LORD KELVIN'S DEATH.

Yesterday telegrams adnounce the death of the greatest modern British man of science, who was as supreme in his own line as was Pasteur in France and Von Helmholtz in Germany. Lord Kalvin was born in Belfast in 1824, and came of Scoto-Irish race of Ulster which has been so prolific in genius. His father, Dr. James Thomson, professor of mathematics in the Royal Academical Institute, Belfast, was in 1832 appointed to the chair of mathematics in his alma mater, the old College of Glasgow which formerly stood on the west side of the High Street. His son William, who was destined to play a heroic part in the field of science, became a student of the college while a mere child of eleven or twelve, and astonished the older scholars in his father's class by his preternatural quickness in solving the problems. His talent for mathematics was inclubirable, and his father sent him to St. Peter's College, Cambridge, where he graduated as Second Wrangler and first Smith's prizeman in 1845. The Senior Wrangler probably owed his triumph to ready writing, for one of the examiners was heard to say that he was unworthy "to cut Thomson's pencils for him," and he has since been forgotten.

While at Cambridge Thomson began to publish papers on physical subjects—for example, beat and electricity—but he was active in various directions, and so far from being the pale student, overcome with night work, he was given to open air sports, gained the Silver Soulls, and rowed in the winning boatof the Oxford and Cambridge race. Enrolled as Fellowof St. Peter's, he entered the laboratory of the famous Regnault in Paris, and in 1846 was called to the Chair of Natural Philosophy Yesterday telegrams amounce the the greatest modern British man of who was as supreme in his own line

Enrolled a Fellow of St. Peter's, he entered the laboratory of the famous Regnault in Paris, and in 1846 was called to the Chair of Natural Philosophy in his old college at Glasgow, a congenial poet, which, in spite of tempting offers, he never quitted. In 1852 he espoused Miss Margaret, a daughter of Mr. Walter Crum, F. R. S., of Rooken Castle, Thornliebank, the famous calico printer, who was distinguished for his investigations on the nature of cotton fibre.

It is impossible to give any but the merest outlines of the inventions of Lord Kelvin. He contributed more than any other man to the success of the Atlantic cable by enunciating the law of retardation whereby engineers were enabled to design a cable, which would give a satisfactory spead to the messages. He invented the mirrorinstrument for receiving the messages to be sent through the cable. He next produced the siphon recorder, which with the mirror is now employed on most of the submarine cables throughout the world. His most important aid to navigation was the adjuatable compass which bears his name. He did mere than any other electrician to introduce accurate methods of measuring electricity. His machine for predicting the level of the tides in any part of the world was his chief non-electrical invention.

Concurrently with these and other inventions he carried out an immense number of experimental and mathematical researches in every department of natural philosophy. Indeed, his scientific renows culminated over his discoveries, the mathematical researches in every department of natural philosophy. was typical of his age in covering the whole field.

Such prodigies of nature are only produced at rare intervals, and it may be a long time before the world has another scientist of his calibre. It will be easier to estimate his true place and proportions hereafter from the standpoint of distance. Apparently, however, his name will go down to posterity with those of Galileo, Newton and Pascal. So far he was unique in science by reason of his multifarious and diversified career. His achievement would suffice to make at least three eminent reputations, for not only was he the greatest physicist of the day but the leading electrical engineer, and one of the most celebrated inventors.

The chief incidents in "La Favorita" were the singing of M. Flachat and the chorus. His voice, always true and full of meaning, took on every shade of colour and passion, renunciation and despair. It is so seldom that the French and despair. It is so seldom that the French tenor voice can please without prejudice: it is apt to savour of throat, to be husky, forced, noisy; but M. Flachat was free from all this and yet had the characteristic warmth and suggestion of the best 'demi-caractère.' The others sang well enough. M. Gorins (M. Valette was inscribed for the part, but a change was made) was consistent, but too change was inauch and conservation vigorous: M. Coiglio was certainly good, dignified and emphatic; Mme. Broglia is apparently still unwell, but she was quite adequate: her voice accentuates the extreme of the French contralto, constrained, rather forced, apt to be profuse in moments of passion, not always pleasing, but her technique and singing in general seemed good. M.Delmas and Mile Gilberte were excellent in their rather slight parts : it is so important to fill the lesser parts well, an opera can be so wholly marred by details. According to the new tariff, freight charge from Khartoum North to Port Sudan and Suakin, including charges for loading and unloading, will not exceed 12 P.T. per ardeb. MONEY AND SHARE MARKET

(PROM OUR FINANCIAL CORRESPONDENT,)

London, December 13.

It is becoming increasingly evident that Lombard Street must be prepared for stiff discount rates for some weeks to come. In the first place, the task of clearing up the wreckage in America is a slow process. Further failures have taken place this week, and cash is returning only very slowly into circulation. The premium of gold still continues, and further shipments from this side are expected. So fa as can be gathered, the banks are still retaining the paper currency, notwithstanding that the date fixed for the renewal of cash payments passed some ten days ago.

South America is also likely to require

substantial quantity of gold in the near future. The crops there are reported to be excellent, and will probably be sold at high prices, so that London will have to take a large share in providing the necessary funds Another point to be reckoned with in considering the future movements of discount rates is the serious financial position in Germany. As already reported in your columns, the Budget recently presented showed a large deficit, in spite of presented showed a large denoit, in spite of economy in the various departments, and the Government were compelled to appropriate a million of the Sinking Fund for Imperial Debt in order to reduce the deficit. It is therefore probable that gold will go to Berlin before the

One bright feature in the outlook is the cessation of the demands for Egypt, and it is hoped that the gold you have already obtained will be safficient to finance the crop. Indeed we are given to understand that we may anticipate a return of the precious metal from Egypt in January, and that your banks have several millions of gold in their coffers in Egypt; this being so, they should be more to make advances on Egyptian Stocks and Shares in your markets, all of which should tend to improve the situation.

The position of the Bank of England has undergone a substantial improvement during the past week, the increase in the re-serve amounting to £1,767,823, bringing the total to £23,674,013, which compares with £22,748,055 in the corresponding week of 1906. The proportion to liabilities is up 2.93 on the week, being now 46.95, against 47.02 last year. The increase in coin and bullion is £1,400,000, and the note circulation has contracted to the extent of nearly £360,000. Other Securities have been reduced by 11 millions, as the result of the maturing of bills at the Bank, but Public Deposits have declined £200,000. Other Securities are up £727.376.
