ZOO SECRETARY AND A MARRIAGE PROBLEM.

Dr. P. Chalmers Mitchell, Secretary to the Zoological Society, and a distinguished scientist, writes a very informative letter to the "Times" concerning a physiological aspect of marriage. "Your correspondent 'Medicus,' he says, 'attempts to draw a distinction between marriage with a deceased wife's sister and that with a deceased husband's brother on a supposed physiological fact. He states that a physiological objection, absent in the former case, is present in the latter. He asserts that a woman who has borne a child, retains in her constitution some definite trace or taint of the father of that child, a trace which would be carried over to children by a second father, and is so bold as to give the categorical instance that 'if a white woman have a child by a black man, her subsequent children, even if the father be a white man, will be more or less black.' He draws the logical inferences that, if her first marriage has been fertile, a woman in marrying her deceased husband's brother would be marrying a man to whom she had acquired a close blood relationship, and that children of such a marriage would be liable to some portion of the physical disadvantages that fall on the children of marriage between brother and sister.

"The supposed physiological fact is a popular belief of very long standing. Breeders of animals have believed from time immemorial that a dam was 'infected' by the sire of her first offspring in such a fashion as to transmit his characters to subsequent progeny by another sire. The classical case was reported by Lord Morton to the Royal Society in 1820. A chestnut mare, after having a hybrid by a quagga, produced to a black Arabian horse several foals showing a number of stripes. In the popular interpretation of such facts, propounded by 'Medicus' as physiological truth, there are two elements which must be distinguished. There is what I may call the 'acquired consanguinity,' that of Lord Morton's mare to the quagga, that according to 'Medicus' of any woman to the father of her child.

"I may be allowed to point out, in passing, that, if there were any truth in the view of 'Medicus,' there would be a greater physiological sin in a woman having a second child to her husband than to the brother of her deceased husband, inasmuch as the consanguinity she is supposed to have acquired would be greater to her husband than to her husband's brother.

"Next, there is the supposed effect of this acquired consanguinity on children to a new sire, a possibility for which the word 'telegony' is employed in scientific discussion. Some years ago Professor Weismann redirected attention to 'telegony,' and, without explicitly denying its existence, pointed out important theoretical difficulties in the way of accepting it, and insisted on the necessity of careful scrutiny of alleged cases and of extensive experimental investigation. Since then experimental breeding has been conducted on a large scale in the hope of settling the problem. Professor Cosnar Ewart, in particular, having made most extensive experiments at Penycuik, using horses, asses, and zebras, and all manner of domesticated animals. The results have been conclusive; not the faintest shadow of a ground has been discovered for supposing the existence of any telegonic influence of a first sire on offspring to a second sire.

"The pair of white cattle now at the Zoological Gardens in Regent's Park have this year committed the indiscretion of producing a coal-black calf. They come from herds supposed to represent remnants of the original wild white cattle of England, and it is at least certain that the cow at the Gardens has had no calves nor opportunity of producing calves to any except a white bull. If she had been previously mated successfully with a black bull, the present black calf to the white bull would be a typical case of the kind of occurrence upon which the suppositions of acquired consanguinity and telegony are based.

"Those who wish to legalize marriage with a deceased husband's brother need not fear the existence of a physiological barrier; and couples who have already one child need not become Malthusians lest consanguinity acquired through the first child ruin the constitutions of subsequent children."

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

**Alexandria v. Cairo.**  
A two days' cricket match will be played to-morrow and Saturday afternoon on the grounds of the Alexandria Cricket Club between teams representing Cairo and Alexandria, playing commencing each day at 1.30 p.m.

**Tramcar Affray.**  
Yesterday about 10 a.m. two natives in a tramcar at Zaber commenced a quarrel, which ended in one of the adversaries producing a knife and stabbing the other, inflicting a dangerous wound. The aggressor was arrested and taken to the carcerol.

**Death of a British Soldier.**  
Three days ago the Commander of the Inniskilling Fusiliers informed the police officials that one of the regiment was missing. The body of the soldier was found yesterday morning in the Nile at the Delta Barrage and conveyed to the Citadel.

**Fatal Mosquito Sting.**  
A death from a mosquito sting is reported from Tottenham. Florence Fowler, the fifteen-year-old daughter of the engineer at the Dust Destructor Works, was stung by one of these insects at the beginning of last week. Blood poisoning afterwards set in, and the girl died three days later.

**Births and Deaths.**  
508 births, of which 7 were of European parentage, and 434 deaths, of which 12 were Europeans, were registered in Cairo during the week ending the 16th instant. 262 of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age. The principal causes of death were:—dysentery, typhoid, erysipelas and fever.

**Panic in a Synagogue.**  
A panic was provoked in the Rue El Moghrabi Synagogue, Cairo, on Tuesday by the electric light going out. Considerable disorder and struggling resulted, during which one of the crowd received very serious injuries. An electrical engineer, who was in the synagogue, eventually succeeded in restoring the current.

**Death in the Street.**  
As an old native man was walking through the Pathé establishment this morning he suddenly fell down in a fit and died before medical assistance could be obtained. The Soccorso d'Urgenza arrived within a few minutes, and the body was conveyed to hospital for the post-mortem examination.

**Ariston Aired Water Co.**  
We hear that the damage which the machinery of the Ariston factory sustained during the recent fire, which appears to have been somewhat exaggerated in the Press reports, has been repaired and the factory is now in full working order, the well-known waters now being manufactured at the usual rate of supply.

**The "Olive-moor."**  
The salvage of the cargo of the "Olive-moor" is still being carried on and up to the present three lighter-loads have been brought into harbour, and the salvaged cargo will, we understand, be deposited in the Bonded Warehouses this afternoon. The sea is somewhat rougher this morning, which necessitates the salvage steamer keeping some fifty yards off the ship.

**Abandoned Infants.**  
At the meeting of the Municipal Delegation on Tuesday evening, the President communicated a project presented by a number of native notables for the creation of a refuge for abandoned native infants, with the object of decreasing the heavy mortality among children which has obtained for some considerable time. The refuge will give all necessary care and nourishment to the children. The committee promoting this charitable institution has requested the support of the Alexandria Municipality.

**New Cotton Press.**  
The inauguration of the establishment of the Société Anonyme Egyptienne des Presses Allemandes at No. 90 Rue Premier Khedive took place at ten o'clock this morning and was attended by a large number of invited, including the Governor of Alexandria, several members of the Consular Corps, Schiass Pasha, and representatives of the local Press. A general inspection of the building, the machinery, and the methods employed in the cotton pressing convinced us that everything had been arranged on the most modern lines and that every attention had been paid to detail.

**SMYRNA-AIDIN OTTOMAN RAILWAY.**  
The report of the Ottoman Railway from Smyrna to Aidin for the half-year ended 30th June last, to be submitted at the meeting on the 24th instant, states that the receipts on revenue account amounted to £124,506, as compared with £104,707 in the corresponding period of 1906. The expenditure amounted to £33,254, as compared with £48,771, and the net profit amounted to £68,489, as compared with £57,936. After defraying all fixed charges for the half-year the balance of net revenue, including the sum brought forward, amounts to £51,092, out of which the Council recommend the payment of an interim dividend of 8s per share on account of the year 1907, leaving £33,254 to be carried forward. The expenditure on construction of the pier and warehouses amounted to £10,441, and on additions to carriage and locomotive stock £16,934, which has been charged to capital account. The traffic for the current half-year shows a decrease up to the present time owing to diminished crops in the lower districts of the line, occasioned by a wet and late season, but the reports from the higher districts are satisfactory, and the outlook in that portion of the line is better than it was last year.

TRADE DIFFICULTIES.

REALISATION OF DEBTORS' STOCK.

An interesting point has arisen in connection with some of the recent Egyptian failures. It is customary in a deed of inspektorship to give the inspectors power to supervise the carrying on of the business, with authority to permit the debtors to expend whatever sums are necessary upon the replenishment of stock. In the cases referred to it has been considered advisable to restrict this optional authority, and to provide that of the amounts realised half shall be devoted to replenishing stock and the remaining half distributed among the creditors. This completely alters the character of the arrangement. Under the first form the stock was maintained as high as possible, so that the business might continue. The result would practically amount to a distribution of profits among the creditors, a long and tedious process of waiting. Now (says the "Manchester Guardian") the arrangement has been altered to one of gradual realisation, and sooner or later the stage must arrive when the stock is insufficient to carry on the business effectively. But some such alteration was absolutely necessary, since the object of the deeds was to pay the creditors, and not to furnish the debtors with capital to carry on their businesses. Since the alteration affects the deed itself it is necessary to obtain new assents, and for these the inspectors are now asking.

INTERNATIONAL POSTAGE STAMP.

"The new international stamp agreed upon at the Rome Postal Congress of 1906, on the motion of Mr. Henniker Heaton, has now been prepared, and will be issued for use next month," says the "Daily Chronicle." The stamp is really a coupon measuring approximately four inches by three. It has been designed by M. Eugène Grasset, and engraved by M. E. Florian, both of Paris.

"The coupon is really a kind of little postal order to bearer, to be exchanged for stamps so that anyone writing, say from Europe to America, and wishing to send a stamp for reply, can take advantage of it. Five million stamps have been printed, and each country will order several hundred thousands.

"The vignette on the stamp represents the figure of a goddess as a messenger of peace from one hemisphere to the other. In the background are olive branches. The robes of the goddess are a bluish-grey fading in the background into a yellowish-green. The olive branches are also of that colour, making a soft, harmonious blend. The stamp has been made by Messrs. Benziger and Company, of Einsiedeln, Switzerland. Immediately above the figure are the words in each case in the language of the country which issues the stamp:

"This coupon can be exchanged for a stamp of the value of 25 centimes, or the equivalent of this amount, in the countries which have accepted the agreement."

"The countries which have entered into the arrangement include Great Britain, France, Germany, Austria, Belgium, United States, Spain, British Colonies, French Colonies, Egypt, Mexico, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Sweden, Switzerland, Roumania, Japan, Siam, Korea, Greece, Italy, Chili, Costa-Rica, Crete, Denmark, Luxemburg, and Norway."

OBSTRUCTING THE POLICE.

A commotion of no considerable importance in itself, but which served as an illustration of the degree to which the police are handicapped in the carrying out of their duty, disturbed the residents of the district surrounding the German Hospital, Alexandria, at half past ten last night. A little child was knocked down by arabah No. 1016 and the loud crying of the women and shouting of the men, ending with that shrill, penetrating shriek which signifies the death of one of their race, soon brought a large number of people from their houses. The child, however, had not been badly hurt, one hand only having been slightly injured. All who witnessed the accident agreed that the fault lay with the arabah, and an effort was made by a ghaffir to take the man to the neighbouring carcerol for the case to be enquired into. This, however, was prevented by an interfering Effendi who was sufficiently proud of his unjustifiable interference with the police in the execution of their duty to give his name and address to a representative of the "Egyptian Gazette," who protested against his action. There are, however, parallel cases daily and the native man in the street appears to consider it his privilege to decide whether a policeman has the right to arrest an offender, and, if in his opinion the matter is not worth referring to the carcerol, he forcibly obstructs the police. We trust that severe lessons will be given at the first opportunity to several of those who interfere in this way and that by such means the public will be made to learn that the decision as to whether a case should be referred to the carcerol or not lies with the police.

MOTOR CARS FOR THE DESERT.

A further series of tests with the motor car which the Sirdar has had constructed for use in the desert were carried out at Westbarn Sands, Haddingtonshire, last week. To overcome the difficulty of the wheels sinking in the sand a succession of iron teeth, much the same as the paddle of a steamer, were strapped to the rear wheels. This invention was a success, the wheels climbing out of the sandholes quite easily.

AMERICA'S COTTON CROP.

NEXT SEASON'S PROSPECTS.

Messrs. Neil Brothers, in their cotton circular published last Tuesday give the official report of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange of the crop for 1906-7. The amount is 13,511,000 bales. Messrs. Neil's own estimate on 30th October was 13,000,000 to 13,500,000 bales, the latter figure being definitely adopted a few weeks later. Their forecast was thus remarkably approximate to the truth, and confirms their previous good record as cotton crop authorities. Other expert calculations in October ranged from 11,250,000 to 13,300,000 bales, and all the three leading New York authorities were 2,000,000 bales out. The past season's crop is the biggest, with one exception, of the decade, and is 2,165,000 bales larger than that for 1905-6. The exception was the crop for 1904-5, which amounted to 13,566,000 bales. The distribution of the crop has been almost as remarkable as its size. Of the bumper crop of 1904-5 only 12,509,000 bales were taken by the trade, but of the past season's yield no less than 13,079,000 bales have been absorbed, and in Messrs. Neil's opinion quite 12,750,000 bales have been actually spun at the mills. The quantity exported has been 8,510,000, as against 6,755,000 bales, and of this 3,772,000 as compared with 2,884,000 bales has come to the United Kingdom. The States themselves have accounted for 4,965,000, as against 4,737,000 bales. Messrs. Neil decline to give any estimate yet of next season's crop, but they state the area planted is beyond all precedent, and that the farmers are making greater efforts than ever before to produce a bumper yield. But the weather is more important than acreage.

THE NEW BOULAC BRIDGE.

The following particulars of the new Boulac Bridge about to be erected by the Government appear in "Engineering," and will prove of interest. The bridge will cross the river between Boulac and Ghezireh Island, at an angle of about 26 degrees to the direction of the river. The superstructure will be of steel, supported by six piers. The total length between quay walls will be 900 ft., in seven spans. At the shore ends there will be on each side two fixed spans, each 167 ft. long, then one fixed span 62 ft., with an opening span in the centre of 108 ft. 10 in. The bridge will have an available width of about 60 ft.; the footpaths will each be 9 ft. 10 in. wide, leaving a roadway of 39 ft. 4 in. wide, of asphalt on concrete, carried on buckled plates. There will be two lines of tramway on the north side. The opening span will leave a free passage of about 88 ft. 7 in. between the piers for navigation purposes. It will be made according to the Scherzer rolling lift-bridge system, which necessitates an ascending slope from the abutments towards the opening span in order to gain sufficient space for the girders supporting the machinery. Each fixed span of the bridge will consist of two straight main girders; the two parallel booms are to be connected by diagonal bars only, without vertical or suspension bars. The piers and abutments will be built in masonry on foundations sunk by compressed air. Each pier will be built of masonry, and will have a width of about 12 ft. at the level of the girder supports. The bottom of the caisson will be founded at a level of 91 ft. below High Nile, or about 98 ft. 6 in. below the roadlevel. The great depth of foundations is necessitated by the depth of the river at this point, which is about 82 ft. 2 in. below High Nile. It is intended to have a heavy granite portal or archway of a monumental character at the entrance to the bridge. The new roadway is continued across Ghezireh Island and crosses the small branch of the Nile known as the Bahr-el-Aama, between the Island and the West Bank, by another bridge having an available width of 54 ft., with a total length of about 410 ft., made up of one central turning-span of 206 ft. 8 in. and two fixed abutment spans. The roadway will be in asphalt over concrete on buckled plates; the footpaths will be supported by steel plates with a slope of 0.01 metre per metre towards the centre of the roadway. The main girders of the fixed spans will have a height of 9 ft. 3 in. above angles, and are sloped parallel to the roadway. The upper booms on the whole length of the bridge will project over the roadway level 2 ft. 7 in. The main girders will be N shaped lattice-girders. The panels will have a length of 9 ft. 10 in. The roller-path of the turning-span will rest on circular girders, supported by the cylinders of the pivot-pier. The turning movement will be effected by means of one or two electric motors placed under the roadway. The pivot-pier will consist of five cylinders supporting the roller-bath and the machinery for the turning-span, and resting on one or more caissons. The abutments will be in masonry, resting on one caisson.

COTTON WORM.

The operations for the destruction of the cotton worm during the week ending September 11 resulted in the following:—  
The Provinces of Assiout, Behera, Beni-Souef, Fayoum, Ghizeh, Minieh, Keneh and Sharkieh were inundated.  
In Dekhshieh 20 feddans in 33 villages were infested and cleared.  
In Ghezireh 903 feddans in 19 villages were infested and cleared.  
In Menoufeh 1 feddans in 5 villages was infested and cleared.  
In Kalyoubieh 224 feddans in 105 villages were infested and cleared.  
Throughout the country 1,148 feddans in 163 villages were infested and cleared.

INVESTMENT IN EGYPT.

THE INDIVIDUAL INVESTOR.

(Concluded.)

Bearing in mind these general remarks—and remembering the oft-repeated warning that when it is stated that the sanction of the Egyptian Government has been given for the formation of a company this sanction does not denote approval or disapproval, but simply means that the Government conditions laid down in the hope of protecting investors' interests have been complied with—let us now consider the position of an individual investor who decides to purchase shares in one, or both of the banks mentioned above. Presuming he buys 100 shares in the National Bank of Egypt at an average price of £20 per share, his position and prospects would be as follows:—

1. He may reckon on a safe 4 1/2% interest on his outlay, with a good prospect next March of a 10% dividend (which would give him 5% on the money invested).
2. Inasmuch as an issue of 50,000 new shares has been authorised, he would in due time receive the option of taking up, say, 16 new shares (the pro rata of his holding) at a remunerative rate. When the last batch of shares was issued at the close of 1905 the price of issue was £20—though the market quotation was about £27.
3. The *bona fide* investor may legitimately look forward to a substantial rise in the value of his shares, for the lowest price of National Banks in 1906 was £25, and the highest £28 17s. 6d., and we have seen that the Bank itself was not affected by the recent crisis, and that the shares have fallen solely on account of forced sales; while, in view of the prosperity of the country, far-seeing men must hold that the future prospects of the National Bank of Egypt are most promising.

As to the Agricultural Bank, an investor purchasing 100 shares at an average of £8 per share places his money in a sound thing, and may look to receive from 5% to 5 1/2% on his capital, with a good prospect of seeing the value of his shares increase in the next two years to £10—which would mean a profit of 25% on his outlay. In 1906 the lowest price of these shares was 9 1/16 and the highest 10 7/16. In deciding to confine my recommendations to these two quasi-state institutions I am actuated solely by the fear that it might be considered ill-advised and invidious were I to select for comment other sound Banks and Companies. Yet it is common knowledge that there exist in Egypt many Banks to my mind practically as sound and prosperous as the National Bank, and many Companies whose balance-sheets will bear the closest inspection. I myself, as a director of a Land and Mortgage Company which is as sound as a bell, and the practised eye of any chartered accountant would see at a glance from its published accounts that, even in the event of it being wound up, the £3 paid shares would produce £5 each, while widows and others, desiring an absolutely safe 4% investment may purchase the same company's Debenture Stock with the very fullest confidence.

But the design and purpose of this paper is but to point to Egypt as a field for the "bona fide" investor, and it is for that investor, after taking counsel with his brokers or other financial advisers, to select for himself from the numerous sound banks, land companies, water companies, dairies, light railways, hotels, &c. And it is to be noted that the increase in the number of banks, and of the volume of business, is in itself a sure indication of the development of commercial activity. To cite only two categories, the purely Egyptian deposit banks and the mortgage banks—the share capital and reserves of the former have increased since 1901 from three millions sterling to more than double, while the share and debenture capital plus the reserves of the latter have increased in the same period from seven to over thirty millions.

His selection made, the investor's next step should be carefully to examine the last balance-sheet of the undertaking chosen, as more useful information is generally to be gleaned from the credit side of a balance-sheet than from the make-the-best-of-everything wording of Directors' reports. Let the would-be investor satisfy himself that the assets set forth in the accounts are *verifiable assets, i.e., realisable*, for assets such as "Expenses of Debenture Issue," "Goodwill," "Patent Rights," and the like, are generally of no value whatever should a company become insolvent or even wind up voluntarily. Therefore not until he has so satisfied himself should an investor give the actual order to purchase.

Throughout this article I have purposely omitted all mention of the Soudan, not only as being outside the Egyptian field proper, but also because during my recent visit to Khartoum I formed the opinion that the time has not yet come for the general investor to place capital in that vast territory, marvellous though its future may be. But in concluding this paper I may be allowed to point out how materially the joint possession of the Soudan by England and Egypt makes for the continued prosperity of the latter country. We have seen how the wealth of Egypt depends on its agricultural land; we know that without water that land would become desert; the importance therefore of the Nile, apart from its being a natural trade channel, is paramount, for Egypt is the only country in the world which in no degree depends upon the local rainfall for its supply of water. The joint-possession of the Soudan hold the key of the situation by being in a position to control the Sources of the Nile by the regulation of the great lakes. For the last seven years the arduous work of taking accurate observations

has been persevered in, and though enormous sums of money, and many years in point of time, will doubtless be required before the completion of the contemplated improvements for affording to their fullest extent the fertilising waters of the mighty river (which is 3,478 miles in length), yet ultimately, in the Soudan alone, at least a million acres, or about a sixth of the present farm lands area of Egypt, will be brought under cultivation. Besides yielding a direct return to Government in the shape of land tax, I have little doubt that a vast area will, in the somewhat distant future, become very remunerative under cotton, for experts have already reported that the Behr el Ghazal is suitable in regard to both climate and soil, while in other Soudan provinces over twenty thousand acres are already producing Egyptian cotton.

That the British authorities in Egypt will advise this expenditure, heavy though it be and that they will see that the carefully matured scheme is carried through in its entirety, may be considered certain, for only thus can Egypt, already so highly favoured as to be practically safe against them, be rendered absolutely and for all time secure against the danger of inundations, formerly so disastrous, against drought, the dread of the farmer, and against drought's twin-brother, famine.

CAIRO DRAINAGE SCHEME.

Mr. Carkeot James, to whom has been entrusted the important work of the drainage of Cairo, is still in Europe, and is expected to return to Egypt next month. In the meantime, we understand that the location of the large sewage farm has now been decided upon, and as soon as all details have been settled, will be placed at Kkanks, near Marg, beyond the end of the Mattarieh Railway. The final decision as to the scheme is still in abeyance pending the agreement of the various powers to the proposed increase of house-tax from eight to ten per cent. When this has been concluded, we understand that the work will be taken seriously in hand.

SPONGE FISHING SEASON'S CLOSE.

The Greek fleet of tiny vessels which came from countless islands of the Egean to fish for sponges off the Egyptian coast has just set sail on its return to the classic havens of Hellenic history. Or, rather, the small barks which were only a week ago dotted all over the water were hauled up on to primitive brigantines and schooners, which seemed to have stepped straight out of the pages of a history of Columbus, and there stowed away with their crews. For, stout enough as the fishing boats are, they are written an occasional correspondent of the "Pall Mall Gazette" from Alexandria too fragile to risk the onset of a treacherous Mediterranean squall; and as we know from the time of St. Paul to Eothen, Greek mariners, nursed as they are between azure and azure, do not exhibit quite the spirit of Vikings in battling with storm.

They are lusty men, however, and within a small stretch or bay and cove the crews are said to have mustered 1,000 strong. Some sixty barks composed the fleet of Rhodes alone. The Bay of Pelusium was one of the favourite fishing-grounds this summer. It is not easy to find on the map, but it is that bay which sweeps from Port Said, on the north of the Sinai peninsula, towards Al Rafat, where an English cruiser kept watch during the Akaba trouble last year.

The sponge fishers appear to have reaped magnificent spoil in Pelusium, which they say has yielded some of the finest sponges they have ever known; and they should be good connoisseurs. Fishing ends, it appears, as soon as ripples begin to shiver over the water; that for these sons of the sea is the unfailing precursor of summer's decline, and for sponge fishing at its best the true Mediterranean transience is essential.

THE CASABLANCA SITUATION.

SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT.

CASABLANCA, September 18. A patrol of 900 men of all arms marched 4 miles to the north-east of Casablanca on Monday. This action has increased the numbers of the tribes desirous of peace but General Drude is not relaxing his activity. (Reuter)

PARIS, September 18. According to the latest information the situation in Morocco has substantially improved. (Reuter)

CASABLANCA, September 18. General Drude disagrees with the Government on his further action in case of the non-submission of the tribes. The service of information is difficult owing to the remoteness of the Mehallas. Six Moors, captured during the reconnoitre of the 16th inst., have been shot as spies. (Havas)

GERMANY AND RUSSIA.

KAISER DECORATES RUSSIAN OFFICERS.

BERLIN, September 18. The Emperor has conferred high decorations on several prominent Russian Generals. General Karopatkin has received the Grand Cross of the Red Eagle. (Reuter)

JAPANESE STEAMSHIP BURNED.

100 LIVES LOST.

SHANGHAI, September 18. The Japanese S.S. "Taifu Maru" has been burned near Ching Kiang. It is reported that 100 persons have perished. (Reuter)

ANTWERP DOCK STRIKE.

RESUMPTION OF WORK.

ANTWERP, September 18. 2,000 strikers have resumed work. 8,000 foreigners, including 4,000 Englishmen, supplied by the Shipping Federation, are now engaged here. (Reuter)

MACEDONIAN REFORM.

PORTES SCHEME.

CONSTANTINOPLE, September 18. The Porte's scheme of judicial reform in Macedonia has been communicated to the Powers. It closely resembles the Austro-Russian project, with the important omission of the question of international financial control. (Reuter)

THE STANDARD OIL COMPANY.

GOVERNMENT'S ACTION.

NEW YORK, September 18. The government has taken action in the Federal Court to annul the charter of the Standard Oil Company in the State of New Jersey. The evidence showed that the profits from 1899 to 1906 aggregate \$98,063,187. The dividends paid amount to \$61,671,886. (Reuter)

HOME GOVERNMENT.

ANTI-LORDS CAMPAIGN.

LONDON, September 18. The Master of Elibank, on a political cruise in the west of Scotland, told the Skye Liberals with reference to the loss of the Scottish Land Bill that a great anti-Lords campaign was opening in the autumn.

Speaking at Oban, he said his guiding motive was the formation of a consolidated Scottish party ultimately leading to Scottish control of domestic questions. (Reuter)

INTERNATIONAL BALLOON RACE.

WON BY GERMANY.

BRUSSELS, September 18. 29 balloons participated in an international race here. The German was the winner, travelling 603 miles and landing at Bayonne. The Swiss second, travelling 563 miles. The Britishers Huntington and Rolls, travelling 556 and 537 miles respectively, were third and fourth. (Reuter)

MONEY AND SHARE MARKET.

(FROM OUR FINANCIAL CORRESPONDENT.)

London, September 18.

The Money Market.

It was rumoured in Lombard Street yesterday that gold will be withdrawn from the Bank to-morrow for Egypt, but although we have made enquiries in the best-informed Egyptian financial circles this morning, we are unable to obtain either confirmation or denial of the rumour. The market has received the report with great equanimity; for, in the first place, the autumn demand for Egypt may be expected in the ordinary course to commence at any time now—last year nearly half a million had been withdrawn for that quarter by the 12th of September—and, in the second place, the Bank's position is now so strong that the optimistic views of the situation appear to be fully justified. A simple comparison with the position at this period twelve months ago will confirm this statement. At that time America and Egypt had withdrawn in our week gold to the extent of three millions, bringing down the total reserve to £24,761,561. To-day the reserve stands at £27,994,716, an increase of £3,233,155, while the proportion to the liabilities is now 51.3 against 47.85 per cent a year ago.

The Bank return this week is very satisfactory. The note circulation has diminished £356,000, and coin to the amount of £179,000 has returned from the country, while the head institution received £311,000 in gold from abroad. The increase in the reserve is consequently £846,067. The stock of gold now amounts to £38,654,101, compared with £35,045,706 last year.

Easy conditions continue to be the order in the money market, and last evening call loans were offered as low as 1 1/2 per cent, the highest figure touched during the day being 2 per cent. Three months Bank bills were quoted up to 4 per cent.

For the gold available this week, amounting to about £650,000, the competition was not so keen as expected, and the price was fixed 1/2 lower at 77.9 1/2.

Silver.

The silver market has been quiet. The quotation for bars relapsed 1/2, but yesterday recovered to 31 1/2 spot.

The Stock Markets.

As we pointed out last week, the fluctuations in the current of Stock Exchange business are so frequent that it is quite impossible to forecast, with any measure of success, the possible extent of any upward movement. The advance and decline of the market seem to occur in periods—first a week of activity and higher prices, followed by one of stagnation and receding quotations. Last week, for instance, there was scarcely a bargain doing, and dealers were in the depths of despair; this week, the tone has been almost buoyant, with an appreciable amount of investment buying, and prices all-round have substantially improved. This may be partly attributed to the shortage of stock in the markets, which causes quotations to advance immediately any buying orders are forthcoming, but there is no doubt that the easy money conditions now prevailing and the prospects of a fairly comfortable state of things in the autumn, have done much to impart confidence all round. It is impossible to feel otherwise than gratified when comparing the present case with the "squeeze" which was taking place exactly a year ago, when gold was pouring out of the Bank in large quantities, and all the signs pointed to an increasingly higher Bank rate.

To say the least, the conditions generally are eminently favourable to a rise in the values of stocks and shares, but, as we have said before "You never can tell." To-day the tone of markets has not been quiet so favourable, and prices are generally slightly lower.

Consols.

The gilt-edged market has been very firm, and the list throughout shows a substantial appreciation in prices. Consols have been a strong feature, and an advance of 1/4 yesterday put up the price to 82 1/2 for cash and 82 1/2 for the account, these being ex the dividend. To-day Consols have eased off 1/4.

Foreign Bonds.

An instance of the confidence of the investing public in Japanese stocks has been provided this week, when the money released by the redemption of the six per cents has been freely reinvested in existing Japanese issues. These have been very active throughout. Yesterday the 4 1/2 per cents were quoted 1/2 higher at 92 1/2, while the first series of Fives moved up 1/2 to 100.

Russians, after being quiet for the greater part of the week, were also very firm yesterday and the Fours advanced 1 to 75, and the last issue 1/2 to 85 1/2. To-day the first series of Japanese 4 1/2 per cents shed 1/4, but the ditto second series and the new issue are 1/2 higher. Russians have also advanced 1/2.

Home Rails.

There have been some signs of a revival in home railway shares, and although not a great deal of business has resulted, there has been a fair amount of investment support forthcoming which has caused a welcome hardening up of values. The shares of the southern lines have been much in favour, and yesterday Brighton Ordinary gained 2 points to 100, and the Deferred 1 to 75 1/2. South Western Deferred were also 1 better at 43 1/2. After the announcement of the dividend, North British were put up 1/2 to 80. The de-

The traffic returns were excellent. The North Eastern headed the list with an increase of £19,800 following on one last year of £14,400, the North Western reported a gain of £20,000 on the top of £3,000 last year, and the Midland were £23,000 to the good, as against a decrease of £1,600.

To-day Brighton and South Eastern deferred have been sold. The former have given way a full point.

Americans.

The tone of the American market has generally been backward, owing to the weakness of Wall Street, where professional selling has again been a weakening influence. The movements at no time, however, have been important, and the changes on balance are insignificant.

Yesterday the tone was somewhat better. Unions after opening at 184 1/2 advanced to 135, and closed at 155 1/2. Southern Pacific, which commenced at 88 1/2, went to 88 1/2, and Steels also gained 1/2 at 32 1/2.

A general relapse has occurred in Americans to-day. Northern pref. are 2 lower, and Reading 1 1/2.

Egyptians.

This has been another very quiet week in the Egyptian market, and prices are if anything, a fraction easier all round, with the exception of Delta Light Railway Preference (Bearer) which close distinctly firm buyers at 9 1/2-10. A good many of these shares have been taken off the market, and the price looks like going better. Delta Land and Investment on the contrary are dull, and are offered @ 1 1/2, perhaps even 1 1/4. Egyptian Estates have been a dull market at 1 1/2-1 1/4 but close 1 1/2. National Bank of Egypt are about 20 1/2, and Agricultural Bank at 8 1/2 are only the turn easier. The Preference remain firm at 9 1/2, but the 3 1/2 per cent Debentures are on offer at 85-7 without finding purchasers. Daira Sanieh are quoted 12 1/2-13, and the Deferred 60-5 nominal.

Corporation of Western Egypt have changed hands at 19/32, with further sellers. They close 19 1/2. Salt and Soda are firmer at 19/32, but Egyptian Markets are unchanged at 28/6. There is no business at all in Land Bank, or Union Fonciere, the prices closing 7 1/2, and 4 1/2 respectively. Khedivial Mail have been picked up round about 21/8. United Egyptian Lands are weak at 6/6-7/6, which is about the lowest price they have yet touched.

Mining.

The South African mining market has been much assisted by the announcement of the Transvaal gold production in August, which constitutes another record, the output amounting to 555,027 ounces, valued at £2,857,602. This is an increase of 4,860 ounces over the previous highest output last December. There has been a steady demand for the leading shares and in addition to the expansion in home orders, there has been some support forthcoming from Berlin.

To-day Kafirs have been somewhat less firm. Rand Mines have lost 1/2 to 5 1/2, Tanganyika 5/32 to 4 1/2, and East Rand 3/32 to 3 1/2.

Egyptian mining shares are neglected, and prices remain about the same.

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PIGEON POST IN FRENCH CONGO.

The tedious delay and difficulty of communicating, particularly with Fes, has several times caused the possibility of establishing a pigeon post to be mooted, the "Liberte" having suggested it at the commencement of the Moorish troubles. The "Diploche Coloniale" now publishes some interesting practical details concerning an experiment now in progress in the French Congo. In that region the ordinary telegraph system would be accompanied by great expense in initial outlay and heavy cost of maintenance. The mischievous natives take especial delight in cutting down the posts and using them for firewood, and a not less dangerous, though equally destructive enemy, is the wild elephant, which amuses itself by snapping them one after another. Wireless telegraphy is also ill adapted for the tropical climate, where the atmosphere is generally saturated with damp, and often highly charged with electricity.

In considering the alternative of a pigeon post, it was necessary not only to prove how far and truly pigeons could fly, but how to ensure a regular daily post. After a good many preliminary tests in France, in the course of which pigeons were tried to the east and west of Paris in relays, it was found that two messages handed on from cote to cote came back to Paris after travelling 1825 miles in about three days. The best mean distance between the stations or pigeons' cotes was found to be from 25 to 30 miles, which any well bred carrier pigeon could be trained in a very short time to do quickly and with certainty. Basing itself on these experiments, the French Government started with a main pigeon depot of 100 pigeons at Brazzaville, in the Congo, and the birds have borne the change perfectly well, and shown themselves quite equal to all that is required. It is now proposed to have a chain of stations at a distance of about 25 miles. A station, for example, with 60 pigeons will send 15 to station "B" and 15 to "D," and if the other stations have done the same, 15 messages could be sent either way. The chances of a bird being killed or going astray are put down at 2 per cent., so that a message sent over 600 miles by four pigeons would have 92 chances out of 100 of reaching its destination. For any message of extra importance it would be sent in duplicate by two birds. Besides the use of carrier pigeons for regular service, it is argued that any traveller, explorer, or in case of war, military reconnaissance, could carry a few. The Brazzaville station cost about £40 to build and equip, and covers a radius of 875 miles. From £15 to £20 a year is sufficient to keep such a station in working order, and the Ministry for the Colonies has before it a scheme for extending the pigeon post over the whole Congo on the lines above sketched out.

GENESIS STORY IN HIEROGLYPHS.

EVIDENCE FOUND OF THE "SEVEN LEAN YEARS"

Quite a sensation has been caused among biblical students by the discovery, by Brugsch Bey, the great Egyptologist, of a monumental inscription telling how the Nile failed to rise for seven years in succession about 1,700 years before the Christian era. A long and terrible famine was the result. B.C. 1700 is the date recognised as the beginning of the "seven lean years," described in the Book of Genesis, and theologians are very interested in the confirmation which the discovery gives, in hard facts, to the famous Bible story.

The account of the failure of the Nile and the continuous famine throughout the land was told in a number of extraordinary hieroglyphics, which Brugsch Bey, fortunately, has been able to decipher.

As the "Homiletic Review" says, all students of sacred literature, to whatever school they may belong, are thankful for new evidences of the "real historicity of the great Bible narratives."
