#### THE BERENS COLLECTION OF OVER 100 BABYLONIAN TABLETS (see brief description below)

This collection of tablets of baked and unbaked clay not only has the usual inscriptions in cuneiform (arrow-headed) lettering, but many also have been engraved with small figures of animals, gods and warriors. 40

These figures have been impressed with cylinder seals in many cases. Nearly all of them show the common design of the owner presented to his god, but in many cases there are figures of more interesting and unusual subjects. For example no. 26 (11), the surface and edges of the tablet are covered with impressions of the cylinder-seal of the scribe, SUR-LAMA, and depicts the very ancient subject of men fighting animals, one of whom is a Babylonian "bull man" horned and ringletted.

In the collection are six oblong bead shaped pieces of clay, pointed at each end, and pierced for a cord. Their inscriptions are uncertain but it has been suggested that they were labels attached to the property of "The Lord of the Garrison." They are of the early age of URU-KA-GINA, whose name they bear. Circa 2600 B.C.

These pieces and the small carefully written dateless inscriptions nos. 7-13 are perhaps the earliest tablets. Nos. 94 to 102 are early Semitic, and Nos. 103-11 are late Semitic.

There is little doubt that the earlier pieces (Sumerian period), nos. 1-93 were inscribed at LAGAS. The later Semitic documents possibly came from SIPPAR, whilst the latest of all were excavated at BORSIPPA, in which city stands the great temple traditionally known as the Tower of BABEL.

The tablets are mostly business documents and include such subjects as The Receipt for an Ass; Deliveries of Building Materials; Sheep Accounts; Shipments of Foodstuffs; Concerning Cattle; Workmen's wages; Sale of a Female Slave; a Business Letter, etc. Amongst the towns mentioned in these documents are Adamdum, Ansan in Elam, Nippur, Susa and Ur (of the Chaldees).

This early Babylonian language—the rediscovering of its meaning is itself a romance of scholarship—still has something left for scholars to learn. It is ambiguous as many of the signs are polyphonous. It is in this form of document that we obtain our large list of Assyrian proper names, either as interested parties, as scribes, or as witnesses.

This collection has peculiar interest from all these points of view from the fact that each piece in the collection has been redrawn (thus making each character decipherable on the tablet itself, when read in conjunction with the handbook), also transliterated and literally translated by Theophilus G. Pinches, LL.D., M.A., A.S., in vol. XVI of The Asiatic Society Monographs, 1915.

A centre rivet in the erown and other rivet holes tend to show that it originally had a spike on top; slightly broken on the right side, but otherwise in good preservation,  $6\frac{3}{4}$  in. high
