2050, Tula Lotay's dreamlike, surrealist work perfectly depicts the confused state of Maplewood, an amnesiac cop trying to police the few survivors of an apocalypse while struggling to remember who she is at any given moment.

Luckily for me, the perfect artist to draw a story filled with everything from forlorn felines to protesting plants, Russ Braun, versatile veteran artist of FABLES and JACK OF FABLES, said yes! I am deeply indebted to him for bringing his beautiful art and storytelling talents to my writing debut.
