**ELIZABETH (ALDEN) PABODIE AND
DESCENDANTS.**

In "Winsor's History of Duxbury" and elsewhere, we find "John Pabodie 1637; admitted freeman Jan. 2, 1637-8; proprietor of Bridgewater 1645; will dated July 16, 1649; proved June 27, 1666. He married Isabel who survived him. In his will he speaks of Thomas, Francis, and William, and Amie, wife of John Rouse, grandson John Rouse and grandson John Pabodie, son of son William."¹

We will follow the line of William only. He was born 1620, and died Dec. 13, 1707. He married Dec. 26, 1644, Elizabeth Alden, oldest child of John and Priscilla (Mullines) Alden, born the latter part of the year 1623, or the first part of the year 1624, in Plymouth. She "was the first white woman born in New England."

This has been doubted, that in three years not a single girl was born; but there is no question when all things are considered. We must realize how few were left of the original settlers in the spring of 1621 — only fifty, and very few heads of families. Tradition has it that the "Widow Foord," who came in the "Fortune," had a daughter soon after she landed, but the "Division of Cattle," May 22, 1627, shows that her youngest child was a son, and she brought her daughter with her. Tradition and "Goodwin's Pilgrim Republic" show that John Alden and Priscilla Mullines were married, either the second or third marriage,

before August, 1623, when the "Anne" came in, bringing Alice (Carpenter) Southworth, who married Governor Bradford, in August, 1623. Elizabeth (Alden) Pabodie died in Little Compton, R.I., May 31, 1717, in the 94th year of her age. "June 17, 1717, the 'Boston News Letter' of this date notices thus her death: 'Little Compton. 31. May. This morning died here Mrs Elizabeth Paybody, late wife of Mr W^m Paybody in the 93rd year of her age. She was the daughter of John Alden Esq. & Priscilla his wife, daughter of Mr William Mullins. This John Alden & Priscilla Mullins, were married at Plymouth in New England, where their daughter Elizabeth was born. She was exemplary, virtuous, and pious, and her memory is blessed. Her granddaughter Bradford is a grandmother.'" Mr. Pabodie and his wife are buried in the Little Compton Cemetery. In the "Division of Cattle," May 22, 1627, Elizabeth Alden is given as three years old, and she may have been considerably more. Just before her death, it was said to her:

"Rise daughter, to thy daughter run,
Her daughter's daughter hath a daughter."

This was Mary Whiting, born January, 1716-17.

We will have to concede that she *was* "the first white woman born in New England." Peregrine White was the first white male, and Oceanus Hopkins born on the passage. The gravestones of William Pabodie and his wife Elizabeth are in excellent preservation. The descendants of Elizabeth Alden have put up a monument and inserted the old stone in the west side.

On all sides can be found her children and grandchildren. Towards the south lie John and Sarah (Pabodie) Coe; nearer James and Ruth (Rogers) Bennett; west of them Nathaniel and Sarah (Rogers) Searl and their children. North of the monument we find the stones of William and Rebecca (Pabodie) Southworth, while north-east are the

graves of the Churches, Joseph Church and the "Hon. Colonel Benjamin Church, Esq." and their families.

Mrs. Jane G. Austin has written a very charming book, "Betty Alden," but in regard to Betty Alden's character, she drew entirely from her imagination, and "Betty's" descendants resent the title and description. They say she was "dignified, a woman of great character, and fine presence, very tall and handsome. In height she resembled her father, John, the tallest in the Colony — also her brother, Capt. John Alden, known as the 'tall man of Boston.'" In the list of the first baptisms in the Little Compton church, 1704, her name does not appear; but some names must be lost, for sixty-nine were baptized, and only sixty-three are given. Her husband was one of the organizers of the church. But we must not lose sight of the sterling qualities of William Pabodie. He was "a man much employed in public affairs and of much respectability." J. O. Austin's Genealogical Dictionary of Settlers in Rhode Island gives very much about him, gleaned from the public records. He was town clerk of Duxbury, after Alexander Standish. When he took the office the town records were burnt, and he entered his own marriage, and births and marriages of his children, very carefully. Would he had done as much for the other families in Duxbury. He lived in Duxbury, close to the Brewsters and Standishes, east of Eagle-nest Creek.

There has been much discussion as to *when* he went to Little Compton to live. In "1681 he and two others are appointed to run the line betwixt the lands of Sacon-nett and Puncateesett to Dartmouth bounds &c." Tradition also has it that John Coe went down by boat from Portsmouth to Saconnett, landed on the shore near where William Pabodie's house stands, and took up his abode with him while surveying the land, and meeting his daughter Sarah, fell in love with her, and married her. This must have been before or in 1681. William Pabodie may have put up his house and taken his daughter down there with him before he formally

left Duxbury. We find him in Duxbury, June, 1684, and do not have certain proof of his living in Little Compton before 1685-6, when he was selectman. The house that he built is still standing, tradition says, built with money from John Alden, his wife's portion of her father's estate. They also say that John Alden visited his daughter in Little Compton.

The house remained in the Pabodie family till 1740, when it was sold to Pardon Gray, and is now owned by Mr. George Gray, a descendant.

The descendants of Elizabeth Alden have reason to be thankful that it is in such good hands.

Mrs. Gray, descendant of the beautiful Quakeress, Innocent Howland, cares for it reverently as historic ground, and renders the place beautiful with its lovely flowers.

Some few years back a colonial window was thrown out, and in making these repairs, some very old forks and knives were found, and a spoon of peculiar shape and material. The spoon is of bronze, and resembles exactly the bronze spoons used in Holland about 1600. (See Harper's Magazine, 1896, September.) We can imagine this spoon brought in the "Mayflower," remaining in Duxbury till the death of her father and mother, it comes to the oldest daughter.

When William Pabodie went to Little Compton all his children were married but his youngest daughter, Lydia, and we think his son William went with him and lived with him. His son-in-law, William Southworth, and wife Rebecca, followed him soon, and it was not long before a number of his grandchildren began to settle there.

His will was dated May 13, 1707, proved Feb. 27, 1708. Executors, wife Elizabeth and son William.

"To wife east side of house at Little Compton and part of the land given formerly to son William; all to be hers while widow, and also to her all household stuff, cattle, bills due, and money; but if my wife choose to claim her thirds of my

land and house at Duxbury (which I sold Samuel Bartlett) and make use of them, then my son Wm. to have the whole of housing and lands at Little Compton and to pay Samuel Bartlett. 50s. per year during time that his mother makes use of her thirds in Duxbury. To son Wm. after death of his mother, the part of house and land, bequeathed to her for life. To son Wm. other land & all my books tools &c. To three grandsons, Stephen Southworth son of daughter Rebecca, deceased, and John and Wm. Pabodie sons of son Wm. land at Westquadnaug, (west of Providence) part purchased by son in law Wm. Fobes of Shuebal Painter and assigned by Wm. Fobes to my son in law Ichabod Wiswall." He mentions also son-in-law Edward Southworth. To daughters Mary, Mercy, Martha, Priscilla, Ruth, Sarah, Hannah, Lydia, 1s each. To daughter Lydia one sett of green curtains, she having already received her part.

1. Wm. and Elizabeth¹ (Alden) Peabodie had the following children, all born in Duxbury (Dux. Rec.):

3 ² Elizabeth Pabodie (Elizabeth Alden¹).

Born in Duxbury, April 24, 1647 ; died before 1707 ; married in Duxbury, Nov. 16, 1666, John Rogers, Jr., son of John and Ann (Churchman) Rogers, of Duxbury, a grandson of Thomas Rogers, who came in the "Mayflower." She was his first wife. After her death he married a widow, Marah (Browning) Newell, and on her death in 1739, administration is granted on her estate to her sons, John and Moses Newell, of Brookline. John Rogers, Jr., was freeman 1659 ; constable of Duxbury in 1670, June 5 ; surveyor of highways, 1671, Oct. 29, and several times afterwards. Constable again in 1681, June 7 ; and for several years he lived in Boston and Great Barrington. He owned some of the first lots in Tiverton and Little Compton. He died in 1732. There has been much discussion as to the ancestry of the various John Rogerses, but Mr. Drummond's book is so conclusive, I have quoted his facts without comment. I refer readers to his book for further particulars.

4 ² Mary Pabodie (Elizabeth Alden¹).

Born in Duxbury, August 7, 1648 ; married, November 16, 1669, Edward Southworth, son of Constant and Elizabeth (Collier) Southworth. She survived her husband. He was born "in Plymouth," says Winsor, but I think in Duxbury. His father, Constant, and Uncle Thomas were the only two children of Alice (Carpenter) Southworth, by her first husband, Edward Southworth. The Southworth pedigree can be found in Winsor's History of Duxbury. Constant Southworth married Elizabeth Collier, and had — 1. Edward ; 2.

Nathaniel, married Desire Gray ; 3. Mercey, married Samuel Freeman, 2d ; 4. Mary, married David Alden ; 5. Alice, married Col. Benjamin Church ; 6. Elizabeth, married William Fobes ; 7. William, married Rebecca Pabodie ; 8. Priscilla, married first, Samuel Talbot, and 2d, John Irish, Jr. Constant Southworth died Duxbury, 1679-80. His widow, Elizabeth, died in Bristol in 1682. Edward Southworth in his will gives : To Thomas Southworth land next to Capt. Alden's. To son Constant, land, etc. To son Benjamin. To son John "I give my half purchased right of land at West Canoag, in the Government of Rhode Island, which I bought of Wm. Pabodie, $\frac{1}{2}$ to sons & $\frac{1}{2}$ to three daughters — Mercey wife of Moses Soule, Eliz. wife of Samuel Weston, & Priscilla Southworth. To grandson Cornelius Soule. & give to beloved wife Mary, one-third part of estate." Edward Southworth and family lived in Duxbury, Mass.

5. ²Mercey Pabodie¹ (Elizabeth Alden¹). Born in Duxbury ; Jan. 2, 1649 ; married Nov. 16, 1669, in Duxbury, John Simmons, son of Moses and Sarah () Simmons.

Moses Simmons, formerly written Symonsen, was born in Leyden, of Dutch parents. This Symonson family has been traced from a Samuel Symonson, who came to New York in 1640, back two hundred years ; and Moses and, probably his brothers and cousins, Thomas, of Scituate, and John, of Freetown, were of this family. There was but one Moses Symonson, who married Sarah, and came in the

"Fortune." He was not married in 1627, but had, besides John, Rebecca, called "eldest daughter," married about 1655, as his first wife, John Soule (George), and mother of all his children but Joshua, and possibly Josiah. Mary married Joseph Alden about 1564. Elizabeth married Richard Dwelley and Sarah married James Nash and Aaron.

"Mr. Edward Winslow in his brief narrative written in 1646 states: 'Moses Simonson was a child of one that was in Communion with the Dutch Church at Leyden; and is admitted into church fellowship at Plymouth in New England, and his children to baptism as well as our own.' Young's Chronicles, page 393."

Moses Symonson died in 1689, and speaks of himself as "very aged."

John Simmons made his will in 1715, and speaks of wife Mercy, and youngest son Moses, a minor; sons John, Wm., Isaac, Benjamin, Joshua, Joseph, Martha, wife of Ebenezer Delano, and Rebeckah, wife of Constant Southworth. His widow Mercy's will, in 1728, speaks of sons John, Wm., Benj., Joseph, Joshua, Martha, Rebeckah, and Moses. Book 5, page 487, Plymouth Probate Records.

6. ²Martha Pabodie¹ (Elizabeth Alden¹). Born in Duxbury, Feb. 25, 1650; died in Little Compton, R.I., Jan. 25, 1712. She married, first, in Duxbury, April 4, 1677, Samuel Seabury, son of John and Grace () Seabury.

He was born in Duxbury, Dec. 10, 1640, and died there, Aug. 5, 1687. She married, second, his second wife, Lieut. Wm. Fobes; son of John and Constant (Mitchell) Fobes, born 1650, and died in Little Compton, R.I., Nov. 6, 1712.

Wm. Fobes married, first, Elizabeth Southworth, daughter of Constant and Elizabeth (Collier) Southworth. Her father was opposed to the match, and gave her her portion "provided she do not marry Wm. Forbes, and if she do," then she was "to have 5 shillings." By Elizabeth Southworth Wm. Fobes had at least two children, Phebe, born 1679, who married, first, a Smith, and then his son-in-law, Joseph Seabury, and Martha, born 1681, who married in Little Compton, in 1710, Josiah Sawyer, and had: John Sawyer, born 1711, died April 17, 1794; Mary Sawyer, born L. C., May, 1715; Abigail, born L. C., 1717; Priscilla Sawyer, born L. C., 1719; Josiah Sawyer, Jr., born 1728. As will be seen later, there was another Sawyer family similar to this, and it is very difficult not to confound them.

Lieut. William Fobes was a man prominent in war and in peace, wealthy, of excellent standing in the community. I give below abstracts from his will, Taunton Prob. Rec., Book 3, page 112:

"I Wm. Fobes of Little Compton . . . Item. I give and bequeath to my son in law, Joseph Seabury, to him, his heirs, and assigns 15 acres of land in the "firste 24 Acre Lott" on the South Side &c. Item. I give and bequeath to my son in law, Josiah Sawyer, to his now wife, Martha Sawyer, to have all the remainder of the 24 acre lott on the North side. Item. I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Briggs the wife of Wm. Briggs, the bed and furniture which are in her possession. Furthermore I give to her eldest son Lovett Briggs, and my Daughter Constant Little, and my grandson Fobes Southworth, and my grandson Samuel Steabury, and my grandson John Sawyer, that acre of land which I have, lying near the meeting house of

Little Compton, in the northeast corner of that land, that was formerly Daniel [illegible] land, which land shall be equally divided. Item. I give and bequeathe to my son John Little, and to my daughter, his now wife, all my land, lying on the waye side of the great high way, being part of the eleventh great lott in number in Little Compton, with all the housing therein. And if my said daughter, Constant Little shall die without issue, then after her decease, & her husbands, then the said lands & housing to return to my grandson, Fobes Southworth, only my sd. daughter in her lifetime may bequeath to my granddaughter Rebeckah Southworth or to any other of my grandchildren 100 lbs of my estate. Item. I give and bequeath to my Grandson Fobes Southworth, the westward end of the fourth Great Lott in number from the great High way to the Sea or Pond, with the Ferry Boat, Wharf & housing, and all the Privileges thereto with the Serge & Mowable land lying between said land and creek etc. etc.

"All rest of lands, housing &c. to John Little & wife, and Fobes Southworth to be equally divided, only Fobes Southworth to pay to Rebekkah Southworth £100, at her of age or marriage. John Little & Fobes Southworth or his guardian to pay just debts," and appoints Justice Thomas Church, of Little Compton, guardian of Fobes Southworth. Executors, Sylvester Richmond and Joseph Seabury. Witnessed by Thomas Gray, Joseph Blackman, Thomas Church. Dated Nov. 4, 1712. Admitted to Probate, 4 Dec., 1712. There was considerable difficulty between Edward Southworth, father of Fobes, and the executors, but it was finally settled. Near to the Peabodie monument can be seen two slate stones:

"Here lyeth buried the body of Wm. Fobes Lieutenant, who departed this life in the 63 year of his age. Nov. ye 6, 1712.

"Here lyeth buried, Martha, late the wife of Wm. Fobes, aged 61 years, & deceased Jan. ye 25, 1711-12 [on the

same stone]. Here lyeth Marey, ye dau of Wm. Fobes and Martha his wife, deceased, Feby. 14, 1711-12."

7. ²Priscilla Pabodie (¹Elizabeth Alden). Born in Duxbury, Jan. 15, 1653; died in Kingston, June 3, 1724; married in Duxbury, Dec. 24, 1677, Rev. Ichabod Wiswall, son of Thomas and Elizabeth () Wiswall; born 1637-8, probably in Dorchester; died in Duxbury, July 23, 1700. Rev. Ichabod Wiswall married, first, Remember , and had Elizabeth. He was freeman 1674. He entered Harvard college, but did not graduate. He was settled in the ministry in Duxbury, in 1676. Winsor says, "He was a man of energy and piety, and under his ministry the prospects of the church were bright, and the highest prosperity was secured to his people." He ranked with Mather and Cotton in the estimation of the colonists. "He died much lamented of the people, among whom he had been a friend, an advisor, and an instructor." "He was buried in Duxbury, in the second burying ground, and his monument bears this inscription, 'Here lyeth buried the Body of ye Reverend Mr Ichabod Wiswall. Died July ye 23rd Anno Domini. 1700. in the 63 year of his Age.' Priscilla (Pabodie) Wiswall went to Kingston to live, after her husband's death, probably with her daughter, Mrs. Gershom Bradford, and is buried there." Mr. Thomas Bradford Drew, of Pilgrim Hall, has aided me materially in this family and the two following, making search in Probate

Records, etc. He is a descendant of Priscilla (Pabodie) Wiswall. For Wiswall genealogy see Genealogy by Rev. Anson Titus. N.E. Hist. and Gen. Reg., vol. 40, page 58. His will is dated May 25, 1700, and mentions "my eldest daughter, wife of Elisha Wadsworth," wife Priscilla, son Peleg, daughters Mercy, Hannah, Priscilla, and Deborah.

8. ²Sarah Pabodie (Elizabeth Alden). Born in Duxbury, Aug. 7, 1656; died in Little Compton, R.I., Aug. 27, 1740. Her stone and her husband's can be seen in the cemetery almost due south from the Pabodie monument. "In memory of Sarah, ye wife of John Coe, died Aug. ye 27. 1740. in ye 86th year of her age." She married, probably in Duxbury, Nov. 10, 1681, John Coe, son of Matthew and Elizabeth (Whately) Coe, of Portsmouth, N.H., where I suppose John was born June 30, 1649. He died in Little Compton, R.I., Dec. 16, 1728. Gravestone: "Here lyeth the body of John Coe, decd December ye 16th 1728. in ye 79th year of his Age." Tradition says, Sarah accompanied her father on a trip to Little Compton, probably to make a home for him, and that John Coe, a surveyor, came down the river in a boat, landed on the shore near the present location, and helped William Pabodie lay out the lots, and the next year married Sarah. They lived for a few years

in Duxbury, but came to Little Compton before 1688. Sarah Coe was admitted to the Little Compton church, November, 1708. His will—Taunton Probate Records, vol. 6, pages 195-198-199—speaks of his daughters—Lydia Bailey, wife of John Bailey; Sarah Tompkins, wife of Samuel Tompkins; Elizabeth Burgess, wife of Edward Burgess; Hannah Coe, youngest daughter; sons Samuel Coe and Joseph Coe have lands in Little Compton; son John Coe, "In Casco Bay," has money.

9. ²Ruth Pabodie (¹Elizabeth Alden). Born in Duxbury, June 27, 1658; died in Duxbury, Aug. 27, 1740; married there, December, 1673, Benjamin Bartlett, son of Benjamin and Sarah (Brewster) Bartlett. He was grandson of Robert Bartlett, who came in the "Ann" in 1623, and married Mary, daughter of Richard Warren, a "Mayflower" pilgrim. He was also grandson of Love and Sarah (Collier) Brewster, and great-grandson of Elder William and Mary () Brewster, who also came in the "Mayflower."

Benjamin Bartlett's will is dated Dec. 10, 1717,—proved April 10, 1724. He names loving wife Ruth, "three youngest daughters, Priscilla, Deborah, and Abigail," other daughters,

Sarah Bradford, Rebeckah Bradford, and Ruth Murdock, also "Mercy, daughter of son William, deed."

I am inclined to think that Winsor has mixed the children of Benjamin Bartlett with those of Sammel Bartlett, and using the will as a basis I shall rearrange them, but hope that any one who can prove an error, will not hesitate to do so :

Born in Duxbury, Oct. 16, 1660 ; died in Little Compton, R.I., Dec. 3, 1702 ; married, in 1680, William Southworth, son of Constant and Elizabeth (Collier) Southworth, and brother of Edward, who married her sister Mary. He was born 1659, and died June 25, 1719. The gravestone of these two is one large slab, laid horizontally on concrete and stone, about a foot high. This style of stone was peculiar to the families holding a higher social position, and the Southworths were of the nobility in England.* The inscriptions are as follows : "Here lyeth Interred the Body of Rebekka^h the wife of Capt William Southworth, who departed this life December ye 23, in the 43rd year of her age, 1702." "Here lyeth Interred the Body of Capt W^m. Southworth, Esq. who departed this life June ye 25. 1719. in the 60th year of his age." William Southworth married a second wife, widow Martha (Kirkland) Blague (afterwards Blake). Her first husband was Joseph Blague. She was daughter of Nathaniel

and Parnell Kirkland. See N. E. Hist. and Gen. Reg., 7-29, and Savage, under Blague.

William Southworth's will, book 3, page 575, Taunton Probate Records. Dated May 8, 1719. Entered Aug. 27, 1719:

"To wife Martha. To sons Benjamin, Joseph, Edward, Samuel, small gifts 'for they have received before.' To Nathaniel £400. To Thomas, 20 shillings 'he rec'd before.' To Stephen, half a negro man, 'rec'd before.' To Gideon Southworth 20 shillings 'rec'd before.' To Andrew Southworth, half a negro man, 'rec'd before.' To dau's Elizabeth Little, Alice Cook. Two grandsons William and Constant Southworth."

Witnesses John Wood, Peter Taylor, Sylvester Richmond.

Martha Southworth, widow, in her will speaks of sons Joseph and Samuel Blake, granddaughter Mary Blake, and daughter Mary Southworth, wife of Joseph, and makes son-in-law Joseph Southworth executor.

Gideon was published "Intentions of marriage with Priscilla Pabodie Jan. 1727 dau of ² W^m. & Judith Pabodie," but he was *never married to her*, evidently a lovers' quarrel, for she married William Wilcox. Otis Wilborn, in copying the

old Little Compton Records, assuming they married, gives Priscilla Pabodie as Gideon Southworth's first wife. Gideon Southworth married first and only time, in 1728, Mary Wilborn, daughter of John and Sarah (Palmer) Wilborn. He finally went to Rochester, Mass., to live. He had thirteen children: Isaac and Parnell, born July 31, 1729; Wilbor, 1733; Sarah, 1736; Elizabeth, 1738; William, 1740; Rachel, 1742; Alice, 1744; Lois, 1746; Mabel, 1748; ———; ———; Hannah, 1755.

Andrew Southworth, born Sept. 12, 1709; married Temperance Kirkland and went to Connecticut. I do not know when William Southworth went to Little Compton, certainly before 1700. None of them connected themselves with the church.

11. ²Hannah Pabodie (¹Elizabeth Alden). Born in Duxbury, Oct. 15, 1662; died after 1714; married, Aug. 2, 1683, Samuel Bartlett, brother of Benjamin, who married her sister Ruth (see that family for pedigrees). He was born, (?); died 1713.

A letter of administration was granted on the estate of Samuel Bartlett "to his Relict Hannah," Dec. 9, 1713. His estate was divided in 1714, and mentions widow; sons Benjamin, Samuel, Ichabod; daughters, Hannah, Elizabeth, Lydia, Sarah. The son Ichabod and daughters Lydia, Sarah, and Elizabeth were minors, and had guardians appointed.

Winsor gives William and Judah, but I have transferred William to the family of Benjamin, and if there was a Judah he was dead in 1814. In my copy of Winsor's Duxbury (second hand), Judah was erased and Judith inserted. Winsor says that Samuel, the father, was a mariner.

We will now say the children are as follows, all probably born in Duxbury:

12. ² William Pabodie (¹Elizabeth Alden). Born in Duxbury, Nov. 24, 1664; died in Little Compton, Sept. 17, 1744. Gravestone: "In memory of William Pabodie, who died September ye 17th 1744 in ye 80th year of his age." He married Judith (?) ; born 1669-70, who died July 26, 1714. Gravestone: "Here lyeth ye body of Judith, ye wife of W^m Pabodie, who departed this life in ye 45th yeare of her age, July ye 28. 1714." He married, second, Elizabeth (?) ; born 1673. Gravestone: "Here lyeth ye Body of Elizabeth, ye second wife of William Pabodie, who dyed Decem^{br} ye 14. 1717, aged about 45 years." He married, third, Mary (Morgan) Starr, widow of Thomas Starr, of New London, Conn., and daughter of Capt. James and Mary (Vine) Morgan. She was born March 20, 1670, and Starr Genealogy says: "she died the widow of William Pabodie, Sept. 14, 1675." William Pabodie, Sr., and William Pabodie, Jr., were among those who organized the church in 1704. Judith Pabodie joined the church in 1707, July 6. William Pabodie, Jr., lived in Little Compton in the homestead. He was a deacon. He made his will Aug. 7, 1743; proved 1744, Nov. 12. Exs. sons John and William; to wife Mary, a feather-bed and household stuff, that was hers before marriage; also, while widow, suitable clothing, house-room, meat, drink, washing, and lodging, and £5 paid yearly by son William, and £5 by sons John and Joseph. To son John, 120 acres, on south side of farm and buildings. To sons William and Joseph, rest of farm, but William's part to be £200 better than Joseph's. To son Benjamin, certain land, and all moveables in the house that

was his mother's. To dau. Elizabeth, wife of Edward Gray, £25. To daughter Rebecca, wife of Joseph Fish, £8. To dau. Priscilla, wife of William Wilcox, £10. The foregoing to be paid by son John. To daughter Judith, wife of Benjamin Church, £20. To dau. Mary, wife of Nathaniel Fish, £25. These sums to be paid by son William. To sons John and William rest of estate. Inventory £4,912. I quote from J. O. Austin's Gen. Dict. of R.I. Settlers.

13. ² Lydia Pabodie (¹ Elizabeth Alden). Born in Duxbury, April 3, 1667 ; died July 13, 1748, in old Killingworth, Conn. (now Clinton) ; married, about 1683, Daniel Grinnell, probably born in Portsmouth, R.I., about 1668, son of Daniel and Mary (Wodell) Grinnell. He was of French Huguenot descent. His grandfather, Matthew Grinnell, is spoken of in Baird's "History of Huguenot Emigration to America." From the Town Records we find that Lydia was aged eighty-years at death — book 2, page 91. Daniel Grinnell and wife Lydia removed early to Saybrook, and at the organization of the third church, of fourteen members, among those recommended from other churches was Lydia Grinnell, June 20, 1726. Among those added before 1731, "claiming right of the Lord's table," were Daniel, Ruth, Mary, George Grin-

nell. Daniel Grinnell, the father, was chosen first deacon, but declined. At Court of Probate held at Guildford, Conn. Jan. 20, 1740-41, Peabody and George Grinnell, two of the executors of David Grinnell's will, had will recorded. It was dated November, 1726, and speaks of beloved wife Lydia; daughters Mary Lay, Priscilla Redfield, Elizabeth Stevens, Lydia Clark, Rebecca Donde or Doude, Sarah Brocker, Jemima Chalker; and two sons, Peabody and George Grinnell.

He was born in Duxbury, , 1668, and Bradford Gen. N.E. Hist. and Gen. Register says, died April 11, 1714. He is buried in "the second burying ground in Duxbury." Winsor's Dux. This burying ground is near the railroad station of South Duxbury. His stone is quite illegible, but I made it out as follows:

"Here lyes Capt. Samuel Bradford of Duxbury, who died Feb. 17, 1714, in 47th year of his age."

He was born 1672; died Nov. 20, 1754, in Little Compton. She was his first wife. He married, second, Deborah (Cushing) Loring, daughter of Hon. John and Sarah (Hawke) Cushing. The gravestones are well preserved and handsomely carved. They read, "Here lyeth the Body of Elizabeth, ye wife of Sylvester Richmond Esq. who died October ye 23rd, 1724, in ye 52nd year of her age." "In memory of Col. Sylvester Rich-

mond of Dartmouth who died November ye 20th, 1754, in ye 81st year of his age." "Here lyeth ye Body of Hannah, ye daughter of Sylvester Richmond Esq. and of Elizath his wife, died January ye 20th, 1728 in the 20th year of her age." "In memory of Mrs Deborah Richmond, Relic of Col. Sylvester Richmond, and formerly the wife of Mr. Thomas Loring. She died Oct. 18, A.D. 1770 aetatis 96." "Fare well vain world &c." Sylvester Richmond was prominent in Little Compton affairs; later in life of Dartmouth, but I presume not far over the line, for he kept up his connection with the Little Compton church. For further particulars those interested will, no doubt, find what they wish by consulting the new Richmond genealogy, just coming out, compiled by Joshua Richmond, of Brookline, Mass. In Austin's "Genealogical Dictionary" I find, "In May 1701 May 29, he bought of John Rogers of Boston. He bought 40 acres in Little Compton for £60, of William Earle, Feb. 7, 1727. He made a covenant with Deborah Loring & Caleb Loring, previous to marriage to said Deborah." He "held the title of Colonel." He served in the French war, but was not the Colonel Richmond present at taking of Louisburg. This was his son. He was one of the founders of the church in Little Compton, and continuously to this day this family is represented in the church. Elizabeth, his wife, joined the church Oct. 4, 1705.

17. ³ Ruth Rogers (² Elizabeth Pabodie, ¹ Eliz. Alden). Born April 18, 1675; died in Little Compton. "Here lyeth the Body of Ruth, the wife of James Bennett, died April ye 28, 1725, in the 50th year of her age." She married at Bristol, , James Bennett, son of John Bennett, of Charlestown, and Mary —, his wife. See Wyman's Charlestown Genealogies, and East Cambridge Probate Records and Registry of Deeds. His mother afterwards married a Meades, and she is buried in Little Compton near her son James. A deed at East Cambridge speaks of James and Ruth Bennett, John Bennett, Mary Bennett, and Josiah and Rebecca (Cutler) Bennett, and their mother Mary Meades, widow of John Bennett, of Charlestown. A still later deed speaks of John and Ruth Bennett. Ruth (Rogers) Bennett was not mentioned in her father's will, and was dead without children. James Bennett married, second, Ruth's cousin, once removed, Mercy Simmons. James Bennett was one of the organizers of the church in 1704. Ruth Bennett was admitted to the church Oct. 4, 1705. In the cemetery we find the stones with the following inscriptions: "Here lyeth the Body of James Bennett, died Feb^{ry} ye 17th, 1729-30, in ye 64th year of his age;" also, "Here lyeth the Body of Mary Meades, alias Bennett, mother of James Bennett who dyed March ye 5th, 1729, in ye 79th year of her age." I think that John Bennett who "died July ye 25, 1752, in the 61st year of his age," and is buried in the Little Compton cemetery, is James Bennett's brother, and that Mary Bennett who married Thomas Palmer was his sister.

18. ³ Sarah Rogers (² Elizabeth Pabodie, ¹ Elizabeth Alden). Born May 4, 1677; died in Little Compton Jan. 19 or 20, 1770. Gravestone says: "Jan. 19, 1769 in the 92nd year of her age;" married, about 1694, Nathaniel

Searle, of Dorchester, son of Robert and Deborah Searle, born in Dorchester, June 9, 1662. He came to Little Compton after 1696. Deborah, his daughter, was baptized Dec. 21, 1701. On "June 7, 1696, Nathl Searles of Little Compton laid hold on the covenant." Among the sixty-nine baptized Nov. 1, 1700, by Rev. Peter Thacher and Mr. John Danforth, were "children of Nathaniel Searle, John and Sarah." On "June 26, 1700, Nath'l Searle and Sarah his wife" admitted to the church. Nathaniel Searle was the first schoolmaster. The first school had a peaked top,



erected 1724, and was located on the old colony road, on the grounds of Mrs. Charles Wilbur, better known in the village as "Aunt Sarah Charles Wilbour." She was the antiquarian of the village, and she had a peaked stone chiselled out and placed on the stone wall, with the words "Peaked Top School house, erected 1724," under it. The inscriptions on the stones in the graveyard, very near the Pabodie monument, are as follows: "Here lyeth ye body of John, son of Nath'l Searle, and Sarah his wife. He was drowned March ye 26, 1714. Buried May ye 23 following — aged 16 years, & 14 days." "In memory of Nathaniel Searle, died Feb. ye 5th 1749—50 in ye 88th year of his age." "In memory of Sarah, the wife of Mr. Nathaniel Searle, who died Jan. 10, 1769, in ye 92nd year of her age."

Probably he was no younger than his wife. Winsor says he had land granted to him in 1707. I feel sure he married, second, Sarah Chandler, Jan. 15, 1729. She was probably daughter of Joseph and Martha (Hunt) Chandler, born , 1714. This makes her very young, fifteen, to marry a man at least sixty years old; but such things have been done. It is possible that Moses Soule may have had a son Moses, who died before his father, without children; or Moses, who married Sarah Chandler, may have been a son of Aaron, brother to Moses, senior. I feel sure all the children of Moses, senior, had Mercy Southworth for a mother. Winsor says Mercy Southworth, daughter of Edward Southworth, married Micah Soule in 1740. That ⁴Mercy Southworth was granddaughter of Edward Southworth. The estate was divided into ten parts in 1751. There was no mention made of a widow. The division was as follows: Isaac Soule (eldest son); Cornelius Soule; Barnabas Soule; Ichabod Soule, deceased, and Abigail, his only child; Gideon Soule; Jedediah Soule; Ruth Soule; Elizabeth Soule, wife of Barnabas Perry; * Deborah, wife of John Hunt.

Cornelius Soule was remembered in his grandfather Edward Southworth's will.

His mother was daughter of ² Alexander Standish and his second wife Desire (Dotey, Sherman, Holmes) Standish. He was born in Duxbury, date of his birth unknown. "He lived in Duxbury; selectman, 1740-45-47, and was a man widely known and respected." (See Weston Gen. N.E. Reg., Vol. 41, page 286; also note in "Boston Transcript" by T. E. W., 4.)

"Samuel Weston received from his father, by his will, the home farm, and was charged to provide for carefully and look after his mother as long as she lived." He was appointed executor of his father's will, probated 1729. Samuel Weston died in February, 1752, and his will was probated March 2, 1752. He speaks of his wife Elizabeth, son Samuel, son Elnathan, daughters Mary and Priscilla Weston, two sons, Samuel and Elnathan Weston. Executors' inventory was £338-15-2.

Thomas Southworth's will, dated Aug. 21, 1742, proved Sept. 22, 1742, mentions Hannah, widow of son Jedidiah and grandsons John and James, speaks also of five grandsons — sons of Jedidiah; also of granddaughter Deborah Loring.

52. Samuel ³ Coe (Sarah ² Pabodie, Elizabeth ¹ Alden). Born in Little Compton (T. Rec., Dec. 12, 1692). Grave-stone in Little Compton says: "Died Dec. 25 in 1740, in 50 year of his age." Married by Benjamin Church, Justice, April 8, 1716, Mary Chadwick. Otis Wilborn, of Little Compton, copied the old births, deaths, and marriages, and added his *impressions* to the records. He makes this Samuel Coe marry twice. His son, Samuel Coe, died young, and the wife of the second Samuel is given to the father. The proof of my statements can be found at the Probate Records of

Taunton. His will, Book 10, pages 24-58-108-109. Guardianship of children, Elizabeth, pages 105-125; Matthew, page 101; Priscilla, page 29; Sarah, pages 24-58-108-109. In his will he speaks of wife Mary. In 1741 she is given the guardianship of John and Elizabeth, under 14.

Burgess Genealogy says they lived in Newport. This may be so, after the birth of their children, but their children are on Little Compton Records, and they and their children were baptized in L. C. church in 1727 and 1728 — "Edward Burgess and Elizabeth his wife, and Thomas and Esther their children."

She married her cousin, a Coe of Casco Bay, one of three sons of an uncle who settled there. This marriage and the name of her husband cannot be found, because of the destruction of the records. He went to sea and was lost, and she returned to her father's house with her only child, Ruth. She was admitted to the church on her return to Little Compton, Oct. 1, 1730, and her dau. Ruth was baptized 1727-8 (*Church Records*), at the same time that her cousins the Burgesses, and Coes were.

Visiting Mr. Taylor's, he saw Rebecca, a mere child, and made her her first pair of shoes. He said, "I will wait for her," and he married her when she was 21."

He was an astronomer and made almanacs. Was well educated. He never married.

59. William³ Bartlett (Ruth² Pabodie, Elizabeth¹ Alden). Born about 1674; died before his father, leaving a daughter, Mercy. This Mercy, I am sure, is the one who married John Turner, and not her aunt, who must have died young, as she is not mentioned in her father's will. Mercy⁴ Bartlett being the "child of the oldest son" (family tradition), she was not far distant in age from her younger aunts. I surmise William married Hannah, and died soon after the birth of his daughter Mercy, and that in 1698, "the widow, Hannah Bartlett of Duxbury," married Thomas Delano (Philip), by whom she had no children.

He gives to grandson Tillson, the son of Stephen Tillson, the whole of the farm, dwelling-house, etc., situated in Plympton. To son-in-law, John Wall, £40, and also £13.6.0 due from him. All the rest to loving wife Ruth, during her natural life, and at her death to be divided between two sons, James and Bartlett, who are also made executors. His will is dated Sept. 16, 1756, and witnessed by William Thomas, Joseph Head? and John Lothrop.

In it he speaks of wife Deborah, second son Joshua, five sons and two daughters; viz., William, Joshua, Peleg, Benjamin, Consider, Deborah Thomas, and Ruth Thomas.

65. * Abigail³ Bartlett (Ruth² Pabodie, Eliz.¹ Alden). Born in Duxbury, 1703; died Aug. 30, 1776; married Aug. 30, 1728, Hon. Gamaliel Bradford, son of Samuel and Hannah (Rogers) Bradford, her cousin once removed. He was born in Duxbury, May 18, 1704, and died April 24, 1778, æt. nearly 74 years.

"Hon. Gamaliel Bradford was a son of Lieut. Samuel Bradford, and great-grandson of Hon. William, the second Governor of Plymouth Colony. He shared largely in all the duties of the public offices of the town, and was always selected to bear the responsibilities of its important agencies. He was a friend of education, and did much towards the maintenance and improvement of the public schools. He for several years represented the town in the Legislature, and during the trying period from 1764 to 1770 was a member of the Executive Council. He was for many years a justice of the peace, and judge of the County Court. He also held command of the company of militia in his native town, and about 1750 was raised to the rank of Major, and afterwards promoted to the command of the regiment with the rank of Colonel. In his declining days he witnessed with patriotic ardor the uprising of the Sons of Freedom; and though his heart was with them, he was unable by active exertion to assist in the crowning glories of true-born freemen. He died in Duxbury on the 24th April, 1778, having nearly reached his seventy-fourth year. — *Windsor's History of Duxbury*, pp. 148, 9.

66. Benjamin³ Southworth (Rebecca² Pabodie, Eliz.¹ Alden). Born April 18, 1681, I think in Bristol. The Southworth family did not come directly from Duxbury, but tarried awhile in Bristol. The children are entered on Little Compton Records, also on Bristol Records. I think nearly all of Rebecca Pabodie's children were born in Bristol. There is no record of either William or Rebecca joining the

* Her family will be given under Hon. Gamaliel Bradford in fourth generation.

Little Compton Church, or the baptism of their children, until we come to Andrew and Gideon, the children of the second wife. Therefore, Bristol is given as the birthplace. I do not know whether Benjamin or his third wife died in Little Compton. Many stones are broken off in Old Cemetery. He was in Little Compton till after 1730. I feel sure his children moved away, probably to Connecticut, and are the ancestors of many Southworths we find in Mansfield, Ashford, and elsewhere. About 1730 three, at least, of his brothers went to Connecticut. He was married, first, by Joseph Church, Esq., Dec. 18, 1701, to Elizabeth Woodworth, probably daughter of Walter Woodworth. Her stone can be seen in the Old Cemetery — "Elizabeth, wife of Benjamin Southworth. Died June 18, 1713, in ye 35th year of her age." He married, second, by Rev. Richard Billings, in Little Compton, March 14, 1717, Alice Church. She was daughter of Joseph³ Church (Joseph,² Richard¹) and Grace (Shaw) Church, born in Little Compton, Feb. 8, 1693; died "Feb. 14, 1718, in the 23d year of her age" (gravestone in Old Cemetery). He married, third, Susanna (Palmer) Blackman, by the Rev. Richard Billings, July 18, 1722. I feel sure she was a widow. There is no Susanna to be found in the Blackman family, and William Palmer in his will speaks of daughter Susanna Southworth. (See Richmond genealogy, by Joshua Richmond.) This genealogy says William Palmer married Mary³ Richmond (Edward,² John¹), and had a family in Kingston or Westerly. We do not find the children on these towns' records, but do find them in Little Compton. William Palmer was son of William Palmer, of Dartmouth, and he son of the first William, of Plymouth and Duxbury. Susanna was born, I think, in Dartmouth, Oct. 24, 1692.

67. Joseph³ Southworth (Rebecca² Pabodie, Eliz.¹ Alden). Born in Bristol, Feb. 1, 1683; died in Little Compton; buried in Old Cemetery — "In memory of Captain Joseph Southworth, who died April ye 20, 1739, in ye 57th year of his age." He married Mary Blake (the name so appears, changed from Blague), by the Rev. Richard Billings, April 20, 1710. She was the daughter of Joseph and Martha (Kirkland) Blague, born 27 Aug., 1692, in Saybrook, where her parents lived for a while. Mary (Blake) Southworth is buried in the Old Cemetery. "In memory of Mary, wife of Joseph Southworth, who died October 29, 1770, in ye 79th year of her age." And next to them is the stone "In memory of John, son of Captain Joseph Southworth and Mary his wife, died Aug. ye 12, 1720, in ye 24th year of his age." I think I read the year wrong (the stone is badly broken). I think it ought to be 1740; and this John was their youngest. Otherwise, he was not recorded with the rest of the children. Joseph Southworth lived all his life in Little Compton. In 1722 he buys land from his brother Thomas. March 9, 1727, Samuel, Stephen, and Thomas sell to their brother Joseph their share of their father's homestead. In Little Compton what is known as the "Mash" (marsh) road marks the northern boundary of the old Southworth place; from that south to the ocean is known to this day as the "Southard Marsh." Gradually it was divided up among the descendants.

The site of the old house is known; the cellar is there on the George Peckham place. Farther over, the well on the Gideon Southworth place can be discerned. Joseph Southworth's widow Mary and his son Constant were made administrators on his estate. The executors sell land in 1745.

A Mary Southworth, and Susanna, her daughter, were baptized June 13, 1741.

This may be the widow and a child not recorded — perhaps born after the father died. I cannot place them elsewhere.

68. Edward³ Southworth (Rebecca² Pabodie, Eliz.¹ Alden). He married his cousin, Mary³ Fobes. See her number.) I wish to make a correction: his wife, Elizabeth Palmer, was daughter of *John* and *Elizabeth* (Richmond) Palmer. I am very sure that the Richmond genealogy is at fault in giving John Palmer's children as born in Kingston or Westerly; or if born there, came early to Little Compton. John Palmer and Elizabeth his wife, and children John, Sarah, Elizabeth, Edward, Job, Aaron, and Anne

were baptized Nov. 1, 1700, in company with others to the number of sixty-five, preliminary to forming the church in 1708. The Richmond genealogy says John was son of Henry; this Henry was son of the first William. I do not find Edward or his wives on the church records; neither do I find at Taunton, before 1745, any sales of land indicating that they left the town. I feel sure the children moved away.

69. Elizabeth³ Southworth (Rebecca² Pabodie, Eliz.¹ Alden). Born Sept. 23, 1686; married in Little Compton by Joseph Church, Justice, Dec. 2, 1703, David Little, son of Ephraim and Mary (Sturtevant) Little. Ephraim was son of Thomas Little and Ann (Warren) Little. Ann was daughter of Richard Warren, of the "Mayflower." David was born 1681, and died about 1779; Elizabeth was alive when her father died. David Little made his will Feb. 12, 1750. "I, David Little, of Scituate, yeoman, having arrived at old age." He speaks of son Ephraim, son David Little, son Nathaniel Little, daughter Elizabeth Otis, daughter Mary Cudworth, daughter Mercy Otis, son Barnabas Little, who was executor, and to have certain property, *provided* he does for David's wife Abigail what he (David) covenanted before marriage. (He guards the right of the wife so carefully, I feel sure she was a stepmother to the children.) Codicil, Jan. 12, 1754, names son Nathaniel, deceased, and his children to have his share. The will was witnessed by Thomas Pierce, Ezra Pitcher, and Elizabeth Pitcher, but when the will was proved in 1779 all were dead but Elizabeth Pitcher.

He was born in Tiverton, Nov. 5, 1685, and died 1754. "John Cooke was a man of considerable wealth and standing, and was active in public affairs, owned slaves like his father and grandfather. Was an officer in the militia of the colony."

of his father's homestead to his brother Joseph in 1727. About 1719 he is of Bristol, buys land; Dec. 30, 1723, is of Lyme, Conn.; he sells this land in Bristol. On Bristol church records we find four children of Samuel and Abigail Southworth, baptized Dec. 26, 1721, and on Lyme Records we find the rest.

Josiah Torrey, of Medfield, and his wife, Sarah Wilson (Rev. John, Rev. John). Rev. Thomas Hooker had a daughter, Sarah Hooker, who married Rev. John Wilson, Jr., of Medfield; their oldest daughter, Sarah Wilson, married, first, Paul Batts, and had two children; married, second, Capt. Josiah Torrey, of Medfield and Milford. (See will of Rev. John Wilson in History of Medfield.) Capt. Josiah Torrey was born in Weymouth about 1645; he was son of William Torrey, who was born in Combe St. Nicholas, Somersetshire, Eng., Dec. 21, 1608. He married, first, March 17, 1629, Agnes Combe. He married, second, Jane Haviland, who was the mother of Samuel and Joseph. He married, third, the daughter of Edward Frye. In 1640 he came to New England and brought with him his third wife and Samuel, born 1632, and Joseph, 1638. He settled in Weymouth. He was deputy to the General Court, and was clerk for many years. As part payment for services rendered, the General Court gave

him and others a very large tract of land in what is now Mendon and Milford, Mass.

Josiah, about 1645 ; Judith, born about 1647 ; Angel, born about 1650 ; married Hannah. Capt. Josiah married Sarah (Wilson) Batts. He lived in Milford as well as Medfield ; removed to Bristol, 1706, then to Barrington, 1717, and was there till about 1726 ; thence to Mansfield, Conn., where he died Oct. 30, 1732. (*I think* Margaret Torrey, who married Caleb Church (Joseph, Joseph, Richard) was his daughter.) We know he had Mary, born April 17, 1689 ; John, April 4, 1692. Mr. Horace F. Carrier sent me most of these facts in regard to the Torreys, and I think they are so valuable I insert them here. Mary (Torrey) Southworth survived her husband and married again — whom we do not know — and lived in Mansfield. Her second husband was a mill-owner.

The Southworth genealogy states that Nathaniel Southworth, who went to Mansfield, was son of Nathaniel (son of Constant), who married Desire Gray. According to Davis' "Landmarks of Plymouth," this Nathaniel married Jael Howland and lived at Middleboro. Nathaniel Southworth, of Middleboro, sells land received from his grandfather, Edward Gray, through his mother, Desire Gray. He also names brother Ichabod.

Nathaniel Southworth, No. 72, styling himself as of Little Compton, wheelwright, buys land in Bristol. Then, as of Bristol, buys land in Mansfield. In 1722 he sells to brother Joseph his share of homestead of honored father, William Southworth, of Little Compton. In 1730 was lost at sea on a voyage to the Mediterranean. At that time his son Constant was nine months old.

Thomas Southworth, of Middlesex, was not a son of No. 72.

"His manners were those of a Christian gentleman; affability and kindness were combined with the dignified suavity of a spiritual guide and teacher. He enjoyed the best advantages for education, and he appears to have profited by them, as his writing exhibited a vigorous and cultivated mind." Some children died young; these names I have not got. land, being advanced in years, and under bodily weaknesses and infirmities, but through the goodness of Almighty God of sound mind and memory, and calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed to all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say, principally, first of all, I give and recommend my soul in to the hands of God that gave it, and my body I recommend to the earth, to be buried in decent Christian manner at the discretion of my executors, nothing doubting but at the resurrection, I shall receive the same again by the mighty powers of God, and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me in this life, I give, devise, and dispose of the same in the following manner and form, my just debts and funeral charges being first paid out of my personal estate :

" *Imprimis*. — I give and bequeath to Lydia, my dearly beloved wife, the use and improvement, income, profits, and advantages of all my personal estate, during the time that she shall remain my widow.

" *Item*. — I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Lay such a sum out of my estate, which, together with what she has received, and shall receive before my decease, will make up the sum of thirty pounds in value.

" *Item*. — I give and bequeath to my daughter Priscilla Redfield the same.

" *Item*. — I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Stevens the same.

" *Item*. — I give and bequeath to the children of my daughter Lydia Clark deceased such a sum out of my estate, which with what she, the said Lydia, received in her lifetime, will make up the value of thirty pounds value.

" *Item*. — I give to my daughter Rebecca Donde the same, thirty pounds.

" *Item*. — I give to my daughter Sarah Brooker the same, thirty pounds.

" *Item*. — I give to my daughter Jemima Chalker the same.

"*Item.* — I give to my beforenamed daughters, besides what I have before given them, I give and bequeath to each of them severally one seventh part of all my household goods, after the decease of my beloved wife Lydia, and the other seventh part of my said household goods I give and bequeath to the children of the aforesaid daughter Lydia over and above what I have already given them, and after the decease of my aforesaid wife.

"*Item.* — I give and bequeath to my two sons, Peabody and George, after the decease or second marriage of their mother, my aforesaid beloved wife, all my horses, cattle, sheep, or swine, together with all my husbandry utensils and implements to be equally divided between them, my said sons, all which estate named in this paragraph of this my will. I give to them as aforesaid upon conditions that they pay the aforesaid legacies herein particularly given to each one of their sisters, and to the heirs of Lydia Clark, deceased, and in failure thereof, viz of ye payment of said legacies as aforesaid, my will is that each and every one of my aforesaid legatees, said daughters and the heirs of said Lydia Clark, shall have their several legacies levied out of the estate in this paragraph mentioned. And I do thereby constitute, and ordain and appoint my dearly beloved wife Lydia, and my two sons Peabody and George, to be the executrix and executors of this my last will and testament, and I do hereby disallow, revoke, and disannul all former wills, testaments, and bequests by me made, ratifying, allowing, and confirming this, and this only as my last will and testament. In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal this day and year aforesaid, Daniel Grinnell signed, sealed, and published, and declared by said Daniel Grinnell, as his last will and testament in presence of us, Samuel Jones, Samuel Willard."

Mr. Edwin A. Hill sends the following: "1702, Sept. 2, Thomas Avery sells to Daniel Grenhill land at Saybrook, West parish (Westbrook), being 200 acres more or less at

Pochaug 'south bound sea.'" (Land Records, Vol. 2, page 90.) On September 6th following he sold his lands at Little Compton, 50 acres, to his brother Richard. Daniel Grinnell died Jan. 7, 1740-41.

"Principally, and above all, I give and Recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it in hopes of Salvation through Christ ye Redeemer, and my body to the Earth for a decent and Christian burial, at the discretion of my executors, hereafter named, hoping & trusting that at the general resurrection of the just to receive the same by ye Almighty power of God, and as touching such worldly estate God has blessed me with, I give bequeath & dispose of the same in manner & form following, viz.

"First, my will is that my just debts & funeral charges be paid by one of my executor hereafter named, viz. my son Samuel out of what I give him in this will.

"I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife Hannah, the

improvement of one third part of all my real estate as ye law hath endowed her with during her life. I also give sd wife ye improvement of one cow, during her said life. I also give sd wife, the sole improvement of all my household goods, during sd natural life, and all in lieu of dower, out of my estate.

"I give and bequeath to my eldest son Thomas Gilbert, and to his heirs, and assigns forever, all my purchase rights in ye old township of Taunton, viz, half a right which was my honored father's, Mr Thomas Gilbert's, and half a purchase right I bought of Thomas Danforth, and one quarter of a right I bought of John Newland, and one whole right in Taunton old township, so called, bought of Palmer Doughty with all lands & rights to land & commonage in sd propriety to fuller divisions, and I also confirm & ratify all lands & titles to lands I have given said son Thomas by deed, heretofore conveyed, together with three acres and a half in land in sd Berkley (Taunton Proprietary measure) & is the premises he conveyed to me laying near a place called the Ridge of Trees on the Southeast side of the highway leading from Israel Tisdale's to pole plain, said son Thomas to have & to hold the same, to him, his heirs & assigns forever, and this with what I have heretofore given him by deeds of gift is his sole proportion out of my estate, with what is given him hereafter in this will.

"I give & bequeath to my grandson Nathaniel Gilbert, son of my son Nathaniel, late of said Taunton, but now deceased, the whole of my tract of land in sd Taunton lying on ye East-side of Taunton Great River, between the ways leading from ye Ware Bridge, towards James Coopers, and from sd Coopers to the way leading to the dwelling of Seth Williams, Esq. & adjoyns to land where I have buried two daughters.

"I give sd grandson all sd piece of land adjoyning together containing about nine acres more or less, he to have & hold the same to him, his heirs & assigns, forever (always excepting about three quarters of an acre of sd land in the fork of the said

paths, near to & adjoyning, and where several of my children are buried, & lay principally in ye most convenient place on the Southwest side of the Hill next to sd way leading from sd bridge to sd Coopers, which three quarters of an acre is always to be for the publick use of a burying place, not only myself & posterity, but also for the Christian neighborhood.

"I also give sd grandson Nathaniel his heirs, & assignes forever, a certain piece of cedar swamp in Taunton old township, and in the great cedar swamp, so called of about nine acres, and lays to the the east of a lott called Thrashers (?) & runs from the upland to extent to the line called ye North Purchase Line, which piece of Swamp descended to me from my honoured father Thomas Gilbert. I also give sd grandson Nathaniel & his heirs & assignes forever, a certain piece of land in said Berkley containing about seven acres, & lays on a plain called Pole plain, and adjoyns to the land of Samuel Dean, James Harvey & the way leading over Pole plain & is all the land I have in sd plain, adjoyning to the way, sd Nathaniel to have & to hold the same, provided he pay to his brother George Gilbert, his heirs or assignes, the sum of six pounds when said grandson George shall arrive at the age of twenty one years, but if failure be made of said payment, then said last mentioned lands to be & remain to sd George his heirs and assignes forever.

"And I also give to my grandson George, son of my sd Son Nathaniel, the six pound ordered to be paid by his brother Nathaniel, but if the sd Nathaniel do not make payment of sd six pounds to said George when he arrives at twenty one years of age, then sd George to enter and hold sd seven acres, his heirs & assignes forever, and what is above given to sd Nathaniel, & George, with what I gave their father by deeds & otherwise in his lifetime is the whole of what I intend to give the children & representatives of sd. Nathaniel dec'd.

"I give to my son Samuel Gilbert of said Berkley all & singular my mansion, house, lands, & premises laying in

said Berkley, including the lands, I purchased of Thos. Gilbert, Esq^r. heretofore Malicai Holloways, and all the lands I purchased of sd Samuel by deed, heretofore belonging to Bezaleel Thrasher including the land I purchased of Nathaniel Townsend called twenty two acres, in the whole about one hundred & forty acres, more or less, with all the appurtenances on sd lands belonging, as also eight acres of land heretofore granted me on ye late eight acre division laying near to my sd. homestead on ye original rights of Gilbert & Wiat, & all lays in Berkley aforesaid, he sd Samuel to have & to hold the same to him, his heirs & assigns forever as an absolute estate in fee forever. I also ratify & confirm to sd son his heirs & assigns all ye land I heretofore gave him by deed in ye town of Norton in said County. I also give sd Samuel the desk he has in possession. I also give sd Samuel all my live stock of cattle, sheep, & swine, and all my live stock including my husbandry tools only, reserving ye cow I have in this will given to my wife, provided sd Samuel perform what I shall order him in this will hereafter named.

"I give & bequeath to ye children of my late daughter Hannah, the wife of Ebenezer Smith deceased, over & above what I gave to said children's father & mother in their lifetime, of my estate real & personal which was considerable. I now give Lemuel Smith, John Smith, & Ebenezer Smith twelve pence each to be paid them by my son Samuel Gilbert, after my decease; & to Mary Smith daughter of my said Hannah deceased, I give her four Spanish milled dollars, to be paid her within twelve months after my decease by my son Samuel: To Sybil wife of Doget one other of my said granddaughters I give her twelve pence, to be paid her by my son Samuel, she having heretofore received her portion from me. I give to my granddaughter Hannah four Spanish milled dollars, to be paid her within two years after my decease by my son Samuel; & to Abigail one of my granddaughters, &

daughter of my late daughter Hannah Smith, I give her four Spanish milled dollars to be paid her within four years after my decease, by my son Samuel.

"I give & bequeath to my daughter Mary Godfrey of Norton. I give her all & singular the swamp & right to swamp in the Great Cedar Swamp so called in sd county & in ye old township of Taunton called ye Burnt Ground in both divisions which descends & belongs to me in ye original right of dower & this is over & above what I have heretofore given her, & furthermore I give her twenty six pounds thirteen shillings & four pence lawful money to be paid her by my said son Samuel within twelve months after my decease, and she sd Mary to have & to hold the same to her heirs and assigns forever.

"I give and bequeathe to my daughter Welthea wife of Ebenezer Hathaway, Junr. over and above what she has already received of me., I further give her twenty six pounds, thirteen shillings & four pence lawful money to be paid her by my sd son Samuel within two years after my decease, & further, I give all & singular the goods & chattels that I have above given to my wife as above that she shall die seized of & not in her lifetime disposed of to be equally divided between my two daughters, Mary & Welthea.

"And also I give to sd son Thomas his heirs & assigns all & singular the lands due to me on former divisions in the old township of Taunton within the said county. not before disposed of in this will & the original right of sd Doughty the swamp given to my dau Mary only excepted. All other estate, real or personal goods, chattels, rights and credits not otherwise disposed of in this will, & of which I shall die seized of, I give to sd son Samuel his heirs & assigns forever & he to pay my just debts & funeral charges & to provide gravestones for my grave after my decease.

"And last of all, I constitute and appoint my said sons Thomas Gilbert & Samuel Gilbert to be my executors to this

my said will & testament, & do by these presents utterly revoke, make void all former wills & testaments by me heretofore made, and all executors heretofore before this date named, & do ordain this & no other to be my last will & Testament. In Witness whereof, I, the sd Nathaniel Gilbert have hereinunto set my hand & seal the day & year first before mentioned.

I know nothing more except that he was alive in 1751, but as there is no settlement of his estate, I think he must have moved out of the country. I think a (692?) Constant Soule, born about 1742, was his son.

126. ⁴Cornelius Soule (³Mercy Southworth, ²Mary Pabodie, ¹Elizabeth Alden). Born in Duxbury, 1703. I quote from a Soule Genealogy, by Dr. Charles E. Banks, U.S.A., in "Old Times in North Yarmouth, Maine": "Cornelius Soule removed to North Yarmouth, Maine, about 1726, where he resided till his death. He soon became prominent in town affairs, being largely interested in land speculations. In the Registry of Deeds of York County, Maine, no less than thirty transfers occur in as many years, to which he was a party, and probably that does not represent all of his business. In the division of property rights, 1727, he drew Lot No. 48, which consisted of 38 acres of upland including the Islands, Middle Brother, Upper Brother, and Sow and Pigs. This lot gave him Pew No. 19 in the First Church, of which he was a member, having been received 9 May, 1731. He was the first assessor of the town in 1733, constable in 1734, and selectman many times. In 1735 he joined with Peter Weare, Stephen Larrabee, *et als.*, in opposing the church call to Rev. Ephraim Keith. When Rev. Nicholas Loring was ordained, he and Andrew Ring furnished the entertainment, for which the town reimbursed them to the extent of £20-17-9. In 1742 he acted as messenger for Governor Shirley, in transporting some official letters from Boston to the Eastern frontier. His journal of the trip is preserved in Mass. Archives, Vol. xxxviii., etc.

He was the first Representative of the town to the General Court of Massachusetts. He was Captain of Co. F, 6th Mass. Volunteers, Colonel Sylvester Richmond, in the siege of Louisburg and the expedition against the French in 1745. About 1732 he married Mrs. Hannah Scales, widow of William Scales, who had been killed by the Indians some years previous. She was received into the church Aug. 8, 1731. She died 19 May, 1762. He died without issue, and was buried in the old graveyard at North Yarmouth. An old slate slab, moss-grown and worn, has this inscription: 'This perpetuates the memory of Capt. Cornelius Soule, who departed this life Oct. ye 20, 1755 in the 52nd. yr. of his age.'"

His will dated 3 Sept., 1755, on file in the York Registry, is here given below:

"In the name of God, Amen. The third day of September. Anno Domini. 1755. I, Cornelius Soule of North Yarmouth &c &c, I give, and bequeath to Susannah, my beloved wife, the improvement of all my estate, both real & personal during her natural life, and at her decease I give & bequeath ye same to her son Thomas Scales [whom I also, make, constitute, & appoint my sole executor of this my last will & testament] & to Cornelius Soule son of my brother Barnabas Soule, to be equally divided between them.

"At a Court of Probate, held at York, Jan. 15, 1756, the within written instrument was presented by Thomas Scales Soul, sole Executor therein named." (York County Registry of Probate, Book IX., p. 135.)

127. ⁴Barnabas Soule (³Mercy Southworth, ²Mary Pabodie, ¹Eliz. Alden). Born 1705. Went to North Yarmouth. He is the ancestor of many; all the rest in Freeport, Yarmouth, Pownal, and other towns in Maine, descended from Jedidiah. In early part of 1745 bought a homestead of his elder brother Cornelius. He married, in 1737, Jane, the posthumous daughter of Jacob and Elizabeth (Stock-

man) Bradbury, of Salisbury, Mass., born 1718, bapt. 4 Aug., 1718. She was the youngest sister of Mrs. Dorothy, the wife of Rev. Ammi Ruhamah Cutter, and great-granddaughter of the noted divine Rev. John Wheelwright. Barnabas and his wife were received into the First Church 30 Aug., 1742, by public profession, and on the 5th September following he brought his two sons to baptism. He died 8 April, 1780, aged 75 years; lies buried in the old burying ground that overlooks the town and gives a glimpse of the blue waters of Casco Bay in the distance.

I found this Mary after the family of Constant had gone to print, so inserted her under the head of Priscilla Simmons as 189a, as Priscilla was a Pabodie descendant. She was born about 1724; died May 16, 1765, age 41. She married Thomas Weston, son of Joseph and Mercy (Peterson) Weston, born in 1726. He always resided in Duxbury. He married second — Jan. 15, 1767 — Martha Chandler, daughter of Joseph and Martha (Hunt) Chandler. She was born Nov. 23, 1716. By his second wife he had Mercy Weston, born Jan. 29, 1768, married Isaiah Alden; Peleg Weston, born 1769; Almira and Rebecca Weston, born June 16, 1774. Thomas Weston made his will, book 25, page 7, Plymouth probate records: "Thomas Weston of Duxborough, yeoman, gives to his dear and loving wife, Martha Weston, the improvement of $\frac{1}{2}$ of his real estate; $\frac{1}{3}$ of personal and wood in the woods, so long as she remains my widow, and all the things she brought. To his two sons and two daughters, by his first wife, viz.: Joseph, Thomas, Mary, and Jane, all the wood land that was their mother's. To his son Peleg, his silver knee buckles and stone buttons. I give to my four daughters, Mary, Jane, Mercy, and Rebecca £46. 18. 4. apiece, to be paid by my three sons, Joseph, Thomas, and Peleg, equally. Martha Weston and Joseph Weston executors."

The first of these was the *Declaration of Independence*, which was adopted by the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776. This document declared that the thirteen colonies were no longer part of Great Britain, but were now free and independent states.

The second of these was the *Constitution of the United States*, which was adopted by the Continental Congress on September 17, 1787. This document established the framework for the federal government, and provided for the separation of powers into three branches: the executive, the legislative, and the judicial. The Constitution also provided for the election of a President, and for the creation of a Supreme Court.

The third of these was the *Bill of Rights*, which was adopted by the Continental Congress on September 12, 1791. This document guaranteed certain basic rights to the citizens of the United States, including the right to free speech, the right to a fair trial, and the right to bear arms.

The fourth of these was the *Emancipation Proclamation*, which was issued by President Abraham Lincoln on January 31, 1863. This document declared that all slaves in the United States were now free, and that the federal government would no longer support slavery.

The fifth of these was the *13th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on January 19, 1865. This amendment prohibited slavery and involuntary servitude, except as punishment for a crime.

The sixth of these was the *14th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on August 19, 1868. This amendment guaranteed that all citizens of the United States were entitled to equal protection under the law, and that no state could deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law.

The seventh of these was the *15th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on February 3, 1870. This amendment guaranteed that the right to vote could not be denied on the basis of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

The eighth of these was the *16th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on September 13, 1913. This amendment gave the federal government the power to tax income.

The ninth of these was the *17th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on October 3, 1913. This amendment provided for the direct election of Senators by the people of each state.

The tenth of these was the *18th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on January 16, 1919. This amendment prohibited the manufacture, sale, and transportation of intoxicating liquors.

The eleventh of these was the *19th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on August 4, 1920. This amendment guaranteed that the right to vote could not be denied on the basis of sex.

The twelfth of these was the *20th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on March 2, 1933. This amendment provided for the early start of the presidential term, and for the removal of Congress from the summer recess.

The thirteenth of these was the *21st Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on December 5, 1933. This amendment repealed the 18th Amendment, and allowed the manufacture, sale, and transportation of intoxicating liquors.

The fourteenth of these was the *22nd Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on March 2, 1951. This amendment limited the President to two terms in office.

The fifteenth of these was the *23rd Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on March 29, 1961. This amendment gave the District of Columbia the same representation in Congress as the states.

The sixteenth of these was the *24th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on August 1, 1964. This amendment prohibited the federal government and the states from imposing a tax on the right to vote.

The seventeenth of these was the *25th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on July 6, 1965. This amendment provided for the procedure for the removal of a President from office.

The eighteenth of these was the *26th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on July 1, 1971. This amendment lowered the voting age from 21 to 18.

The nineteenth of these was the *27th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on May 19, 1992. This amendment provided for the procedure for the removal of a Senator from office.

The twentieth of these was the *28th Amendment*, which was adopted by the United States Congress on September 13, 1992. This amendment provided for the procedure for the removal of a Representative from office.

dated 1785: I give to daughter Sarah Pearce, widow; To daughter Deborah Davenport; To daughter Lydia Little widow; To sons John and Zarah a small portion, because they were so well remembered in their father's will. To daughters Rachel Brownell; To daughter Elizabeth Manchester; To daughter Comfort Slocum; To grandson John Pearce; To grandson Ichabod Pearce. Furniture to daughters Comfort Slocum and Lydia Little, and executor son-in-law Thomas Davenport.

Richard Billings (Int. June 19), Sept. 1, 1725. They had (Little Compton Records) Lois of Job and Priscilla Palmer. Priscilla Hilliard was daughter of David and Joanna (Andros) Hilliard. The Hilliards came

from Connecticut to Little Compton, and my theory is that Job and Priscilla Palmer, after the birth of Lois, went to Norwich, Conn., where Priscilla died, and Job returned to Little Compton for his second wife. Hon. Richard Wheeler writes me he cannot place Job Palmer amongst the descendants of Walter Palmer. A Job Palmer was a Revolutionary pensioner in 1841, in Charleston, S. C.

159. Rebecca⁴ Simmons (William,³ Mercy² Pabodie, Elizabeth¹ Alden). Born May 8, 1708. From her father's will we know she married a "Bagger" (probably meant for Badger). I do not find this family. From certain clues I surmise they went to Providence and that the husband's name was Jonathan. If so, he had a daughter who married a Noyes and had a son Oliver. She married, second, a Snow, of the Bridgewater Snows.

Mary Brownell, daughter of Thomas and Mary (Crandall) Brownell, born July 15, 1717.

We find his will in Plymouth, 19 vol., 544-543 pages, dated 31 Aug., 1764. Isaac Simmons, of Duxborough: "To beloved wife Lydia Simmons; she to do $\frac{1}{2}$ with my son Levi Simmons in maintaining my sister Priscilla; to son Jehiel; to son and daughter Samuel and Jeruiah Holmes; to dau. Martha Loudon; to two daughters Susannah and Lydia, until they arrive at 18, and Lydia at 15." Witnessed by Cornelius Delano, Mary Peterson, and Nehemiah Thomas. 989. Benjamin Wilcox, born Sept. 14, 1747.

I found the will of Jeremiah Wilcox at Taunton, but have mislaid my notes giving date of the will. It reads:

"I, Jeremiah Wilcox of Dartmouth, yeoman, advanced in

years. I give and bequeath to loving wife Judith that part of the homestead I have hereinafter given my son Benjamin so long as she remains my widow and no longer. In lieu of her thirds to my estate and whereas I received of James Honeyman, Esq., about 14 hundred pounds old tenor, and of Samuel Almy £500, and of Gideon Sanford £500, all which with other money all which I expected to find in this chest, but upon search I found it was all gone; my said wife and no other had the keeping of the keys, whereupon I shrewdly suspect she has concealed the same; all which I give her for her part of my moveable estate, and if she see cause to accept the same; but if otherwise she delivering up said money to my executors hereafter named, she to have then, and not upon any other conditions, the third part of my moveable estate after my debts are paid. There is a gold necklace I found my wife which I desire after she has done with it may go to my granddaughter Mary Wilcox." (He then gives) "to loving son Samuel; to loving son Wm. Wilcox; to loving son Benjamin; I give to dau. Sarah's children, she being dead; I give to Mary's children my gold buttons and silver shoe buckles; I give to sons Samuel and Jeremiah." (The last name I am not sure of. Certainly on Dartmouth Records we find no Jeremiah and it is probable I read it wrong.) Loving son William sole executor. Jeremiah Wilcox.

217. Elizabeth⁴ Briggs (Elizabeth³ Fobes, Martha² Pabodie. Eliz.¹ Alden). Born Dec. 17, 1713; married Shippee; says L. C. Reebut, "may have been wrong in copying and may be Skiffe". I would like to find this family.

218. William Briggs, born in Little Compton April 11, 1715. [Born 24 April, Town records.] Probably the one who married Abishag Records, July 16, 1738, by Sylvester Richmond. Wm. Briggs died Aug., 1803; his wife, Abishag Records, was born 1716 and their children:

Probate Records, Vol. 27, 147, at Taunton. Division of estate of Wm. Almy of Dartmouth, "late of Tiverton", Nov. 5, 1782. Widow Mary, to Gideon, eldest son, to Eliphale and Mary Almy. How many of these children

belonged to Phebe, I do not know and there are no records at Dartmouth to clear it up.

224. Lovet⁴ Briggs (Elizabeth³ Fobes, Martha² Seabury, Eliz¹. Alden). Born 1728; married Freelove Dring of Tiverton, Int. Oct. 5, 1735. [Was Freelove Dring daughter of Thomas and Mary (Butler) Dring; born March 1, 1720?] Lovet Briggs lived in Tiverton.

She married Abijah White of Marshfield, son of John⁴ White (Daniel³, Peregrine², William¹) and Susannah (Sherman) White (Samuel). He was born Oct. 8, 1706. "He purchased the paternal estate of his uncle, Joseph White on his removal to Lebanon, Conn., and his grandchildren were the last of the name and family to occupy it. Abijah White was the famous Marshfield Loyalist, and died in Boston, Oct. 29, 1775; buried in King's Chapel Yard, sermon by Rev. Dr. Waters." (White Genealogy, recent issue 1897.)

He married 2nd in 1750 Sarah, daughter of Kenelm and Patience (Dotey) Baker. She was born April 12, 1726 and died Nov. 29, 1792 of small pox and was buried in the family lot in Marshfield. Her father, Kenelm Baker of North Dubury, was born Nov. 3, 1695; died May 22, 1771; married Jan. 22, 1791 Patience Dotey, daughter of John and granddaughter of Edward Dotey of the Mayflower, and Faith (Clark) Dotey. Kenelm Baker was son of Kenelm Baker and Sarah Bradford, (Major William, Gov. Wm.) and grandson of Samuel Baker, and Eleanor Winslow, daughter of Kenelm Winslow and Eleanor Newton his wife.

Thomas Little married 3rd in his old age, Lucy Brown, but she had no children.

He lived in "Norent Farm," Marshfield. He belonged to the Church of England. He was of Tory sympathies, and is said to have been one of the signers of the application for royal troops to protect loyal subjects of England in Marshfield.

Little, says he married Abigail White. Miss Marcia A. Thomas says he married Sybil Metcalf. In Colchester, Conn., I find the marriage of a Wm. Little to Rachael Townsend, married Nov. 5, 1745, (see Conn. marriages). At Lebanon, Conn., I find the marriage record of a William Little to Sybil Metcalf, Nov. 10, 1748. He may have had three wives or one of the Williams may have come from Rev. Ephraim¹ Little (David², Ephraim², Thomas¹) who was settled in Hebron, Conn.
