THE REAL INDIA.*

Mr. Oman, formerly Professor in the Govrnment College at Lahore and a well-known author on Indian subjects, writes this book to interpret the present-day Indians to the English public, which is far, indeed, from realising that more than half the entire population under British rule follow the Hindoo religion, that a quarter of the inhabitants of the Empire are Mahommedan, and that the remainder is made up of the Christians of the United Kingdom and the colonies. In all India there are not three millions of Christians, Europeans and natives combined. Mr. Oman, who really knows his subject, divides his book into goddess worship in Bengal, caste in India,

Theism in Bengal, and Hindoo Social Reform. It will thus be seen that he deals chiefly with Bengal, and from his pages, as from those of the last census report it is apparent that the baser and cruder forms of superstition flourish particularly in that province. He speaks of the sensitive and sensual character of the Bengalis, who are not Aryans, but belong to the Mongolo-Dravidian race. It is they who are par excellence the Saktas or worshippers of the female energy, and amongst them religion is morbid affection which tends to sap the manhood of the people and to effeminate the

Few deductions as regards the religion of the people, of its outward and visible manifestations, and of its esoteric effects upon themselves are to be drawn from Bengal for other parts of India. It is only Calcutta which boasts the Kalighat temple with its shambles. The Hindoos as a whole are extremely and genuinely religious, and are living examples of the belief that the fear of God is the beginning of wisdom.

Few of the many who have written upon caste have dealt with it in so clear and practical a manner as the author of this book. SUNDAY CLOSING.

DEMONSTRATION AT ALEXANDRIA.

The question of the closing of all shops in Alexandria, save those dealing in foods, drinks, etc., has been well fought for some years by the Société Internationale des Employés d'Alexandrie, and yesterday morning a further example of the energetic manner in which the society carries on its work and insists upon the employes of Alexandrian shops being granted one welldeserved day of rest in the week was given yesterday morning by the demonstration held at 6 a.m. in the Mohamed Ali square. It was decided last week by the masters that the shops should be re-opened on Sundays, as was the case the year before last, but this society, whose object it is to protect the employes, decided to oppose the decision of the masters. Consequently a mass meeting was called and the president of the society supported by several members of the committee and several hundreds of members of the society, the meeting altogether numbering almost two thousand persons, assembled yesterday morning in the Mohamed Ali square to protest against the proposed imposition of the masters. Within a few minutes after the opening of the meeting Mr. Makri, opposite whose shop the meeting was being held, appeared with his staff with the object of re-inaugurating general Sunday work in the shop-world. This gentleman, however, was approached by Mr. George Rublié, president of the society, and several members of the committee, who begged him to refrain from taking such steps. They pointed out to him that they were working in an absolutely disinterested manner for the members of the society for whom they desired to claim a weekly day of rest, The long hours sustained during the working days of the week by the men and women, many of whom receive a pittance barely sufficient to provide them with the necessities of life, are amply sufficient to earn a Sabbath's repose from labour and such is the contention of the society, which we most emphatically endorse and which we shall ever be ready to

The petition of the president, however, was eceived with no favour by Mr. Makri, who gesticulated wildly and waved in the air a somewhat formidable stick. The shop was opened and within a few minutes one of the employés appeared with a pistol, and those around began to fear for the safety of the protesting president of the society. The police appeared on the scene, the president wrested the stick from Mr. Makri, and within a few minutes order was restored by the arrival of the mounted police. The demonstrators afterwards adjourned to the, back of Makri's shop and succeeded in persuading some half dozen shops in the neighbourhood to close. They afterwards proceeded in perfect orderand quiet to Rue Ibrahim and the Attarine and repeated the same process, the proprietors in every case showing themselves quite willing to meet with the demands of the crowd of employes.

Thay afterwards proceeded along Rue Cherif Pasha and into the square and again, faced Makri's shop, which was strongly guarded by mounted police. After a conference with Hashim Bey, chief of the public security, the meeting marched to the Gouvernorat, where the president and several members of the committee were received by Mustapha Pasha Ibadi, Governor of Alexandria, who, after the matter had been explained, thanked the deputation for the orderliness of the meeting and promised to use is influence to induce Mr. Makri to combine with his fellow shopkeepers in observing Sunday as a holiday. The demonstrators returned to the square about 11 a.m. and after a short speech by the president the meeting dispersed n the same perfect order which it had sustained throughout.

We must draw exception to the most innacurrate report of this demonstration which appears in yesterday afternoon's edition of "L'Etendard Egyptien," according to which the demonstrators were guilty of disgraceful conduct and threatened Mr. Makri with revolvers. Such is absolutely untrue, and on the contrary as we have previously reported. the meeting was conducted in a most peacable

VICTIM OF THE CRISIS:

A contemporary reports that M.M. Carantinopulo, broker at Zagazig, has committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver. The victim had announced by letter to his parents, living at Alexandria, his fatal decision. On receiving this letter they telegraphed at once to a friend at Zagazig, communicating their son's intention, and asking him to do all he could to prevent him till they arrived. The friend at once went to look for M. Carantinopoulo, but he was already too late. When he arrived at the house, he found the broker's door Friday evening there could not have been less | locked. Forcing open the door he found himself in the presence of a dead body. The broker hadshot himself! The deceased was well respected and extremely popular. Unfortunately he had been speculating in stocks and had suffered with the rest in the crisis. He waited patiently for better times until a firm of Cairo brokers served on him a bill for an amount surpassing his resources. It was this extreme measure which decided M. Carantinopulo to take his

CAIROS WATER SUPPLY.

THE COMMISSION.

The members of the Commission selected by the Egyptian Government from a number of water experts in England, Germany, and France, are arriving in Cairo shortly in order to study the best means for ensuring a pure supply of drinking water for the Capital of Egypt. It is a matter of general regret that the new source of water supply from the so-called artesian wells at Rod-el-Parag has not fulfilled all the anticipations that were expected of them The cardinal defect of these wells is that they do not tap the water through impermeable strata, which is one of the essential conditions of all artesian wells. The English member of this International

Commission of Water Experts is Dr. Houston, who is the chief bacteriologist of the Metropolitan Water Board of London. He was recommended to the Egyptian Government by the Royal Society and is well qualified in every respect. His French colleague holds an equally high position as a Parisian authority and the German member is the author of a standard work on water analysis. The Commission will arrive in November and will sit for about ten health. Whilst Thenkebkis adds this is the

It has been suggested that the commission will not be in a position to judge of the alternating changes in the water of Cairo during the year. But the public need have no apprehension on this point as the commission will be perfectly qualified to form an opinion, as exhaustive data has for some years past been collected by the laboratory of the Survey Department. These data have been issued in an exhaustive report, which has been sent to Europe and is now in the hands of the mem bers of the commission. It is sincerely to be hoped that the vital problem of Cairo's water supply is now in the point of settlement and it is very desirable that the commission should make public the result of their deliberations at as early a date as possible in order to allay all

misapprehensions in the matter. It is worth recalling that in Lord Cromer's last report a quotation was made from Sir Horace Pinching's remarks on the Rod-el-Farag supply to the effect that" The water supplied by the Cairo Company from the wells at Rod-el-Farag, continues of excellent quality in every respect,

THE KHEDIVE.

It is expected that the Khedive will arrive here on Thursday morning. The reception at Ras el Tin palace has been postmoned until Saturday.

On the occasion of the arrival of the Khedive at Alexandria, the Guard of Honour will be composed of a Battalion, and not 100 Medinet Nenas non-commissioned officers and men as previously arranged.

CAIRO STREET MOLESTATION.

A Cairo correspondent writes :- The local as inequently calls attention to the molesta tion of passers by in one of the principal streets of the Capital and the more than slack measures taken for the suppression of this evil Undoubtedly the various Consuls have devoted a considerable amount of energy to the abatement of this evil, but there is room for doubt as to whether the police have been able, or willing, to thoroughly back up the efforts of the Consulates. It should be generally known that the Cairo city police is considerably understaffed actually, although not on paper; this fact while mitigating the situation on the one hand is negatived by the apathy of the men on point duty. Although these gentlemen could not effect an arrest without a cavass from one of the consulates, yet a really firm attitude on their part, would, without doubt, cause the perambulating ladies to restrain their advances. A really smart constable could make himself so objectionable to the "industry" without the assistance of the consular authorities as to abate the nuisance considerably, were it not for lack of initiative. The power of the police in Egypt is really formidable, a entrusted to intelligent men with a little finesse, and if European constables were posted in the thoroughfare frequented by the demi-monde with instructions to keep people "moving on," there would be some hope of making things so uncomfortable to them as to induce them to ecome less in evidence.

INTEREST ON LOANS.

(Continued).

The borrower, a lady named Iaidora, for the use of 3500 drachme for a year repays the principal and 420 drachmes as interest making about 14½ per cent. The receipt explains that this amounted to 1 drachma per mina a mounted to 1 drachma per mina a month. Perhaps to many readers the receipt for part wages and other items, paid in respect of the mursing of a child for 3 years will be of much interest. In it the slave owner, a lady named Thenkebkis acknowledges 500 drachmae from a gentleman, Isidorus, being the residue of payments for nursing, oil, and sundry expenses, for three years for her slave sarapias, who had suckled and nurtured the baby named Endremon, the child of the said Isidorus by a slave. Isidorus has to acknowledge that he has to receive his little boy weaned, and in good final settlement, she having previously from to time received payments on account for the services, of her slave Sarapias. Also that she had been paid the sum due for "giving notice" so, apparently Isidorus had notified the nurse has he longer required.

In addition to the papyri about 20 Ostrace are described but their texts are not of any value, being chiefly receipts for the beer tax. Nearly one hundred pages are occupied with a geographical survey of the topography of the Arsinoite nome, an endeavour being made to assign the sites of the hundreds of villages and towns mentioned in these, and the almost in-numerable other papers, referring to them. The industry and time occupied to produce this must have been immense. It is only tentative because of hundreds of Greek papyri yet unpublished and the similarly numerous demotic ones at Berlin and the Ryland's Library at Manchester, and also those from Umm-el-Baragat and Khamsin, which Professor Spiegelberg is working at. For the benefit of visitors to the Fayoun we append the names of the ancient towns, which ecoupied ten of the mo-dern sites, whose identification is absolutely certain :-

Whilst not for a moment desiring to diminish the fame of modern European scholars it is only correct to say that in this great revival of classical learning, which will be the literary renaissance of our age, the British race has far and away achieved the greatest prominence. In respect of Doctors Grenfell and Hunt we too have associated the roles of the most eminent explorers and excavators with those of editors, an alliance of fortunate attributes practically unknown elesewhere. Their successful search for papyri, and then their decypherment and publication of them, have produced a series of works absolutely unparelled in history. They would be the last to wish that the share of others in editing the texts such as those of Professor Smyly and the ever lamented Dr Blass, should be ignored, but the highest honor must be assigned to them, and we cordially hope that still greater discoveries await their unceasing activity. To the Egypt Exploration Fund must also be given the tribute it deserves for iniatiating and supplying the funds for the

With reference to the date of the Latin of Dictys Cretensis, it should be noted that the writer of it, Septimius, dedicates his performance to Q. Aradius Rufinus. There were two Roman Statesmen of this name, one in office in 304-314 A.D. and later his nephew is mentioned in affairs concerning A. The tax on letters originating in Egypt and the Sudan for Abroad will be :

1. Five milliemes for every 20 grammes, or fraction thereof for Great Britain and Ireland and all British Colonies, Possessions and Protectorates with the exception of Newfoundland. 2. Five milliemes for every 20 grammes, or fraction thereof, for Italy, Eritrea and Benadir.

3. Ten milliemes for the first 20 grammes and 6 milliemes for every extra 20 grammes for all Countries in the Postal Union not mentioned in Paragraphs 1 and 2.

4. Ten millientes for every 20 grammes, or fraction thereof, for Countries not in the Postal Union, viz :- Abyssinia, China (Interior) Afghanistan, New Hebrides, North East and North West Rhodesia.

POST - CARDS.

Cards bearing the inscription "POST CARD" will be in the same category as "printed matter" provided that they fulfil the conditions laid down for such matter. Should they, however, not falfil these conditions they will be considered as ordinary Post Cards and treated as such, otherwise, according to the regulations in force for Post Cards, they will be taxed as

REPLY COUPONS.

Reply coupons will enable the sender of a letter to transmit the cost of a reply to the addressee. These reply coupons will be sold at 11 milliemes each.

These coupons can be exchanged in all Countries to which this Service extends for cash or nostage stamps to the value of 25 Centimes. Information as to the Countries which are admitted to this Service can be obtained from any post office.

INSCRIPTIONS ON MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders which bear an inscription written in pencil will not be accepted.

> PARCELS. 1. Reduction of tax.

The tax on parcels not exceeding 1 Kilo: in weight will be reduced for certain Countries.

2. Conditions of despatch.

1. Parcels of which the addresses are written in pencil will not be accepted for transmission, 2. All parcels for abroad must be packed in such a manner as to ensure the safety and preservation of the contents during transport. They must also be sealed with wax, lead or some such substance, which seals must bear the imprint of some special design.

3. Customs declarations.

Customs declarations must accompany all parcels for abroad and must show the exact value of the contents of such parcels in order to facilitate the collection of export and quay

4. Despatch notes.

Communications relative to parcels sent nay be written on Despatch Notes. This facility however does not extend to Despatch Notes of parcels addressed to Great Britain and Ireland and British Colonies, with the exception of British India.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF RECEIPT AND PAYMENT

The sender of a registered or insured article parcel or a money order will be able to obtain an Acknowledgment of Receipt by the addressee from the Post Office on payment of 10 milliemes at the time of posting.

OTHER SERVICES.

Notice is also given to the effect that the following services, which have not undergone much alterations by the Postal Congress, are undertaken by the Post Office.

1. Value Declared Letters & Boxes.

By means of this service the contents of letters and boxes can be insured according to their value, with a maximum of 10,000 francs.

2. Collection Order Service.

The Post Office will undertake to present any bill, draft etc. to a debtor for collection of the amount. In case this amount cannot be obtained however no action will be taken by the Post Office against the person.

3 Subscriptions to Newspapers.

Subscriptions for newspapers published in Egypt and the Sudan as well as Austria-Hungary, Belgium, Great Britain and Ireland. Germany, Italy, Switzerland and the United States of America, can be taken out at the Post Office.

4. Identity Certificates.

In order to minimise the difficulties often xperienced by the Public in obtaining postal matter or money orders addressed to them, identity certificates can be obtained from Post Offices at the rate of 20 milliemes each. These certificates hold good for the tollow

COMMERCE IN PERSIA.

NEED FOR FOREIGN CONTROL.

It seems certain, says the "Morning Post," that one of the first results of the ratification of the Anglo-Russian Agreement over Central Asia will be to give a much-needed impetus to the trade and commerce of Persia. It is almost equally certain that most of this increase will pass into Russian hands, but though this fact may be deplored there is no reason why India and Great Britain should not obtain a fair, share of the new trade that will quickly be set up. It is anticipated that this Agreement will define exactly the future position of Persia, will place on record the necessity for the maintenance of its independence and integrity, and will define the attitude to be observed towards it in the future by each of the signatory Powers. At the present time it may be said that roughly speaking, the trade of the Persian Gulf is in the hands of British and Indian traders, while the caravan trade between Persia and trans-Caspia is entirely controlled by Russia. The Agreement will probably leave things undisturbed in this direction, but it is to be expected that it will define clearly the respective spheres of action of the two Powers. In this connection, however, it is impossible to overlook the position of Germany with regard to the Gulf trade. Recently Germany has made very bold bid to capture this trade, and has lately started a heavily-subsidised service of steamships between the Gulf ports and Europe, while both India and Turkey are making bold bid for the caravan trade in the north.

In the past the British and Indian authorities have paid but the most perfunctory attention to the cultivation of commercial relations with Persia, and the measure of success that has been attained has been due almost entirely to private enterprise This has provided the opportunity for both Russia and Germany to step in. So far as it has gone such commercial expansion as has taken place in Persia has been almost without any effort on the part of the Persians themselves. Now, however, quite a different state of things is coming into existence. Persia is at the moment struggling to throw off the sloth of centuries, and is evincing obvious, if only semi-articulate, signs of a desire to enter boldly into the markets of the world. That the natural resources of the country are very great is plain to the most anobservant traveller through Persia, but they are only half realised at the moment, and it will be a work of years before the real value of Persia, from a commercial standpoint, can be clearly established. Persia's leading export at the moment is dried fruits, with raw cotton and those woollen carpets for which the land is so famous, not far behind. It will probably be found, within the next decade or so that these positions have altered somewhat. and that the export of raw cotton has become Persia's staple trade, since all experts who have visited the country report that it is eminently a cotton-growing land, and one where the employment of modern methods of cultivation and modern machenery would meet with

capital forthcoming. It will be a matter of years before the railway system of Persia can become anything like adequate to her requirements, but while this construction work is going forward there is no reason why commercial activity should not be manifested in many ways throughout the land. The report of the Commercial Mission that visited Persia from India a year or two ago under the leadership of Mr A.H. Gleadowe-Newcomen showed how great are the commercial possibilities of Persia, and the effect of this report was to excite immediate interest in Persia on the part of the trading community of India that at once became noticeable, and this has since been fully maintained. Further, since the establishment of the new Persian Constitution much has been done to remove the vexatious restrictions and delays that in the past made many merchants and traders, both in India and in this country, shy of entering the Persian markets.

Though the mineral resources of Persia are at the moment almost entirely undeveloped, there can be no doubt that they are of a nature that would easily repay exploitation. The greatest obstacle to their rapid development is

the fact that in most cases they are situated at great distances from the ports and distribut-ing centres and in districts where good roads are things unknown. The copper and lead mines of Persia were, of course, well known to the ancients, and many traces of the old workings are to be seen as one travels through the land while in several places large deposits of rich, black iron ore have heen discovered. The value of these deposits is increased by the fact in nearly every instance where they are found, eams of good quality coal that might be em ployed for smelting purposes have also been ocated close at hand. Those experts in this direction who have visited Persia are unani mously of the opinion that it only needs capital and the construction of good roads-pending the advent of the railways-for Persia to become a great iron-producing country. At the present time the whole money that the Persian Government receives annually by way of mining dues, royalties, &c., is something under twenty thousand pounds, a sum that will probably be quadrapled during the next ten

There have been many more or less casual examinations of various portions of Persia in the hope of finding mineral deposits of late years, but what is now required is a thorough and systematic geological and mineralogical survey of the country from south to north and from west to east by properly qualified experts, and signs are forthcoming that before very long the Shah and his Government will order this survey to be taken in hand. A commencement will in all probability be made with those districts where minerals have already been found and where ancient workings indicate their former presence. It will take a very considerable time to carry out such a survey as- is here outlined, but it is practically certain that when it is made some surprising discoveries will take place.

The Persians are essentially an industrial population, but they need foreign control and guidance. At the present time the manufacture f carpets and silks are the two principal things that occupy their attention, but under proper encouragement new industries would rapidly spring up, and one of the first of these would no loubt be cotton spinning. Already more than one large firm of Indian spinners is looking ongingly towards the rich lands of Persia, so eminently suited for the cultivation of cotton on modern lines and calculating how greatly Persia's present output might be increased and easy it would be to erect mills close at hand. Labour is to be obtained in abundance and is very cheap, even when compared with the standard, while on the whole the lands best suited to cotton growing purposes are remarkably well watered, so that the cost of

rrigation would be comparatively little. Taken all round the commercial outlook in Persia is of the brightest at the present time. and it only needs the adoption of a progressive and enlightened policy on the part of the Government of the country and the cordial cooperation the two Powers primarily concerned in the prosperity and political integrity of the country to ensure its rapid advance in the scale of nations. Happily there seems good reason to believe that both these requirements are now on the very point of being fulfilled.

A TALE OF THE BUSH.

The author of the "Transvaal from Within," the guide through the tangled maze of Transvaal politics of some ten years ago, has stepped down into the world of the "little people," and written them a guide-book to the enchantment of hunting in the Bush-veld. "A simple record," he calls his book, "compiled for the interest and satisfaction of some little people." The idea of the book took shape in a demand from the "autocrats of the nightgown" that the half hour before "lights out" should be eked out with a story. The outcome is a series of tales which resemble the "Arabian Nights" in the circumstances of their origin, and the "Just Stories" is their origin, and the "Just So Stories" in their subject and fascination. The story of Jock gives artistic unity to the whole book. But the autobiographical interest of the book, its extraordinary insight both into the atmosphere of the veld and of the types of character which the veld produces will lift it out of the realm of the "little people" to the shelves of "the grown-ups." There is hardly one typical incident of yeld life, from a bash fire to "lost in the bush" which Sir Percy Fitzpatrick has not depicted with the sympathy of personal experience and the masterly touch of the artist. There is hardly one of the characters typical to the veld which has not been sketched—from a bad specimen of the Field Cornet to the Zulu of Chaka's moulding. There is hardly an animal to be found in a South African soo which is not the central figure of some exciting hunt where dog plays even a more important part than master. And of all the delightful characters in the story Joek is the most delightful. The ugly duckling ot the litter, the puppy, justifies the choice of his master and fights his way by sheer pluck and doggedness into the first place. He is character in himself. Grim, silent, and determined he proves himself in hunt after hunt to be more than the match of his master's quarry He is a typical South African in his dislike of Kaffirs and in the humorous tricks in which his dislike found expression. In a book that is crowded with brilliant

sketches of men scenery and incident it is invidious to single out any one for quotation.

The following passage, however, may be taken as a fair example of the spirit and the style of the book :

Of the people who live lonely lives, on the veld or elsewhere, few do so of their own free choice. Some there are shut off from all their kind-souls sheathed in some film invisible through which no thrill of sympathy may pass; some barred by their self-conscious heart hungry still, who learned in childhood to make friends ; some have a secret or a grief; some thoughts too big or bad for comradeship. But most will charge to Fate the thoughtless choice, the chance, or hard necessity, that drew or drove them to the life apart ; they know the lesson that was learned of old : "It is not good for man to be alone."

That is the philosophy of the people of the veld. Here is another passage to show their practical wisdom in so humble a pursuit as the driving of bullocks: Brains and character tell there as everywhere

experience only gives them scope; it is not a substitute. The men themselves would not tell you so; they never trouble themselves with introspections and analyses, and if you asked one of them the secret of success he might tell you "Commonsense and hard work" or curtly give you the maxims "Watch it," and "Stick to it"-which to him express the whole creed, and to you, I suppose, convey

The author disclaims any "pretension" for his book. But it is assuredly a notable contribution to the literature of the veld, to the explanation of that elusive but irresistible charm which the veld exercises over those who have tasted its pleasures.




