CRIME IN ROUMELIA.
The Turkish Embassy in London has sent the following communication to the Press: A letter recently published by a daily paper in London on the situation in Roumelia contains many incorrect assertions. For instance, the Ottoman Government is charged by the authors of the letter in question with intentional and gross neglect in the performance of its duty as regards the suppression of crime and the safe-guarding of public security, preventing thereby the reforms from being conducive to the desired pacification of the three vilayets; but the efforts of the civil and military authorities, in view of the restoration of order, afford the strongest possible evidence that such accusations are totally erroneous and hollow, inasmuch as armed bands are effectually hindered from attacking villages, murderers, whatever their race or creed, are arrested and brought to justice, while malefactors and evildoers are punished, and the peaceful inhabitants protected. As for the imperial troops, their advance unflinchingly against perturbators, whoever they may be, and sustain themselves heavy losses, a fact which proves how devoted they are to the task which is entrusted to their gallantry and loyalty. The Courts do also their duty and try all those who are under the imputation of having committed acts of personal revenge or having shed blood for the mere sake of robbery. The accusations concerning Musliman murderers are likewise groundless, as the latter, who form a comparatively trifling portion of the criminal returns, are arrested and punished in the same way as the others, and it must not be forgotten that their crimes and misdeeds are isolated and are not the outcome of a general plan of campaign, nor of a preconceived system of extermination, but are generally perpetrated in self-defence against murderous attacks by agitators. Neither is it true, as alleged by the authors of the letter, that the four individuals killed during an encounter in the village of Bilhiza, between the troops and a Bulgarian band, were harmless peasants. From papers seized at Castrona it has been proved that these four men were formidable bandits, and that one of them, Ivan Navumoff, was a member of the Revolutionary Committee at Kirobova. All this proves that the troubles in Roumelia have not a local origin but spring from outside.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Coal Imports. Between January 1st and January 16th 49,664 tons of coal were imported into Egypt, of which 22,276 tons were Welsh, 7,829 Newcastle, 8,881 Yorkshire, 4,784 Scotch and 5,984 other qualities. During the corresponding period of last year the imports totalled 25,358.

Tramway Accident. Early yesterday afternoon a Greek girl while attempting to mount a tram in motion near the Giansolis station lost her hold of the rail and fell backwards between the first and second class cars. The girl was terribly injured and died last night. No blame could possibly be attached to the waltman or any servant of the company, the accident being due entirely to the infringement of rules and neglect of personal safety so often apparent in such cases.

DR. RUTHERFORD'S VISIT.

PRESENTATION OF ADDRESS. Yesterday afternoon Dr. Rutherford M.P., attended a meeting of the Constitutional Reform, and was presented with the following address: To Dr. V. H. Rutherford M.P., One of the Secretaries of the Egyptian Parliamentary Committee. We, the undersigned, on behalf of the Constitutional Reform League have the honour to bid you welcome and tender to you our most cordial thanks for your presence amongst us.

The nature of those rights and the character of those aspirations may best be gleaned from article III. of our statutes wherein we set forth the objects of our organization. They are as follows: (a) The maintenance of the Khedivial authority as guaranteed by the Firmans conferring upon Egypt administrative independence. (b) Reliance upon the pledges given and declarations made by Great Britain at the time of the occupation with the claim for their fulfilment. (c) A demand for representative institutions invested with full political and administrative powers in so far as Egyptians and Egyptian interests are concerned. (d) Primary education to be general and gratuitous. (e) Arabic to be the medium of instruction in all Egyptian Government schools. (f) Posts in the Egyptian Government to be given to natives according to their capacity and merit with the object of diminishing as far as possible the number of foreigners in the service of the Government and thus enabling the Egyptians to learn to govern themselves. (g) Extension of the jurisdiction of the mixed Courts, which already try civil, commercial, and petty offences, to criminal cases in which foreigners are concerned until such period as it may be possible to inaugurate unity of jurisdiction, and thus affirm the great principle of justice for all who inhabit the same country—namely, "equality before the law."

We hope that the purposes for which this league has been formed and the methods by which it will seek to achieve them may meet with your entire approbation. It is almost needless to add that as we largely rely upon the powerful cooperation of the British Parliamentary Committee for the fulfilment of our desires it will ever be our most sincere and earnest endeavour to act in complete accord with them and to that end we shall at all times be grateful for their wise and experienced counsel. On this auspicious occasion it is opportune to recall to mind the apathy formerly shown by the British Parliament towards Egyptian affairs and to contrast it with the newborn interest in our welfare. Until two years ago the House of Commons evinced an almost callous indifference to the wants and wishes of the inhabitants of this country, being content to leave everything to "the man on the spot." But since that time the whole aspect of matters has changed to our incalculable advantage, and the British Parliament no longer turns a deaf ear to Egypt's reasonable demands, and it is due to the chivalrous championship of you, Sir, and the devoted band with which you are associated that we are at last enabled to make our voices heard. For this, Egypt owes you a debt of gratitude which she can never adequately repay. We ask you to believe that every speech you make and every question you ask on our behalf is followed in Egypt with eager interest and evokes in every patriotic heart a feeling towards you of genuine devotion. We are convinced that the results of your sojourn here, which we wish could have been prolonged, will be productive of untold benefits to our country; we ardently trust that you will carry away with you such pleasant memories as will induce you ere long to revisit our beloved country, where you may ever count upon a hearty reception; and we earnestly beg you to convey to our friends and supporters in the British Isles the expression of our affection and regard. In response Dr. Rutherford expressed his regret at being unable to reply in Arabic, but the fact that he was unable to do so made him feel more keenly the honour they were conferring upon him. He expressed his profound appreciation of their friendship, their kindness, and their hospitality. He had great sympathy with and interest in all things pertaining to Egypt. He reminded his hearers that of the 670 English M. Ps only a very few interested themselves in Egyptian affairs. His colleague and himself on the Egyptian Parliamentary committee would do their best for the Egyptians, but the parties on here must attend to the political education of the people. Regarding the Denishwai prisoners he hoped the Egyptians would "forgive and forget" that most deplorable incident. The League had his warmest sympathy and he rejoiced in the healthy signs he saw of national life. In conclusion, he said he was sure England would eventually do her duty towards the Egyptians and treat them, as was her wont, in a fair and broad-minded spirit.

THE OASIS RAILWAY.

TO-DAY'S PROCEEDINGS. (FROM OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.) Kharga, Saturday. The programme for to-day has consisted in excursions to the various places of interest with which the Kharga Oasis abounds, the most noticeable of these being the ancient Christian Necropolis and the Temple of Hibis. An inspection has also been made of a portion of the lands under the control of the Corporation, and the remarks made by the Chairman of the Company in the appended speech as to the falsity of the statements which have been made denying the existence of either water or cultivable land in sufficient quantities to make cultivation a paying concern, will be fully appreciated by all who were present here to-day. I will on behalf of myself and the founders make but a few remarks. Personally I am delighted to be here to commemorate an important event in the history of modern Egypt. We can afford to forget the troubles and difficulties we had to overcome in the past, to be generous and to forgive our enemies. I have my reward in the satisfaction expressed by your Excellency and for which I again thank you. We feel that we have done our duty. Having ended I can only say I wish God's speed to an enterprise which will largely increase the revenue of the country, do much good generally, and stand for ever as a monument of a public work carried out for the good of this country. Do not think that by wishing God speed to the Corporation that I am severing my connection with it. On the contrary I am making arrangements which will enable me in the future to devote more time and attention to the Corporation whose interests I have so warmly at heart. I am the largest shareholder, I think I have £50,000 more in it than anyone else. I hold more shares now than I ever held and it is my intention to stick to the ship so long as God may be pleased to give me the health, strength, and business capacity to be of any service to this great undertaking. At the conclusion of Mr. Heaton-Armstrong's remarks, Mr. Manville, chairman of the company, made the following speech:— First of all on behalf of the Corporation of Western Egypt Limited it gives me the greatest pleasure to welcome you all here to-day and to express the gratification of my colleagues and myself at the trouble and inconvenience to which you have put yourselves in attending at the inauguration of this, the first stage in the development of what I think I may safely term our great undertaking. SUFFRAGETTES IN LONDON.

ONSLAUGHT ON PREMIER'S RESIDENCE

LONDON, January 17. The suffragettes organized an onslaught on the Premier's residence on the occasion of the assembling of the Cabinet to-day. They tried to force an entrance into the house. One of them succeeded in doing so but was ejected. The rest scuffled with the police outside. The police were obliged to break the chains with which two women fastened themselves to the railings of the house opposite. Five arrests were made.

The suffragettes who were arrested refused to find sureties for their good behaviour and went to prison for three weeks. (Reuter)

THE FRENCH IN MOROCCO.

PARIS, January 17.

The French troops at Casablanca, after a forced march of 50 miles in 24 hours, engaged and routed with heavy loss a strong force commanded by Moulay Hafid's principal lieutenant Moulai Raghib, after 16 hours' fighting, at the pass Settat. The French had 20 wounded. Moulai Hafid's advance on Fez is thus prevented. (Reuter)

BERLIN, January 17.

It is announced that Germany would favour a neutral attitude of the Powers towards the rival Sultans. (Reuter)

BERLIN, January 17.

The German press considers that the Act of Algiers was concluded, not with Abdel Aziz personally, but with the Sultan of Morocco, and would not be affected by the accession of another prince.

The German Government is observing strict reserve on the subject of Moulai Hafid and is taking no steps to recognise him as Sultan. (Reuter)

ORAN, January 17.

The tribes in the Marrakesh region have proclaimed a holy war. All the southern tribes are joining them. (Reuter)

THE PERSIAN SITUATION.

TEHRAN, January 17.

Prince Firman Firms has sent a message to Tabriz saying that Sujulak can only be held for four days, and asking again for reinforcements. The telegraph at Sujulak has been cut. (Reuter)

THE LUGH INCIDENT.

ROME, January 17.

Great Britain, in response to an Italian request for any information procurable, has notified that Captain Bongiovanni is stated to be dead and Captain Molinari wounded and a prisoner.

Signor Segre holds Lugh with the remainder of the garrison. It is not believed to be in danger. (Reuter)

FEARED LOSS OF BRITISH SHIP

VANCOUVER, January 17.

Wreckage from the British ship "Hartfield" has been washed ashore here. It is feared that she has been lost. In all 30 persons were on board. (Reuter)

He was with the Borderers in South Africa, 1900-1902, and shared in the operations in Orange Free State, Orange River Colony and the Transvaal (Queen's medal with three clasps, King's medal with two clasps).

Captain G.C. Shakerley, D.S.O., King's Royal Rifle Corps, has been promoted major. He is presently employed as adjutant of the 7th Battalion, Barnet, and would in any case have vacated that appointment in a few weeks. Major Shakerley has been a Rifle officer since November 1890, and his war service record embraces the South African War, the defence of Ladysmith, and succeeding struggle, in which he was a mounted infantry officer (mentioned in despatches, Queen's medal with five clasps); and the Somaliland Expedition, 1903-04, in the course of which he was badly wounded at the action of Jidballi (mentioned twice in despatches, D.S.O., medal with two clasps).

Brevet Colonel P. Graham, Suffolk Regiment, on vacating the command of the 1st Battalion, Malta, has elected to go upon retired pay. He is succeeded by Lieutenant Colonel Edward Montagu, from second in command of the 2nd Battalion, Parkhurst, Isle of Wight, to whom it returned a few days ago from Aden. The new chief of the old 12th Suffolks has been associated with the regiment for over twenty years, and has spent all his service with it, save five years whilst staff captain in Egypt, 1898-1903. He saw fighting in the Hazara Expedition and the Chin Looshai Expedition (medal with two clasps).

The first-class cruiser built to the order of the Russian Government by Vickers Sons and Maxim at Barrow in Furness, named the "Rurik," has been completed and has proceeded to the Clyde, where at Beardmore's Dalmuir Yard she will be docked for scraping and painting. After that she will undergo her "hand over trials"—machinery and guns—and will then sail for Libau in Russia. She has a full navigating party of Russian officers and crew aboard. The "Rurik" is the last word in cruisers, and is said to be the most powerful cruiser afloat, both protection and guns. The following are the principal features: Length, 490 feet breadth, 75 feet; draught, 26 feet; displacement, 15,000 tons; indicated horse power, 19,700; speed, 21 knots; normal coal supply, 1299 tons; armament, four 10 in. 50 calibre guns, eight 8 in. 50 calibre guns, 20 4.7 in. 50 calibre guns, four 47 m.m. Hotchkiss guns, eight 3-line Maxims, two submerged 18 in. torpedo tubes; protection, belt armour, 6 in. barbettes 7 1/2 in.; conning towers, 8 in. protective deck, 1 1/2 in. Her decks are covered with a special shot-resisting cement. She resembles in appearance more a battleship than a cruiser. She has three huge funnels, and one towering mast abaft the funnels.

The third class cruiser "Philomel," which for the last three and a half years has been lying at Haulbowline, where she has been re-fitted at a cost of £7,000, is being brought forward for commission at that yard. The nucleus crew of the so-called "Foresight" Portsmouth, will be sent from Portsmouth to Haulbowline on the 1st February, and Captain S.J. Segrave will commission the "Philomel" for service on the Mediterranean Station, where she replaces the second class cruiser "Venus," Captain C.C. Chapman, M.V.O., which will then return to Portsmouth on the expiration of her two years commission.

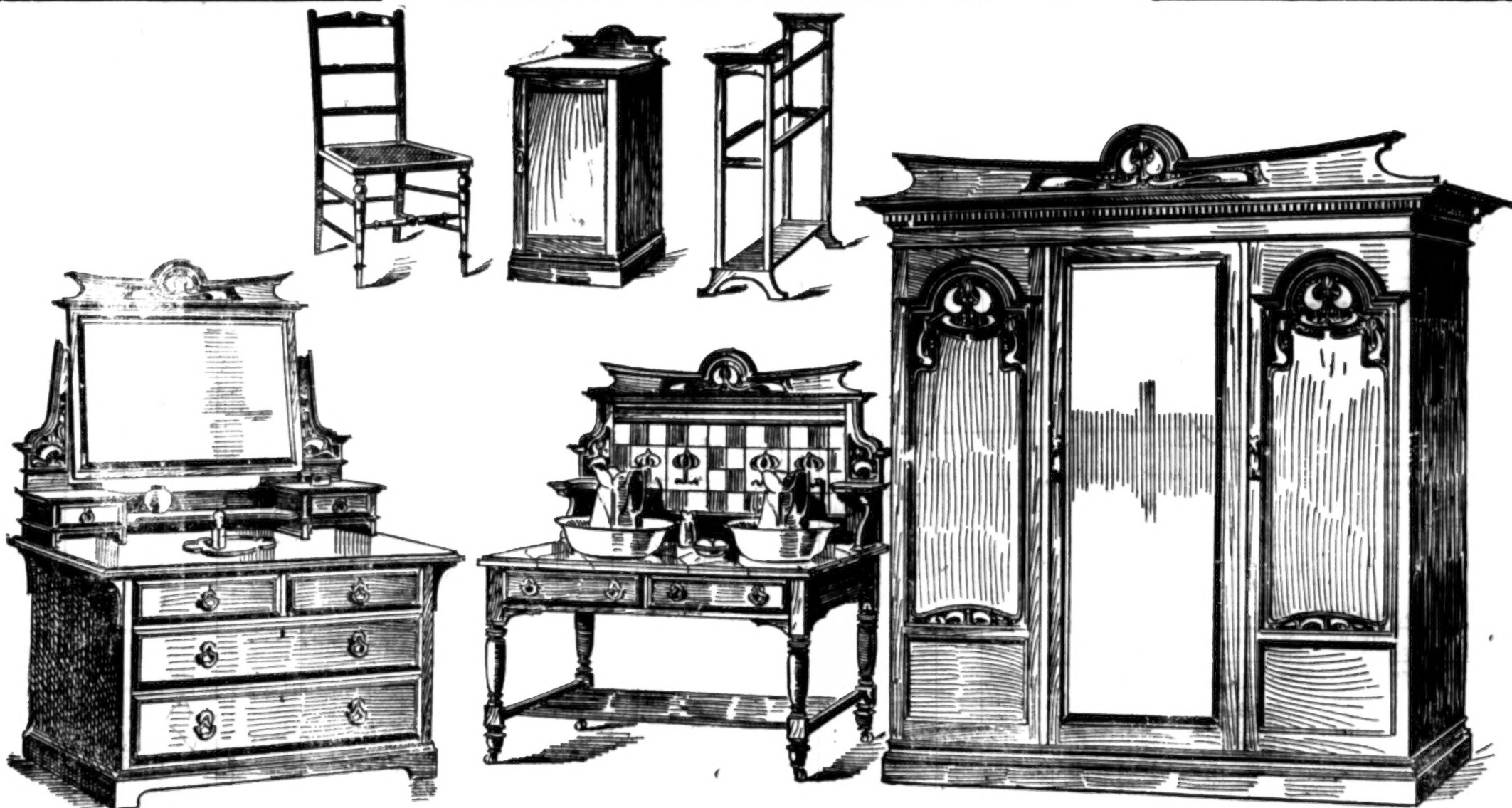
