thus leaving the Army to e constituted by unwilling recruits, he wo advise the Expetian Government to take into consideration the expediency of establishing a system of paid military service, such as exist

of his reports cited by the hon, member, given the reasons which render the abolition of the present system difficult and inexpedient. The conditions of the country would make it impossible to introduce with success a military sy tem such as exists in the United Kingdom, but the subject, as may be seen from Lord Cromer's report, continues to engage attention.

### CAIRO AGRICULTURAL SHOW.

### DESCRIPTION OF EXHIBITS.

The Cairo Agricultural Show which of The Cairo Agricultural Show which open to-day gives every promise of being the most interesting that has yet been given in Egypt It contains new features and new exhibits while the old are better represented than ever, cotton and cereals showing a high average standard, while the cattle, put "out of action" as far as exhibition was concerned for the past three years by the prevalence of bovine typhus, have made a welcome reappearance before a public which shows a genuine appreiation of good beasts. It is not our inter to give a detailed description of every exhibi our space is too limited for the purpose, no our space is too limited for the purpose, nor are we as yet in a position to give the names of the numerous prize winners. We shall for the present confine curselves to a general description of the Agricultural Show which may serve in some degree as a guide to the numerous visitors whom it is certain to

Toking the Khedivial Agricultural Society's ouilding as the centre of our survey, we find in front of the main entrance and exhibition hall something that bears a strong resemblance to the last Egyptian Exhibition held at Olymia. In London it would be called the Eryp tian village and attract enormous and gaping crowds. In Caico it naturally excites less attention, but these rows of booths and tents are perhaps the most important and certainly most novel feature of the whole. For The 'E pytian village" or "Exhibition of Arta

-the name is immaterial-forms three sides of a hollow quare, the eastern and ab'ed, while the open ts the northern side fr nstitutions. The Prisons show a capital ex-Industrial School, where some excellent furni-ture and a pair of remarkably tasteful and well-finished candlesticks are to be noticed. with, among less artistic but most useful mechanical appliances, oil engines and borers, all the work of the boys, and wheels of a new pattern, embodying numerous improvements on the design in use in the British Artillery, which have been made to the order of the Cairo Fire Brigade. The pottery exhibits show a very considerable advance. The blue tiles require only a little better firing and slightly more evenness in the distribution of the colouring to be termed first-rate copies of the splendid tiles of Damasous and Baghdad, and many of the smaller pieces of ware are remark-

Some excellent woollen cloth, woven, we elieve, at Alib Bey Abou Girgis' establishe in the Fayoum, is well worth examining. It is very strong and light and though too coarse or wear next the skin would make very good overalls or light cloaks. The upholstery and tent cloth exhibited by Toulba Mohamed in the next "street" is a notable exhibit, and indeed all the exhibits in the tent-maker's sheds are very well worth a visit. Tents and dados of the Cairens hieratic type there are on which pink warriors and blue chariots battle with brown warriors and yellow chariots. Isa Omar has a particularly good show of these, and a picture of H.H. the Khedive done in loth attests at least the ingenuity of his

ne of Salamah Tawi's exhibits are worth notice. The S. block of the "village" is taken up with the si'k-weaving industry; the looms are at work, the inevitable small boy turns the wheel or pulls the string, and the visitor can watch every stage of the manufacture of a fine kufran and if he desires can buy it. The combination of colors and the great gloss and shen of many of the silk-stoff exhibited by Hafis el Saved or Hafiz Salama are worthy of the finest

Another very attractive exhibit is that of the Mehallet el Kobra si'k workers. This is, generally speaking, a different genre of work : of their exhitits. Their colours are in general we'l chosen, the geometrical designs and silver or golden texts and arabesque patterns worked upon backgrounds of claret, French grey, or a deep green, are perfect. One wonders why the workers of Mehalla do notestablish branches o Cairo for the sale of their work to the tourists who are so often overjoyed at the purchase far inferior stuffs. S yed Ibrahim and Ali Gamali show perhaps the finest of these silks, but there is little to choose among many cellent exhibits. On the B. side of the village are the makers of mats and baskets, the Orwat el Woska and the b'ind schools being well el Woeks and the blind sonools being weit represented, while lovers of the practical will find something to interest them in a sakkich of an original design. Some quaint pottery, with the furniture and boot-making exhibits, unst be passed by, the scents and inlayers too, but we must spare a little space for the announcement that a manufa genuine "antikas" is expected to occupy a hed and display to the public how sourabs ushabt, and what—not can be fabricated with a little patience, clay, and blue or green glaza. The machinery halls are on each side of the central building. Our technical correspondents

will give us faller particulars in our next few issues, but we may say that the exhibits are extremely interesting. On the B side of the centre Mesers. A KHEDIVIAL VISIT.

(Continued from yesterday.)

It was pouring with rain when we reach Goaiferi, and even on the very morning whe the caravan started on its pilgrimage to the ruined sanctuaries, Jupiter had not favoured as with better weather. I hope to report on some future occasion about the highly interesting geological condition of the stretch of land to which we were coming, where the rocks appear in huge boulders often many metres square. The nomads had written on these flag-stone their way-marks in order that the traveller should not lose himself, just as they had also areoted pyramids of stone, so-callet Allams, between one halting place and another, Redonin tents surrounded by the last signs of cultivated soil became very scarce. There is yet another more solemn picture and way mark seen now and again. Our eyes rest on a small nomadic graveyard; small heap of earth closed in by stones, with flying banners. The horses proceed very un-steadily and need occasional rests. All the more we admire the camels, walking at a quiet regular pace. How many times have the merits of this noble and indispensable animal been sung by poets, and this in all justice, for without its sure step treading firmly on any soil the journey in these parts could not be lished. It seems to us to-day inconcoomplished. It seems to us to day incon-seivable that there should have been a time when no "ship of the desert" crossed Lybia. and when Herodoth's Masamones an i Sallust' agurtha warriors crossed these roads without amels. It was Antiochus who, at the battle of Magnesis, introduced them to the civilized world and in the fourth century they are already so numerous in the North of Africa that the Prince of Tripoli could claim the large num ber of 4000 transport camels from the Leptiers.
Three wells lie on the road at an equal

fistance of two hours from each other: Bir Gibn, Bir Gramett, and Bir Haft. A mall chain of hills to the east of Bir Gra nett is called by the Bedonias Dienel Taref Here and there the barren stone desert Here and there the parren stone users gives place to patches of green shrubs and siny plants whose sweet seent fills the spring air. Much life and animation reign amongst the four groups of the caravao. The leading four groups of the caravao. The leadir sheikh Parag, clad in his Morocco burnoos rides at the head, the Khedive follows in h light coash escorted by fifteen men of his body-guard. Next come the hired animals of the Bedouins; Mihamed Abou Geneue follows them and his strong camels soon got up to the others. Riding and transport camels wind up the caravan. Could I ever forge the friends who, perched on horses or riding Could I ever forge mmels, shorten the long day's ride, consisting of twelve hours, with their songs and fairy tales! It was a never-to-be-forgotten sight, when Abmel Abou Balter, "Father of the Hoe," alias Tabbach Pashs, i.e. chief cook, mounted his patient steed, assisted by six strong arms, and role to the Ammonian. What attracted me next was Mahmoud, 'Pather of the Riding Camel,' in whom no one recognized the former slave-dealer. While listening to his stories from Wadai, Da fur or the Sudan, one noticed that an old fire kindled in his eyes, and one saw in him once more the kidnapper who made off with many a prize simply by holding the thumb of his victim in his mouth.

After a ride of eight hours we reache Danais, "The Churches," amidst sunshine and blue skies. Long before the table moun tains had been visible, rising high in the East and West from the plateau and forming steep descents down to the well lying in the centre of the land surrounded by hills. Two cones in the North-East bear strong weather-beaten, ruiped walls, and also dow at the well the above mentioned walis can be traced. Kanais itself is a pass, the im mediate continuation of the Eastern and Western chains, sporadically shaped, and the ower parts rich in oyster-bads, star fish, shells, and corals. He who has seen it once never forgets the character of the soil and would be able wherever he came from, to find his way. This spot, which is not to be mistaken the Ras-el-Kanais, is mystically enveloped like all ancient relies

The camp lit up by the setting sun offered an incomparable spectacle ; soldiers on horse

back, the men who fix up the tents and their inexperienced assistants, fagged-out ramel drivers, over-active Berbersen, Arabs who are delever enough to snatch a rest, merry Be-douins and their solemn sheikhs. Searcity of water and the advanced hour had brought them together to the camp. Tae recital of the Imam in a chanting voice, praising Allah and the prophet, brought rest and peace. Coly in the South-West, spart from the camp, red fires were glowing and many spent balf the night telling stories until even they tell off to sleep on their native soil, wrapped in their barnones.

"THE EGYPT OF THE FUTURE." MR. DICEY'S ACCURACY.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE EGYPTIAN GARRITE. Sir,-In the 'Egyptian Gazette' of last We inesday I noticed a letter dealing with the remarkable discrepancies between Mr. Dicey's arguments in "The Egypt of the Futere" and a recent contribution by that gentlemen to the 'Dai y Telegraph," and as no reply has yet appeared I presume your correspondent's animadversions are unanawers-ble. I should, however, like to point out that the one and only effort at constructive criticism made by the author of "The Egypt of the Future" reposes on a precedent which is utterly misl ading and which is especially mischievous because it may lead some ignorar natives, who read the book, to form totally erroneous ideas. I may state that I have not the slightest animus against Mr. Dicey or his work, and I thoroughly enjoyed reading the two last chapters of his latest book, which contain a considerable amount of amus ing criticism and which, as far as I can judge, form the raison detre of the work, as the first five chapters are mere examples of book making. The book, how ver, is only interesting for its destructive criticism. But the author rightly judges that he is logically called upon to make out some sort of policy which will be an improvement on Lord Cromer's and this is the result. He remarks:—

"If I am asked what I should propose as an alternative, I should recommend the system which has been adopted in the native States of India by England, in Tunis and Algeria by France, and in Bosnia and the Herzegovina by Austria, and adopted with success. The fundamental principles of this system may be stated briefly as follows. Supreme authority should be vested in the hands of the repre entative of the Protecting Power, whether he may be called Resident, Governor, or Consul General. Subject to this supreme authority, as little change as possible should be made in the internal administration of the protected State. The old laws, customs and neages should remain as they were before the Protectorate xisted, and the old native administrators should as a rule be retained in the public service. These a iministrators should be clearly given to understand that they would be allowed a considerable latitude in the discharge of their functions, and that they would not be called to account if their administration should be considered somewhat differently from the view entertained by the Protecting Power, but that if any gross scandal or abuse should occur during their administration they would be forthwith dismissed or, if necessary, severely punished by the representative of the Protectorate. To work out the details of such a system must be the work of the Resident, and this can only be done by the men on the spot. All I am concerned with is its broad principle."

The citation of Algeria and Tunis, which Mr. Dicey evokes as models on which his scheme if Egyptian administration should be based, hows an extraordinary ignorance of those countries. The only excuse which M . Dicey can offer for introducing Tunis and Algeria as examples is that he is unaware of their administrative system. M. Fallot, late firector of the Commercial and Immigration Departments at Tunis, in his work "L'Avenir Departments at Tunis, in his work "L'Avenir Colonial de la France," published in 1902 depreciates the French system in Algeria because it is so bureaucratic and directed from Paris. He remarks: "L'Algérie nous offre le spectacle d'un pays qu'ou a tenté de placer dans le lit de Procuste d'un organisme politique et administratif importé du debers et en opposition avec ses besoins," and he declares e or six years before being ab'e to begin the construction of its econd sy tem of rai ways, which she had to make at her own expense. He praises the Mon. English system of decentralisation abecause, I évite les retards entrainés par la centralisar on à Paris de touter les affaires de que que importance.' The administration of Tunis is nominally in the hands of the Bey, but each of his acts is inspired or advised by the Franch Resident. The decrees are submitted to the Bey for signature but they have to have the vise of the Radient b fore being promolgated. The native Ministry has preserved for its head a Prime Minister, as isted by a Ministère de la Plume, but by their sides there is a high Prench official, the General Secretary of the French Government, whose duty it is to watch and direct the work of the Ministerial bareaux in all their details, to prepare the correspondence of the Prime Minister and to submit the decrees to the signature of the Bey. The interior is governed by Caids, whose functions are concerned with the local police, the ollection of taxes and some judicial functions. They correspond to the Egyptian Moudirs but their actions are overfully controlled by F each officials, entitled Civil Controllers, who represent the Resident, These officials correspond to

he Inspectors of the Ministry of the Interior hers, but as they are permanently resident to their respective localities, they exercise a far more efficacious control. In A'geris the Caids have been kapt but they are officially inferior to the French officials, who occupy a position analogous to our Indian civilians, that is to say they have no native provincial officials theoretically superior to them. This brief sketch of French administrativemethods suffices to show that the Prench officials in Tonis and Algeria bave a far more direct control than have the Anglo-Bzyptian officials, and that if we adopted the we should undermine native authority far

more efficacionaly than we do now.

As to Bosnia and Herzagovina, Mr. Die equally anfortunate in these examples. I recommend him to read the report of the important meeting of the Bosniaus and Hersegovinians which was held at Vicuna a short time ago, but of which hardly any notice has been taken in the European Press. This depends partly upon the month in which you leave Ecypt, for Cairo in January may be a little waimer then the Riviera, and possibly net so waim as Sicily, be to March it will be warmer than Rome, and more uniformly warm than many other places in Europe. Many people leave Egypt far too early in the year, for as a rule the weather in April and May is perfect. The warmest place to go to on leaving Egypt is Sicily.

Some will want to take into consideration.

The fine steamers of the North German Lloyd leave Alexandria every Wednesday during the season for Naples, the voyage

during the season for Naples, the voyage being only 3 days.

NAPLES is also reached in 10 hours from Palermo by the Florio-Rubattino Co.'s steamers, which leave daily. One cannot approach Naples or leave it without wishing to explore some of its islands, besides the lovely places on its bay—Castellamare and Sorrento. The small steamer that takes you to Sorrento [you can drive two] will take you on to Capri.

From Naples to ROME is a train journey of but five hours All who can will devote at least one week to visiting the many historical and interesting portions of the Eternal City, whose charms and beauties are too well-known to need comment here.

whose charms and beauties are too well-known to need comment here.

Leaving the Eternal City with much regret, a railway journey of five hours brings you to FLORENCE, where another week can well be spent admiring the City of Flowers and its surrounding co-ntry. In Florence itself the churches and galleries are of absorbing interest, whilst the local promenades and excursions should not be omitted. The Cascine is the most attractive and fashionable promenade in Florence, whilst the Viale dei Colli, one of the finest walks in Europe opened 35 years ago, goes winding up through the hills a distance of four miles. The most delightful excursion outside Florence is that to Vallombrosa, with its Monastery 3,300 feet above the

The steamers of the P. & O., North German Lloyd, Orient, and Messageries Maritimes are the largest. The Anchor, British India, Bibby and Henderson Lines are also excellent, and their steamers are largely patronised by travellers to Egypt.

As regards the train jon meys from Cairo the shortest is that to Alexandria, without change (3 hours). That to Port Said can now be made without change in 4½ hours.

The least expensive way to England is by the Moss, Papeyanni, Prince, and Westcott lines of steamers from Alexandria to Liverpool. The German Levant line has also good steamers from Alexandria to Hamburg.

The quickest through Continental routes are by P. & O. Brindisi express from Port Said, and the Austrian Lloyd Trieste-Vienna express from Alexandria

As regards heavy loggage, it must be borne
in mind that very little luggage is allowed
free on the railways of Europe, but there are
several good and responsible forwarding agents
in Egypt who undertake at a fixed charge to
deliver packages to any address in Europe.

The quickest manner of getting to Europe
from Port Said is undoubtedly by the fast
Mail Steamers "Osiris" and "Isis" to Brindisi.
One of these leaves Port Said every week, as
soon as possible after receiving the Indian

Bombay.

These small but comfortable ships have enormously powerful engines, and attain a very high rate of speed. They are called the "Ferry boats," having been specially built to carry the British mail from Port Said to Brindisi. If you are going straight through to England you will find the train waiting at Brindisi which will take you to Calais without changing. It has complete arrangements for sleeping and eating on board, and you should arrive in London on the fifth day from leaving Port Said.

In and around the town the walks are charming, and the excursions to be made from Lucerne by boat, rail, etc., are very numerous.

Other excursions on the lake can be made by steamer, and the ever-changing scenery on the trip from Lucerne to Fluelen is a source of delight to the lover of nature.
