When a nation lifts up the crystal microphone trophy and the credits roll over the end of a Eurovision Grand Final, it's generally a given that the circus will simply roll on to that country the following year. However, when Ukraine's Kalush Orchestra won in Torino last year with *Stefania,* we knew that, despite two previous successful hostings, we would not be able to convene in Kyiv again in 2023. The still-ongoing conflict battering Ukraine may prevent us from heading there this year, but through the spirit of collaboration and cross-cultural exchange that inspired the creation of the Eurovision Song Contest so many years ago, silver medalists the United Kingdom will be hosting the event on Ukraine's behalf.

While the BBC is leading production, we'll see performances by both British and Ukrainian acts, a roster of hosts that spans both nations, and plenty of off-screen touches that highlight the culture and history of our defending champion. As it's been stated before, this is Ukraine's party and the UK is just hosting it at their house. This year's slogan, "United by Music", has never been so apt.

2023 Host City: Liverpool, United Kingdom

Located on the Mersey estuary, Liverpool is the fifth-largest metropolitan area in the United Kingdom. Established as a borough over 800 years ago, it eventually became a cultural crossroads in the north of England, and a hub of commerce, art, sport, and history.

Liverpool has more listed buildings than any other city in the UK (bar London), and is an architecture buff's playground. For example, its Pier Head area, once the jumping-off point for ship passengers and cargo alike, maintains its beautiful historic architecture while embracing a modern and visitor-friendly vibe; it will be the home of this year's Eurovision Village.

Most first-time visitors to Liverpool know the city as the home of the Merseybeat sound, and it's hard to escape the influence of Beatlemania even more than sixty years after the Fab Four took to the stage at the Cavern Club. What better place to host Eurovision than the city that gave us Gerry & The Pacemakers, the Searchers, Cilla Black, Echo & the Bunnymen, A Flock of Seagulls, OMD, Dead or Alive, Frankie Goes to Hollywood, Mel C from the Spice Girls, Atomic Kitten, the Zutons, the Wombats, Ladytron, and countless more? Whether you're into classic rock n' roll, new wave, or the future of pop music, you'll be able to find it here, probably surrounded by a horde of Scousers having the time of their lives.

2023 Venue: Liverpool Arena

Often branded as the M&S Bank Arena, and previously known as the Echo Arena, this year's venue is an 11,000 capacity space that was first opened in early 2008, and expanded in 2012 and 2017.

It's been the site for the MTV Europe Music Awards, the MOBO Awards, and sold-out concerts by artists like Rihanna, Beyoncé, Muse, Kylie Minogue, and Elton John.



2023 Hosts:

Alesha Dixon

First gaining fame as a member of the girl-group Mis-Teeq before striking out on her own as a solo artist, Alesha Dixon has transitioned into a successful career as a television presenter and talent judge. Over the years, she's been seen on *Comic Relief, Strictly Come Dancing, Your Face Sounds Familiar,* and editions of the *Got Talent* franchise in the UK, Australia, and the United States.

Hannah Waddingham

Hannah Waddingham's career started with successful stints as a leading lady on both West End and Broadway stages, with critically-lauded roles in *Spamalot*, A Little Night Music, The Wizard of Oz, and Into the Woods, leading to a trio of Olivier Award nominations. Following a turn as Septa Unella on Game of Thrones and a recurring role on Sex Education, Waddingham's big international breakthrough came with her role as Rebecca Welton on Ted Lasso, which has garnered her an Emmy award for Best Supporting Actress in a Comedy.

Julia Sanina

Best known to Eurovision fans as the lead singer of the band The Hardkiss, which narrowly missed out on Ukraine's ticket to Eurovision in 2016, Julia Sanina is one of the most recognizable women in the Ukrainian music scene today. The Hardkiss has won multiple YUNA Awards and were nominated for an MTV Europe Music Award as well. Julia has also been a judge on *X Factor Ukraine*.

Graham Norton

Joining the three co-hosts for the Grand Final and doing double-duty as the BBC's television commentator at the same time, Graham Norton has been the UK's voice at Eurovision since 2009. He got his start as a standup performer before moving over to the BBC in the early 2000s. His signature program, *The Graham Norton Show*, premiered in 2007, and he's been seen as a recurring judge on *RuPaul's Drag Race UK*, *The British Academy Television Awards*, *Children in Need*, and many, many more. In addition to all of this, he also helms weekend shows on Virgin Radio UK.

<u>Georgia</u>: Iru was one of the five members of the group "Candy", which won Junior Eurovision in 2011 with the song Candy Music.

Lithuania: Monika Linkytė was in the running to represent Lithuania at Junior Eurovision 2007, and came in third place with her song Vaikystės pasaka.

How many of this year's artists go by a mononym or pseudonym?

<u>Armenia:</u> Brunette's real name is Elen Yeremyan (**Էլեն Երեմյան**)

<u>Austria:</u> Teya's real name is Teodora Špirić (and she's also gone by Thea Devy in the past), and Salena's is Selina-Maria Edbauer

<u>Azerbaijan</u>: TuralTuranX is the combined artistic name for twins Tural and Turan Bağmanov.



<u>Belgium:</u> Gustaph's real name is Stef Caers, but his early work was released under the name Steffen.

Denmark: Reiley's real name is Rani Petersen.

<u>Estonia</u>: Alika's full name is Alika Milova.

Georgia: Iru's full name is Irina Khechanovi (ირინა ხეჩანოვი)

<u>Greece</u>: Victor Vernicos's full name is Victor Vernicos Jørgensen (Βίκτωρ Βερνίκος Γιούργκενσεν).

Finland: Käärijä's real name is Jere Pöyhönen.

France: La Zarra's real name is Fatima-Zahra Hafdi.

Iceland: Diljá's full name is Diljá Pétursdóttir.

<u>Israel</u>: Noa Kirel's legal name is Noa Kirel (נועה קירל), but she was actually born "Noya" Kirel and had her name changed in infancy.

<u>Moldova</u>: Pasha Parfeni's real first name is Pavel, but "Pasha" is a standard nickname. <u>Netherlands</u>: Mia Nicolai's real name is Michaja Nicolaï, and Dion Cooper's is the similarly pronounced Dion Cuiper.

Norway: Alessandra's full name is Alessandra Watle Mele.

Poland: Blanka's full name is Blanka Stajkow.

Portugal: Mimicat's real name is Marisa Isabel Lopes Mena, and she had released earlier music under the name Izamena.

<u>San Marino</u>: All of the members of Piqued Jacks perform under stage names. Vocalist Andrea Lazzeretti goes by "E-King", bassist Francesco Bini goes by "littleladle",

drummer Tommaso Oliveri goes by "HolyHargot", and guitarist Marco Sgaramella goes by "Majic-O". Former members have included "Penguinsane" and "ThEdOg". Serbia: Luke Black's real name is Luka Ivanović (Лука Ивановић).

Spain: Blanca Paloma's full name is Blanca Paloma Ramos Baeza.

<u>Sweden</u>: Loreen's real name is Lorine Zineb Nora Talhaoui.

United Kingdom: Mae Muller's full name is Holly Mae Muller.


