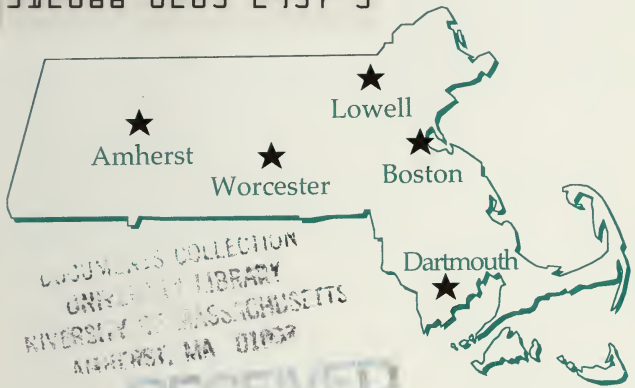

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FACTS 1995-96

The University of Massachusetts - The University was established in 1863 as the Massachusetts Agricultural College located at Amherst. It became known as the Massachusetts State College in 1932 and in 1947 became the University of Massachusetts. The Worcester and Boston campuses were established in 1962 and 1964, respectively. The Lowell and Dartmouth campuses (previously the University of Lowell and Southeastern Massachusetts University, respectively) were consolidated into the University under Chapter 142 of the Acts of 1991.

The University's mission is to provide a quality, affordable university education to the citizens of Massachusetts regardless of economic means and to conduct quality research and outreach to meet State needs.

The University's five campuses are geographically dispersed throughout the state and possess unique and complementary missions. The University is governed by a single Board of Trustees composed of 19 voting members and 4 ex officio non-voting members. The President of the University (located in Boston) oversees the five-campus system, and each campus has its own Chancellor.

UMass Amherst - The original land-grant institution, research university, and the largest campus in the system, offers comprehensive liberal arts and professional programs and a large number of graduate and research programs. It offers 6 associate's, 92 bachelor's, 72 master's and 52 doctoral degree programs. UMass Amherst is internationally recognized for the strength of many of its programs including astronomy, computer science, psychology, linguistics, polymer science and engineering.

UMass Boston - The University's only non-residential campus is located three miles from downtown Boston. It offers 57 undergraduate, 22 master's and 6 doctoral degree programs. The campus places a strong emphasis on identifying, attracting, preparing, encouraging, and sustaining nontraditional students, including students of color, older individuals, the disabled, and members of economically disadvantaged urban communities. UMass Boston has a particular focus on the local urban population and the research and policy needs of business, government, and communities in the greater Boston metropolitan region.

UMass Dartmouth - The only Massachusetts university, public or private, south of Boston and the smallest campus in the system, offers students 42 liberal arts and professional majors and 15 graduate programs, including a Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering. The Dartmouth campus has a broad emphasis on the liberal arts with special strengths in marine sciences, engineering, visual arts and design, and medical laboratory sciences and nursing.

UMass Lowell - The University's most technologically-oriented campus focuses on an integrated strategy in which the academic disciplines of engineering, management, science, education and health are applied in the pursuit of a thriving industrial economic sector. UMass Lowell's academic programs focus on preparing its graduates for careers relating to emerging generic technologies (development of advanced materials, intelligent materials and photonic materials), selected established industries (including the plastics manufacturing and computer industries), and workplace health and safety. The campus offers 46 undergraduate, 36 master's and 12 doctoral degree programs.

UMass Worcester - The Worcester campus houses the University's Medical Center, including the Medical School, the 416-bed teaching hospital and clinics, the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences, the Graduate School of Nursing and the Program in Molecular Medicine. The campus offers 7 master's and 10 doctoral degree programs, provides general and specialized medical care to the citizens of central Massachusetts, and engages in a research program which benefits not only the recipients of clinical services, but contributes to the national effort to understand, prevent and treat disease.

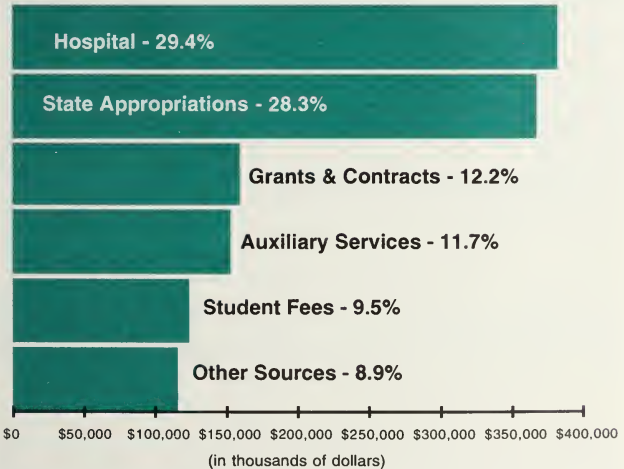
