At a meeting of the General Association of Connecticut, at the house of Rev. Leonard Bacon, in New Haven, on the third Tuesday in June, 1840 ; were present,

The Rev. Theophilus Smith was chosen Scribe ; Rev. David D. Field, D. D., Moderator ; and Rev. Henry N. Day, Assistant Scribe.

Certificates of membership were read, and prayer was offered by the Moderator.

Messrs. J. Day, Dutton, Robbins, Walker, Tucker, and Welton were appointed a Committee of Overtures.

This Committee made a report in part, which was accepted.

Messrs. Calhoun, Torrey, and Hayes were appointed a Committee to distribute the Minutes of Corresponding Bodies.

A certificate of Delegates from the Consociation of Long Island was read, and referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Messrs. Joab Brace, Dutton, and Calhoun.

A letter from the Annual Assembly of the Congregational Union of England and Wales was read, and referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Messrs. Hawes, Tucker, Punderson, and Robbins, to prepare an answer, and submit it to this Body.

The Committee of Overtures made a further report, which was accepted.

Messrs. Robbins, Tyler, Tucker, and Hayes were appointed a Committee to report on the State of Religion in the churches connected with this Association and Corresponding Bodies.

Voted, To take a recess until 2 o'clock, P. M.

Resumed business. A communication was read from Fairfield East Association respecting the religious character of the meetings of this Association ; which was referred to a Committee consisting of Messrs. Hawes, Stone, Dutton, Tucker, Walker, and Blodget.

The report of the Agent on Statistics was read, accepted, and re-committed to the same Agent, that the Statistics recently handed in may be incorporated in the report.

Voted, That the reports on the State of Religion be made to this Body. Commenced hearing these reports.

At half past 3 o'clock, P. M. the Association united in public religious services. The Associational Sermon was preached by Rev. Nathaniel Hewit, D. D., from Eph. 4:3—6.

Voted, To adjourn, to meet to-morrow morning, at 8 o'clock.—Closed with prayer by the Moderator.

At half past 7 o'clock, the members of the Association attended the Anniversary of the Connecticut Branch of the American Education Society. The Reports of the Treasurer and Directors were read and accepted. The meeting was addressed by Rev. Joseph Emerson, Agent of the American Education Society, Rev. Benjamin C. Meigs, from Ceylon, and Rev. Chauncey Eddy, from Saratoga Springs.

Wednesday, June 17. Met according to adjournment. Opened with prayer by the Moderator.

Resumed and finished hearing reports on the State of Religion.

The following persons were appointed receivers of money for the General Association, in their respective Associations, viz: Messrs. J. Bartlett, Northrop, J. Atwater, Swan, Arms, G. Hall, Perry, N. S. Hunt, W. W. Andrews, Lyman, and Hyde.

Rev. S. H. Riddel was appointed Treasurer of the General Association for the year ensuing.

The Committee on the communication from the Long Island Association made a report, which was accepted.

The District Associations were called upon to report their action on the subject of the Overture from Windham Association in reference to a change in the ratio of representation in the General Association; from which it appeared that five Associations approved the change proposed—five disapproved, and in two there was no action.

Voted, That this subject be indefinitely postponed.

The Trustees of the Everest Fund exhibited their Report, which was accepted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes. (See *Appendix*, No. I.)

The following persons were appointed Trustees of the Everest Fund: Rev. Allen McLean, Horace Cowles, Esq., Rev. Jairus Burt, and Benjamin Ely, Esq.

The Committee appointed at a previous meeting of the Association to report on the rules and usages of the District Associations, made a report, which was accepted.

Messrs. Strong, Joab Brace, and Jonathan Brace were appointed a Committee to examine the papers in the hands of the above Committee, and report whether the subject shall be prosecuted farther.

Rev. Leonard Bacon was appointed to preach the *Concio ad Clerum* at the next Commencement in Yale College.

Messrs. Daggett, Shipman, and Robbins were appointed a Committee on the subject of the nomination of Delegates from this Association to Corresponding Bodies.

Rev. Samuel R. Andrew was appointed a Delegate to the General Association of Massachusetts, to be held on the 4th Tuesday of June, 1840.

The Treasurer's Report was read, accepted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes. (See *Appendix*, No. II.)

The Treasurer was authorized to transmit the Minutes of this Association to Corresponding Bodies by any safe conveyance, at his discretion.

Voted, That the Treasurer be requested to superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes, and that he receive five dollars for his services.

A tax of $37\frac{1}{2}$ cents was laid upon each Pastor and Stated Supply in connexion with this Association.

The following persons were appointed to certify the regular standing of travelling Ministers, viz: Rev. Joel Hawes, D. D., Calvin Chapin, D. D., Jeremiah Day, D. D., David Smith, D. D., Abel McEwen,

Daniel Smith, Thomas Punderson, Daniel Dow, James Beach, Samuel R. Andrew, Aaron Hovey, and William Ely.

A communication from the Medical Society of Connecticut on the registration of births, deaths, and marriages was read, and referred to a Committee consisting of Messrs. J. Day, Hawes, and Hovey.

The vote accepting the report of the Committee on the communication from the Long Island Consociation was re-considered. On re-consideration, the subject was recommitted to the same Committee.

A communication from the Committee of the New York State Temperance Society was read, and referred to the following Committee : Messrs. Arms, Hubbell, and Crane.

Reports were made by the several delegations from this Association to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, meeting in the 7th Presbyterian Church, Philadelphia ; to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, meeting in the 1st Presbyterian Church, Philadelphia ; to the General Association of Massachusetts ; and to the Evangelical Consociation of Rhode Island, which were accepted.

The Annual Report of the Trustees of the Missionary Society of Connecticut was read and accepted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes. (See *Appendix*, No. III.)

The following persons were elected, by ballot, Trustees of the Missionary Society of Connecticut : Rev. Joel Hawes, D. D., Seth Terry, Esq., Rev. Noah Porter, D. D., Hon. Elisha Stearns, Hon. Samuel J. Hitchcock, Rev. Caleb J. Tenney, D. D., Rev. Timothy P. Gillett, Rev. Alvan Bond, Thomas C. Perkins, Esq., Hon. Thomas S. Williams, Rev. Horace Bushnell, and Edward Goodwin, Esq.

Francis Parsons, Esq. was appointed Treasurer, and Rev. Horace Hooker, Auditor of the Missionary Society of Connecticut.

The following persons were appointed Directors of the Missionary Society of Connecticut Auxiliary to the American Home Missionary Society : Rev. Thomas Punderson, Rev. Bennet Tyler, D. D., Rev. Samuel Spring, Jonathan Barnes, Esq., Rev. Leonard Bacon, and Rev. Anson S. Atwood.

The following persons were appointed Delegates to Foreign Ecclesiastical Bodies :

To the General Association of Massachusetts ; Rev. Messrs. Ansel Nash, and Isaac Parsons, principals ; Abram Marsh, and S. A. Loper, substitutes. [Meeting 4th Tuesday of June, 1841.]

To the General Convention of Vermont ; Rev. Messrs. Abraham Browne, and Joseph Whittlesey, principals ; John E. Bray, and Zebulon Crocker, substitutes. [Meeting 2d Tuesday of September, 1840.]

To the Evangelical Consociation of Rhode Island ; Rev. Messrs. Timothy Tuttle, and David Smith, D. D., principals ; Joseph Ayers, and Zolva Whitmore, substitutes. [Meeting at North Scituate, 2d Tuesday of June, 1841.]

To the General Association of New Hampshire ; Rev. Messrs. Erastus Scranton, and Lyman Strong, principals ; H. P. Arms, and Joel R. Arnold, substitutes. [Meeting at Hampton, 4th Tuesday of August, 1840.]

Calhoun, principals ; and Fosdick Harrison, John Woodbridge, D. D., and Joel Hawes, D. D., substitutes. [Meeting 3d Thursday of May, 1841]

The Committee on a communication of the Medical Society made a report, recommending that no order be taken on the subject. The report was accepted. After some discussion the subject was recommended. Mr. J. Day was excused from acting further on this Committee, and Mr. Hayes was appointed in his place.

The Committee on a communication from the Long Island Conso-ciation made a further report, which was accepted.

The Committee on the State of Religion communicated a Report, which was accepted, adopted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes. (See *Appendix*, No. IV.)

At 12 o'clock took a recess to allow an opportunity for free conversation on the subject of slavery.

Resumed business. The following persons were appointed to collect the Statistics of the Churches in their respective District Associations : Rev. Messrs. Daggett, Whittlesey, Putnam, Gilbert, Shipman, T. Smith, Stone, Tillotson, Ives, N. Porter, jr. Field, and A. Miller.

The Committee on the communication from the Medical Society reported a letter addressed to that Society, which was adopted.

The Committee on the communication of the New York State Temperance Society reported the following Resolutions, which were adopted :

Resolved, That this Association deeply sympathize with the New York State Temperance Society, in its persevering endeavors to promote the cause of temperance.

Resolved, That we recommend to the Ministers connected with this Body, by giving to temperance that prominence in their public ministrations which belongs to this department of Christian morals, and by such other efforts as to them shall seem most judicious and efficient, to co-operate with the friends of this great enterprise throughout the world.

Heard addresses from Rev. O. Eastman, Secretary of the American Tract Society ; and Rev. Chauncey Eddy, Agent of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions.

The Committee on the communication from Fairfield East Association made a Report, which was accepted, adopted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes. (See *Appendix*, No. V.)

At 3 o'clock, P. M. the Association heard the Narrative of the State of Religion adopted by this Body, and a statement from Rev. Benjamin C. Meigs, Missionary of the American Board of Commissioners

for Foreign Missions at Ceylon, respecting the progress of Christianity in that island ; and united with the churches in New Haven in the celebration of the Lord's Supper ; in which Rev. Messrs. Walker and Tucker officiated.

Voted, To adjourn to 8 o'clock to-morrow morning. Closed with prayer by the Moderator.

At half past 7 o'clock the members of the General Association attended the Anniversary of the Missionary Society of Connecticut Auxiliary to the American Home Missionary Society. The Reports of the Treasurer and Directors were read and accepted, and ordered to be printed ; and the meeting was addressed by Rev. Messrs. Badger, Tucker, and Ludlow.

Thursday morning, June 18. Met according to adjournment.—Opened with prayer by the Moderator.

The Committee on the subject of the rules and usages of the District Associations made a Report, which was accepted. The Committee appointed in 1838 on this subject, was continued.

The Agent on Statistics made a further report. *Voted*, that this Report be adopted, and printed with the Minutes. (See *Appendix*.)

Voted, That the thanks of this Body be expressed to the First Church and Society, and to the members of the other Churches and Societies in New Haven, for their courteous and Christian hospitality during the present meeting, and to the choir of singers, for their appropriate and acceptable services.

The Committee on the communication from the Congregational Union of England and Wales reported a letter in reply, which was adopted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes. The Register was charged with the transmission of this letter, and of the documents of this Body. (See *Appendix*, No. VI.)

Voted, That the next Annual Meeting of this Association be held at the house of Rev. Samuel W. S. Dutton, in New Haven, on the third Tuesday of June, 1841.

Resolved, That the system of American slavery is, in the opinion of this Body, inconsistent with the principles of the Gospel ; and its immediate abolition, by those who have the legal power, is a duty, in the discharge of which the blessing of heaven may be expected.

Resolved, That we recommend to the churches under our care a prayerful consideration of this important subject ; and the exertion of their appropriate influence for the emancipation of all the enslaved in this land and throughout the world.

Rev. Messrs. Daggett, H. N. Day, and Riddel were appointed a Committee to re-arrange the Schedule of nominations, and prepare it for the press.

The Minutes were read and adopted.

The Association having finished the business before them, united in the closing prayer with President Day, and then adjourned.

NO. III.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF CONNECTICUT.

To the Missionary Society of Connecticut, to be convened at New Haven, on the third Tuesday of June, 1840, the Trustees of the Society respectfully present the following Report :

The receipts of the Missionary Society of Connecticut, for the year ending January 1, 1840, were \$ 2012 22. During the same period, the expenditures were \$ 3443 72. The Permanent Fund, to which no additions were made, the last year, is \$ 29,877 25. The excess of the expenditures over the receipts, was \$ 1431 22. This sum was taken from a small disposable fund, accumulated in former years,—which the Trustees thought it better to expend, in supplying the present necessities of the destitute settlements, than to employ only the interest of it, for that purpose.

The number of Missionaries, in the service of the Society, the past year, is twenty. Of these, thirteen are on the Western Reserve,—five, in Illinois,—one, in Pennsylvania,—and one, among the remnant of the Mohegans, in this State.

NO. IV.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF RELIGION.

In the merciful providence of God, the pastors of the churches assembled on this occasion, are permitted to review the past year, in its moral and religious aspects, touching themselves and these churches, with fresh and increasing cause of gratitude. They would not be insensible, also, to the deep humiliation which they should exercise in view of their deficiencies as men and as ministers, and to the evils which still continue to prevail amid the respective fields of their labor. The circumstances under which they meet, are highly calculated to call forth those fraternal and devout sympathies which should distinguish them as ministers of the Gospel, and by which they are known to the world, as the disciples of one common Master. Their mutual intercourse and consultations in their associated relation, have ever been, it is believed, one great means of cementing their union, animating their hopes, and encouraging their efforts, in the great work to which they are appointed.

At the present time, they feel the necessity of drawing closer the bonds which connect them with each other, and of being quickened

in holy diligence, from the consideration that five* of their fellow-laborers have fallen by death during the past year—two in very advanced life, two in the midst of their days, and one young man who had just entered upon the ministry, around whom many hopes were clustered. These our beloved fathers and brethren instruct and admonish us, by the example of their virtues.

There is evidence from the statements which have been given by the several local Associations, that God has been graciously present with his churches, the past year, as he was wont to be in the days of our fathers. The spirit of the Puritans lives, to some extent at least, in their descendants; and wherever their institutions exist and are sustained by the same feelings in kind, like effects have been produced, and that from age to age. The character which these institutions, in their wide diffusion through the land, have formed and nurtured, has always had a peculiar type. It has been marked by simplicity, purity, power—by directness of aim in the religious life, by independence of thought in biblical investigation, and by a love of truth and freedom. Revivals of religion in the churches, with accompanying reformatations in the community, which, through the divine blessing, are both a product and a proof of the excellent principles of our puritan ancestors, are now as frequent, it is believed, and as pure, it is hoped, as they were in the early periods of our history. We rejoice in them as God's testimony to Christian faithfulness on the part of pastors and churches, as the answer of prayer, as the token of union in the truth, and as the pledge and earnest of the future complete victory of Zion's King over this revolted world. We give to God the praise of his own blessed work. Let those who have the temerity, speak in disparagement of the operations of the Holy Spirit.

These manifestations of divine power have been enjoyed by the churches within our bounds, during the past year, perhaps, in an unusual degree. In many places, there has been more than the ordinary measure of gracious influence; and in quite a number, the work of God has been very signal. The latter has been the character of the work in Bristol, Barkhamsted, Plainville, Hartford Fourth, and West Hartford. The effusions of the Spirit have been extensively experienced, also, in New Haven, Mount Carmel, East Plains, and Waterbury. In one Association, that for the Eastern District of New Haven, the remarkable fact appears, that out of sixteen churches, ten have been blessed, in a greater or less degree, with the same precious influences. These favored churches are North Haven, Meriden, Northford, North Guilford, United Society of New Haven, Guilford, Wallingford, North Branford, Branford, and Cheshire. The aggregate of supposed conversions in these ten places, is not far from seven hundred, many of the subjects of which have already professed religion. The congregation in Ridgefield, in Fairfield West, has enjoyed

a large share of divine influence, as also Ashford, in Windham Association. There has likewise been some degree of a special work in Bozrahville, East Lyme, Salem, Stamford, Norwalk First, Greensfarms, Fairfield First, Thompson, Village Corners, Muddy Brook, and Chaplin. In the whole, thirty-two congregations are mentioned as having been visited in the manner already described, and a great accession of moral strength and spirituality, it is felt, has been brought to the churches. These effects of divine grace have, in general, appeared to follow the ordinary religious means, *faithfully* applied to Christians and to sinners. In many places, where these visitations of mercy have not been enjoyed, there is nevertheless a state of things which may be called prosperous, partly as the effect of former revivals, and partly as the prayerful anticipation of coming good. We dwell the more on the subject of revivals, as we believe, that at least in this land, and in such a community as our own, they are destined to give to the Christianity which is professed among us, its peculiar form and feature.

We learn with pleasure, that the churches are generally furnished with pastors, and that to a good degree, a spirit of activity and enterprise is manifested in sustaining the institutions of the Gospel, and in promoting the spiritual welfare of the community. The frequent erection of new and commodious houses of worship, and the remodelling of old ones, is a pleasing indication of the interest which is felt on this subject. The comparatively small number of ministers who have been dismissed, and the speedy supply of vacancies of late, lead us to infer, that the permanency as well as the importance of the pastoral relation, is beginning again to be estimated as it was in the days of our forefathers. Connected with this trait, is the gratifying fact that the attendance on public worship seems, for the most part, to be on the increase.

Union, which is the strength, the ornament, and the criterion of Christianity, is represented in almost every report of the District Associations, as extensively prevailing among the pastors and churches, and there seems in general to be that "*endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace,*" which, with the blessing of God, can never fail to accomplish the object, even amidst that diversity of views, on some topics, which is a common attribute of our frail humanity, or a necessary result of our imperfect sanctification. The argument for peace and harmony, in such circumstances, derives immense weight, as well from the fact, that the pastors and churches speak of it, wherever it exists, as a blessing for which they should be eminently thankful, as from its strict coincidence with the precepts and spirit of the Bible.

The commercial and pecuniary embarrassments of the times seem, hitherto, to have had little or no effect, in diminishing the charities of those who love the Gospel, and seek its extension at home and abroad. On the contrary, there has probably been, in the whole State, an amount of contributions to benevolent objects, within the year, beyond that of any former year. This is the right spirit; and shows that a

permanent and perennial benevolence may be calculated upon, in the mighty enterprise to which the church has consecrated her energies.

The many thousands of children and youth, who, in our Sabbath schools, are taught the truths of the Bible and the lessons of beneficence, and many of whom are renewed and sanctified by such an instrumentality, inspire within us the hope, that *our* places will be filled, and this to a better effect than at present, when we shall have been summoned to our final account. The extensive introduction of valuable libraries into these institutions, we feel to be, and would recommend, as a means well adapted to make a race of Christians fond of reading and research—enlightened and patriotic, and of general elevation of character.

Some complaints are made in regard to the desecration of the Sabbath, especially through the increased facilities for travelling. This cannot but be the more regretted, as with every other indication of spiritual prosperity, if that were possible, a disregard of this holy day in the minds of the people, would tend eventually to efface the last vestige of piety and of freedom from the land. More care and prayer, and a stricter discipline of offending church members are due from the faithful, as a testimony of their regard for this sacred institution, and as a means of arresting, in this respect, the downward tendency of the age. However consentaneous it may be to the temper of the times, and of many of our citizens in the pursuit of wealth or of pleasure, to trample on such a divine appointment, it will be found, as in all other cases of transgression, that not only no good is gained, but infinite evil is incurred.

In regard to temperance, a paramount interest also, it is difficult to admit that it is not on the whole on the advance, and yet it would appear, that in a number of places, the aspect of things, is, in a degree, discouraging. The cause is stationary, or possibly retrograde, in some portions of the State; although in others, it is decidedly going forward, and its principles are daily becoming more fixed in the minds of men. It is hoped that the hydra-headed evil of intemperance may ere long receive its final, fatal wound.

Yale College is favored with its usual prosperity, in all its departments. In addition to the revivals which have been recorded above, may be noticed some special influences of the Holy Spirit which have recently been granted to this institution. Though the work has been limited as to extent, it has been pleasant in its effects. Several have manifested their hope in the Saviour, and joined the communion of the church. An additional Professor has been appointed in the Theological department. That department now numbers between eighty and ninety members.

The Theological Institute at East Windsor continues to enjoy its prosperity, and under the smiles of divine Providence, thirty young men are there preparing for the ministry, with encouraging prospects of usefulness.

The Reports of Foreign Bodies, so far as they have been received, present an encouraging prospect, on the whole, in regard to the progress of morals and sound religion.

The General Association of Massachusetts, including within its bounds probably sixty thousand church members, and at least as large a number of Sabbath school scholars—refreshed with revivals in very many towns, and revivals affecting particularly Sabbath schools—giving to the cause of Foreign Missions, by estimate, an amount of seventy thousand dollars—and stemming the tide of intemperance and other evils, affords to them as well as to ourselves, occasion of thankfulness to God for the conservative and sanctifying energies of the Gospel, in a world of sin and evil.

New Hampshire, as we learn through the delegate of its ecclesiastical body, rejoices in the harmony of its ministers and churches, in the increasing settlements of the ministry among them, in the reviving influences which have been enjoyed in several of its congregations—in the new, aroused attention to its Sabbath schools—in the fresh impulse given to temperance, and in the flourishing condition of its Literary Institution at Hanover, and its Theological Seminary at Gilmanton.

Vermont is reported as not being blessed with many revivals of religion at the present time, but as enjoying extensive peace and harmony in its ecclesiastical connexions—the religious sense of the community being manifested by an increasing regard of the institutions of the Gospel, and by forward movements in the cause of benevolence and Christian morals. The condition of the churches is represented as being sound and healthy in an encouraging degree, and their members as being “ready to every good word and work.”

From the Evangelical Consociation of Rhode Island we learn, that the churches connected with that body are in the enjoyment of peace and prosperity—that in several congregations seasons of divine refreshing have been witnessed—that vigorous efforts are made in the cause of temperance—that Sabbath schools are in a flourishing condition—and that great attention, particularly in the city of Providence, is bestowed on common school education, from which are expected the most happy results in regard to the moral, as well as intellectual benefit of the community.

The delegate from the General Association of New York reports, that amid difficulties arising from the violation of the Sabbath by means of public travel, and from consequent intemperance and other evils, in that part of our country, they have, notwithstanding, realized much of the presence and interposition of the great Head of the church—that several of their congregations have been revived—and that a state of delightful union and peace prevails among themselves. They feel cheered and strengthened by anticipations of the future, inasmuch as, through the divine assistance, they have been carried forward in past duties, and sustained in past trials.

The delegates from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, which held its sessions in the First Church of Philadelphia, report, that they have enjoyed unwonted divine manifestations for several months past—that a moiety at least of their churches have shared in these manifestations—that most of the large cities on the Atlantic board and in the interior parts of the Union, have been the special

seats and scenes of these wonders of grace, and that probably fifteen thousand souls have been added to the Lord. They represent that the moral improvements and enterprises so uniformly consequent on such divine visitations are already signally visible, and they hail those visitations and these effects, as omens of future increased good, and as the day-star of the Millennial morning.

In conclusion, Fathers and Brethren, we feel that we have abundant occasion to bless God and take courage, in view of the condition present and prospective of our Zion, as well as to watch against the evils to which ourselves and the important bodies we represent are liable, in a world of trial.

NO. V.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE RELIGIOUS INFLUENCE OF THE MEETINGS OF THIS BODY.

The Committee appointed to take into consideration the communication from Fairfield East Association respecting the religious influence of the meetings of the General Association, report the following as the result of their deliberation.

Your Committee feel, and trust the members of this body generally feel, the justice of the rebuke implied in this communication, and regret that the meetings of this body, for some years past, have failed to make that religious impression, and afford that spiritual improvement which they ought to have done. Your Committee have the solemn conviction that while these meetings are necessarily employed, to some extent, upon subjects not *immediately* connected with vital godliness; yet that a great object of them should be, by intercourse and consultation to extend the views, increase the devotedness, and elevate the piety of the ministry and the churches, and that they should be so conducted as to have this effect. We look back to times when this was a prominent object of the sessions of this body; and we can point to other ecclesiastical bodies in whose meetings this object is secured to a much greater degree than with us.

To promote this desirable end, your Committee make the following suggestions:

1. That ministers, especially the members of the General Association and the churches should look forward to the meetings of this body with the expectation of a season of spiritual refreshment, with the determination, as far as depends on the power of man to make them such; and with fervent prayer for the presence of the Sanctifier and Comforter. We believe that much, very much depends on the expectation and preparation of the ministers and the churches where the Association convene, and those in the vicinity. We cannot doubt that God will bestow his blessing on those who are prepared and waiting to receive it.

2. That all the religious services of the occasion should have a bearing upon this object,—should be designed and calculated to promote it. That the sessions of this body should not be perverted to debate and strife about non-essential differences; that the members keep in remembrance that the General Association is not a legislative or a judicial body, but a body for mutual consultation, advice, and the promotion of brotherly love. Your Committee are persuaded that there is an extreme sensitiveness, perhaps fastidiousness in the Christian community in regard to the collisions of ministers, and that therefore they ought especially to watch against all bitterness in their discussions—to avoid every thing which may be an offence to Christian charity.

3. We would suggest that the reports on the state of religion from the District Associations and Foreign Bodies, should be made in a public meeting, either in the forenoon or afternoon of the second day of the session; and that these reports be prepared for the purpose, with conciseness, yet with sufficient particularity to reach the feelings of those who are interested in the welfare of Zion.

4. That religious services should be performed on every day and evening of the sessions of this body, for the benefit of the people and the ministers who are not members of the Association.

LETTER TO THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF ENGLAND AND WALES.

New Haven, June 18, 1840.

The General Association of Connecticut to the Congregational Union of England and Wales.

BELOVED BRETHREN IN CHRIST,

It gave us joy to hear read, at the opening of our present session, your truly fraternal letter under date of May last. It was very pleasant to receive the expressions of your sympathy and love, and to know that, on the ground of our common faith and common interests, we have a remembrance in your prayers.

Be assured, dear Brethren, that our hearts are drawn to you, not only by the ties of our common Christianity, but by the remembrance of our origin as formed among the churches of your land; and most heartily do we reciprocate every expression of fellowship and love contained in your very acceptable epistle.

By what means your communication of March, 1838, together with the documents mentioned as sent with it, failed of reaching us, we know not. But neither has come to hand; and it is owing to this, and not to any indifference to intercourse with you, that our corres-

pondence, so pleasantly begun, has for sometime past been interrupted. We joyfully resume it; and while we feel that 'your churches and ours are bound to each other by ties so many, and so strong, that fellowship between them cannot but be sweet and endearing,' we wish to add, that we shall ever be most ready to hold intercourse with you, 'either by mutual delegation, or by interchange of documents and correspondence.'

The printed Minutes of our present meeting, accompanying this, will make you acquainted with the general state of our churches. We are just now closing the annual session of this Body, which has been one of much interest and harmony. We bless our heavenly Father for the sweet influences of his grace upon us and our churches; and while we praise him for the past tokens of his favor, we go home to the work he has assigned us, with new confidence in his love, and with brighter hopes of his assisting grace in future.

Our prayer for you, dear Brethren, and for the churches in connexion with you, is, that the God of peace and love may dwell among you, and give great success to all your endeavors to build up the kingdom of our common Lord. We hear with joy of what you are doing to extend the triumphs of the cross in your own and in other lands; and especially of your praise-worthy and most successful efforts in the great cause of human rights and African emancipation. May your zeal and success in these good works be greatly increased; and the friends of Christ all over the earth soon be united in putting forth their utmost energies for the advancement of the great cause of religion and freedom throughout the world.

Most heartily, beloved Brethren, do we unite in the prayer expressed in your letter, that your country and ours may abide in peace; and that 'no war or strife may arise between the parent and the daughter people,' who should always be as one. The heart sickens at the thought, that between two great Christian nations, like yours and ours, on whose mutual efforts and continued co-operation, the advancement of the cause of God in our world so greatly depends, there should ever exist any thing but mutual attachment and the most kindly good feelings. Let our united prayers ascend to the God of nations, that he may preserve your country and ours in firm and ever enduring peace.

We bid you farewell, dear Brethren, in the name of the Lord; and wish all grace, mercy, and peace to be multiplied to you from God the Father, and Jesus Christ our Lord.

STATISTICS OF THE CHURCHES.

REPORT OF THE AGENT ON STATISTICS.

The last General Association requested the undersigned to act as General Agent in collecting and embodying the Statistics of the Churches in our connexion.

Complete returns have been received from the churches connected with the following Associations, viz : New Haven West, New Haven East, New London, Fairfield West, Fairfield East, and Middlesex. The returns from the four following Associations are nearly complete, viz : Hartford North, Hartford South, Litchfield South, and Tolland. From Windham Association, 15 churches out of 24 have made report. In Litchfield North, only 7 churches out of 20 have made report. The whole number of churches reported is 212 ; the number of churches not reported 31 ; whole number of churches connected with the General Association, 243.

The reports from the District Associations have all been copied and reduced to the same form. A few alterations and additions have been made to the Statistical Tables, and a general Summary appended to the whole. Some of the results of these tables will here be stated.

It appears that 228 churches are consociated ; and 15 not consociated.

Number of Members.—212 churches report 34,644 members, which is an average of 163 members to each church. If we allow the same average to the 31 churches not reported, the total number will be 39,714 ; which is probably not far from the true number. 194 churches distinguish male and female members. The numbers are 9,888 males, and 20,445 females ; which is somewhat more than two females to one male.

Additions and Removals.—The 212 churches reported have received by profession 971 members ; which is an average of about $4\frac{1}{2}$ to each church. The removals by death have been 522 ; which is about $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the whole number of members. The number of excommunications is 59 ; being to the whole number of members, as 1 to 587. The additions by profession exceed the removals by death and excommunication, by 390. The additions by letter are 813 ; removals by letter 997 ; decrease on this score, 184. Total additions, 1,784 ; total removals, 1,578 ; nett increase, 206.

The churches in the 6 following Associations have received more members than have been removed, viz : Hartford North, Hartford South, New London, Fairfield West, Windham, and Tolland.

The churches in the following 5 Associations have received fewer members than have been removed, viz : New Haven West, New Haven East, Fairfield East, Litchfield South, and Middlesex.

Baptisms.—The number of adults baptized is 392 ; which is about $\frac{4}{16}$ of the whole number that have united with the churches by profession.

The number of infants baptized, is 1,093 ; which is about 3 to every 100 church members. It is worthy of notice, that in 32 of our churches, *no* infants were baptized in the year 1839.

Non-residents.—The whole number reported is 2,572 ; which is about 7 per cent. of the whole number of members. But in this item, nearly half the reports are defective.

Pastors.—The list of Pastors is believed to be complete. 5 churches have 2 pastors each ; and 183 churches have 1 pastor each. Whole number supplied with pastors 187 ; which is somewhat more than 77 per cent. of the whole number of churches. Of the remaining 55 churches, 28 have stated supplies, and only 27 are vacant ; i. e. the vacant churches are but 11 *per cent.* of the whole number.

Ministerial Age of Pastors.—The date of ordination is ascertained in every case except *one*. The whole number of pastors is 193. The aggregate ministerial age of 192 pastors is 3,029 years ; which is an average of $15\frac{1}{2}$ years to each pastor. 97 pastors received ordination at the time they entered upon their *present pastoral relations* ; and 96 had been previously ordained.

Age of present Pastoral relations.—The date of the last installation is ascertained in every case *except four*. The aggregate age of 189 existing pastoral relations, is 1,925 years ; which is an average of $10\frac{3}{8}$ years to each existing pastoral relation. Of the 189 pastoral relations, 135 are under 10 years of age ; 18 are between the ages of 10 and 20 years ; 16 are between the ages of 20 and 30 years ; 11 are between the ages of 30 and 40 years ; 6 are between the ages of 40 and 50 years ; and 3 are between the ages of 50 and 60 years. The three oldest pastors are, Nathaniel Gaylord, of West Hartland ; Samuel Nott, D. D., of Franklin ; and Frederick W. Hotchkiss, of Saybrook.

The District Associations vary considerably in respect to the permanence of the pastoral relation.

An attempt has been made to exhibit a complete list of the members of each District Association, arranged in the order of ministerial age, with the place of residence, the date of ordination, the ministerial age, and the occupation whether as Pastor, stated supply, or without

charge, annexed to each name. Those of Litchfield North, Hartford South, and Tolland, may be found to be defective.

The whole number of members given is 174. Of this number, 188 are pastors ; 20 are stated supplies ; 1 is a missionary to the Indians ; 1 is a President of a College ; 5 are Professors of Theology ; 6 are teachers ; 3 are editors ; 2 are agents ; and 48 are without charge.

The date of ordination is ascertained in 259 cases. Aggregate ministerial age of these 259 members, 4,549 years ; average to each member, $17\frac{146}{259}$ years.

The Ministerial age of 97 members, is under 10 years.
