CULTURE—Sow every two weeks from early May until August for succession crops in the latitude of New York. Further south, sow earlier; further north, later. Plant two inches deep in drills two and one-half feet apart. Plant seeds two inches apart, thin out plants to stand four inches apart. They commence bearing in six to eight weeks. 2 lbs. to 100 feet of drill.

A Suggested Plan That Will Keep the Garden Busy Producing Delicious Vegetables from Early Summer to Late Fall

Honesty

The great charm of Perennials lies in their permanence. Once established they are a constant source of pleasure, and among the most interesting plants in our gardens, presenting a variety of size, form and color so great as to fit them for almost every conceivable purpose in the garden. Some may be made to thrive under most unkind conditions, while others require skilful cultivation. A very large proportion of the Perennial plants that may be grown from seed have great value as cut flowers, particularly so because of

their great substance, which enables them to stand up well long after

their great substance, which changed charm, they are most effective cutting. Notwithstanding their individual charm, they are most effective when planted in a mixed border, where by arranging them according to height, color and season of flowering, an attractive display may be had from the earliest days of spring, all through the summer, and even after the first frosts herald the approach of winter. Perennials are generally raised from seed sown from early spring to about August 1st, in the latitude of New York. Treated thus, they make strong plants which may be planted in a

time for development, and by sowing thus early, the growing season is proportionately prolonged. Others may be sown where they are to stand, in which case they require careful attention for the first

While there is no class of plants that will survive better under rigorous conditions, yet in order to achieve the best results they should be planted where they can obtain ample sunlight, may be easily watered, and, in case of early frost, may be quickly protected.

A continuity of bloom may be secured by occasional sowings of many sorts. In the latitude of New York these sowings may be made as late as June 15th.

Biennial Flower Seeds-These grow from seed the first year, then flower and die the following year. Some are grown as annuals.

These complete the cycle of their existence, growing from seed to seed in one year. Many sorts require to be sown in some sheltered situation such as a greenhouse, cold frame, or window box about a month before they may be planted outdoors. This is necessary not only on account of their tenderness, but also because they need more

STARTING PERENNIAL FLOWER SEED Perennials may be started indoors any time between the early part of January and the end of March. By starting the seed early, some varieties will flower the first season. The method followed, is the same as that ordinarily employed. A shallow box or flat about two inches deep should be filled with light sandy loam. A good loam will consist of one part ordinary garden soil, one part humus, and one part sand. Level and firm the soil in the box and sow the seed in rows about two inches apart. Then, with a smooth board press the seed into the soil. Next cover the seed by screening some of the loam through a piece of mosquito netting, being careful not to have the covering over four times the thickness of the seed. Depending on conditions, it will take from ten to thirty days for all the seeds to germinate. After the second set of leaves has developed, the seedlings should be transplanted into another shallow box, spacing them two inches apart each way.

During the late spring and summer months, perennial seed may be started in a small seed bed outdoors. Ask for our leaflet, "A Perennial Garden—From Seed."

PREPARATION OF THE SOIL FOR BEST **RESULTS WITH FLOWERS**

The principal object to keep in mind particularly for the successful cultivation of annual flowers, is that the plants complete their life cycle in the comparatively short period of from three to four months time. This naturally leads to the conclusion that although the soil should be well drained, the mechanical condition should be such as to permit the retention of a certain amount of moisture, in order to dissolve the plant foods in the soil, because plants must subsist entirely upon a liquid They are unable to absorb any food before it has first been disdiet. solved.

In order that the soil will be in proper mechanical condition, it must contain an abundance of humus. This can be supplied either through the medium of rotted stable manure, Peat Moss (see page 140) or Hyper Humus (see page 139). The humus material should be spaded in and thoroughly incorporated with the soil. For Annuals, the soil should be dug to a depth of 8 or 9 inches and for Perennials, to a depth of 12 inches or more. Plant food should be applied at the rate of 10 lbs. to 200 square feet. The Henderson Garden Fertilizer (described on page 139) is a well balanced plant food which contains all of the elements required for the successful growth of plants. The question is frequently raised regarding the soil preferences of various plants. Most garden soils, especially those that are inclined to be sandy, are either neutral or slightly acid. The great majority of garden flowers, especially the Annuals, prefer this type of soil. Those that in their natural habitat are found in woodlands, as well as a few others including Daisies, Lupines and Salvia, prefer an acid soil. Where the soil is found to be over-acid, it can be corrected with an application of Hydrated Lime (see page 140), or where it is necessary In order that the soil will be in proper mechanical condition, it must

an application of Hydrated Lime (see page 140), or where it is necessary to increase the acidity of the soil, this can be accomplished by applying Aluminum Sulphate (see page 140).
