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

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FOREWORD

The compilation and publication of this family history of the descendants of the American settler Johann Diedrich Fahnestock, to whom all of the name in America owe their origin, has been appropriately sponsored and financed by the descendants and widows of descendants of Adam K. Fahnestock who with his brother Walter F. Fahnestock compiled and published the little Fahnestock Memorial in 1879. These are Mrs. Helen Fahnestock Hubbard, Mrs. Ernest Fahnestock, Mrs. Harris Fahnestock, Sr., Mr. William Fahnestock, Jr., and Mrs. Herbert S. Darlington. Through the latter's enthusiasm the publication of this work was started and she has given unstintingly of her time in the editing of the final manuscript. To these sponsors the whole Fahnestock tribe owes a debt of gratitude for carrying out the wishes of Adam K. Fahnestock whose book was intended merely as a forerunner of a more complete work.

No Fahnestock coat-of-arms is included as extended research has shown that line of descent from German nobility suggested in the Fahnestock Memorial is not only unlikely but impossible.

EUROPEAN ANCESTRY

The first known ancestor of the Fahnestock family was Peter Fahrenstuck, which form of the name has been continually used in Germany to the present day. Peter, born about 1606; d. 1 Nov. 1678; m. (probably) Anna, d. 11 Aug. 1683. He lived at Esborn in the district of Hagen in Westphalia and is mentioned in papers belonging to the family archives of the Counts von Volmerstein, now on deposit in the State Archives in Münster. These papers contain records of dispute on matters of taxation between the townships of Hagen and Schwerte during the latter part of the Thirty Years War (1618-1648). Both townships had suffered greatly from the wars and practically all the inhabitants were in dire straits from the resulting destruction of property and heavy taxation. A list in 1645 enumerates the property of each resident, among whom at Esborn was "Peter im Fahrenstuck", a designation which at that time would mean Peter living on the Fahrenstuck Hof or farm. He was the owner of a Splitz or piece of land and a Leibzuchthauschen or barn and a house with a damaged roof. In addition he owned three schepels of swampland. schepel is a dry measure and a schepel of land is as much land as can be sowed with one schepel of seed.

Peter was a farmer, his livestock consisting of four cows, one bull, one calf and a young pig. The property was valued at sixteen and three quarters Reichsthalern, or Rix dollars. His cattle he farmed out in a pasture for which he paid a Groschen a head. He had seeded two quarter Morgen (about an acré) to rye, two schepels of land to oats and a quarter Morgen to linseed.


Peter's death occurred I Nov. 1678, the entry in the church register under the year 1678 reading: "I November, Peter Fahrenstuck, ein 72 Jahriger" (aged 72). His wife was probably Anna whose death is recorded in the same church register in the year 1683 as follows: "II August, Anna Fahrenstuck, Witwe (widow) ihres alters 70 jahre" (aged 70). Their son in all probability was: Wennemer Fahrenstuck, b. about 1627, d. Esborn, Hagen, 2 May 1683, the entry in the Wengern church register reading: "1683,

- 2 Mai, Wennemer Farnstuck, seines alters 56 jahre." The probable names of his children as gathered from the same register were:
 - I. Liborius, see following.
 - II. Catherina, a sponsor at the baptism of her niece, Catherina, in 1688.
 - III. Heinrich, who appeared as a sponsor in 1690 at the baptism of his nephew, John Heinrich.
 - IV. Anna, who was a sponsor at the baptism of her niece, Anna, in 1699.
 - V. Herman, b. ca. 1650; d. 19 Sept. 1715, "murdered"; m. Wengern, 15 April 1688, Else Hessebroch, dau. of Johann Hessebroch of Wengern. His children, all baptized at Wengern, were:
 - (a) Catherina, 8 May 1688; sponsors, Dietrich Hessebroch, Christian Sackerman, Catherina Fahrenstuck.
 - (b) Johann Heinrich, 2 April 1690; sponsors, Heinrich Fahrenstuck, Catherina Huppeps, Johann Hesselbroch.
 - (c) Liborius, 4 March 1692; sponsors, Liborius Fahrenstuck, Clara Hessebroch, Johannes Schmaleubsch.
 - (d) Jurgen, 28 Nov. 1694; sponsors, Jurgen Hessebroch, Skuckermann, Anna Kemna.
 - (e) Dietrich, 10 March 1697; sponsors, Dietrich Hessebroch and Catharina Hessebroch.
 - (f) Anna, 24 May 1699; sponsors, Anna Fahrenstuck, Anna von der Heilen, Friedrich Nicklaus zu Albingshausen.

Liborius (Borius) Fahrenstuck, son of Wennemer, probably b. Esborn; buried Halden, Hagen, Westphalia, 29 June 1713; m. (intentions) 29 Oct. 1692, Catharina Brenne, buried Hagen, 28 Aug. 1728, dau. of Heinrich Brenne.

The marriage proclamation in the Wengern church register reads: "Dimittiert am neunundzwanzigsten Oktober Eintausensechshundertzweiundneunzig, Liborius Fahrenstuck, sel. Wenemar Fahrenstuck nachgelassener ehelicher Sohn mit Catharina, Henrici Brennen zu Halden, Gerichts Hagen, eheliche Tochter." This may be translated—"Marriage intention 29 Oct. 1692, Liborius Fahrenstuck, son of the late Wenemar Fahrenstuck and Catharina, daughter of Heinrich Brenne of Halden in the district of Hagen."

The entry in the Hagen Church of the burial of Liborius is: "1713, 29 Juni, Borius Lollerts von Halden, begraben worden." His widow's burial record in the same church is: "1728, 28 August, Catharina Brende, genannt Lollert, religen Liborius Fahrenstuck genannt Lollert aus Halden fromme witwe, ihres alters—begra-






ben." Translated this reads: "Catharina Brende, alias Lollert, pious widow of the late Liborius Fahrenstuck from Halden, aged —, was buried 28 August 1728."

The explanation of the use of the name Lollert in the above records is that the family of Liborius' wife owned the Lollert Hof or farm in Halden. In accordance with the custom of the day they often used the name of their farm as a surname. We find the name Lollert as an alias appended to the name of Johann Diedrich's brother Johann Heinrich in a letter from the former to the latter, further proving the correctness of the lineage. When upon marrying Catharina Brenne, Liborius Fahrenstuck settled at Halden on the Lollert Hof, which his wife must have brought him as dowry, he at times used the name of the farm, by which he would have been better known in that neighborhood. When his son Johann Diedrich, the American settler, was baptized at Hagen, we find the name Lollert again. The entry reads: "17 Februar 1696 Johan Dietherich, Borius Lollert's sohn getauft."


A family tree at present in the possession of Mrs. Frederick Dickson, which was obtained in 1866 from the German branch of the family, calls Liborius Fahrenstuck "Liboris Vahrenstuck gen. Lollert." It calls his wife Auguste Brende. Brenne and Brende are interchangeable, but the name Auguste is either an error, or she bore the double name, Catharina Auguste.

The children of Liborius and Catharina (Brenne) Fahrenstuck were:

1. JOHANN DIEDRICH FAHRENSTUCK (Liborius, Wennemer, Peter), b. Halten, District of Hagen, Westphalia, 2 Feb. 1696; d. Ephrata, Pennsylvania, 10 Oct. 1775; m. Elberfeld, District of Berg, Westphalia, 15 June 1723, Anna Margaretha Wirth, b. (probably near Elberfeld) 27 July 1702; d. Ephrata, 29 Dec. 1783, daughter of Wilhelm Wirth (bapt. 27 Jan. 1664, d. 6 Nov. 1726) and his wife Elizabeth Kuckelsburg (bapt. 27 Aug. 1673).

Johann Diedrich Fahrenstuck, to use the customary form of his signature, was baptized at the Hagen Church, 17 Feb. 1696. his youth we know nothing except that he was raised on his father's farm at Halten. His letters, translations of which will be found in the Appendix, indicate that his education was somewhat better

than that of the usual German immigrant of the period.

On 4 June 1723 the following proclamation was entered in the register of the Reformed Church at Elberfeld, "1723 Dismissus in Elberfeld 4 Junni, Johannes Dietherich Varnstuck, weiland Liborius Varnstuck zu Halden nachgelassener ehelicher John, und Anna Margaretha, Wilhelm Wirths, Hardenbergs im Kirchspiel Elberfelds, Bergischen Landes ehelicher Tochter." To be translated as "1723 marriage intention 4 June of Johannes Dietherich Varnstuck, son of the late Liborius Varnstuck of Halden, and Anna Margaretha, daughter of Wilhelm Wirth of Hardenberg in the parish of Elberfeld, district of Berg." They were married in the same church 15 June 1723.

His wife's parents were Wilhelm Wirth, baptized at Elberfeld, 27 Jan. 1664; d. Elberfeld, 6 Nov. 1726, and Elizabeth, daughter of Godert and Merrig Kuckelsburg. Wilhelm Wirth was the son of Wilhelm im Wirth and his wife Maria, and grandson of Heinrich

im Wirth.

The children of Wilhelm and Elizabeth (Kuckelsberg) Wirth, of whom there is a record, were: 14.

I. Maria, bapt. 23 April 1698.

II. Anna Margaretha, b. 27 July 1702; d. 29 Dec. 1783; m. 15 June 1723, Johann Diedrich Fahrenstock.

III. Johann Gotfried, bapt. 3 July 1703.

IV. Wilhelm, b. ca. 1707. He came to Pennsylvania, settling in Reading Township, York County. His will (York Wills F:191), dated 16 March 1778, proved 12 Nov. 1783, makes bequests to his brother Peter Wertz (the spelling of the name adopted by him and his brother in America); his sister "Margaret," widow of "Deterick Fanstick," and their children, Casper Deterick, John, Daniel, Benjamin, Borius and Sebah (Joseba) Fanstick; his sister "Christeen" and her two children; Mary, wife of Barnit Beallice; Christeen, wife of Adam Weaver; Margaret, daughter of Daniel Weaver. His executors were Peter Wertz and Peter Deardorff.

V. Johann, bapt. 5 June 1714.

VI. Christine, b. ca. 1716; d. 8 April 1798, "aged 81"; m. Johann Peter Laushe (Lashey, Lasche, Laushey), son of Johann Jacob Lasche, a French Huguenot who came to Lancaster Co., Pa., from France in 1736. Christine had a son John (d. 21 Dec. 1790, aged 41) and a daughter Mary Lashey who m. William Harlacher and had a son Benjamin Harlacher (b. 11 Sept. 1777, d. 17 March 1829) who m. Barbara Rider (b. 1779, d. 5 March 1858, aged 79 years, 1 month, 18 days) (See No. 33) and sons Peter and Eli Harlacher. They were all buried in the Markey Burial Ground, Washington Twp., York Co., Pa.

VII. Johann Peter, bapt. 14 Nov. 1718; d. 18 Oct. 1783, "aged 63 years, 6 months". Buried in Markey Burial Ground.


Tradition states that Johann Diedrich Fahnestock came to America to avoid conscription, fearing that on account of his size and strength he might be forced to join the guards of Frederick Wilhelm of Prussia, all of whom were of gigantic stature. While this may have been true, he was also undoubtedly influenced in his decision by the fact that his older brother Johann Heinrich would (and did) inherit the Halten farm. About the last of June 1726 he set sail from Holland for America, via England, arriving at New York on St. Michael's Day, September 29th. He was accompanied by his wife, two oldest sons, the younger of whom died on the voyage, and his sister, Anna Catrina, who later married Heinrich Dierdorff. In a letter written to his relatives from New York, Oct. 15, 1726 (see appendix), he says, among other things, that they were fourteen days on the journey from Holland to England and ten weeks from England to New York.

He found the New World much to his liking and was impressed with the high wages, the abundance and cheapness of food, and the low taxes. He probably earned his living at first as a weaver since he brought with him a weaver's shuttle and writes that it was a "necessary occupation". Two years after his arrival in New York he was settled on the Raritan River, near Amwell, N. J., "close to the Evangelical Church", where he lived for many years in association with the Dunkards. The community centered around a crossroads now known as Baptisttown but on older records as Dunkertown. It is in Delaware Twp., Hunterdon Co., N. J., about a mile northeast of the Washington Headquarters. At first he rented his land there, on which he raised cattle, horses and cows. By 1734 he had a farm of 105 acres. Living near him was his sister, Anna Catrina, who had married a carpenter, Heinrich Dierdorff "born in the Duchy of Neuwit", son of Anthony and Christina Dierdorff.


Catrina (Fahrenstuck) Dierdorff died several years before 1748. Her husband married 2nd, Elizabeth Moore, and died Nov.—Dec. 1752, survived by three children of his first wife, Abraham, Christian, and Henry Dierdorff. His widow, Elizabeth, married (2) Daniel Bollinger.

In December 1738 the Brothers of the Ephrata Cloister made a pilgrimage to this congregation, among whose leaders were Anthony Dierdorff, father-in-law of Johann Diedrich's sister, Anna Catrina, and Johann Peter Laushe, the husband of Christine Wertz, sister of Johann Diedrich's wife. It was the second attempt to introduce the mystical theology of Ephrata in this community, a visit for that purpose having been made two years earlier. A favorable impression was made on many of the residents of Amwell and the following year Brother Emilech came to the Amwell brethren with credentials from Ephrata. A log cabin was built for him on the grounds of Johann Peter Laushe and he assumed charge of the evangelistic services. He soon lost popularity from the rigor of his services and was sent back in disgrace to Ephrata. He had, however, created a rift in the congregation and a number of the members who were deeply convinced of the truth of the Sabbatarian doctrine of the German Seventh Day Baptists of Ephrata, soon determined to follow Brother Emilech to the Cocalico. Prominent among these were Diedrich Fahnestock (as he had come to be known by this time) and Conrad Boldhouser (Boldhauser, Balthauser, etc.), whose

daughter Elizabeth later married Diedrich's son Peter. (Sachse's German Sectarians of Pennsylvania, Vol. I, pp. 368–372). This was the cause of the removal of the Fahnestock family to the Conestoga Creek near Ephrata in the spring of 1741. Diedrich became a "house father" of the Ephrata Community of Seventh Day Baptists, that is, a member of the congregation living outside the Cloisters.



On 12 Jan. 1749, for fifty pounds nineteen shillings ten pence, he received a patent of 329 acres, with an allowance of six additional acres for roads, from the Penns, in Cocalico Township on a branch of the Cocalico River, about two miles from the Community grounds and one mile south of what is now known as Lincoln. He had made application for this under the name of Derrick Fahnestick, on 21 June 1748. In a letter of Oct. 2, 1750 he described the place and drew a map of his holdings which is here reproduced.

He wrote to his brother in Germany, "We have a good piece of land of about 280 acres." He had sold 50 acres to his brother-in-law Heinrich Dierdorff.

In October 1752 he acknowledged a letter from his brother in Germany from whom he had not heard in fourteen years. He had just completed building another house "as in the city with stone walls. It is 37 feet long and 30 wide and we have an arched cellar in the new house a little larger than half the house." This made three houses in all, one of which he rented. The new house was entirely of brick and "is made white with lime and sand. We burnt this lime for the walls ourselves." They also made more than 4000 tiles for use in the chimney, the kitchen and the stoves. The window frames, doors and boards were cut in the sawmill in Ephrata from over 50 logs taken there in a four-horse wagon, over 3000 board feet in all. The roof was of cedar and the shingles were bought in Philadelphia at a cost of 10 pounds. "The glass windows cost also 10 pounds and are framed in wood which is better than lead." The panes were 8 x 10, 7 x 9, and 6 x 8.

In 1759 Diedrich Fahnestock bought 400 acres on Bermudian Creek in Manchester Twp., York Co., 300 acres of which in 1771 he conveyed equally to his younger sons, Daniel, Benjamin and Borius. In these deeds he is described as a miller. A few years later he died at his farm in Cocalico Twp. near Ephrata. His widow survived him for eight years. Both are buried in the Ephrata Cloisters Cemetery, where a large monument was erected to their memory by Adam K. Fahnestock. The original headstones stand near by and give what we must take to be the correct date of birth of Anna Margaretha as the 27th of July 1702, instead of 23d of July as inscribed on the monument.

Diedrich Fahnestock's will dated I May 1774, proved 22 Jan. 1776 (Lancaster Co. Wills C 1:337) mentions his wife and all his surviving children. To Benjamin and Borius, his youngest sons, he left his gristmill and sawmill on Bermudian Creek in York County. A bequest of £100 was made to Joseba, wife of John Ury "if she have issue". His estate was valued at £477:14:7. Some of the items on the three page inventory were pewter plates and dishes, 22 pewter spoons, Delft plate and teapot, looking

glass, tea table, round walnut table, 3 brass lamps, 2 Bibles, 2 Testaments, a windmill, and one "Josephus Book".

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
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

2. CASPAR DIEDRICH FAHNESTOCK (Johann Diedrich [No. 1]), b. Halten, Hagen, Wesphalia, 11 April 1724; d. E. Whiteland, Chester Co., Pa., 17 Aug. 1808; m. about 1759, Anna Maria Catherine Gleim, b. Prussia, 1734; d. E. Whiteland, Pa., 5 Aug. 1805, daughter of John Gottlief Godfried Gleim of Wiesbaden, Prussia (d. 1757), and Elizabeth (b. ca. 1712, d. Oct. 1786).

Caspar Fahnestock, as he was generally called, accompanied his parents to America in 1726 at the age of two. He became a wheelwright and farmed the property at Ephrata, Pa., near his father. In 1753 he made a trip back to Germany to secure more learned and able divines for the Lutheran Church. He visited Wiesbaden and induced the Rev. John Gottlief Godfried Gleim to come to Pennsylvania with his wife and daughter (whom Caspar later married), son Georg Christian Gleim, and two nephews, Carl and Jacob Gleim. They all sailed from Würtemberg on the John and Elizabeth and landed at Philadelphia 7 Nov. 1754. Rev. John Gleim settled at Germantown and preached there three years, dying in 1757.

On 21 March 1786 Caspar Fahnestock bought from John Penn the once famous Admiral Warren Tavern plantation, consisting of the inn and 211 acres, for which he paid £2000. An interesting tradition says that he was traveling on foot from Ephrata to Philadelphia with a companion. They came to the Warren Inn and were refused admission because they were travel-stained and dusty, dressed in the garb peculiar to the Seventh Day Baptists. They continued on foot to their destination and purchased the Inn from the Penns. Their return with a deed to the property was somewhat of a shock to the landlord. Caspar Fahnestock shortly thereafter took over the famous hostelry which was then on the direct stage coach route from Philadelphia to Lancaster. It was there that his mother-in-law died, in her 75th year, soon after they had settled in, in October 1786. She was the first to be buried in the Fahnestock burial ground on the North slope of South Valley Hill, about a quarter mile from the tavern, now a much neglected graveyard. In 1789 he turned the Inn over to the

management of his eldest son Charles who ran it until he in turn passed it on to his son William in 1834, shortly before his death.

The Inn lies just beyond Malvern in East Whiteland Township in Chester County. It was built in 1745 and until after the Revolution was known as the Admiral Warren Tavern. Thereafter it was called the General Warren Tavern. During the Revolution it was run by a Tory landlord, Peter Mather, and was used as a meeting place of the Tories. Major André on the night of Sept. 12, 1777, was with the party that stopped at the Warren and then moved on to attack Wayne's forces at Paoli. At one time the Inn was considered the county seat of Chester County. The original tavern was burned down in 1831 and at once rebuilt, much as it now is. At present, owing to improvement of the Lancaster Turnpike, it is no longer on any main road, though still operated as a tavern.

Caspar Fahnestock, according to his gravestone inscription, died 17 Aug. 1808, "aged 84 yrs. 7 mos." and was buried in the family graveyard. His will dated 24 July 1806, proved 24 Aug. 1808, mentions all his children, both sons-in-law, and his grand-child Rebecca, daughter of his son Charles.

The children of Caspar Diedrich and Anna Maria Catherine (Gleim) Fahnestock, all born at Ephrata, were:

3. PETER FAHNESTOCK (Johann Diedrich [No. 1]), b. Amwell, N. J., 3 March 1730; d. Ephrata, Pa., 15 Sept. 1805; m. Ephrata, 12 April 1757, Elizabeth Bolthouser, d. Ephrata, 23 July 1781, daughter of Conrad Bolthouser (d. 31 Jan. 1780) and his wife Catharine (d. 14 March 1761).

Peter Fahnestock until his marriage was a member of the inner circle of the "Christian Society of Ephrata", known as the "Brethren of Bethania". The Brethren lived like monks in a rude three story building with low ceilings and narrow passages, occupying sparsely furnished cells and sleeping on wooden benches with wooden blocks for pillows. They wore white cowls and gowns and went barefooted except in the coldest weather. Bread, vegetables and mush constituted their sole diet, eaten from wooden utensils which they made themselves.

Peter Fahnestock farmed the land next to his father in Ephrata. On 26 Sept. 1758 his father conveyed to "Conrad Baldhouse of Cocalico" and his wife Catherine, for life, land patented to Diedrich Fahnestock 10 Aug. 1757, with remainder to Diedrich's son, Peter, and wife, Elizabeth, "daughter of said Conrad Baldhouser". Conrad Baldhouser was a friend of Peter's father, accompanying him from Amwell to Ephrata and living near him there.

Peter Fahnestock served in the Revolutionary War. In 1778 he was in the 9th Batallion of Lancaster Co. militia under Capt. Bernard Gardner, Col. John Huber; according to an undated return he was later in the 6th Company, 3rd Battalion under Capt. Philip Beck; on 21 March 1781 in the same company under Capt. Michael Oberly, Col. George Feathers, and 23 May 1781 he served again in the same company under the same officers. (Pa. Archives, 5th Ser., 7:229, 243, 245, 876). His brothers, Diedrich and John, served in the same companies. In 1779 he was taxed on 30 acres, 2 horses and 3 cattle in Reading Twp., York Co., and in 1783 he owned but did not occupy 100 acres in the same place. In 1802 he was one of two surviving trustees of the Estate for use of the Seventh Day Baptist Society at Ephrata.

Peter Fahnestock "of Cocalico Twp." made his will 27 July 1805. It was proved 20 Sept. 1805. In it he mentions all his children except Peter; his son-in-law John Landis; Peter and Ann, children of his deceased son Conrad, and Benjamin, Elizabeth and Joseba, children of his deceased daughter Sarah Bowman. He and his wife were buried in the Ephrata Cloisters graveyard.

4. DR. DIEDRICH FAHNESTOCK (Johann Diedrich [No. 1]), b. Amwell, N. J.; 25 Dec. 1733; d. Ephrata, Pa., 20 or 28 Dec. 1816; m. about 1760, Esther Bauman (Bowman), b. 27 March 1740, d. 6 Dec. 1792.

Diedrich Fahnestock was the first physician in a family which is noted for the number of its physicians, dentists and druggists, many Fahnestock girls also marrying doctors. The date and place of his marriage has not been found nor is it known who his wife's parents were. She was a sister of Christian Bowman of E. Pennsboro, Cumberland Co., Pa., who in his will dated 6 Dec. 1807, proved 14 Dec. 1815, mentions his brother-in-law Diedrich Fahnestock, and his own brothers, Benjamin, Daniel and Samuel. (Cumberland Co. Wills 11:358.)

Diedrich Fahnestock, like his brothers Peter and John, served in the Revolutionary War in the 6th Company 3rd Battalion, under Capt. Michael Oberly, Col. George Feathers, appearing on the rolls of 21 March, 23 May, 1781, and 4 Dec. 1782, and under Capt. Philip Beck on an undated return. (Pa. Archives, 5th Ser., 7:229, 243, 245, 254, 307, 321.)

After the Revolution he lived for awhile in Marietta, Pa., for a notice in the Marietta Pilot of 26 July 1814, says: "Dr. D.

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Fahnestock intends leaving Marietta about the 18 Aug. next. Therefore respectfully requests those indebted to him to discharge their respective bills previous to said date." He returned to Cocalico Township, one and a half miles from Ephrata. dated 10 Dec. 1803, proved 17 March 1814, mentions his children, Mary now wife of John Rudisill; Samuel; Peter; John; Daniel; Susanna; Margaret Bowman and her six children, Samuel, Jacob, William, Esther, Susanna, and Mary; deceased daughter Esther Kimmel and her children, Susanna and Mary; Joseba Hay and her children Michael and Julian Hay, and grandchildren Samuel and George Bealer, by his daughter Mary's former husband, George Bealer. In the Lancaster Journal of 27 Aug. 1817 there appeared the following notice: "Pursuant to the last will and testament of Dietrich Fahnestock, dec'd, will be sold at public vendue on 1st Oct. next ensuing, 106 acres of valuable limestone land lying in Cocalico Twp. 11/2 miles from Ephrata, on which are erected 2 two story limestone dwelling houses, a large Swisser barn and a press house. There is an excellent well and pump close to the house, also a fine spring nearly in the center of the clear land by which 7 acres of excellent meadow can be watered. There are about 30 acres of good woodland and a large orchard of choice The place being well known may be readily viewed fruit trees. by persons inclined to purchase, previous to the day of the sale. Terms made known on day of sale by the undersigned executors, Samuel Fahnestock, Daniel Fahnestock."

Diedrich and his wife Esther were buried in Ephrata Cloisters graveyard. His tombstone gives his date of death as 20 Dec. but the Reading "Adler" of 14 Jan. 1817 says he died 28 Dec. 1816.

5. JOHN FAHNESTOCK (Johann Diedrich [No. 1]), b. Amwell, N. J., about 1735; d. Cocalico Twp., Pa., 22 May 1812; m. Rebecca Groff, b. about 1742 probably at Amwell, N. J., d. Cocalico Twp., 17 Jan. 1773, "aged 30", daughter of Henry and Ann (Harley) Groff; m. (2) Catherine (——) Studebaker, b. 1745;

d. Cocalico Twp., Pa., 15 May 1822.

John Fahnestock was born after I Oct. 1734, when his father writes that of four sons Diedrich is the "smallest", and before 31 Oct. 1737, when his father refers to "5 sons still living". He was probably born about 1735. His gravestone inscription says he died 22 May 1812 "in 77th yr." His first wife's father was a native of Nivit, Germany, and went to Amwell, N. J. Her mother was a daughter of Rudolph Harley. His second wife was probably widow of Clement Studebaker, whose daughter Hannah married Dr. Samuel Fahnestock [No. 13], and mother, by her first husband, of Clement Studebaker who married John Fahnestock's daughter Maria [No. 28].

John Fahnestock served in the Revolutionary War in 1778 in the 9th Battalion of Lancaster Co. Militia under Capt. Bernard Gardner, Col. John Huber, and was on rolls of the 6th Co. 3rd Battalion of Lancaster Co. Militia under Capt. Michael Oberly (Oberlin), Col. George Feathers, dated 21 March and 23 May 1781, and on an undated return in the same company and battalion under ensign Michael Oberly, Lt. Peter Bentz and Capt. Philip Beck. (Pa. Archives, 5th Ser., 7:229, 243, 246, 879). His will dated at Cocalico Twp., 18 Oct. 1811, proved 30 May 1812, mentions his wife Catherine; children, Henry, Rebecca, Hannah, and Jacob; granddaughter Rebecca, dau. of Clement "Hutenbacker"

who in releasing executors in 1818 is called "Stewthebaker", and sons-in-law David Bollinger and Jacob Konigmacher. His executors were Jacob Fahnestock and Jacob Studebaker.

The Commemorative Biographical Encyclopedia of Dauphin Co., Pa., states that he and his widow Catherine died in Pittsburgh, but since his will was dated about seven months before his death at Cocalico Twp. and both he and his widow were buried at Ephrata Cloisters, it is probable that they both died in his home near Ephrata.

(1) at Huntington, now Latimore Twp., York Co., Pa., 18 Dec. 1764, Eleanora Leas, b. 3 May 1744, d. 22 Sept. 1781, daughter of Leonard Leas (Lais, Liest, or Läsht), (b. 1710, d. 16 Nov. 1782) and his wife Sarah (d. after 1793); m. (2) Catherine Reiter, b. 1757, d. 1831, daughter of Frederic Reiter of Washington Twp., Pa.

Daniel Fahnestock was born about 1737 and is probably the fifth son, "still living", referred to in his father's letter of 31 Oct. 1737, though if his older brother Andreas was still living he may have been born as late as 1740. He was the second brother to become a physician. He was living in Warrington Twp., York Co., Pa., in 1780, when he was taxed on 100 acres there. On 24 June 1790, Dr. Daniel Fahnestock "of Warrington Twp." bought a plantation called "Sociability" in Tyrone Twp., Cumberland Co., Pa., and in December of that year he bought land with a

gristmill on Buffalo Creek in Rye Twp., Cumberland Co. (later Juniata), to which place he apparently moved. He is described as a yeoman (farmer) in that deed and in August 1797 Daniel Fahnestock "yeoman of Juniata" bought land on Little Buffalo Creek in Juniata. His first wife is called Ellen Lais on her marriage record which appears in the Lower Bermudian Church, York Co., records, and in Strayers Lutheran Church records. The latter church was situated near Dover, in York Co. Her father is called Leonard Läsht on his tombstone record at the Markey Burial Ground in Washington Twp., York Co., Pa. In his will filed in York Co., Pa., he calls himself Leonard Leas, the name used by his descendants. It is dated 7 Nov. 1782, proved 9 Dec. 1782, and describes him as of Reading Twp. It mentions his daughter "Eleanor Fahnstick".

Dr. Daniel Fahnestock's second wife was Catherine, daughter of Frederic Reiter and granddaughter of Henry Lehman, and therefore sister of the spouses of her stepchildren, William and Esther. (See William Fahnestock'[No. 33]). She m. (2) John Ewald. The will of Daniel Fahnestock of Juniata, dated 6 Dec. 1800, proved 21 Feb. 1807, between which dates he must have died, refers to his wife Catherine, sons William and Daniel, daughters Mary, Salome, Esther, Margareth and Barbara, and minor children Eleanor and Joseph. His first wife was buried in the Markey Burial Ground, Washington Twp., York Co., Pa. His second wife was buried in the Cocklin Cemetery in Upper Allen Twp., Pa., her year of birth and death only, being inscribed in the

records.

His will dated I June, proved 26 Sept. 1820, mentions his wife Christiana, sons George, John, Henry, Peter and Benjamin, and daughters Christiana, wife of Peter Aughenbach, and Joseba, wife of Dr. Jacob Bowman. He and his widow are buried in the Ephrata Cloisters Cemetery. His first wife is buried in Markey Burial Ground, Washington Twp., York Co., Pa.

The children of Benjamin and Catherine Barbara (Gerber) Fahnestock, probably the first seven born in Warrington Twp., York Co., Pa., the others in Chambersburg, Pa., were:


8. BORIUS FAHNESTOCK (Johann Diedrich [No. 1]), b. Ephrata, Pa., 9 May 1749; d. East Berlin, formerly Berwick Twp. now Hamilton Twp., Adams Co., Pa., 9 June 1820; m. 17 Oct. 1772, Elizabeth Enders, b. Dec. 1752; d. 1836–7 (Admr. 7 Feb. 1837 granted to son-in-law Jacob Gardner). Her parentage has not been discovered, but she was sister of Nicholas Enders who died in York Co., Pa., in 1810 as appears by his will in which his brother-in-law Borius Fahnestock was one of the executors.

Borius Fahnestock was taxed in Warrington Twp., York Co., in 1780 and 1782, on 100 acres. In 1786 Borius Fahnestock, late of Baltimore, merchant, purchased a mill and 25 acres of land in Berwick Twp. for £1000. He lived in what is now East Berlin, Adams Co., Pa., at the eastern end of the borough, having a patent from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to a large tract of land 3

April 1789. On 29 March 1808 he was Commissioned Justice of the Peace of Adams County by the Governor. His will dated 2 March, proved 22 July 1820, mentions his wife and children, Salome, Diedrich, Joseba, Elizabeth, Mary, Dinah, Benjamin and Daniel. He is buried in the Union Cemetery, E. Berlin, Hamilton Twp., Adams Co., Pa., near his home.

9. CHARLES FAHNESTOCK (Caspar Diedrich [No. 2], Johann Diedrich), b. Ephrata, Lancaster Co., Pa., I Feb. 1761; d. East Whiteland Twp., Chester Co., 16 Jan. 1837; m. Susanna Smith, b. 24 Sept. 1768; d. E. Whiteland, 17 Sept. 1814, daughter of John Smith and his first wife, Elizabeth Catherine. In his will, filed in Lancaster Co., dated 15 Dec. 1814, proved I June 1818, John Smith mentions his wife Salome (his 2nd wife, widow of John Ness) and his daughter Susan, wife of Charles Fahnestock, and John Smith's first wife, Elizabeth Catherine.

Charles Fahnestock was a sparely built man, 5 feet 11 inches tall, with a full beard. He ran the General Warren Inn after his father turned its management over to him in 1789 until 1834, three years before his death, when he left its operation to his youngest surviving son William. It was during his ownership that the Inn was burned down in 1831 and the present building immediately erected in its place. He became a strict Presbyterian and closed the bar of the Inn on Sundays. In 1834, the year when he turned the tavern over to his son William, the railroad was built from Philadelphia to Lancaster, with a consequent falling off of business which was largely dependent on the stage coach trade.

Charles Fahnestock fought in the Revolutionary War, enlisting in the fall of 1785 in the 2nd Co. of the 6th Battalion of Lancaster Co. militia under Capt. Michael Oberlin, and Lt. Col. John Huber.

(Pa. Archives, 6th Ser., 3:553).

His will proved 6 July 1837, mentions his son William; his son-in-law John F. "Stineman", trustee for his daughter Catherine, wife of Joseph Phillips, whose bequest was for life only; heirs of his son Caspar, and his daughters Mary S. "Stineman" and Esther Fahnestock. He, his wife and his unmarried children are all buried in the family graveyard near the General Warren Inn. His was the last burial there as his son William sold the Inn in 1838 and the family moved away. The only one buried there not of the Fahnestock family was "Thomas Bradley, native of England, d. 27 Aug. 1826 ae. 76". He was doubtless a servant in some capacity at the Inn.

The children of Charles and Susanna (Smith) Fahnestock, all born at the General Warren Inn, East Whiteland, Chester Co., Pa., were:

Samuel Fahnestock fought in the Revolutionary War in the 6th Company, 3rd Battalion, of Lancaster Militia under Capt. Michael

Oberly (Oberlin), Col. George Feathers, in 1781 and 1782, and in the fall of 1785 in the 2nd Company of the same Battalion, under Capt. Michael Oberlin, Lt. Col. John Huber. (Pa. Archives, 5th Ser., 7:244, 246, 254, 308, 310, 312; 6th Ser., 3:553.) In 1799 he was a merchant at Abbottstown, Cumberland Co., Pa. He later built a house in East Berlin, Hamilton Twp., Pa., where he had bought land as early as 1788.

His first wife, Hannah, was daughter of Clement Studebaker, whose widow married as a second wife, John Fahnestock [No. 5]. She had a sister Elizabeth Studebaker who married Walter Fundenburg, and had a son Daniel Fundenburg who married Rebecca Fahnestock [No. 53], daughter of Samuel Fahnestock and Hannah. Her brother Clement Studebaker married Maria Fahnestock [No. 28].

In 1814 he organized the Berlin and Hanover Turnpike which started "at or near Michael Geiselman's mill" in East Berlin. The mill was at the east end of the borough and was owned by Borius Fahnestock [No. 8]. His descendant William W. Resser of East Berlin still owns the account book in which he charged the amounts paid to his children. He died of apoplexy. He and his first wife, Hannah, were buried in Mummerts Baptist Cemetery, Hamilton Twp., Adams Co., Pa. Conrad Fahnestock fought in the Revolutionary War in the fall of 1785 in the 2nd Company, 3rd Battalion, under Capt. Michael Oberlin, Lt. Col. John Huber (Pa. Archives, 6th Ser., 3:554). He learned printing from the Ephrata Brethren. In 1791 went to Harrisburg, Pa., and engaged in the mercantile business with his younger brother, Obed. He continued his printing there, publishing a paper. During the Alien and Sedition Acts he was a warm supporter of Thomas Jefferson against John Adams and in consequence thereof he was arrested and imprisoned in 1800 on the eve of Jefferson's election. He was released a few days later. His paper which he owned in partnership with Benjamin Mayer, was called the Morgenrothe or Dutch Aurora. Later he went to Middletown, Pa., where he was a merchant and where he died. He was buried in the Harrisburg Cemetery at Harrisburg, Pa. His widow was buried at Middle Creek Cemetery, Ephrata Twp., Pa. His will dated 18 Sept., proved 14 Oct. 1803, left all to his wife Mary, for life, remainder to his children, unnamed. His executors were his widow and his brother Obed.





Obed Fahnestock moved to Harrisburg about 1795 where he joined his older brother Samuel in the mercantile business which he followed until 1822. He remained throughout his life a Seventh Day Baptist. He was an outstanding character in the community, serving as Coroner 1802–3 and Director of the Poor 1811–13. Governor Snyder appointed him Associate County Judge, 12 Nov. 1813. He resigned 30 July 1818 owing to his dislike of the newly appointed Presiding Justice, Samuel D. Franks. In 1820 he was Treasurer of the German Society of Harrisburg, and served as Burgess of the Borough 1820 and 1821. He was frequently a member of the Council and was Prothonotary 1824 to 1830. That he was a fine penman is evidenced by the inventory he made of his father's estate in 1805. In 1797 he lived in a brick house next to General Hanna's "on the bank" (of the Susquehanna River) and the next year removed to a place "opposite the Sign of King of Prussia", Market Square and 2nd Street. His wife, Anna Maria Gessel, was baptized 31 Aug. 1777 in the

His wife, Anna Maria Gessel, was baptized 31 Aug. 1777 in the Trinity Lutheran Church in Brickersville. Her father William Gessel was probably the son of William Gessel who came to Philadelphia in 1735 in the brigantine Mary. William Gessel, Jr., served in the Revolutionary War in 1780–1782 in the 7th Company, 3rd Battalion of Lancaster Co. militia under Capt. John Ashton (Pa. Archives, 5th Ser., 17:227, 261). He and his wife were Moravians living at Lititz. They moved to the Northwest Territory when it was opened up in 1787. His wife, Anna Dorothea, was b. 31 Jan. 1752, daughter of Jacob Heil, a German Palatinate, b. in Rohrbach, April 1712 and his wife Anna Catherina, daughter of Nicolaus Riehl.

Obed Fahnestock and his wife were buried in the Harrisburg Cemetery at Harrisburg, Pa. His will dated 28 Nov. 1836 was proved 24 April 1840. In it he left everything to his wife "Mary"

for life and after her death to his unnamed children.



18. REVEREND ANDREW FAHNESTOCK (Peter [No. 3], Johann Diedrich), b. Ephrata, 27 Nov. 1780; d. Snow Hill, Franklin Co., Pa., 5 Feb. 1863; m. Margaret Graver, b. 18 Jan. 1779; d. 11 April 1847.

Andrew Fahnestock was in Lower Paxton Twp., Dauphin Co., Pa., in 1809 and bought land in Hamilton Twp., Adams Co., in 1814, where he resided as late as 1827. He later settled at Snow Hill, Quincy Twp., Franklin Co., Pa. He was ordained Elder of the Snow Hill Seventh Day Baptists, 23 Aug. 1823, and officiated as pastor there until his death, and alternately between Snow Hill and Ephrata after 1843. This was the most prosperous period of the Snow Hill Community whose first community house was built in 1814. The second community house there was built under his leadership in 1835, the Brother House in 1838 and the Sister House in 1843. The Community was founded by Andreas Schneeberger (Snowhill) from whom the name was derived. Reverend Andrew Fahnestock was of most patriarchal appearance, with long flowing snow-white beard falling on his breast. He was of childlike simplicity and guilelessness. At one time he was quite wealthy, but he gave all he owned to the poor and would accept no pay for his services. "Of his children, Obed gave him much sorrow and Derrick was no better," says George Wolff

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Fahnestock in his manuscript. His picture may be seen in Sachse's German Sectarians of Pa. 2:369. He and his widow both died intestate and are buried in the Snow Hill Cemetery a few miles north of Waynesboro. The Roll of Departed Members of Snow Hill Communal Society says: "The venerable teacher Andreas Fahnestock died in the 5th day of the 2nd month 1863. His age 82 years, 2 months and 9 days."



Der Volksfreund, a German language newspaper, of Lancaster says in its issue of 20 Dec. 1836 that Dr. Samuel Fahnestock was a very skillful physician, highly loved and respected by the citizens, through almost 50 years of practice in Lancaster.

His wife is wrongly called Rebecca Baker in the Fahnestock Memorial. Her father Arnold Becker was son of Christian and Valentine (Fetty) Becker, German Palatinates who came to

America from Rotterdam in the Betsy, 27 August 1737.

Jacob Kimmel was a tavern keeper at Ephrata. At the fork of the lower Reading Road and the road to the Cloisters near the bridge over the Cocalico is or was (in 1899), a massive building formerly the tavern. The tablets in the wall bore the inscription "Jacob Kimmel A.D. 1795—Esther Kimmel MDCCVC". In the Kimmel manuscript at the Hist. Soc. of York Co., Pa., he is said to have been born 1733, son of John Jacob Kimmel who came from Gimpsheim, Germany (b. 14 Oct. 1706; d. Ephrata 25 Nov. 1784) and his wife Maria Barbara Heinrich who d. 1753 at Lower Bermudian, Pa. This is probably an error. These were more likely his grandparents. He was in all likelihood the son of Philip Kimmel and Anna Christina who was baptised at the Lutheran and Reformed Upion Congregation at Lower Bermudian, 28 Aug. 1757. His wife was buried at Ephrata. His date of death is unknown. The Jacob Kimmel, b. 10 Oct. 1733, son of John Jacob Kimmel, the emigrant, died 9 Dec. 1812 and he and a wife Elizabeth are buried at Snow Hill Cemetery, Quincy Twp., Franklin Co., Pa.

The will of Dr. Diedrich Fahnestock dated 10 Dec. 1803 mentions only two children of his daughter Esther Kimmel; Susanna and Mary, but in Lancaster Co. Deeds N 5:432 is a release by George and Sarah Wechter to Dr. Jacob Konigmacher (see No. 13) as a guardian of Sarah, "late daughter of Jacob Kimmel".

Samuel Bauman, in his will, dated 5 June 1802, proved 18 Nov. 1807 left his wife Catharine land in Harrisburg and his plantation on the Susquehanna River in Buffalo Twp. and mentions his sons Henry and John and daughter Susannah and her husband (not named) and their children (not named). The Susannah mentioned was the wife of Dr. Peter Fahnestock [No. 23], brother of Margaret (Fahnestock) Bauman. The oldest child of John and Margaret Bauman was named Samuel after his grandfather, and a daughter Susanna named for John's sister, who m. Dr. Peter Fahnestock. The inventory of John Bauman was filed in 1810 and on 22 Aug. 1810 his minor children petitioned for guardians.

Dr. Peter Fahnestock resided at Oyster Point, Cumberland County, about three miles west of Susquehanna, Pa., and practiced

medicine there from before 1800 until 1813.

His wife was sister of John Bauman who married Dr. Peter Fahnestock's sister Margaret (see No. 22). On the 27th March 1809, Henry Bowman conveyed to his brother John Bowman and

2 years hase been xurialianis. 1792 = 1498 to Christian Mohler, executors under the will of Samuel Bowman, one third of the house in Harrisburg which Samuel Bowman left to his wife with remainder to his three children, in trust for Susanna, wife of Peter Fahnestock of East Pennsboro. On 24 June 1811 further property was conveyed to John Bowman in trust for Susanna Fahnestock and on 28 Nov. 1814 Susanna Fahnestock acknowledges receipt of legacy of her father Samuel Bowman from John Bowman.

Dr. Peter Fahnestock probably died in 1816, as on Nov. 9th, 1816, administration of his estate was granted to Solomon Gorgas, husband of Catherine Fahnestock, [No. 11], the sureties on the bond being John Fahnestock and John Bowman. Susanna, widow of Dr. Peter Fahnestock left a will dated at East Pennsboro, 14 Oct. 1849, proved 20 Feb. 1850, in which she left a legacy for a "love feast" to be held at the Snow Hill Communal Society, and in which she left the family Bibles to her grandchildren, Susanna, wife of Charles Wolfensber and Derick G. Fahnestock. Derick G. was the son of her son, Dr. Derick, and it is probable that Susanna was Dr. Derick's daughter though it is possible that she was a daughter of his younger brother Samuel. Abraham Funk of East Pennsboro in 1824 left bequests to "Peter Fahnestock's heirs." His relationship has not been determined.

George Hay in 1791 was Captain of the Independent Light Infantry of York, Pa., which later became the 113th Regiment. From 1800 to 1801 he was Captain and Adjutant of 113th Regiment. In 1810 he was commissioned Lieutenant-Colonel, and in 1813, Colonel of the Regiment. He resigned in 1814 at the conclusion of the War of 1812. He was Coroner of York County 1789–1802, Assistant Burgess 1806, 2nd Burgess 1807, Chief Burgess 1808, 2nd Burgess 1809–12. Burgesses were equivalent

to the present day councilmen. In 1811 he was County Treasurer of York. After resigning as Colonel of the 113th Regiment he became the innkeeper of the "Indian King" at York. Joseba (Fahnestock) Hay was buried at Ephrata Cloisters Cemetery. He m. (2nd) Susan Schole.

William Fahnestock lived near Brandtsville, Monroe Twp., Cumberland Co., Pa. His birth date is taken from his gravestone. The Fahnestock Memorial says he was born in 1776 but the earlier date is probably right as William is mentioned before Daniel in their father's will, and note the age of his wife. In an interesting deed filed in York Co., Pa. (2W:443), dated 21 April 1812, a release to Frederick Reiter "now seized of life estate in estate of Henry Lehman deceased" is given by Catherine Fahnestock (widow of Daniel Fahnestock [No. 6]) Henry Flory and his wife Rosina, Jacob Brehm and his wife Hannah, William Fahnestock and his wife Esther, and Benjamin Harlacher and his wife Barbara, Theresia Cook, John Bower and his wife Sabina, Ephraim Reiter, Frederick Reiter and John Reiter. The wives were all children of Frederic Reiter of Washington Twp., York Co., who in his will dated 30 Dec. 1809, proved 25 Feb. 1811 (York Wills M:312), leaves bequests to his children Ephraim, Frederic, John, Rosina, Sapphina (Sabrina), Catherine (wife of John Ewald in 1816, Deed 3F:79) and her three children; Hannah, Esther, Theresa and her son Jacob Kimmel, Barbara, and sonin-law Benjamin Harlacher. The latter was a son of Mary Harlacher, sister of John Lashey and daughter of Christine Lashey.

Christine Lashey was a sister of Anna Margaretha Wirth, who married Johann Diedrich Fahnestock.

William Fahnestock was buried on the Hoover Farm near Brandtsville. At the time of his enlistment, he was 6 feet tall with auburn hair and gray eyes. His widow applied for a pension 23 Sept. 1879, at which time she was living at Frazier, Chester Co., Pa. Her application was rejected as there was no record of any Captain Wayne's Company in U. S. Service. The service may have been only a State enlistment. In his will dated 2 Sept. 1863, proved 14 March 1870, Caspar Fahnestock left his son John Henry \$600. Everything else was bequeathed to his wife Jemima. He and his widow were buried in Oaklands Cemetery, West Chester, Pa.

Weistling and spent some time in the printing house of the Messrs. Johnson in Philadelphia before taking the position of Teller in the Harrisburg Bank in 1830. He was appointed Cashier in 1844 and held that post until his death in 1878. He wrote frequently for the press and published several religious tracts and "Manual of Prayer" (1838), "The Closet Companion" (1854), and "Home

Worship." He was always courteous, of unimpeachable integrity and his intellect and ability were of the highest order. He had no children.

Dr. William Morrell Fahnestock was probably named for David Louis Morel who on I June 1802 conveyed land to Obed Fahnestock in trust for his son William Morell. Dr. Fahnestock's picture may be seen in Sachse's German Sectarians of Penna. 2:161, and his portrait is owned by his great grandson, Dr. Barry King of Great Neck L. I. He took up his residence in Bordentown, N. J.

Dr. Fahnestock was fond of antiquarian research and in 1835 published an historical sketch of Ephrata, with a concise account of the German Seventh Day Baptist Community there, of which he was a prominent member. He was appointed a delegate to the Seventh Day Baptist General Conference at Shiloh, N. Y. in September 1846, probably the first Ephratian to attain this honor, but he was unable to attend. He often preached at Ephrata. He was a life member of the Seventh Day Baptist Missionary Society, Vice President of the American Sabbath Tract Society in 1846 and Director of the Seventh Day Baptist Publishing House at Little Genesee, N. Y. in 1854. A voluminous contributor to the Sabbath Recorder, he wrote a scholarly article on The German Seventh Day Baptists which was included in Rupp's "Religious Denominations of the United States" (ed. of 1844). In 1850 he was the author of a 24 page tract entitled "The Bible Sabbath." He died in a Philadelphia hospital from injuries received in a fall down the stairway of a private house. He and his widow were both buried in the Harrisburg Cemetery, Harrisburg, Pa.

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



Adam Konigmacher Fahnestock lived most of his life where he was born and where he died, in his father's homestead at Second Street and Market Square, Harrisburg, Pa. When a young man he lived for a while in Germantown, Pa., where he established a fulling business. On his return to Harrisburg he started a hardware business, at the same time manufacturing bricks on a large scale, a business which he carried on for 15 years. In 1833 he established a glue factory. He and his brother Walter Franklin were the authors of the Fahnestock Memorial, published in 1879. His favorite pastime was carving and cabinetmaking and he made many exquisite tables, chairs and other furniture for members of his family and friends, often from fruit woods grown in his own orchard.

During the Civil War, when the internal revenue system was begun, through the influence of his eldest son he was made the first Collector of his District, a position he held until 1865. In 1866 he retired from active business. He served for a number of years on the Harrisburg City Council. He was Treasurer of Harrisburg, 1858 to 1860, and was Treasurer of The Dauphin County Bible Society. He was a Baptist but for a long time attended the Market Square Presbyterian Church. His earnestness, fidelity and loyalty won him a host of friends.

His first wife was granddaughter of a soldier in the Revolutionary War, Eli Holbrook, b. Brimfield, Mass., 11 Feb. 1745/6; d. Townshend, Vt., 7 Nov. 1828, and of his wife Sibel Thompson, b. Brimfield, Mass., 14 Oct. 1750; d. Townshend, Vt., 16 April 1810, daughter of Daniel and Hannah Thompson. Daniel Thompson (b. 3 Oct. 1725; d. 1 Feb. 1811) was a sergeant in the French and Indian Wars and first cousin of Benjamin Thompson, father of Count Rumford. Mr. Fahnestock's second wife was sister of Dr. William Smith Wallace, who married Frances Todd, sister of Mary Todd, wife of Abraham Lincoln. His will dated 5 July 1879 was proved 19 Nov. 1887. Adam Konigmacher Fahnestock and his wives were buried in the Harrisburg Cemetery. His children were all by his first wife.

Simon Snyder Fahnestock entered the U. S. Military Academy at West Point as a cadet I July 1837. He graduated I July 1841, 20th in the class of 52, and was commissioned Lieutenant of Artillery. He served on the Northern frontier during the Canadian border disturbances, at Detroit Arsenal 1841, at Sacketts Harbor, N. Y., 1841. He was in garrison at Fortress Monroe, Va., 1842–3, at Carlisle Barracks, Pa., 1843–44, again at Fortress Monroe 1844–5. He participated in the military occupation of Texas 1845–6 and the Mexican War 1846, where he fought at the Battle of Palo Alto and Resaca de la Palma in May. In 1846–7 he was engaged in recruiting. He was commissioned 1st Lieutenant of the 4th U. S. Artillery, 18 June 1846. In the Mexican War 1847–8 he was acting Assistant Adjutant-General of the Department at Vera Cruz, and in February 1848 of the Brigade

moving on Orizaba, Mexico. In 1848-9 he was in garrison at Fortress Monroe and at Fort Pike, La. He took part against the Seminole Indians in Florida 1849-50, resigning 30 April 1850. For the next six years he was in business with his brother Walter F. Fahnestock as hardware merchants at Pittsburgh, Pa., and then for a year tried farming in Prince William Co., Va. From 1857 to 1860 he was a draughtsman in the Construction Department of the U. S. Treasury at Washington. He was Assistant Examiner in the U. S. Patent Office 1860–1861, Principal Examiner 1861–1865, and resigned to become Solicitor of American and Foreign Patents at Washington, appearing as attorney before the U. S. Supreme Court. He was Colonel of the District of Columbia Militia 1861 to 1866. Colonel Fahnestock was buried in the Harrisburg Cemetery, Harrisburg, Pa.

John Eberman was Cashier of the Farmers Bank at Lancaster. He came from one of the most extensive and best known families of old clock-makers in Lancaster County. They ranked with the best both in the quantity and quality of their work. They made the town clock that for many years hung in the belfry of the court-house in Pennsylvania Square and is now stored in the loft of the present Court House. The first of three generations of clock-makers was John Eberman, father of the husband of Sarah Elizabeth Fahnestock. He came to America the year of his birth with his father, also a John Eberman, and his wife Juliana Schweigin. John Eberman, husband of Sarah Elizabeth, followed his father in the business, as did his brothers Jacob and Joseph. His name appears upon many of the grandfather clocks of the period. It was

the father John who made the town clock. John Eberman, Jr.'s picture may be seen opposite page 150 of the Lancaster County Historical Soc. Publ. Vol. XLIII, No. 5. His will dated 28 Feb., proved 30 Nov. 1846, indicates that he was very wealthy. He left bequests to the Society and Congregation of United Brethren, to his wife Sarah, sons Albert F., Samuel F., Edward M. and daughter May Louisa, wife of James C. Hathorn.

He and his widow were buried in the Moravian Cemetery and

later removed to Woodward Hill Cemetery, Lancaster, Pa.

Dr. William Baker Fahnestock graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1825 and began the practice of medicine in Lancaster, where he became one of the leading physicians, carrying on an extensive practice for thirty years. For a long time in connection with his practice, he had a drug store on West King Street just above the Sorrel Horse Hotel. He was a founder of the Lancaster City and County Medical Society, his membership dations from 18

ing from 1844.

A man of wide accomplishments and varied tastes, he combined scientific knowledge and research with many philanthropies. With his close friend, James Damant, principal of a flourishing ladies' school, when the news of Daguerre's new method of taking pictures in France reached Lancaster, he worked zealously to

develop the process. They worked out important and satisfactory results with only the guidance of the meager newspaper reports of the day. He was the first person in the city to take daguerreotypes. The Lancaster Intelligencer and Journal of 4 Jan. 1842 ran the following notice. "We invite attention to the advertisement of James Damant and Dr. William B. Fahnestock, two gentlemen well known in this city for their scientific attainments, proposing to take likenesses by the new daguerreotype process. . . . We understand that they have acquired a knowledge of this astonishing process unaided by any instruction save such as they were able to glean from published accounts; and the result is that they have brought it to a state of more perfection than any we have seen in the cities. These gentlemen are our fellow citizens and it behooves us to encourage what is emphatically native talent."

He and his father-in-law, Henry M. Reigert, were the first to notify James Buchanan of his election to the Presidency, driving

to Wheatlands for that purpose 19 June 1856.

Later in life he entered upon investigations into animal magnetism, spiritualism and clairvoyance, finally developing his theory of statuvolence upon which he wrote an interesting work. His theory was that diseases should be treated mentally. He developed many remarkable and startling results, his reports attracting great attention among scientists and institutes of Europe.

In 1876 he wrote a 114 page book entitled "Worlds Within Worlds—Wonderful Discoveries in Astronomy—The Sun and Stars Inhabited." This book, most curiously illustrated, explains his theory of the composition, inhabitancy and physical features of the planets. Dr. Fahnestock was also an expert mineralogist and assayer, at one time acting for seven years as superintendent and assayer of the copper mines at Cornwall in Lebanon County.

For a brief period he lived and practiced medicine in Marietta, Pa. On account of failing health, a few years before his death, he retired to Walhalla, S. C. He joined the Protestant Episcopal Church in early life, being confirmed at St. Stephens in Philadelphia while attending the University of Pennsylvania.

His widow's will dated 23 Sept. 1893, proved 4 April 1896, men-

tions all her surviving children and Jacob K. Miller and his wife Mae, who may have been parents of the wife of her son James Damant Fahnestock. Her estate consisted of two small farms in South Carolina and a one-fifth interest in land in Calhoun Co., Ga. and in Chicago. Dr. Fahnestock and his widow were buried in Woodward Hill Cemetery, Lancaster.

Little is known of Dr. Derick Fahnestock and his family. His mother, in her will dated 14 Oct. 1849, left family Bibles to her grandchildren Susanna, wife of Charles Wolfensber, and to Derick G. Fahnestock. 

He won the Junior orator first prize in 1867 and was chosen to write the ode of welcome for the Centennial Celebration of the Cliosophic Society. He was Salutatorian of his class at Commencement. In 1871 he was elected both by his class and the college faculty to deliver the master's oration, but declined the honor. He was a teacher in the College of New Jersey 1870 to 1873, at the same time studying Theology at Princeton, where he graduated in 1871. Licensed to preach by the Presbytery of New Brunswick, N. J., 15 April 1874, on 24 January 1875 he became pastor of the First Ward Presbyterian Church in Syracuse, N. Y., in which, his first charge, he continued until death.

He was a man of strong character and dominant purpose, an eminent scholar of taste and refinement which gave literary charm to his expression of thought. This was shown in such dainty publications as "The Autograph Thanksgiving Souvenir" and "The Bride's Gift to Her Friends." He was at home in the classics, his most striking translation was perhaps that of the hymn "Dies Irae." Washington College, Tennessee, conferred upon him, 12 April 1894, the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

He was buried in Oakwood Cemetery, Syracuse.

He soon felt that the insane should have a hospital to themselves and was fortunate in interesting Miss Dorothea Lynde Dix in his plans. On November 11, 1862 Dr. Reed transferred his patients, 113 in number, to his new institution ten miles from Pittsburgh overlooking the Ohio River. As Miss Dix had more or less discovered this property and had been influential in its purchase, the place was called Dixmont. The hospital was known as the department for mental diseases of the Western Pennsylvania Hospital. In 1905 by an order of court its name was changed to

The Dixmont Hospital. Although in those early days such institutions were more or less custodial in character and did not always enjoy a very favorable reputation, Miss Dix and Dr. Reed were among the pioneers in the field of mental hospitals and Dixmont gained a well earned reputation for its excellent care and treatment. There are now over 1000 patients at Dixmont. Miss Dix lived with the Reed family for thirteen years, going from there on trips in regard to her various philanthropic works. Dr. Reed's second wife, Mrs. Mary Frances Fahnestock Reed, gave much thought and untiring effort to the well being of the patients and her beautiful Christian character was much felt at the hospital. After Dr. Reed's death Dr. Henry Ashmore Hutchinson, who had been Assistant Superintendent, was appointed Superintendent and later married Sarah Fahnestock Reed, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Reed. Dr. Reed and his widow are buried in Allegheny Cemetery, Pittsburgh.

Harris Charles Fahnestock terminated his school career at Harrisburg Academy at the age of sixteen. His schoolmates say that he was unusually bright and especially good at mathematics. When he left school in 1851 he went into his father's store and then into the Harrisburg National Bank, controlled by his uncle James W. Weir, where he soon became paying teller. In 1861, having attracted the attention of Jay Cooke through his ability and energy in pushing the sale of a Pennsylvania bond issue of \$3,000,000, he entered the banking firm of Jay Cooke & Co. in Philadelphia, as a partner. He soon went to Washington where he remained throughout the Civil War. He had a sixth interest in the Washington branch of the firm, of which, with Henry P. Cooke, brother of Jay Cooke, he was in charge. The firm became a main reliance of the Government in the sale of war bonds.

After the war Jay Cooke opened a New York office, as Jay Cooke, McCullock & Co., the burden falling on Mr. Fahnestock who had by then a fourteen percent interest in the New York, Washington and Philadelphia offices. The New York branch opened the first day of March 1866 and was successful from the start. Jay Cooke became interested in the building of the Northern Pacific Railroad and undertook to sell their bonds against the advice of Mr. Fahnestock. The result was the closing of the doors of the New York office 18 Sept. 1873. Although the assets of the firm were more than twice its liabilities and its debts were paid off in seven years, the New York office never reopened.

Mr. Fahnestock, on the closing of the office, together with George F. Baker and James A. Garland, bought controlling interest in the First National Bank of New York. Mr. Fahnestock took charge of the bond department of the First National Bank of the City of New York, one of the oldest national banks of the country. In 1877 he became Vice President and Director. He resigned as Vice President in 1911 but remained as a Director until his death in 1914. The present importance of the Bank in the world of finance is almost entirely due to Harris C. Fahnestock.

On May 10, 1881, his son William founded Fahnestock & Co. with Joseph T. Brown, Harris C. Fahnestock appearing as a special partner. His grandson, William Fahnestock, Jr., is now the head of the firm.

Early in his career he became interested in railroads and while in Washington was Treasurer of the Washington and Georgetown Railway, the first line of horse cars in Washington. His connec-



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tion with the Richmond and Danville Railroad was probably his most interesting experience. He took hold of the property when it was in a highly speculative and chaotic state, built it up and left it. It was later wrecked and then reorganized by Drexel, Morgan & Co. as the present Southern Railroad.

He was a member of the firm of Winslow, Lanier & Co., Vice President of the East Jersey Water Co., Tidewater Pipe Co., Ltd., and the New Jersey Junction Railroad Company, a director of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad, Western Union Telegraph Co., American Cotton Oil Co., New Jersey Security Co., and of many other corporations. He was considered one of the foremost authorities on the subject of banking in the United States.

Mr. Fahnestock was a founder and trustee of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and its Treasurer from 1901 to 1914. Through a gift in his memory by his daughter Mrs. John Hubbard, he was declared a benefactor of the Museum. He was a member of many distinguished New York Clubs. He was fond of music and sang in the Presbyterian choir and later, in his Washington days, in the choir of Epiphany Church. His voice was a light bass. In 1858 he was secretary of the Harrisburg Harmonic Society. He was brought up in the Presbyterian Church and later attended the Episcopal Church in Washington where he was baptized and confirmed Nov. 26, 1864, and at a later date became a vestryman of Epiphany Church to which he gave the Sunday School building. In New York he was vestryman of St. Thomas' and when the church was burned subscribed a large amount for the new church. He contributed substantially for an arch in the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine, of which he was a Trustee at the time of his death.

Mr. Fahnestock was fond of horses and drove and rode both in Washington and New York. He also liked skating and fishing and shooting, making many trips to Minnesota to hunt prairie chicken, and at one time going regularly to the Rangeley Lakes for trout, to the St. Lawrence region for bass, to Lyme, Connecticut, to shoot quail and to Pike County, Pa., for fishing.

At his death he was possessed of a large fortune. His funeral took place at St. Thomas' Church in New York. The honorary

pall bearers were, E. D. Adams, George F. Baker, Robert W. De-Forest, Charles F. Hoffman, A. Barton Hepburn, Seth Low, Henry C. Tinker and Dr. Charles E. Hackley.

152. SIBYL AMELIA FAHNESTOCK (Adam Konigmacher [No. 61], Obed, Peter, Johann Diedrich), b. Harrisburg, Pa., I Jan. 1842; d. New York City, 12 May 1921; m. Harrisburg, 28 Jan. 1868, General Thomas Hamlin Hubbard, b. Hallowell, Me., 20 Dec. 1838; d. New York City, 19 May 1915, son of Governor John Hubbard (b. 23 March 1794, d. 6 Feb. 1869) and his wife

Sarah Hodge Barrett (b. 4 March 1796, d. 31 Jan. 1891).

Thomas Hamlin Hubbard prepared for college at the Hallowell Academy and entered Bowdoin College at the age of fourteen in the fall of 1853. He ranked high in his studies and at the Commencement Exercises in 1857, he delivered the English oration. He was a member of Chi Psi, the Athenaean and Phi Beta Kappa Societies. From 1859 to 1860 he was principal of Hallowell Academy. In the fall of 1860 he entered Law School in Albany and was admitted to the New York Bar, 4 May 1861. He then was employed by the law firm of Barney, Butler and Parsons in New York City, becoming the managing clerk. Meanwhile the Civil War had broken out and in the summer of 1862 he joined the 25th Maine Volunteer Infantry, mustering in as Adjutant 29 Sept. 1862. His early service was chiefly on picket duty in and around Washington, D. C., and he was mustered out 11 July 1863. Shortly thereafter he was commissioned Lieutenant-Colonel in the 30th Maine Volunteer Infantry, which he assisted in organizing, under Colonel Francis Fessenden who had been his Captain in the 25th Maine Volunteers. The regiment was mustered into service 9 Jan. 1864 and the following month went to New Orleans and thence to Franklin, Louisiana, as part of the 3rd Brigade 1st Division of the 19th Army Corps under Major General Nathaniel P. Banks. It participated in the Red River expedition and fought at the battles of Sabine Cross Roads and Pleasant Hill. At the latter engagement the brigade commander was killed, Colonel Fessenden took his place and Lieutenant-Colonel Hubbard was left in command of the 30th Maine. On June 2, 1864 he was commissioned Colonel of the regiment and retained that

office during the remainder of his war service. In July 1864 the regiment was with General Sheridan and that fall was stationed in Shenandoah Valley but Colonel Hubbard was recovering from typhoid and was invalided home for a few weeks. He rejoined his command at Bolivar Heights, near Harpers Ferry and served around Washington until sent to Savannah 30 June 1865. He resigned his commission 23 July 1865, ten days after he had been awarded a commission as Brevet Brigadier General of United States Volunteers, for meritorious service.

On his return to New York he again took up the practice of law and on January 1st 1867 was made a partner in the firm of Barney, Butler and Parsons, with which firm he was associated for twenty years. The firm name was changed in 1874 to Butler, Stillman and Hubbard. He and his partners were among the organizers of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York in 1869 and of the New York County Lawyers Association, of which he was President at the time of his death. In 1896 he retired from active practice. His work had been largely corporate litigation and he tended naturally toward corporate management. He managed the Mark Hopkins Estate with Mr. Stillman from 1888 to 1898 and thereafter alone. The estate owned one fourth of the Southern Pacific Company of which General Hubbard was a director for eleven years and Vice-President for five. He established the International Banking Corporation, the first American Bank to gain and retain a foothold in the Orient.

He was always close to the interests of Bowdoin College, from which he had A.B. and M.A. degrees and in 1894 Bowdoin bestowed upon him the degree of LL.D. He was an Overseer of the college from 1874 to 1889 and a Trustee from 1889 until his death. He presented to Bowdoin College the Library and the "Hubbard Grandstand". In 1901 he endowed the chair of legal ethics in the law department of Union University, known as Albany Law School, of which Law School he was a Trustee. He was President of the Peary Arctic Club in New York and Admiral Robert E. Peary as a tribute to his friend and helper, named Cape Thomas H. Hubbard for him. In 1867 he became a member of the Maine Commandery of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States. He transferred to the New York Commandery

in 1891 and was Commander 1903 to 1907. In 1913 he was elected Commander-in-Chief of the Loyal Legion.

Louis Kossuth Fahnestock was brought up by his maternal grandmother. He was educated in private schools in Harrisburg. At an early age he evinced a great fondness for music and in his teens sang in the Market Square Presbyterian Church. He de-

veloped an excellent baritone voice.

In the summer of 1863 he helped dig rifle pits along the bank of the Susquehanna River for the defense of Harrisburg against the Confederate Army which was marching towards Fredericksburg.

In September 1866 he went to Phillips Academy at Andover, Mass. After three years there he was forced to leave before graduation on account of his health. On recovery he went to Philadelphia to learn brick making but left in a year to go west with an engineering party building the Northern Pacific Railroad, and became an assistant engineer. He had many interesting experiences on the plains and once narrowly escaped drowning when a wagon overturned in the Red River of the North. When the railroad opened an office at St. Paul he returned there and obtained the position of auditor of ticket accounts.

In 1881 he took employment with the German American Bank which later became the First National Bank of St. Paul. He remained with the bank until in 1888 he went to Washington, D. C., on account of his wife's health. There he became associated with the Richmond and Danville Railroad until they moved their offices to Atlanta.

He then entered the American Security and Trust Company, retiring in 1900. Later he was employed by the Southern Railroad where he remained until he retired in the nineteen twenties.

He now (1942) lives in Washington, D. C., active and well at the age of ninety-three. His wife was a beautiful woman, expert at

drawing, painting and needlework. She died of paralysis and was buried in the Harrisburg Cemetery, Harrisburg, Pa.

Edward George Fahnestock graduated from Pennsylvania College at Gettysburg, and from the University of Pennsylvania with the degree of M.D. He practiced medicine only one year on account of poor health. He then joined his brothers in Fahne-

stock Bros., general merchants, at Gettysburg.

In the Civil War he enlisted as 1st Lieutenant of Company E, 2nd Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, in the 2nd Brigade of the 2nd Division of General Patterson's Army, which saw service at Charleston, Va. His enlistment was from 20 April to 20 July 1861. He re-enlisted 16 Dec. 1862 as Lieutenant-Colonel in the 165th Regiment of Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry at its organization under Colonel Charles Henry Buehler who had married his cousin, Anne Salome Fahnestock [No. 187]. The regiment went to Newport News and Suffolk Co., Va., where it became part of General Foster's 2nd Brigade of the 1st Division of the 7th Army Corps. Its first skirmish was 29 Jan. 1863 at Deserted House. It successfully defended Suffolk for a month against General Longstreet. It also participated in Dix's Peninsula Campaign and at So. Anna in July 1863, and was mustered out 28 July 1863, at Gettysburg. His third enlistment immediately followed, on 14 Aug. 1863, as Major and Additional Paymaster of Volunteers at St. Louis, Mo. He resigned 5 March 1864 on account of his health. In 1881 he was sent by the Federal Government to Watertown, Coddington Co., So. Dakota, to look after

the Sioux Indians in that State. He moved to Minneapolis after 1894 where he organized and became secretary of the Northwest Lumberman's Insurance Association, from which position he retired in 1906. He was a Past Master of his Masonic Lodge at Gettysburg, a member of the German Lutheran Church and of the Military Order of The Loyal Legion of the United States. He and his widow were buried in Evergreen Cemetery, Gettysburg, Pa.

Fahnestock, was 2nd Lieutenant. Before that he had recruited a company of sixty men and put them in the 47th Illinois Volunteers. The 86th Illinois was commanded by Colonel Irons until 13 Aug. 1863 when he died and was succeeded by Colonel Magee who resigned March 1864. Captain Fahnestock was commissioned Major, 5 Feb. 1864, Lieutenant-Colonel 13 April 1864, and Colonel 4 May 1865. The regiment was mustered out 6 June 1865 with only three hundred and eighty-five men left out of the full regiment, after nearly three years of hard service in the Third Brigade, Second Division of the Fourteenth Army Corps. It fought in sixty battles, marched thirty-five hundred miles and traveled two thousand miles by rail.

After the war Colonel Fahnestock became the leading merchant

of dry goods, drugs and groceries in Glasford, Ill.

On a shooting trip in the Mexican wilds he was made an honorary chieftain of an Indian tribe. He was an expert taxidermist and mounted many beautiful specimens of birds for his own collection.

He published "Memoranda of the effects of carburetted Hydrogen Gas on a Collection of Exotic Plants" in the Proceedings of the Academy of Natural Science in 1858. In the same year his "The Alarm Bell, an Address to Firemen" reached a circulation of 20,000 copies. He published "A Centennial Memorial of Christian and Anna Maria Wolff". From his father he inherited half a million dollars. He bequeathed his extensive library to the Pennsylvania Historical Society. He and his daughter died in the disastrous collision about midnight, near Warsaw, Ind., on the Ohio River, between the steamers United States and America, on the former of which they were traveling to New Orleans. The United States was burned and sixty-six persons lost their lives. At the same time the material he had collected for a Fahnestock Genealogy was lost. He and his wife were buried in So. Laurel Hill Cemetery, Philadelphia.

It immediately attacked the town which the Confederates were leaving and captured some arms and ammunition, returning to camp at Cumberland. Captain Fahnestock there resigned. When Captain Fahnestock came to New York he served as Captain of Company K, 12th Regiment of the National Guard of New York.

He is reported to have been the first to remove an ovarian tumor and to have attained a national reputation as an authority on hernia. He spent one year in Europe. At one time he was connected with the St. Louis Medical College. He was closely associated with the Dunham Medical College in Chicago from its founding about 1896. He was on its faculty, Dean and finally President of that institution. He was in 1880 Vice President of the State Medical Society and at that time had never lost a case as the result of a surgical operation. He was said to have the finest collection of medical works in the State in his library and the most complete surgical office (1880).

Dr. Fahnestock was a member of F. and A.M., K.T., Elks, Royal Arcanum, a Scottish Rite, and 32d degree Mason and a Shriner, and a member of the Presbyterian Church. His obituary says he was an expert surgeon, skillful physician, interested in civic matters with gift of speech in a rare degree. His after-dinner speeches teemed with originality and humor. He was, according to an eminent Chicago surgeon "loyal to the heart, frank, generous, always cool in judgment, kindly in criticism, one of the ablest men of medicine in the world, fluent in speech, a ready writer, a man who knew the human heart and human soul as few men knew them."



290. GIBSON FAHNESTOCK (Harris Charles [No. 150], Adam Konigmacher, Obed, Peter, Johann Diedrich), b. Harrisburg, Pa., 21 Feb. 1859; d. St. Augustine, Fla., 2 March 1917; m. Baltimore, Md., 3 June 1884, Carolyn Snowden Andrews; b. Baltimore, 20 Jan. 1862; d. Washington, D. C., 18 Oct. 1937, daughter of General Richard Snowden Andrews of the Confederate States of America (b. 29 Oct. 1830, d. 5 Jan. 1903) and his wife Mary Catherine Lee (b. 20 July 1832, d. 2 March 1920).

Gibson Fahnestock was educated at the Gibbons and Beach

School, New York City. He was a partner in Fahnestock & Co. until he retired in 1891 on account of his health. He lived abroad for several years, principally on the Riviera and in Florence, Italy. In 1914 he returned to the United States and lived in Washington, D. C., and in the summer at Newport, R. I. At one time he was a member of the 7th Regiment New York National Guard. He was an enthusiastic yachtsman and in 1905 crossed the Atlantic in his schooner *Shenandoah*. He attended the Episcopal Church and was a member of many of the most exclusive clubs in New York and Washington.

His wife was prominent in religious, philanthropic and patriotic activities. During the World War she was a leader of the Red Cross and founder of the Women's Naval Service and National Service School for Women. At the time of her death she was Vice President of the Washington Home for Incurables and a member of the National Committee of the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul in Washington. She and her husband were buried in Wood-

lawn Cemetery, Mt. Vernon, N. Y.

291. HARRIS FAHNESTOCK (Harris Charles [No. 150], Adam Konigmacher, Obed, Peter, Johann Diedrich), b. New York City, 21 Sept. 1869; d. Boston, Mass., 11 Oct. 1939; m. (1) New York City, 16 April 1896, Mabel Metcalf, b. New York City, 24 Nov. 1870; d. New York City, 27 May 1930, daughter of James Betts Metcalf (b. 13 May 1843, d. 1 Feb. 1896) and his wife Annie Tiffany Cutting (b. 4 July 1845, d. 7 March 1911); m. (2) New York City, 30 March 1937, Georgette (Gerard-Varet) Hyde, b. Dijon, France, 15 March 1897, (m. (1) 1 July 1919, Fletcher Sprague Hyde), daughter of Louis Gerard-Varet (b. Paris, 20 Aug. 1860) and his wife Juliette Costes (b. Paris, 21 June 1869).

Harris Fahnestock prepared for college at Berkeley School, New York, and graduated from Harvard with the degree of A.B. in

1892. The next two years he spent in traveling extensively through Europe, returning to New York in the autumn of 1894 to enter the First National Bank. In 1898 he became Assistant Cashier of the Astor National Bank and subsequently Assistant Cashier of the First National Bank. He retired from business in 1906 and afterward when not traveling abroad spent six months of the year in New York and six months at his beautiful home in Lenox, Mass.

Much of his life was spent in travel. Another great interest was driving. He was an active member of the Coaching Club until the time of his death. His coach and his carriages, of which he owned thirty and which he drove, himself, in finished style, were always faultlessly turned out in their appointments. In October 1916 Harris Fahnestock did his trick "on the cushion" of the Coaching Club's famous road coach "Pioneer" in the last organized drive of the club. Starting October 11th they drove to William Woodward's Belair House in Maryland in three days, using 45 horses for the 235 mile trip. He was the last member of the Coaching Club to drive a coach-and-four in the city of New York in 1930. When the crowded condition of the streets caused by the increased use of automobiles forced him to give up his horses, he donated his twelve Brewster carriages and his coach, harnesses and liveries to the New York Historical Society where they are on exhibition to the public, a unique monument to a charming gentleman and a fine sportsman.

Mr. Fahnestock was an accomplished linguist, speaking French, Spanish and German fluently, as well as some Italian and Russian. Another of his hobbies was photography through which he expressed his artistic nature. His drawings, particularly of horses, were excellent. He was an authority on art and architecture.

With his brothers and sister he installed the Reredos of St. Thomas', Church in New York, of which church he was a vestryman, and with them built a bay for the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine.

In Lenox, Massachusetts, he was Manager and Treasurer of the Lenox Library Association, Trustee and Treasurer of the Charles Sedgwick Library and Reading Room, Trustee of Trinity School, Vestryman of Trinity Church, Trustee and Clerk of the Lenox Academy and Governor of the Mahkeenac Boating Club.

In New York he was a Founder of the Museum of the City of New York, a Fellow of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, a Governor of the Union and a member of the Metropolitan, Riding, Harvard, and Coaching Clubs. He was also a member of the Tuxedo Club in Tuxedo, N. Y., and of the Lenox Club in Lenox.

His widow, who is one of the sponsors of this book, is the daughter of Louis Gerard-Varet who was Professor of Philosophy at the University of Dijon until 1906, President of the University of Rennes in Brittany 1911 until his retirement in 1931. By her first marriage she has a son, b. in Boston, Mass., 2 June 1920, Louis Gerard-Varet Hyde, Harvard '43, now (1944), a Sergeant in the First Experimental Detachment, serving over-seas. He is a member of the Union and Harvard Clubs. Mrs. Fahnestock has donated to St. Thomas' Church two bas-relief in marble of Harris Charles Fahnestock, and his wife Margaret Antoinette, made by Ezekiel in Rome, in memory of Harris Fahnestock.

(1) New York City, 14 April 1896, Dr. Clarence Gordon Campbell, b. Warren Co., Ind., 28 April 1868, living 1943, son of Thomas Benton and Elizabeth Florence (Kronkhite) Campbell; m. (2) Paris, France, 20 Aug. 1928, John Hubbard, b. Brooklyn, N. Y., 13 Feb. 1870; d. New York City, 7 May 1933, son of General Thomas Hamlin Hubbard (b. Hallowell, Me., 20 Dec. 1838; d. N. Y. C., 19 May 1915) and his wife Sibyl Amelia Fahnestock (b. 1 Jan. 1842, d. 1 May 1921) [No. 152].

Helen (Fahnestock) (Campbell) Hubbard has spent much of her time travelling and living abroad. She has crossed the Atlantic Ocean about ninety times, the first time when she was a little over two months of age on the old side-wheeler Scotia, commanded by Captain Gadsten of the Cunard Line, in July 1872: She returned on the same boat, sailing from Queenstown 13 October, arriving New York 22 October 1872. She was in Egypt in 1893 and in 1903 in Khartoum where there were at that time only seven other ladies. Her first trip to the South Seas was in 1902. In 1903 she made a 21 day voyage from Sydney along the North Coast of Queensland, behind the Great Barrier Reef, calling at the Pearling Station on Thursday Island. She has made several voyages to Australia and New Zealand, Java, British North Borneo, the Philippines, the Sulu Archipelago, and Hong Kong. The Straits of Magellan, South America and South Africa are all familiar to her and she has crossed the equator 22 times. She has been around the world three times in all.

For her interest and experience in travel she has been elected an associate member of The Society of Woman Geographers. Her interest in exploration has caused her in recent years to give to her cousins Bruce and Sheridan Fahnestock, the 137 foot three masted schooner *Director II*, with its recording machine, for their South Pacific Expedition, and to finance the recordings of South Sea music and songs for the Manhattan School of Music.

For many years she has had an apartment in Paris and has devoted much time and money to charitable works in France. For a number of years she supported a "Foyer" at the Caserne on the Boulevard de la Tour Maubourg in Paris for the soldiers of the 24th Regiment. In 1939-40 until the collapse of France, she supported three foyers at the front. To the Palais de Malmaison at Rueil in France, a Napoleonic Museum, she has given an immensely valuable Savonerrie carpet, the only one extant with the initial N thereon. She has also donated to the Museum life size portraits of Napoleon and Josephine and a portrait of Queen Hortense; a bronze tripod used by Napoleon at St. Helena brought back by Baron Gourgaud; part of the personal dinner service which belonged to the Emperor Napoleon and was used by him at the Tuileries and at St. Helena, brought back by the Comte de Montholon; the Vase of Austerlitz given Napoleon at the time of his victory there, and a mantelpiece of ormolu on marble in the Chambre de Conseil. For these and other gifts she was created a

Chevalier de la Legion d'Honneur, in 1928, and in 1939 raised to an Officier of the Legion.

Mrs. Hubbard has always derived much of her enjoyment of life from music. She built and equipped the Manhattan School of Music, of which she is a Director and Honorary Chairman. To this school in 1940 she added the beautiful Hubbard Memorial Auditorium in memory of her late husband John Hubbard and her brother Dr. Ernest Fahnestock. She has financed two tours of Europe for the Manhattan String Quartette, and European tours for Earl Maiman and Natalie Bodanya.

Besides her music Mrs. Hubbard has a great interest in autographs of which she has a priceless collection, especially those of French royalty, Napoleana, Americana, and letters of Lafayette.

Among her philanthropies has been the endowment of beds in the Woman's Hospital, and in the Babies Hospital in New York, and the donation of the iron lung to the Monmouth Memorial Hospital at Long Branch, N. J. She has furnished a room and bath in the American Hospital, Neuilly-sur-Seine, in France, in memory of her brother Major Clarence Fahnestock, M.D., and also in his memory a chalet in the village Sanatorium d'Haute Altitude at Passy, Haute Savoie, France. For Katharine House of the Ladies Christian Union she has built and furnished two floors known as Hubbard Hall and Fahnestock Hall. To the Seeing Eye, Inc., in Morristown, N. J., she has given a large endowment in memory of John Hubbard, for their School for Instructors.

The many memorials to her husband, daughter, father, mother, brothers and friends, include a munificent gift to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in memory of Harris C. Fahnestock, for which he was declared and she was elected, a Benefactor. The proceeds were used to purchase valuable armor from the notable Dean Collection. To the Church of the Heavenly Rest she has given the Reredos in memory of John Hubbard and of Helen C. Michalis, and installed the Rose Window in memory of Major Clarence Fahnestock, M.D. To St. Thomas' Church, in conjunction with her brothers she has given the Reredos in memory of their parents Harris C. and Margaret Antoinette (McKinley) Fahnestock, and she and her brothers have installed a bay in the Cathedral Church

of St. John the Divine. In the church in Bouy-sur-Marne, France, she has placed several windows in honour of her friends Evelyn G. Smalley and General Henri Gouraud, Military Governor of Paris for many years. In the American Red Cross Chapter House in Washington, she has erected a pillar in memory of the Model Work Room of the New York Chapter.

In the present war in memory of her brother Major Clarence Fahnestock, M.D., she has donated two mobile kitchens to the British War Relief and an ambulance to the British-American

Ambulance Corps.

Mrs. Hubbard is a life member of the Daughters of the Cincinnati, the National Society of Colonial Dames in the State of New York, the Institut de France, the Institut Français de Washington and the Institute of Social Sciences, of which she is Vice President, as well as a member of the Cosmopolitan Club in New York.

On April 20, 1943, Mrs. Hubbard was awarded the degree of

Doctor of Humane Letters by Lafayette College.

Dr. Clarence Gordon Campbell was a student at Wabash College 1883–1886, after attending Wabash Preparatory Academy in Crawfordsville, Ind., for a year prior thereto. In 1926 the College conferred upon him the degree of LL.D. In 1888 he received the degree of Ph.B. from the University of Michigan. He spent two years at the Bellevue Hospital Medical College, graduating in 1890 with his M.D. degree. He was an interne at St. Vincent's Hospital, New York City 1890–1891 and spent the next year in graduate study at London and in German Universities. From 1894 to 1900 he was physician to out-patients at Bellevue Hospital, New York, and from 1896 to 1900 visiting physician at the New York City Hospital. In 1900 he withdrew from medical work to travel in the South Sea Islands, Malaya, Africa, and elsewhere. During the World War 1917–1918 he served in a Military Hospital in England.

He is a past president of the Eugenics Research Association, a Fellow of the Academy of Arts and Sciences, of the R.A.A.S., of the Galton Society, of the Eugenics Society of Great Britain, and a member of the International Eugenics Council, the American Eugenics Society, the American Genetics Association, the American

can Institute, the American Sociological Society and the Phi Kappa Psi. In 1925 he was the author of "Commonwealth", has written several medical monographs, chiefly on tuberculosis, and contributed frequently to magazines on eugenic, social, and racial problems.

John Hubbard prepared for college at the Morse School in New York City. He graduated from Harvard in 1892 with the degree of A.B. During 1893-95 he studied law at the New York Law School and read law during the same period in the office of Butler, Notman, Joline & Myndorse, with which firm he remained until 1899. He was admitted to the New York Bar in 1895. He was with the Standard Trust Company of New York 1899-1901 and in the latter year became Treasurer of the International Banking Corporation, of which his father was President. After his father's death in 1915 he resigned his position and devoted his time thereafter to the management of family affairs. He traveled widely and visited many unusual places. He was a student of history and accumulated a valuable library of early editions on historical subjects. Like his cousin Gibson Fahnestock he was extremely fond of yachting and with Gibson, in the latter's three-masted schooner Shenandoah crossed the Atlantic in 1905. He was also an expert horseman and belonged to many exclusive clubs.

The large auditorium at Albany Law School was given by John Hubbard in memory of his father. He bequeathed a sum to equip the maternity ward of the French Hospital in New York City and gave a generous amount to Bowdoin College in memory

of his father.

His never-failing sense of humor, unusual store of knowledge and kindly altruistic nature endeared him to a wide circle of friends and he was respected by his business associates for his ability and integrity. He had no children.

The only child of Dr. Clarence Gordon and Helen (Fahnestock) Campbell, was:

293. CLARENCE FAHNESTOCK (Harris Charles [No. 150], Adam Konigmacher, Obed, Peter, Johann Diedrich), b. New York

City, 4 Dec. 1873; d. at Base Hospital No. 15, France, 5 Oct. 1918; m. Marion, Mass., 5 June 1906, Marguerite Sawyer, (divorced).

He prepared for college, first at Berkeley School, New York, and then at Phillips Academy, Andover, Massachusetts. He entered Harvard in the Class of 1898, remaining only two years. In the autumn of 1896 he entered the College of Physicians and Surgeons in New York, and in 1900 he received the M.D. degree. On January 1st 1901, he became a member of the house staff of the Presbyterian Hospital; he served for eighteen months successively in the three grades of the Second Surgical Division. In 1902 and 1903 he pursued further medical studies in Vienna, and then took an extended journey to the Far East and the South Sea Islands. From October 13th 1905 to October 15th 1912, he was a clinical assistant in the Aural Department of the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary.

In spite of his active and successful professional life he found opportunities to pursue his favorite avocations—fishing and shooting. He took frequent trips to the Rocky Mountains and to Canada, and twice went to British East Africa to hunt big game. Of his prowess John Caswell, Harvard '95, who accompanied him on these expeditions, has written as follows:

"Clarence Fahnestock was undoubtedly one of the successful big game shots in America. He was a man of great resource and very thorough in detail both of preparation and following out his plan of expedition. With a technical mind well trained, he was a careful observer of the habits and characteristics of game, added to which a thorough familiarity with firearms, both as to their use and the effect of shots on game, enabled him to use his rifle with extremely good effect. He was a man of great personal courage and although he was in many close corners he never lost his nerve and could be counted on to put a bullet where it would be effective even when under great excitement. At the longer ranges at non-dangerous game, he was at a great disadvantage on account of his eyesight, but even then his calculation of range and estimation of distances were remarkable.

"He was extremely positive as regards theories of hunting, and what was more, often proved through sheer perseverance and brain work that his ideas were correct.

"His wide experience in travel stood him in good stead on the African veldt and he was rarely at a loss to master any emergency that arose in regard to path finding or the management of native carriers.

"His medical knowledge proved a great asset and he was only too happy when treating some native for a tropical disease, and would, after the examination of the bacteria under a microscope, draw conclusions which were remarkable. I am sure that if his talks on medicine had been noted, many valuable hints would have been given to the world.

"In hunting he was indefatigable and many times he secured remarkable heads by perseverence. A good rider, he always was at home in the saddle and no day seemed too long for him. In camp he had a great hold over the natives, who regarded some of his cures as miraculous. Keenly observant, he picked up a knowledge of the customs and language of the people in a most remarkable manner, while in counselling and planning a scheme of campaign, his advice was invaluable.

"With it all he was always modest and unassuming, and while he actually accomplished more than most men, he said less about

it.

"In 1915 Fahnestock was at Plattsburg from August 10th to September 6th and also during part of the period of a subsequent camp. The following year he attended the Plattsburg camp from July 12th to August 8th and remained for part of the period of the next camp. In this year he was in the 7th Training Regiment and was given the provisional rank of first lieutenant and quartermaster. In both years he won distinction in marksmanship.

"In the spring of 1917, although many of his friends and colleagues tried to dissuade him, he took the Reserve Officers' examination for the grade of major. He received assurance that he had passed creditably but he was not commissioned for the reason that at the time there were too few officers of the lower grades to permit the commissioning of any more majors. On account of Fahnestock's age he could not, under the rules then in force, receive a lower rank.

"Undiscouraged he went to Plattsburg in May 1917 to the First Officers' Training Camp, simply as a candidate. At the end of the

period of instruction he was made a major and assigned to the 308th Infantry in the 77th Division at Camp Upton. He was one of the few original Reserve Officers detailed to receive the first contingent of drafted men there. He commanded the Second Battalion of the 308th until December when he was transferred at his own request to the command of the First Battalion of the 301st Infantry in the 76th Division at Camp Devens. At the end of June 1918 he sailed for overseas service with about two hundred other officers of the 76th Division and he was ordered to the staff school at Langres where he remained until the beginning of August. He then rejoined his battalion at St. Armand, but about the beginning of September, at the request of one of the Chiefs of Section of the General Staff, he was detailed to General Headquarters, becoming a member of the Intelligence Section. Not long afterwards he became ill with influenza and was admitted to Base Hospital No. 15. Pneumonia set in and he died on October 5th.

"The following morning, October 6th, the funeral was held from the hospital. The Reverend Murray Dewart, an Episcopalian chaplain, officiated; all the troops at the post, almost the full battalion to which his rank entitled him, formed the escort. The pallbearers were four lieutenant-colonels and two majors of the second section of the General Staff, his section. He was buried in the American Cemetery beside the River Marne, not far from Chaumont; but in 1921, in accordance with a wish he had expressed before going overseas, his body was brought back to America and placed in the family vault at Woodlawn, N. Y."

Testimony to his qualities as a soldier is given by Colonel Frank

Tompkins of the 301st Infantry:

"'As Colonel of this regiment I gave Major Fahnestock command of the First Battalion. I told him the battalion was his and to make of it what he could. He was always working for the good and progress of his battalion. Were it in the lecture room at night or on the trench system, digging trenches in the frozen ground, Fahnestock was there, an example and inspiration to his men.

. . Professionally he was a good soldier, thorough, loyal to his superiors and optimistic. He inspired others with his optimism—a very valuable gift in a soldier. . . . Major Fahnestock, in dying for his country, gave all, but he left the example of an honest, noble

and pure character. He was a most lovable man, and always a gentleman. He was a credit to the Army and an honor to the distinguished name he bore. He played the game, he died like a soldier and a gentleman; he was of the class of men who are the true life-blood of the nation."

294. DR. ERNEST FAHNESTOCK (Harris Charles [No. 150], Adam Konigmacher, Obed, Peter, Johann Diedrich), b. New York City, 27 Jan. 1876; d. New York City, 5 April 1937; m. New York City, 15 Feb. 1905, Georgette Henriette (Waters) (DeGrove) Perry, b. Paris, France, 22 Aug. 1873, living 1943, widow of Edward Perry and daughter of George Robert S. Waters (b. 31 July 1848, d. 8 July 1881) and his wife Henriette Cardoze (b. 18 Dec. 1855, d. 4 Aug. 1913) who m. (2) Edward Ritzema DeGrove.

Dr. Ernest Fahnestock attended Harvard College and studied medicine at the College of Physicians and Surgeons in New York City, receiving the degree of M.D. in 1900. His interneship was spent at the J. Hood Wright Hospital, now known as the Knickerbocker Hospital. In 1934 he received the Honorary Degree of

D.C.L. from the University of the South, Sewanee, Tenn.

Dr. Fahnestock was associated with Misericordia Hospital, New York City, as a member of the attending surgical staff 1915-1933; Vice President of the Medical Board 1923-1929; Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board 1923-1933, and Director of Surgery 1926-1933. Upon his resignation from his active duties in 1933, he was made a consulting surgeon. He generously donated to the hospital the complete equipment of the Operating and Emergency Rooms and Obstetrical Department and the equipment for the first X-Ray and Physio-Therapy Unit in 1925. In addition, he gave generously to the Nurses' Building Fund and the fund for building an extension to the Pathological Laboratory. He was also connected with St. Vincent's Hospital, New York City, where he was Assistant Visiting Surgeon 1917-1923; a Visiting Surgeon 1923-1927 and after his resignation from active duties in 1931, a Consulting Surgeon. He was also an attending Surgeon at the New York Foundling Hospital.

Dr. Fannestock was a member of the American Medical Asso-

ciation, a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons and of the New York Academy of Medicine. He was Trustee of the United Hospital Fund of New York City and of the New York Institute for the Education of the Blind.

He joined with his brothers and sister in installing a Reredos at St. Thomas' Church, New York, in which he was a Vestryman, and in building a bay in the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine.

To the people of the State of New York he donated the Clarence Fahnestock Memorial Park, a gift of over 2000 acres in memory of his brother. He was also donor of the Ernest Fahnestock Medal, presented each year to a member of the New York City Police Department of which he was an Honorary Consulting Surgeon, for conspicuous service. He was at one time a member of the 7th Regiment N.Y.N.G.

His clubs were the Union, Lotos, New York Yacht and Riding Clubs in New York, and the Rumson Country Club, Seabright Lawn Tennis and Cricket Club and Seabright Beach Club in New Jersey.

Keenly interested in the community about his home at "Shadow Brook Farm", Shrewsbury, N. J., he was for many years a patron and active head of the Monmouth Memorial Hospital at Long Branch, N. J., serving as a member of the Board of Governors from 1920 until his death, as Vice President 1920 to 1926, President 1926 to 1937 and acting in numerous other capacities during this period. His many and generous donations included much of the hospital equipment and three homes for personnel. He was a contributor to and honorary member of the Shrewsbury Fire Department and the Red Bank Police Department, a member of the Shrewsbury Zoning Committee and he was interested in and made substantial donations to the Monmouth County Organization for Social Service, the Shrewsbury Child Welfare Organization and Clinic, St. George's Church (Episcopal) at Rumson, Christ's Church (Episcopal) at Shrewsbury and the Long Branch Catholic Church. In 1937 he was named a Director of the Victory Park Memorial Foundation at Rumson. On his death he was honored by a resolution of the Council of the Village of Shrewsbury, citing him as "one of the Borough's most esteemed citizens and benefactors".

His widow is one of the sponsors of this book.



Adam Bruce Fahnestock, Jr., usually known as Bruce Fahnestock, yachtsman, explorer, lecturer and writer, came to Great Neck, Long Island, at the age of four with his family. He prepared for college at the Army and Navy Preparatory School in Washington, D. C., attended Brown University from 1930 to 1931, and was the college correspondent that year for the "Providence Journal". After a walking trip through France and other travels, Bruce became editor of the "North Shore Commutor" of Long Island, of which his brother Sheridan was assistant editor, and during that period wrote several short stories which were published. In 1934, following some months of study at the Museum of Natural History in New York City, he embarked on his first South Seas expedition with five companions in the reconditioned sixty-five-foot schooner Director. Bruce was director of the expedition, his brother Sheridan was Captain of the vessel. They were joined at Panama by their mother, Mrs. Mary Sheridan Fahnestock, who subsequently described her experience in "I Ran Away to Sea at Fifty."


The three-year voyage took them across the Pacific from island to island to the Philippines and briefly to Peking for a rest. On the way the two Fahnestock boys wrote periodic dispatches for the "New York Herald Tribune", describing among other things the Sino-Japanese War in Peking, six uncharted islands, the Ndkunimdi Stone writings in the Fiji Islands, discovered by them, a major contribution to the history of migrations across the Pacific, a gold rush in New Guinea, and the perils of pearl diving. On their return the brothers collaborated on a book of their adventures, "Stars to Windward".

Their second South Seas expedition in 1940, on which their mother also accompanied them, was on a more ambitious scale.

They sailed in *Director II*, a 137-foot schooner, built originally to race against *Bluenose*, in the Gloucester-Halifax race. She was equipped with a Diesel engine, special radio broadcasting apparatus and a light 65-horsepower airplane was carried on deck. Their purpose was to record native music for the Fahnestock-Hubbard Memorial Collection, to make oceanographic surveys for the United States Navy where charts were faulty, to make entomological surveys and obtain six habitat groups of bird life for the Whitney Wing of the Museum of Natural History.

The work was almost complete six months ahead of schedule, including a collection of recorded music from the Marquesas, Society Islands, Samoa, Bali, Java, the Fiji Islands and New Caledonia, and four bird groups, and the fruits of the expedition had been landed in Australia and shipped to New York, when the schooner foundered on an uncharted reef in the Great Barrier Reef, off Queensland, Australia. All aboard escaped without injury. Bruce Fahnestock had returned to the United States a month before the accident.

In 1941 the brothers made a third expedition to Bali and Java which was concluded on the outbreak of war between Japan and the United States on December 7, 1941. Both Fahnestocks were given commissions in the Army and were sent back to the South Seas on special missions for which their knowledge of the area fitted them.

Bruce Fahnestock met an untimely death while scouting ahead of his troops at an advance base in New Guinea.





APPENDIX

Translation of Fahnestock Letters
1726 to 1753



My beloved relative, also mother-in-law, sisters and brother, together with all good friends and acquaintances.

Through God's grace I am now here in New York as I arrived recently on St. Michael's day and we should like to know if all of you are still active and well. Concerning myself I have, thank God, been healthy and well and have not found it necessary to worry about eating and drinking because our dear Lord has supplied us most bountifully with food and drink. Notwithstanding that two young children, namely my little son Johan Henrich and another small child were buried in New York, no voyage went off so well as ours, for 105 persons embarked on our ship and 107 people disembarked. In respect to ourselves my wife was laid up with seasickness for 8 or 9 days. My sister and Caspar Diederich were as healthy and well as fish in water. We did suffer some dangerous storms but when the danger was at its height then the grace of God was most powerful.

As to the characteristics and resources of this country it is certainly a good country and as a matter of fact we have found it so. A workman such as you have or a servant would receive wages of 100 reichsthaler, as is the case here. The farmers live like gentlemen, and better than they do with you.

N.B. I received 35 reichsthaler for the cot which I brought over and 10 reichsthaler for the bed covering. If anyone should want to bring clothing I suggest they bring small doublets and also fine kneebreeches but they should hide them in their sea chests as they will otherwise have to pay duty in England.

Regarding the citizens here, they all have plenty of butter, sugar, flour, buck-wheat, corn, milk! Yes, you cannot realize how rich they are in cattle, and of vegetables they have a surplus, apples, peaches, cabbage, lettuce, and nuts. They have really everything they might wish. Taxes are next to nothing, they only pay 12 or 13 pennies a year which amounts to one poll tax in your country. Sugar costs as much as 2 stueber. Fresh meat one can buy plenty of for very little money. In fact you can buy a quarter of mutton for 6 or 7 pennies. One can live here more luxuriously than with you. Yes, the people do not know how rich they are and when the butcher slaughters an ox or a cow he throws the legs away. Indeed one can buy a lot of meat for 2 stueber. As to freedom the peasants can have their fresh roast every day, they are allowed to shoot all the game they want.

We had on our ship a lot of young people, but they all traveled away from here in order to earn their passage-money of 7 pistollen in 2 or 3 years. They are given their clothes as good as new and also excellent food in addition to their wages. Weaving here is a necessary occupation, a journeyman who does good work can earn a day's wages whether he weaves fine or coarse. The tailor trade is regarded as one of the best and that applies also to most artisans. Indeed one cannot adequately describe the excellence and prosperity of this country.

My sister Anna Catrina can earn her passage money in a year in addition to her food and clothing. Believe me, my friends, the work is not so hard as with you. If it were ordained by God that you should come here, bring with you sundry

things, such as flintlocks with which you could earn your passage money, because for one flintlock you can get 15, 16 or 17 reichsthaler, while it costs you only 5 reichsthaler. The dear Lord would give you much happiness and his blessing if you should decide to come here. He would lead you in the manner He led the children of Israel, He would send His angel in advance, in order to prepare the way. May you keep well.

N.B. Our journey from Holland to England took 14 days, and from England it took 10 weeks, during which we saw nothing but sky and water.

Dearly beloved friends and relatives and all good acquaintances in Christ Jesus, I am now writing to you to let you know that I have safely arrived in this. country America and I cannot thank the almighty omniscient God enough, that He brought us over the wide, stormy, trackless ocean. I would have you know that I received the letters and also the shingles. It pleased me to receive them as boards are very dear here, 18 stueber per one hundred. I wish to thank you for having sent them to me. I have learned through your letters that you also wish to come here during the year 1729 and my wife Anna Margretha was very happy when she heard this. We are all in good health and the good Lord gave us a young son 3 days ago. Casper Dierich is always happy and healthy. I hope it has been the same with you. I have not yet bought any land, because land is becoming dearer here every year and I have not had the money to buy it. Now I have rented a small property for 5 years and I have 2 cows and a calf which cost me 25 reichsthaler. I have so much land that I need 3 horses and I can keep as many cows as I wish. I must pay 12 reichsthaler a year for rent. I have 2 little pigs which I am fattening. Everyone who owns land here must have horses. The people here have many horses. They do not go on foot but ride horseback instead or go in wagons. If they want to go to church they ride thither and to any other place they wish.

And now, my dear father and mother-in-law and brother and sister-in-law I heartily greet you. Since you also want to come here I must let you know what is necessary to do. You might bring some butter and a bushel of frying fat, and a bushel of wheat flour and a can or 12 jugs of drinking water, sausages and some bacon which you all can use for nourishment while at sea. One cannot eat ship's fare all the time. You should not bring much money but rather goods instead, and not too many because you must hide them when you reach England, so pack them carefully in the bottom of your chests. Your money will be stolen from you because it is worth 36 stueber more here than there, and the value of silver money does not change. As far as the goods are concerned please bring with you some cloth very finely woven and with small stripes close together,

also some tablecloths with small stripes and also white linen which must be finely and closely woven, and also broad striped colored linen, the brighter the better, because here the women folk put on much style. The cloth must be wide. Bring also double cotton neck scarfs which are expensive here, and some drapes. They must be a good length. The linen here is also dear. Tulle and lace borders are also quite dear, particularly when colored. The chest must be large, at least 4 or $5\frac{1}{2}$ feet long, and its sides must be studded with copper. One which costs 5 reichsthaler over there costs at least 12 here.

Bring me a pair of scales like the one you have. I will of course reimburse you for everything. Whatever is not in this letter is in Conradus Balthaus's letter.

People here shoot a great deal of game. There are so many pigeons that they break the small branches off the trees. I have killed as many as 62 pigeons, with one shot. Every man is allowed to bring two guns with him. My father-in-law 2, and Wilhelmus 2 and Pieter 2. Bring also copper kettles. One pound of copper here costs 54 stueber, and good iron implements are also dear. One pound of steel is worth 12 stueber. You must also bring copper candlesticks, for people here burn nothing but candles. Bring with you a cross saw of good quality because there is a great deal of timber, of all kinds of wood not to be found in Germany. Also bring woolen clothes, because clothes here are very dear, and also shoes which are worth 2 reichsthaler and 12 stueber. Those from Elberfeld are no good, but those made in my town are better.

My children earn here 48 stueber a day, and a woman for outdoor work 36 stueber, for indoor work one shilling and her keep. Nobody who works here supplies his own food, but where one works he gets fed. A carpenter earns I reichsthaler a day, a tailor 36 stueber, Shoemakers earn a great deal of money but there are too few of them here. A blacksmith also earns a great deal of money, and for that reason ironwork is very expensive. When you come over to us I should be very glad if you would bring me 2 branding irons which weigh about 30 pounds, and also a bellows which costs 10 or 12 shillings, and a big doorlatch nicely made. I will pay you back for all this. Well my friends, I cannot describe this country for it is a very fertile land, many crops grow here, much wheat and also Indian corn, rye, oats and barley. Not much barley, however, for the people make bread only of wheat which can be finely ground and salted. The crops here are a better buy than the purchase of land in which there is a great difference, one is dear the other cheap. In Radentantz 100 acres are worth 400 reichsthaler and more. Also bring with you some scissors from Solingen, which are good, and also pewter. From England bring with you bowls and dishes and plates and spoons for the people here use only pewter-ware for eating.

Now, God be with you, I want to let you know that my sister Anna Catrina lives with me. I send you heartfelt greetings and wish you God's blessing. Before all things see that your whole heart and spirit be committed to God, that He may lead you according to His holy will so that we may have salvation and happiness. For faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it. Amen.

Remember me to all the children who try to live according to God's will.

I and my wife and our sister Catrina together with her husband Henrich Dierdorff, send you all our best greetings and wish for you all God's grace and blessing. We have written to you without receiving a reply and do not know if the letter was delivered to you or not. We should very much like to know how you are, whether you are all still alive and what you are doing. Regarding ourselves we are, thanks to the Almighty, in good health and live in peace, and are in a good country where everyone can live well. I, your brother Dietrich Fahnstück, and my wife Margrethe with four sons, and I Catrina and my husband Henrich with three children, one son and two daughters, live close together. Everything goes well with us and we hope it goes well with you. We hear that there is war in Germany, we still have peace. We beg you should you receive this letter to write again and send the letter to Kollenbusch in Elberfelt who will forward it to Johannes Laubach in Creyvelt, in which way we should receive it. Dear brother Johan Henrich when you have read this letter please send it to our two sisters so that they may also hear where we are in America, between Neu Jorck and Filadelfia in Anwill (Amwell) in the county called Hunterdann (Huntingdon), so they can write to us. If you my dear brother and yours should care to come to us, or our sister should care to come we should love it dearly. And if we should not see each other again in this life we wish you again God's mercy and blessing so that you will come to your God Almighty and with all your hearts find Him in good time and eternity. Amen.

Dearly beloved brother and sisters Johan Hindrich Fanenstück and Elisibet and Anna Girth-trud,

I and my wife wish to send heartiest greetings and wish to let you know that we are still all in good health and that we have 4 children, Kasper Dierich, Andreas, Petrus and the smallest Dierich. I cannot forego writing you a little and I am

surprised that you do not write me. I would very much like you to write and tell me how you are getting along and where you are, for I hope every year that one of you will come over. When ships arrive with passengers no one among them knows anything about you. I have heard that war has struck many places in Germany and it would seem that it was predicted because Christ speaks of it in Matthew 24. You will hear of war and warcries because God will enforce his laws over all godlessness of man, because godlessness has been dominant in the whole world, for there is not one in a hundred who knows and seeks the right way to live and act in accordance with God's will. Therefore, my dear friends, I tell you all to remember that you shall with me seek with your whole heart the salvation of your soul and your happiness. Do not believe in the blind advisers who would lead you to hell but instead gaze with both eyes singly and alone upon Jesus, who is the author and finisher of the Faith of Faiths. He is the right guide and He will not mislead you, if we with our heart try to follow Him, for He is true and forsakes no one who does His will. Now I will herewith end this.

I will now let you know how we are getting along. We live here in a quiet and peaceful country and know nothing of war. The place where we live is called Amwell and lies halfway between New York and Philadelphia, about 12 hours from New York and 12 hours from Philadelphia.

Here I have 105 acres . . . and an acre is as much as with you. . . . It is good land and grows oats, rye and most of the crops that you have such as wheat. One does not cultivate . . . grows here well and also buckwheat . . . turkish wheat and also good flax. . . . Our sister Anna Catrina is also married, her husband is called Hindrich Duerdorff and was born in the county of Neuwit and is a carpenter. They seem well and healthy and have 3 children, and have also 100 acres of land and live a quarter of an hour away from us. I now give you in God's care and greet you all most heartily, and all I know in Halten and Traussen. And if any one of you would care to come to this country he must go to Duisberg and send his belongings there from where a ship goes every week to Rotterdam. From that port come every year ships with passengers to this country.

When you write me send the letters to Elberfeld or have them taken there personally by Johannes Peter Collenbusz who will see that they get here. You must do this however in the Spring, in March or in the beginning of April because the ships sail in May from Holland to America.

V

(From Heinrich and Catrina Dierdorff, in the Spring of 1735)

This is to be delivered by hand, to my dear brother
Johan Henrich Fahnestück
in Halten in the electorate district
Haagen on the Lahn.

To my dear and highly respected brother, Johan Henrich Fahnestück, living in Halten, in the district of Hagen.

Although there are reformed and lutheran clergymen here there are not so many as in Germany, but nevertheless one finds in this land more truly devout and faithful people than in Germany because those devout people who were driven out of Germany are now here in this country. Here there is liberty of conscience and because there are not so many false shepherds and teachers they follow the true shepherd Jesus, who has forfeited His life for His flock and has Himself done that which He teaches to others. But the preachers deceive the people and are like the pharisees who do not touch with one finger what they order others to do. We believe in Jesus and His apostles of whom the prophets have written and we have learned that one must do as one has been taught, for Jesus said, "you are my children if you do as I command".

You write that I should let you know if you and our sister Gertraut should come here because you wish to be with us, and so I warn you that it is not advisable because you will encounter great hardships on the ocean and whosoever cannot endure and resign themselves to the will of God would find it hard, for often when one leaves country and home to come over here one suffers many hardships before he can enjoy pleasure and rest. This we ourselves have experienced and those who risk it and who come later will have the same experience. In respect to the purchase of land here, I can tell you that there are many rich people here with many thousands of morgen (5/8 of 1 acre) of land which they bought from the king, and this is the land one can buy. If it is good and well situated, it is also expensive. Good land costs 400 reichsthaler for 100 morgen. One does not fertilize land to begin with, but after it yields wheat it becomes a little worn out and then one fertilizes as much as possible and puts it down to seed. As I have written you, practically all the land has good clean water. Regarding the length of the days, in summer the days are one hour shorter and in winter one hour longer than with you. The winter is about as cold as in Germany but one winter can be much harder than another. The summer is somewhat hotter than with you. As far as the land is concerned, when it is good it is as good as with you, but in some places much better. We have freedom of labor and one does not have to do statute labor, also one does not have to give his sons as soldiers to the king. One pays only small taxes, about 2 reichsthaler a year per 100 morgen. If it becomes too hard on you to remain over there and should you wish to come to us we should be very glad and would try to help you as much as possible. I do not know what else to say except that you can write to us again. We all commit you to God's protection and wish you all grace and blessing for your soul and body.

(Written about 1736?)

My dear friends,

I must write you a little bit about the characteristics of this country, how life goes on here and how one works. There is a great deal of woodland in this country, there are all kinds of trees, many oaks, many nut trees and other kinds of wood which you do not know. What land one has here he clears by hard work. One cuts the small trees out of the ground, which are as thick as a leg or an arm, and burns them with the brush on the ground. Large trees such as nut trees or oaks are felled with axes and then we hitch 3 horses to a plough which must go through the roots and everything else. After that we use a harrow with iron spikes and harrow the clearing. Next year you have good wheat growing. Land is becoming dearer now. The land I bought is 105 acres and cost 100 pounds. One pound equals 4 reichsthaler. My land was mostly bush and now I have already cleared 45 acres. The first year I cleared 14 acres and seeded on it 9 bushels and harvested 250 bushels. The second year I sowed 10 bushels and hope soon to sell 200. I have not threshed it all yet. The third year I again sowed 10 bushels and this crop is still on the land. It looks quite promising. When one first clears land one plants it all in wheat, thereafter one can sow other crops. This year I harvested more than 60 bushels of rye and well over 60 bushels of seed wheat, 33 bushels of buckwheat, a little oats and also good flax.

When people first arrive in this country and go to live in the wilderness, they fell trees one foot thick and as long as they desire, 20 or 30 feet long, and then the neighbors come and help them stack the logs on top of each other in a rectangular shape as high as the roof. While they stack the logs they cut pieces out of the ends so that the logs fit together. Then they put on a roof and they have a house. My brother-in-law helped me build my house. It cost more than 150 reichsthaler. I have a cedar roof on it. The cedar roof costs as much as 42 reichsthaler.

Now my dear friends, I must close and I say to you that all is vanity. Let us like Mary choose the better part which will not be taken away from us. But what shall I say about Germany and other countries? Darkness has covered the earth and has blinded the nations. Now I remain your faithful brother



VII

(Excerpts of letters 1735-1738)

My especially beloved brother and sister-in-law and sister, from us all be heartily greeted. . . .

I cannot refrain from writing to you, because I see from your letter that you want to come here next year. With brotherly love I want to advise you to use any money that you have over and above what is necessary for the passage to make purchases that you can bring with you. You will make a good profit out of them, and you should bring the kind of things which I will describe below, but as to the passage-money you need not pay more than half when you board the ship. I believe it best for you to go by way of Amsterdam and go with Lievenus Clarense, who lives in Amsterdam near the waterfront, where the ships are moored alongside each other. He goes to New York every year around this time and takes passengers, but not half as many as the captains who take only passengers. He takes better care of his fewer passengers than the others. can ask Johannes Kollenbusch who lives on the market place at Elberfeld, to write on your behalf to the merchant so that you will be informed at what time you must sail. Do not bring any of those little spinning wheels as they are of no use, but bring one or two dozen augers, but they must be very strong as one needs them to make holes in wheels into which to put bolts. You must have them made by Cautherg Schrol who lives on the Kauttenberg. They must be of steel otherwise they are of no use for they use them three or four times as often as They may be very dear but even if they cost half as much again as ordinarily it is cheap. Also a dozen knives, also twenty pounds of iron wire which the mechanic will make into spools, large ones, and some that are smaller, also two pounds of brass wire. Wire is very dear here. Iron wire costs as much as a half reichsthaler, and brass wire costs one reichsthaler in German money. You can bring as much with you as you wish or is convenient, for you will get good profit. Brass wire costs often even more but I do not know what brass wire is worth over there. You will know and can calculate accordingly. Do bring with you as much as you can, both fine and coarse. Bring also a few long and light rifles which are very accurate and hand-made throughout and mounted with copper. If you cannot get these where you are you can buy them in Holland.



Bring also twenty dozen wound metal buttons, but they must not be smaller than the circle and they must be nice, smaller ones will not do. Bring also a dozen ivory combs with teeth on only one side which you can buy near the Bollenberg in Elberfelt. Bring me also an axe for cutting down wood, have it well made with much steel, it must weigh not less than six pounds. Also copper kettles made of rolled copper, very strong and heavy, and the largest of a

size which one uses in a large household, as you can understand. You must buy half a dozen or as many as you think necessary, but they must fit into each other, otherwise you will not have enough room. The smallest must hold about two pails, and they must all be made entirely of copper and must be round and fairly thick. Here they cost as much as 36 stueber per pound in your money, and they are strengthened with iron hoops, for which the price is the same as if they were of copper. You must have a barrel made for the kettles and pack them in it, but carefully so they do not crush each other, and fasten them tight because they

won't be carefully handled at the custom house. You can also put other things with them which will not give or shake. Bring also one or two dozen jack-knives such as are made over there, with deer antler handles and heavy blades. Also one or two good flat irons with bolts attached. Bring also several pieces of checkered cloth but the checks must be very small, about the size of rusks, however use your own judgment. The women mostly prefer small checks, not more than 800 or 900 to the square yard. You can also bring some white ribbons, as well as some linen thread, also some coloured ribbons. You can buy these at Brugelmann's opposite your house. They must be several inches wide and rather long. Bring also some finely woven cotton but without large flowers, and some fine white linen cloth for caps and headcloths or neckerchiefs, also broadcloth. You can also bring whatever ironware or kettles you may already have.

As you may only bring one chest on each passage ticket, leave the small ones behind and sell them. Have the others made four or five and a half feet long and two and a half wide and equally high, and pack them full. Have them well studded with iron because on the journey they will be subject to hard use particularly in loading and unloading. For your use aboard ship bring some sausages, pickled apples, some nutmegs and cloves; you can buy all of this in Holland. And bring also a small keg of brandywine which you can buy in Amsterdam. You must stow all this under the bed or under the chest of drawers. Buy yourself in Holland also a teakettle which will be useful on board, and about twelve pounds of frying sausage because they are very good at sea. You can also take a small brazier on board so you yourself can cook on the ship, because the ship supplies wood and also coal for this purpose.

Dear brother, Several people have arrived this year from Elberfelt, and Kollenbusch advised them to go to the merchant Lievenus Clarense and cross on his ship, but they were afraid because they did not have sufficient passage money. But afterward they very much regretted not to have gone to him because the other merchants take so many people on the ship that it is hard to find room on board. Therefore I rode over to see some people who arrived this year on Clarense's ship at New York. They told me that they had been very comfortable, and had much pleasure and also more companionship than on the other ships. Also, only five children and two old people had died out of one hundred and thirty passengers. Here in Philadelphia several ships have arrived with as many as five hundred passengers aboard, and when there are so many people huddled together they become impatient, swear and blaspheme, and there are all sorts of illnesses and inconveniences.

Dear brother, you wrote me in the year 1737 and expressed surprise that more German people do not come here. This year there came fourteen ships to Philadelphia, and two to New York, and it is said that three more are due in Philadelphia. They are mostly North Germans, Swiss and people from the Palatinate, Zweibruecken, also from the upper Palatinate and Alsace, Wurtemberg and Hanoverians. Because there are so many people in Holland who want to come over here, the captains load as many as possible on each ship, as I have already

told you. This year thirty to forty or fifty, even eighty or one hundred or even two hundred died on one ship. Many children and also adults, sometimes whole families have died. This was reported in Philadelphia and the authorities said they would write to Holland and lodge complaints, so that in future they will not overcrowd their ships. Therefore, my dear brother, when you and yours decide to come to us, I think it best that you follow my advice, because I heard that those people had such a pleasant journey compared with the others.

If you have any money left over you should change it into Dutch money in Duisberg through the merchant Cannab, or Kannap. You must also keep some ready money for England where you have to pay your customs duty. Yo should declare two pistoles or one hundred reichsthaler, but keep silent about the rest, and don't tell anyone where you have hidden it, because there was a merchant who had hidden his goods and who was not searched, but then they asked various people if they knew if he had anything. Bring with you twenty reams of paper, and yellow striped cloth for neckerchiefs, 20 or 30 yards of the best. Don't bring anything I have not mentioned. Write down carefully everything you buy, so that you may afterwards know what each item costs.

When I was in Holland I saw neckerchiefs for one to four Dutch stueber which were decorated on both sides; bring a dozen of these. Dear brother, bring me also a hoe, and have it made long and strong, also a chain with which to bind the wood on the wagon, very strong, and with a ring through which one can put his hand. Hang it over the fire, so that it will blacken; you will then not have to pay any duty on it. I will repay you also for this. Bring also for yourself two iron wedges for wood splitting; one can actually buy these here, but they are very dear. Leave the adzes behind, they are of no use here. If you still have some money left in Holland, you could buy yourself a hand axe.

I should also let you know how many horses I have. I have four, two of which

I drive to the wagon; ten cows and fifteen sheep.

Dear brother, I have written you about much you should bring with you, and you will see how far your money will go, but you should also bring some copper to adorn the door locks and for yourself some implements or tools.

Dear brother, have your chest made with a double bottom with a narrow space between, where you can put the cotton checkered cloth and the yellow striped muslin. Put the false bottom on top but be sure that it fits closely and don't leave too much space between. Three inches should be sufficient between the upper and lower bottom for should it be discovered you will have to pay double the amount of duty. Put therefore on top of the false bottom your old house utensils and other old things, but leave your very old belongings in Elberfelt. But be sure that you have a good friend. I hope that Kollenbusch will help you with this, because when one buys so much from one person, he should get it cheaper than when one buys only a little.

Dear brother, buy in Holland, and in Holland only, all sorts of spices as I have told you before, and especially many nutmegs. I suggest you bring three or four dozen, because not all people think far ahead and when they become ill you can

sell to them at a high price.

Have yourself made one or two big baskets with a narrow edge which taper at the ends and which you can keep under the bed, and all the important things must be put under your bed, otherwise they are of no use. If one puts them in the chests remember that the chests are put in the hold where they remain until you get to the customs ashore.

Dear brother, I have now written you everything but remember to supply yourself with proper food before everything else, because one cannot rely on the

shipsfare, as it is sometimes bad. . . .

It is a long and hard journey so do what you wish and do not force your wife to undertake it for otherwise it may not turn out as she expects and you will get the blame. It is a poor thing to give people advice in regard to this journey. It is no short journey as people sometimes imagine it is. Usually it takes from England to New York ten weeks on the water. It is a great piece of luck if one gets over in eight weeks, and one sees nothing but the heavens and water.

Neither must you believe the stupid talk of people who say that the contents of letters are changed, because that is not true. Anyone may write what he wants to, he may have contempt for this country or praise it. It is definitely a

good country where people need not live in a pitiful way.

Now I commit you all to the care of the almighty God. He will be your protector and your guide for the journey, should you come to me, and I hope that I will see all eight of you again.

First my heartiest greetings to all of you with the wish that God's light and mercy be yours, your wife's, your children's, your dear sister's and all the dear friends' who may still be alive, because I see from your letter that some of them have died. I, my sister and all the relatives were very pleased that we received another letter from you. This is the first letter wherein you mention that you wrote a year ago, which we did not receive. You say that your wife and three children and also our sister Gertraute and our other friends are still alive and well. The many hardships you have experienced are common in every land except here where we cannot say the same. I and my wife and five sons are still living and thanks to God things are well with us. We live in peaceful times and are little bothered by the authorities. The country is still fairly blessed although one has to work according to God's command. What you tell us about the English and Spanish war we have not heard anything about in this country. In respect to our sister Catrina and her husband Henrich Dirdorff, they also have four children, one son and three daughters. They are very happy together and we live only a half hour away from them. They also have food according to the season as much as they need.

My dear brother, our temporal life and our bodily sustenance is the least important, we all have immortal souls which cannot be fed by any human creature. We must live again in communion with God in Jesus Christ, casting off the old coat of sins and of the flesh so that we can approach the likeness of God. If we want to be blessed we must follow the way and life of Christ and be members of the body of Jesus. Of what use is it if one gains the world and harms his soul. You wanted to know also if there were churches and schools here. There are indeed churches but not as fine as in Germany. When one has the fear of God in his heart one has a church at all times within himself. One serves God best when he goes to Jesus Christ and learns from Him. He will teach us right if we hold fast to Him and with our minds search our hearts and observe what He teaches through the Holy Ghost who is the right teacher and will not mislead us.

Now, God willing I will add a short letter to this one.

This letter is to be delivered to Johan Hennrich Fanestück, called Lollert, living in Halten on the Lahn, and to be left at the Luscher Mill.

Anwiel, November 7th-8th

1740

My brotherly greetings to you, my dear brother and sister-in-law and also my brotherly greetings to my dear sister Anna Gertraut. Although I received your letter of May 14th in good order and we are all well, only now have I a good opportunity to send you a short answer and hope it will find you and yours in good health, which you deserve, your innermost feelings being what they are. Dear brother, I learn from your letter that times have been very difficult for you and that you have had a hard winter. The winter here has been mild, hardly enough snow to make it possible to haul firewood in a sleigh. In the spring we had a long cold spell, but this did little damage to the crops which we are selling well now. A bushel of wheat weighs sixty pounds and costs 3 kopstueck in your money, a pound of butter is worth 6 pennies if sold but people here eat it themselves. We are enjoying good times but it would be better still if corn were to fetch a higher price, as then we could buy more land. A working man however can have enough corn and whatever else a household requires for little money but the land becomes dearer and dearer. I have sold my place here and received two hundred pounds for it. I had also a debt of ten pounds but had enough wheat to pay it off.

Once more my brotherly greetings to you, dear brother, and to all my friends. I also wish you wisdom and blessings for your soul so that you can carry on wisely and gain salvation in these times, so that when we leave this earth we may enter the blessed eternity and peace. I particularly greet my sister, I wish she were here because she is not well. If she were with me she need not have any worries for one does not worry here. She could earn enough with spinning and sewing. If she still has nothing to do and wishes to come here and has not the

fare, I should go with pleasure to meet her as soon as I heard she had arrived in Philadelphia. I would pay her fare and make her independent. We hear that there are many in Elberfelt who want to come here, so in that way she might find good company. My wife's cousin Johannes von Marsch wants to come and he might be a good companion. When you write me again please remember that I am going in the spring to live on my new piece of property near Kannestocken (Conestoga) which is situated sixty miles or twenty hours from Philadelphia in Pennsylvanien. Kannestocken in or near Ephrata. I and my wife greet you all most heartily together with your children and my sister and all good friends.

Much beloved brother-in-law Henrich Farnstück together with your dear wife and children, as well as your dear sister Gertraute, with blessings and love to all of you,

I, your unknown brother-in-law Henrich Dirdorff and my beloved wife Catrina, your dear sister, send you our heartiest greetings and wish you all blessings from God that He would make you strong through the Holy Ghost. The true knowledge of oneself comes from Jesus the Savior of all people who turn to Him. with all their hearts. Afterwards we become Godly as our lives have been given to us by God in Jesus. Unfortunately most of the so-called Christians live under a false illusion even if they have been brought up in such religions as Reformed or Lutheran, because they have no inner life of the true rebirth. I mean, only, if in their childhood they are baptised with water and when they have reached their twelfth or thirteenth year and learn a little of the catechism, can they then realize whether they are saved or lost. We believe they would be good Christians although they know nothing of the true rebirth which was brought about through the Holy Ghost, and so we together with you and many others were led astray, and listened blindly to the leading preacher. But as God looked into our hearts He saw that we had been deceived and that we should learn to build our faith upon the death of Jesus. Firstly we must again be baptised according to the Holy Scripture (Roman 6) and then we must curb the lust and greed in ourselves, all the vain knowledge of the world, and must bear the yoke, indeed follow everything that Jesus has commanded, so that we may share and earn the mercy of Jesus Christ, that we have been taught. We do not become religious without knowing what Jesus and His twelve apostles have taught and experienced themselves.

That is our foundation and creed, and we hope with all our hearts that you will

agree with us. It would do your poor souls good.

As for our material life we are all well and have six children, two sons and four daughters. Our little son fell asleep in God. We do not want for food or bodily

nourishment, but earthly riches have not been our lot. We learned through your letter of your prosperous condition in material things as also your sister and our uncle and we are very happy that the dear Lord has taken care of you so well in these hard times. We were surprised to hear about the severe cold, dearth and want from which man and beast have had to suffer over there. That God has begun His last judgment on this earth is not true for it is obvious that He must first judge the sins that are now as bad as they were in the days of Sodom. You have asked us to let you know whether it has been cold here also, and how we are getting along, but as mentioned before we have not experienced great cold but indeed a very mild winter, so everything has been well. We have not had any rise in the cost of living, and we have harvested bountifully. Although sinners increase here and God's judgment may strike here also, our Lord will protect his own. You have written that the journey for you and your children would be dangerous and difficult because you hear so many people have died. But whoever undertakes it under God's will cannot go wrong. However it needs faith and trust in God, then one can stand it although he may have to suffer somewhat and it is not as hard as many have imagined. It would please us to have you here with us, but will be content with whatever you decide for the best. When you write again address the letter to Anwill in New York. If we should not see you in this world, we commit you to God and His Infinite Love. Greetings to you all and those who may inquire about us, meanwhile we remain your faithful brother-in-law and sister.

Dearly beloved and worthy brother Johan Henrich Fanestück,

I wish you and yours much prosperity, happiness, peace and spiritual well being. I have not received any letters from you for many years nor have I had any news of you. I do not know whether you have not written or whether your letters have gone astray. Anyway I am anxious to learn how you are, and whether you and yours are still living, and also if our sister Anna Gertraute is still living and how it goes with you. As for myself, my wife and seven children we are all well and prosperous. We have good reason to praise and honor our Creator and Keeper, for everything good comes from Him alone. Our sister Catrina passed away several years ago, she had eight children of whom three are living and five are dead. Her husband took unto himself another wife and the children are still with them. They are well as far as I know. I am no longer living in the neighborhood as I moved to a place called Kanastoka. We did not move because of lack or want of material things as we had plenty to carry on this mortal life, in fact a surplus of such things. But because of God and our immortality we looked for people who had the same desire to lead a blameless and Godfearing life which is very hard to find among the majority of people. As we found such people in the above mentioned place, we moved there and in sympathy with them it was easier to attain such a life, for as bad company can destroy good habits so can good company destroy bad habits and through encouragement and

cooperation with one another much good can be accomplished. This is the reason why we moved to the above mentioned place, where we are now living on a property near to a place called Ephrata, where also seventy people are living, who are all endeavoring to adjust their lives in accord with the creed of the first Christian and Apostolic Church. They hold all their goods in common, they eat of one bread and drink of one water. They live in the following way: bachelors live in one house, where each one has his own separate cubicle and six or seven share a floor. They all eat at one table and work together. The spinsters live in the same way in another house. And we, the fathers of families live some a quarter, some a half, and some an hour or more away from these community houses where each of us has his own piece of land. We have in the above mentioned place a meeting house, where we gather every Sabbath, because we hold the Sabbath as the seventh day which was ordained by God a holy day, and blessed as a day of rest, as can be found in the Holy Scripture. Our community was born in the following manner. A lonely man who was entirely committed to God and was only concerned for his soul came to this place where in his solitude he intended to lead a life dedicated to God's will. This man who risked his life to please God is our spiritual pioneer and guardian, and hither have gradually come so many who desire this kind of life, it has become a community. You must forgive me for writing so much concerning immortal life, but I believe and know that no one can do better than spend his time in contemplation of the things that will serve his everlasting salvation and peace.

I wish that you were all here with us. In this country one can live well and bountifully. We have not been troubled with wars as yet, and up to the present we have enjoyed a very good government. Everyone is free to live according to his conscience. As for me and mine, we are all well, very contented, and live very happily. More I do not want. I do not know what else I can write to you, but I beg that you let me know at the first opportunity how you are, also if

our sister Anna Gertraute is still living and how she is.

In conclusion, I, my wife and children greet you all most heartily and particularly our sister Anna Ger. if she is still alive.

The 2nd of October 1750

Heartily beloved brother Johan Hinrich Fahrenstück.

I let you know that we are all healthy and happy, and I want to tell you a little about our life here. We have a good place about 280 acres of land which lies in a circular shape, and on it are two houses and two barns. The houses and the cleared land are on one side, and the woods or forest are on the other side. It takes about one hour to walk around the property. We have about twelve or fourteen acres of meadow land, and we harvest in the year more than thirty

wagon loads of hay or thirty-five to thirty-six wagon loads, depending upon whether it is a dry or a wet year. The meadow is close to and partly between the houses. The houses are about one hundred fifty paces apart. There are several springs in the meadow. One is in the upper part of the meadow and the water flows by my house and I use this to water the meadow. Another spring is very near the house, and another is partly between the houses and to one side, another group of seven or eight springs is close to the other house. We cultivate a great many crops, wheat, rye, spelt, barley, oats, buckwheat and flax. We take the surplus barley and wheat, which we do not need, to Philadelphia, for we eat not only wheat bread but occasionally bread made of spelt, which is practically as good as wheat bread. We sell linseed from the flax, which is shipped to Ireland. This year I sold fifteen bushels of linseed because the price was rather high, about ten shillings per bushel, the same as two reichsthaler in your money, and therefore a total of thirty reichsthaler. We have this year more than three hundred bushels of wheat, one hundred thirty-six bushels of buckwheat and more than one hundred fifty bushels of spelt, rye, barley and oats. I do not know how much there is of each, but of wheat there is most. The wheat we take occasionally to the mill and have it ground into flour which we then sell in Philadelphia. A bushel of wheat weighs sixty or sixty-one pounds. We can carry fifty bushels of flour in our wagon but not more than thirty-six or forty bushels of wheat. Fifty bushels of wheat make two thousand pounds of flour. A bushel sells for five shillings which is the same as one reichsthaler. We also have quite a little live stock, eighteen cows, nine horses, and also sheep. Our place is now worth more than seven hundred pounds. Now my dear brother, I have written you somewhat about our material affairs, but they cannot satisfy the soul, but instead they are more like a snare imprisoning the soul. The letter which our friend Huecker wrote is better than this one, but people would much rather listen to material things than to God's word.


Now my dear brother, I wish you and my sister much peace and the blessings and love of God. I have written this letter with my own hand. Now, dear brother and sister, I and my wife, Anna Margritha, send our heartiest greetings to you and also remember me to all good friends in Fahrenstück. We have still living eight children, the eldest is called Casparus, who is a basket weaver, for there are excellent reeds here. After him two died, the fourth one is named Petterus, the fifth Diederich, the sixth Johannes, the seventh Daniel, the eighth is a daughter and is called Josa, the ninth is Benjamin, the tenth Borius as my father was named. Please write soon again, we can write to each other every year if you will send your letters to Zwingenberg in Crefeldt. I live in Canistocka near Ephrata in Cocalico Township.

Johan Dierich Fahrnstück

About a year ago he practised medicine in an apothecary shop and had things sent to him from Frankfort, which he received safely.

I want to inform you a little how my place may be described and how much land we have. The whole place is 330 acres, 50 acres of this I have sold. We

now have 280 acres left. The fifty acres I sold to my brother-in-law Henrich Dierdorff who built a house on it, but he is now dead. . . . I bought it for 81 pounds to begin with. . . . Bought the whole place for 160 pounds . . . which are well worth 500 pounds. We have 14 acres of grass land and can harvest



much hay and rowen. We have now 15 wagon loads of hay and 29 wagon loads of rowen; the early summer was dry. We have more than 20 head of cattle and also 7 horses. Crops are very expensive because it is far to cart the hay to other places. This autumn we have carted 4 wagon loads to Philadelphia, 2 wagon loads of wheat flour and 2 wagon loads of barley.

XIII

Much beloved brother and sister Johan Henrich Farnstück and Anna Gertraut, I wish you a thousand times much good and love from God, and I am rejoiced to have received a letter from you. I had not heard from you for fourteen years and did not know whether you were alive or dead. I have written you often as I can send a letter each year with the Netherlanders. They are people who go abroad to buy merchandise, but they do not go to you, instead they go up the river Rhine as far as Frankfort where they buy their goods. They also take passengers and arrive every year in this country from Germany with several thousand people. So far this year as many as sixteen ships have arrived from Germany. Last autumn and in one ship there were four to five hundred people, perhaps more. Those people who have the passage money pay their fare at once and land from the ship, and everyone looks about for a place to live. But those who have nothing must wait until someone comes who will pay the fare which amounts to ten pounds, and then they must go into service from one to two, three, four, or five years, during which time they receive board, lodging and clothes. When the time has elapsed they receive a new suit or dress, and are free to go wherever they please. When people hear that ships are due to arrive, those who need workmen or maids meet them and pay their passage money. There is a law here that young men and girls must serve until they come of age. Girls come of age at eighteen, and boys at twenty-one. So those who are seven, eight or ten, twelve, fourteen or sixteen years old must stay in service until they come of age. Those who stay with artisans must be taught the trade, no matter what kind of trade it is.

I also want to write you a little about the house we are building. We began to build it in the year 1751. It is built as in the city, with stone walls. It is thirty-seven feet long and thirty wide. We have a vaulted cellar in the new house, which is a little larger than half the size of the house. Over the cellar is a large room and a smaller one and on the next floor is another room. We have built two stoves for the rooms. There are five plates to each stove, and each stove weighs about four hundred pounds. They are cast not forged. There are all sorts of figures on them. We also have a stove in the house where we live which cost four and a half pounds, and in the other houses we have stoves which cost four pounds, for we have three houses. The one we live in is still really good, and we let it stand and work in it. In the other house we have people living as we do not need it. The new house and the house in which we live are eighteen feet apart, and the other house stands about fifty yards from the two houses. The vaulted cellar in the new house is eight feet high, and the first floor is nine feet high, and the second floor eight feet high. Over the second story we have an attic in which we store some of the crops. We cultivate a lot of wheat, spelt, rye, barley, oats and buckwheat, and also turkish wheat. The new house is built entirely of limestone and is whitewashed with lime and sand, which we burned ourselves. We burned three kilns full, and each kiln contained as much as fifty wagon loads. We also baked more than four thousand tiles which we

will use for the roof and chimney and in the kitchen, and also to build stoves in the rooms. We have done much of the work ourselves, as it costs a great deal to have it done by others. Masons get one to three shillings a day. At times there were five masons, sometimes seven, and the carpenters also get three shillings a day. I had the masons for some time, and they received thirty-five pounds. for the entire building. A shilling is as much as twelve stueber, a pound is twenty shillings. The masons do only masonry. There are now three carpenters working who make the doors and windows as well as the floors and beams. have already worked at it six weeks, and must work four or five weeks more before they have finished. They receive one thaler a day which is as much as one reichsthaler and twenty stueber. Building costs a great deal. If one should build this kind of a house in the city, it would cost four or five hundred pounds. It is a stone house from the bottom to the ridgepole, and in addition there is a great deal of wood which cost fifteen pounds to saw. We have a sawmill near us in Ephrata a quarter of an hour away. We hauled more than fifty tree trunks to it in the wagon with four horses. Out of these we sawed beams, window frames, door posts and planks. More than three thousand board feet were needed. What other wood was needed was cut in the forest, such as large cross-beams. We made the roof of cedar wood, and under the roof is a jutting roof over the windows, which runs all around the house. We bought the shingles in Philadelphia, and they cost about ten pounds, that is as much as forty reichsthaler. We often drive to Philadelphia, sometimes five, six or seven times in the year, taking flour, wheat, barley, and also linseed. In the year 1752 we had three hundred bushels of wheat ground into flour, and we carted it to Philadelphia where we sold it. Each wagon load amounts to fifty bushels, that gives two thousand two hundred pounds of fine flour in bags bagged here in the mill. The glass windows cost about ten pounds, and are framed in wood which is better than lead. The panes are large, one is eight inches wide and ten inches high. Others are seven inches wide and nine inches high, also six inches wide, and eight inches high.

Now my dear brother and sister, I, my wife and children greet you all from our hearts. We are all fine and healthy. I wish that many of your people who must

live so poorly were here.

My very dear and beloved brother John. Henr. Fanestück,

Your happy greetings and heartfelt love to me and mine are reciprocated by us. I want to let you know that our greatest wish, namely an answer from you, has been received with great joy by us. We learn from this that you are well off and that you have received my letter in which I wrote you about our life. As for ourselves I can say that I and my family are now in such a position that I wish with all my heart every one of our dear friends in Europe could fare the

same as we. Not only is there no shortage of food but an oversupply, and as to Godly things we are also particularly blessed compared with other communities. For all this we have cause to thank God from the bottom of our hearts. We live under a good government, the country is under the protection of the crown of England, and there are officials appointed who are called governors. One of them is in New York, another in Virginia, one in Maryland, and one in Pennsylvania, under whose jurisdiction we live. Pennsylvania has a particular advantage over the others in as much as we all enjoy a complete freedom of thought and everyone can live according to his own conscience. We are not oppressed by the aristocracy. I have to pay ten shillings tax a year, which about equals two thaler, and this money is used for the benefit of the countryside. Whatever else I earn remains mine. The government is such that no one man has the right to say how things must be run, but a certain number of men are elected and they meet together and deliberate what is best for the country. As they decide so it is done. Furthermore each district or neighborhood has a special authority whom we call "justice", and who is about the same as richter (judge) with you. Here and there are courthouses which correspond to your Kanzleihaeuser (chanceries) where this official together with other civil servants pronounce judgment and maintain order during the year. Now I have told you a little about our government and worldly affairs. In my last letter I explained our spiritual government in detail, but if there is any further news I shall write you later.

With all my heart I would like to see you again face to face, my dear brother, but I think that can scarcely happen because we are both growing old. I am not likely to go to you, and although I might wish you were here I cannot advise you to come, because so far as I understand by your letter, though you are well off materially you suffer from asthma, therefore I would not encourage you to take such a tiring journey during your few remaining days. But should any of your young people be inclined to come here I would rather advise them to do so. It would please me very much to see one or more of your children, and I should try my best to be helpful to them. It is particularly favorable here for young people. A young man gets wages from sixteen, eighteen to twenty pounds in

the year; a pound is twenty shillings. A girl gets seven pounds.

As I saw from your letter the circumstances of our dear sister Anna Gertraut are pretty bad, which is sad and depressing to hear. I do not know what to say about it, but if I could advise or help her in any way I should be glad. In the meantime I wish the best for her. Give her my hearty greetings and also my best regards to the friends of whom you wrote. I wish you many happy days of God's bountiful grace, together with all spiritual prosperity of body and soul.

Concerning those left behind by our dear departed sister Anna Catharina it is this way: Her husband did marry again but died more than a year ago, and his widow married again a good man. The children are still with them, they are contented, are in good circumstances, and have a piece of land with good buildings on it. They live only a quarter of an hour from me.

I also informed you that our friend Kamvman arrived here safely with his family. I have not yet seen him, as I live twenty-eight hours away from where

he landed. My brother-in-law Wilhelmus Werth who lives here went to visit his —— there, and when he arrived our friend Kamvman had just landed, and he was helpful to them. He had brought me your letter. Beyond this I have nothing of importance to write you. If we were together and could talk face to face, I think there would be a good deal that we could say to each other, which cannot very well be written. Nevertheless we should write as much as possible and as long as we live in these mortal huts, inform each other how we are getting along.

I hope to get another letter from you in reply next year. In conclusion, my dear brother, I greet you with all my heart, also your dear wife and children and once more our dear sister Anna Gertraut and her family and all our friends, and may God take good care of you all. My dear wife and her brothers and sisters also wish to be sincerely remembered to you, and so do my children, eight of whom are living, seven sons and one daughter. I remain devoted in love and faithful unto death your well-wishing brother

P.S. Just as this letter was finished Diedrich Hoeltzenbecker from Elberfelt called upon me with his wife and four children. He was not sparing with his gifts. He used to live in Radetantz, and wants to go to Carolina. He wants to rest here for a few days as it is two hundred hours from here. Many people are moving there from here. From Pennsylvania they travel through Maryland, from there through Virginia and then into Carolina.

XV

My very dear and beloved brother J. H. Fanestück,

With friendly greetings I want to inform you that thanks to the great goodness of the praiseworthy Creator all is well with us. I my wife and children wish and hope the same for you and yours. A year ago I wrote you in much detail about my life, but have not yet received a reply from you, and therefore do not know if my letter reached you. This year my eldest son Caspar traveled away. It would have pleased me if he had gone to you, and he would have done so gladly. But I doubt very much whether this will happen as he went alone to foreign lands and he does not care to go again without companionship which is dangerous, and while it would not be exactly on his way I doubt whether his traveling companions would go with him. They travel way back in the country and therefore should it not come to pass please do not be offended with him because it is not due to lack of love, but to lack of opportunity. He calls at Creyvelt when coming and going, where he is having made for us several watches and a clock by the artisan Rittblaetter. If you could find out when he is coming back, you could arrange to meet him, but if that is impossible please write to me again. You can send the letters to Creyvelt where three brothers live named Johannes Wilhelmus, Christophorus, and Tobias Abeckers. Beyond this I have nothing more in particular to write. I think you will have received my last year's letter wherein I gave you all the news in detail. Herewith I close and I and my wife

and children and my brother-in-law Wilhelmus, who still lives with me, send our greetings to you, your wife and children and all our friends who are still alive. Besides sending you our love and best wishes we commit you to the all-powerful hand of God. I remain your devoted and loving brother unto death.

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
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
