SIR ELDON GORST.

RECEPTION BY KHEDIVE.

At a quarter to ten this morning. Sir Eldon Gorst, who arrived from Cairo yesterday even-ing accompanied by Mr. Ronald Graham and Mr. Gaisford, left the British British Consulate on his way to Ras el 'Tin palace, to receive his official recognition by the Khedive as Diplomatic Agent and Consul-General of his Britannic Majesty in Egypt. Treeeded by an escort of mounted police with drawn swords, Sir Eldon Gorst drove to the palace in the Khedivial state coach in company with Zeki Pasha, First Master of Ceremonies to the Khedive. Another body of mounted police followed and next came a second stage coach, in which were seated Mr. Gould, H.B.M.'s. Consul at Alexandria, Mr. Graham and Mr. Gaisford. The procession, which was a most impressive sight, was viewed by large crowth collected in the streets, and the nutives appeared especi-ally impressed by it.

After being received by the Khedive, who was surrounded by his Ministers, Sir Eldon Gorst returned to the British Consulter, where he remained for some time with Mr. Gould, and he afterwards paid a visit to the Gouver-norat, where he was received by Mustapha Pasha Ibadi.

The Customs Administration's return for the past month are very satisfactory and the figures for last month and the totals for the first four months of the year show that the trade of

The imports for April amounted to L.E. 2,243,950, an increase of L.E. 535,098 on the figures for the corresponding month last year. The exports amounted to L.E. 1,516,657, an increase of L.E. 87,025. The total imports for the first four months of the year amount in value to L.E. 8,398,992, an increase of L.E. 1,428,449 on the figures for the same period in 1906. The annual meeting of the British School of Archaeology in Egypt was held at Universi-ty College, London, to-day week, when Pro-fessor Finders Petric gave an interesting description of the discoveries which have been ade in the course of the present For more than a month, he said, he ar

The discoveries ranged over every age of Egyptian history. The site near Ghizeh was that on which the Egyptian officials some two or three years ago found a tomb of the First Dynasty. Their hopes of making fresh finds there had not been disappointed. In particular they had found a large circular tomb, pro-bably that of some royal personage, not neces-garily of a king. Most likely it was the tomb of a king's son. The period, which had been accertained to a certainty, was that of the third king of the First Dynasty. Here they uncarthed portions of eighty stone vases and ago at Abydos, but of blue glaze, which

Another tomb contained thirty or forty stone vases of the Second Dynasty, the largest group of that period ever brought to light. Glizeh, the burial place for Memphis, had hitherto been considered to have been founded by one of the Kings of the Fourth Dynasty, but as a result of these researches it was found that it had existed from the time of the First Dynasty. LOCK GATES AND SLUICES.

Mr. Wilfrid Stokes managing director of Mesara Ransomes and Rapier Ld., is again in Cairo and has just signed a contract with the gyptian Government for the necessary alter-ations to the look gates and sluices involved by raising the Assound Dam. We are not a little surprised to hear that notwithstanding the fact that the level of water to be held up by the aluices is raised some 23 feet only very few of the sluice will require alteration and these only to a trifling extent. It would seem therefore that the confidence placed in Mesara. Ransomes and Rapier by the Government has been amply justified and that their designs and workmanship compare most favourably with these of other undertakings carried out by

AN IMPORTANT DISCOVERY.

nost important discovery has bee baths of Menas City and them I with the monastery of Saint Me in the baths of Menas City and thermae con-nected with the monastery of Saint Menas—a fine, old, Christian basilica forming part of the baths. The basilica has three naves, the central nave having a breadth of 7.30 m; its large apse with prothesis and diakonikon is well preserved. Up to the present five marble bases have been mearthed and fragments of columns, on one of which a Greek inscription to Menasiscarved. A ministure column (30 cm) shows the sign of a cross in high relief, and also remains of dipinto inscriptions, pottery and marble pavement are found. Some of the bath appartments lie (and this is a most interesting fact for the "ancient Lourdes") directly in the southern nave of the basilien and all others communicate with the church by waiting rooms and corridors.

For all in-formation on these points I am indebted to the kindness of Captain Hayes Sadler, the Director of Sudan Customs. It is impossible, at this point, not to a say a word as to the work which has been achieved by this officer.
