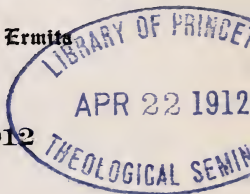

Review and Outlook

Through another year of divine favor we have been allowed as a church to serve the community. The very presence of our stone building, dedicated to worship, substantial, with graceful vines and trimmed hedge and smooth lawn, is a hint to the passer by of the stability and beauty of the invisible things. The faithful proclamation of the truth as it is in Jesus, week after week, in sermon and hymn and class and friendly influence, has had its gracious results. The practise of the presence of God in the lives of his followers has made for light and love.

In our enrolled membership a slight shrinkage is evident. The number of families interested and the attendance at services is said to be the same as in recent years. The fact that the American population of the city is about at a stand-still (4174 in 1910) doubtless limits the growth of all the churches but the other fact that there are not over 500 worshippers in the five American churches all together on a normal Sunday morning shows that there is room for improvement.

In finance the treasurer of the trustees reports a decrease in the small floating indebtedness left from the Manse fund, and the several organizations have done well. The church has felt, however, a lessening

of the open-handed generosity which marked the first years of American occupation, and the multiplying of secular societies which call for support. Some on our rolls are slow to respond to the prosaic necessity of paying our monthly bills. Our aim is to have each member contribute, as the Lord has prospered him, to the running expenses of his church, that is, pay for what he gets; and also give free-will offering to benevolence, that is, help our needy neighbors. We are making some progress toward this ideal.

Our relations to our church neighbors have been most cordial, special mention being made of the Presbyterian Mission, the Methodist Church, the Bible Societies, and the Y. M. C. A. Union services have been held, as in the Thanksgiving service in our church; joint efforts made, as in placing Bibles in the guest rooms of hotels; and aid exchanged in preaching and teaching. We rejoice in the organization of a Presbyterian Church in Dumaguete to which three of our members have been transferred, one of them being elected a ruling elder.

Two unfinished projects are carried over into the new year. One is the form which the memorial to Mrs. Mary Augusta Rossiter is to take; and the other is the proposed joining of three American churches, the Central Methodist, the Christian, and our own into a Union Protestant Church. If this union is effected and our property should be the seat of the Union Church, it may seem wise to use the memorial fund in some fitting way for the larger equipment needed.

We are led step by step into the future. We are confident that He who has led us in the past will guide us all the way. We are confident that by His blessing our beloved church will be enabled to minister in an even larger and better way to the real spiritual needs of this important community, one of the outposts of Christianity. For His blessing, operating through our devotion and zeal, we offer earnest prayer.

Minutes of Congregational Meeting

The annual congregational meeting of the First Presbyterian Church of Manila was held at the church at 8.30 p. m., January 23rd, 1912.

The meeting was opened with a devotional service conducted by the pastor. Mr. C. W. Rosenstock, president of the Board of Trustees, presided over this meeting of the corporation. In the absence of the secretary, Mr. Joseph U. Jackson, on account of sickness, the president appointed Mr. William S. Harris secretary *pro. tem.* The president announced that it was evident that no quorum was present, but that the business could be transacted and approved at a subsequent time. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The following organizations reported: the Session through Mr. N. C. Comfort, clerk; the Trustees through the secretary; the treasurer by Capt. C. H. Sleeper, showing that the church's indebtedness had been reduced from ₱2305 to ₱1650; the Sunday School through Mr. H. C. Fraser, secretary and treasurer; the Ladies' Aid Society through Mrs. L. E. Griffin, secretary, the report being read by the new secretary, Mrs. C. S. Salmon; the Christian Endeavor Society through Miss Eda M. Lucas, secretary.

The nominating committee, appointed by the trustees, presented the following nominations which were unanimously sustained: as elders for the term of three years: William S. Harris, Louis H. Jacob, and Verne E. Miller; as trustees for one year: Ellis Cromwell, Frank L. Dodds, Joseph U. Jackson, C. W. Rosentock, Lewis G. Salmon, Charles H. Sleeper, Thomas A. Street; to fill the new position of financial secretary, William S. Harris.

The following resolution was presented by the Session and after discussion was passed without dissent by a rising vote: "Resolved, that the Session and the Board of Trustees as a joint committee be directed: (1) to consider the advisability of forming a Union American Protestant Church in Manila, (2) to confer with others who are interested, and (3) to report a working plan of such a church."

The meeting adjourned to meet the third Friday in February. After singing the doxology the Rev. George William Wright pronounced the benediction.

A pleasant social hour was spent after the meeting. The Ladies' Aid Society furnished refreshments.

The Session

The year just closed, ending January, 1912, has been an increasingly successful year. The church has been doing a splendidly commendable work of uplift in the community, and the interest in our church seems to grow and abide.

The church during the year has been under the pastoral guidance of Rev. Mr. Cooke, who has ministered to our needs and spiritual wants in the pulpit, in the home, by the open grave, at the sick bed, during the ringing of wedding bells, and whenever and wherever called he has been most prompt in the performance of the Lord's work in our community and in this church in particular. Our appreciative and grateful words of encouragement go out to Mr. Cooke and his sister for their ministrations during the year and we tender our love, respect and esteem.

The Session held its regular and a number of special meeting during the year. Considerable business seemed to be ever before the session, and some is as yet unsettled.

The relationship between this church and the New York Board of Foreign Missions has been most pleasing. The Board has continued its support and has graciously granted this church all favors which we asked of it. The Board is very anxious for this church to become entirely self supporting, and to that end the undersigned recommends that some endowments be obtained at as early a date as possible, and that much of our future efforts should be exerted towards the end that in time the church may have an adequate endowment to insure the permanency of its future.

The subject of a union church has provided considerable material for earnest thought and prayer and the future has for us that problem and the best means for its solution.

Dr. Rossiter's kind proposal for the erection of a memorial to Mrs. Rossiter was one of the events of the year and that proposition continues with us, one of the unfinished projects and undecided questions for the new year to answer.

The seventh annual handbook was published and distributed and has again been a great help in the work of the church.

The choir for its work during the year deserves our praise and commendation, as well as do all the other societies and branches of the church's activities.

The Trustees

The following were elected as members of the Board of Trustees at the last annual meeting (January 17th, 1911): C. H. Sleeper, C. G. Wrentmore, J. U. Jackson, G. R. Harvey, Lewis G. Salmon, Geo. W. Beattie, and Ellis Cromwell. At the first meeting, held January 20th, G. W. Beattie was elected president. George B. Harvey vice-president, Joseph U. Jackson secretary, and C. H. Sleeper treasurer. In the absence of Captain Sleeper, Mr. Salmon was made acting treasurer. Messrs Jackson, Salmon and Harris were appointed as the finance committee.

The Board held twelve meetings within the past year. A number of changes have taken place in the personnel. Mr. Wrentmore's resignation was accepted on March 10th, and Mr. C. W. Rosenstock was elected to fill the vacancy. Mr. Beattie's departure in April led to Mr. Harvey's election as president, and to Mr. Sloan's election as a member. On July 18th Mr. Harvey resigned from the Board, and on September 27th Mr. Rosenstock was made president and Mr. Wrentmore returned to the Board. The finance committee was changed and augmented so that the present committee consists of Messrs. Jackson, Salmon, Cromwell, and Rosenstock.

The principle business to come before the Board outside of its regular business was the transferring of

279.79 square meters of land to the city to be used for sidewalks and street in front of the manse on Arquiza, in consideration of which the city is to construct necessary sidewalks, walks, and driveways, to fill in the remaining lot, and plant such trees and hedges as are necessary, the cost of all this work being equivalent to the value of the land deeded to the city.

Several joint meetings of the Session and Board of Trustees were held to consider the proposition made by Dr. Rossiter to build a memorial hall in memory of Mrs. Rossiter, provided the church buys the ground necessary. A reply was sent thanking Dr. Rossiter most heartily and suggesting a memorial park as more useful and less expensive, but no response was received and a little later it was decided to place the whole proposition before the public. This was done at the Sunday morning service September 24th when considerable funds were subscribed. On account of the arising of the project for a Union Church little has since been done but it is hoped that the coming year will see a splendid addition to our equipment and a worthy memorial to Mrs. Rossiter.

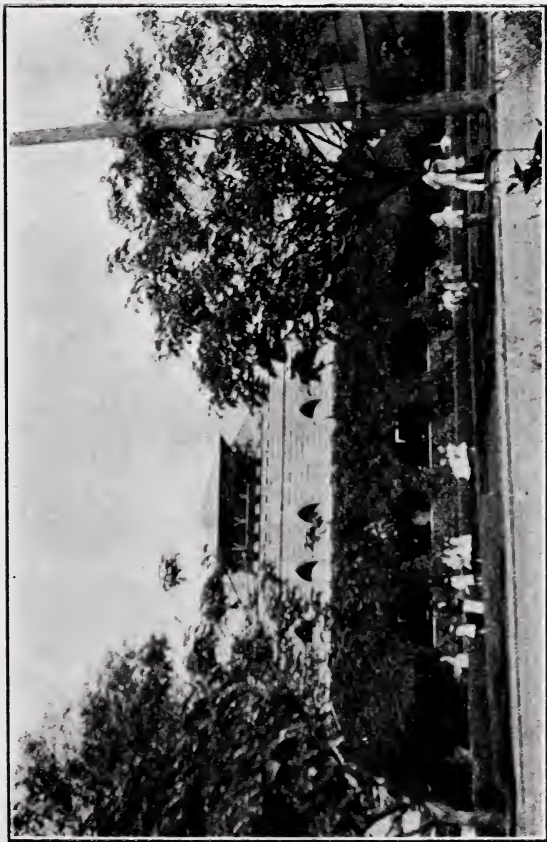

The notable event in the life of the school was the change in the system of lessons on October first. After investigation it was voted to leave the old Uniform lessons and take up the Graded lessons. These new lessons, pedagogically adapted to the age of the pupil and most attractively printed, are giving general satisfaction. They are in use in all the classes except the adult Bible class which is pursuing a course of its own, going straight through the Old Testament being now

in the Books of Samuel. The honor roll and prizes for memorizing Scripture are a stimulus in the younger classes. The fidelity and progress of pupils, teachers, and officers deserves high praise.

Social events, as in former years, have been emphasized and are indeed a feature of the American child life of the city. Lawn parties in the late afternoon with games on the grass and easy chairs on the porch were crowned with a glorious celebration of the Fourth when fire-crackers, balloons, and ice-cream appealed to every sense; and with a long trolley ride to McKinley and through the burned district on Rosario. On the Friday before Christmas a delightful little play, "Is Santa Claus a Fraud?" was presented with great eclat in charming costumes and setting before an enthusiastic crowd of parents and friends. Needless to say in the mock trial the old gentleman was handsomely acquitted by the jury of young folks.

Special Christmas music, furnished free by the Board of Foreign Missions, was enjoyed for several Sundays during the holidays. On Easter we had a special service, with an address by Mrs. Baxter. Children's Day was appropriately observed.

In benevolence special appeals and opportunities are met, and regularly the offering of the first Sunday of each month is given to the Ellinwood schools for scholarships for a boy and a girl.

"Children's Church" held every two or three months has helped to draw the young people to the

morning service. One of the boys made a profession of faith and was baptized.

The Ladies' Aid Society

The Ladies' Aid Society has held its twelve regular meetings during 1911 with a fairly good attendance. It is very difficult, where the membership is so constantly changing, to keep up the attendance of the society to what it ought to be. The average number of members present at meetings is about ten. Of the 65 members in good standing on the books, one, Mrs. Rossiter, our beloved former president, has been called to her long home. Of the others, 17 are in the provinces, Europe or America. Most of these will return during the present year and others will depart so that a balance, as in former years, will probably be maintained. It seems reasonable to expect and hope that more of those of the 50 members usually present in Manila might attend. Seven new members have joined this year five less than last year. All of the meet-

ings, except one held in the church during Miss Cooke's absence, have taken place in the sala of the Manse. This room proves to be a delightful meeting place, and Miss Cooke a perfect hostess who has done everything possible to add to the attractiveness of the gatherings.

We began the year with the following officers.

Mrs. Baxter resigned in August to return to the United States. With great regret the ladies saw her go, feeling that a mere vote of thanks was an entirely inadequate return for her faithful and prayerful services.

Mrs. B. F. Rahmeyer was elected president to complete the year and the society hoped that she would be able to serve during 1912. This, however she considered impossible and, in accordance with her wish, the society regretfully gave up their second good president in one year.

The annual election of officers took place at the last meeting, January 9, resulting in the election of

The sudden death of Mrs. Rossiter our former pre-

sident and dear friend, in Benares, India, on Dec. 26, 1910, came as a great grief and shock to the Society. Resolutions of condolence were spread upon the minutes, sent to the sorrowing husband and family, and to the local daily papers.

Beginning with the month of April and continuing through May, June, July, August, September, October, and November monthly sales of food and dainties have been held at the Manse. These have been a source of considerable revenue but not so profitable as the society had hoped.

Calling committees were appointed to visit the sick, new members and new arrivals. Lists of names have been furnished by the pastor from time to time. Not as much has been done in this line as could have been accomplished, and it is hoped that the society will take this work more earnestly in hand this year.

Each month P5.00 has been set aside as a furniture fund to supply needful articles for the manse. It is intended by the society to supply the Manse in time, with everything necessary for complete furnishing. The society furnished oil for the first finishing of the new Manse floors, which under Miss Cooke's supervision have taken on a beautiful polish.

Owing to the kindness of Mr. Virgil it was made possible to install a call bell system in the Manse at very moderate cost. The society takes pleasure in thanking Mr. Virgil in this public manner for his kindness in the matter.

During the year the Ladies' Aid Society has sup-

plied ₱10.00 monthly toward the support of a girl in the Ellinwood school. Other charities have been ₱5.00 monthly to the Iloilo hospital for the partial support of a native nurse. Clothing was furnished a needy little girl at Ellinwood.

Most of the expense of furnishing the weekly church bulletins has been borne by the society.

Repotting and furnishing new plants has been the care of the Ladies' Aid.

Our work is mostly made up of little things, but very necessary little things, and this year the Ladies' Aid Society intends to look around and capture all the little things in sight and it will be surprising if next year's report does not show a very creditable year's work done.
