





### Henderson's Shady Nook LAWN GRASS SEED

On nearly all lawns there are unsightly bare spots under the shade of the trees, which have baffled all efforts to get into grass, but with this mixture there need be no further difficulty. It is a combination of fine, dwarf growing, evergreen varieties, which in their wild or natural state are to be found growing in the woods their wild or natural state are to be found growing in the woods or other sheltered and shaded spots. Ground that has been densely shaded by trees is frequently "sour," and if the drainage is defective it is apt to be covered with moss and coarse grasses. In such cases an application of slaked lime, at the rate of one bushel to each thousand square feet, or forty bushels to the acre, is an excellent corrective and sweetener, but the moss should be first removed by the use of a sharp rake.



Soak a quart overnight or for a few hours, with a piece of fat pork. Grease around inner edge of kettle to prevent boiling over. Soak three dried Chili peppers, pouring off water twice. Mash peppers well with a pint of canned tomatoes. Cut up an onion and fry slightly, adding it to the Chili and homatoes. Pour the beans when done into a shallow mixing pan. Cut the pork in small pieces, distribute it evenly over the top of the beans. Pour tomatoes and onions over all. Scrape off inner lining of peppers, throwing the pods aside.

SOUP OF "BABY" LIMA BEANS

Cook one pint of lima beans one hour in plenty of water and add a pinch of baking soda while boiling. Cook fifteen minutes more and drain off the water.

Put to cooking again in plenty of water until soft, then put beans and liquid through a colander to remove the skins. Then add a pint of sweet milk and piece of butter the size of an egg. Salt and pepper to taste. Do not let it boil after the milk is added, but keep good and hot.

Transplanting from Cold Frames or Window Boxes. This is done about May 10th to 15th or whenever the weather is settled. Water the seedlings and also the ground they are to the seedlings and also the ground they are to be transplanted to, the day before, so that soil conditions are equal. Separate the seedlings with a sharp stick, and if they are growing thickly together place a clump of them in water to soften the soil. Transplant when 2 or 3 "true" leaves appear. (See cuts.)

ANNUAL FLOWER SEEDS. These complete the cycle of their existence, growing from seed to seed in one year. Many sorts require to be sown in some sheltered situation such as a greenhouse, cold frame, or window box about a month before they may be planted outdoors. By sowing thus early, the growing season is proportionately prolonged. Others may be sown where they are to stand, in which case they require careful attention for the first few weeks.

Annuals offer a large field for selection, embracing plants of all kinds, from the modest Sweet Alyssum to the gorgeous Salvia, the majestic Ricinus, and dainty Cosmos. They are found in every conceivable shade of color, and are adaptable for growing as single specimens, or planting for large effect in clumps or masses, while others are well suited for making borders.

While there is no class of plants that will survive better under rigorous conditions, yet in order to achieve the best results they should be planted where they can obtain ample sunlight, and may be easily watered.

It is elmost needless to urge the importance of careful weeding, as weeds

It is almost needless to urge the importance of careful weeding, as weeds usually grow more rapidly than the seedlings. If the rows are carefully marked when sown it will be easy to distinguish the weeds.

A continuity of bloom may be secured by occasional sowings of many sorts, such as Eschscholtzia, Sweet Alyssum, Phlox, Zinnia, etc. In the latitude of New York these sowings may be made as late as June 15th.

The great value of annuals is greatly enhanced by the fact that an effectual display may be secured for a very modest outlay.

PERENNIAL FLOWER SEEDS. The great charm of Perennials lies in their permanence. Once established they are a constant source of pleasure, and among the most interesting plants in our gardens, presenting a variety of form and color so great as to fit them for almost every conceivable purpose in the

garden.

Many plants of this class, notably Antirrhinums, have been so greatly improved by hybridization during recent years that they may now be had in varying height, and in almost every shade of color.

A very large porportion of the Perennial plants that may be grown from seed have great value as cut flowers, because of their great substance, which enables them to stand up well long after cutting.

Notwithstanding their individual charm, they are most effective when planted in a mixed border, where by arranging them according to height, color and season of flowering, an attractive display may be had from the earliest days of spring, all through the summer, and even after the first frosts herald the approach of winter. And so, week by week, such a border will present new charms and revive old ones, the beauty of it growing with everinceasing interest.

present new charms and revive old ones, the beauty of it glowing increasing interest.

Perennials are generally raised from seed grown from early spring to about August 1st, in the latitude of New York.

Treated thus, they make strong plants, which may be planted in a permanent situation early enough in the fall to enable them to winter safely.

In some instances plants will flower the first year from seed if sown quite early, but nearly all require a year to reach their full development.

In colors there is also great variety, some richly brilliant, others dainty and exquisite, then there are colors and tints in charming combinations. There are maroon, black, pink, chamois-rose, apricot with garnet throat, crimson, canary yellow, pink with claret throat and veins, blush with carmine lacings, cerise, white, scarlet, blush with white throat, hander throat, crimson, canary vellow, pink with claret throat and veins, blush with carmine lacings, cerise, white, scarlet, blush with white throat magenta, apricot with buff margin, wine-red with white edge, etc., etc.



This new race of Pansies promises to be an important introduction on account of the extreme hardiness of the plants and in consequence their earliness in flowering: With slight protection, such as meadow hay, leaves or similar material, full-grown plants winter over in the open ground-even in very cold latitudeand commence flowering in early spring with the Snowdrops and Crocus, or from four to six weeks earlier than other Pansies. In fact, we gathered flowers several times during the past winter by lifting the snow-covered hay. 





Helichrysum Monstrosum (or Strawflower) the glorified type of the oldfashioned strawflowers of grandmother's garden, and the dainty Rhodanthe are shown in colors on the opposite page. There is a charm attached to these

Strawflowers or Everlastings which places them in a realm of their own.

The Helichrysums, deriving their name from the golden sun (Helios—sun, and chrysos—gold), have indeed been rightly named, for their brilliance and showiness have won for them well-merited admiration wherever known.

As garden flowers, the Helichrysums and Rhodanthes are most satisfactory, producing a great wealth of bloom from early summer till heavy frost. The former plants grow from 2 to 3 feet high, and the latter about 1 foot. The Rhodanthes are also particularly adapted for growing in pots; their hardiness and easy culture making them desirable house plants.

Beside the aforesaid good qualities, their great value is only appreciated after

frost has made it impossible to gather fresh flowers from the garden. It is then that these charming dried flowers, retaining all their natural colors and attractiveness, give particular delight. They are invaluable for table adornment in the home or in hotels, for making up ornamental baskets for the holidays, and, in fact, they may be used in almost any kind of floral decoration.

The flowers are easily dried by cutting the stems just before the blooms have fully developed and suspending them, flowers down, in a dry place.

Both the Helichrysums and Rhodanthes are of easiest culture. They may be sown out-of-doors after danger from frost; the seed covered to a depth of not over four times their size and pressed in firmly with a board. When the plants have developed two or three leaves they should be thinned out so that the plants do not become crowded. 





A few years ago the wild "Primulinus" Gladiolus was discovered near Victoria Falls, South Africa. As we know the modern garden varieties of to-day it was inferior-but what was important it was rugged, floriferous and bore the purest yellow flowers known among Gladiolus. The celery should be nearly full grown before putting on our bleaching tubes. At this time, with plenty of moisture, heart growth is very rapid, and celery will often be in prime condition in from 8 to 14 days.

For the late or winter crops these bleachers can be put on just before banking, with soil they will prevent dirt from entering the heart of the plant The result, sanitary cleanliness, more than repays the cost, especially for private use.

The 6 x.2 size is usually used on medium or average size celery; the 6½ x 13 for large stalks. The 7 x 14 is best for very big celery, especially the green varieties. The bleachers should hug the celery close, but not tight. If an unusually large plant is encountered trim off a few leaves.

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### MAKE YOUR GARDEN WORK FULL TIME

The coming of peace has not brought plenty. Prices of vegetable foods are still high and THERE IS GREAT NEED FOR INCREASED HOME PRODUCTION OF FOOD IN THE GARDEN DURING 1921.

We therefore wish to impress upon our friends the importance of second and even third plantings of vegetable seeds during the months of June, July and August, which is not as generally practiced among home gardeners as it should be. In the list printed below we give the latest dates up to which seed may be sown in the latitude of New York.

YOU CAN DOUBLE THE OUTPUT OF YOUR GARDEN AND RAISE A HOST OF GOOD THINGS FOR THE TABLE FROM NOW ONWARDS UNTIL FROST ENDS GARDEN OPERATIONS.

The possibilities of your garden have by no means been exhausted when you have raised one crop of vegetables, and many of the thriftiest gardens are planted after June 1st. Many varieties of vegetables yield larger crops from summer sown seed, then from spring sown seed, because the weather

prevailing at the time the young plants attain any size is exactly suited to their requirements, and they are able to grow and complete their development without check.

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Summer is the best time in all the year to sow seeds of root crops, such as Carrot, Beet, Turnip and Ruta Baga. The young plants attain their true leaves when the weather is favorable to them, and grow right on without a check, consequently they are tender and palatable.

check, consequently they are tender and palatable.

For your health's sake, do not omit to put in more rows of SPINACH, indispensable and necessary on every table. Sow up to September 15th. Victoria, Thick-Leaved and Long Standing are good varieties to plant as they are great heat resisters. Don't waste any ground, but in odd corners sow radishes. Red Forcing Radish and Early White Tipped Searlet Turnip Radish succeed well at this time. Put in more sowings of Lettuce up to Aug. 15th. Besides the kinds specially mentioned there are many other seeds which may be sown during the summer with every assurance of reaping bountiful crops. The varieties marked "early" should be chosen for late plantings, because they mature more quickly than the varieties called "late."
