THE REAL INDIA.

Mr. Oman, formerly Professor in the Government College at Lahore and a well-known author on Indian subjects, writes this book to interpret the present-day Indians to the English public, which is far, indeed, from realising that more than half the entire population under British rule follow the Hindoo religion, that a quarter of the inhabitants of the Empire are Mahomedan, and that the remainder is made up of the Christians of the United Kingdom and the colonies. In all India there are not three millions of Christians, Europeans and natives combined. Mr. Oman, who really knows his subject, divides his book into goddess worship in Bengal, caste in India, Theism in Bengal, and Hindoo Social Reform. It will thus be seen that he deals chiefly with Bengal, and from his pages, as from those of the last census report it is apparent that the baser and cruder forms of superstition flourish particularly in that province. He speaks of the sensitive and sensual character of the Bengalis, who are not Aryans, but belong to the Mongolo-Dravidian race. It is they who are par excellence the Saktas or worshippers of the female energy, and amongst them religion is a morbid affection which tends to sap the manhood of the people and to effeminate the race.

Few deductions as regards the religion of the people, of its outward and visible manifestations, and of its esoteric effects upon themselves are to be drawn from Bengal for other parts of India. It is only Calcutta which boasts the Kalighat temple with its shambles. The Hindoos as a whole are extremely and genuinely religious, and are living examples of the belief that the fear of God is the beginning of wisdom. Few of the many who have written upon caste have dealt with it in so clear and practical a manner as the author of this book. Instead of the four castes of the Hindoo Shastras, there are now 2,378 main castes and tribes and forty-three races or nationalities. There have been great changes, but the idea of caste and its recognition as an indispensable feature of society have been strong and persistent amongst Indians from the remotest ages to the present day. The average Englishman would be surprised to learn that great numbers of Brahmins are cooks for masters with whom on no account they would themselves sit down to meat. The author dissipates much of the self-satisfaction with which Europeans regard themselves, as differing from the Hindoos. Europeans, too, had hereditary occupations. There were serfs, moreover, all over Europe in the Middle Ages, and down to the last century in Russia. Again, there is stricter and crueller caste distinction between negroes and white men in America than between the highest and the lowest castes in India. No stigma attaches there to belonging to any particular caste, the maintenance of all being a religious duty. Hindooism is a congeries of many cults, but it everywhere requires the veneration of the cow, supports the caste system, and gives the highest place to the Brahmins. Behind the Brahmins cults there is a background of pantheism, the doctrines of reincarnation and of Karma, the two latter features being by no means peculiar to India, but very general in the East.

The author agrees that caste has been the most efficient means of saving the Hindoo religion against reforms from within, and against the inroads of alien religions. Hence it has incurred the unqualified condemnation of Christian missionaries. The attacks of Islam and Christianity have, however, been met by Hinduism by outbursts of religious fervour from within its own borders, and the general recrudescence of Hindoo religious enthusiasm which has been apparent in recent years. Plague Bulletin.
During the last twenty four hours one recovery has been reported at Alexandria. There are now 3 cases under treatment.

Public Debt Commission.
The Offices of the Public Debt Commission are transferred to-day from their summer quarters at Alexandria to Cairo.

Cairo Circulating Library.
From and after Tuesday 1st October, the Cairo Circulating Library will be open in the morning from 10.30 to 12 and in the afternoon from 4.30 to 6.

Arrival of Tourists.
A party of fifteen tourists arrived this morning at Alexandria by the S.S. "Semiramis" and left for Cairo by special train from the custom house quay.

New Alexandrian Newspaper.
The latest production in the newspaper world of Egypt under the management of the Captain J. Nelken and Waldberg is to appear to-morrow with the title of the "Petit Journal Egyptian."

Spirit Lamp Accident.
A young apprentice engaged in a tarboush shop was severely burned by an accident with a spirit lamp for heating irons: his master who went to the rescue was also considerably burned.

M. Tawil Liberated.
M. Elie Tawil, director of the Salonica Cigarette Company and the involuntary author of the murder of the agent Scasoli, of the secret police, has been provisionally set at liberty.

Medical Licences.
The Ministry of the Interior has granted licences to practise in Egypt to Mr. Loucas Lefos, physicians, and Mr. Dimitri Antoun and Mr. Aristolle, L. Manjaritis to practise as pharmacists.

The Alhambra Theatre.
In consequence of the delay caused by the dismemberment of the bears attached to the new troupe advertised to appear at the Alhambra, the debut of the troupe has had to be postponed until Wednesday evening.

Al Menayer San Francisco School.
The distribution of prizes to the pupils of the San Francisco school at Al Menayer, Alexandria, will take place next Thursday under the presidency of Mgr. Aurelio Briante, Catholic Archbishop of Egypt and Arabia.

Theft of Type.
It is reported that one of our European contemporaries has been the victim of a theft by a discharged workman of a quantity of type which he intended to use on his own account. The usual proceedings have been taken by the police.

Wrestling Championship.
This evening will take place the finals of the wrestling championship at the "Eldorado" Theatre, Alexandria, when the following contest will be fought:—Baicevich v. Ruggero; and after the conclusion of this contest the prizes will be distributed to the winners.

Municipal Garden Party.
On Saturday afternoon a most successful garden party was held at the Nouzha Gardens by nearly two hundred officials of the Alexandria Municipality. The Alexandria Police Band played a nice selection of music. The afternoon was enlivened by various races, of which the bicycle race was the best contested. Dr. Schiess Pasha gave away the prizes.

Cairo Jewellery Burglary.
The individual who succeeded in obtaining some £150 worth of jewellery, as recently recorded in these columns, from a jeweller in the Boulevard Abd el Aziz, Cairo, has been traced and arrested. It appears that the culprit is one named Mohamed Aly Moursi, a son of a money changer of Tanta, who has been making a livelihood for some time past by similar exploits.

Arrest of Burglars.
The housebreakers who recently broke into a butter shop in the Cairo New Market, and of whom it will be remembered certain made good their escape, have been arrested, and on search being made at their haunt a large quantity of stolen goods were found. It appears that the band have carried out several successful burglaries, including one in a Church at Constantinople.

Signi Gaber Moulded.
The above Moulded concluded on Friday evening, after a week's rejoicing and festivities. The fête was extremely picturesque, the open spaces and handsome mosque lending themselves to oriental sight and scene. Crowds of natives thronged the stalls and tents, and on Friday evening there could not have been less than 16,000 visitors. In spite of these large numbers excellent order was kept, and no arrest was made, thanks to the measures taken by Mustapha Pasha Ibad, and Kaimakam Cobbe Bey of the Alexandria police.

The S.S. "Osmanieh."
The Khedivial Liner, "Osmanieh," (Captain Gatteschi) arrived at Alexandria this morning from Constantinople, Smyrna, Athens, and Leris with a record number of passengers, 250 first and second class, and 430 third class. The "Osmanieh" stopped at the island of Leris, near Patmos, to take up a large number of Greeks resident in Egypt, who go to that island every year to spend the summer, owing to the fine climate and beautiful scenery there. Notwithstanding the very large number of passengers and the extra work entailed thereby on the staff of the "Osmanieh," the service was excellent.

SUNDAY CLOSING.

DEMONSTRATION AT ALEXANDRIA.

The question of the closing of all shops in Alexandria, save those dealing in foods, drinks, etc., has been well fought for some years by the Société Internationale des Employés d'Alexandrie, and yesterday morning a further example of the energetic manner in which the society carries on its work and insists upon the employes of Alexandrian shops being granted one well-deserved day of rest in the week was given yesterday morning by the demonstration held at 6 a.m. in the Mohamed Ali square. It was decided last week by the masters that the shops should be re-opened on Sundays, as was the case the year before last, but this society, whose object it is to protect the employes, decided to oppose the decision of the masters. Consequently a mass meeting was called and the president of the society supported by several members of the committee and several hundreds of members of the society, the meeting altogether numbering almost two thousand persons, assembled yesterday morning in the Mohamed Ali square to protest against the proposed imposition of the masters. Within a few minutes after the opening of the meeting Mr. Makri, opposite whose shop the meeting was being held, appeared with his staff with the object of re-inaugurating general Sunday work in the shop-world. This gentleman, however, was approached by Mr. George Rubli, president of the society, and several members of the committee, who begged him to refrain from taking such steps. They pointed out to him that they were working in an absolutely disinterested manner for the members of the society for whom they desired to claim a weekly day of rest. The long hours sustained during the working days of the week by the men and women, many of whom receive a pittance barely sufficient to provide them with the necessities of life, are amply sufficient to earn a Sabbath's repose from labour and such is the contention of the society, which we most emphatically endorse and which we shall ever be ready to support.

The petition of the president, however, was received with no favour by Mr. Makri, who gesticulated wildly and waved in the air a somewhat formidable stick. The shop was opened and within a few minutes one of the employes appeared with a pistol, and those around began to fear for the safety of the protesting president of the society. The police appeared on the scene, the president wrested the stick from Mr. Makri, and within a few minutes order was restored by the arrival of the mounted police. The demonstrators afterwards adjourned to the back of Makri's shop and succeeded in persuading some half dozen shops in the neighbourhood to close. They afterwards proceeded in perfect order and quiet to Rue Ibrahim and the Attarine and repeated the same process, the proprietors in every case showing themselves quite willing to meet with the demands of the crowd of employes.

They afterwards proceeded along Rue Cherif Pasha and into the square and again faced Makri's shop, which was strongly guarded by mounted police. After a conference with Hashim Bey, chief of the public security, the meeting marched to the bouvenorat, where the president and several members of the committee were received by Mustapha Pasha Ibad, Governor of Alexandria, who, after the matter had been explained, thanked the deputation for the orderliness of the meeting and promised to use his influence to induce Mr. Makri to combine with his fellow-shopkeepers in observing Sunday as a holiday. The demonstrators returned to the square about 11 a.m. and after a short speech by the president the meeting dispersed in the same perfect order which it had maintained throughout.

We must draw exception to the most inaccurate report of this demonstration which appears in yesterday afternoon's edition of "L'Etandard Egyptian," according to which the demonstrators were guilty of disgraceful conduct and threatened Mr. Makri with revolvers. Such is absolutely untrue, and on the contrary as we have previously reported, the meeting was conducted in a most peaceable and orderly manner.

VICTIM OF THE CRISIS.

A contemporary reports that M.M. Carantipoulo, broker at Zagazig, has committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver. The victim had announced by letter to his parents, living at Alexandria, his fatal decision. On receiving this letter they telegraphed at once to a friend at Zagazig, communicating their son's intention, and asking him to do all he could to prevent him till they arrived. The friend at once went to look for M. Carantipoulo, but he was already too late. When he arrived at the house, he found the broker's door locked. Forcing open the door he found himself in the presence of a dead body. The broker had shot himself! The deceased was well respected and extremely popular. Unfortunately he had been speculating in stocks and had suffered with the rest in the crisis. He waited patiently for better times until a firm of Cairo brokers served on him a bill for an amount surpassing his resources. It was this extreme measure which decided M. Carantipoulo to take his life.

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CAIROS WATER SUPPLY.

THE COMMISSION.

The members of the Commission selected by the Egyptian Government from a number of water experts in England, Germany, and France, are arriving in Cairo shortly in order to study the best means for ensuring a pure supply of drinking water for the Capital of Egypt. It is a matter of general regret that the new source of water supply from the so-called artesian wells at Rod-el-Parag has not fulfilled all the anticipations that were expected of them. The cardinal defect of these wells is that they do not tap the water through impermeable strata, which is one of the essential conditions of all artesian wells.

The English member of this International Commission of Water Experts is Dr. Houston, who is the chief bacteriologist of the Metropolitan Water Board of London. He was recommended to the Egyptian Government by the Royal Society and is well qualified in every respect. His French colleague holds an equally high position as a Parisian authority and the German member is the author of a standard work on water analysis. The Commission will arrive in November and will sit for about ten days.

It has been suggested that the commission will not be in a position to judge of the alternating changes in the water of Cairo during the year. But the public need have no apprehension on this point as the commission will be perfectly qualified to form an opinion, as exhaustive data has for some years past been collected by the laboratory of the Survey Department. These data have been issued in an exhaustive report, which has been sent to Europe and is now in the hands of the members of the commission. It is sincerely to be hoped that the vital problem of Cairo's water supply is now in the point of settlement and it is very desirable that the commission should make public the result of their deliberations at as early a date as possible in order to allay all misapprehensions in the matter.

It is worth recalling that in Lord Cromer's last report a quotation was made from Sir Horace Pinching's remarks on the Rod-el-Parag supply to the effect that "The water supplied by the Cairo Company from the wells at Rod-el-Parag, continues of excellent quality in every respect."

THE KHEDIVÉ.

It is expected that the Khedive will arrive here on Thursday morning. The reception at Ras el Tin palace has been postponed until Saturday.

On the occasion of the arrival of the Khedive at Alexandria, the Guard of Honour will be composed of a Battalion, and not 100 non-commissioned officers and men as previously arranged.

LORD CROMER AS FREE TRADER.

The announcement that the Earl of Cromer has been elected a member of the Unionist Free Trade Club is commented upon as follows by the "Daily News":—

The adherence of Earl Cromer to the Unionist Free Trade Association is a notable fact which Tariff Reformers will not enjoy. That one of the ablest financiers among our statesmen who have carried weighty responsibilities for many years should be a convinced Free Trader is not to be disregarded. The Barings know as much about the economic conditions of trade as any men, and Lord Cromer cannot be set aside as an inexperienced authority.

CAIRO STREET MOLESTATION.

A Cairo correspondent writes:—The local press frequently calls attention to the molestation of passers-by in one of the principal streets of the Capital and the more than slack measures taken for the suppression of this evil. Undoubtedly the various Consuls have devoted a considerable amount of energy to the abatement of this evil, but there is room for doubt as to whether the police have been able, or willing, to thoroughly back up the efforts of the Consulates. It should be generally known that the Cairo city police is considerably understaffed actually, although "not on paper"; this fact while mitigating the situation on the one hand is negatived by the apathy of the men on point duty. Although these gentlemen could not effect an arrest without a cavass from one of the consulates, yet a really firm attitude on their part, would, without doubt, cause the perambulating ladies to restrain their advances. A really smart constable could make himself so objectionable to the "industry" without the assistance of the consular authorities as to abate the nuisance considerably, were it not for lack of initiative. The power of the police in Egypt is really formidable, if entrusted to intelligent men with a little finesse, and if European constables were posted in the thoroughfare frequented by the demi-monde with instructions to keep people "moving on," there would be some hope of making things so uncomfortable to them as to induce them to become less in evidence.

STEAMER MOVEMENTS.

The S.S. "Trojan Prince" with passengers and general cargo, left Malta on the 28th inst., and is due to arrive at Alexandria to-morrow.
The S.S. "Creole Prince" with passengers and general cargo, left London on the 27th inst., and is due to arrive at Alexandria on or about the 14th October.

THE TEBTUNIS PAPYRI.

INTEREST ON LOANS.

(Continued.)

Papyrus 389 gives clear information as to the rate of interest charged by a bank upon a safe loan, for this one had the security of a mortgage behind it; in the time of Hadrian. The borrower, a lady named Isidora, for the use of 3500 drachme for a year repays the principal and 420 drachme as interest, making about 14 1/2 per cent. The receipt explains that this amounted to 1 drachma per mina a month. Perhaps to many readers the receipt for part wages and other items, paid in respect of the nursing of a child for 3 years will be of much interest. In it the slave owner, a lady named Thekhekkis acknowledges 500 drachme from a gentleman, Isidorus, being the residue of payments for nursing, oil, and sundry expenses, for three years for her slave Sarapia, who had suckled and nurtured the baby named Endeimon, the child of the said Isidorus by a slave. Isidorus has to acknowledge that he has received his little boy weaned, and in good health. Whilst Thekhekkis adds this is the final settlement, she having previously from to time received payments on account for the services of her slave Sarapia. Also that she had been paid the sum due for "giving notice" so, apparently Isidorus had notified the nurse has he longer required.

In addition to the papyri about 20 Ostraca are described but their texts are not of any value, being chiefly receipts for the beer tax. Nearly one hundred pages are occupied with a geographical survey of the topography of the Arsinoite nome, an endeavour being made to assign the sites of the hundreds of villages and towns mentioned in these, and the almost innumerable other papyri, referring to them. The industry and time occupied to produce this must have been immense. It is only tentative because of hundreds of Greek papyri yet unpublished and the similarly numerous demotic ones at Berlin and the Rylands Library at Manchester, and also those from Umm-el-Baragat and Khamsin, which Professor Spiegelberg is working at. For the benefit of visitors to the Fayoum we append the names of the ancient towns, which occupied ten of the modern sites, whose identification is absolutely certain:—

Whilst not for a moment desiring to diminish the fame of modern European scholars it is only correct to say that in this great revival of classical learning, which will be the literary renaissance of our age, the British race has far and away achieved the greatest prominence. In respect of Doctors Grenfell and Hunt we too have associated the roles of the most eminent explorers and excavators with those of editors, an alliance of fortunate attributes practically unknown elsewhere. Their successful search for papyri, and then their decipherment and publication of them, have produced a series of works absolutely unparalleled in history. They would be the last to wish that the share of others in editing the texts such as those of Professor Smyly and the ever lamented Dr Blass, should be ignored, but the highest honor must be assigned to them, and we cordially hope that still greater discoveries await their unceasing activity. To the Egypt Exploration Fund must also be given the tribute it deserves for initiating and supplying the funds for the work.

With reference to the date of the Latin translation or paraphrase of the Greek version of Diety's Cretensis, it should be noted that the writer of it, Septimius, dedicates his performance to Q. Aradius Rufinus. There were two Roman Statesmen of this name, one in office in 304-314 A. D. and later his nephew is mentioned in affairs concerning A. D. 363, so it was in the first half of the 4th century Septimius produced his Latin text.

THE "OLIVEMOOR" CASE.

THE COURT'S DECISION.

This morning the special court called together to judge upon the case of the stranding of the S.S. "Olivemoor" and consisting of H. B. M's Consul-General Gould, as president, and Captains Muir and Jones, deliberated for over an hour and a half at the British Consulate, no further evidence being taken. Shortly before one o'clock Mr. Gould announced that the court found that Captain Heatley, commanding the "Olivemoor," had been guilty of neglect of duty and they accordingly sentenced him to a suspension for a period of six months, and to pay the expenses of the enquiry.

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PERSONAL AND SOCIAL.

AMONG THOSE WHO ARRIVED THIS MORNING BY THE S.S. "SEMIRAMIS" WERE MAHMOUD PASHA SIDKI, DR. MARTINO PASHA, AND JOHNSON PASHA.

Brewster Bey, English Secretary to the Khedive, who has been at Constantinople with his Highness, has received the Liasat Medal in gold from the Sultan. This mark of the Sultan's esteem is an Order of Merit and has been granted to Brewster Bey for his long and faithful services to the Khedive.

Yehia Pasha and Abani Bey, Councilors of the Alexandria Municipality, and the former's son, Emin Bey Yehia, arrived at Alexandria this morning from Constantinople by the Khedivial Liner "Osmanieh."

Osman Bey Mortada, Councillor to the Court of appeal, arrived here by the Italian steamer yesterday.

Mr. Ernest Tester, of "L'Epargne Immobilière," Cairo, has returned from London. Mr. Tester has been appointed Egyptian Agent for the London and Paris Exchange, Limited.

The Pope granted an audience at the Vatican on the 19th inst. to Chevalier Aquilina, of the Carlton Hotel, Ramleh, who thanked His Holiness for having given him the rank of Cavalier of Saint Gregory the Great.

On the 19th September a marriage took place, at Hill Church, County Dublin, of F. Moreton, L. Dodd, and Jane Louise eldest daughter of the late W. McComas Esq. and Mrs. McComas of the Grange, Monkstown.

ARMY DRAFTS FOR EGYPT.

The reinforcing drafts of the Royal Army Medical Corps, Royal Engineers, Army Service and Army Ordnance Corps, and Royal Horse Artillery left Aldershot last Tuesday for Gibraltar, Malta, and Egypt. The men were given a hearty send-off, being played away by the bands of the Royal Engineers and Royal Army Medical Corps.

FOREIGN POSTAGE.

We remind our readers that commencing from to-morrow the postage on letters from Egypt to the United Kingdom, on all British Colonies, Possessions and Protectorates, with the exception of Newfoundland, will be 5 millimes for every twenty grammes or fraction thereof. The same rate will apply to letters for Italy. The postage to all other Countries in the Postal Union will be 10 millimes for the first twenty grammes and 6 millimes for every extra twenty grammes.

For the undermentioned Countries which are not in the Postal Union the rate of postage will be 10 millimes for every twenty grammes or fraction thereof:— Abyssinia, China (interior), Afghanistan, New Hebrides, N.E. & N.W. Rhodesia.

BORGANDAGE IN THE FAYOUM.

Our Fayoum correspondent reports that on the 21st inst. about 10 o'clock in the evening a large band of brigands passed through Sineri village and attacked a number of fellahin, who happened to be in their cotton fields. Fire-arms were used and before the police could intervene one man was killed on each side and another fellah was seriously wounded. On the arrival of the ghafrirs, reports our correspondent, a terrible blunder was made by the ghafrirs attacking the defensive party and another of these was mortally wounded. After the fight had been suppressed and several arrests had been made the usual police measures were resorted to.

CLAYTON GAS CO.

The first steamer of the fleet of the Clayton Gas Company of Egypt and the Sudan has arrived at Alexandria and is now ready for being utilised for the disinfection of steamers frequenting this port. The second steamer will be at Port-Said in a week's time and the other two steamers will come in their stations at Port-Sudan and Suez. A large disinfecting machine for shoonahs and public buildings is now on its way to Egypt. This machine is mounted on a steam traction engine. Three small, portable machines for the disinfection of private houses are also shortly arriving.

TELEGRAMS.

THE CASABLANCA SITUATION.

TROOPS HAMPERED BY RAINS.

OUTBREAK OF FEVER FEARED.

CASABLANCA, September 28. The Consuls have been informed that Muley Hafid's army is approaching Casablanca with the object of arranging terms of peace with France.

CASABLANCA, September 29. A torrential downpour here has rendered the French and Spanish camps swamps. An outbreak of fever is feared.

PARIS, September 29. Admiral Philibert has telegraphed that the cruiser "Gloire" has left for Gibraltar. The "Galilee" is now at Rabat. The political situation at Casablanca continues calm.

MARMADE, September 29. During the course of a banquet given in honour of M. Fallières, the President eulogised the bravery of the troops at Morocco. In the evening he left for Montpellier.

AMERICA AND JAPAN.

PHILIPPINES NOT TO BE SOLD.

TOKIO, September 28. Mr. Taft, the American War Minister, has arrived.

TOKIO, September 29. Mr. Taft, in the course of an interview, said that America and Japan would always be friends. He had no mission to Japan except to bear friendly greetings and visit old friends at Manila en route. He denied that America had any intention of selling the Philippines.

THE MALAGA FLOODS.

12,000 PEOPLE HOMELESS.

MADRID, September 28. The rain at Malaga has ceased; the situation is improving. (Later) 12,000 people are homeless owing to the floods. The lower part of Barcelona is flooded.

MALAGA, September 29. Fresh storms are reported to the south of Spain. Enormous damages.

LARGE FIRE AT WU-CHOW.

200 PERSONS PERISH.

HONGKONG, September 28. 200 persons have perished in a fire at Wu-chow, which is believed to have been a work of incendiarism owing to the establishment of a new lighting (?) station. Property to the value of a quarter of a million dollars has been destroyed.

SIR ELDON GORST.

POSTPONEMENT OF DEPARTURE.

LONDON, September 28. Sir Eldon Gorst at the last moment has deferred his departure for a week.

TURKEY AND PERSIA.

TEHRAN, September 28. A sum of £400,000 has been subscribed by the Persian people, including the dignitaries and officials, to assist the Government in raising a force to expel the Turks from disputed districts.

BOXERS IN CHINA.

SHANGHAI, September 28. The protestant missionaries at Kang-chow fu are safe.

TELEGRAMS.

COUNTESS MONTIGNOSO'S MARRIAGE.

THE KING'S EXASPERATION.

BERLIN, September 28. The King of Saxony, exasperated at Countess Montignoso's marriage, held a council and intimated that he would continue her allowance but insists on the surrender of their child.

FLORENCE, September 28. The newly-married couple Louise de Saxe and the singer Toselli are at Fiesole.

LONDON'S NEW LORD MAYOR.

LONDON, September 28. Sir John Bell has been elected Lord Mayor of London.

THE FLOODS IN FRANCE.

PARIS, September 28. The President of the Republic and Messrs. Pichon and Barthou have left to visit the scenes of the disaster at Hérault.

THE KHEDIVE.

CONSTANTINOPLE, September 29. The Khedive has left for Egypt.

CONSTANTINOPLE, September 29. The Khedive prior to his departure bade farewell to the Sultan.

KIRKDALE DIVISION ELECTION.

LONDON, September 28. Kirkdale Division (Liverpool) Bye-Election. Mr. MacArthur, Unionist, has been elected with 4,000 votes in place of Mr. MacIver, deceased. The Labour candidate, Mr. Hill, had 3,330 votes.

YACHTING IN BRITISH WATERS.

LONDON, September 29. A movement has been started among British yachtsmen to organise an international race to take place in British waters, in place of the race for the America Cup.

U. S. NAVY.

WASHINGTON, September 29. It is stated that the start of the battleships for the Pacific will be delayed for two months owing to the carrying out of necessary repairs.

PLAGUE AT ORAN.

PARIS, September 28. It is officially announced that two deaths from plague have occurred at Oran.

ORAN, September 29. Owing to the report of a case of plague, the battleships have left the port. The base of military operations has been transferred to Algiers.

PARIS, September 29. The authorities are taking the most rigorous measures to stamp out the plague which appeared at Oran. Up to the present there have been 12 cases, 4 of which have turned out fatal. Rats are being exterminated. The ships in the harbour have removed.

AMERICAN RAILWAY DISASTER.

FIFTEEN PERSONS KILLED.

NEW YORK, September 29. 15 persons have been killed and 20 injured, several of whom fatally, at Bellefleur (Ohio) in a collision between a Chicago express and a goods train.

GREEKS AND BULGARIANS.

ATHENS, September 29.

Nine Bulgarians and one Greek have been killed in an encounter between Greek and Bulgarian bands in the Morichoven district.

DEATH OF GRAND DUKE OF BADEN.

BERLIN, September 28.

The Grand Duke of Baden is dead.

COMMERCE IN PERSIA.

NEED FOR FOREIGN CONTROL.

It seems certain, says the "Morning Post," that one of the first results of the ratification of the Anglo-Russian Agreement over Central Asia will be to give a much-needed impetus to the trade and commerce of Persia.

There have been many more or less casual examinations of various portions of Persia in the hope of finding mineral deposits of late years, but what is now required is a thorough and systematic geological and mineralogical survey of the country from south to north and from west to east by properly qualified experts, and signs are forthcoming that before very long the Shah and his Government will order this survey to be taken in hand.

The Persians are essentially an industrial population, but they need foreign control and guidance. At the present time the manufacture of carpets and silks are the two principal things that occupy their attention, but under proper encouragement new industries would rapidly spring up, and one of the first of these would not doubt be cotton spinning.


