THE SENUSSIA.

Calling attention to the article on the "Moslem Menace" and the Senussia, the "Spectator" declares that "The lesson of it all, as it seems to us, is to keep our consciences clear; to govern, when we have to govern, with mercy and justice; to be very moderate in the use of our scientific superiority; and not to provoke the collisions in which it will be a condition of safety to pour slaughter, as it were, out of a bucket. If we are challenged, we must accept the challenge; but at least let us be sure that the challengers, and not the Christians, are in the wrong."

"It was necessary, we suppose, to shell Casa Bianca—we see no clear answer to that proposition—and certainly the French were challenged; but it will be well to avoid that kind of demonstration whenever it is possible, and to seek to secure that half-sullen, half-contented acquiescence which, no doubt, is not the most satisfactory of objects, but which at least prevents the children of the world from sacrificing millions of lives, besides all their future hopes, in a mad effort at 'barring out' of which they hardly recognise the purpose, and during which they are certain to be blinded by their own mad fury as to the only methods through which success could be obtained. In Africa, as in Asia, the whites might possibly be defeated, or at all events perplexed, by passive resistance; but a rising for massacre, even though it were a rising of the whole coloured world against Europe and America could be nothing but a jacquerie, and it is one of the great facts of history that no jacquerie has ever succeeded, except, indeed, when perpetrated through legal forms."

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Legislative Council. The above Council will meet on Tuesday next, October 1, under the presidency of Abd-el-Hamid Pasha Sadek.

Police Budget. Eight and a half tons Egyptian and four tons Abyssinian ivory have arrived in London for the Courtly sales, which commence October 22.

Fatal Scorpion Sting. A native workman engaged at Boulae, was taking a rest on an open ground and was stung in the leg by a scorpion. He expired a short time after.

The Cairo Police. It is announced that from the 15th prox. Captain Renda, member of the Musky kism, will be placed on pension, having tendered his resignation.

Agricultural Bank of Egypt. Coupon No. 6 of the 3 1/2 per cent. Bonds will be paid on and after October 1 at the National Bank of Egypt, 4 and 5, King William-street, City, where forms for listing may be obtained.

Army of Occupation. Lieutenant Duneck, Inspector of Army Schools, Mediterranean Command, arrived at Alexandria on the 22nd inst, and will inspect the schools of Alexandria, Cyprus and Cairo in the order named.

False Pretences. Hamdy Bey Yaku has brought a complaint against Yousef Eff. Khalil, who he alleges has extorted a sum of L.E. 100 from him under false pretences in connection with a proposed sale of certain lands.

Alexandria Municipality. Mr. Jenkin has been appointed chief electrical engineer to the Municipality, out of 89 candidates. Mr. Armstrong has been appointed assistant drainage engineer to the Municipality. An assistant chief engineer will be chosen by Mr. Foster in England.

Subsidiary Plague. Six cases of bubonic plague were registered during the week ending the 23rd inst, of which 5 occurred at Alexandria and the other at Simbellaween. From the beginning of the year to the 23rd September 1095 cases of plague have been treated as against 464 cases recorded during the corresponding period of last year.

A Street Attack. While following a wedding procession yesterday morning in the Waily quarter of Cairo, Khalil Abdel Gawad was suddenly attacked by a passer-by, believed to be Abdel Al Ragheb, and left in an unconscious condition. Unfortunately his aggressor effected his escape in the throng, but the police have the matter in hand and hope shortly to be able to lay hands on him.

Wages in The Cotton Trade. The movement for a higher rate of pay for ring-spinners in the Lancashire cotton mills led to a meeting between masters and men last week to consider a proposal to form for this class of work a universal list. The present rate of pay varies from 2s per 100 spindles tended in some districts to 2s.9d. in others. Yesterday's meeting came to no decision and was adjourned for a month.

Roads Bridges. The Ministry of Public Works has arranged with the Cairo Tramway Company to test the new Rodah bridges by running over them tram-cars loaded with bags of sand. The Company will probably commence running its trams to the Pyramids via the Rodah Bridge in three or four months' time, and is in communication with the Ministry of Public Works with the object of creating a station for the Pyramids line in a Cairo square other than the Ataba-El-Khadra, as the latter has become too congested.

The Ahambra Theatre. On Sunday evening "The World's Famous Royal Illusionist Company" will arrive in this town, and will give a short series of representations in the above theatre. This troupe has been in existence several years, and has already made a tour of the world. Its repertoire is most interesting and has aroused enthusiasm wherever the various items have been represented. The spectacle of 8 massive white Polar bears presented on the stage in a cage of 12 metres diameter, by Captain Robert, the intrepid trainer, is without doubt one of the greatest attractions that have been shown in the world. Mr. Charles Watry and his wife are the illusionists of the troupe, and their turn is both interesting and original. Mr. Felix Wigo is an artist whose skill has earned him the title of "King of Cyclists."

THE NEW LIBERAL MOVEMENT.

MOHAMED WAHID'S LETTER.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

LONDON, September 20. I have to-day telegraphed in short the impression created here by the publication of the open letter of Mohamed Wahid to Sir Edward Grey and the general feeling on this side. This feeling is well expressed in the "Standard" which in a leading article to-day speaks as follows:—"The party to which Mohamed Wahid belongs is perfectly satisfied with the British occupation and is grateful for the benefits which England has conferred on Egypt. It has its own aspirations for a gradual cultivation of the blessings of self-government, but these are in no way incompatible with a proper appreciation of the motives which have inspired, and we hope will continue to inspire, our policy. Mohamed Wahid's letter, in fact, is a satisfactory and even flattering tribute to the honesty of British intentions."

The Egyptian Liberal Party is as yet a very young growth, so young that its programme can hardly be expected to receive that immediate attention which an older established party might reasonably look for. It would be unwise therefore to discuss it here in detail, but the salient feature of it which is too important to pass by is the spirit in which Mohamed Wahid has approached the subject, the spirit of true reasonableness; this spirit is manifest in many of the terms of the programme such as "to be on friendly terms with the British Government," "to be on friendly terms with foreign residents in Egypt," "to prepare the people for the acceptance of the useful methods of European civilisation by eradicating their prejudices" and finally "to work for their ends by proper and lawful means." To the people of Great Britain it is more than gratifying to see the seed so patiently sown through long and toilsome years and in the face of numerous obstructions at last beginning to bear fruit; the optimists who have born the brunt of a battle have not looked to Egypt in vain for the response to their efforts, and they cordially welcome the birth of the spirit of true reasonableness as marking the rise of a new era in Egyptian politics. This movement may not be of any overwhelming character but it is no doubt enough to extinguish the dying flame of the discredited faction of Mustapha Kamel, and to give a lead to all real Egyptian patriots who have the welfare of their country, and that only, at heart, and its spirit is one in the face of which acrimony disappears and progress, though possibly slow, becomes assured.

You have on many occasions pointed out in your columns what all people on this side have considered to be the true role of Mustapha Kamel; this opinion is now backed, (as one is surprised that it has not been backed before) by the very people whom he has always posed as representing, and who now come forward and paint him in his true colours. The fate of such men is always sure in the end, though they often do harm in their temporary progress; Africa has however now measured up Mustapha Kamel as we had already done here and with this final denial by his own countrymen his little play is ended, and the sooner he disappears from the stage of his adventures the better for him and all concerned.

Finally it is difficult to over rate the sound sense which Mohamed Wahid and the Liberal party in Egypt shows in the following words addressed to our Foreign Minister:—"In our capacity as Egyptians who love their country we consider it in the interests of Egyptians to rely, in our material and moral affairs, on the occupying power which has always worked for the good of Egypt."

THE "OLIVEMOOR."

Yesterday afternoon shortly before six o'clock the "Olivemoor" was towed off the rocks by the "Berger Wilhelm" and the "Danemark" and brought into the outer harbour, where she is now lying. The pumping operations are still being continued and this morning divers were sent down to ascertain the full extent of the damage sustained by the vessel, but up to the present no accurate estimation has been made. The seamen, firemen, and petty officers were discharged this morning by H.B.M.'s Consul Gould.

PERSONAL AND SOCIAL.

The Ministers will return to Cairo on the 8th prox. and will take up their official residence in the Capital from that date.

Lawa Mansfield Pasha, Commandant of the Cairo City Police, will return to Egypt on the 15th prox.

Mr. Henry George Fuller Archer, of the Egyptian Civil Service (son of Colonel Archer, of the Rookery, Frensham, Surrey), was married at All Saints', Clifton, to Miss Beatrice Jessie Harley (daughter of Mr. Edward Harley, of 8, Albert-road, Clifton, Bristol). The bride wore a gown of white satin, trimmed with Limerick lace and silver passementerie, and a Court train of silk, trimmed with chiffon and silver flowers. A Honiton lace veil covered a coronet of orange blossoms. Mr. E. C. Penfather, of the Agricultural Bank, Egypt, was best man, and there were six bridesmaids.

STEAMER MOVEMENTS.

The S.S. "Cyprus Prince" with passengers and general cargo, left Malta on the 25th inst, and is due to arrive at Alexandria on Sunday the 29th inst.

MUSTAPHA KAMEL PASHA.

RECEPTION OF THE "OPEN LETTER."

(From "Al Watan")

Truly the lines of the Egyptian agitators have fallen in unpleasant places. During the past two years they have gone to no end of trouble to create in Europe an opinion favourable to the "cause". The support of both the English and the French press has in turn been sought; manifestos, protests, and interviews galore have been issued; but over all their efforts disappointment is writ in large characters. The iron has entered into their souls.

In the early days they placed their trust in the English Liberal press, and for a time they had no cause to complain of their reception. But, unfortunately, they outstayed their welcome. In other words, the obliging Liberal editors wearied of these too frequent and virulent communications, and finally practically refused to insert them. In sorrow turned their anger Mustapha Kamel Pasha turned his face to Paris. With their unflinching courtesy, the French journals inserted the "ultimatums" and the "interviews" but almost invariably accompanied them with a little note which was anything but encouraging to their authors.

The latest effusion of the Pasha has received as scant sympathy as was accorded its predecessors. It may be hinted here, in parenthesis, that to those of a critical turn of mind it seems somewhat unusual, if not actually lacking in courtesy, to address an open letter to the Prime Minister of England through the medium of a newspaper published in another country, but to Mustapha Pasha Kamel that is a mere matter of detail. But what has been the result of the "Letter" so far as the French newspapers are concerned? For the most part they have cold-shouldered it, and such comments upon it that have appeared are not calculated to encourage Mustapha Kamel Pasha to further prosecute the attempt to obtain French support for his campaign. Indeed, the leading article on the subject which appeared in the "Temps" made the Pasha so angry that he must needs write another and very bitter letter of complaint.

As regards the press, only two of the Liberal papers published the "Letter," and in one case only was any comment made upon it. The "Tribune," the "Westminster Gazette," the "Daily Chronicle," and the "Manchester Guardian" entirely ignored it.

Evidently Mustapha Kamel Pasha will have to turn to other sources for the sympathy which London and Paris have refused to give him.

ANOTHER VIOLENT LETTER.

Mustapha Pasha Kamel has followed up his manifesto to Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, which appeared originally in the "Figaro," with another letter addressed to the "Temps" in which he roundly abuses the editor of that journal for his comments on the manifesto, and for having written of Egypt "too much as if that country were a British colony."

The letter is penned in the Pasha's best style, with a liberal use of adjectives. "Egypt," he declares, "is, from the point of view of international law, an autonomous nation, whose autonomy is guaranteed by Turkey and by the whole of Europe. The English occupation is therefore a brutal fact which nothing can justify. The power of the Khedive has been usurped by the absolute sway of British capital. . . . When we demand a Constitution, we are really asking merely for a Restitution, for Britain abolished our Constitution in order to establish her arbitrary rule. . . . If France, after thirty-seven years, has not forgotten Alsace and Lorraine, and holds their memory sacred—if she has no desire for too cordial an understanding with Germany, how can the people of Egypt be expected to sacrifice their independence or to forget it! . . . You, who make so brave a struggle for the maintenance of patriotism and race unity, will doubtless be the first to appreciate our feelings. The English themselves understand them, but, unhappily, the Imperialists find that the occupation of Egypt pays them better than either respect or honour."

There is much more in the same strain, but it is, perhaps, worthy of note that Mustapha Kamel Pasha is careful to point out that it is to his party's interest to carry on its agitation peaceably, if energetically. "You may be sure," he says, "that we shall never give Great Britain reason to unite the Powers of Europe against us."

The "Figaro" itself, which printed the communication, gives a significant hint that since the agreement with England the nationalists ought to know that when France has given her word she keeps it. "Le Siecle" is even more outspoken, and tells the Pasha a few home-truths regarding the failure of the agitation. "What result," the "Siecle" asks, "have they obtained up till now?"

We cannot see that they have made any impression on the masses or stirred their indifference. And this is easily explained. The fellahin, or peasants, who for centuries had been oppressed and reduced to work without hope of ever being able even to eat as much as they wanted, enjoy, since the British occupation, the sweets of life and a measure of individual independence they had never known. These blessings are bound up for them with the maintenance of British rule. Would they not rather be on its side than on that of Mustapha Kamel, if the nationalist party ever tried to pass from empty rhetoric to brutal aggression?"

THE NEW PARTY.

MODERATE AND EXTREME.

(From "Al Watan")

This is the epoch of party-making in Egypt with programmes and declarations galore. You are sure to hear of a new party or a different programme wherever you may turn; but all is not gold that glitters, nor is every attempt at party making successful in the Valley of the Nile. Certainly the events of the last months have resulted in a new grouping of political forces and a wholesome change, at least in the outward appearance and published policy of the different parties. Up to a recent date the majority was in favour of independence, parliamentary government, and antiforeign agitation. Now the change is sweeping and astounding in certain cases, for the very advocates of independence and parliamentary institutions have changed their front and are reviling "Al Lewa", the only remaining organ of the old views. The most rabid enemies of British rule are now "Moderates" claiming neither independence nor hasty enfranchisement. In their revised programmes they do not mention the evacuation, the Nationalist Parliament, the ousting of the foreign element from the public service, and similar things among their former claims and aspirations. So far the change has been marvellous indeed. But the most remarkable feat was left to the members of the Legislative Council and the notables who founded "Al-Garida" last year and who now come forward as a new political party claiming the "Nation" as their own. We do not deny the right of these shareholders in the "Garida" enterprise to speak for the nation, as they actually represent the majority of sound minded Egyptians and are almost without exception members of wealthy and strong families. We find nothing in their programme at variance with our views and aspirations. On the contrary, every article of their political faith has been preached for years in our columns, a fact which has given us entire satisfaction and made us confident in the success of the new party. One thing more. We may safely add here that the new party adopts, not only our views, but those of the Nationalist papers which have undergone a wholesome transformation of late. The programme published by "Al-Garida" is the same now adopted by every Nationalist paper with the solitary exception of "Al-Lewa." If the new converts to the principle of liberty and moderation are sincere to their adopted faith the whole Press of Egypt may now be class as "Moderate" with the newspapers conducted by Mustapha Pasha Kamel as "Extreme." We hope that the new grouping will last and that the different wings of the Moderate party will loyally uphold its principles for all time.

MUSTAPHA GARRISON THEATRE.

An excellent and thoroughly enjoyable entertainment was given last night at the regimental theatre (gymnasium building) of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers at Mustapha, by Mr. Bert Platt and his satellites, and we must congratulate the various artistes, professional and amateur, upon the success of their performances. The difficulties which are almost invariably attached to such entertainments were most successfully overcome by Mr. Platt, and we must congratulate all concerned upon the manner in which the entertainment was carried through. Pressure of space prevents us from commenting upon the programme in extenso, and we can but comment upon the most prominent items, though these are somewhat difficult to select as each was thoroughly deserving of applause, which was throughout most generously accorded. The burden of the evening was born by Bert Platt, and this brilliant American comedian excelled himself with his instruments, his patter, and his songs. With the saxophone he gave us a musical treat, his banjo playing was cleverer than any he has before heard, while with the mouth organ, a toy, as he rightly expressed it, of ten notes, he did wonders. In his songs Mr. Platt was also excellent, and the manner in which he gave "Back to Baltimore" and "Quick Questions" drew forth well-earned applause. Miss Violet Esdaile, always a favourite in Alexandria, was also in the best of form and sang and danced with even greater vivacity than usual, in spite of the fact that she was handicapped by several breakdowns on the piano. The applause accorded to Miss Annie Lettine was richly deserved, the manner in which she sang being thorough, and at the same time she showed herself to be a dancer of no mean merit. Needless to say Lance Corporal Evans, Sergeant Byrne, and Pte. Pantom met with great success, and each was excellent in his particular line. A second entertainment is to be given to-night when the programme will be changed, and we anticipate as full an audience as that of yesterday.

HUGE AMERICAN PAPER COMBINE.

The Acting British Consul at Chicago reports that a consolidation of print paper concerns is being brought to a successful conclusion by the International Paper Company, and that all the plants in Wisconsin, Michigan, and Minnesota will be taken in. It is stated that within a year the company, which has a authorized capital of \$24,000,000, will control the print paper market of the United States, and to do this will spend from six to ten million pounds in buying up the plants in the States named.

EGYPT'S PROBABLE GOLD REQUIREMENTS.

PROMINENT BANK MANAGERS ESTIMATE.

(Continued from yesterday.)

The "Financier" last week obtained the views of a bank manager connected with Egyptian business with reference to the amount of gold likely to be required for the moving of the cotton crop in Egypt. He expressed the opinion that the drain of gold from England will hardly be so heavy this year as it was last year. "For one thing," (he said) "the banks have made better provision for the contingency than was the case last year, and the total of gold in the coffers of the banks doing business in Egypt is, I have no doubt, considerably greater now than last autumn. As to the amount required altogether, it is quite impossible to say at present. You see, the entire amount is not known, and, indeed, is not sent, until after Christmas."

"What do you estimate the amount of gold consignments from this country to Egypt between now and Christmas will be?"

"Well, as a rough estimate, I should put it between six and seven millions sterling."

"Are the fellahen making any progress in the way of learning Western methods of business?"

"Yes, I think I may say they are to some extent. But, taking the mass of them, there is very little change at present. A certain minority who have made more money than the average—probably because of their astuteness—have undoubtedly shown that they are quite alive to their opportunities. I may say that the term fellah includes all native agriculturists who occupy and cultivate their own land. Some of these men have made a good deal of money. I even know of some who have sent a son to Oxford to be educated. But these cases, naturally, are very few and far between. The fellah, in such circumstances, is usually a money-lender—a little banker—as well as a farmer. The generality of the peasants still bury their money that they do not actually want, and try to conceal the fact that they have got any. This habit of concealing wealth will die out very slowly. The people have still an ingrained fear and suspicion of the tax collector, and it will take a generation or two to alter their views on that point. The disposition to feign poverty in Egypt is not by any means confined to the fellahs."

"I heard, for instance, of a curious case a few weeks ago, in Cairo. An Arab trader, in a moderately large way of business, had accepted a bill for a hundred pounds Egyptian. When the bill was presented for payment, he said he could not possibly meet it, and asked that he might be allowed a day's grace. It was presented the next day, when he offered five pounds on account, and said he would pay the balance by instalments. This not being agreed to, he went out and borrowed fifty pounds from a neighbour at 20 per cent. interest. Then he gave a fresh bill for the balance. The same night a fire took place in his house and it was accidentally discovered that in a drawer of the table in his office at which he regularly sat he had over L.E. 12,000 locked up."

"As a great deal of English money must have accumulated in the country during the last few years, and the last harvest was so profitable, I suppose a considerable sum will be available for harvest purposes this year out of the native funds?"

"One would naturally suppose so, but how far internal capital will be available it is quite impossible even to guess. It may be inferred that every year of prosperity will increase the amount of money in circulation, notwithstanding the hoarding, and that, therefore, less should be required from abroad. On the other hand, of course, there is so much being done in Egypt, in the way of new ventures and undertakings, that money is constantly being absorbed that way, apart from agricultural requirements. Personally, I doubt whether the native wealth will be much in evidence in relation to the harvest."

PAPYRUS IN THE FAYOUM.

AN IMPORTANT PUBLICATION.

(Continued from yesterday.)

The great god of Tebtunis was the crocodile Sobk, who was worshipped as Soknobotanis and possessed a temple and also a small shrine. His priestly hierarchy, as elsewhere in Egypt, was divided into five "tribes" or grades, and one of the new papyri provides an elaborate enumeration of them, with details of their offices, emoluments, and also an account of the temple records and expenditures. The whole of this report relates to the time of the Emperor Trajan. This text is only one of many papyri relating to the theocracy of Sobk, which, together with the commentary upon them, occupy more than 30 pages and constitute the chief feature of the volume. Other papyri records of the priests of Greek and Roman Egypt are to be found in the British and Berlin museums, and elsewhere; all of these however are connected with the temple of Soknopaiou; also in the Fayoum, which was a much more magnificent edifice, and accordingly served by a larger retinue of officials than Soknobotanis. These new texts can now be compared with the information we already have about the ancient Egyptian temple hierarchies from the hieroglyphic texts, such as the particulars especially clearly known as to the priesthood at Abydos and Sibt, at the former of which were five, and at the latter ten grades of members. Also the store of evidence as to similar matters brought to light by M. Revillout from the Demotic papyri of later times.

The revenues of the priests were, in some cases, high, and consequently it is not surprising that several of the new papyri relate to the sale of pious trusts. One offer for the office of prophet equals 3 1/2 years purchase of the proceeds, which is not excessive. But the occupant's position appears to have been only an insecure tenure. The government being able to depose the holder and sell them again, for we have records of an office being three times disposed of during successive years. Means were found by the state, also, for obtaining a share of the ecclesiastical wealth, even the sacrificial calf offerings being taxed, as was the produce of the weaving industry attached to the shrine. The priests seem to have been great makers of papyrus for writing material, an appropriate industry for them because they formed the major part of the literary class. A Tebtunis temple text is a receipt for purchase of 20,000 papyrus stems for paper making. One priestly title was that of "Temple Warden," Neccoros Curious because it is the title assigned by its chief magistrate to the City of Ephesus in regard to the great temple of Diana in the Acts of the Apostles (where the town is termed "Neccoros" of her shrine).

An interesting legal point crops up in a priestly papyrus, where the possor receives a "present" in consideration for the renewal of a lease on temple land. Similar to the fine imposed upon some London Estates and elsewhere for the extension of a legal lease. Before leaving the literary and legal documents for the private letters and notes, it should be recorded as illustrating the value of these papyri that they refer to 20 emperors, from Augustus to Gallianus, to hundreds of cities, counties and Roman; to 15 deities; scores of officials; eleven Byzantine Prefects of Egypt, one of these new to history, and to nearly one hundred taxes and imposts.

"De nouveaux indices de la prospérité croissante de l'Egypte se révèlent chaque jour en dépit de la crise monétaire dont nous sortons à peine, et qui, malgré tout ce qu'on a dit, a laissé intactes les deux sources de la richesse de l'Egypte, le climat et le coton.

Le dernier numéro du "Bulletin du commerce

extérieur de l'Egypte" que fait paraître l'Administration des Douanes montre que les importations totales durant la période 1er Janvier-31 Août de cette année ne sont élevées à L. E. 16,416,068 contre L. E. 14,360,868. L'augmentation en faveur de cette année est donc de L. E. 2,055,200.

Le total des exportations pour la même période se chiffre par L. E. 15,356,338 en 1907 contre L. E. 12,734,575 l'année précédente. C'est ainsi, de même qu'à l'importation, une augmentation de non moins de L. E. 2,621,763.

Il faut donc conclure de ces chiffres que la "productivité" et le "pouvoir d'achat" de l'Egypte, deux facteurs économiques importants s'il en est, se sont considérablement accrus alors même que la crise monétaire était au plus fort de son acuité. Il y a là une réponse péremptoire aux pessimistes outranciers qui prétendaient, quoique leur ton ait déjà baissé, que l'Egypte mettrait des années à se relever.

Dans un autre sens, toutes les compagnies de navigation songent à améliorer leur service entre Alexandria et l'Europe, et notamment la White Star Line qui veut se décider d'augmenter l'importance de ses services entre l'Amérique et l'Egypte. Cela revient à dire que les agences de tourisme d'Outre-Atlantique prévoient un mouvement plus considérable de passagers vers l'Egypte, et c'est comme l'on sait, une source de gros profits qui n'est pas à dédaigner.

THE CASABLANCA SITUATION.

GENERAL DRUDE ACTIVE.

CELEBRATION AT YILDIZ.

CONSTANTINOPLE, September 25. The Sultan's birthday has been observed in the usual manner. The Ministers and State dignitaries proceeded to the Yildiz Kiosk to present their congratulations. To-night the city and suburbs will be illuminated. Yesterday, on the occasion of the festival Leileiberat, the Khedive went to the Palace to congratulate the Sultan. (Reuter)

NEWFOUNDLAND MODUS VIVENDI.

ST. JOHNS (Newfoundland), September 25. An Order of Council has been gazetted under authority of the Imperial Act of 1819 legally sanctioning the Anglo-Russian modus vivendi. Sir Robert Bonf's organ says that the Colonial Cabinet has refused to participate in the publication, and it urges the Cabinet to repudiate the outrageous action and to appeal to the self-governing Colonies to vindicate the Colony's rights. Sir Robert Bonf in the course of an interview said that he was determined to uphold the sovereignty of the Colony's laws. (Reuter)

AMERICAN COTTON CROP.

NEW YORK, September 25. The census bureau reports that for the year 1906-07 all American manufacturers took 5,296,783 running bales of cotton as compared with 4,820,990 for the year 1905-06. The stock held by manufacturers on 31st August amounted to 996,279 bales as compared with 688,312 on 31st August last year. The active cotton spindles numbered 26,242,407 as compared with 25,250,096. (Reuter)

ANGLO-RUSSIAN AGREEMENT.

BERLIN, September 25. Yesterday the text of the Anglo-Russian agreement was officially communicated here. The sentiments of peacefulness and friendliness with which from the outset the Anglo-Russian negotiations were followed here in their entirety, and more especially as regards Persia, have been strengthened by the examination of the document. (Reuter)

INTERNATIONAL HYGIENE CONGRESS.

BERLIN, September 25. The Municipality received the delegates to the International Hygiene Congress. Dr. Vary, medical inspector to the French army, toasted to the Municipality. (Havas)

ANTWERP DOCK STRIKE.

ANTWERP, September 25. The dock labourers have decided to resume work on Thursday on condition that their wages are increased within a fortnight. (Reuter)

THE MECCA PILGRIMAGE.

CONSTANTINOPLE, September 25. The sacred caravan left Constantinople for Mecca yesterday with great pomp. (Reuter)

ANDALUSIA INUNDATED.

MALAGA, September 25. Floods have ravaged the neighbourhood. Many villages are in ruins already. 59 persons have been drowned. (Reuter)

MALAGA, September 25. Inundations have devastated Andalusia. There are numerous victims. (Havas)

COUNT ISVOLSKI IN AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, September 25. Count Isvolski has arrived. It is understood that the object of his visit is to discuss with Baron von Aehrenthal the details of the Balkan reform scheme. (Reuter)

MONEY AND SHARE MARKET.

(FROM OUR FINANCIAL CORRESPONDENT).

London, September 26th.

The Money Market.

The rumours regarding the probable shipment of gold to Egypt, mentioned in our last article, proved well founded, it being announced on Saturday that £200,000 in sovereigns had left the Bank for that quarter. It may be taken for granted that the shipments will now be continued at regular intervals until the amount required for the moving of the crop has been supplied. We understand that a further large sum will be withdrawn for Egypt to-morrow.

The newspapers are devoting much space to speculations as to the probable extent of the Egyptian demands for gold, but there appears to be a wide divergence of opinion on the point. One bank manager, who may be expected to speak with some degree of authority, has given the opinion that rather less will be required this year than in 1906, and mentions a total of between six and seven millions. Of course, a very great deal depends upon whether the natives are willing to put their accumulated funds into circulation. If they persist in their usual policy of hoarding it, as we do not for a moment doubt that they will, there seems little reason to suppose that the total shipments this year will be much, if any less, than last year seeing that a larger crop will have to be financed.

This week the Continent has been a successful competitor for the available gold and obtained the whole of it, with the exception of a small amount required for India. The price has advanced to 77/10.

Silver.

The silver market is steady and quiet. The highest price touched during the week was 31 3/4, and the lowest 31 1/4. To-day's quotations are 31 1/4 for spot and 31 1/4 forward.

The Stock Markets.

There has been only one feature of note in the Stock Exchange this week, but that is of sufficient importance to merit special mention. We refer to the deplorable condition into which the home railway market has been plunged by the further developments of the dispute between the railway companies and the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants. The latter decided that a ballot of the men shall be taken on the question as to whether an attempt shall be made to enforce their demands by means of a strike. There is little reason to fear that such a calamity is at all likely to happen in the near future. In the first place, the men's section represents only a comparatively small section of the whole of the railway employes, and, in the second place there is so much disunion between the different branches of the service, who are divided up into a number of unions, that it is unlikely, even if a strike be declared, that a struggle could be maintained for any period. Nevertheless, shareholders have been threatened with a strike for so long, that they have become disgusted, hence they have seized every opportunity to realise their holdings.

This week's events have brought the home railway market to a point approaching panic. One newspaper estimates that during the past seven days the shares of twenty eight of the

principal lines have depreciated to the extent of £10,000,000, and although this is probably a somewhat extravagant figure, the decrease in values has undoubtedly been alarming. Of course, the ultimate recovery of the shares cannot be doubted, but shareholders have become too nervous as the result of recent events to derive much consolation from this fact.

In other sections business has been on a small scale. The great festival of the Atonement has taken many of the important Jewish members away from the "house" during part of the week, and this has helped to keep things quiet. We are glad to be able to report that the Egyptian market has shown a firmer tendency, and the leading shares are now appreciably higher on balance.

Consols.

Gold withdrawals and rumours of further withdrawal kept the market for first class consols dull at the beginning of the week, and Consols again fell below 82. The tendency is now better, however, and a further improvement of 1/8 to-day has brought the price of the premier security to 82 1/4 for each.

Foreign Bonds.

International bonds opened very firm on Monday, and there was a considerable amount of investment buying for both local and Continental account. Owing partly to the scarcity of stock, Russians experienced a sharp rise, being 1 1/2 up at the close, the Fours at 76 1/2 and the Fives at 87. Japanese issues were also higher. A slight reaction subsequently occurred, but the market has again firm up. Russians are now quoted 76 1/2 and 87 1/2 respectively. Japanese have advanced 1/4 to 3/4 to-day.

The rumours regarding the contents of the new Anglo-Russian agreement are considered a bull point in this market.

Home Rails.

It is unfortunate for the home railway market that the threatened crisis synchronises with the "off-season." Instead of treating us to sea serpents descriptions of the discovery of new serpents the editors of our London journals are giving us reams upon reams of matter dealing with the railway dispute, with the inevitable stage thunders of the men's leaders thrown in. On Saturday we were told that the railway employees intended handing in their notices to cease work last Monday, but this absurd story was disproved on the Sunday when Mr. Bell announced that a ballot of the men was to be taken.

The list of shares shows throughout a serious slump in quotations, although to-day there has been a fractional recovery. South Eastern "A" close 1/2 better at 90 1/2, North Eastern 1/2 at 131 1/2, Lancs and Yorks 1/2 at 92 1/2, Great Northern Def. 1/2 at 34 1/2, and Brighton "A" 1/2 at 72 1/2, and Great Eastern and South Western Def. 1/2 at 64 and 39 1/2 respectively.

Americans.

American railway shares have generally displayed a firmer tone, but the market has been very quiet. Very little interest has been displayed, and business has been very limited in extent.

Yesterday Unions were the only active feature. The shares, after being offered down to 133 1/2, advanced to 135, but reacted to 134 1/2 later in the day. The parity was 134 1/2. United States Steel were sold down to 29, but finally recovered to 29 1/2.

To-day Americans have advanced. The strength of Unions has been a feature, the closing quotation marking a rise of 1 1/2 at 136.

Egyptians.

The Egyptian market has been firm, and most shares show an advance in price, closing practically at the top. National Bank have advanced gradually to 20 1/2, and have changed hands at 20 1/2, but their have been a good many sellers at this price, although there were also anxious buyers at 20 1/2. Today they close 20 1/2. Agricultural Bank have been largely bought at 8, 7/32 and 3/4, closing strong at 8 1/2. The Preference also has been dealt in to some extent at 9, 5/32 and 9 1/2, closing 9 1/2.

Delta Preference Bearer remain very firm, closing 9 1/2 bid, and Delta Land and Investment are slightly harder at 1 1/2. Egyptian Markets have also come to the front, and after being down to 28 1/2, were in good demand yesterday, the last price being 28/6-29/6. Salt and Soda are unchanged at 19/6, also Corporation of Western Egypt at 1 1/2.

Daira Sanieh are quiet at 12 1/2, and the Deferred at 60-5. There is a better tone about Egyptian Estates, and several thousands were dealt in yesterday at 11/16. Union Fonciere are still a very nominal market, closing 4 1/2. Land Banks close better at 7 1/2-8.

Sidi Salem have again changed hands, this time at 2 1/2, the previous bargain being done at 2 1/4.

Mining.

The pessimistic report on the financial position in South Africa made by Lord St. Aldwyn, who has just returned from a tour of inspection in that country in connection with the Bank of Africa, is calculated to be anything but encouraging to the Kafir market, which has already had enough nasty knocks during the past few months. Lord St. Aldwyn, who is anything but a scare-monger, stated that he believed there was never a moment when the depression was more acute in the principal South African ports and large towns than it is at present, and if it continued, and he saw no sign of an immediate turn in the tide, there might be failures in other quarters besides where failures had already happened.

This seems a serious state of affairs, and should such failures occur as are predicted, it would inevitably have the effect of bringing
