Earth Day and Solar **ARRAY**

There was no day more appropriate than Earth Day to mark the dedication of Elizabethtown College's solar array. Partnering with Community Energy and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), the College welcomed close to 100 trustees, faculty and staff members and students to the ribbon cutting on Pennsylvania's largest higher education-sited solar array. Situated on 10 acres, owned by the College, the project is expected to produce more than 3,000,000 kWh per year—enough to power the equivalent of nearly 300 homes.

John Quigley, former Secretary of the DEP; Brent Alderfer, president of Community Energy; and College President Carl Strikwerda welcomed guests, on what began as an overcast afternoon. As if on command, the clouds parted just enough

to welcome brief peeks of sunshine as the ribbon was cut. Quigley acknowledged the College's dedication to sustainability by leveraging the \$500,000 state grant from the Pennsylvania Energy Development Authority to build the on-campus solar power plant, which sits on the eastern end of campus, directly across from the V. Lester Schreiber Quadrangle.

The project will serve as a living laboratory for our students, faculty and staff by providing solar energy research and learning opportunities for years. Dr. Kurt DeGoede, professor of engineering, spoke about the learning and research opportunities the solar array affords him and his students.

Community Energy is the developer, owner and operator of Elizabethtown College Solar, a project that will produce more than 20 percent of Elizabethtown College's annual electricity needs.

As the **BE INSPIRED**. Campaign progresses, the College will unveil additional sustainability initiatives, including a Sustainability Green Fund, which will serve to support those initiatives.

"ON THE ROAD" TO ELECTRIC POWER

As the College continues to advance its commitment to sustainability, two electric car charging stations will be installed this summer. The first two locations will be located in the Brown and Hoover parking lots. Both stations, and two more at locations to be determined, are made possible through the generosity of Ted Hoffman '68. Once the College is established as a charging station site, it will appear on PlugShare, a website used by electric car owners to map available charging stations throughout the United States.



2016 LEFFLER LECTURE



Peace—it's a hard thing to teach and even harder to learn. And it's not a game—unless you're nine years old and your teacher is the award-winning educator, John Hunter.

On Feb. 16, Hunter brought his own "brand of peace" to campus as the featured Carlos R. and Georgiana E. Leffler Memorial Lecturer. As he spoke about "World Peace and other Fourth Grade Achievements"—also the title of his book—he shared inspiring stories from more than 30 years of teaching and observing students tackle complex global problems while playing his World Peace Game.

While on campus, he also held conversations with education majors and local educators on how to teach peace as an everyday practice, challenging them to incorporate it in their own classrooms.

LOOKING AHEAD:

On Nov. 15, 2016, the College will welcome Michele Norris as the fall 2016 Leffler lecturer. Last year, Norris, the former host of National Public Radio's *All Things Considered*, left NPR to devote more time to The Race Card Project, her award-winning effort to spur conversations about identity, six words at a time. The College's own Six-Word Story Project gained local and regional recognition in fall 2015.

NEW MASTERS IN EDUCATION

With the College's commitment to nonviolence, social justice and human dignity, it should come as no surprise that Elizabethtown is now offering a graduate-level program in peace education, one of very few graduate-level programs in the world. According to Rachel Finley-Bowman, chair of the Dept. of Education, "this degree is an important extension of what we do in

our undergraduate program. It is a commitment to creating a learning community that champions equity and social justice."

The fully online program, with accelerated semesters and rolling admission, is designed for certified educators (pre-K through12) and already has attracted national interest from mentor teachers and alumni.

IT'S ON US— ON ALL OF US...

Already positioning itself as a leader in addressing the problem of sexual assault, Elizabethtown College was selected as the site for Gov. Tom Wolf's January announcement of Pennsylvania's "It's On Us" campaign to end sexual assault. The Commonwealth was the first state in the nation to initiate a state-specific campaign as part of the national "It's On Us" movement. College President Carl Strikwerda called on the more than 100 who assembled for the announcement to "reject the quiet tolerance" of sexual assault.

Allison Bridgeman, associate dean of students and director of Residence Life, participated as a member of a statewide panel of legislators, college and university presidents and higher education administrators who



discussed the challenges of and best practices for addressing sexual assault awareness on college campuses.

"It's On Us PA" is a statewide campaign that encourages everyone to play a role in ending sexual assault. College and university campuses are at higher risk for sexual assault cases. The campaign brings greater awareness to situations in which sexual assault may occur, offers tips to intervene in situations where consent has not or cannot be given and creates an environment in which sexual assault is unacceptable and survivors are supported.

HIGH CENTER FAMILY BUSINESS FORUM

On Tuesday, March 22, the High Center presented its annual Family Business Forum to more than 600 attendees. The forum has become an annual "not-to-be-missed" event. Each year business owners, large and small, along with executives from all around Pennsylvania's capital region, gather for a day of collaboration, education and networking. This year they heard from world-renowned author and leadership

guru John Maxwell, who offers professional leadership advice to everyone from world leaders to team leaders.

The 2017 Family Business Forum will be held Tuesday, March 21, at Lancaster Marriott and Convention Center. The line up includes Dr. Henry Cloud, a clinical psychologist, acclaimed leadership expert and best-selling author, and Ann Rhoades, founding executive of JetBlue Airways.

RUNNING INTO HISTORY

Ten Years of the Ware Lecture on Peacemaking

It was 1972. Do you remember the first time you saw the photograph of a young girl running naked from her village, her skin on fire with napalm? Perhaps it was later—in the '80s or '90s—you saw the photo and wondered "what ever happened to the girl in the picture?" It was this iconic photo that changed the way the world viewed not just the Vietnam War but all wars.


A vision in a brilliant blue ao dai, the national costume of Vietnam, Kim Phuc emerged on the Leffler Chapel and Performance Center stage to a capacity crowd of more than 800. As she delivered the April 13 Ware Lecture on Peacemaking, it was a fitting way to recognize the 10th anniversary of the lecture series that brings celebrated world leaders to Elizabethtown.

The girl in the picture, now a bright and articulate—if somewhat soft-spoken—woman, shared her story of resilience, forgiveness and reconciliation. She offered videos and photos of the life-changing events that occurred in her village almost 45 years ago. She took the audience back

to a time when she felt safe with her family and her life, and she detailed how the events of that day changed the course of her life forever, taking her to Cuba for medical school and eventually to Canada.

As the E-town campus community warmly welcomed Phuc, the campus came alive with a series of programs that set the stage and provided context for her message:

- War and Peace Photography
 Exhibit including the famous photo
 of Phuc, along with other iconic
 images and student-made photos
- film screenings of "Indochine" and "Platoon"
- conscientious objectors panel discussion offering perspectives and a greater understanding of religious beliefs and values that influenced panel-members' decisions to choose alternative service during the Vietnam War
- book discussion of Denise Chong's "The Girl in the Picture: The Story of Kim Phuc, the Photograph and the Vietnam War"

For the fourth time in as many years, Elizabethtown College is proud to announce a Fulbright award winner. Gates Failing '16 has been selected as a recipient of the Fulbright U.S. Student Program research



grant to Malawi in 2016-17.

An Oklahoma native, biology major and Stamps Scholar, Failing has Blue Jay roots as the son of Barbara (Larmon) Failing '75 P'16. Failing will conduct research on traditional medical practices and the potential for collaboration with modern care systems to combat HIV in Malawi. His research will be affiliated with the Centre for Social Research, University of Malawi.

When not researching, Failing will volunteer with a youth peer health education program focused on training and wellness promotion. Upon his return, he'll pursue a medical degree and continue international public health service.

In the last three years, seven E-town students have earned Fulbright scholarships.

Bonner '02 Leads Media Team at Division I Basketball East Regional


March means spring, St. Patrick's Day and college basketball. For many sports enthusiasts, it is college basketball and everything else a distant second. March Madness consumes the sports landscape, and that was evident as more than 41,000 spectators piled into Philadelphia's Wells Fargo Center March 24-27 to watch four of the premier programs in NCAA men's basketball vie for a Final Four spot in the East Regional.

The allure of perennial contenders Indiana University, the University of North Carolina, the University of Notre Dame and the University of Wisconsin, with 11 national championships and 32 trips to the Final Four between them, made the East Regional the hot ticket not just for fans, but for local, regional and national media,

which showed up in droves. More than 450 media members covered the event.

Kevin Bonner '02, associate athletic director at La Salle University, served as host media coordinator and oversaw a volunteer staff of close to 50. Dave Naphy '04 and Elizabethtown College Director of Athletic Communications Matt Heffelfinger both served on Bonner's media relations staff during the event.

"This was, by far, the biggest event I've been associated with as a professional," noted Bonner. "The NCAA told us that La Salle was the smallest athletic department to host a Division I men's basketball regional. Though all major events have their share of challenges, standing on the court during the trophy presentation, I know that due to the

North Carolina cut down the nets in the City of Brotherly Love after defeating Indiana and Notre Dame to be crowned East Regional champions. The Tar Heels advanced to the Final Four in Houston, Texas, before falling to Villanova University, 77-74, on a 3-pointer at the buzzer in the national championship game.

FIELD HOCKEY EARNS ACADEMIC PRESTIGE

High academic standards are nothing new inside the Elizabethtown College field hockey program. The Blue Jays have earned the National Field Hockey Coaches Association academic team distinction 10 times in the last 11 years.

This year's team didn't just earn another award, however. Among hundreds of collegiate field hockey programs across the country in Divisions I, II and III and more than 200 recognized as National Academic Teams, E-town topped them all with a 3.7 team grade point average (GPA).

For all the academic consistency the Blue Jays have shown over the last decade, they'd never cracked the top five performers in Division III prior to this year. To be



named a National Academic Team, Elizabethtown had to achieve a minimum team GPA of 3.0 during the fall semester of the 2015-2016 academic year.

E-town's accomplishment was further heightened by the fact that its GPA this fall is the second highest among NCAA Divisions I, II, III in the NFHCA's National Academic Team digital archives, which dates back to 2004 for Divisions II and III and 2003 for Division I. Stockton University amassed a 3.76 GPA in 2014, the only other time a team has reached the 3.7 threshold.

All 19 athletes were named to the NFHCA's National Academic Squad for having a cumulative GPA of 3.30 or higher following the fall semester. Jacki Hikes '16 and Andrea Keady '15/M'16 were four-year award recipients.

The national coaches organization also recognized rising seniors Kelsey Detweiler '17, Halley Donlin '17 and Allison McLamb '17 as Scholars of Distinction for earning a cumulative GPA of 3.9 or higher through the fall semester.
