FINANCIAL CRISIS.

NEW YORK MARKET DEMORALISED.

(Gazette's Special Service.)
LONDON, Tuesday.
The New York Market is completely demoralised. The London Market is comparatively steady. Only one small failure was announced yesterday.

BANQUE UNION D'EGYPTE.

The Khedivial decree sanctioning the creation of an Egyptian company of the Banque Union d'Egypte (Société Anonyme) has been signed. The capital is £500,000 in 100,000 shares of £5 each. These shares have been fully subscribed by the following local capitalists in the undermentioned proportions: M. Joseph N. Mosseri Bey, 25,000, M. Vita J. Mosseri Bey, 20,000, M. Elie Curiel, 15,000, M. Abramino Menasse, 12,000, M. Menasse Menasse, 12,000, Baron Jacques Elie de Menasse, 8,000, M. Gustave Cattai, 8,000.
The board of directors will consist of from nine to fifteen members. The head office of the bank will be at Cairo, with a branch at Alexandria. All the usual operations of a bank will be undertaken.

IMPERIAL OTTOMAN BANK.

The news published by a morning contemporary a few days ago that negotiations were proceeding between a Cairo group of financiers and the direction of the above bank for the purchase of its property in the Sharia El Manakh at the price of L.E. 160,000, is devoid of foundation. The bank has received several very advantageous offers but so far none have been entertained, since it has not yet been decided whether to enlarge the present premises or seek new ones elsewhere.

It is interesting to note that the property in question was bought by the late Mr. Moseley, then local manager, on behalf of the bank some 6 or 7 years ago from Mme. Veuve Mera Ismail for £18,000; the improvements and additions, including cost of building of the two shops fronting the main street, brought the total up to about £30,000. Previous to this the house was occupied for several years by the General Commanding the Army of Occupation until the purchase in 1900 of the house in the Kasr-el-Dubara quarter formerly belonging to Hussein Pasha Wassif.

IMPORTANT LAND SALE IN CAIRO.

A new company has been formed and the capital privately subscribed for the acquisition from Saifullah Pasha Youssy of his property situated in the Sharia Soliman Pasha, close to the Standard Life Buildings, consisting of some 7,000 square metres, at the price of L.E. 25 per metre, plus a large number of deferred shares. As a proof of the immense appreciation during the past two years in the price of good building sites in the Ismailieh quarter of the capital, which, by the way, have now become quite rare, we may mention that the ground in question, with the old Pension Fink that formerly stood on a portion of it, was bought by the late prioretress about eight years ago—when Mme Fink sold her house in the Sharia Kasr-el-Nil to the Bank of Egypt—from Abdel Kader Pasha, a former Minister of the Interior, for £14,000. It was acquired by pre-emption in 1905 by Osman Bey Cherif and was sold by him for £92,000 to the present owner. This works out at £13 the metre, so that the property has more than doubled in value in two years or so.

SOCIÉTÉ D'S ENTREPRISES URBAINES ET RURALES.

This company has made an interesting proposal to the Alexandria Municipality, which would give the city a Corniche route to Ramlieh without any cost. The company offer to reclaim from the sea a certain portion of land part of which, twenty metres wide, would form the road. The conditions are that the balance of the land thus reclaimed should become the property of the company. In order to protect this road from the sea the company undertake to construct a breakwater, protecting the entire length of the road. The breakwater would be so built as to leave a broad channel between it and the new reclaimed sea front, wherein could be constructed baths and amenities of the sea-side, and it also would permit pleasure boats to disport themselves in perfect security. The proposal has been sent by the Delegation to the Public Works Committee prior to bringing the question before the plenary Commission before entering into communication with the company.

EGYPTIAN NATIONALISM.

THE KHEDIVÉ'S DECLARATION.

The declaration of the Khedive in "Le Temps" has aroused universal interest. It is obvious that the interview, which has the air of a political manifesto, was given with all due deliberation with a view to publicity. M. René Puaux, to whom the Khedive made the announcement, has recently been on a visit to Egypt as a special commissioner for the Parisian "Temps". He is a well-known French journalist and would not have ventured to transmit to the important newspaper, which he represented, any imperfect or unauthorised version of his Highness's declarations. The statements of the Khedive must therefore be considered as having been deliberately authorised by his Highness with a view to the widest publicity.

We have received the following telegraphic summary of the Khedive's statements from our London correspondent:

LONDON, Monday.

M. René Puaux, the correspondent of the "Temps," has had an interview with the Khedive in which his Highness said that the necessities of the peculiar political situation had long compelled him to refrain from giving public expression to his views on the affairs of the country, but he was told that his silence might be misconstrued abroad, and he was aware that in Egypt it was interpreted in various ways, so he availed himself of the opportunity of expressing his opinions and ideas and referred to the Egyptians as people of progress, whose intelligence had found application in the development of the modern civilisation of Egypt. The day was approaching when the Egyptian peasant would equal the peasant of most civilised countries. Finance had recovered stability, and the confidence of Europe had come back to us in such a measure that Cairo and Alexandria are now two of the most important financial centres in the world. International co-operation in the Egyptian debt being no at an end, it was time to devote all efforts not only to the material welfare of the population, but to the satisfaction of their intellectual and moral requirements. He emphatically denied that national claims assumed an anti-foreign and a fanatical form. It had been stated that he aspired to the restoration of his personal power to exercise it in the oriental fashion, and to return to the methods of despotism and dissipation of certain of his predecessors. His reply was that his European education taught him the necessity of the co-operation of the nation with the sovereign for the administration and good of the country. If his thoughts only tended to the satisfaction of his personal vanity his reign would have been one long intolerable period of suffering. He always set personality on one side and had but one line of political conduct, namely, to work in agreement with anybody for the good of his country. He never opposed any measures which he believed to be useful to Egypt and never refused advice.

LONDON PRESS COMMENTS.

(Gazette's Special Service.)

LONDON, Tuesday.

The statements of the Khedive in "Le Temps" have caused a considerable sensation here and are the subject of criticism in the Press. The newspapers specially comment on the significance of the fact that the Khedive, in the interview, omitted any mention or acknowledgment of England's services to him and to his country.

LOCAL PRESS OPINIONS.

The comments of the local French newspapers are instructive. "La Réforme," with an air of deep foreboding, remarks: "We are clearly convinced that we are drawing nigh to a crisis the issue of which we cannot foresee." "Le Progrès" says: "If the thoughts of the Khedive have not been changed so as to be past recognition, his Highness appears to have come out of the obscurity in which he has hitherto shrouded himself and to have resolutely put himself at the head of the Nationalist Party."

"La Bourse Egyptienne" "The Egyptian Standard" is enthusiastic at this very vague profession of faith, but we may point out that it was difficult for the Khedive to have spoken in a different way. It seems to be otiose to conclude therefrom that his Highness is an out-and-out supporter of Mustapha Pasha Kamel."

"L'Egypte" is very gloomy as to the future outlook. It concludes a long article on the Nationalist Party with the following halucination of the impending catastrophe: "What will happen to the Nationalists? By means of exciting the Egyptians against the Europeans they will oblige the latter to take some steps, which at first may be only just and severe, but may later on become violent and possibly unjust, and in the tempest that will ensue there will disappear the prosperity of the country which rendered the people so happy, and all the institutions, as yet imperfect, whose normal and progressive development is impatiently expected by the country. Then the object of Mustapha Kamel will have been attained. All the world will know him, but how loud will be the curses against him!"

The "Egyptian Standard" says: "These declarations of the Sovereign will fill with delight the heart of every Egyptian and of every European who is a friend of Egypt. Permit us for the moment to express our highest thanks to His Highness for having refuted the stupid accusation of fanaticism and the no less stupid accusation of intrigues made—as is asserted—in favour of the restoration of the personal power of the Khedive."

"Al Moayad," in its issue of yesterday, is very discreet and says it will be better to wait for the complete text of the declarations before comment. But it remarks that it is a pity that certain newspapers have read into his Highness's remarks certain allusions to the present political situation in Egypt.

"Al Zaher" declares that the declaration has been received with pleasure by the nation for it is a happy augury to see oriental potentates announcing their line of policy to the world, thus showing that they respect public opinion.

According to telegrams from England Mr. Wilfrid Blunt has contributed a violent letter to the "Manchester Guardian" on Egypt.

GHEZIRAH FLOWER SHOW.

The Flower Show at Ghezireh opened on Saturday was the last to take place under the auspices of the Khedivial Horticultural Society; the reorganized society, which has the same aims in view, to be known in future as the Commercial Horticultural Society. The opening ceremonies on Saturday were performed by Lady Cromer, attended by Prince Hussein Pasha Kamel, punctually at 3 o'clock, both of whom made a tour of the building and adjoining sheds and expressed their great satisfaction at the excellence of the exhibits. Quite one of the leading features of the exhibition was the magnificent display of cinerarias, frezias, pansies, and other ornamental plants staged in the great entrance hall under the direction of Mr. Curtis of the P.W.D., wide borders of grass displaying these masses of bloom to the greatest advantage.

The Ethel Lady Cromer Prize, which is annually presented by Prince Hussein Pasha Kamel, was awarded this year to Dr. Keatinge for his wonderful hybrid freesia. Up to the present no one has been able to produce this flower in any colour but white or yellow; hence Dr. Keatinge's hybrid, which is of a delicate rose shade, is a very important innovation, and a valuable addition to the garden.

At the east entrance to the hall were some beautiful groups of foliage plants arranged by the Government Garden Department, and Boniteau Bey was responsible for a varied collection of well cultivated flowering and foliage plants, including some magnificent crotons.

In spite of the unfavourable season the exhibition of out blooms was extremely varied and interesting, including beautiful groups of gladioli, arum lilies and a large variety of annual flowers. Dr. Keatinge, Mme Debbane, Mrs. Crafton, Mrs. Rowlett, Mr. Findley, and Abdoula, who were all prize winners in this division, the roses shown by the latter being especially fine.

The prettily decorated lunch and dinner tables also attracted much attention; the first prize for the latter going to Effendi Moussa for his treatment of tea roses and sweet peas, while Miss Johnston gained the second prize for her delightful arrangement of lilies-of-the-valley and ferns in low silver vases on a table centre of white drawn thread work over pale green. The same clever lady also won a prize for her beautiful group of foliage plants and flowers, which included handsome specimens of arums, tulips, frezias, cinerarias, violets, etc. Mrs. Maclean was more fortunate in her exhibits of baskets and vases of flowers than in her table decoration, and some of the arrangements of cut flowers by native gardeners were extremely fine, that of roses and hyacinths, the work of Abou El Morg Aly, being specially worthy of notice.

A prize of ten pounds was offered by the society to the native grower who obtained the highest number of awards in the vegetable section. This resulted in keen competition amongst the native growers, who brought a large number of vegetables and fruit of good quality; and some of the vegetable marrows, cabbages, cauliflowers, and onions were of mammoth proportions. In the same department were also some very interesting exhibits of jams, liqueurs, etc.

Under the auspices of the reorganized society, experimental gardens are being started at Ghizeh and Ghezireh for the introduction of new vegetables, fruit, and trees, and the distribution of seed and young plants. The exhibitions will in future be held under the auspices of this society, as before stated, the offices of which are at Ghizeh.

THE MOORE CASE

The "Mokattam" gives an account of some strange revelations which have been made by the Parquet of Chebin-el-Kom in reference to the charges brought against Mr. Moore. Our contemporary states that when the Parquet interrogated the first witness called up by El Sergani, the witness took the oath and declared: "May the Lord preserve me from doing harm to Mr. Moore and stop me from bearing false testimony against him. But why should I do harm to a person who has never harmed me or anyone else?" Then the witness produced copies of telegrams addressed some to him and some to one of his relations. The senders offered him 300 pounds if he would bear false testimony against Mr. Moore, by accusing him of having extorted money from him.

It is also stated that the witness declared that gold was flowing in abundance on this occasion, and those who desired to enrich themselves had only to promise to bear false testimony.

THE EGYPTIAN INVESTMENT AND AGENCY LIMITED.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE "EGYPTIAN GAZETTE"

Dear Sir,—As an investor in this company at a time when the shares were considerably over £2 in price, I had some hope that the recent correspondence in your paper would have the result of obtaining an intimation as to the intentions of the Board with regard to the present anomalous position of the shareholders who have paid 20s. per share and only receive a dividend on 5s.

From the evident intention of the Chairman in his annual speeches to avoid all mention of this subject, although it must have often been brought before the Board, it appears that the directors are interested in maintaining the present in-quality of treatment, and I am puzzled to know what can be the reason of their doing so, and thereby keeping the company in its present limited state of development at a moment when capital can be so profitably employed in Egypt and every other financial company is increasing its sphere of operations.

No information has been vouchsafed to the shareholders as to the number of shares held with 20s. paid and those on which 5s. only has been paid, and I am driven to the conclusion that those of the latter category are mainly held by the directors, who find it more profitable. There is also the advantage for the directors that the shareholders in Egypt in parting with their nominative shares for the provisional certificates issued by the Anglo-Egyptian Bank have sacrificed their voting power, and the Board has nothing to fear and can continue to draw their £200 a year each for their good investment of £125 for many years to come. The Anglo-Egyptian Bank is naturally highly satisfied with the present arrangement, which gives them the use of nearly £150,000 of other people's money at a nominal interest.

It is to be hoped that the Alexandria Brokers' Association may take some action on the matter and bring pressure to bear on the directors to either return our 15s. per share, call up the full capital or if this should be inconvenient to any impetuous director, to pay dividends on the amount paid up, issuing proper bearer shares against the present bank certificates.

The to-day's quotation of £1 per share is the lowest yet recorded and speaks eloquently to the public opinion of the state of affairs, quite as much as that of the latest flotation of the company, "leur galette annuelle" as a French friend calls it, does as to the general opinion of the business capacity of the management and directorate.

THE BRITISH CLUB.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE "EGYPTIAN GAZETTE"

Sir,—I was born and bred in Liverpool, the son of a British subject, and am an Englishman in everything except my surname. According to the rules of the British Club all British subjects are eligible for election to the club, yet I was refused admission to the club because my application, as I am told, "cannot be considered under the present rules and by-laws of the club." My proposer, Mr. H. O'Donnell, was informed that the real reason why I could not belong to the club was because I was not a genuine Britisher but only a British subject and so, I presume, a sort of pariah. I have every claim to be an Englishman by domicile under the law of England and it seems to me that such an extraordinary theory of racial caste feeling, as exemplified by the proceedings of the British Club in my case, cannot be in any way justified. To display such a narrow idea of race is to injure the Empire, for why should we Englishmen, who happen to have foreign names, be excluded from a British club? There are thousands of thoroughbred Englishmen with absolutely foreign names of every sort and kind. On such grounds, I presume, no member of the Royal Family would be allowed to belong to the British Club because they have a German name. The patrician descendants of the Ancient Britons, who decided the question of my exclusion from the club on account of my name, would on identical grounds exclude Lord Cromer because the name of Baring is not two hundred years old in England. Under such a system the old families of the Channel Isles would be excluded and also the many descendants of the Huguenot refugees who settled in England after the revocation of the Edict of Nantes.

I do not write this because I am vexed at my exclusion from the club. On the contrary I have no wish to be a member on sufferance. But I am convinced that if this petty interpretation of the term "Britisher" were in vogue throughout the Empire, the bonds which unite us together as a whole would be terribly weakened by such an extraordinarily narrow interpretation of one of the widest and most honourable designations for a great part of the human race.—I am, etc.,

Messrs. Huddleston, MacMichael, Mathew, Osborne, Willis, and Woodland have been granted the powers of first class magistrates in the Sudan under the Code of Criminal Procedure.

NOTES FROM SUEZ.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

Suez, Monday.

The hired troopship Rewa arrived this morning from Bombay having on board different drafts and details, amounting to 1,635 officers and men, Major E. Elen, of the Oxford Light Infantry, being the commanding officer. The Rewa entered the Canal in the forenoon bound to Southampton. This is her last trip for this year's troopship season.

The S.S. Castello, which is in collision with H.M.S. Bedford is now discharging her cargo at Suez to undergo repairs, as she has been seriously damaged, apparently by the Bedford's propeller, a piece of which was found on the Castello.

EGYPT AND LEVANT STEAMSHIP COMPANY.

The general meeting of this company was held at Alexandria yesterday. The directors submitted their report and accounts for the nine months ending 31st December, 1906, which we are sure will be found very satisfactory by the shareholders, for, in spite of the fact that more than half the company's fleet was delivered by the builders at intervals between the months of July and September, and therefore was earning dividends only for an average period of about four months, the profit and loss account enables the directors to pay a dividend at the rate of 5% per annum on the capital of the company, to transfer to depreciation account the substantial sum of £5,000, carry forward £976.12.11, and to write off a further sum of £1,521.10.0 from goodwill and preliminary expenses, and this in spite of the fact that, owing to the great increase in the cost of shipping since the steamers were bought, the company's fleet to-day, which is mostly composed of brand new steamers only a few months old, is worth many thousands of pounds more than the company paid for them.

MOROCCAN SITUATION.

FRENCH OCCUPATION.

PARIS, March 25. The Cabinet discussed the measures to be taken to obtain reparation for the murder of Dr. Mauchamp. The cruisers Jeanne d'Arc and Lalande have started for Morocco. (R)

PARIS, March 25. The Moroccan situation is regarded with some anxiety in France. The tone of the German and French press in discussing the various recent incidents is increasingly acrimonious.

The Cabinet has decided to occupy Ujda, near the Algerian frontier, pending satisfaction being given for the murder of Dr. Mauchamp. (Reuter)

PARIS, March 25. The Council of Ministers has decided to occupy Ujda until Morocco gives the reparation demanded. (Havas)

TOULON, March 25. The cruisers Jeanne d'Arc and Lalande have left for Tangier. (Havas)

CHANNEL TUNNEL.

BILL WITHDRAWN.

LONDON, March 25. In view of the Government's opposition the promoters have withdrawn the Channel Tunnel Bill. (Reuter)

THE SIAMESE TREATY.

PARIS, March 25. The Siamese treaty increases the French Colonial domain by 20,000 square kilometres of rich territory. (Reuter)

THE FINANCIAL CRISIS.

LONDON, March 25. The settling of the Stock Exchange is proceeding earlier than was apprehended. The announcement that it will be closed on Saturday is regarded favourably. (Reuter)

RUSSIAN SQUADRON AT PORTSMOUTH.

LONDON, March 25. A Russian squadron has arrived at Portsmouth on a few days' visit. (Reuter)

DEATH OF GEN. BADCOCK.

LONDON, March 25. General Sir Alexander Badcock is dead. (Reuter)

FAMOUS SURGEON DEAD.

BERLIN, March 25. Professor Bergmann, the famous surgeon who attended the Emperor Frederick, is dead. (Reuter)

FUNERAL OF BERTHELOT.

PARIS, March 25. At the funeral of Berthelot, M. Briand eulogised the illustrious savant. (Havas)

PRINCE VON BULOW.

Rome, March 25. Prince von Bulow has arrived at Rapallo. (Havas)

TELEGRAMS.

WAR IN CENTRAL AMERICA.

SEVERAL SHARP BATTLES.

NEW YORK, March 25. The Nicaraguans have seized Choluteca, which the Hondurans and San Salvadoreans held. The President Bonilla embarked on a vessel and escaped. Steamers have started in pursuit. (Reuter)

NEW YORK, March 25. The Nicaraguans have fought several sharp battles with the Hondurans and San Salvadoreans, who have been uniformly beaten. The causes which led to the war remain unexplained. (Reuter)

RUMANIAN UN EST.

TROOPS ATTACKED.

BUKAREST, March 25. The disturbances are ascribable to a huge trust holding 3,188,000 acres which sub-lets to peasants at exorbitant rents.

2,000 peasants attacked a company of soldiers in the village of Bachi armed with revolvers and rifles. The troops were outnumbered and retired after firing and killing 40 peasants and wounding many others. (Reuter)
