

# **Pentagon Mulls Drone Cutbacks**

# Military leaders say they have enough to wage future wars

#### Langley Air Force Base

The Pentagon for the first time is considering scaling back the massive buildup of drones it has overseen in the past few years, both to save money and to adapt to changing security threats and an increased focus on Asia as the Afghan war winds down.

Air Force leaders are saying the military may already have enough unmanned aircraft systems to wage the wars of the future. And the Pentagon's shift to Asia will require a new mix of drones and other aircraft because countries in that region are better able to detect unmanned versions and shoot them down.

If the Pentagon does slow the huge building and deployment pro-

**Overall, Pentagon spending** on unmanned aircraft has jumped from \$284 million in 2000 to nearly \$4 billion in the past fiscal year, while the number of U.S. drones has rocketed from fewer than 200 in 2002 to at least 7,500 now.

The discussions to consider scaling back on drones may trigger heated debate because drones have become so important to the military. They can provide 24-hour patrols over hotspots, gather intelligence by pulling in millions of terabytes of data and hours of video feeds, and they can also launch precisely targeted airstrikes without putting a U.S. pilot at risk. (AP)

Those strikes were brought center stage last week during the confirmation hearing for White House counterterror chief John Brennan, President Barack Obama's pick to lead the CIA. Mike Hostage, commander of Air Combat Command, said senior leaders are analyzing the military's drone needs and discussions are beginning. But he said the current number patrolling the skies overseas may already be more than the service can afford to maintain.

"We are trying to do the analysis and engage in the discussion to say at some point the downturn in operations and the upsurge in capabilities has got to meet," Hostage said.

The analysis began before Brennan's confirmation hearings, where he was questioned sharply about the CIA's use of drones to kill terror suspects, including American citizens overseas. The CIA gets its attack drones from the Air Force fleet, but any decision to stop building them would be unlikely to have any effect on that program. LOLITA C. BALDOR (AP)

# **3 Die in Del. Courthouse Shooting**

Police: Gunman kills women before dying in deadly exchange

Wilmington, Del.

A gunman who spent years in court battles over child custody disputes opened fire Monday in the lobby of a Delaware courthouse, leaving two women dead before police fatally shot him, authorities said.

"It happened so fast," said Jose Beltran, 53, an employee at the New Castle County Courthouse who was entering the lobby when he heard two shots. He said he turned around and heard three or more shots as he ran.


Shavack said the suspected gunman and two women are dead. He said two police officers suffered non-life-threatening injuries. Delaware Attorney General Beau Biden said at a news conference that the shooting was not a random act of violence.

"It's developed out of a long, over the course of many years, custody dispute in the courts of this state," he said.

Earlier, Shavack said the gunman opened fire before he passed metal detectors in the lobby.

"The violence today has saddened and horrified all of us," Delaware Chief Justice Myron T. Steele said in the statement. "I know I can speak for our entire judiciary in thanking the Capitol Police for risking their lives to protect as many of our citizens and employees as they could." RANDALL CHASE (AP)

# **Northeast Commuters Struggle**

Hartford, Conn.

The workweek opened with a whiteknuckle ride Monday in the snowclobbered Northeast as drivers encountered unplowed streets, twolane roads reduced to a single channel and snowbanks so high it was impossible to see around corners.

Schools remained closed across much of New England and New York, and about 140,000 homes and businesses were still waiting for the electricity to come back on after an epic storm swept through Friday and Saturday with 1 to 3 feet of snow.

The storm was blamed for at least 15 deaths in the U.S. and Canada, and officials warned of a new danger as rain and higher temperatures set in: roof collapses.

Connecticut Gov. Dannel P. Malloy said there have been about six roof collapses so far involving barns and other structures.

Most major highways were cleared by Monday, but the volume of snow was just too much to handle on many secondary roads. In hard-hit Connecticut, where some places were buried in more

than 3 feet of snow, the National Guard used heavy equipment to clear roads in the state's three biggest cities.

Flights resumed at major airports in the region, and the number of homes and businesses without power was down from a peak at 650,000. Nearly 120,000 of those still waiting were in Massachusetts.

While many attempted to resume their routines, others

remained hopelessly stranded.

In North Haven, Conn., First Selectman Michael Freda said that with many driveways still to be cleared, people were running out of heating oil and prescription medication.

"What this is creating, particularly in the senior citizen sector, is a bit of psychological anxiety, which is creating a lot of emotion," he said. MICHAEL MELIA (AP)

Many in Germany haven't had an easy relationship with Pope Benedict XVI, but most on Monday praised their countryman's courage in deciding to step down from his position amid failing health. Chancellor Angela Merkel, a Protestant, said the pontiff's decision "earns my very highest respect." Unlike Polish-born predecessor John Paul II, Benedict hasn't enjoyed undivided admiration in his country, which is roughly evenly split between Catholics and Protestants and where many didn't appreciate his conservative approach. (AP)

"He can't quit like that," said Alis Ramirez of Caracas, Venezuela. "This can't be."

"Nobody was expecting it. It was quite a shock," said Cardinal Thomas Collins of Toronto, Canada.

Many Catholics, however, praised Benedict for bravery and modesty in deciding to step aside.

The news also brought reawakened calls for a more energetic successor from a developing country. The church has been battered by sex-abuse scandals in the northern hemisphere, but the number of believers is growing in Africa, and half the world's Catholics live in Latin America.

"We need someone young who can bring back the dynamism to the church," said Zulma Alves, a cook in Rio de Janeiro.

In Lagos, Nigeria's largest city, trader Chukwuma Awaegwu put his feelings simply Monday: "If I had my way, an African should be the next pope, or someone from Nigeria."

But in the end, "it doesn't matter who it is: be it a Latino, European or Asian," said Ferya Caicedo of Pradera, Colombia. "This world is crazy, with lots of violence, lots of corruption. We are killing one another for crumbs and we need God's messenger, whoever it may be." JULIANA BARBASSA (AP)

# **Syrian Rebels Capture Major Dam**

#### Beirut

Syrian rebels captured the country's largest dam Monday after days of intense clashes, giving them control over water and electricity supplies for much of the country in a major blow to President Bashar Assad's regime.

The rebels had already seized two other dams on the Euphrates River. But the latest conquest, the al-Furat dam in northeastern Raqqa province, was a major coup for the opposition. It handed them control over water and electricity supplies for both government-held areas and large swathes of land the opposition has captured over the past 22 months of fighting.

# Will Tunnels Take Priority?

Q When considering future priorities, how expensive would the proposed walking tunnels be relative to new rail options? I'd think they'd be much less complicated, improve passage in the middle of the system for existing traffic, and take traffic away from transfer points.

I think the pedestrian tunnels between Farragut North and Farragut West and between Metro Center and Gallery Place would be a huge improvement. And the price tag also would be huge: About a billion dollars.

And that estimate is in 2012 dollars, without any detailed engineering studies that might reveal additional costs.

In the draft of Metro's longrange plan — the thing called "Momentum" — these tunnels are a target for 2025. But my guess is that very few people commuting today will ever walk through them.

What is the status of the Silver Spring Transit Station? I go past it every day, twice a day, and I swear I have never seen any work being done. This is striking me as a bad, overwrought idea from the get-go.

This is a Montgomery County fiasco. The county government is talking about the possibility of the downtown transit center opening in September, but there aren't many reasons to believe that will happen.

The idea of collecting transit services in one place and using it as a focal point for downtown development was pretty good. The execution was terrible.

It isn't so much that this moderately sized concrete and steel garage is taking longer to complete than the Beltway HOT lanes. The issue is more that bus riders and pedestrians have been inconvenienced for years by this project.

**Q** This weekend will be the third-straight in which the Red Line has a significant amount

of single-tracking for riders from Silver Spring, where I live. My response has been to make plans that don't involve Metro, mostly substituting driving. Do Metro ridership statistics show a decline in weekend ridership since the aggressive maintenance program started?

Metro ridership dropped on weekends last year. If that's because people are discouraged about the weekend service, it would make sense. Why would anyone ride Metrorail on a weekend if they didn't have to?

I agree that Metro needs to do the work. But I don't see why the communications with weekend riders can't be better. At least, Metro's online Trip Planner should reflect the delays.

This is going to continue for four more years, at this intense level.

# **Region Boasts Broad Affluence**

# Census shows 1 in 7 households in top 5 percent of incomes

#### Washington

One in 7 households in the Washington region have incomes that propel them into the top 5 percent, the third-highest level in the nation, new census figures released Monday show.

Only the metro areas of Bridgeport, Conn., and San Jose, Calif., have higher concentrations of highincome households.

Washington, with 14 percent of all households in the top 5 percent, has a higher share than the areas surrounding San Francisco and New York City.

The upper tier is composed of households with incomes above about \$191,500, so many who are in that group consider themselves solidly middle class. Washington owes its ranking largely to the predominance of two-income, collegeeducated households.

The broad affluence, which was barely dented even as the rest of the country went through a crippling recession, has helped fuel a transformation in Washington and its suburbs.

More luxury retailers have opened in the region's choicest

neighborhoods, and housing prices dipped rather than collapsed before climbing back up again.

But the higher cost of living that accompanies such widespread prosperity has squeezed the mid-

dle class and pushed even longtime residents into more distant suburbs where housing costs less. The costs also make it more expensive to do business here, as employers must pay bigger salaries and benefits to lure talent.

"I'd rather be at the top than the bottom, so it's mostly good," said Jim Dinegar, head of the Greater Washington Board of Trade. "But there's beginning to be a backlash from around the country of people saying, 'Gee, the greater Washington area is successful and the rest of us are suffering.' That's just not healthy.' # **McDonnell May Compromise On Va. Gas Tax**

#### McLean, Va.

Virginia Gov. Bob McDonnell says he's willing to compromise on a key detail of his \$3 billion transportation package to get it through the state Senate.

At a news conference Monday in McLean, McDonnell said he would consider a plan that does not fully eliminate the state's 171/2 cents-pergallon gasoline tax.

If legislators want to phase the gas tax out over time, or leave a reduced gas tax in place, McDonnell, a Republican, said he would consider it.

McDonnell's proposal calls for abolishing the gas tax and replacing the money by increasing the sales tax from 5 to 5.8 percent. (AP)

# Stunning Departure

# The pope, bucking 600 years of tradition, plans to resign, leaving the church in flux

#### Vatican City

With a few words in Latin and citing his advanced age, Pope Benedict XVI did Monday what no pope has done in more than half a millennium, announcing his resignation and sending the already troubled Catholic Church scrambling to replace the leader of its 1 billion followers by Easter.

Not even the 85-year-old pope's closest associates had advance word of the news, a bombshell that he dropped during a routine morning meeting of Vatican cardinals. And with no clear favorites to succeed him, another surprise likely awaits when the cardinals elect Benedict's successor next month.

"Without doubt this is a historic moment," said Cardinal Christoph Schoenborn, a protege and former thePapal Process

Pope Benedict XVI's announcement Monday that he will resign sets in motion a complex sequence of events to elect the next leader of the Roman Catholic Church. Here's how it works:

**Summoning** The Vatican convenes a conclave of cardinals that must begin 15-20 days after Benedict's Feb. 28 resignation. Cardinals eligible to vote — those under age 80 — are sequestered and take an oath of secrecy.

**Balloting** Two ballots are held each morning and two each afternoon in the Sistine Chapel. A two-thirds majority is required to win election.



**Smoke Signal** Ballots are burned after each round. Black smoke means no decision; white smoke signals that cardinals have chosen pope and he has accepted.

**Introduction** The new pope is introduced from the loggia overlooking St. Peter's Square with the words "Habemus Papam!" (Latin for "We have a pope!") and he then imparts his first blessing. (AP)

Many of his stated priorities as pope also fell short: He failed to establish relations with China, heal the schism and reunite with the Orthodox Church, or reconcile with a group of breakaway, traditionalist Catholics.

And hard as he tried to heal the church's wounds, Benedict's message was always clouded by his wooden personal style. No globe-trotting showman or media darling like John Paul, Benedict was an academic to the core. He spoke in paragraphs, not sound bites. In recent years, his declining health made him seem increasingly fragile and somewhat disengaged in public.

As a top aide, Benedict watched from up close as Pope John Paul II suffered publicly from the Parkinson's disease that enfeebled him in the final years of his papacy. Clearly, Benedict wanted to avoid the same fate as his advancing age took its toll, though the Vatican said the announcement was not prompted by a specific malady.

"After having repeatedly examined my conscience before God, I have come to the certainty that my strengths due to an advanced age are no longer suited" to the demands of being the pope, he told the cardinals.

Popes are allowed to resign, but few have — and none for a very long time.

The last pope to resign was Pope Gregory XII, who stepped down in 1415 in a deal to end the Great Western Schism, a dispute among competing papal claimants.

When Benedict was elected in 2005 at age 78, he was the oldest pope chosen in nearly 300 years. At the time, he had already been planning to retire as the Vatican's chief orthodoxy watchdog to spend his final years writing in the "peace and quiet" of his native Bavaria. (AP) **Sports**

# Indiana

Case for: The Hoosiers are atop the toughest conference, and their three losses are respectable — No. 11 Butler, No. 20 Wisconsin and at Illinois. Indiana is the most complete team in the country, with a dominant inside presence (Cody Zeller), quality shooters to spread the floor (Christian Watford, Jordan Hulls) and a do-everything, super-athletic swingman (Victor Oladipo).

Reason to be wary: Indiana hasn't proven to be reliable in close-game situations. The Hoosiers are 2-3 in games decided by five points or less. On Thursday, the Illini scored the game-winning bucket on a wide-open layup from an inbounds pass with 0.9 seconds left.



# Duke

**Case for:** The Blue Devils are the only two-loss team from a major conference, and they have the best nonconference résumé with victories over Kentucky, Louisville, Ohio State, Minnesota, VCU and Temple. Duke has an elite insideout combination with Mason Plumlee and Seth Curry. Plumlee has 13 doubledoubles this season and is averaging 18.2 points and 10.7 rebounds a game.

**Reason to be wary:** With Ryan Kelly, this is the best team in the country, but the senior forward has missed the past eight games with a foot injury. Kelly is a reliable scorer who can rebound and space the floor. Without him, Duke lost by eight to N.C. State and by 27 to Miami.



# Miami

**Case for:** There hasn't been a hotter team than the Hurricanes, who are 10-0 in the ACC and have won 11 straight games. They are coming off a 26-point win over North Carolina after beating Duke by 27 points last month. Miami is led by the dynamic backcourt of Durand Scott and Shane Larkin, who combine to average 27 points a game.

**Reason to be wary:** It was in November and they were without Scott, but the Hurricanes lost to Florida Gulf Coast by 12 points. While Miami is solid, it isn't really dominant in any particular area — not ranking atop the ACC in any major category except the standings. In March, teams need to have something to rely on.



# **Syracuse**

**Case for:** Without James Southerland, the Orange's offense struggled. But with Southerland's return on Sunday, Syracuse scored 77 points (a mark the Orange didn't reach as they went 4-2 without him) in a rout of St. John's. Syracuse's 2-3 zone has been consistent all year — the Orange rank fourth in the country in field goal percentage defense (36.6 percent).

Reason to be wary: Michael Carter-Williams leads the country in assists (8.5 per game), but he also is averaging 3.6 turnovers a game. The Orange are in the middle of the Big East in field goal percentage (45.3 percent), and they go through stretches when they don't get quality shots. JEFFREY TOMIK (EXPRESS)

# **Eagles, QB Vick Agree to a Restructured Contract**

Quarterback Michael Vick has agreed to a restructured deal with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Vick, who was injured and inconsistent last season, eventually giving way to rookie Nick Foles, now has a one-year contract for the 2013 season and will compete with Foles over the next nine months to see who will run new coach Chip Kelly's offense.

Vick, who returned to start the season finale vs. the New York Giants in December because Foles was injured, finished the season with 2,362 yards passing, 13 total touchdowns and 10 interceptions. The Eagles finished 4-12 and in last place in the NFC East. Andy Reid was fired as coach the day after the season ended, and Kelly was hired last month. Vick, who will be 33 when next season begins, is still elusive when healthy, and seems equipped to run Kelly's aggressive, up-tempo offense that he is bringing to the Eagles from Oregon.

"He wanted to be here," Kelly said Monday. "I had never met him before. The one thing that attracted me to him is Michael is a competitor. Nick is, too. You want guys who want to compete."

The new contract replaces the six-year, \$100 million contract Vick signed in 2011. He was signed by Philadelphia in 2009 and became the starter in 2010. He led the Eagles that season to an NFC East title.

There are questions about Vick's durability, as he seems far removed from that resurgent 2010 season. He finished that year with 3,018 yards passing, 676 yards rushing and 30 total touchdowns. ROB MAADDI (AP)



# Cardinals' Carpenter Hopeful He'll Be Back

#### MLB

St. Louis Cardinals pitcher Chris Carpenter hasn't ruled out pitching again, including this year.

If that seems remarkable, remember that Carpenter's sporadically brilliant career has included several comebacks from injury.

The 37-year-old Carpenter met with reporters at Busch Stadium on Monday as pitchers and catchers reported to spring training in Jupiter, Fla. Last week, the team said it wasn't counting on the longtime staff ace this season, shut down this time due to apparent circulation problems that left his pitching hand aching and discolored for hours after he left the mound.

Against odds, perhaps, there's dogged optimism.

"Maybe I don't ever want it to end," Carpenter said. "I don't think I'll ever retire, to be honest with you. I'll never say that word. There might always be hope. Maybe like when I'm 48 I can come back and pitch some more."

The 2005 NL Cy Young winner plans on meeting with team medical personnel once they return to St. Louis after conducting physical exams in Florida. He hadn't responded to text messages from well-wishers, nor one from Dr. Greg Pearl of Dallas, who performed radical surgery last July to relieve nerve compression in the shoulder that involved removing a rib, because he "didn't know what to say."

"It was supposed to be fine," Carpenter said. "And it hasn't been. So we'll see what happens."

When Carpenter was shut down last spring, the symptoms were numbness and tingling up and down the right side of the body, including his face. Carpenter was confident he'd be ready to go, but he had to cut short his first attempt throwing off a mound. He gave it a few more tries before informing the team. R.B. FALLSTROM (AP)








# **Guinea Pig** | Watch This

People want a strapping chest, not a chest strap. That's why pulses are racing for the Mio Alpha (\$199, Alphaheartrate.com), a watch that reads your heart rate through your wrist. Our numbers seemed on target even when we weren't — the gizmo beeps and emits a blue flash if you fall below your target zone and a red one if you overdo it. It required a snug fit to get a reading, but we're willing to get cozy with such a catch.



Although it's a fairly simple move, it requires working together and putting faith in another person. And that's really the basis for all AcroYoga, both the athletic positions that demand strength and the therapeutic ones that call for complete passivity. (A partner can serve as a human traction machine, helping someone use gravity to let loose.)

In every session, the goal is to do something that didn't seem possible before. That might be balancing in handstand on someone else's palms, or it might be trusting a stranger to fly you. Whatever the goal, Nemer says, people learn that they're capable of much more than they realized.

"That carries off the mat and into their personal life," adds Nemer, who sees the potential for using AcroYoga to foster peace in the Middle East and instill confidence in children touched by tragedy.

Another upcoming outlet for AcroYoga? Gyms. Nemer has developed a curriculum for AcroYoga Fitness — a class that centers on circuit partner training — that he expects to roll out this summer.

# AcroYoga co-creator Jason Nemer lifts more than just spirits

Some people dream of shaking hands with the president, or maybe sharing a beer with him. Jason Nemer's dream is a little different: "I want to fly Mr. Barack Obama."

Nemer is the co-creator of AcroYoga, a practice that melds the spectacle of circus arts with the healing power of massage and the breathwork of yoga. And when he talks of "flying," he doesn't mean in an airplane — he does enough of that while teaching his techniques around the globe. Rather, Nemer imagines lifting Obama off

the ground, so the POTUS can feel the freedom of posing in midair.

"I'd teach him that he doesn't need to carry everything," says Nemer, who'll get closer in proximity

to his dream this month when he comes to Logan's Flow Yoga Center to lead an immersion course.

This will be his first time teach-

ing in Washington, although AcroYoga has already established a presence in the area through workshops at various yoga studios, as well as practice sessions in Meridian Hill Park.

Nemer

AcroYogis "jamming" in public

spaces is what's built up the program so quickly, Nemer says. He and cofounder Jenny Sauer-Klein met in December 2003, when both were training at Circus Center San Francisco, and they started teaching the next month. Soon, they were certifying other instructors and watching AcroYoga help thousands of people conquer fears and connect with others.

The combination of Nemer's and Sauer-Klein's interests has historical precedent: Krishnamacharya, called the "father of modern yoga," was inspired by British gymnastics and "flew" a few people himself in the first half of the 20th century. Since then, others have toyed with blending yoga with acrobatics or with massage.

"There's been flirting between them for a long time," Nemer says. But there's never been such a need for this practice until now, he adds. "Our society has moved so much to this cyber world that we don't touch other humans. We need to get to laugh and play and learn about communicating."

# **A Problem-Child Problem?**

I am seeing some signs of aggression in my 4-year-old that worry me. His father has had anger issues (we are no longer together), and I wonder if it is too early to start worrying about this? Some of my friends say I am overreacting, but they don't see what I see and I wonder if they're just being nice. WORRIED MOM, VA

You might be overreacting; it's hard to know. Some kids go through developmentally normal pushy phases that soon work themselves out; other times, today's preschool shoving turns into tomorrow's outof-control punching.

But the penalty for overreacting is a lot milder than the penalty for underreacting when it comes to aggressive and perhaps violent behavior in young children. Talk with his pediatrician out of his earshot and get the name of a behavioral specialist — hopefully a psychologist — with whom you can get a consult.

But don't view your child's genetics as destiny. The way you raise him (and that, of course, includes how you let your husband influence his life) will likely be far more important than his DNA in terms of his behavior.

# Packing It Up Isn't the Answer

My mother is emotionally unstable, has suffered from depression and alcoholism, and has a hard time draw-

ing boundaries. She is way too quick with an opinion about my husband's job search, when we should have kids, how we should decorate our home, everything you can think of. She stops by all the time. It's gotten to the point that my husband wants to move. I can recognize his frustration, but I also think she would lose it if we left her — both my siblings live out West. MARITAL TENSION

It sounds like you can understand your husband's perspective, and you might want to get away yourself but feel guilty about that. But what's the history here, and where's the middle ground? Have you ever tried drawing more boundaries where you are? Have you tried to get her into treatment, or better treatment?

This isn't about geography; it's about whether you're willing to prioritize your marriage and stand up for your partner — and how you plan to handle a parent who's not well. Talk with him about what changes you are willing to make to stand up to her. Here. Now. And if you can't do it, then be willing to get help in trying.

# 'Fifty Shades of Grey' inspires the use of an unusual exercise prop

To spice things up for February, Washington Sports Clubs in North Bethesda has introduced Tough Love boot camp, a workout designed to be by the book. And in this case, that book is the risque novel "Fifty Shades of Grey."

"We have bars, bands and blindfolds," instructor Libby Linden Rubin announced at the debut class Thursday, in a joking reference to the best-seller's bedroom antics.

There's nothing all that sexy, however, about the props in this context. Those bars are weights that need to be lifted, and the resistance bands boost the difficulty level of various exercises. As for the sleep masks, they're a way to turn every move into a balance challenge.

"You'll notice your muscles engaging and be more in tune with your body," Rubin said, warning that the sightless sensation might not be right for everybody. "If you don't like that feeling, it's an option, of course, to take it off."

During "chapter one" of the class, students pair off for partner exercises, starting with the wheelbarrow. Everyone remembers the childhood classic: One person walks upright while carrying the legs of a partner, who's moving on just his or her hands. Tough Love students graduate to a harder version that adds a resistance band around the ankles of the walker and a mask on the partner.

Not only is it more physically demanding that way, but it also requires more communication. The person in front doesn't know where to stop to prevent smacking into a wall.

which are performed solo, students have no one to trust but themselves. Rubin has students do one set normally before the masks come on to emphasize just how odd it is to step, jump and reach without visual cues. 





American system in the minds of viewers and shaping expectations of how politics and governing should look. So has the kind of politicking served up on the screen become so ingrained that it is blowing back into the reality of governing?

Take, for example, the ongoing fiscal crisis, which has seemingly been going according to script. Every few months, the country faces a looming fiscal deadline - tax cuts are set to expire and the nation's debt limit needs to be raised or automatic spending cuts are to take effect.

Act 1 has both Democrats and Republicans calling for compromise and talking of grand bargains. # **Follow the Bouncing Ball**

The lyric music video isn't new (see Dylan), but it's gaining use as a promotional tool

## Music

The lyric music video — which features words onscreen while a song plays — is not a new phenomenon. Some consider Bob Dylan the pioneer of the lyric video: His 1965 song "Subterranean Homesick Blues" featured the singer holding up large cue cards with the song's lyrics.

These days, lyric videos are used to promote new songs, giving fans something to hold on to between a song's release and the launch of an official music video. It has become a part of the marketing repertoire for many of music's top acts, including Taylor Swift, Katy Perry, Prince, Justin Bieber and Ke\$ha.

Justin Timberlake, who recently released a lyric video for his new single "Suit & Tie," took things to new heights when the clip broadcast on TV — MTV to be exact.

"As soon as we knew [Timberlake's label] was going to push out a lyric video, we proactively asked them to let us make this an event the biggest way possible," says Amy Doyle, MTV's executive vice presi-

When CeeLo Green released the audio version of "[Expletive] You" in 2010, he wanted to maintain the buzz of the song but didn't have an official video to share at the time. So Green — along with his management team — huddled up and created a colorful, cartoonish video with the song's lyrics appearing onscreen as the song played. Green was hoping he would build more momentum around the groovy song without spending much money.

The video became a viral hit, and a promotional tool.




