## Ginsburg Battling Cancer

## Supreme Court justice has surgery for pancreatic cancer

WASHINGTON | Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg had surgery Thursday for pancreatic cancer, raising the possibility that one of the ideologically divided court's

leading liberals - and its only woman - might have to curtail her work or even step down before she had planned.

Ginsburg, 75, has been a justice since 1993. She has been increasingly vocal



Ginsburg in recent years about the

court's more conservative stances, especially after the appointments made by President George W. Bush.

Pancreatic cancer is often deadly, although the court said doctors apparently found Ginsburg's growth at an early stage. In 1999, she had colon cancer surgery, underwent radiation and chemotherapy, and never missed a day on the bench.

Ginsburg underwent the surgery at the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York. She will remain in the hospital for seven to 10 days, said her surgeon, Dr. Murray Brennan, according to the court. (AP)



## Labor Pick Put on Hold Over Taxes

Nominee's husband failed to pay liens on business for 16 years

WASHINGTON | Labor secretary nominee Hilda Solis became the latest Cabinet nominee to face questions



about unpaid taxes Thursday as a Senate panel abruptly postponed a scheduled vote on her confirmation.

The postpone-

Solis

ment came after revelations that Solis' husband settled tax liens on his California auto repair business this week that had been outstanding for as long as 16 years.

The discovery posed another headache for a White House already chafing after tax problems derailed other administration appointments, including Tom Daschle's nomination as health secretary.

White House spokesman Robert Gibbs insisted that Solis' own tax returns "are in order."

"She's not a partner in that business," Gibbs said. "So, we're not going to penalize her for her husband's business mistakes."

When asked whether the Solis nomination was in trouble, Gibbs said, "I don't believe it is at all." SAM HANANEL (AP)

## Lawmakers Pare Stimulus

President ratchets up pressure on Congress to finalize recovery bill

WASHINGTON | Senate moderates worked to cut tens of billions of dollars from economic stimulus legislation Thursday in hopes of clearing the way for passage as the government spit out grim new jobless figures and President Obama warned of more bad news ahead.

With partisan tensions rising, a Republican alternative with higher tax cuts and far less spending than the administration favors

### PRESIDENT OBAMA

was defeated on a pure party-line vote, 57-40. Other GOP attempts to make significant changes in the bill appeared doomed, too.

"The time for talk is over. The time for action is now," Obama declared as the Senate plodded through a fourth day of debate on the legislation. He implored lawmakers in both parties to "rise to this moment."

Increasingly, the events that mattered most were not the long roll calls on the Senate floor but the private conversations in that the White House and Democratic leaders sought to clear the bill.

"As I have explained to people in that group, they cannot hold the president of the United States hostage," said Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev. "If they think they're going to rewrite this bill and Barack Obama is going to walk away from what he is trying to do for the American people, they've got another thought coming."


Republicans countered that neither the president nor Democratic congressional leaders have been willing to seek common ground on the first major bill of the new administration.

"We're not having meaningful negotiations. ... It's a bad way to start," said Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz.

Nearly 20 senators from both parties met twice during the day and reviewed a list of possible cuts totaling nearly \$80 billion. They included the elimination of at least \$40 billion in aid to the states, which have budget crises of their own, and \$1.4 billion ticketed for the National Science Foundation.

The legislation is a blend of federal spending and tax cuts that supporters say can create or preserve at least 3 million jobs. Critics contend the bill is bloated with wasteful spending. DAVID ESPO (AP)

## **New Leads in Tylenol Case**

FBI may be on verge of solving nationwide 1982 poisoning deaths

**BOSTON** | James W. Lewis has a habit of getting into trouble. And a knack for getting out of it, too.

He was charged with killing and dismembering a man in Kansas City, Mo., in 1978, but the case was thrown out. He was jailed on rape charges decades later in Massachusetts but went free when the victim refused to testify.

And while authorities in Chicago have long suspected Lewis was responsible for the deadly 1982 Tylenol poisonings, the only thing they ever pinned on him was an extortion attempt against the maker of the pain reliever. No one was ever charged in the seven cyanide deaths.

Now the FBI says there are new leads in the Tylenol case, and on Wednesday seized a computer and boxes of files from Lewis' Bostonarea home. The mysterious and sudden flurry of activity has raised hopes of a long-awaited break in the sensational 26-year-old case.

"Up until yesterday, I thought

this would never be solved in my lifetime or ever," said Jack Eliason, whose sister, Mary McFarland, a 31-year-old mother, died after swallowing poisoned Tylenol.

Exactly why investigators have suddenly taken so much interest in the self-proclaimed "Tylenol Man" is unclear, but the FBI cited advances in forensic technology, along with publicity and tips that came in around the 25th anniver-

sary of the crime in 2007.

Caught after a nationwide manhunt in late 1982, Lewis gave investigators a detailed account of how the killer might have done it and eventually admitted sending a letter demanding \$1 million from the manufacturer of Tylenol to "stop the killing." But he said he was only trying to exploit the crisis, and denied he had anything to do with the deaths. (AP)

## Transit Company Loses Track of Murder Suspect

PHILADELPHIA | A private prison transportation company lost an attempted-murder suspect somewhere between Florida and Pennsylvania, leading to a search for the cuffed and shackled inmate, and drawing complaints that such companies are poorly regulated.

The discovery Thursday was at least the second escape in six months involving an inmate being moved by Prisoner Transportation Services of America LLC.

Authorities searched for the suspect who escaped late Wednesday or early Thursday while en route from Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Sylvester Mitchell, 33, was being extradited to face attempted murder charges in Philadelphia. (AP)

## Study: Coastal Areas Threatened Even More

Scientists say sea levels could rise higher than predicted as ice melts

WASHINGTON | Long-term sea level increases that could have a devastating effect on southern Florida and highly populated coastal areas may be even larger than once thought, a report suggests.

Some studies have suggested that melting of ice in Antarctica and other areas could raise sea levels by 16 feet to 17 feet over the long run, a potential threat to coastal areas such as Washington, D.C., New York City and California.

But a report in Friday's edition of the journal Science warns that factors not previously considered could one day boost that increase ..... to up to 21 feet in

some areas. The study did not list a time frame

The rise in sea level, in feet, that could eventually be seen in parts of the United States, according to the study. not list a time frame for such a dramatic change. But coauthor Peter Clark, a geoscientist at Oregon State University, stressed that they "aren't suggestme of the West Art

ing that a collapse of the West Antarctic Ice Sheet is imminent."

The most recent International Panel on Climate Change report estimated sea level rise of up to 3 feet by the end of this century. (AP)



### ISLAMABAD, PAKISTAN **Suicide Bombing at Shiite Mosque Kills 24 People**

A suicide bomber blew himself up among worshippers streaming toward a Shiite Muslim mosque on Thursday, killing 24 people and wounding dozens more. The bomb detonated in the city of Dera Ghazi Khan as a crowd approached the mosque for an evening prayer ceremony. Television footage showed bystanders and emergency workers trying frantically to help victims lying in the darkened street. (AP)

### COLOMBO, SRI LANKA **Prime Minister Rejects Calls** For Cease-Fire in Civil War

Sri Lanka's prime minister rejected calls for a cease-fire Thursday from donor countries worried by reports of growing civilian casualties in the South Asian nation's civil war, instead demanding the Tamil Tiger rebels' unconditional surrender. Sri Lankan forces captured the rebels' biggest sea base, effectively cutting off their supply point and pushing them to the brink of defeat. (AP)

## Iraqi PM's Allies Victorious in Vote

## Election results could bolster U.S. confidence in plans to pull troops

BAGHDAD | Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki's allies swept to victory over Shiite religious parties during last weekend's provincial elections in Iraq - a rousing endorsement of his crackdown on extremists, according to official results released Thursday.

The impressive showing, which must be certified by international and Iraqi observers, places al-Maliki in a strong position before parliamentary elections late this year and could bolster U.S. confidence that it can begin withdrawing more of its 140,000 troops.

The results were a major blow to Iraq's biggest Shiite religious party -

## **Pirates Release Ukrainian Freighter**

As U.S. Navy watches, Somali bandits count ransom, abandon ship

NAIROBI, KENYA | As U.S. Navy ships looked on, Somali pirates sped away Thursday with \$3.2 million in ransom after releasing an arms-laden Ukrainian freighter – ending a four-month standoff that focused the world's attention on piracy off Somalia's lawless coast.

The Navy said it couldn't seize

"We are not holding it [the ship] anymore," said Omar, adding that more than two dozen pirates made their escape aboard motorized skiffs.

The \$3.2 million booty - among the largest-ever reported ransoms - would be shared among the pirates, he said.

The Sept. 25 seizure of the MV Faina, loaded with Soviet-era tanks and other heavy weapons, was one of the most brazen in a surge of pirate attacks on shipping off the Somali COAST. KATHARINE HOURELD (AP)

## **Colombian Rebels Free Ex-Politician**

Sixth hostage released this week spent 6 years as captive of guerrillas

BOGOTA | A former provincial lawmaker was helicoptered to freedom in Colombia on Thursday after spending more than six years as a captive of leftist guerrillas.

The Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, or FARC, handed Sigifredo Lopez over to a humanitarian mission led by the Red Cross and an opposition senator, Red Cross spokesman Yves Heller told reporters.

Lopez then flew to the western city of Cali. Television broadcasts showed him descending from the

helicopter and embracing his wife, Patricia Nieto, and his sons Lucas and Sergio.

Wearing a small wooden cross around his neck, Lopez lifted his right hand in triumph and wept.

"I'm well, I'm well, thank you," he told a pack of reporters.

Lopez, 45, was the only one from a group of 12 who were abducted in April 2002 to survive a confusing attack in 2007. The FARC said at the time that he was being held in a different camp.

He is the sixth captive to be released this week by the FARC in what the rebels called a unilateral act aimed at starting talks on an exchange of hostages for imprisoned guerrillas. VIVIAN SEQUERA (AP)

## Israeli Navy Seizes Lebanese Ship

JERUSALEM | The Israeli navy intercepted a ship carrying humanitarian supplies from Lebanon to the Gaza Strip and towed the vessel into port Thursday, foiling a new attempt by international activists to break Israel's blockade of the Palestinian territory.

It was the first time Israeli forces seized an aid ship, after the navy let some boats in and turned others around

The interception was condemned by Lebanon and Syria, adding to tensions after last month's Israeli offensive against Hamas militants. (AP)

## **D.C. High-Speed Rail Gains Interest**

WASHINGTON | A top lawmaker on the House transportation committee says 80 groups have expressed interest in bringing high-speed rail to the Northeast region and across the nation.

The Federal Railroad Administration began soliciting proposals in December for projects to help build, finance and operate high-speed rail service between Washington and New York and 10 other areas across the U.S. Final proposals must be submitted by September 2009.

Rep. John Mica, R-Fla., said Thursday that those who have expressed interest include architectural, engineering and construction firms, train manufacturers and state transportation departments. (AP)

## Va. Smoking Ban Deal Set

## Governor, GOP House speaker agree to curb smoke in bars, eateries

RICHMOND, VA. | Gov. Timothy M. Kaine and House Republican leaders announced an agreement Thursday on a bill that would curb smoking in most public eateries and bars.

The bill represents a compromise between the Democratic governor's longtime backing for an outright ban on all smoking in bars and restaurants, and traditional Republican opposition to mandated smoking restrictions.

If passed, the measure will ban smoking except in private clubs and inside walled-off areas of restaurants designated for smoking

and served by a ventilation system separate from the one that serves nonsmoking parts of the establishment.

Kaine

In announcing the accord, House Speaker William J. Howell said the bipartisan compromise was off to a good start.

"The big difference this time is both sides were willing to yield," Howell said.

For years, bills to ban or curb smoking have failed to clear the

House, victims of the muscular tobacco lobby in a capital city that is home to the world's largest cigarette manufacturing plant.

This year at least 10 proposed smoking ban bills were introduced.

"It's not a perfect bill — compromises aren't perfect — but [it's a] very good bill," Kaine said at a press conference about the agreement.

House General Laws Committee Chairman S. Chris Jones said a total smoking ban never would make it out of his committee.

Howell, however, would not predict final passage. "There are people who are going to continue to oppose it," Howell said. "I'm never confident down here." BOB LEWIS (AP)

## Watchdog: Treasury Department overpaid for assets from banks

WASHINGTON | The federal government overpaid for stocks and other assets in attempting to help financial institutions last year, a government watchdog said Thursday, taking further issue with the beleaguered \$700 billion rescue program.

Elizabeth Warren, chairwoman of the Congressional Oversight Panel for the bailout funds, told the Senate Banking Committee on Thursday that Treasury in 2008 paid \$254 billion and received assets worth about \$176 billion.

The figures were reached by extrapolating the results of a study of 10 government transactions, comparing the price paid by Treasury and the value of the asset at the time of purchase.

In a bright spot for the rescue program, however, banks that received capital infusions from Treasury have already paid \$271 million in dividends to the federal government. A Treasury

official said Thursday that banks are expected to pay more than \$1.5 billion in dividends by the end of this month.

Referring to overpayment on assets, Warren said Treasury has failed to specify its goals and methods in helping more than 300 institutions.

"There may be good policy rea-

sons for overpaying, but without a clearly delineated reason, we can't know that," Warren said.

Senate Banking chairman Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., said the overpayment was sure to "raise eyebrows."

"I can understand some gap," he said. "But that's a pretty large disparity." JIM KUHNHENN (AP)

## List of Madoff Clients Includes Famous Names

NEW YORK | Broadcaster Larry King. Hall of Fame pitcher Sandy Koufax. World Trade Center developer Larry Silverstein.

The three have at least one thing in common: Their names appear on a list of several thousand clients of disgraced financial wizard Bernard Madoff. The list has been made public in a court filing in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Manhattan.

The list emerged late Wednesday, a testament to the sweeping nature of Madoff's alleged fraud. The 162-page list includes Madoff's relatives, prominent business people, celebrities and charitable institutions. The list does not say how much money the customers may have lost, nor does it spell out their specific connection to Madoff. (AP)

## Jobless Claims Soar After Wave of Layoffs

Government expected to release grim stats on employment Friday

WASHINGTON | New jobless claims jumped far more than expected last week in an already dismal labor market, and there's no relief in sight for workers.

The Labor Department reported Thursday that the number of newly jobless workers seeking benefits rose last week to a seasonally adjusted 626,000, from the previous week's upwardly revised figure of 591,000. The latest total is far more than analysts' expectations of 583,000.

The numbers reflect the large spate of layoffs announced last

month by companies from all sectors of the economy, including Cat-

erpillar Inc., Pfizer Inc. and Microsoft Corp. Economists

The percentage orders dropped at U.S. factories in December, a record fifthstraight monthly orders decline.

E conomists expect the government to issue a grim report Friday that will show the unemployment rate rose to 7.5 percent in January, up from

7.2 percent in December. That would be the highest rate in 17 years.

The housing slump and financial crisis have hammered spending by businesses and consumers, sending the economy into a recession that is expected to continue until at least the second half of this year. (AP)

## After an 'awful' losing streak, Georgetown seeks revenge vs. Cincy

HOYAS HOOPS | When Georgetown last played Cincinnati, coach John Thompson III's team was mired in a three-game losing streak and on its way to dropping five in a row.

Ten days later, the Bearcats come to Verizon Center against a Hoyas squad that's made progress - albeit just a little – toward getting its season back on track.

"We took a baby step today," Thompson said after a 10-point win over Rutgers Tuesday. "Losing is awful. It's awful. When you win, it feels good."

And although the Hoyas led by 20 in the second half over the lowly Scarlet Knights, it wasn't their offense that came to life to produce a much-needed win. Georgetown

"It sounds simple, but gaining that understanding [that] the shot we just missed can't affect [what] goes on at the other end on the next play [is difficult]. Forget that play and move on. When we miss shots, we've gotten angst, and lost focus and the understanding that we grind out victories."

# **Green Cooks Up Success**

## Returning from injury, defenseman back to slicing, dicing for Caps

CAPITALS | Mike Green can laugh about it now that he's in the midst of perhaps the best stretch of hockey he's ever played professionally, but when forced to sit out with a shoulder injury earlier in the season, the Capitals defenseman just didn't know what to do with all the free time.

"I was bored and frustrated," said Green. "I even was cooking, which I don't do."

His favorite dish to make is salmon, rice and cooked vegetables, something "you can't screw up too bad. I think I came back [from injury] a little too early because I couldn't stand [it] anymore."

Nowadays. the 23-year-old has taken to slicing and dicing opposing defenses, with goals in his past four games and 22 points in his last 16 contests to vault his name to the top of every major offensive category pertaining to defensemen in the NHL.

Heading into Thursday night's game against Los Angeles, Green is just two goals shy of matching his career high of 18 from last season, all while missing 13 games over the

course of November and December. He also ranks 11th in the league and first on the team in ice time, averaging 25:33 per game, while being a focal point of the Capitals' power play and penalty kill.

And it's when Green is on the man advantage that he truly ranks among the league's elite. He's tied for fifth in the league with teammate Alex Ovechkin with 12 power-play goals, many of which have come when Green sneaks into the offensive zone from the point for backdoor-style goals that leave penalty killers looking around for answers.

"This year, I'm a lot more com-

posed and smarter," said Green, whose biggest strength is his shiftiness carrying the puck.

Just this week, coach Bruce Boudreau even suggested his defensive star would be among the best in the NHL if he were to enter the fastest skater competition.

So, what can't he do? Up until recently, many would have said win the Norris Trophy as the league's best defensemen. That, like cooking, he may be trying his hand at SOON. MARK GIANNOTTO

## Olsen Works Through Pain in Comeback Try

## The vet hopes to make an impact after an injury-filled 2008

UNITED | The huge banner unfurled at last June's D.C. United-Los Angeles game read "Heart of a Lion." It was the return of veteran midfielder Ben Olsen, not David Beckham, that the RFK faithful were celebrating. But, unfortunately, Olsen also has the ankles of an old man, and the 15 minutes he played that day constituted his entire 2008 season.

Olsen is a two-time MLS champion and the winner of numerous individual awards. He played in the 2006 World Cup. He also is the scruffy face of United — a hardworking, thoughtful, passionate player who has fought through injury and consistently delivered the goods.

Now his career is in jeopardy. Four ankle surgeries in the past year to correct bone spurs, cartilage damage and infections have limited him to the point where "just getting through a training session" is a success. United and Olsen are in Florida this week preparing for the season. The midfielder, 31, doesn't know whether he'll play a part.

"I wish I could even give an edu-

cated guess. My hope, and a lot of it is wishful thinking, is to compete in games, help this team," Olsen said. "If I can't do that, then we kind of have to weigh the decision."

His contract is guaranteed this year, which provides a bit more time to work through the pain. But Marcelo Gallardo's departure has left the midfield unsettled, and last season's disappointing record has increased the pressure on a team needing a good start to 2009.

"At times, I feel I can play at this level. There's days where I think that I don't know how it'll hold up," he admitted. "I feel really fortunate that I've had the years that I've had. What takes me a little bit down sometimes is that I've got a lot more to give. ... If I can sneak another year I'm going do to what I can to make that happen." BRIAN STRAUS

# Not That Into It

## A highly anticipated romantic dramedy is less than cohesive

FILM | "He's Just Not That Into You" isn't exactly a romantic comedy at least, not in the most traditional sense. Yes, the characters work themselves into the same sorts of tizzies over falling in and out of love, but mixed in with the fizziness is an unexpected seriousness, an attempt at injecting realism.

All those A-listers in the ensemble cast (Jennifer Aniston! Scarlett Johansson!) are smiling in the movie's posters, but don't let that fool you. Some heavy stuff falls upon their pretty heads. But while it's admirable that the film from director Ken Kwapis tries to shake up a typically frivolous formula, too many other elements undermine his intentions.

Based on the best-selling advice book by Greg Behrendt and Liz Tuccillo, the script from Abby Kohn and Marc Silverstein ("Never Been Kissed") follows nine intertwined characters struggling to make sense of their love lives. The women, especially Ginnifer Goodwin's hopeless romantic Gigi, tend to be needy and demanding; the men, such as Bradley Cooper's cheating Ben, are often caddish and evasive.

We begin with Gigi's obsessing over the blind date she just had with Baltimore real estate agent Conor (Kevin Connolly). Winsome and attractive as she is, she's also annoyingly desperate, to the point where she drives herself and everyone else mad analyzing every "uh" and "er' she exchanges with a guy.

Thankfully, Conor's restaurantmanager pal Alex (Justin Long) is there to strip her of her girlish illusions. Alex gives her advice that's hilarious in its harshness: "Maybe he just didn't call because he has no interest in seeing you again." Long brings a charisma to this cruelty, and his scenes with Goodwin provide the film with refreshing honesty and zest.

Because from there, everything else is a downer. Gigi's co-worker, Beth (Aniston), has been living with her boyfriend Neil (Ben Affleck) for seven years, but he's never asked her to marry him. Their other colleague, Janine (Jennifer Connelly in a meaty performance), is married to her college sweetheart (Cooper), who's having an affair with yoga instructor Anna (Johansson).

Drew Barrymore, also an executive producer on the film, has a supporting role as the sales rep who helped place Conor's ad in the local gay newspaper; with the help of her flamboyant co-workers, she laments the way technology has actually made dating harder, but her observations aren't particularly funny or insightful. THE MIDWEST IS SO WEIRD AND SCAWY! THAT GUY'S HOT: Behold the premise of "New in Town," starring Renee Zellweger.



CHE (R, 257 minutes) In Steven Soderbergh's sprawling yet surprisingly taut two-part retelling of Che Guevara's life during the Cuban revolution and his illfated attempt to bring the fight to Bolivia, he comes into sharp, sympathetic focus, by way of an extraordinary performance by Benicio Del Toro. (AH)

**DEFIANCE** (R, 137 minutes) Edward Zwick's often-stirring movie dramatizes the true story of Zus and Tuvia Bielski (Liev Schreiber and Daniel Craig), Jewish brothers who eluded their Nazi captors during World War II in what is now Belarus. Zus and Tuvia helped a thousand fellow Jews escape the German SS and forged a resistance. Zwick has perfected the art of marrying bombastic action, aestheticized violence and historical import, and he marshals all three effectively to bring this little-known and amazing story to life. (AH) **FROST/NIXON** (R, 122 minutes) You expect something dry, historical and probably contrived here. But you get a delicious contest of wits, brilliant acting and a surprisingly gripping narrative — no less dramatic even though the results are a foregone conclusion. The writing is so good, the acting so powerful, that the film goes well beyond the courtroom drama into the territory of the classic history play. (PK)

HOTEL FOR DOGS (PG, 100 minutes) This comedy, starring perfectly pleasant upand-comer Emma Roberts (Julia's niece), is about kids, not parents. Andi (Roberts) and Bruce (Jake T. Austin) have been parentless for three years, smuggling their dog, Friday, from foster home to foster home, always getting evicted after infractions, violations or minor criminal acts. Deprived of affection, guidance and decent nutrition, Andi and Bruce stumble upon an abandoned hotel in downtown Los Angeles and decide to turn it into a home for unwanted pups. For all the latent social criticism of the film, it's a candy-coated romp through death and abandonment. (JA)

INKHEART (PG, 106 minutes) In Iain Softley's vivid, sometimes lurid adaptation of the young people's novel by Cornelia Funke, Brendan Fraser plays Mortimer "Mo" Folchart, a "silvertongue" who can make stories come to life by reading them aloud. Mo and daughter Meggie (Eliza Hope Bennett) travel to a Swisstown to search for an obscure novel called "Inkheart," which he was reading to Meggie when she was a toddler and things went desperately awry. (AH)

MY BLOODY VALENTINE 3-D (R, 101 minutes) No cartoon cuddliness in this handdrips-blood-in-your-lap exploitation picture that lacks the subtlety or horror foreplay of the original. The plot staggers from absurd to ridiculous, and we don't have enough time with any of the characters to wish them well in the face of certain death. But if horror in general is the last great communal movie experience, 3-D just heightens the shared fun. (ORLANDO SENTINEL)

**NEW IN TOWN** (PG, 96 minutes) There's nothing novel about this overly familiar farce, a creaky rom-com-cum-fish-outof-water tale about a tightly wound corporate executive (Renée Zellweger) who finds herself temporarily reassigned from sunny Miami to small-town Minnesota in the dead of winter. Throughout much

of the movie the actress's face annears botoxed into a frozen mask of misery. which melts only after meeting truckdrivin', beer-drinkin', plaid-wearin' hottie Ted (Harry Connick Jr.). But first Ted and Lucy have to act as though they hate each other. That is, until the handsome widower and single dad (all together now: awww) happens to have the opportunity to rescue the career-obsessed singleton when her car gets stuck in a blizzard, making her reevaluate her big-city priorities in the face of true love and a near-death experience. The real America, my foot. As Lucy remarks at one point, this whole endeavor looks like the world's coldest theme park. (MO)

NOT EASILY BROKEN (PG-13, 100 minutes) This spiritually infused melodrama falls prey to many of the usual shortcomings of movies that secretly want to be sermons: starchy contrivance and didacticism. But it also exerts an unmistakable appeal, thanks to an absorbing story and fine performances from Morris Chestnut and Taraji P. Henson. (AH)

**NOTORIOUS** (R, 100 minutes) This biopic about the life and death of Notorious B.I.G., feels like Biggie's Wikipedia page reformatted for the big screen. (CHRIS RICHARDS)

PAUL BLART: MALL COP (PG, 90 minutes) Even though this film was co-produced by Adam Sandler, it never sinks to scatological humor. That's pretty much where the accolades end for this mediocre, unmemorable comedy. Kevin James plays an overweight mall security officer named Paul Blart. On a particularly unfortunate Black Friday, a posse of thieves assumes control of the mall and starts to take hostages. (JEN CHANEY)

**THE READER** (R, 123 minutes) Bernhard Schlink's highly regarded novel receives a graceful, absorbing screen adaptation. Kate Winslet and Ralph Fiennes deliver fine performances as the tortured souls at the center of this wrenching portrait of Germany reckoning with its Nazi past. But the standout here is 18-year-old German actor David Kross, whose portrayal of a teenager Michael Berg suggests a promising future. (AH)

**REVOLUTIONARY ROAD** (R, 119 minutes) Sam Mendes' dirge-like adaptation of the 1961 novel by Richard Yates exerts an undeniable pull as its beautiful, doomed protagonists navigate the ennui of adult life in 1950s suburbia. Leonardo DiCaprio and Kate Winslet play Frank and April Wheeler, who are leading lives of not-very-quiet desperation. (AH)

SLUMDOG MILLIONAIRE (R, 121 minutes) The resourceful, unerringly grounded title character is Jamal Malik (Dev Patel), a lanky kid from the Mumbai slums whom we meet just after he wins 10 million rupees on India's own version of the "Who Wants to Be a Millionaire" TV show. Accused of cheating, Jamal is taken into custody by the Mumbai police, and he proceeds to tell them his story, a tale of one boy's decidedly unsentimental education by way of poverty, tribal strife, abandonment, exploitation, criminal gangs and star-crossed love. (AH)

TAKEN (PG-13,94 minutes) The story of an ex-CIA spook (Liam Neeson) who trains his deadly skills on the Albanian slavers who have kidnapped his daughter, the film *Continued on page 18*

Bryan Mills retired from his CIA job to be closer to his daughter, 17-year-old Kim (Maggie Grace), who lives in California with her mother (Famke Janssen). Kim wants to spend the summer in Europe despite the gualms of her dad, who sees danger around every corner. Needless to say, Bryan is right: Kim is nabbed less than an hour after landing at Charles de Gaulle airport, and it falls to her father to rescue her from the sex-slavery ring that plans to sell her to a sheik. The film is perhaps best viewed as a cautionary tale for nervous fathers as Neeson tears through the Parisian underworld. Its message: Dads, don't let your little girls go anywhere or do anything, ever. (DAN KOIS)

### UNDERWORLD: RISE OF THE LYCANS (R.

92 minutes) An impressive cast of British actors lend Shakespearean importance to this dark and hilariously grandiose

vampires-versus-werewolves saga. High school-age fans of gothic horror ought to be entertained. (JANE HORWITZ)

UNINVITED (PG-13, 87 minutes) This remake of the Korean "A Tale of Two Sisters" begins with teenage Anna (Emily Browning) in a mental institution. She can't get over dreams of the fire that killed her mother 10 months before, and she's troubled by visions of a creepy redhaired girl. Even so, her kindly shrink says it's time for her to go home. There she finds that her father (David Strathairn). a famous writer, has set up housekeeping with Rachael (Elizabeth Banks), the nurse who had been tending to Mom. Anna's smart-alecky older sister, Alex (Arielle Kebbel), is just disgusted by the whole thing. Soon the girls come to suspect that Rachael killed their mother. First-time directors Thomas and Charles Guard give the action a glossy polish and a properly measured pace. They also maintain the right narrative balance. Is Anna the victim of an archetypal wicked stepmother, or is she unstable? Experienced horror fans will probably stay one step ahead of the game, but it's still a nice ride. (мм)

WENDY AND LUCY (R. 80 minutes) A deliberately spartan tone poem of need and desperation, the film stars Michelle Williams in a role that is one long moment. Wendy is trying to make her way from Indiana to Alaska because she has a vague promise of work in a fish-packing plant. When her Honda breaks down, she's faced with repair bills she can't pay. Wendy steals food for her dog, Lucy, and she becomes the victim of a self-righteous store employee: "If a person can't afford dog food, they shouldn't have a dog!" Wendy later searches desperately for Lucy, who disappeared while she was under arrest. Williams' performance is nuanced, moving and well worth any awards she gets. But Wendy is also anonymous. We are provided almost nothing about her background. She could be anyone, and her circumstances anyone's. Which, of course, is writer Kelly Reichardt's point. We get the whole point. We just don't get the whole woman, despite a performance that puts flesh on words and pictures. (JA)

**THE WRESTLER** (R, 109 minutes) As washed-up one-time ringmaster Randy

"The Ram" Robinson, Mickey Rourke embodies the same tragedy of ego that afflicts his character. As good as Rourke is, his performance constantly begs the question of whether the story would be worth telling without him. Marisa Tomei, as Cassidy the pole dancer, delivers a courageous performance; both Randy and Cassidy exist in fairly shadowy worlds that thrive on youth, and both are aging out. But in the broader sense, Randy is another in a long line of American screen characters who are facing the inevitable and can't ease their regrets. We feel for him. And we feel for us. Maybe that's enough. (JA)







## Necco hopes to sell candy Sweethearts past Valentine's Day

After 162 years, the New England Confectionery Co. wants to be more than your valentine.

The maker of Sweethearts — the tiny heart-shaped candies inscribed with messages such as "I Love You" and "Kiss Me" — and other sugary nostalgia such as Mary Janes, Necco Wafers and Clark Bars says now is the perfect time to broaden its offerings, despite the recession and saturated candy market.

"It's the oldest multiline candy business in the United States. There are some iconic brands here that are just marvelous," said Necco's new chief executive, Richard Krause. "We thought it was an excellent opportunity to take this company to the next level."

When Necco opened in 1847, there were only 29 states in the Union, the Civil War had yet to start, and Abraham Lincoln was in Congress. It began making its signature Sweetheart Conversation Hearts in 1866, spreading G-rated messages of affection.

It has since introduced many themes, with hearts in Spanish or more modern messages such as "Text Me." It also offers Sky Bars, Double Dipped Peanuts and Thin Mints, but the tiny hearts are still Necco's best sellers.

Krause says if the company wants to survive in a global economy — and take advantage of consumers' need for less-expensive entertainment — it needs a little change of its hearts.

Next month, Necco plans to unveil a new line of Sweethearts connected to "Twilight" — the young-adult vampire-romance book series. They'll be released at the same time as the DVD of the movie and feature such sayings as "Bite Me," "Bedazzle" and "Live 4 Ever."

In addition, around Memorial Day, Necco will introduce a "Red, White and You" series aimed at veterans returning from Iraq with



messages like "Proud" and "Love | the USA."

"We're going outside of just the seasons," said Jackie Hague, the company's new vice president of marketing. "And during the seasons we want to expand at the right time. And these brands are perfect for that."

Krause, who joined the company in August as its chief operating officer, said Necco needs to expand its brand in the U.S. now so it is in a better financial position to expand globally later. He is aiming for 30 percent growth within two years for Necco, whose annual revenue has hovered around \$100 million since 2005.

Necco isn't the first confection-

ery company to try expanding a seasonal product's appeal.

Brach's Confections, now owned by Farley's & Sathers Candy Co., began seven years ago to expand its Candy Corn brand beyond Halloween, said company spokeswoman Michelle Graber. The conical sweets can now be found year-round in a variety of flavors and colors, including a pink and white version at Valentine's Day.

"It's been very successful for us," said Graber.

Pat Conroy, a consumer products expert at accounting and consulting firm Deloitte & Touche USA, said any move by Necco to seek new markets outside its traditional seasonal push could work if the

company doesn't try to redefine squa itself too fast.

"They are competing for the footprint in consumers' minds," Conroy said. "They've got a kind of brand image that's recognized, so they must have a clear basis for differentiating any new brands they are taking on."

Toward the goal of streamlining, Necco will replace some of the machinery at its new 820,000square-foot factory.

"Some of this equipment ... we've been using since the 1930s," said Manny Da Costa, Necco's facility manager.

As for releasing new products during a recession, Conroy said candy is inexpensive.

"People still like to reward themselves," said Conroy. "At the end of the day, a little candy won't tilt their budgets." RUSSELL CONTRERAS (AP)

### Did you need a crash course in biology to play a doctor?



# King Bling

As a kid, Alexis Bittar earned pocket money selling vintage jewelry on the then-mean streets of New York's East Village. Today, he can legitimately call himself a rock star, since he makes a living creating rings, bracelets and baubles that merge contrasting elements (Lucite and crystals; sleek gold and rough gems) in a city-cool way. Bittar talks about the bijoux biz Wednesday at 7 p.m. at the Corcoran Gallery of Art (500 17th St. NW: 202-639-1770). Find his work locally at haute spots such as Terra (1706 Connecticut Ave. NW; 202-232-8581) and Tabandeh (5300 Wisconsin Ave. NW; 202- $244 extsf{-}0777$ ). Cory ohlendorf

How'd you get started designing? I grew up in Brooklyn. In high school, I started spending more time in the city. I was selling vintage pieces [in Brooklyn], and for my birthday, my parents bought \$200 worth of costume jewelry to get me started selling in Manhattan. Then jewelry got harder for me to find, so it was easier to make it.

### l love the signature Lucite pieces. How'd those come about?

While I was selling antique jewelry, Bakelite was having this moment. It was all hand-sculpted plastic treated like something precious. Lucite is similar. I love how you can manipulate the colors. It's beautiful how it reflects the light.

## After 20 years in the business, what changes have you seen?

When I started, it was all big '80s pieces. Then around 1994, minimalism hit, and everyone wore all black or grunge. People forgot how to wear jewelry. But it exploded after the [new] millennium, and people started piling it on. Jewelry was like the naughty stepchild; now it's a staple again. Are you a big jewelry guy yourself? I used to wear a lot of it — these big heavy chains, like a thick 1950s Hermes necklace. But, slowly, I've traded it for tattoos.

Michelle Obama is a fan of costume jewelry. Any thoughts on her style? The first lady becomes this ambassador for fashion for the whole country and the whole world. Michelle Obama does such a good job of mixing mainstream and high-end, and embracing the up-and-comers. She really looks the part while still looking modern.

## What inspired your spring designs?

We looked at paintings of Gauguin and designs of Elsa Schiaparelli. [The spring line] has this feeling of classic jewelry that's slightly disproportionate and surreal. And then I was also inspired by the club Boombox in London, where all the kids were going back in the '80s. That means pieces that were very multilayered, very Grace Jones.

## Any muses besides Jones?

There are two people who I find incredibly stylish. One is Marie-Amelie Sauve, a stylist for French Vogue who styles the runway shows at Balenciaga. When I'm designing I think, "Would she think this is cool?" And Tilda Swinton. She's just strong and beautiful.

## When you're not in the studio, where might we find you?

I love going to flea markets and discovering things. And one of my great luxuries is travel. So, I love going out of town and staying at some "ye olde inn."


