What was your favourite part of the shoot? Getting all oiled up and messy!! I love creative shoots like that!





Now in its third year, Eindhoven's punk and hardcore festival The Sound Of Revolution has just gotten bigger and better. As well as having three stages like last year (Revolution, True Spirit and Warzone), they have now extended the Saturday all-dayer to include a Friday evening.

FRIDAY:

It's always daunting opening up for any show or festival, but luckily melodic punk outfit Antillectual have not had to travel that far to play for the few bothering to turn up early. Their well crafted and almost radio friendly songs make them a perfect warm up act for this festival but they are certainly deserving of greater things.

Coming in from Boston, Street Dogs deliver their mix of Irish folk punk and Oi. Street Dogs' classics like 'Savin Hil'l, 'Back to the World' and 'You Alone' and those from more recent years like 'Punk Rock and Roll' and their cover of Menace's 'GOP' all get the crowd dancing and singing. Biggest crowd pleaser as always is the glorious 'Tobe's Got A Drinking Problem', fit with harmonica intro and incredibly catchy chorus. It a shame that singer Mike's vocals seem to give way by the end of the set. It's equally sad that they don't play 'Two Angry Kids', possibly their best song.

Venice Beach thrash punk veterans Beowülf play to a pretty reluctant and maybe surprised audience. Imagine Willie Nelson backed by a Suicidal Tendencies tribute act doing Discharge covers and that's pretty close to this whole experience. As weird as that may sound, it's quite magnificent, especially when things kick off for 'Muy Bonita' and set closer 'Drink, Fight Fuck'.

Known to barely play festivals, Canadian melodic punk band Propagandhi arrive on stage to a pretty packed hall of eager fans and curious onlookers. As the band plays (with some mic issues at the start), it's clear they are not your average punk band. Due to their sound and even subject matters changing through the years, their repertoire is an interesting mix of songs. The short and angsty 'Fuck The Border' and the more technical and almost prog-like 'Note To Self' are worthy highlights for very different reasons. It might not be everyone's thing, but Propagandhi are certainly worth a watch, even if it's just to see a punk drummer use four tom-toms.

From the start, Dag Nasty's brand of 80's melodic hardcore/ early emo gets people stage diving and banding together for gang vocals. Watching Dag Nasty in action, especially with original singer Shawn firmly in control, feels like having a glimpse into what the DC scene was like back in the day. Never does it feel more like a history lesson than when they break into the Minor Threat classic 'I Don't Wanna Hear It', making the crowd go even more nuts. Dag Nasty are definitely an important band and prove they still have what it takes.

New York's Life of Agony gets the place bouncing with their iconic and unique blend of alternative metal and hardcore. Not only does the set consist mostly of songs from fan favourites River Runs Red and Ugly (including Damned If I Do, which they have not performed in years) but the band are on top form, including new drummer Veronica playing everything beat perfect. As bassist Andy and guitarist Joey move around and work the crowd, singer Mina belts out all her deep and honest lyrics with her incredibly powerful vocals. From time to time, she comes off stage down to climb the crowd barrier and interact with fans. At one point, someone hand's her a Queen cap which Mina proudly adorns to create a priceless moment. When you think it can't get better, they invite old friend Billy (Biohazard) on stage for a cover of Biohazard's 'Punishment' and to join in on the raptastic 'Method of Groove'. Although LOA may be a bit too different for the more "punk" fans, their set is simply thrilling from start to finish and is a great way to end the night.

SATURDAY:

Like Friday, Saturday starts off with some Dutch talent, this time in the form of Get Some! Deliver an exciting and competent performance of Blood For Blood-meets-Knuckledust style hardcore, the band doesn't quite get the reception they deserve. Hopefully they've at least made some new fans who will go and purchase their latest EP and give them proper attention another day.

Rotterdam's Deathtrap may look and perform like your ordinary hardcore band but as you listen closer, there's far more to them. Their sound could be described as hardcore reimagined by Pantera and Metallica fans. With some crossover elements also creeping in, it's actually all very compelling. There may be other bands out there with some "Southern swagger", but Deathtrap feel pretty fresh and positively different.

Having already had a taste of thrash elements, Belgians Toxic Shock give us a proper slab of it. Coming across like a thrashier Cro-Mags, Toxic Shock put on an energetic and electrifying show. The main focus is vocalist Wally who not only venomously spits his lyrics but takes complete ownership of the stage. At one point, he climbs the speakers and runs the microphone along it, causing perfectly timed feedback to accompany the song. It's strange to see little movement among the fans, but it could just be that everyone is simply stood in complete awe.

You'd think the whole mohawk and leather jacket punks were a thing of the past, but Aussies Topnovil are proof that it still exists. Either because people don't know who they are or because they're simply not feeling their Rancid-esque sound and image, it's all a bit quiet in the crowd throughout their set. Topnovil seem like a fun bunch of lads but their songs aren't hitting as hard as they do on record and their live performance just isn't as captivating as one may hope.

Helsinki's St. Hood bring things back around with their groovy metallic hardcore. Reminiscent of bands like Sworn Vengeance, Born From Pain and even Biohazard, they have a perfect mix of thunderous drums, tough vocals and thrash-like riffs. Sadly, there seems to be only a few crowd members familiar enough with the band to be interacting at all but there's no doubt that St. Hood have got something special going on.

Possibly due to the positive reception of their recent release W.A.R., straight-edgers Trail of Lies from Syracuse, New York, have brought quite the crowd today. Their low tuned beatdown hardcore certainly gets the crowd moving but singer Tom makes it difficult for any other spectator to enjoy. He has great stage presence but his inward vocals make him sound like a yelping dog. On record it just about works, but in this very moment it's very off-putting.

As Long Island Oi band The Templars arrive on stage, there's a few fans in boots and braces ready to welcome them. Unfortunately from the very start, everything falls pretty flat. Not only is the band fairly static but the songs aren't making as much of an impact as they should. Singer/guitarist Carl mentions that their stand-in bassist learned their set in an hour (which is impressive), so maybe the band decided to take things easy for his sake. However, if this a typical show then it's disappointing for a band considered in such high regard.

Dutch-Belgian band Redemption Denied keep the heavy hardcore going, with singer Kasper completely owning both the stage and the crowd (despite the vocals not quite coming through for most of the show). They serve up some solid grooves and beatdowns that definitely satisfy the fans, but it does feel a little too familiar. Like most singers, Kasper makes a little speech during the set. Instead of being political or just talking about the scene, he instead talks about how it's a good thing to be different and not confirm. It's refreshing to hear

and highly commendable.

Following Redemption Denied's advice (they even cut their set a little short to accommodate), many make their way to see Pennsylvania's Shark Attack. Not only do they play a majority of their so-called Discography album but they throw in some Violent Minds (other band of singer Matt and bassist Zach). It's all straight up, frenzied hardcore punk that causes pile-ons, sing-alongs and general chaos. They quite possibly take the title for fastest band of the weekend. When Matt's voice starts giving way, he just leaves the mic with the crowd who happily take the lead.

As a last minute addition to the line-up due to cancellations by GBH and Gorilla Biscuits (which has disappointed some), West German up and comers Slope get people moving with their dual vocal, Leeway inspired groovy hardcore. Not only are they themselves a replacement but band friend Chris (Thronetorcher) is standing in for one of the vocalist Fabio. This makes no difference as the whole band effortlessly bounce around the stage sounding incredible. 'Goodbye Mr. Dandy' seems to be a particular crowd favourite, putting everyone in a frenzy. With the success of bands like Turnstile and Higher Power in recent years, Slope definitely deserve that same recognition.

Playing mostly tracks off of most recent album Thousand Mile Stare and predecessor Cost of Living, Long Island's Incendiary induce crazy dancing from the floor and stage diving. Even a young kid is joining in on the fun. Their chaotic sound mixed with thought provoking lyrics is intense and thrilling but sometimes feels too much like Snapcase or early Refused. They are certainly a band to check out but you might find that they sound more original on record than in person.

After some harrowing intro music, Norway's Shipwrecked kick into some pure 80's Boston style hardcore a la SSD and Slapshot. The songs are mostly quick, aggressive and to the point (i.e. short). Sometimes, the songs feel like they end too soon, both in the way that they feel structurally unfinished and also that you wish there was more. Unfortunately, the same feeling comes at the end of set as the band finishes way ahead of schedule.

Representing Sweden, Perkele deliver a set full of infectious Oi anthems. The trio may not be as boisterous as their counterparts but there's something in their honest yet simple lyrics, their use of actual riffs akin to Judas Priest/Iron Maiden and guitarist/singer Ron's vocals that make the band so endearing. The positive and heartfelt songs like 'Forever' and 'Heart Full Of Pride' see even the "hardest" of men embrace each other and sing along. That's the magic of good music.

There's nothing more special than being a band's only European show of the year and that's what this is for 80's New York band Underdog. As they play through their blend of hardcore punk, crossover, rap and even reggae, fans sing along and stage diving ensues. They may not be the most energetic live band but singer Ritchie and bassist Russ exude a certain charm that gives them control over the crowd and draws all our attention. This is quite a momentous occasion for all.

Staying with New York hardcore, legends Agnostic Front now take the stage. The crowd goes especially wild when guitarist (Vinnie) Stigma arrives with guitar aloft. Agnostic Front may be a massively influential outfit, but there's no denying that singer Roger Miret's vocals have always been questionable. There's no real change tonight as he is sometimes barely coherent. Luckily, as they power through old school favourites like 'Friend or Foe', 'Victim In Pain' and 'Police State' and more modern classics like 'For My Family', 'My Life My Way' and 'Peace', Miret does a good job of motivating the crowd. The Oi-inspired 'Gotta Go' followed by their legendary cover of Iron Cross' 'Crucified' is a particular highlight. However, Stigma is definitely the star of the show, chock full of charisma, energy and pure magnetism.

Continuing on from Beowülf yesterday, we return to Venice Beach for skater punk/crossover icons Suicidal Tendencies. As a reminder, some of the band are dressed in their own merchandise, with bassist Ra even pointing to his top and encouraging "ST" chants. Even founder and vocalist Cyco Mike maniacally runs around the stage in a band jersey. Kicking off with the positive 'You Can't Bring Me Down' (which seems to go on forever), the band, including Slayer drummer Dave Lombardo who is introduced to huge applause, energetically go through a set of twisted classics like 'War Inside My Head', 'Subliminal' and even the groovy 'Send Me Your Money. Mike and co invite fans onstage during closer 'Pledge Your Allegiance' for some more chanting, which has already lost some impact. Despite delivering a show of non-stop excitement, the band leaves some people wondering... "Where the hell was Institutionalized?!"

It's been quite a long day so the turn out for final act Comeback Kid isn't as big as it could be, with some people choosing to call it quits already or move on to the after party (in the Blue Collar Hotel next door). The hall is still full of fans of the Canadian hardcore outfit who, led by singer Andrew, are super hyped up from the get go. As well as causing stage dives and sing-alongs with their Bane-meets-Terror brand of HC including opener 'False Idols Fall', newer hit 'I'll Be That' and the gloriously iconic and anthemic 'Wake The Dead', the absolute highlight happens early in the set. For those disappointed by the late Gorilla Biscuits cancellation, it was an extremely pleasant surprise to see Andrew invite GB guitarist Walter, who fortunately did make it to the festival, for a cover of the classic 'New Direction'. As soon as the fanfare intro begins, the crowd gets even more excited than they already are and everyone's faith in the festival is fully restored.

10 years ago, You Me At Six reigned supreme. They were rocks brightest stars, being tipped as the next big things in the alternative scene. Young emo kids adorned their walls with posters of Josh Franceschi and co. and studied the lyrics of their infectious debut Take Off Your Colours so that they could singalong to every word as though they were a member of the band themselves. You'd think the energy of 2008 would stay in the past, it has been ten long years after all, but no, in 2018 those very same emo kids, now in their 20's are filling Brixton academy ready to be part of YMAS once more.

Prior to the main event, we are treated to sets from Scottish up-risers, The Xcerts, and comebacks kids of the year, Marmozets. The aforementioned trio smash through a collection of heartfelt and inspirational numbers which span their career, whilst the latter remind the crowd that they are a force to be reckoned with via a carefully selected set of high tempo rib rattlers.

Whilst the support acts shine in their own way, it's only You Me At Six that the crowd really care about tonight. As you look around you see a crowd of people who are no longer your typical YMAS fans... let's face it, in years following Sinners Never Sleep (the band's third album), the hardcore OG fans fell away from their teenage boyband dream and let a new wave of 14 year olds carry YMAS to more radio friendly success. Whilst these new fresh faces are dotted about, this crowd is made up of 20 somethings who work full time and are sacrificing the early Sunday night for a couple hours of nostalgia.





The lights go down the band appear and the opening melody of 'The Truth Is A Terrible Thing' begins. We are back in 2008 and man, does it feel great.

Of course, being a 10 year anniversary tour, the boys play Take Off Your Colours in its entirety. 'Save It For The Bedroom' and title track, 'Take Off Your Colours, see the coolest of cats lose their minds, whilst tracks like 'Call That A Comeback' and 'Tigers And Sharks' wheedle out the stans from the true fans. 'Gossip' still remains a crowd pleaser and even more exciting is the reception Josh's sister Elissa Franceschi receives as she joins the boys on stage for an emotionally charged 'Always Attract'. Every song performed is full of celebration; they loudly and proudly showcase how one album catapulted them into a whole career doing what they love and it's evident from the excitement that pours out from the stage that this is truly special for everyone involved.

Most surprising tonight is just how on point You Me At Six sound. Now that we're all a bit older we can hear that Take Off Your Colours isn't the greatest of album productions, so there was questions about whether the vocals would still work now they're more polished and whether the riffs and melodies would sound too perfected, losing the albums gritty fresh-faced feel. Yes, everything sounded way more clean tonight but alas, it only made the night even better. You Me At Six are on top form tonight and anyone who doubted that tonight would be one for the history books is eating their words right now.

Deluxe Edition tracks such as 'Finders Keepers' and 'Kiss And Tell' make up part of the encore along with the likes of 'Reckless', 'Room To Breath' and 'I O U'. Although as leader of the pack, Josh decides to stop proceedings to deal with some unfriendly crowd behaviour, nothing can ruin tonight. Ending with the beloved track, 'Underdog', You Me At Six proved that there's life in the (old-ish) dog yet. See you in 2020 for the Hold Me Down ten year anniversary tour?
