NATIONALIST HISTORY.

The youth of Egypt is learning a strange form of history from its guides, so strange that one is convinced that the present genera tion will witness the birth of quite a number of myths. Some have indeed made their appear ance—e.g. the Denishwai myth, the myth relating to the resignation of Lord Cromer though this last off-spring of the Goddess Credulity shows signs of succumbing to infantile decay—while others have been reinfantile decay—while others have been revived both by the Egyptian Nationalists and their opponents, e.g. the myth of Arab superiority to the Turk, the myth of "Islamic' civilisation, the myth of the Arab military virtues, the myth of the Arab descent of the majority of the Egyptians, and the myths concerning European aggression at the exmajority of the hyppicans, and the myths concerning Buropean aggression at the ex-pense of the Moslem nations of the west. The last is certainly the most wide spread, and the most plausible and it is on that account that we will deal with it first.

The Arab conquests of the first two centurie of the Moslem era were carried out by bands of fervent proselytisers (with a taste for plunder and a penchant towards the fair sex) clinely at the expense of the Byzantine and Persian monarchies and the Christian and Zoroastrian religions : they were only successzoroastrian rengions; they were only success-ful owing to the fact that the two great empires were exhausted by the long and terrific struggle between Heraclius and Chosroes, and that the old Western Empire (where the Roman element predominated as a civilising force, though the races were as mixed as in the Eastern Empire) had fallen to pieces before the assaults of the northern barbarians. The Arab conquest had, none the less, an immense importance to European masters and European civilisation the prov. nasters and European civilisation, the ces of Syria, Egypt, North Africa and Spain. It completely wiped out all vestiges of Christianity in the African provinces west o'. Egypt and it practically destroyed the Egypt and it practically destroyed the Roman organisation, the 'machine' of gov-ernment from Urfa to the Pyrenees. Its sole justification was the vigour and energy displayed by the conquerors, which saved them from the consequences of their own lack of organisation. Religious fervour, cour-age and deal, triumpher for a time course. age and dash, triumphed for a time over a higher organisation unimbued with the moreover, been softened by the relaxation of manners and morals that followed victory. Roderic the Visigoth was a very poor match for Tarik the Berber, but without being too partial, one may reasonably contend that the Moslem conquerors would have won at best but Pyrrhic victories against the Gothic host that annihilated the Eastern legions at Adrianople or the armies of Alaric or Clovis. This contention is supported by the failure of the Saracens in France, in Italy and in Asia Minor. In Italy though they conquered Sicily and Calabria, they were unable to Sicily and Calabria, they were unable to extend their conquests to the north. In France caphers.

The conquests of the Arabs were based upon the principle that 'might is right.' The Arab who had fought at Kadesiya or Wadi Yarmuk believed that his cause was just, that the Divine blessing hallowed his exploits, that it was the will of God that he should prevail.

He did not even consider the Byzantine or He did not even consider the Byzantine or Persian case. Similarly the invaders of France Persian case. Similarly the invaders of France never asked themselves whether the Franks and Gauls were likely to accept Islam, whether they were not justified in resisting plunderers and conquerors and in refusing tribute. The Arab fought firstly for his personal pleasure and advantage. Salvation, plunder, a well stocked harem in this world and the hour's in the cast. and according ashes prejously reshaus. the next—and secondly, subconsciously perhaps, for the triumph of Islam and Islamic ideas. Is this explanation of his motives too materialis-tic t Hardly, for we write of the average Arab whom we consider to have been and to be as human as any other warrior of the past. Religious fervour and material advantage went hand in hand, as they did in the case of the Crusader, who, having conceived a notion that robbery under arms, superior piracy in fact, was sanctioned by Heaven when committed at the expense of 'infidels,' fought with a fervour the expense of inners, rought with a nervour that was seldem accompanied by a knowledge of tactics or by the display of the vulgarest common-sense. In fact, it might be urged that the more civilised a nation becomes the more idealistic are its armies. The average European and Japanese soldier fights because he has in him the conviction

necessary his life to the State. It is idle to contend that he has no choice, for if the majority of civilised men were Tolstoyans, armies and wars would come to an end. As it is he fights for the 'fatherland' i.e. in the interest, real or supposed, of the State, its insti-tutions, its religion or ideals, and its safety, and the more convinced he is of the excellence of these institutions, and ideals, the better he will fight. As for the question of "right" and "wrong," we doubt whether these concepts wrong," we doubt whether these concepts have ever guided the rulers or the people of any nation when the national security or ideals any nation when the national security or ideals have been threatened, or even questioned. From the point of view of the logician there was a good deal to say for the Boer case in 1899, but the mass of the English people realised more or less clearly that they were about to put the question—is S. Africa to be under the Union Jack or the Vierkleur—to the under the Union Jack or the Vierkleur — to the trial of battle. Similarly the conquerors of Algeria, Saracens or Frenchmen, as far as they considered the question at all, believed them-selves to be absolutely justified in making conquests at the expense of the inhabitants of the country. They believed in their civilisa-tion, their religion, or their institutions, sufficiently to be ready to enforce them upon others against their will. The more vigorous the against their will. The more vigorous the inner life of a state or a people, the more expansive are its energies and the more thorough its conquest, and the European expansion in the 19th century at the expense of the western Moslems is an exact parallel to the Moslem expansion in the 7th century at the expense of the Roman Empire. Here we find the justification—if any were needed—of the "aggressions" of Europe in the Medi terranean. These wars of conquest are in reality "wars of reconquest". The heirs of the civilisation of the Empire; Gauls, Britons, Iberians, Italians, have won back for their civilisation—the lineal descendant of the conclusional collutre—the province lost in the conelassical culture—the province lost in the conclassical culture—the province lost in the con-fusion of the dark ages, by conquest, occupation or protectorate: the methods vary, but the end has been the same. If, therefore, the Moslems of Egypt or North Africa complain of the aggressions of the European powers or deplore the excess of Imperialism, they should at least have the honesty to admit that the heirs of Greek and Roman civilisation have but re-occupied the territories once lost to the aggressive imperialism of the Araba, which aggressive imperialism of the Arabs, which though inspired by courage and zeal, never proved itself capable of creating a stable politic-al system in the place, of that which it so suddenly destroyed. The Arabs of N. Afrea, Tunis, Algeria and Morocco, had for 1100 years the opportunity of building up a well organised state or states. They failed under the Caliphs and when the Caliphate had loosen-ed its hold on N. Africa, they failed again to ssive imperialism of the Arabs, which ed its hold on N. Africa, they failed again to produce anything better than dynasties of barbarous and often fanatical conquenors— Almohades, Almoravides, Aghlabites, or bands of pirates whose empire was finally destroyed to the great satisfaction of all the dwellers on the North coast of the Mediterranean. We are quite ready to grant that the Sallee rovers who sacked Baltimore near Cork, and even reached Iceland. were hardy and adventurous fellows hornets, highwaymen, panthers, and other predatory beings. But we refuse to admit that no one has any right to attempt to destroy these picturesque bût dangerous creatures. Those who justly complain of aggression must never age and dash, ritumphed for a time over a who justly complain of aggression must never the enthusiasm necessary for success, or over barbarian enemies who lacked the Roman discipline and the Moslem faith and had, moreover, been softened by the relaxation or a religion that has never committed a single act of aggression against its neighbours. Were there such a tribe, nation, or religion, the sole trace of it which he would discover would be its obituary notice, for the Greek saying Polemos patêr pantôn' is as true of human institutions as of the animal world, whether 'war, the father of all things' be waged with the bayonet or with the ballot box.

DISTRICT POST OFFICES.

The postal administration has opened district offi-ces in far less important parts of the capital, for example at Faggalla, Bab-el-Khalk and Nasrieh and we think it is high time that steps should be at once taken to remedy this deficiency for the quarters that require a district office far more than any of the latter.

BONAPARTE IN EGYPT.

Were this the custom of the military author-ities in the Sudan they would soon have no troops left! The days when an Egyptian war troops left! The days when an Egyptian war vessel searched the Mediterranean in vain for Malta and returned with the news "Malta mafeesh" are past. Then there was no press to expose the mismanagement which could lead to so comic and so humiliating an incident. Now the mistake of a luckless guide, which seems to have cost him his life is brought up against the War Office and the Sudan Government by their self appointed critics, who ment by their self appointed critics, who having never done any desert work on camels, do not realise the dangers that beset the best equipped expeditions.

PRESS OF EGYPT.

INTERESTING STATISTICS

Artin Pasha contributes an interestin Artin Pasha contributes an interesting articles to the "Bulletin de l'Institut Egyptien" giving the statistics of the Press in Egypt up to the end of 1904. According to this article there were in 1839 two newspapers, one in Arabic and one in Turkish, in 1868 there were 3 French, 2 Italian, 1 Arabic and Turkish and 1 Arabic journal; in 1889 15 Arabic, 8 French, 1 English French, 4 Italian and 5 Greet, and in 1904, the features were as Arabic, 8 French, 1 English-French, 4 Italian and 5 Greek; and in 1904 the figures were as follows:—Arabic 118, French 17, French-English 3, Italian 6, Greek 15, French-English-Arabic 2, English 3, Hebrew 1, French-Arabic 1, English-Arabic 1, Italian-French 2, Armenian 3, and Turkish 3. Of the journals being published at the end of 1904; 29 were daily, 4 three times a week, 6 twice a week, 76 weekly, 24 twice a month, and 37 monthly. Of the 33 papers published in 1889 only 16 continued to 1904.

At the annual general meeting of the Kobe Board of Trade the President remarked that the cotton mills of Japan during 1906 had a the cotton mills of Japan during 1906 had a most successful year, their production being sold out for some months ahead almost all the year round. The Canadian Commercial Agent at Yokohama reports that large dividends were earned by the better class of spinning mills, and a considerable increase of spiules would be made this year. Prices of yarns dropped somewhat in the summer months, but advanced towards the end of the year. The quantity exported was some 1,000 piculs (1 picul equals 133lb,) less than tor 1905, though the value shows an increase of 1,500,000 yen. The market generally was in a very healthy condition, and with a good demand from China on account of the increase in the price of silver, mills generally are in a most thourishing condition, and one or two bave made arrangements for an increase of capital. From another source the Canadian Commercial Agent states that the cotton-spinning industry, which made considerable progress after the Japan-China War, does not indicate so great a relative expansion under the influence of the present speculative mania assome other industries. CAIRO BUILDING SITES

NO FALL IN PRICES.

A correspondent writes:—There seems to be an idea that prices of building sites in the better residential districts of the Capital are fallaing, or that we may expect a drop in the near future, but such an idea is altogether fallacious, and not borne out by facts, for sites suitable for building purposes have, on the contrary, been steadily increasing all the winter, and even at this moment there is only a momentary lull, which is usual at the dull season of the year, but no relapse from former evalues is apparent from the recent sales. GREAT EGYPTIAN DICTIONARY.

Before the Berlin Academy of Science the other day Prof. Adolf Erman, the well-k

other day Prof. Adolf Erman, the well-known Egyptologist, reported the progress made on the Dictionary of Egyptology, the mammeth effort of the German scientific world. The material gathered in the last nine years has been sifted and is now ready for editing.

Prof. Erman declares that it is not his aim to produce a finished book similar to "Thesaurus Linguae Latinae" for Egyptian philologists. The object of the new dictionary is to enable the student to translate Egyptian texts without being compelled to depend upon guesswork. Much has been accomplished toward formulating a grammar during the last three decades, and it is hoped that similar results may attend the attempt to define and classify the vocabulary.

results may attend the attempt to define and classify the vocabulary.

It is a mistake, however, Prof. Erman continues, to indulge in false illusions. Just as the grammar offered a comparatively limited knowledge of the rules governing verbal expression, so the vocabulary must of necessity leave much to be desired. There are a million words, some permanent, some transitory, in many forms and expressing many shades of meaning, the true definitions of which can only be reached by infinite comparison aided by an endless process of exclusion.

TRADE OF CYPRUS.

(FROM OUR CYPRUS CORRESPONDENT)

(Continued from May 27, 1907).

It must not be imagined from the preceding observations that Cyprus is a land suited more to gardening than to farming. We have already referred to her wine and corn. In ancient days she was known as the "Granary of the East," and although times have changed she still continues year after year to lay down a large part of her soil to cereal crops. Of these barley is the most extensively grown and every year the best of it goes to Messrs. Bass every year the best of it goes to Mesars. Bass and Co. for malting purposes. The old-fashioned methods of husbandry employed account for the comparatively small yields per acre, but modern ploughs and other agricultural implements are being adopted more and more and the use of these, together with a more enlightened system of rotation in place of alternate cropping and fallowing, should give more abundant returns.



TRADE OF CYPRUS.



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
