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P R E F A C E.

THE Author has often been requested to prepare a book of family prayers, but he was hindered by other occupation, and had also the feeling that there was considerable provision made for this duty in the devotions that have already been given to the church.

During a late illness, however, while disabled from his public ministry, and restricted from every thing that might occasion mental excitement, it appeared to him that it might be both personally profitable, consistent with the circumstances in which he had been placed, and useful to others, to avail himself of notes which had been made of his own family prayers in preparing this work, and the reader has now before him the fruit of this seclusion from full public duties.

The regular daily practice of family devotion comes so continually that the multiplication of helps is not without its advantage against the danger of mere formal repetitions.

May it please the Lord to bless each scriptural effort, however feeble, thus to assist the devotions of his people. The circumstances of the times are so peculiar, and the unfoldings of providence are so remarkable as justly to call on the minister of Christ to supply his people with hints for prayers suited to these times.

The prayers here given are comparatively short, particularly those in the 6th and 7th weeks; but it will be easy to enlarge them from the occasional prayers which furnish a considerable part of the present volume.

Matthew Henry used to say that they who pray, do well; they who pray and read the scriptures, do better; they who pray, and read, and sing, do best; this is true, provided the heart go along with the worship, and we are led from the outward to the inward service.

The Author's plan has long been to sing a psalm or hymn, read a very short portion from the New Testament in regular course in the morning, and from the Old in the evening, explain it in a practical manner, and then unite with his family in prayer,

founded on the instruction given, and connected with the events of the day.

It is very desirable that family prayer should not be something distinct and separate from the usual spirit and habits of the family; but the refreshing and strengthening of all the ordinary course and feelings, and the very centre of the family interest and happiness, gathering round it all that most concerns us each day. It is important that it should not be merely a venerable custom, but a spring of blessing, flowing daily in renewed streams of grace for the whole household.

The following hints for using these prayers may be useful.

The Author hopes that the heads of families who use them, may be induced by their general shortness to lengthen them as occasion may require, and he gives the following hints for this purpose.

The Lord's prayer should precede, or follow the form here given.

Collects for special graces are added at the close of the book, that they may be occasionally used.

The sacred seasons of the episcopal church

furnish her members also with profitable opportunities of varying and enlarging family devotion.

In this method it is hoped that many a master, or parent, or head of a family, giving a few minutes previously in private for preparation, will learn by degrees the happy skill of framing his own family devotions, and giving that variety to them which will adapt them to the ever-varying circumstances of a family, and prevent their becoming a mere matter of form and custom.

In a former work the Author recommended that every head of a family should try to attain the holy skill of exposition in his family, and should be a Teacher in his own house. This skill is of more easy attainment, and of much more important benefit, than is often supposed. Christians might thus become more fitted for extensive usefulness. Any thing tedious and wearisome is to be avoided. Short striking addresses to the conscience, drawn from the passage like arrows from the bow penetrate the heart, but lengthened common-place explanation, wearies and disgusts, and is in ordinary cir-

cumstances quite out of place in the family. Much, very much of the true blessedness of this service will depend on the lively piety of the expounder. Well is it when family prayer is felt to be such a blessing that a necessary absence is felt to be a loss and privation.

In closing these prefatory remarks, I would endeavour to press upon the heads of families to seek the attainment of the blessed privilege of conducting family devotions without being tied to a form, and with all the freedom of unbosoming our inward feelings and wants as children of God to our heavenly Parent and ever present Redeemer. Multiplication of forms cannot fully meet the vast variety of Providence, or comprehend the infinite fulness of divine thoughts and pleadings given us in the word of God for this blessed duty. What comes warm and direct from the heart will also find its way more readily to the hearts of others. There are frequently occasions when one holy strain of desire and feeling, which might seem limited or exclusive in a published form, may yet from circumstances most suitably and profitably be used in our family.

Gratifying then as is the large and growing demand for publications of this kind, as showing that this blessed duty is more extensively practised, I cannot but hope that in this, as well as in other things, the New Covenant direction and promise may soon be more realized. "They shall not teach every man his neighbour and every man his brother, saying, Know the Lord, but all shall know me, from the least to the greatest."

The highest recompense of all labour is to promote the divine glory in being useful to the souls of our fellow-men. The Lord prosper this effort to this end. I send forth this work to the Church, with humble prayer to that heavenly Father who has graciously prospered my past publications so much beyond my hopes, that it may please him to make this farther effort useful in promoting family devotion among my fellow-Christians.

ADDRESS
OF THE
HEAD OF A FAMILY,
ON BEGINNING FAMILY WORSHIP.

MY DEAR FAMILY AND FRIENDS,

THE duty and importance of family prayer have determined me to begin this sacred service immediately, and to continue it regularly from this day, morning and evening.

All common excuses for neglecting it are wholly insufficient. To say that we have no time for such a duty is to suppose that all our time does not belong to God, and that our really profitable employment of it does not depend upon his blessing. All other employment of time may be expected to prosper as we openly acknowledge and honour him daily with a portion of that time which he has given us. To say that we are ashamed of owning God and his truth, before our fellow men, is to bring ourselves under the terrible sentence—"Whosoever shall be ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him shall the Son of man

be ashamed when he cometh in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

There is far more danger of neglecting family prayer than in attending to it. We may possibly be sometimes inconvenienced in our employments, or we may possibly sometimes offend those whom we desire to oblige by family worship, but it is a far more serious evil, by not duly attending to the directions of God's holy word in that employment of time which affects our eternal interest, to offend our highest and best friend, even the Almighty, who can alone make any other friendship delightful or profitable to us. It is his declared and solemn purpose to pour out his displeasure upon the families that call not upon his name, (Jer. x. 25,) and let us be more afraid of that wrath than any other displeasure. It is also his gracious promise, that if we seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, all other things shall be added unto us; and let us trust his promise.

The examples of God's faithful servants and the blessing of God which followed their conduct, furnish weighty and unanswerable reasons for this duty. Thus our God testified of Abraham: "I know Abraham, that he will command his children and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the Lord to do justice and judgment, that the Lord may bring upon Abraham that which he hath spoken of him." Gen. xviii. 19. Let us be followers of the faith of Abraham. Of Joshua, again, it is tes-

tified that he said, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." Joshua xxiv. 15. Let this, by God's grace, be our purpose also.

We find, both in the Old and the New Testament, that the devoted servants of God were men who honoured and worshipped God in their own dwelling.

We are brought together in God's providence as a family, not merely for our worldly comfort and in order to provide for each other the comforts, and conveniences, and advantages of this life. We are brought together in the grace and loving-kindness of God, that we may be helpful to each other in higher and better interests; that we may be trained and educated in one family below, to fulfil the duties of this life towards all our fellow-creatures, and to be made meet to share in the privileges and joys of the great family of God, to be gathered together in his heavenly kingdom,

Created by one Almighty Father, redeemed by the blood of one Lord, Jesus Christ, having all the promise of one Teacher, the Holy Ghost, and the hope of one eternal home; altogether dependent, as we all are, for life and breath, salvation and eternal glory on the grace and goodness of the living and the true God, how right, and meet, and just it is that we should daily together praise his name and implore his favour and blessing!

I trust therefore that nothing but absolute necessity will hinder us, from this time forward, from re-

come unto thee in the name of Christ Jesus, for thou art the Lord our God.

Thou alone dost set the solitary in families, and fixest the bounds of our habitation, and canst build us up a sure house, and make us to dwell in safety, and we acknowledge thee to be the God of our family and the giver of our blessings. But, O Lord, if left to ourselves, we forget thee and call not upon thy name, and bring upon ourselves thy righteous wrath. O Lord, pardon all our past neglect of thy worship and service, and grant us grace henceforth to honour thee in our family, and, whatever others may do, to take up Joshua's holy purpose of heart, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."

Help us deeply to feel and ever to remember that except the Lord build the house they labour in vain that build it; that children and the fruit of the womb are a heritage and gift that come from thee, and that a special blessing was given to Abraham for commanding his children and his household after him to keep the way of the Lord and to do judgment and justice. Thou hast charged us to teach thy words diligently unto our children, and to talk of them when we sit in the house and walk out, when we lie down and when we rise up. Grant then, O Lord, that from this time forward we may have grace from thee to meet together continually to read and hear thy word, to sing thy praise, and to worship thee as a fa-
y. O do thou most mercifully pour upon us the spirit

of grace and supplication, and give unto us the seeing eye, the hearing ear, the understanding, and believing, and obedient heart, that we may be truly converted unto thee and live.

May our household be a Christian household, not in name only, but in truth; and may all our family plans and rules be ordered according to thy word. As masters and servants, parents and children, may we be wholly conformed to thy will, and our children be brought up in thy nurture. Enable us constantly, as a family, to walk worthy of the Gospel, and to adorn in all things the doctrine of God our Saviour.

We now dedicate our house and family unto thee. We avouch thee the Lord this day to be our God, and our purpose to be to walk in thy ways, and to keep thy statutes, and thy commandments, and thy judgments, and to hearken to the voice of thy commandments. O do thou avouch us to be thy peculiar people, and that we shall keep thy commandments and be a holy people unto thee, according to thy promise. O Lord God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, and in him our Father, keep this for ever in the imagination of the thoughts of our hearts, and prepare our hearts, and put thy fear within us, that we may never depart from thee. We beseech thee to hear us, for our Redeemer's sake. Amen.

THE LORD'S PRAYER.

Our Father which art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil; for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

THE CONCLUDING BLESSING.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Ghost, be with us all evermore. Amen.

FAMILY PRAYERS,

First Week.

I.

LORD'S DAY MORNING.

FOR GRACE TO IMPROVE SABBATH PRIVILEGES.

ALMIGHTY and most merciful Father, who hast given us thy sabbaths to be a sign betwixt thee and us, and a foretaste and sure earnest of the eternal sabbath which yet remains for thy people; we come to thee in the name of thy Son Jesus Christ, that Son of man, who is Lord of the Sabbath, and entreat thee to assist us to keep this day holy, and not to receive thy grace in vain.

Our privileges indeed are great; thy house is ready and open to us; thy ministers wait to instruct us, thy people come together; O may we discern that each Sabbath is a gracious opportunity for good; a sacred talent to be occupied for thee.

We are indeed so sinful and so weak that we can do nothing of ourselves, but must in every thing look

goodness lead us to repentance. May we bear in mind that every gift is given to a man to profit withal; and may knowledge, faith, humility, love and obedience ever follow in our souls the hearing of thy truth; enlighten thereby our minds, purify our hearts, and sanctify our lives.

We do earnestly implore of thee to give unto us thy Holy Spirit to bring to our remembrance what we have heard; may we all of us so meditate upon thy truth day and night, that we may be like a tree planted by the river of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in due season.

Let us not deceive ourselves by judging, approving and commending what we hear; let us remember that thy words may be to us as a very lovely song, and yet we may be of those who hear them, but do them not. O may thy truth have a real and constant and powerful influence upon every day and every hour of our lives, upon all our thoughts, words and actions.

We pray for those that have assembled with us in thy house. Pardon all our infirmities and iniquities in thy worship and service, and give us the great blessings which we asked, because of our Advocate and High Priest, now in thy presence for us.

We pray for those who have been absent from public worship. Some have been kept by sickness, and others by unavoidable hinderances, from the assemblies of thy people: grant unto them the visits of thy love and grace in their sick chamber, or where-

ever may be the place of their constrained absence. Others have kept away from thy house through wilful unbelief, sin, and disobedience; O give them true repentance and a better mind for the time to come; and may they, with us, know what it is to be joyful in thy house of prayer.

O Lord, follow with thy largest blessing all the faithful labours of thy ministers. Give an abundant increase every where to the seed sown, and may the fruits of righteousness spring up on every side. May the myriads upon myriads of prayers this day offered up by thy believing and devout people, bring down innumerable blessings on thy church, and, through the great Advocate, be a prevailing intercession with thee for a sinful world. O let Israel at length know the blessedness of our Christian Sabbath and of our Lord's day, believing in the resurrection of Jesus, and receiving the out-pouring of his Spirit. Revive thy dying churches; enlarge continually the kingdom of Christ; and let the whole earth be filled with his glory, for his name's sake. Amen.

III.

MONDAY MORNING.

FOR A SENSE OF GOD'S LOVE.

O God, our gracious Father, in whom we live and move and have our being, whose presence and glory surround us on every side, shed abroad, through the Holy Ghost, thy love in Christ Jesus into our hearts. O may we all see how great is thy goodness! how

great is thy beauty! and how excellent is thy loving-kindness! and may all of us be numbered with the sons of men who put their trust under the shadow of thy wings.

Give us grace to live under the constant sense of thy holy love to us sinners. May we enter into the fulness of that blessed truth,—that God is love, and he that dwelleth in love, dwelleth in God, and God in him. Let love, out of a pure heart, be the great animating, directing and enlivening principle of our whole conduct, towards thee and towards all men.

May the sermons yesterday preached by thy ministering servants here, and the instruction given, be a blessing to this place; to rich and poor, to young and old, to the children in the schools, and to the parents of the children. Extend the same blessing wherever thy gospel has been proclaimed, far and wide. Let there not be one hearing thy truth without gaining some quickening or strengthening grace from the truth preached.

May thy church be animated by a believing view of the bliss of all thy saints now with thee in the heavenly Zion, and by the prospect of the resurrection-glory of thy church in the day of Christ. Seeing this great cloud of witnesses, may we run with patience day by day, the race that is set before us, laying aside every weight with which the world or Satan would encumber us, and the sin which does so easily beset us, and always looking unto Jesus, the Author and Finisher of our faith.

O Lord, hold thou up our goings in thy paths; for only while thou holdest us up are we safe. We are in the midst of snares and temptations, which we see not, or at best see very dimly. Do thou then, who never slumberest nor sleepest, still watch over, keep and guard us, and inspire us with holy zeal, and courage and devotedness in thy service.

May the wicked all around be converted and turned to thee; may the impenitent and unbelieving be brought to repentance and faith; may those burdened with sin and guilt come to Jesus and be relieved.

Bless this our family. May it appear that we have been given to each other and brought together in thy providence to be a full blessing to each other, in body and in soul, for time and eternity. O may we all, through thy imparted grace, bring to each other that daily help and comfort which thou didst design for us, by our union as one family together.

And bless the whole family of God; bring in the Jews; bring in the Gentiles, and let it be said over the whole earth, "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." Hear us for Jesus' sake. Amen.

IV.

MONDAY EVENING.

PRAYER,—A REST IN WEARINESS.

Great God, the God of the whole earth and of the highest heavens, our merciful Father, who wast in

Help us to rejoice in thee, the Lord, always, and in every thing to give thanks.

We confess to thee our many sins. Whether we look at our thoughts, words, or works; in the morning, at mid-day, in the afternoon, or in the evening, we have not, as we ought, had a lively sense of thy presence, nor sought with full purpose of heart thy glory, nor walked with thee all the day long, nor taken up, as we should, self-denying work and duty. Vain and worldly thoughts have too much possessed our souls, and made us like those who live as without

God in the world. We have not called on thee. We have been weary of thee. Blot out all our transgressions for thy name's sake, and remember our sins no more. Renew our souls by thy grace, and make us pure, even as thou art pure, and meet for the inheritance of the saints in light.

May all the changing scenes of this life work for our spiritual and eternal good. May our eye be single and our whole body full of light.

Bless each member of our family, the master, and the servants, the children and the relatives, our friends and our neighbours; may all receive a blessing from thee through our prayers. Help us to be lovers of hospitality and lovers of good men. May our church and our country be protected, preserved and prospered continually, through thy watchful care and good providence from day to day.

Give us a lively interest in the prosperity of thy whole church and the increase of thy kingdom. O Lord, grant these great blessings; speedily bring to its predicted end the mystery of iniquity, and destroy the man of sin with the brightness of thy coming. Faithfully accomplish thy promised truth and mercy to Zion, and let all the ends of the earth see thy salvation. O grant our requests, for our Redeemer's sake.

V.

TUESDAY MORNING.

STRENGTH FOR DAILY DUTY.

Almighty and eternal God, now present with us, thine eye upon every heart, thine ear open to every desire, and waiting now to be gracious to us in Christ Jesus, may we ever feel that it is our richest privilege to approach thy throne of grace. We now seek of thee those things which are needful for our souls and for our bodies, which Jesus alone is worthy to receive for us, and which he is exalted to bestow upon us.

Assist us in all that lies before us this day. Be present with us in every thing in which we are engaged. In study and in labour, in silence and in conversation, in company and in retirement, in business and in relaxation, at home and abroad, in trials and in joys, O still be near to our souls; and in all the varied circumstances of this day, may our fullest joy be in thy presence, our one desire to do thy will, and our greatest object to be approved by thee.

We are very far from thy mind and thy image, blessed Lord Jesus. We feel the inward workings of pride and vanity, self-will and earthly-mindedness, but O make us like thyself, meek and lowly, and delighting to do God's will; and with one mind may we seek the glory of our heavenly Father,

We are weak also to do what thy Spirit in us has taught us to desire. We fall unless thou sustain us. Hold thou up our goings in thy paths, that our footsteps slip not. Impress so deeply and strongly upon our minds the sense of our own sinfulness and weakness, that we may be constantly looking to thee for righteousness and strength, and receiving out of the fulness of Christ the grace which we need. O may that abundance of grace which bringeth salvation, effectually teach us to deny ungodliness and worldly lusts.

Help us in each duty of this day, whether personal or domestic, relative or social, to be earnest and simple-hearted followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, not slothful in business, but fervent in spirit, serving the Lord, and kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love, in honour preferring one another. Assist us in all the temptations and difficulties of the day, and make us prompt to seize all its opportunities of doing good. May we have wisdom to discern what our special duties are, and grace given to us in patient diligence and self-denial to fulfil them, and through all may sweet intercourse in secret with our God be our hidden joy and consolation.

God Almighty bless not only our family, but the families whom we know and love. Multiply thy grace and peace upon all around us. Regard with thy favour our beloved church and country, and make them a full blessing to all nations: especially

may we show love to Zion, and so inherit the prosperity thou hast promised.

Accept our grateful thanksgiving for blessings without number to our bodies and our souls, to our families and to our friends, this day continued and multiplied to us. But, above all, we praise thee for thine unspeakable gift, Jesus our Lord, and our Saviour, to whom with thee, O Father, and thee, O Holy Ghost, be all honour and glory now and for ever. Amen.

VI.

TUESDAY EVENING.

FOR FULFILLING PRESENT DUTY IN HOPE OF COMING
GLORY, AND FOR PROTECTION.

O Lord Jesus Christ, the King of glory, exalted at the right hand of God to be a prince and a Saviour, to give us repentance and remission of sins, thou hast promised that "where two or three are met together in thy name, thou art in the midst of them;" enable us in faith to approach now unto thee, and give unto us repentance and remission of sins. Thou hast invited the weary and the heavy-laden to come unto thee and take upon them thy easy yoke and thy light burden, that they may find rest for their souls: give us grace thus to come unto thee and obtain rest.

Almighty Father, draw us unto Jesus, that we may come to him and be raised up by him at the last day. O that our daily life may be a constant coming

to Christ, a constant receiving out of his fulness, a life of continual faith in the Son of God. Give us of his Spirit very largely, and may we know him, and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death.

Do thou, merciful God, enliven and enlarge our hopes of thy future glory in our earth, when all shall know thee from the least to the greatest. Hasten thy coming and thy kingdom. In the mean while may we fulfil our present duties, our daily work, doing all as unto the Lord.

Bless the church to which we belong, the place in which we reside, and all the ministers of Christ in every place, and send forth every where more labourers into thy harvest. Bless especially our own beloved country, and all efforts for the increase in it of divine knowledge and for its spiritual as well as temporal welfare. When the enemy comes in like a flood, may the Spirit of the Lord lift up a standard against him. Clothe thy priests with thy righteousness, and make thy people joyful in thy salvation. May thy word descend as the rain and the dew, and refresh our weary land, that it may become as a fruitful field and a vineyard of the Lord's planting.

May we now lie down at peace with thee and with

all our fellow men, and be protected by thy good providence from every evil during the defenceless hours of sleep, and refreshed with quiet repose, and awake with thee present to our thoughts in the morning. O that we may so measure our days as to know how frail we are and how short our time is.

Regard each of us and of our relations according to our individual wants, and give to each that mercy, grace, and strength we individually require, for our special temptations, dangers, sins, and necessities, according to the fulness of thy love in Jesus our only Lord and Saviour.

VII.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

PRAISE FOR MERCY, AND PRAYER FOR FAITH, HOPE,
AND LOVE.

O thou whose eyes are over the righteous and thine ears open to their prayer, through our advocate Jesus Christ the righteous, we, though we have sinned, call upon thee by him, who is the propitiation for our sins. Enable us then to trust only in his name. And while one is speaking with the lips, may the hearts of all with one accord be ascending unto thee in earnest prayer and supplication by Jesus Christ.

We bless thee, O our God, for all the mercies restored to us afresh this morning. We praise, we magnify thy holy name, for the food which nourishes

us, the warmth that cheers us, (the cold that braces us,) the raiment which covers us, the light which shines around us, the air we breathe, the habitation which shelters us, the joy and communion which we have in each other's love, our common salvation, our common hope of glory, our divine Saviour Jesus, our one teacher and sanctifier the Holy Ghost, our one glorious Father, and our one eternal home. How vast the treasure thou hast given to us! What a circle of mercies and blessings surrounds us, how great, how numberless, how eternal! Forgive our ingratitude and disregard of mercies the loss of which would soon bring sorrow and distress upon us. Let us not forget all thy benefits, but daily live to thy praise.

And now we entreat thee to give us that precious gift of faith, by which unseen things shall become living realities, influencing our daily conduct. While we thank thee for goodness so great in all that is past, we commit unto thee all that is before us. We know not what may be our trials and temptations, what unexpected events may arise, but all is known unto thee. Preserve us, then, from the snares of our great enemy. May the world, the flesh, and the devil never seduce, entrap, pollute, or destroy our souls, but may we be kept by thy power through faith unto salvation. Make us ready to every good work, may we show mercy with cheerfulness. May we be prompt to seize opportunities of doing good. Especially let our souls be growing in faith, hope,

and love. And whether health or sickness, sorrow or joy, life or death, ease or suffering be before us, may all be advancing the maturity of our souls for thy heavenly kingdom, and preparing us to be ready for the coming of our Heavenly Lord.

Bless thy church universal. Unite the hearts of thy faithful people as the heart of one man in the belief and love of thy truth. O hasten that day when Satan shall be bruised under our feet, when the saints of the Most High shall take the kingdom and possess the kingdom for ever and ever; when sorrow and sighing shall flee away, and those new heavens and that new earth be created wherein dwelleth righteousness.

VIII.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

CONFESSION OF SINS AND PRAYER FOR HELP; FOR A
BLESSING ON RELIGIOUS SOCIETIES.

Almighty God, our most merciful Father, who gavest thy Son Jesus to suffer for our sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to thee; may thy Holy Spirit so teach us what he has done for us, that with our whole hearts we may come to thee in entire confidence and joyful love.

Gratefully we acknowledge together thy loving-kindnesses in the day that is past. How constant

Thus may thy name be glorified in our consistent Christian course day by day.

We thank thee for all that thou art doing by religious societies both at home and abroad. Lord,

prosper every design to do good to the bodies or to the souls of men; all efforts for building churches; maintaining ministers of Christ, spreading either thy holy word or edifying books, sending missionaries to Jews or to Gentiles. Bless all who conduct, support, or labour in these societies, and may they all be effective for promoting thy glory in the salvation of our fellow-men.

Again we commend ourselves to thy care. Watch over us as a family for good; may no change occur amongst us without its designed blessing being realized to us, may we every day be dearer to each other and more ready to fulfil the law of Christ by bearing each other's burdens.

O hear us, and answer us, according to the fulness of thy mercy in Christ Jesus. Amen.

IX.

THURSDAY MORNING.

TO RECEIVE OUT OF GOD'S SUFFICIENCY WHAT WE
NEED.

Almighty Father, our one, our heavenly Parent, in the name of Jesus Christ we approach unto thee, desiring to see by faith thee who art invisible, and to have access, unto thee through one Spirit. truth, that we may know we are of the truth, and assure our hearts before thee; we entreat thee to make us a full blessing to our fellow-creatures.

About to enter upon the duties which thou hast this day given to us to walk in, we ask grace to fulfil them in thy name; and to seek thy glory as the one great end of all to be done by us. May we all live as in thy presence; each occupying his talent in fulfilling his work appointed by thee, and in every thing seeking to do thy will. Deliver us from a complaining, dissatisfied, and murmuring spirit, and give us a glad, grateful and thankful heart, filled with real love to thee.

Bless our family, our neighbourhood, our church, our country, and all in authority over us. Guard us from all foes and all dangers, whether national or spiritual. Bless thy people Israel, and enlarge thy kingdom continually, till the whole earth rejoice in the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ. Hear us for his name's sake, to whom, with thee and the Holy Ghost, be all honour and glory now and evermore. Amen.

X.

THURSDAY EVENING.

THANKSGIVING FOR CHRIST, PRAYER FOR THE HOLY SPIRIT, AND FOR HELP TO THE AFFLICTED.

O most merciful and heavenly Father, give unto us thy quickening grace, that now, when we bow

our knees unto thee, we may fully believe that thou art here present, and a rewarder of all them that diligently seek thee. O give us thine own Spirit, that we may come before thee not in form, but in power; not in carelessness, but in reverence; not with a doubtful mind, but in full confidence of heart, looking to him who is at thy right hand, ever living to make intercession for us.

We praise together thy goodness for all our daily mercies: our temporal blessings are all from thee, our religious privileges we owe to thy free favour, our spiritual blessings are all thy gift. We pray for the afflicted, the suffering, the cast-down, and the sorrowful. We pray for the stranger, the captive, the tempted, and the endangered. We pray for those who have lost what they valued most on earth, entreating thee thereby to take occasion to give them fuller and richer blessings that shall endure to everlasting life.

May we as a family continually edify each other in love, and may bonds now be knit together, uniting us more and more in Christ Jesus, which shall be lasting as eternity; so that, though our earthly union may be severed for a season, our spiritual and heavenly union may be perfected and completed for ever, in thy coming kingdom and glory, for our Redeemer's sake. Amen.

XI.

FRIDAY MORNING.

GRACE SOUGHT THROUGH CHRIST FOR OURSELVES,
OUR CHURCH, AND OUR COUNTRY.

O thou good and gracious God, who hast so loved our lost world that thou gavest thine only-begotten Son to be a sacrifice for our sins—we thy sinful creatures, redeemed by his blood, come unto thee by that once crucified and now exalted Lord and Saviour. Draw us, and we will run after thee. O take possession of our whole souls, and make us willing to give ourselves unreservedly unto thee.

Give unto us pardon, peace and holiness, and all those things which thou seest to be needful and good for our souls, and turn away from us wrath and condemnation and sin, and all those things which thou seest to be hurtful to us. We indeed deserve not the good, and justly merit the evil; but Jesus appears as a Lamb slain in the midst of the throne in heaven for us; he is worthy to receive all good, and we ask all in his name.

Assist us each to go through our appointed duties this day. May we study to be quiet, and each in our station to do our own business, and to work with our own hands. Impress so strongly upon our minds the sense of our utter insufficiency to think any thing good of ourselves, that we may constantly

We pray especially for the church of Christ in our country, and for all the ministers of the gospel. May all discern their great responsibility, as belonging to a church thou hast so favoured in this land from age to age, and especially in our repeated deliverances from the apostacy of Rome.

And O look upon this nation which thou hast so highly exalted among all nations, and to which thou hast given such extended dominion and power and such wide-spread opportunities of being useful to all nations. May our beloved country, generally and nationally, rise to that high and blessed office to which she is now called, of diffusing the glorious light of thy gospel through the world. May our President be as a Cyrus to returning Israel; may our statesmen be like Daniel and Nehemiah, ruling in thy fear and faith and love: and may holiness to the Lord be inscribed on all our possessions, commerce

and wealth, that thus we may be a full blessing to every land through Jesus Christ, our all-sufficient Helper and Redeemer. Amen.

XII.

FRIDAY EVENING.

TO KNOW AND LOVE GOD. FOR OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD
AND THE CHURCH.

O Everlasting God, the Lord of heaven and of earth; the King eternal, immortal, and invisible; the only wise God; the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, give us now to see thee as thou art, and to delight ourselves in thee, that we may have those desires of our hearts which we would now spread before thee in prayer.

Give us by thine own Spirit the full assurance of faith that Jesus has reconciled both Jew and Gentile unto thee in one body, by the cross, having slain the enmity thereby. May we also be clothed with humility, may we be pitiful and courteous, and show forth all Christian graces, to the glory of thy name and the good of all around us.

Bless our family; according to the necessities of each one, as manifest in thy sight, give to each one suitable and seasonable grace and help. And if any of us are yet unconverted, O give thou to them a new heart and a new spirit, and strengthen and renew all our souls for thy service.

Bless our neighbourhood, its ministers and people, its schools and religious societies, its rich and its poor, the prosperous and the afflicted, the sick and the dying, giving to each the good thou seest they severally need.

Bless the whole church and family of God every

where. We pray for the peace of Jerusalem. We pray for the free progress of thy word in all lands. We pray thee to bless all missionaries among Jews or Gentiles, and at length fulfil all thy promises in the universal triumph of the holy and happy kingdom of Jesus through the world. O answer us for his name's sake. Amen.

XIII.

SATURDAY MORNING.

PREPARATION FOR THE SABBATH, AND FOR THE
OVERTHROW OF SATAN.

O righteous God, the God of mercy and pity in Christ Jesus, even to sinful needy creatures like us, who in this day of grace call upon thee, through Christ, receive us now approaching unto thee. Fulfil unto us thy gracious promise, Draw nigh unto God and he will draw nigh unto thee. O give us thine own Spirit, that we may truly draw nigh to thee, not in mere form only, but with a believing, thirsting and loving heart. All thanks and praise, adoration and love be unto thee, O Father, for innumerable mercies day by day multiplied unto us, and especially for the gift of Jesus Christ and his great and free salvation.

Give us thy blessing in all that lies before us this day. May we now receive, out of the fulness of Christ, the Word of life, all that our souls require. O may the lusts of the flesh be mortified and cruci-

fied, may the fruit of the Spirit increase and abound in us. Help us to set the Lord before us in every thing this day, that his will may be our will, to be like him our great desire, and his glory our aim in all we say and do.

Bless thy ministers in their secret studies, prayers, and preparation for their public labours on the morrow. May all that call upon thy name remember the Sabbath-day to keep it holy, making this day, every personal and domestic arrangement that will enable them the more devoutly to observe the Sabbath. May the day be set wholly apart for its privileges and duties; and earnestly may we this day in secret seek thy blessing on all the public means of grace on the morrow.

Look upon a world lying in wickedness, in the fulness of thy mercy and compassion. Cut short the days of sin and the triumphs of Satan; bring speedily to an end the usurped dominion of that malignant spirit who now reigns as the god of this world; and hasten the coming and full dominion of the rightful King and Lord, our blessed Redeemer and only Saviour.

We beseech thee regard with thy favour our principal magistrate, and all the ministers of state. We beseech thee give heavenly grace to all ambassadors of Christ, and all appointed to minister in holy things. Continue the blessing of peace, preserve us from entering upon any unrighteous wars or suffering by

unjust aggressions of others. May we be a penitent and believing people, fearing God and working righteousness.

Bless us as a family. May the bonds of family love be multiplied and strengthened, and may they become eternal, by our seeking chiefly and supremely each other's spiritual good. O answer us, for our Redeemer's sake.

XIV.

SATURDAY EVENING.

PRAISE, CONFESSION, AND A BLESSING ASKED FOR
THE SABBATH.

O thou blessed and only Potentate, the King of kings and Lord of lords, who only hast immortality, dwelling in the light which no man can approach unto, whom no man hath seen or can see, to thee be honour and power everlasting. We worship thee, we bless thy holy name, and we now together, at thy footstool, exalt, extol and magnify thee, as the one living, true and only God, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, our God and our Saviour.

How wonderful thy love in testifying to us, thy sinful creatures, that whoso offereth thee praise glorifieth thee; and how rich thy grace to us, that thou hast called us out of darkness into thy marvellous light, that we should be a peculiar people to show forth thy praise! In every thing enable us to give thanks unto thee. In every thing may we order

our conversation aright, that thou mayest show unto us thy salvation,

O Lord, another week of mercies innumerable, and, to our deep humiliation, of innumerable sins, is now closing upon us. It cannot be recalled, but thy day of grace continues, and thou givest to all liberally and upbraidest not; give us then pardon and peace, give us repentance and faith, give us holiness and thine own image and likeness.

We ask for a full blessing on the approaching Sabbath. May it be to us a day of great spiritual gain and advantage. May our hearts, prepared of thee and made ready by thy grace, receive thy word into an honest and good heart, and keep it. Teach us to hunger and thirst after righteousness, seeing that thou, O Jesus, hast said that such are blessed and shall be filled.

O may we enter into thy courts with joy and praise, and experience the full truth of thine own word—Blessed are the people that know the joyful sound, they shall walk, O Lord, in the light of thy countenance; in thy name shall they rejoice all the day, and in thy righteousness shall they be exalted. O may this be fulfilled to each one of us.

Bless especially all thy ministers; send them help

from the sanctuary, and strengthen them out of Zion. Let thy priests be clothed with righteousness, and let thy saints shout for joy. Let thy Spirit come down on all the assemblies of thy people in every land, like rain upon the mown grass; and as showers that water the earth. Lengthen out, if it be thy will, the days of peace and tranquillity, that multitudes may at length account that the long-suffering of our God is salvation, and turn to thee. O Lord, grant that thy people may be diligent to be found of thee in peace, without spot and blameless; and a waiting church and bride may be all prepared to go out and meet the returning Bridegroom, even Jesus our beloved Lord and Head, and to enter with him to the marriage-supper of the Lamb. XV.

LORD'S DAY MORNING.

PRaise FOR SABBATH MERCIES.

Almighty Father, who hast revealed thyself to us as the Lord, the Lord God, merciful and gracious, long-suffering and abundant in goodness and truth, keeping mercy for thousands, forgiving iniquity and

transgression and sin, and that will by no means clear the guilty: through Jesus Christ, now sitting at thy right hand, and ever living to make intercession for us, we adore together and magnify thy holy name.

Another Sabbath of grace and mercy now is before us. We bless thee for its many privileges; for thy house open to receive us; thy ministers ready to instruct us; and that we may now peacefully assemble together and worship in thy courts, none making us afraid. We thank thee for that wonderful grace to all that believe in Christ, that thou dost account them a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, and a peculiar people. May we rise to our high privileges, and ever shew forth thy virtues and praises in the world.

But now, O Lord, we bring before thee our great difficulty and trouble in the midst of our religious privileges. All on thy part is prepared and ready, but we have often found, by sad experience, that we are unready; our minds are carnal, worldly, and earthly. Our souls cleave to the dust. Innumerable vain imaginations and worldly thoughts distract and fill our minds; we lose the sense of thy nearness, and, with the words of prayer on our lips, have innumerable vanities possessing our inner man.

O send thy mighty Spirit into our hearts, effectually to aid us against Satan and our inward foes. May we this day know the power, and reality, and

glory of true prayer, and obtain strength in thy service, and grace to do thy will.

Bless each of us, too, in those opportunities of aiding others in the way to Zion, which thy providence may open before us. May we feel it to be a real privilege, if we can but give the simplest lesson of divine truth to an infant mind, or a poor and ignorant fellow-creature, for whom Jesus has shed his blood, knowing that thou canst make that lesson effectual to the salvation of their souls, and so give us joy in the day of Christ.

Bless all thy people, wherever they meet in thy name or remember thy Sabbath. Whether they be in Europe, Asia, Africa, America, in the countless isles of the sea, or on the trackless ocean; wherever thy people gather together in the name of Jesus, wherever they worship thee; there be with them, and give testimony to the power of thy word and to the blessedness of prayer, and raise their hopes to that rest which remaineth for the people of God. Hear us, for our Redeemer's sake.

XVI.

SUNDAY EVENING.

PRAYER THAT MERCIES MAY NOT BE RECEIVED IN
VAIN, AND CONFESSION OF SINS.

Almighty Father, who from the beginning didst bless and sanctify the seventh day as a day of rest;

divine Redeemer, Lord of the Sabbath, after whom we name this day as the Lord's day, and commemorate thereon thy resurrection from the grave; Holy Spirit the Comforter, who didst on this day impart thy wonderful gifts to the early church of Christ; we praise thee the living and the true God for all thy peculiar goodness to us, in the innumerable privileges and blessings of this holy day. We had not our birth in savage and barbarous lands, or in heathen countries where no Sabbath mercies bless their inhabitants; we had not our birth in Mahommedan or papal apostacy, where the true light of the gospel has ceased to shine; but in thy special kindness to us we had our birth in this favoured protestant land, where thy sabbath is honoured by national and legal protection, and we have such abundant advantages for becoming wise unto salvation. All glory be to thy holy name that these advantages have been continued to us this day, and we have now been partaking of the means of grace in thy house; worshipping with thy people; hearing thy word and singing thy praise.

But, O Lord, help us to remember that Chorazin and Bethsaida heard the preaching of Christ, and rejecting it sunk into lower condemnation than Tyre and Sidon that never heard it. We earnestly entreat thee to grant that we may not receive the grace of God in vain; that we may know that this is the accepted time, the day of salvation; and that every one of us in this our day may know the things which

make for our peace; and follow after peace and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord.

Pardon, then, our innumerable infirmities in thy service. Through our sinfulness even all our worship is polluted and unclean, most humbling and abasing. O cast us not away from thy presence, because of our formality and hypocrisy, which we now mourn before thee; but look upon that great High Priest who with the heavenly censer stands in thy presence, bearing the iniquity of our holy things, and presents all the prayers of thy people unto thee; and by him give unto us, sinful though we be, the great blessings which we have been asking this day.

And, O Lord, pour out of thy Spirit on all flesh. Grant that in all the churches of Christ, throughout the world, the fruit of a faithful ministry of thy word may abound to thy glory. May all thy people grow in knowledge and in holiness; in faith, hope, and love; in nearness to thee; and so in nearness to each other; till at length we all come, in the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ; to whom with thee, O Father, and thee, O Holy Ghost, three persons and one God, be all honour and glory, now and evermore. Amen.

XVII.

MONDAY MORNING.

FAITH SOUGHT, WITH GRACE TO REMEMBER THE
WORD PREACHED.

Almighty Father, the Father of spirits, the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, we, thy sinful children, approach now thy throne of grace in the name of thy only-begotten Son Jesus Christ, the first-born among many brethren, the head of the family who is now in thy courts above for us. O give us true and living faith in him; never let us rest in a dead and vain faith, but give us that mighty faith which, clinging to Omnipotence, conquers this world, works by love, and brings forth all righteousness. Enable us to take, each for ourselves, the only true warrant and ground of faith, thine own word; making thy truth our sure confidence, thy commands our guide, and thy covenant our stay and strength; and so by thy precious promises may we become partakers of the divine nature, and escape the corruptions that are in the world through lust.

Preserve us from the spirit of rashness and presumption, the spirit of enmity and vain glory. O keep us from the vain confidence of the Egyptians, who, following the steps of Israel in the

Red Sea, but not following their faith in thy promise, perished in their presumption. Deliver us from all unbelief, selfishness, self-indulgence, worldliness, and disobedience, and give us self-denial, self-sacrifice, and entire obedience to all thy revealed will.

May the truths which we yesterday heard from thy word be remembered this day, and influence and govern our whole conduct. Let not our hearts be like the way-side, or the stony, or the thorny ground, but make them like the good ground, keeping the word and bringing forth fruit in due season. May we remember the solemn responsibility of our great and many religious privileges, and the fearful wo pronounced on Chorazin and Bethsaida. Especially may we remember our sacramental vows, whether at the baptismal font or at the holy communion; let them not be regarded by us as a light thing, neither let us be slack in fulfilling our vows.

Give us thy blessing in the duties of another day. Whatever we do, may we do it heartily, as unto the Lord and not unto men, and may we have the sense of thy favour to cheer our souls in all that we do. May the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us, and prosper thou the work of our hands, yea, prosper thou our handy work.

Bless abundantly the labours of thy ministering servants through the world. Bless especially our ministers, [our city,] our neighbourhood. May our fellow-worshippers yesterday, strengthened and re-

freshed by thine ordinances, begin with us in renewed zeal the duties of another week. Comfort all in sorrow. Succour the tempted. Be with the sick and the dying. Visit Israel in mercy. Bring again thy first-begotten Son into the world, and fill the earth speedily with thy glory, through the mediation, and in the triumphant and universal kingdom and dominion of the same, our Lord Jesus Christ, to whom with thee and the Holy Ghost, be all honour and glory, now and evermore.

XVIII.

MONDAY EVENING.

FOR COMMUNION WITH GOD, AND PARDON IN CHRIST;
PRAISE FOR FAMILY MERCIES.

Almighty Father, who art about our path and about our bed, always present, and acquainted with all our ways, we beseech thee make us ever mindful of thy presence, and give us such a knowledge of thy grace and glory in Christ Jesus, and such an acquaintance with thyself, that we may evermore delight in thee, and find in thy presence fulness of joy. May we know the rich privilege of communion with our Almighty Friend, whose ear is ever open to our cry, and whose hand is ever ready to help and defend us.

We acknowledge together before thee, that in the past day we have all in many things offended in thy

sight, especially by forgetfulness of thee, by impenitence in our sins, by unbelief, by worldliness, and by neglect of thy glory. We have sinned by forsaking thy ways, and by turning every one to our own.

O may we all behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world; and, looking unto Jesus, may we find peace and joy, righteousness and strength.

O Lord, we thank thee and give thee glory for all the many mercies which we enjoy. It is through thy goodness that those at the head of this family desire to acknowledge and worship thee, value thy truth, and seek to guide their family as becomes a Christian household. We bless thee for every family mercy, for all our domestic comfort, for the good word of thy truth, translated into the language of the land in which we were born, and so freely and fully circulated amongst us, that every one may hear and read in his own tongue the wonderful works of God.

But above all we thank thee for thy best gift, the Lord Jesus Christ. O may he be daily more precious to our souls, and may we daily become more like him in all things, through the quickening, transforming, and sanctifying grace of thy Spirit, freely given to us through him.

Bless, we beseech thee, all mankind. Bless especially our church and our country, and the church of Christ every where. Unite thy people, as one family, through the world. Multiply the peace-makers, and put an end to strife, debate, and divisions among thy children. Bring the Jews to their own land, and discover to them Jesus as their Messiah. Bless our city, our relations, our Christian friends. Do good to them that hate and injure us, even the best good, by converting and renewing their souls. Multiply blessings on our benefactors, and on all who pray for us. O Lord Jesus, shortly accomplish the number of thine elect, and hasten thy kingdom, for thy name's sake. Amen.

XIX.

TUESDAY MORNING.

TO TAKE UP THE CROSS,—PRAISE FOR EARTHLY AND
HEAVENLY BLESSINGS.

O thou who art a faithful Creator, and hast encouraged and charged us to commit our souls unto thee in well-doing, when suffering as Christians according to thy will, we beseech thee, enable all of us daily to take up our cross, to deny ourselves and follow Christ, casting all our care on thee who carest for us.

We bless thee that thy mercies are renewed to us every morning, and we raise unto thee a new song of thanksgiving for the fresh blessings of this day.

By Jesus our only Mediator and Advocate, who has made full atonement for all our sins, and by whom all things are ours, we offer up our thanksgivings unto thee; sleep and waking, food and clothing, warmth and shelter, social endearment and family blessedness, are all of thee; and by them too would we rise to the higher spiritual blessings with which we are daily blessed, and magnify thee for Jesus Christ our Lord, our best robe, our meat indeed, our surest friend, our light, our refuge, our life and our glory, now and evermore.

May we walk humbly with thee our God, and in every thing do justice and love mercy. Make us thoughtful and considerate of the wants and feelings of others, so that we may rejoice with those who rejoice, and weep with those that weep, and be merciful after our power, and do good to all, especially to the household of faith. Is it not

thine own assurance to thy people,—ye are the workmanship of God, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that ye should walk in them? O fulfil this blessed truth in our daily life. May we know with full assurance of heart that we are saved by grace through faith, thine own gift, and not of works, that boasting may be excluded. In the joy and strength of this free salvation may we abound in all good works continually, that thy name may be constantly glorified in us and by us.

Guard us from dangers foreseen or unforeseen, preserve us in temptations expected or unexpected, strengthen us where we are weak, and give us so to feel our entire weakness and insufficiency that we may be ever looking to thee for grace and strength.

O Lord, the nations are disquieted and troubled, the world lieth in wickedness; thy wrath is yet to come upon the earth, but thy long-suffering still prolongs the day of grace. O grant that, while the desolating tempest is yet withheld, thy church may be full of zeal and energy, thy people may be sealed and preserved, multitudes may be plucked as brands from the burning, and a great multitude, which cannot be numbered, may wash their robes and make them white in the blood of the Lamb. Hear us for his name's sake.

XX.

TUESDAY EVENING.

CONFESSION, PRAISE FOR THE SCRIPTURES, AND
PRAYER FOR THEIR DIFFUSION.

O Lord our God, who hast made us, and not we ourselves, and who graciously regardest us as thy people and the sheep of thy pasture, and as the church which thou hast purchased with the blood of thy only-begotten Son, receive our humble supplications, and assist us now by thy Spirit really and fervently to pray unto thee.

We thank thee that thou hast appointed a throne of grace; we thank thee that thine ear is open to our prayers; we thank thee that it is our duty to pray, and that thou, to this very hour, hearest and answerest the prayers of all them that call upon thee.

Great is our sinfulness and multiplied are our wants. God is not in all our thoughts; our affections cling to the world and to the creature; unbelief prevails within us; we dishonour thee by our inconsistencies, our unholy dispositions, our selfishness and our disobedience. We have turned every one to his own way, and are justly exposed to thy awful condemnation.

Help us then truly to see our sinfulness, and really to know and believe, that through Jesus there is forgiveness of all our sins, however numerous, however great. Help us to believe that he was really wound-

ed for our transgressions and bruised for our iniquities, and that the chastisement of our peace was laid upon him.

And in the full belief of these most precious truths of thy holy word, may we every one of us truly be sorry, from the heart, for so sinning against him who has so greatly loved us. May we have thus that godly sorrow which worketh repentance unto salvation, not to be repented of; and that cordial and fervent love which comes from believing that thou hast thus deeply and unquestionably first loved us.

Many have been thy mercies to us, O our God, in the past day. We praise thee for every personal mercy, for every family mercy, for all our domestic comforts. We bless thee for the full light of thy revealed truth, for all its saving doctrines, all its holy precepts, all its instructive history and patterns of holiness, all its profitable threatenings, and all its precious promises. And above all, we thank Thee for Him who is its Alpha and Omega, its sum and substance; Jesus Christ, the light of life, our complete and all-sufficient Saviour.

O may this word of thy grace have free course, and be glorified in all the earth. May it be made known in every tongue and to every people, east and west, north and south, throughout the world. Let there not be one portion of the habitable globe destitute of the saving light of thy truth. May it dispel the superstitions of Popery, the delusions of

Mahomedanism, and the darkness of infidelity. May it revive decayed churches, and be more understood, believed and obeyed in every nation where it is circulated, till at length the Redeemer return, and the knowledge of the glory of the Lord covers the earth as the waters do the sea.

Bless more especially our family connexions and all our relatives; [our city,] our Christian friends, our church and all its ministers, and all the ministers of Christ. Guide our statesmen. Multiply thy grace on all our magistrates. Give spiritual prosperity to our rulers, and make our country a blessing to all lands, through Jesus Christ, the only King of kings and Lord of lords. Amen.

XXI.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

TO DO ALL IN THE NAME OF JESUS.

O thou who takest to thyself this character, that thou resistest the proud and givest grace to the humble, discover to us, by thine own Spirit, our sinfulness and our ruin, our total corruption and depravity in ourselves; that we may loathe and abhor ourselves, and come in the abased spirit of the publican before thee, crying, each from the deep feeling of his own heart, God be merciful to me a sinner.

Yet give us also that true faith which believes all thy promises, and is confident that nothing can really

fail of what the Lord has spoken, and that the scripture cannot be broken. Thou, O Jesus, hast said, Whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son. In the name of Jesus we ask of thee, O Father, the Holy Spirit, to abide in us for ever. We ask farther, in the same precious name, the gift of faith, purifying the heart, working by love, and overcoming the world. In the name of Jesus we ask for inward holiness and diffusive usefulness. O give us the joy of being useful to all around us, and especially in their highest and best welfare, their spiritual and eternal good. Yet farther give us, we ask it in the same name, poverty of spirit, humility and lowliness of heart.

May reputation, or wealth, or enjoyments here be small things in our eyes, compared with likeness to Christ, suffering for his sake, and leading others to know and love him who died for us, and who will soon return again, that where he is we may be also.

Grant, O Lord, that whatsoever we do this day, we may do it in the name of the Lord Jesus. Help us by all the types and figures of him, given to us in thy word, and on the face of all creation, to realize continually his excellence and goodness. May we see Christ in the sun that shines upon us, in the bread that nourishes us, in the way in which we walk, in the friendship and brotherhood which comfort us, or in the tender relations of married life.

Since he hath said, No man cometh unto the Father but by me, may we especially regard him when worshipping thee, and rejoice in the assurance that Jesus is now in the heavens at thy right hand, making intercession for us; is now exalted, to bestow gifts and blessings even on the rebellious. Give then to us pardon and peace; give unto us a true heart to love thee and serve thee unfeignedly.

Assist us in all the undertakings of this day. May our self-will be subjugated, our self-wisdom be mortified, our pride be humbled and our humility deepened. O may we go through each of our employments in thy faith, fear and love. Let us not seek to please ourselves, but to please thee; let us not pursue our own glory, but thy glory; let us not speak idle, vain, foolish words, but words of soberness and truth; our speech being seasoned with salt, that it may minister grace to the hearers.

Let us look beyond the present moment or the present life, and live in distinct remembrance of what is certainly before us,—the judgment day,—the account to be rendered, and the eternal issues of all we now say and do. And seeing the shortness of time and the great and many uncertainties of this life, may we redeem our time for the great ends for which it was given, thy glory in our salvation and the salvation of all within the reach of our influence and exertion and prayers. Thus help us this day and continually to lay ourselves out for the good of others.

Bless our magistrates. May they rule in righteousness. Greatly hast thou blessed our country in times that are past, and we have not rendered again to the Lord, but have rebelled against him; yet spare us and give us abundant grace, and still more exceedingly bless us in the time to come.

Grant to those in authority over us, heavenly guidance and direction, that error, and sin, and apostacy may be discountenanced and every where checked and put down, and truth and righteousness every where encouraged and advanced. Bless the whole earth, and as it is every where full of thy goodness, so may it also be filled with thy grace, and truth, and righteousness, for our Redeemer's sake.

XXII.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

THE BLESSEDNESS OF GOD'S PRESENCE; GRACE FOR DUTY.

O merciful and ever-gracious God, our heavenly Father, may all of us, now kneeling together in thy presence, feel in our hearts the glorious truth, that thou art very near to us and really present in the midst of us. May we know that in thee, who art thus present with us, there is all that is exalted and great, all that is wise and mighty, all that is good and blessed, and this for us sinners, by our own Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ; and may we thus learn

daily to delight ourselves in thee the Lord, and through Christ approach unto thee with full confidence and holy boldness.

O Lord, take away from us the heart of stone, and give us a heart of flesh; put thy Spirit within us, and cause us to walk in thy statutes; cleanse us from all our sins, and remember our iniquities no more against us. Create in us a clean heart, and renew a right spirit within us.

We have confidence in thee, that if we ask any thing according to thy will, thou hearest us; and being assured that thou hearest us, whatsoever we thus ask, O may we know and believe that we have the petitions which we desire of thee, and may we ask of thee, nothing doubting.

We beseech thee to give us grace to fulfil each relative duty, as parent and child, as master and servant, as kindred and friends, as pastor and flock; whether having authority or under authority. O may we each discern our own immediate duty and fulfil it as in thy sight, and not be busy with the duties or concerns of others, but apply ourselves patiently, faithfully, and constantly to do our own work, according to thy holy will. May we submit ourselves to one another in the fear of God; and be clothed with humility, humbling ourselves under thy mighty hand, with the blessed hope of being in due time exalted by thee.

And, O Lord, we praise together thy holy name,

and acknowledge together thy loving-kindness to us, thy sinful creatures. We admire and extol the riches of thy forbearance and long-suffering towards us, in sparing us when we deserved punishment; in giving us benefits when we deserved thine anger and judgments. O Lord, blessed be thou for all thy protecting care over us, all thy providing love for us, all thy redeeming grace in Christ Jesus, and all the precious gifts of thy Spirit promised to us through him; and for that great promise which thou hast promised us, even eternal life in Christ Jesus. Thy mercies by day and thy mercies by night, thy mercies to ourselves and our family, to our church and to our country, and thy whole church and the whole world—how great they are! even more in number than the stars of heaven, or the sand on the sea-shore! All praise then be to thee, the one great Giver of all good gifts, now and evermore. Still continue these thy blessings to us and others, and make us more mindful of them and more grateful for them.

We now commit ourselves to thy care as a family this night. Guard us from all evil, either to body or to soul. May no fire consume us, no robbers disturb us, no sickness alarm us. Refresh us with quiet sleep. Renew both our bodily and our spiritual strength: O may we thus be more and more prepared, not only for duties in this life, but for the morning of the resurrection and the day of eternal glory, through our only Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

XXIII.

THURSDAY MORNING.

DEPENDENCE ON GOD, AND PRAYER FOR THE
AFFLICTED.

Almighty Father, by thy only-begotten Son, who took upon him our nature and became man for us, having all the sympathies of our humanity, and yet one with thee, even God over all blessed for ever; by him, the door of the sheep, through whom alone we can enter into the fold; by him, the way, the truth and the life, by whom alone we can come to thee—we appear again in thy presence.

O what abounding reasons have we, as a family, for daily praises and constant prayer! Continually renewed are the mercies which thy loving-kindness bestows upon us. Daily growing and increasing are thy blessings. O help us to see, and not only to see, but to acknowledge thy love in every thing, even in that which is now dark and painful to us; knowing that all is ordered by him whose brief but glorious and comprehensive description, for our unspeakable and eternal comfort, is—GOD IS LOVE.

We know, O our God, that we are dependent altogether on thee in all things. Blessed be thy name, through thee alone all others are, or can be, blessings to us. We acknowledge joyfully before thee, that we are not dependent on man, or on any son of

man, for good; we are not exposed defenceless to the hatred of wicked men or devils; but for life, for death, for sorrow or for joy, for riches or for poverty, for health or for sickness, and all things, we have simply and wholly to look unto thee. The Lord killeth and maketh alive; he bringeth down to the grave and bringeth up. The Lord maketh poor and maketh rich; he bringeth low and lifteth up. Our choicest gifts in times past have come unlooked-for and unexpectedly, and directly from thy love; and especially those best gifts, thy word, to guide us to Christ, thy only Son himself, and thine Holy Spirit.

Give us now thy help in the duties, the dangers, the perplexities and the anxieties of the day. Teach us how to guide all our affairs with discretion, to be slow to speak, swift to hear, and ready to every good work. May our leisure hours or moments not be lost in vain and frivolous trifling, in foolish books or converse, but redeemed by acquiring fresh knowledge of thy works and of thy word, or in useful intercourse with others.

As our Redeemer took up his cross and endured contradiction of sinners against himself for our sake, so may we follow him in his self-denying course here, and look, as he did, to the joy set before us. Remembering that the cross is the way to the crown, the path of self-denial to true life and enjoyment, and that the gate and the way which are narrow, straight, and difficult, lead to real liberty here and

eternal glory hereafter,—may we choose the cross and self-denial, and enter in at the straight gate, and walk in the narrow way to eternal life.

We pray for all in affliction, whatever be its cause, whether infirmities of body or of spirit; whether sickness or losses, or death of those dear to them, whether poverty, or pain, or persecution, whether they be tempted by Satan, deceived by man, or cast down in despair by many sins, or burdened in guilt; whether prisoners or captives, strangers or foreigners, friendless or shipwrecked in distant lands. O look upon all in their respective necessities; give them strength and grace suited to them; make all things work together for their good and the good of others, and then give them a happy issue out of all their afflictions.

Bless our own neighbourhood, [our city,] our schools, our communicants, our visitors of the poor, our religious societies, our ministers, and all efforts for the temporal and spiritual good of those who dwell around us. Bless our whole country, and our government in church and state. [Preserve our Protestant constitution, and may it be continued to generations yet to come, even till our Redeemer returns to bless the whole earth.] Hear us for his name's sake. Amen.

XXIV.

THURSDAY EVENING.

FOR A SENSE OF ETERNAL REALITIES.

O thou, who hast revealed thyself to us as the God of all grace, when from our sins we might justly have expected to have heard of thee only as the God of judgment and of wrath, help us to come unto thee who art waiting to be gracious to those that call upon thee with all confidence of heart.

Glory, glory for ever be to thy holy name. Thou art great above all that is great on earth or in heaven; and good above all that is good in others; and excellent beyond all that is or can be excellent in created beings; for all were formed by thee and for thee, and every good that any other has, or can have, is only thy gift. Blessing, and honour, and glory, and power be to thee who sittest on the throne, and to the Lamb for ever. We praise thee for all that thou art, we magnify thee for all thy glorious perfections, O thou who art the king eternal, immortal, invisible, the only wise God our Saviour.

Brought in thy love safely to the close of another day, we confess our many sins against thee and against our fellow-creatures, and implore thy free forgiveness. Give us all to believe in the name of Jesus, and so to be justified from all things through his redemption.

Grant us such a lively sense of our real situation here, that we may duly and constantly feel that time is short, eternity infinitely long, and close at hand; that any moment may transport us into that spiritual and invisible world which is before us, and into the immediate presence of thee our God. Help us never to forget that our life is a vapour that passeth away; that here we have no continuing city, and all our trials are but transient and momentary, and yet that on the right employment of this short moment depends that favourable sentence in the great judgment-day, which fixes our future state, through a never-ending eternity. Help us then to flee with all earnestness from the wrath to come. Help us with all firmness and perseverance to lay hold on eternal life. Help us now with all steadfast patience to follow peace and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord. And that we may thus strive, O give us, by thine own Spirit, faith in Jesus, spiritual-mindedness, and let us never be weary in well-doing. May that Spirit be in us, an ever-abiding guide and comforter, teacher and sanctifier.

Bless all among whom we dwell, and our relatives every where, and all our friends. Look especially in mercy and love upon the sick and afflicted, and succour the tempted. Regard all in distress of mind, body, or estate. Bless our native land and all its states and territories. Preserve peace among the nations, that the gospel may freely circulate in

all lands. Greatly increase, and multiply, and prosper the efforts of thy servants to spread abroad thy truth on every side.

Prepare thy church for the return and judgment and kingdom of our great Lord and Head, Jesus Christ. May he find a waiting people longing for his appearance, and all ready to meet him, and may an abundant entrance be ministered to us into his everlasting kingdom. O gracious Father, receive and answer these our prayers, not for our worthiness, but for the alone merit of our Lord Jesus Christ.

XXV.

FRIDAY MORNING.

GRACE TO FOLLOW CHRIST IN TRIAL AND REPROACH.

O Lord Jesus Christ, the true light that, coming into the world, enlighteneth every man; who hast given us thy word to be a light to our feet, and a lamp to our paths, grant that we may take heed to that light by day and by night, and walk in its clear and pure brightness, till we reach our heavenly and eternal home, and rejoice in thy presence for ever.

O thou good and gracious God, who for us gavest up thy only Son Jesus to the cross as the way to the crown, and to be a partaker of sufferings that he might inherit eternal glory, give us grace cheerfully to follow him now; preferring self-denial to self-

indulgence, and choosing shame for his name's sake rather than the honour that cometh from man. Oh may we patiently endure trials in his ways, rather than follow the course of this world, however distinguished by outward glories, and carnal gratifications and pleasures; and let us not follow the multitude still going in the broad road that leads to destruction. Grant that we may not withdraw from thy ways because they are evil spoken of, nor be ashamed of the gospel because it is reproached, but rather may we count the reproach of Christ to be greater riches than all the treasures of this world.

Take from us also all conceit of any goodness or righteousness, wisdom or strength in ourselves. If in any thing we differ from others, all glory altogether be to thee who hast made us to differ, and may we be deeply humbled because thy grace to us has not been far more diligently used to thy glory. Lord, forgive our great unfaithfulness and unprofitableness. We desire only to glory in the Lord Jesus Christ, and to exalt him alone, and we earnestly pray that all our fellow-sinners may be partakers of the benefits which Jesus has bought for us with his blood. O Lord, thou knowest all the secret sins of our hearts, as well as our secret groanings under our corruptions and thirstings after thy grace; break not the bruised reed, quench not the smoking flax, till thou bring forth judgment unto victory. Take away from us pride, vanity, and high-mindedness; remove

all our unbelief, negligence, indifference, and coldness of heart towards thee, and all worldly-mindedness. Cleanse our hearts by the inspiration of thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love thee and worthily magnify thy holy name. Deliver our souls from all the entanglements of sin, and take us 'out of the mire and filthiness of this evil world, and place us firmly and immoveably on Christ, the rock of ages, the only sure foundation.

Be with us this day. Do us good, even the best good, good to our souls. Let all our hours be employed for thee, so that we may do nothing on which we cannot ask thy blessing, and in which we cannot enjoy thy presence. Especially may we be watchful to avoid evil, to do good, to be helpful to the souls of others, and also watch against all inconsistency of conduct in our high and holy calling as the children of God.

Bring back thy people Israel to their own land. Speedily gather in thine elect from all lands, and complete the first fruits unto God and the Lamb, in whose mouth shall be found no guile, and who shall be without fault before the throne of God. Prepare thy people to glorify thy holy name in the fires of tribulation, and keep them from the hour of temptation which shall come upon all the world, to try them that dwell upon the earth. And, at length, let the tabernacle of thee our God be with men, and do thou dwell with them; and let them be thy people, and the whole earth be filled with thy glory.

O gracious Father, thanks, eternal thanks, be unto thee for all the aboundings of thy grace and goodness towards us in what is past, and what is present, and what thou hast promised in the ages to come, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

XXVI.

FRIDAY EVENING.

CONFESSION OF DAILY SINS—PRAYER FOR ABSENT FRIENDS.

Almighty Father, now present in the midst of us, and full of grace and goodness to all who seek thee, and who hast given so many precious promises to all who call upon thee, grant us grace to believe that thou art truly here, and that thou art the sure rewarder of them who diligently seek thee, through our one Mediator Jesus Christ.

We confess that however in the eyes of our fellow men we may have been blameless and faultless, we have sinned greatly against thee this day. Duties justly owing to thee have been omitted or negligently fulfilled; sins against thee and against each other have been committed in thy sight by each of us. By unbelief, by hardness of heart, by vain thoughts, by idle words, by mis-spent time and talents, by lost opportunities, we have all offended before thee. O deal not with us after our sins, nor reward us according to our iniquities, but deal with us according

to the abundance of thy tender mercies, and the multitude of thy loving kindnesses, and raise us at length to that blessed devotedness to thee which thy law has set before us.

Thou hast graciously declared, I will have mercy on whom I will have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I will have compassion. According, therefore, to thine own sovereignty and overflowing bounty have mercy, and have compassion upon us thy sinful creatures; give unto us thy heavenly grace to teach us our sinfulness, and to help us to look to our all-sufficient Saviour, to uphold our goings in his paths, to strengthen us against all our spiritual foes, and to bless us by turning every one of us from our iniquities.

Give us especially the spirit of knowledge and understanding, of faith and love. O grant us much true Christian love; love to God and love to man; that living in love we may dwell in thee, and thou thyself mayest dwell in us. Give us peace within and peace without; and let us as much as lieth in us live peaceably with all men, and follow after the things which make for peace, and the things whereby we may edify one another.

Take care of us all during the defenceless hours of the night. We desire to feel that we have no real safety, but as thou who never slumberest nor sleepest watchest over us; and that no evil can come nigh us while thou art our keeper. We commit, there-

fore, ourselves, and all that are dear to us, unto thy watchful providence.

Bless all our relations and friends. Some are widely scattered from us; but all are under thine eye and in thy presence, so that while we are here praying to thee, thou who art with them canst at this moment, in answer to our prayers, do good to them and bless them. We entreat thee now to give to each that defence and succour, that help and blessing, which they severally need.

O Lord, who hast given us the gracious title of the Lord's remembrancers and watchmen, and hast charged us to give thee no rest till thou make Jerusalem a praise in the earth, give us a deep interest in that which is thus dear to thee; give us ardent desires for the restoration and salvation of thy people Israel. Fulfil all the rich promises given in thy word unto them, that so the heathen may fear thy name, and all the ends of the earth may see the salvation of our God.

We thank thee, O our Father, from the heart, for the full propitiation made by the death of Jesus for the sins of the whole world. We thank thee for the precious assurance that all the ends of the world shall remember and turn unto the Lord, and all the kindreds of the nations shall worship before thee. We bless thee for the promise which we look for, of new heavens and a new earth, wherein dwelleth righteousness. For the speedy return of our Re-

deemer; for the future resurrection of the dead saints, and the glorious change of those that are alive; and for the eternal glory yet to be revealed in the last days, all praise, and honour, and adoration be unto thee, O Father, who livest and reignest with the Son and the Holy Ghost, one eternal God, for ever and ever. Amen.

XXVII.

SATURDAY MORNING.

PRAISE FOR FAMILY WORSHIP—PRAYER FOR GIVING
UP OURSELVES TO GOD.

O thou that art ever with us, and hearest the prayers of all that call upon thee, enable us now to partake of our highest privilege and blessing in this life, communion with thee through Jesus Christ. We cannot of ourselves attain it, but thy precious promise has assured to us the aid of thy Spirit. O may that Spirit now help our infirmities, and raise our inward affections to thyself, and may we come unto thee thirsting and longing after thy presence.

O Lord, what thanks we owe to thee that in thy goodness we have been drawn thus to meet together in family worship! Thou hast taught us that the way of man is not in himself; it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps; and thou hast revealed thy purpose of pouring out thy fury upon the families that call not upon thy name. We bless thee, then,

that in thy goodness family prayer has been established amongst us, and thy word is daily brought before us. May we yield up ourselves unto thee as those that are alive from the dead, and all our members as instruments of righteousness in thy free

May our meditation of thee be sweet to us. May our ears hear for thee. May our tongues speak for thee, and our hands work for thee, and our feet walk for thee and with thee. O teach us effectually that we are bought with a price, even the blood of Jesus; and constrain us thereby to seek in every thing to glorify thee in our body and in our spirit, which are thine.

Bless thy ministers every where, and especially those whom thou hast appointed to watch over our souls, in preparing for their sacred work of instructing thy people. Give them heavenly direction in their subjects, and furnish them with those thoughts and those divine truths, and that utterance of them, which shall be most seasonable and profitable for all who hear them. May each in his generation and in his station be a full blessing to thy church, bringing thy people to a prepared and waiting state for the appearing and kingdom of Christ.

Every where multiply grace upon thy people, and add to them continually. May all who love thee be more and more brought to be like-minded, having

the same love, and be of one accord and of one mind, so that the world may believe that Jesus was sent of the Father, and all may know him even from the least to the greatest. Hear us, for our Redeemer's sake. Amen.

XXVIII.

SATURDAY EVENING.

PREPARATION FOR CHRIST'S COMING—PRAYER FOR
MINISTERS.

O Lord our God, how excellent is thy name in all the earth. Thou hast set thy glory above the heavens, and what is man that thou art mindful of him, or the Son of man that thou visitest him! How wonderful was that love that thou didst show to the world, in sending thy only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. O give unto us grace ever to believe in Jesus, and readiness, if need be, to suffer for his sake.

Brought by thy goodness to the end of this week, we desire humbly to confess the many sins which we have committed, and how far we have all of us come short of thy glory. None of us are righteous, none of us have of ourselves done good, no, not one. We have all erred and strayed from thy ways, and each one has turned to his own way.

But it is thy faithful promise that if we confess

Let us not rest in the mere form of godliness, and an outside show of religion, but give us all its living reality, its inward power, and its mighty energy; making us new creatures, so transforming us that we may prove what is thy good and acceptable and perfect will.

O Lord, when we look back on past Sabbaths, on cold and formal prayers, and hearts dull and lifeless in thy service, we greatly fear lest we should thus again dishonour thee, who art a Spirit, and who requirest that those who worship thee should worship thee in spirit and in truth. Thou knowest our weakness. Thou knowest how full we are of vain imaginations and distracting thoughts; O assist us then

with thy all-sufficient help and strength, and thyself enable us to draw nigh to thee, and do thou draw nigh to us, that we may have real communion with thee in thy house and service.

Bless the pastors of thy flock, the missionaries to Jew and Gentile, and the teachers of thy truth through the world. O that they may go forth in thy name and strength; may every where declare first of all that Christ died for our sins, and every where glory in his cross. May this saving doctrine be the power of God unto the salvation of innumerable precious souls. Thus send the gospel of thy grace on its glorious errand of mercy through the wide world, and to every nation, kindred, people, and tongue, gathering thine elect from every land, till the fulness of the Gentiles be come in, and all Israel be saved.

Give us now sweet rest to refresh us, and fit our bodies to fulfil the sacred duties of the Sabbath. May we lie down with thee in our last thoughts, and may we awake in the morning still present with thee, through our only and complete Saviour, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Third Week.

XXIX.

LORD'S DAY MORNING.

A UNIVERSAL SABBATH DESIRED.

O Lord, the God of heaven and of earth, who sittest in the highest heavens on a throne of glory, surrounded by cherubim and seraphim, angels and arch-angels, and all the glorified hosts above, ever singing thy praise and magnifying thee; and yet who condescendest to regard the feeblest cry of the needy, and the prayers of thy sinful creatures now assembled at thy mercy-seat; enable us to perceive and be assured that prayer unto thee is our richest privilege and our greatest honour.

We do indeed mourn before thee that most sad and affecting proof of our depravity, that we are so backward to this blessed duty, and so soon weary of it. Deeply ought we to be humbled in thy sight, that so often there is hardly any occupation in which we can engage wherein our spirit so soon flags, our thoughts so soon wander, which we are so reluctant to commence, and so ready to give up as prayer unto thee. If in happy times it be otherwise, and we realize our true honour, privilege, and blessedness

in communion with thee, what thanks are due to thee! O that we may this day find it thus good to draw near unto God.

O Lord, who hast made the Sabbath for man, hasten the time when not one weary soul in this world shall be without the blessedness of this day of rest; when there shall be no bearing of burdens, no toiling in earthly occupations, no buying nor selling; but holy joy and gladness, prayer and praise, and growth in divine knowledge, and communion of saints in every place; when all men shall hallow thy Sabbaths and they shall be a sign by which all may know that thou art the Lord their God.

O hasten the time when thy name shall be great among the Gentiles, and in every place incense shall be offered unto thy name and a pure offering; when one holy Sabbath of rest shall comfort, and bless, and sanctify the whole earth, and the sun of righteousness shine forth on every nation, every city, every village, every dwelling, and every heart.

Lord, when shall it once be! Now when thou lookest upon our earth, thou beholdest a world lying in wickedness; thy glorious name, unknown or forgotten, insulted or blasphemed: thy Sabbaths profaned and despised; thy word set aside and mocked. Thou seest all the idolatries even of professedly Christian lands, which dishonour thee in the worship of saints, and images, and pictures; and in those who renounce open superstitions thou seest the more spi-

ritual but not less real idolatry of lovers of the creature, lovers of pleasure and of gold more than of thee. And so the hearts of men are fully set in them to do evil, and they depart from thee, the living God.

Lord, give us such understanding in thy word that we may discern these things according to its light, and take thine own view of all things done on earth, and be among those who mourn for sin, especially our own sin, and sigh for the abominations that are committed, and thirst for the return of our Redeemer and his universal kingdom. May we also have grace so to do thy will as thine own children, that we may now be the salt of the earth, a salt not losing its own savour, but seasoning others, and preserving them from corruption.

Grant that this sabbath may be a day of real spiritual profit and edification. May all its sacred hours be occupied with thee. May our minds be enlightened by thy word, and may that word only be the ground of our faith, and may we all bring every thing we hear to the law and to the testimony that thou hast given, and, like the Bereans, search the scriptures, whether these things are so.

Bless all thy ministers in every place. We rejoice in thy goodness in raising up and sending forth the thousands of faithful labourers that this day will go forth and stand up to declare thy truth. Stand by them and assist them; set a watch over their mouths; open thou their lips to speak thy truth dis-

tinctly, fully and boldly, so that thy people may be built up, sinners converted, the weak strengthened, and the sorrowful every where comforted, through Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour.

XXX.

LORD'S DAY EVENING.

PRAISE FOR SABBATH MERCIES,—THE HEAVENLY
SABBATH DESIRED.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, accept, in the name of Jesus Christ, our hearty thanksgivings for all the blessings of this thy holy day. Thou hast called us in every thing to give thanks. We bless thee for preserving mercy, for health and for sickness, for strength and for weakness, for mercies and for trials, and for all the steps by which thou art leading us to thy heavenly kingdom.

XXXI.

TUESDAY MORNING.

those bearing the name of Christ, but to rejoice over their daily renewal in his glorious image. May no part of thy word, even that relating to thy future counsels, thy judgments to come on sinners, and thy coming in glory to raise thy saints to reign with thee, fail to afford us, and all who believe in Jesus, practical lessons for daily holiness and devotedness.

Bless thy chosen nation; restore and convert Israel. Prosper all our plans for doing good; give us patience and perseverance to go on with them; strength, zeal, and energy to accomplish them; and thine own blessing in them and upon them. Bless all that dwell in our [parish and] neighbourhood; strengthen and multiply the communicants; bless the schools and teachers; regard in mercy the destitute, the sick, and the afflicted; assist the visitors of the poor with thy favour. We thank thee for any tokens of good amongst us. Multiply these continually, and let us rejoice more in thy goodness to all around us.

O God, be merciful to us and bless us, and cause thy face to shine upon us. Restore and save thy people Israel, and thus let thy way be known upon

earth, and thy saving health among all nations, for our Redeemer's sake. Amen.

XXXV.

May we fall into no sin: may we run into no kind of danger: may all our doings be ordered by thy governance, to do always what is righteous in thy sight: may we remember that thou hast appointed to each of us our station and our daily work, and that it is the Lord's work; and may we fulfil it, not negligently but diligently, with a fervent spirit and a joyful and glad heart. Be present with us in all our occupations. In our daily duties may we have fellowship with thee, O Father, and with thy Son, Jesus Christ, and know what it is to walk in thy light and love, O thou God of all wisdom and of all goodness.

Bless thy church in all the earth. O may it be preserved from corruption within, and from enemies without, and continually increase. Speedily consume the man of sin with the spirit of thy mouth. Speedily manifest the brightness of thy coming. We thank

thee for all the efforts now making to scatter the seed of thy word through the world. We bless thee that we live in a day in which we see so many signs of thy coming, kingdom, and glory. Oh may we watch and pray, and be diligent to be found of thee in peace. May our time, and influence, and property, and strength, be willingly and cheerfully given to him who has bought us with his blood.

Bless our magistrates, and all in authority. Preserve and extend order and obedience founded on reverence for thy holy word, among all classes of society. Bless the ministers of Christ, and may they diffuse throughout our country the full spiritual blessings for which the church of God has been established, so that no corner of the land may be destitute of the means of grace, or without a laborious, efficient, and faithful ministry of thy word among all classes and orders of men. Promote piety in our army and navy. May thy Sabbaths and all thine ordinances be honoured and observed by us throughout the land; so that we may, as a nation, be a people fearing God and working righteousness. Grant these blessings, for Christ's sake.

XXXVI.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

OUR CARE CAST ON GOD,—THE COMING OF CHRIST'S

O hasten the time when the nations shall beat their swords into plough-shares and their spears into pruning-hooks, and the Prince of Peace shall reign in every land, and there shall be abundance of peace as long as the moon endureth, and the earth shall be full of righteousness, reflecting the holiness of heaven, for thy will shall be done on earth even as it is in heaven.

THURSDAY MORNING.

THURSDAY EVENING.

Remember thy mercy and truth toward the house of Israel, and let all the ends of the earth see and rejoice in thy salvation, for our Redeemer's sake.

We thank thee, O Lord, for the many mercies of this day. May we see thy love in every thing, and then in every thing give thanks, knowing that this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning us. May we know that if we sow in tears we shall reap in joy; and may all our enjoyments be heightened by seeing the hand of love bestowing them. O Lord, how good thou art in all thy ways to us, punishing us infinitely less than we deserve, and blessing us so graciously, notwithstanding all our provocations. What a Saviour is our Saviour! What a teacher and comforter is thy blessed Spirit! What a promise the promise of eternal life! And all this for sinners, even for us in Jesus Christ.

O let the happy tidings of this grace and love pervade the habitable globe. Let the Jews, let the Gentiles throughout the earth know the joyful sound. Break in pieces the usurped empire of Satan, and let the captives rejoice in their great Deliverer, Jesus Christ. Hear us for His name's sake.

LXIII.

O Jesus, hasten thy coming, and prepare thy church for thine appearing, and take thine own kingdom and reign for evermore. Amen and Amen.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

HOLINESS.

May those who have been tried by weakness of faith gain spiritual strength, and may those exercised by sorrows and losses be thereby weaned from the vanities of earth and enriched with heavenly blessings. Preserve peace on earth, and hasten the reign of the Prince of Peace over the whole world, for His name's sake.

THURSDAY MORNING.

AND GRIEF FOR SIN IN OTHERS.

O Lord our God, full of compassion and gracious, long-suffering and plenteous in mercy and truth, we will sing of thy mercies for ever, and make known thy faithfulness to all generations. And, O Lord, give us a real sympathy for the situation of our fellow-creatures. When we witness abominations, may we sigh over them and testify against them. When men keep not thy law, may tears run down our eyes. May we never rejoice in iniquity, trifle with sin, or make a mock at it, but may we ever rejoice in the truth. LXVI.

THURSDAY EVENING.

CONFESSION OF SINS; AND PRAYER FOR FAITH, HOPE,
AND LOVE.

O Lord, thou art our Shepherd, therefore we shall not want. It is thine own gracious declaration, They that seek thee shall want no manner of good thing: the eyes of all wait upon thee, and thou satisfiest the desire of every living creature. Receive us, O our God, in the name of the one Mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus, and for his sake supply all our need out of thy riches in glory by Christ Jesus.

We come as a family before thee, confessing our sinfulness in thy sight. However free from human blame and condemnation our conduct may have been, we dare not attempt to justify ourselves in thy sight. Thou knowest the heart and all its abominations. Thou knowest the secret springs of what may appear fair to man. Before our own conscience, and in thy sight, we are verily guilty, and justly exposed to the righteous condemnation of thy perfect law. But like Jonah we have sought to flee from that presence, and to fill our souls with worldly vanities that cannot profit.

We have not recollected thine ever-gracious eye watching over us, and thy universal presence, in which we live, move, and have our being, ever surrounding us. We have disregarded thy favour and thy glory, and sought honour that comes of man.

O Lord, give us a realizing and truly humbling view of our own sinfulness; bestow upon us that godly sorrow which worketh repentance unto salvation, not to be repented of. Enable us to see the impossibility of standing before thee in any righteousness of our own, and reveal distinctly to us that in the Lord only we have righteousness and strength. We implore of thee the gifts of a loving, purifying, working, conquering faith, and of a hope that maketh not ashamed, full of immortality; a helmet of salvation, and an anchor within the veil; and yet farther we earnestly pray that we may know the more excellent way of charity, and receive each a larger and fuller endowment of that inestimably precious grace of love, which is the very bond of perfectness.

We entreat that we may be decided and fixed in thy ways. O keep us from that false shame which is so injurious to thee, to ourselves, and to others. May God be our glory and our joy. May we ever speak good of his name, and may we never be ashamed to confess our Saviour and his gospel and his people in this sinful and evil world.

Bless all our family plans and arrangements. May they all be ordered as becomes a Christian house-

hold, and let the kingdom of Christ be first in all our thoughts. O Jesus, thou must increase; fulfil thine own glorious office, and thine own gracious purposes, as the light of the Gentiles and the glory of thy people Israel. Accomplish speedily thine own promises of love and goodness to our world, and may all know thee, from the least to the greatest.

LXVII.

FRIDAY MORNING.

CONFESSION OF SIN, AND PRAYER FOR PARDON.

O Lord God Almighty, and all-sufficient, whose hand is not shortened that it cannot save, whose ear is not heavy that it cannot hear, with whom is all-sufficient grace; we mourn those iniquities which have separated between us and our God, and those sins which have hid thy face from us so that thou wilt not hear. Look then upon the face of thine anointed one, the Lord Jesus, and through the rent veil of his flesh, enable us to behold thee near and reconciled to us, and to have access with confidence to the holiest of all by the blood of Jesus. Give to us the spirit of prayer.

Having this access unto thee, we would now no longer keep silence, but freely and without reserve acknowledge all our sinfulness. We were born in sin, and that which is born of the flesh is flesh, and

O Lord, let thy Spirit so convince us of sin, and especially of the sin of not believing in Jesus, that we may not merely discern that we are sinful, and acknowledge our sins together unto thee; but that we may with the heart feel the burden, the baseness, the vileness, the exceeding sinfulness of sin, and so from the depth of a contrite spirit confess our transgressions unto the Lord, and obtain now the free, full, and complete forgiveness of all our sins according to the riches of thy grace in Christ Jesus. Enable us by thine own Spirit to believe that through Jesus there is forgiveness of sins; enable us to rest upon His atonement, and may we find His death powerful to mortify sin and to quicken us to all grateful, holy, and devoted service unto thee.

We praise thee, we bless thee, that thou hast pro-

vided such a full propitiation for our sins; that thou hast established for us the new covenant, containing all promises and graces suited to the sinfulness and wants of our perishing souls, and for our eternal welfare. O may we embrace these privileges most gratefully, receive them with gladness of heart, improve them diligently, and walk worthy of our high calling.

Assist us, by thy Spirit, in all that lies before us this day; on our daily work, on our intercourse with others, on all that we undertake and design, may there be stamped holiness to the Lord. May thy blessing so prosper all our thoughts and words, all our determinations and works, that all may promote thy glory. We are unable to do any thing of ourselves, but thou hast all strength for us, and art ready to give to us when we ask, let us not then by our own fault lose that strength, which thou art so ready to give. Strengthen us with thy might, by thy Spirit, in the inner man this day, and enable us in this strength to resist temptation and fulfil all thy holy will.

Bless every member of our family. May the law of Christ, the law of love, be the law of our house. Bless our [parish and] neighbourhood. Give seasonable and suitable grace to the sick and the dying, the young, the careless and the wicked, and especial grace to thine own children. Bless our President and all in authority over us. Build up Zion, and send thy

light and truth to every land, through Jesus our Redeemer.

LXVIII.

FRIDAY EVENING.

FOR ASSURED FAITH IN CHRIST, AND THE REVEALING
OF HIS GLORY.

O Lord, the Most High God, the possessor of heaven and earth, without whom not a sparrow can fall to the ground, and by whom the very hairs of our head are numbered, we worship together at thy footstool. Thou knowest all things that we have need of before we ask, and yet thou invitest us to make our requests known unto thee, in every thing, by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, and so to be free from all care and full of peace: receive these our prayers through Jesus Christ.

O Lord, may we delight in that which pleases thee; teach us to do thy will, not only in patiently submitting to all thy afflictive dealings with us, but

also in actively fulfilling all the duties to which thou hast called us. Thy Spirit is good; lead us into the land of uprightness, and grant us to glow with ardent and supreme love to thee and unfeigned love to all men.

When shall it be that the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all flesh shall see it together! Wonderful, in our day, is thy work in bringing nations nearer to each other, and multiplying facilities and rapidity of intercourse. O Lord, may every discovery in arts and science and means of communication facilitate the progress of the gospel and prepare the way of the Lord. Graft in again thy people Israel, and by them fill the whole face of the world with fruit, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Give unto us the seeing eye, the hearing ear, and the understanding and believing heart, that we may see, believe, turn unto thee, and be everlastingly saved through Jesus our Redeemer.

O Lord, let this Sabbath be one of great instruction, full of enlightening, quickening, and sanctifying grace to us and all thy saints, and blessed for the enlargement as well as comfort of the church of Christ, that the Redeemer may see of the travail of his soul and be satisfied.

May thy people every where shine as lights in the world, holding forth the word of life, and continually add to thy church multitudes who shall be everlastingly saved, through Jesus our Redeemer. Amen.

May Christ be formed in us the hope of glory. May we be looking for him who will appear the second time without sin unto salvation. May we dwell in him and he in us, and may we seek to diffuse continually the knowledge of his grace to others.

Unto Thee who hast loved us, and washed us from our sins in thine own blood, and hast made us to be kings and priests unto God even the Father, be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.

Lord. As Lazarus, raised from the dead, sat at meat with thee, so, raised from the death of trespasses and sins, and quickened together with thee, may we sit together and feast with thee in heavenly places, and have meat to eat that the world knows not of.

And with this give us also the listening, loving spirit of Mary. May we like her sit at the feet of Jesus, and hear his words, attend to the one thing needful, and choose the good part that shall not be taken from us. May we, like her, rejoice to be at great cost for our Redeemer, and to pour our best gifts upon him, anointing his feet with the fragrant odours of gifts of love and gratitude. O Holy Ghost, pour into our hearts fervent, glowing, self-sacrificing love to Jesus; love that will show itself, now that he is absent in person, in doing good to the poor always, and especially in diffusing the blessing of his gospel.

And we pray thee keep us far from the grudging, hypocritical and deceitful spirit of the traitor Judas, murmuring at instead of rejoicing in the grateful love of others to thy name, and kingdom, and glory. O Lord, let the whole earth hear and partake of the love of thy church. Let the angel fly through the midst of heaven, having the everlasting gospel to preach to them that dwell on the earth, and to every nation and kindred and tongue and people. According to thy gracious promise, wherever the gospel

shall be preached throughout the whole world, let Mary's costly love to thee be spoken of for a memorial. And at length let the death and burial of Jesus for us sinners be embalmed in the grateful recollection of all mankind, in that coming kingdom of glory for which we wait.

O Jesus, grant that we like Mary may be thoughtful to do what we can, as she did what she could, duly to celebrate thy death and burial, and show our gratitude to thee for thy inestimable love in our redemption. Being now bought with a price, may we ever consider that we are no longer our own but thine, and may we glorify thee in our bodies and our spirits, which are thine.

Give, O heavenly Father, thy full blessing to what we have heard this day in thy house, or have read from thy word. May it abide with us, and make us fruitful in every good word and work. Grant to such of us as hope shortly to join thy faithful people at thy table, in the solemn ordinance of the Lord's Supper, abundant grace to examine ourselves, and give time to private meditation and prayer, and so to go to that table with a penitent, believing, and loving heart, and to receive by faith the inestimable blessings of the communion of the body and blood of Christ. May this ordinance be specially observed by thy people at this time; be a very large and growing blessing to them, enabling them to feed on Christ by faith now, and to look forward to the blessed

hope of his return and appearance in glory. Hear us, for his name's sake.

CI.

MONDAY MORNING.

FOR GRACE TO MEDITATE ON CHRIST, AND TO
CONFESS HIM.

O our Lord and our God, the first and the last, Thou that livest and wast dead, and art alive for evermore, to whose incarnation, sufferings, and death for us we owe all our present blessings, every hope of future good, and especially the ground of our confidence in the judgment to come, and the gift of eternal life—all glory be unto thee. We desire grace of thee, to give more time and thought to consider thy sufferings on the cross, thy putting away our sins by the sacrifice of thyself, and to meditate on all thy love to our souls.

May we set thee, our dying Lord, continually before our minds, ever looking unto Jesus as the author and finisher of our faith. Enable us to meditate much on those parts of thy word, which either in type, or prophecy, or history, or doctrine, or songs of triumphant joy in heaven, bring before us thy atoning sacrifice, and the full propitiation thereby made for our sins. Nor let us be ashamed of the sacrifice of Christ, by which our sins are taken away, nor keep it back from the view of others; but may

we confess it more boldly and openly, glory in it more continually, and find it daily more effectually the power of God to our salvation, and that of countless numbers of believers in our own land and among all men, Jews and Gentiles, throughout the world.

O Lord Jesus, grant unto us to know that we are justified not by the works of the law, but by faith in thee. Through the law, like thy blessed apostle Paul, may we be dead to the law, that we may live unto God. May we be crucified with thee, O Christ, yet live; yet not we, but thou thyself living in us; and the life which we now live in the flesh may we live by faith in thee, the Son of God, who didst love us and give thyself for us. O precious Saviour, divine Redeemer, and quickly returning Lord and King, hear our prayers, for thy name's sake, to whom, with the Father and the Holy Ghost, be all honour and glory now and evermore. Amen.

CII.

MONDAY EVENING.

HOSANNAS TO THE SAVIOUR—PRAYERS FOR HIS
SPEEDY RETURN TO ZION.

O our divine Redeemer, who, before thy sufferings, didst, as the King of Zion, ride into Jerusalem meek and lowly, sitting upon an ass, and a colt the foal of an ass, we would join the joyful acclamation of the great multitude by whom thou wast welcomed, crying, Hosanna to the Son of David, blessed

is he that cometh in the name of the Lord; Hosanna in the highest. We worship and adore thee, our King, our God and Saviour, for thou only, O Christ, with the Holy Ghost, art most high in the glory of God the Father.

O mercifully grant unto us not only to welcome thee in joyful words of praise, but may all we have be at thy service, according as it is needed for thy kingdom, and in every thing may we know and follow in this our day the things which belong to our peace. Let them not be hid from our eyes, but may we walk in the light while we have the light; and knowing now the time of our visitation, may we take up our cross and confess thy name before the world.

O gracious Father, mercifully by thine own Spirit draw all our souls unto Christ, that we may have life. May we come to Christ to be taught by him, to trust in his atonement, to obey his commands, and to rejoice in his grace and love. May our children know thee, love thee, and welcome thee, even now, as in the temple of old the children cried, Hosanna to the Son of David; and still do thou perfect praise out of the mouth of babes and sucklings.

Grant too that we may ever be looking for that promised time when our Saviour shall come again in the glory of his Father. O hasten the day when thy people Israel shall see the Son of man sitting on the right hand of power, coming in the clouds

of heaven, and shall then nationally and with one voice join in saying, Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord. Hasten the time when they shall look on him whom they have pierced, and mourn. Hasten the day when all men shall be drawn to Christ, and the Lord shall be King over all the earth; and in that day there shall be one Lord, and his name one. Hear us, O our Father, and thus glorify thy Son Jesus through the world, for his name's sake.

CIII.

TUESDAY MORNING.

SINS OF THE GENTILE CHURCHES CONFESSED, AND PRAYER FOR CLEANSING.

O Lord Jesus Christ, once crucified for us, and now our exalted Prince and Saviour, who hast planted us as fig-trees in thy vineyard and lookest for fruit, and if thou findest none year after year, mayest justly sentence us to perpetual barrenness, pardon us and spare us who deserve thy righteous wrath. Thou didst not spare the people of Israel, who refused and rejected thee, and denied the Holy One and the Just, and killed thee the Prince of Life in their day of visitation; yet we beseech thee look in mercy upon us, and grant us in this our day of grace true repentance and remission of our sins.

We Gentile Christians, like thy people Israel, have very far revolted from thee, and fallen away by

We mourn that thy churches have not taken warning by thy past judgments on Israel, nor by the woes already poured out on ancient Christian churches. They have not repented, and given thee glory. Have mercy, have mercy upon us a sinful nation, a seed of evil doers, and children that are corrupters. Give us grace to wash and be made clean in that fountain which thou hast opened for sin and uncleanness; to cease to do evil and learn to do well; to seek judgment, to relieve the oppressed, to judge the fatherless, and plead for the widow. May thy churches every where be watchful, and strengthen the things that remain and are ready to die, and may we remember how we have received and heard and hold fast and repent, lest thou come on us as a thief, and find us all ignorant of thy coming and unprepared for it.

Cleanse thy spiritual Temple, O Jesus, through the world. Cast out of it, and cast out of our hearts all worldliness, love of money, and every thing that would defile and pollute what thou hast claimed for thyself. Baptized in thy name, and consecrated to thy service, may we be kept pure for thee, and preserved from seeking to join together the service of God and the service of Mammon.

O may thy love, thou precious Saviour, constrain

us to surrender ourselves wholly to thee. Seeing thou didst die for us all, and we all died in thee, grant that we which live may no longer live to ourselves, but unto thee who died for us and rose again. Hear us, for thy name's sake.

CIV.

TUESDAY EVENING.

FOR GRACE TO HAVE FELLOWSHIP WITH CHRIST'S
SUFFERINGS.

O Lord Jesus Christ, who before thy crucifixion knewest all things that should befall thee at Jerusalem, and yet with constant mind didst go before thy disciples, straitened till thy suffering baptism was all accomplished, make us willing to go through our lighter sufferings for thy sake; and may we, by thy grace, never shrink from the wrath and reproach of man for thee, but willingly endure it for thy sake.

Blessed Redeemer, make us more and more like thyself; O Lord God, so help us that we may never be confounded, but may set our face as a flint against all that is sinful, and never be ashamed of thy gospel as the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth, both Jew and Gentile.

What thanks, what eternal thanks we owe unto thee for thy patient, enduring, untiring and unequalled zeal! O thou once tempted, tried, suffering and dying Lord, now reigning in glory, all praise be

unto thee that nothing stopped thee in thy course of persevering and self-sacrificing love, till thou hadst made a complete and finished satisfaction for all our sins in thy death on the cross. All glory be to thy holy name. And let not all this costly love be received by us in vain. May we know the power of thy resurrection and the fellowship of thy sufferings. May we ever remember that we are called to do well, and to suffer for it, and take it patiently, and that this is acceptable with God; because thou, O Christ, hast also suffered for us, leaving us an example that we should follow in thy steps. May we then ever arm ourselves with the same mind, and live no longer the rest of our time in the flesh to the lusts of men, but always live to the will of God, glorifying him in our body and our spirit, which are HIS. -

Give us all grace to look forward to that day when the glory of Christ shall be revealed. May we in the prospect of that glory, whenever we are partakers of thy sufferings, be glad with exceeding joy, and commit the keeping of our souls unto thee our God, in well doing, as unto a faithful Creator; and thus may many, very many around us, be won by our good conversation.

O God of all grace, who hast called us unto thy eternal glory by Christ Jesus, make us perfect, stablish, strengthen and settle us. To thee be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.

CV.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

FOR GRACE TO RECEIVE THE INSTRUCTIONS OF
CHRIST.

O Lord Jesus Christ, who, as thy days on earth came nearer to their close didst more and more abound in full instruction and labours of love, grant, we pray thee, that we also, feeling the shortness of our time in this world, may continually abound more in love towards each other and towards all men, and be sincere and without offence till the day of thy coming, being filled with the fruits of righteousness which are by thee to the praise and glory of God.

By thy wisdom in answering thy enemies, may we learn to be wise as serpents and harmless as doves. Send forth faithful servants in increasing numbers to invite and with urgent entreaty compel men to come in, that the marriage-supper of the Lamb may be furnished with happy guests. And, O may none of us refuse the wedding garment which thou hast ready for us, but may we be clothed with thy righteousness and sanctified by thy Spirit, and be admitted at last to stand before thee.

Give us grace also here to render to all their dues, giving unto Cæsar the things that are Cæsar's, and unto God the things that are God's; and hereafter may we be found among the children of God and the children of the resurrection, who shall rise from the dead, and be counted worthy to obtain the world to come, who die no more, and are equal to the angels which are in heaven.

Hear us, O our Father, for our Redeemer's sake.

CVI.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

FOR GRACE TO KEEP THE LAW, AND FOR PRESERVATION FROM APOSTACY.

O Lord, what more couldst thou have done than thou hast done to encourage sinners to come unto thee! Thou hast declared that thou art rich unto

all that call upon thee. Thou hast promised thou wilt give good things to them that ask thee. Thou hast farther promised—unto him that hath shall be given, so that each blessing we have is an earnest that thou wilt give fuller blessings still. And yet more, as if to silence every doubt, the Son of God disdained not to become a little child, to suffer, bleed, and die for us. He is touched with the feeling of our infirmities. He ever liveth to make intercession for us: with boldness then would we come to thy throne of grace to obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need.

O our gracious Redeemer, who hast told us that the great commandment of the law is, 'Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength; and that the second is like unto it, 'Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself—we entreat thee to write these thy great commandments distinctly and deeply in our hearts, and grant that they may daily govern our lives.

Give unto us also a clear and distinct discernment of that great mystery of godliness, God manifest in the flesh, and a lively faith in thee, O Jesus, our Lord, as made of the seed of David after the flesh, and declared to be the Son of God with power, perfect God and perfect man in one Christ, our glorious and complete Redeemer.

May we ever walk humbly with thee, and desire

not the honour that comes of man, nor the praise of man, but may we find praise of thee. May our bounty be according to our means in thy sight, and not in man's. O Jesus, give us to act that thou who didst approve the widow's mite, mayest approve our gifts to the divine treasury.

O deliver us and our church, and thy Gentile churches at large, from that awful hypocrisy and wickedness which brought upon the Jews, even from thee, O thou mild and gracious but most holy Redeemer, those tremendous woes threatened in thy last public discourse. May the Gentile churches every where see that they stand only by faith, and be preserved from high-mindedness, and fear thee.

Especially may the fulfilled threatening of the destruction of Jerusalem, and its treading down by the Gentiles for so many centuries, till the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled, now in these last days deeply impress all the Gentile churches with the fearful danger of apostacy, and the vast importance of watching and praying, as we know not the time of thy coming again. O Lord, make us ready. O Lord, preserve us from saying, My Lord delayeth his coming. Give us grace to be like the wise virgins, with oil in our vessels and our lamps trimmed and our lights burning, and like the diligent servant, improving the talents given to us. Make us like the righteous, abounding in all kinds of works of love, that we may be approved of thee in that

day, enter into thy glory, and inherit thy kingdom with thy saints for ever. Amen.

CVII.

THURSDAY MORNING.

TO FOLLOW THE HUMILITY OF CHRIST, AND TO
BELIEVE IN HIM.

“Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, we thank thee from the heart that thou didst not spare thy only-begotten Son, but hast delivered him up for us all, that he might bear our sins in his own body on the tree, and atone for all our guilt. We bless thee also especially that on this day he appointed for his church that blessed Supper, in which he feeds us with his holy body, and gives us his precious blood to drink. We pray thee to preserve ever in us true faith in this thy great love, and grant us thy grace that we may ever so use the holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ, that it may be a mighty remedy to our souls, a strengthening of our feeble faith, and a certain comfort and defence against all the assaults of the devil, sin and death, through the same thy dear Son Jesus Christ our Lord.”*

O Lord Jesus, who having loved thine own which were in the world, didst love them to the end, help us evermore to confide in thee, and fill us with thy love. We bless thee, O Jesus, that knowing that the

O make us clean every whit from all the stains and pollutions of our sins, and while we call thee Lord and Master, give us grace to follow thy example, and to show to others the love which thou hast shown to us. May we not only know these things, but attain the higher happiness of doing them.

O Lord, guard us by the dreadful apostacy of Judas, by the temporary fall of Peter, and by the forsaking of thy other Apostles, from any falling away from thee. May we know our weakness, and our entire insufficiency of ourselves to stand; and may we keep close to thee and wholly trust in thee, and in thee alone; may we be, among our brethren, as the younger and those that serve, and not as the chief and the greatest. Give unto us true faith in thyself, and so keep us from a troubled heart. May we look to the mansions in our Father's house as our true and eternal home, and now give us abundantly thy Holy Spirit the Comforter, to strengthen us for duties here, and make us meet for the inheritance of the saints in light. Amen.

CVIII.
THURSDAY EVENING.

THANKSGIVING FOR THE SUFFERINGS OF CHRIST.*

O holy and gracious Lord Jesus Christ, we give thee most humble and hearty thanks for the deep and anxious sorrow wherewith thy soul was afflicted for our sake, even unto death. Hereby thou hast removed from us everlasting grief and sorrow, and purchased for us eternal joy and happiness. We thank thee for thy humble falling down in Gethsemane before thy Heavenly Father, thereby to procure for us his fatherly grace and favour, and keep our faces from everlasting shame and confusion. We thank thee for thy holy prayer and obedience, wherein thou didst entirely offer up thy will to thy Father, saying, not my will but thine be done; thereby to make atonement for the evil committed by our own will, to heal its various disorders, and to sanctify us according to the will of God.

We thank thee for thy bitter agony whereby thou hast broken the power of death, subdued it, and taken away its sting. We thank thee for that dreadful sweat, which in drops of blood fell down to the ground, thereby to sanctify to us cold and anxious sweat in the hour of death, and to turn its pangs into quiet repose.

O thou innocent and unspotted Lamb of God, we

thank thee for thy being taken that we might be set free; for thy being bound that we might be released from sin; for thy being falsely accused that we might be absolved before the tribunal of God; for thy being smitten in the face that we might have peace.

O thou meek and patient Lord, we thank thee that for our sake thou hast been mocked to atone for our follies, and to become unto us eternal wisdom; that thou hast been spit upon to deliver us from shame and confusion; that thou hast been blasphemed and insulted to raise us to honour and glory; that thou hast been scourged that we might be delivered from stripes hereafter, which we have justly deserved.

O thou King and Lord of glory, we thank thee that for our sakes thou wast in derision clothed with a purple robe, to purchase for us the wedding garment of honour; thou wast crowned with thorns to gain for us a crown of righteousness; thou wast mocked with a reed put into thy hand that we might take thy kingdom and possess it for ever and ever; thy holy head was smitten that we might have the palm in our hands and wear the crown of life in thy heavenly kingdom. O may all this astonishing grace and goodness lead every one of us to compunction, godly sorrow and repentance not to be repented of. Amen.

CIX.

GOOD FRIDAY MORNING.

TO LEARN THE LESSONS TAUGHT BY CHRIST'S
PASSION.

O thou Lord of lords and King of kings, whose visage was once so marred more than any man, and thy form more than the sons of men, who gavest thy back to the smiters and thy cheeks to them that plucked off the hair, and didst not hide thy face from shame and from spitting, help us to gaze upon and admire, to realize and be filled with love and humility while we commemorate thy humiliation. Thou didst become obedient unto death, even the death of the cross, for us and for our salvation; help us then now to come near to that scene of thy sufferings, and behold thee the Lamb of God taking away the sin of the world.

Help us to view thee first in Gethsemane, where thy soul was exceeding sorrowful unto death, and hear thy repeated prayers and thy strong crying, that if possible the hour might pass from thee, and to copy thy perfect resignation to the holy will of God. In thy agony, in thy dreadful sweat of great drops of blood, help us to see the costly price of our redemption, the inexpressible evil of sin, and the unsearchable fulness of thy love. O may we, too, before our lighter trials, abound in prayer lest we enter into temptation.

In the traitor Judas coming with the band of men and officers from the chief priests and Pharisees, may we see the dreadful wickedness of the unconverted, of thy false disciples and thy open enemies, and in the vain repentance and self-destruction of Judas learn the sad end of such transgression. In the forsaking of all thy disciples, of John who lay in thy bosom, of James who said he was able to drink of thy cup, and of Peter who had so often promised never to deny thee, may we discern what *our* hearts would be in the hour of temptation, and that the only safety of any one of us is in thy keeping us, so that our faith fail not.

May we be warned by Peter's example from carnal weapons of defence, and in the darkest seasons have entire confidence in the infinite resources of thy heavenly Father, and full assurance of the fulfilment of all thy word. And may we be guarded by Peter's affecting fall, from presumption, from associating with the ungodly, and from being ashamed of thee and denying thee. O Lord, hold us up that we may be safe.

In thy open confession, O Christ, before the High Priest, may we learn to speak the truth though we have to lay down life itself for it, and not be surprised if we have to suffer for truth itself. We would view thee, O Jesus, brought before the Roman governor Pontius Pilate, and there witnessing the good confession that thou art the King of the Jews,

and that thy kingdom is not of this world, but a heavenly kingdom; give us grace then to belong to that kingdom, and willingly bear to suffer for it that we may reign with thee for ever.

O deliver us from that blindness of heart which prefers a robber to him who is the desire of all nations, chief among ten thousand, and altogether lovely. O preserve us from the dreadful guilt of despising and rejecting our only Saviour, and being guilty of the body and blood of Christ.

And help us to see in thy crown of thorns the way opened for our wearing the crown of life; in thy stripes our healing; in thy wounds may we discern our transgressions, in thy bruises our iniquities, in thy chastisement our peace; thyself who knewest no sin made sin for us, that we might be made the righteousness of God in thee.

Help us to learn all the lessons taught us by thy patience and meekness. As thou, like as a lamb before its shearers is dumb, openedst not thy mouth, so grant that we when reviled may not revile again, and when suffering may not threaten, but may in patience possess our souls, and commit ourselves to thee.

Help us yet farther to view in lively faith and love unutterable, thee our Divine Redeemer hanging on the tree; thy head so full of bruises crowned with thorns, thy back wounded with stripes, thy hands and feet penetrated with iron nails, and suspended

between two thieves. O praise without ceasing be to thee who hast become a curse for us, that we might be redeemed from the curse of the law; who wast numbered with transgressors, that we might be numbered with saints, who didst shed thy precious blood and die, that all our guilt might be removed, and we might live for ever.

O Jesus, teach us all the wonderful lessons here to be learned of the dreadful evil of sin, of the sure, intense, and full love of God, of the unspeakable value of our souls, of the completeness of our salvation, and of the need of fleeing now to thee who hast thus delivered us from the wrath to come. All glory be to thee for ever.

CX.

GOOD FRIDAY EVENING.

THANKSGIVING FOR THE DEATH OF CHRIST.*

O thou, whose love has a height, and depth, and breadth, and length that pass our knowledge and are unsearchable, help us to look unto thee as the Author and Finisher of our faith, who for the joy set before thee in our salvation hast endured the cross, despising the shame.

O thou meek, kind, gracious Lord, we thank thee, who didst condescend to allow thyself to be presented to the compassion of the people by Pilate,

saying, "Behold the man,"—undergoing this, in pity and love to us, that our miserable condition might be pitied, for thy sake, by thy heavenly Father. Thou, O tender and loving Saviour, wast rejected and denied by thy people, to be made the cornerstone of the church of true believers. Thou wast sentenced unto death for our sake, to deliver us from the sentence of eternal death and damnation.

O thou most humble and righteous servant of God, thou most obedient Son of thy heavenly Father, we thank thee that thou thyself didst cheerfully bear thy cross to Golgotha, to teach us thereby that we also should take our cross willingly, and follow thee whithersoever thou goest. We thank thee for thy being nailed to the cross, thereby to be made a sacrifice for our sins. We thank thee for thy being crucified between two thieves and numbered with the transgressors; for thou hadst done no evil, nor was any guile ever found in thy mouth, yet hast thou borne the iniquity of others, to be our propitiation by thine own innocence. We thank thee for the horrid revilings and blasphemies which thou hast endured for us on the cross, to free us thereby from everlasting shame and confusion.

O thou blessed of the Lord, we thank thee for thy being made a curse on the tree, that all nations of the earth might in thee be blessed. Thou art the fairest among the children of men, the only one without sin; and yet thou becamest a worm and wast

made sin for us, that we might be made fair and acceptable unto God, even the righteousness of God in thee. Thou hast condescended to become the most despicable among men, in order to render us great and glorious. Thou didst hang on the cross without the least help or comfort, in order to purchase us everlasting joy and comfort. Thou wast stripped of thy clothing and didst hang naked and bleeding, till thou didst expire on the tree; that we might be clothed with the garment of salvation and the robe of righteousness for ever on thy throne, in thy quickly coming kingdom and glory.

O thou eternal High Priest, our only Mediator, we thank thee for thy prayer offered up on the cross in our behalf, and for the strong cries and tears poured out before thy heavenly Father. We thank thee for thy comfortable word to the penitent thief—"To-day thou shalt be with me in paradise," opening thereby the gate of paradise to us poor and penitent sinners. We thank thee for that great distress of soul which drew from thee these words—"My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me," that we might have a sure comfort in our trials, that we shall not finally be forsaken of God.

We thank thee for thy holy thirst on the cross, and for thy tasting gall and vinegar; for thou hast redeemed us from eternal thirst and from the bitterness of hell. We thank thee for that comfortable word—"It is finished," that we might learn that sin

is now destroyed, God is now reconciled, the scripture fulfilled, and our eternal redemption wrought out and purchased. We thank thee for thy last words spoken on the cross, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit," and for thy holy death, whereby all our sins are atoned for, life is restored to us, and all believing souls are committed in Christ into the hands of the heavenly Father.

O blessed Jesus, all that thou didst upon earth thou didst for us; thy life is ours, thy death is ours; may we die to sin, crucify the flesh with its affections, be crucified to the world and the world to us, and rise with thee to a new, holy and heavenly life here, and live with thee for ever in the glory to come.

CXI.

SATURDAY MORNING.

PRAISE FOR THE BURIAL OF CHRIST.

Almighty and everlasting God, who after thine only-begotten Son had, by his sufferings and death for us, wrought out our eternal redemption, didst please that he should enter the rest of the grave, and, like his brethren, be gathered unto his fathers after the flesh, we pray thee also grant that, by his death, our lusts may be crucified and our hearts quieted from guilt; that we too may now cease in this life from all sinful works, and, by holy quietness from

evil and confidence in thy love, be daily strengthened in thee. We beseech thee also so to assist us that when our hour of departure shall come, we may blissfully fall asleep in thee, and that our spirit may enter thy peace, while our body, in the rest of the grave, awaits the joyful resurrection unto everlasting life, through thy dear Son, our Lord and Redeemer Jesus Christ.*

O Lord Jesus Christ, who after blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, and taking it out of the way, and nailing it to thy cross, didst spoil principalities and powers, and make a show of them openly, triumphing over them in it, we thank thee for that wonderful deliverance of our souls from our worst enemies. We also bless thee that for our farther comfort, after giving up the ghost, thou didst descend into the grave, and abide for a season in the lower regions of the earth and the place of departed spirits, leading captivity captive. Thus thou didst sanctify the state of death to thy people, giving us full assurance that thou didst undergo all the condition of the dead. We bless thee also that thou dost reveal to us that thou hast the keys of death and hell, and art Lord of all, and that at thy name every knee must bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth, and that every tongue shall confess that thou

art Lord, to the glory of God the Father. All glory, praise and adoration be unto thee, who, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit, didst go and preach unto the spirits in prison. All glory, praise and adoration be to Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, that thy soul was not left in hell, nor did the Holy One see corruption; and as Christ our Head was shown the path of life, rose from the dead, entered that presence where is fulness of joy, and became the first-fruits of them that slept; so, O heavenly Father, may we be delivered from the fear of death, count life ours and death ours, and follow him into life everlasting. May we willingly partake of the sufferings of the present time, that we may rise to partake with him of the glory to be revealed in us. Hear us, for his name's sake.

CXII.

SATURDAY EVENING.

FOR DELIVERANCE FROM FEAR OF DEATH, AND
CONFIDENCE IN TIME OF DARKNESS.

O Lord Jesus, our rest and our life, we thank thee, O Lamb of God, that thou hast taken away the sins of the world, and after thy death didst enter the grave and wast buried, that we might be delivered from the fear of death and the grave, and that all their sting and curse might be taken away and for ever removed from us. We bless thee that thou, by thy sufferings, rest in the grave, and resurrection,

hast won for us an everlasting Sabbath. Help us also, gracious Lord, that we may know and find thy grave to be the tomb of all our sins. May we be wholly delivered from the fear of the grave by thy burial in it, and willingly, if thou call us thereto, sleep in it as in a chamber of rest for thy saints. May we know that thou, by thy holy grave, hast consecrated and made holy all the graves of thy saints, till the glorious morning of the resurrection awaken our sleeping dust to partake of thy heavenly and everlasting kingdom. Praised be thou for ever.*

Grant, O Lord, that as we are baptized into the death of thy blessed Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, so by continually mortifying our corrupt affections, we may be buried with him; and that, through the grave and gate of death, we may pass to our joyful resurrection, for his merits who died, and was buried, and rose again for us, thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord.†

O Lord, who didst so overrule the hatred of the chief priests that in their care to make sure the sepulchre of Jesus against his resurrection, they did but call attention to the wonderful truth and furnish the most unexceptionable witnesses to its reality,—help us in all the present triumphing of the wicked to have perfect confidence in thee. However thy

truth may be opposed, may we know that it must ultimately be victorious, and in the darkest seasons may we repose in thee with perfect peace. May we all be numbered among the true disciples of Christ, who, after preparing spices and ointments, rested on the Sabbath, according to thy commandment, and in their early hasting to the tomb received the assurance of the blessed fact of his being risen from the dead. So may we show all love to our Saviour and his cause in its deepest humiliation, keep all thy commandments, and at length be made joyful in resurrection-glory, through Jesus our Redeemer. Amen.

CXIII.

ADVENT SUNDAY.

PREPARATION FOR THE JUDGMENT TO COME.

O God, who made the world and all things that are therein, who art Lord of heaven and earth, and art now in the midst of us, for in thee we live, and move, and have our being; help us ever to remember that thou hast appointed a day in which thou wilt judge the world by that man, even Jesus our Lord, whom thou hast appointed. Give us grace in every thing so to labour, that we may be accepted of Thee in that day. O may we never lose sight of the solemn truth, that we must all stand before the judgment-seat of Christ, that every one may receive the things done in the body, according to that he has done, whether it be good or bad.

And with the judgment yet to come, help us also to realize now the grace of God which bringeth salvation; the good tidings of great joy unto all people, that there is a Saviour which is Christ the Lord. May we believe thy love, O God, in sending thine only-begotten Son into the world that we might live through him. May we rejoice in the assurance that

thou didst not send thy Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through him might be saved; and that he that believeth on him is not condemned.

May we all of us know the day of our visitation, the season of grace, and the accepted time. While it is called day, may we hear the voice of the Son of God and live; yet a little while the light is continued, may we walk in it. While we have the light may we believe in the light, and be the children of the light. O Jesus, thou true light of the world, enlighten our darkness, and enable us to follow thee, that we may not walk in darkness, but have the light of life.

Enable us all to look unto Jesus as our great High Priest, who has entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God for us; having by his one offering perfected for ever them that are sanctified. May we know and be assured that now once in the end of the world he has appeared to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself.

May every one of us with joyful confidence also believe not only that Christ was once offered to bear the sin of many; but also that unto them that look for him, he shall appear the second time without sin unto salvation.

O grant unto us grace to be thus looking for him. May we be among those expecting this blessed hope and looking for the Lord, and grant unto us all the quickening, purifying, and sanctifying power of this

hope. May it lead us to constant watchfulness and prayer, and busy occupation with our Master's talents till he come. May it lead us to sobriety and moderation in all things. May we comfort one another with this hope. May we abound in works of love. Give us thy Holy Spirit abundantly, that we may gird up the loins of our mind, and hope to the end, for the grace to be brought unto us at the revelation of Jesus Christ.

May all the means of grace also be more diligently attended to. Bless the truths which we have been hearing this day to our own souls. Bless us in viewing the Saviour's birth, fasting and temptation, his death, his resurrection, his ascension and the coming of the Holy Ghost; may we be in the Spirit, not only on the Lord's day, but through every sacred season. O bless the preaching of thy word in every place through the whole world, for our Redeemer's sake. Amen.

CXIV.

ASH WEDNESDAY AND LENT.

FOR A SPIRIT OF TRUE REPENTANCE.

O exalted Prince and Saviour Jesus Christ, who knewest no sin, but wast made sin for us, that we might be made the righteousness of God in thee, we believe thy promise, that where two or three are gathered in thy name there thou art in the midst of them: and we desire, as in thy presence, to cast our-

selves at thy feet, and bless thee from the heart for all thy grace to us sinners.

For our sakes thou who wast in the form of God, madest thyself of no reputation, and tookest upon thee the form of a servant, and wast made in the likeness of men, and didst humble thyself and became obedient to death, even the death of the cross! For ever blessed be thou for all this grace to us sinners.

For our sakes, O blessed Lord, thou didst fast forty days and forty nights; thou wast tempted of Satan, and didst offer up strong crying and tears for our sakes. Thou didst go through darkness and trouble, a bitter agony and a bloody sweat, and wast numbered with the transgressors, that we might be accounted righteous! O what thanks we owe to thee for thy great redemption! We believe that thou wast wounded for our transgressions, that thou wast bruised for our iniquities, that the chastisement of our peace was upon thee, and that by thy stripes we are healed. O then may we look unto thee whom, by our sins, we have pierced, and mourn, and be in bitterness for them. Lord Jesus, may we be grieved at heart for our iniquities and rebellions against so much love; and may we mourn with that godly sorrow which works repentance unto salvation. We entreat thee, O our King and Saviour, give unto us true repentance and full remission of sins.

O holy and Almighty Father, who searchest the hearts and triest the reins, deliver us from a mere

outside formal show of repentance. Let not our fasting and humiliation be before men, to be seen of them, lest we have no reward in heaven; but let our fasting and humiliation be before thee; inward and sincere, deep and true. O Lord, give us that broken and contrite heart, that mourning for sin, that real hatred of sin, that self-loathing and self-abhorrence which thou approvest and wilt accept. May we have a new heart and a new spirit, hating every thing that is evil, and delighting in all that is good, and may we walk in newness of life.

Let the Holy Ghost really dwell in us and uphold us in thy ways; may he himself convince us of sin, and especially of the sin of unbelief and neglecting the salvation of Jesus.

And, O Lord, we beseech thee also to preserve us from a heartless indifference to appointed seasons and means of grace. Thou hast told us to submit ourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake, and to submit ourselves one to another in the fear of God. Help us in this spirit to improve the season appointed by our church for our soul's humiliation before thee. May we give more time to prayer, and self-examination, and reading thy word. Remembering the nature of the fast which thou hast chosen, may we loose the bands of wickedness, undo the heavy burdens, let the oppressed go free, deal our bread to the hungry, bring the cast-out poor to our house, cover the naked, and not

hide ourselves from those who are our flesh. O give us grace for this and all the blessedness of this, here and for ever.

We ask the same grace and blessing for thy church and our fellow-Christians; for our country, and the whole family of man. Let not this season be abused to foster the spirit of bondage and self-righteousness on the one hand, nor neglected and disregarded in a worldly, careless spirit, but be every where made profitable by a due improvement of it, to the benefit of immortal souls, through Jesus our Redeemer.

CXV.

EASTER DAY.

MORNING PRAYER.

We will give thanks unto the Lord with our whole heart, secretly, among the faithful, and in the congregation. The stone which the builders refused is become the head-stone in the corner. This is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes. This is the day which the Lord hath made—we will rejoice and be glad in it.

Almighty Father, who didst not leave thy Holy One to see corruption, but hast fulfilled all thy promises in raising up thy Son Jesus from the dead, no more to see corruption, and hast exalted him by thy right hand to be both Lord and Christ, all praise, all glory be to thy holy name. Though he was cru-

cified through weakness, we bless thee and magnify thy holy name that he yet lives by thy power, our glorious Redeemer, our everlasting King, our fore-runner and head, the first fruits of them that sleep, the first-begotten from the dead.

Merciful God, having raised up thy Son Jesus, send him also to bless us in turning away every one of us from our iniquities. O grant that all our souls may be quickened, forgiven, justified, and for ever blessed, through the glorious resurrection of Christ Jesus. May the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead, dwell in us, and so may we have a sure token that he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken our mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in us. May we know that he who raised up our Lord Jesus, will raise us up also by Jesus, and present us, with thy whole church, faultless before the presence of thy glory with exceeding joy.

We thank thee that he who was thus exalted by thy right hand has received of thee for us the promise of the Holy Ghost; enrich then each one of our souls with the indwelling of that divine Spirit. [Especially at thy table shed his grace abundantly upon us and all our fellow-communicants.] May we find by happy experience that it was expedient for us that Christ should suffer and die, rise again and go away from us, that the Comforter might indeed be sent down from heaven. O may he come

and dwell in us as our Teacher and our Guide, our daily upholder, strength, and sanctifier.

Give unto us all the peace and hope, joy and comfort, holiness and strength connected with the blessed fact which we this day commemorate. While the cross of Christ expels from our minds all foolish, trifling thoughts, may the resurrection of Christ deliver us from all gloomy and desponding thoughts, and give us Christian cheerfulness and holy gladness. May we know that Jesus who was delivered for our offences, was raised again for our justification, and that righteousness shall be imputed unto us, if we believe on thee who hast raised him up again. May we be assured that being now justified by his blood, we shall be saved from wrath through him. May we know that if when we were enemies we were reconciled to thee by his death, much more, being reconciled, we shall be saved by his life. May we discern distinctly that Christ is the first-fruits of them that slept, that by him has come our resurrection; and as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. And O grant to every one of us to count all things else as loss, if we may but win Christ and be found in him, know him and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable to his death, and so attain to the resurrection of the dead.

We pray also that our perception of our being buried with Christ in baptism and risen with him,

through faith of the operation of God, and of our quickening together with him, may be lively and experimental. May the forgiveness of all our trespasses and the blotting out of the handwriting of ordinances against us, and the nailing it to his cross, and his spoiling there of the principalities and powers of darkness, also be distinctly revealed to our souls. And thus grant that being risen with Christ we may ever seek those things which are above, where Christ sits at thy right hand; not setting our affections on things on the earth, but on things above. O that we may be dead to sin and the world, and that our life may be hid with Christ in thee; and so when Christ who is our life shall appear, we may hear his voice with joy, welcome his coming, and appear with him in glory. God Almighty grant it, for Jesus Christ's sake.

CXVI.

EVENING PRAYER.

We will give thanks unto the Lord, for he is good, for his mercy endureth for ever. He has ransomed us from the power of the grave. He has redeemed us from death, and has put into our mouths a new song of triumph. O death! where is thy sting? O grave! where is thy victory? Thanks be to God who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

O blessed Jesus, who art the resurrection and the

life, in whom whosoever believeth, though he were dead, yet shall he live, and whosoever liveth and believeth in thee shall never die; increase our faith in this most comforting truth. Enable us with the whole heart to believe that thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God, who hast died for us and risen again, and art now seated at the right hand of the Father, ever living as our advocate and appearing in heaven for us.

Give us grace to remember that thou, O Jesus, of the seed of David, wast raised from the dead, redeeming our nature from the grave. Herein may we discern the fulfilment of prophecy, the glorifying of God our Father, the sure foundation laid for our hope of resurrection, our security from condemnation, and the certainty of our justification by faith in thee. O Jesus, help us by thy resurrection to realize all thy mediatorial offices, as our Prophet, Priest, and King, the satisfaction of divine justice, the full propitiation made for our sins, and the sure testimony of thy divine nature as the Son of God.

O merciful Father, grant that as we are buried with Christ by baptism unto death, even as Christ was raised up from the dead by thy glory, we also may now walk in newness of life; may we be planted together both in the likeness of his death and also in the likeness of his resurrection. O may we thus be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto thee, our God, through Jesus Christ our Lord, and yield our-

selves unto thee as those that are alive from the dead, and our members as instruments of righteousness unto thee. Thus by the resurrection of Jesus may we attain more and more of spiritual life and blessedness, and be ourselves raised up together with him, and made to sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus.

Let not then the blessed doctrine of this day be regarded by us only as a yearly commemoration of a great and all-important event; but let it be a living principle of a holy life, daily remembered by us, and daily leading us to set our affections on things above. Give us firm and unshaken confidence in it as an unquestionable fact, most certainly assured to us, by faithful witnesses, and the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven, and the triumphant progress of thy gospel, and its triumph over all its enemies. Give us to believe it with the heart, and joyfully to embrace the blessed truth as the sure pledge and earnest of our own resurrection.

And O, Almighty Father, who hast done such mighty works of love for us, thy sinful and rebellious creatures, fill our souls with holy gratitude, devout admiration, and full purposes of heart to live unto him who died and rose again. Strengthen mightily hereby our faith and hope in thee. May we joyfully say with thy apostle of old, Who shall lay any thing to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth. Who is he that condemneth? It

is Christ that died, yea rather that is risen again, who is even at thy right hand, who also maketh intercession for us.

Give us thus full confidence that nothing shall separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord. May this love ever dwell in us, and fill our whole soul with love to God and man. Strengthen us thus to fulfil our baptismal and communion vows and resolutions, and to be more than conquerors over all trials, difficulties, and temptations in life and in death, through him that loved us, till the last trumpet summon us in glorified resurrection bodies to meet the Lord in the air, and be with him for ever. Hear us for our Redeemer's sake.

CXVII.

WHITSUNDAY.

Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things, and blessed be his glorious name for ever, and let the whole earth be filled with his glory.

We thank thee, O ascended Lord and Saviour Jesus, that, having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, thou didst so wondrously as on this day, fill thy disciples with the blessed gift, baptizing them with the Holy Ghost, and enabling them to go forth as thy ambassadors to all nations, speaking with new tongues, and proclaiming far and

wide that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them.

We bless thee that thus at length the good tidings of great joy were published on our shores, and God gave testimony to the word of his grace, and we Gentiles were grafted into thy church, and became partakers of the heavenly gift; all praise, all glory be to thee.

O God, our Father, how great are our privileges! that thou shouldest thus bring us near to thyself that we might be builded together for a habitation of God through the Spirit; and that we might receive the adoption of sons, and with that adoption the Spirit of thy Son into our hearts, crying Abba, Father; all glory be to thee. And yet farther, for thy promises, that if we be children then are we heirs, heirs of God, and joint heirs with Christ, suffering with him here that we may also be glorified together. For these inestimable mercies all adoration, thanksgiving, and praise be unto thee.

We entreat thee, merciful Father, suffer us not to receive this grace in vain. Now in the accepted time, now in the day of salvation, work in us to will and to do of thy good pleasure, that we may work out our own salvation with fear and with trembling. May we daily increase in thy manifold gifts of grace. To our Divine Redeemer thou givest not the Spirit by measure; it pleased thee that in him all fulness should dwell, and that of his fulness all we should

receive. As the Spirit of the Lord then rested upon him, so may it be imparted to every one of us, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord, and make us also of quick understanding in the fear of the Lord. Give unto us especially the spirit of prayer, so that we may find the Spirit helping our infirmities, and enabling us daily to pray in the Holy Ghost.

Thus, strengthened with might by thy Spirit in the inner man, may we be valiant for the truth; may we be bold in our God to speak his gospel; may we have that wisdom which comes from above, which is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, easy to be entreated, full of mercy, and of good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy.

And O, our gracious God, who hast so faithfully promised to pour out of thy Spirit upon all flesh, and yet for this wilt be inquired of by us, we entreat thee to fill our rulers, and all in authority over us, with thy Spirit, and give them an understanding heart to judge thy people, and to go in the path of thy commandments. Give unto our bishops, priests, and deacons, and all congregations committed to them, grace, mercy, and peace, and make them faithful stewards of thy mysteries, that thy word may have free course and be glorified. Speedily descend on Israel as the rain, as the latter and former rain upon the earth. Pour upon the house of David, and

upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem, the spirit of grace and supplication, that they may look unto Jesus whom they have pierced, and mourn for him. O may they speedily become the holy people, and the righteous nation keeping the truth; and so may the Lord God cause righteousness and praise to spring forth before all nations.

May the words of our mouths, and the meditations of our hearts this day be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord our strength and our Redeemer.

CXVIII.

TRINITY SUNDAY.

MORNING PRAYER.

Holy, holy, holy Lord God Almighty, which was, and is, and is to come, with deep reverence and abasement would we come into thy presence, through Jesus having access by one Spirit unto the Father. O help us now by faith to behold thee sitting on thy throne, high and lifted up in the heavens, while seraphim and cherubim cover their faces with their wings, and cry one to another day and night, Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts, the whole earth is full of his glory. Thou art worthy to receive glory and honour and power; for thou hast created all things, and for thy pleasure they are and were created.

How graciously hast thou dealt with us! By nature born in sin and the children of wrath, we have been brought into thy household the church, and

baptized into that wonderful name of our God, the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, that we might from the beginning acquaint ourselves with God, and be at peace with him.

We bless thee, O our God, that in revealing to us thy glory, thou hast taught us that the Lord our God is one Lord, and that thou art God, even thou alone, of all the kingdoms of the earth. We bless thee also that thou hast discovered thyself to us, for our unspeakable comfort, as Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, three persons and one God, fulfilling a work of grace and love for our salvation. Thanks be unto thee that we know that the Son of God is come, and has given us an understanding that we may know him that is true, and we are in him that is true, even in thy Son Jesus Christ, and that this is the true God and eternal life. O may we keep ourselves from all idols.

O Lord, enable us to hold fast the profession of our faith, without wavering, seeing thou art faithful who hast promised, and may we build up ourselves on our most holy faith, praying in the Holy Ghost, keeping ourselves in the love of God, and looking for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life.

Give us grace to know this deep mystery of thy divine glory, as it is set before us in thy word; not as a controversy to be disputed upon, but as revealed truth to be believed; not as a speculative doctrine,

but as a living truth, full of unction and power and blessedness; a fountain-head from which continually streams of mercy, grace, and peace are flowing. O Almighty and eternal God, grant unto us thy blessing, that thy grace, O our Lord Jesus Christ, thy love, O God our Father, and thy fellowship, O Holy Ghost the Comforter, may be with us and rest upon us, and make us a blessing to others continually.

[Especially may this knowledge of God and the Lord Jesus shine in our hearts who hope to commemorate our Saviour's death at his table.]

We beseech thee also to look in tender pity upon the millions of our fallen race without God in the world. They have indeed gods many and lords many, yet they know not thee the only true God, while they do service unto them which by nature are no gods, and offer sacrifice unto devils. But we know thee, or rather, to thy name be praise, are known of thee, and we therefore as priests unto God would intercede for a world lying in darkness, and entreat thee to cause the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, to shine upon them.

O may the heralds of salvation go forth and preach through the world Christ Jesus; and do thou who didst command the light to shine out of darkness, shine into their hearts to give the light of the knowledge of thy glory in the face of Jesus Christ.

Bless the ministers of thy word every where in

preaching the faith of God's elect, and testifying the truth which is according to godliness. O may we and all the saints and faithful brethren in Christ Jesus, through the world, be filled with the knowledge of thy will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding, that we may walk worthy of the Lord unto all pleasing, being fruitful in every good work, and increasing in the knowledge of thee our God, strengthened with all might, according to thy glorious power, till we be meet for the inheritance of the saints in light, and come to see thee as thou art, and to know as we are known. Hear us, for Christ's sake.

CXIX.

FIRST PRAYER.—BEFORE ORDINATION.

O blessed Jesus, who didst love thy church and give thyself for it, and who didst purchase it with thine own blood, and after this ascending to heaven didst give apostles and prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers, for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry and for the edifying of the body of Christ, we beseech thee continue still to raise up from age to age faithful watchmen and stewards of thy mysteries. Multiply in our day able ministers of the New Covenant, workmen that need not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth, who shall be examples of believers in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, and in purity.

And especially give to the bishops and pastors of

thy flock a deep sense of the awful responsibility of appointing and ordaining those who are to serve thee in the ministry, that not laying hands suddenly on any, they may be preserved from being partakers of other men's sin. May the Holy Ghost himself separate faithful and able men for the work of the ministry, and endow them with all heavenly gifts for their blessed office. O may the unction from the Holy One descend upon them, and make them wise to win souls, so that continually there may be added to thy church such as shall be saved.

We ask this, O heavenly Father, for our Redeemer's sake, to whom with thee and the Holy Ghost be all honour and glory now and evermore. Amen.

CXX.

SECOND PRAYER.—AFTER ORDINATION.

O thou Father of lights, with whom is no variableness nor shadow of turning, from whom is every good and every perfect gift, we earnestly unite in prayer for those ministers of thy word who have just been set apart for thy service. Give unto them heavenly wisdom, understanding in all things, the word of knowledge, discerning of spirits, working faith, patient hope, laborious love and abounding grace, according to the measure of the gift of Christ, that they may preach his unsearchable riches. May they follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience and meekness, and be in all things a pattern of good

works, in doctrine showing uncorruptness, gravity and sincerity. Preserve them from their special temptations, and may their speech and preaching ever be, not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power; so that the faith of those who hear them may not stand in the wisdom of man, but in the power of God, and a countless multitude may be their glory and joy in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his coming. O hear us for our Redeemer's sake.

CXXI.

FIRST DAY OF THE YEAR.

MORNING PRAYER.

O everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth, the Father of lights, with whom is no variable-ness, neither shadow of turning, who from the beginning didst set the lights in the firmament of heaven to be for signs and for seasons, for days and for years, brought by thy goodness together in family worship at the beginning of another year, we would first of all, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord, present unto thee unfeigned thanksgivings for all thy loving-kindnesses bestowed upon us.

When we look back on all thy dealings in the past year, what reason we have to speak good of thy name and to testify that thou art good, that thy mercy is everlasting, and that thy truth endureth to all gene-

rations. How countless thy mercies have been to us, at home and abroad, in dangers and in difficulties, in providing for all our wants, and day by day, from week to week, and month to month, giving us all things richly for enjoyment.

The same love, in deeper and fuller streams of goodness, we would see in the seasons of trials and afflictions through which we have passed. Thou hast called us in every thing to give thanks, and to glorify thee in the fires. We would then especially see thy love in trials, and praise thee for what has been humbling and painful in the past year. Thou hast taught us that by these things men live. Without these we should want the tokens of thy love and the means of fruitfulness. Help us to discern in them, not the penal judgments of a violated law, and avenging justice, but the fatherly chastisements of a tender Parent, having his mind fixed on our best good.

Help us to see the same love in our spiritual trials and conflicts. If thou hast called us to walk in darkness, in perplexity, in fear, in trembling and in temptation, and hast even given us proofs of what was in our heart in leaving us for a season to ourselves, O help us to discern in all things thy wisdom and our own nothingness. Help us to see that the trial of our faith is more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, and that all things are ours, whether the ministers of thy church; or the

world, or life, or death, or things present, or things to come: all are ours, and we are Christ's and Christ is God's, and evermore then may we glory in thee alone.

May we see thy goodness and wisdom in what has been withheld, as well as in what has been given, and rise to full confidence of heart that thou art love, love in every thing.

And now in this confidence we commit unto thee all those things hidden from us in the future. True it is we know not the particular events which are before us; we know not whether those now assembled together shall at the close of this year assemble together again an unbroken circle, and be the living, the living to praise thee; but we commit all unto thee, knowing who orders all our steps, who performeth all things for us; we know he is our reconciled Father in Christ Jesus, and while humbled to the dust in the sense of our own past deep sinfulness, we cast all our care on thee, in the assurance thou carest for us. In the full conviction of the uncertainty of life and the shortness of time, that the strong may be cut off and the weak may be spared, and any of us here kneeling together may have to go through sickness and sorrow and danger, or may pass unto thy immediate presence, we would pray that thou wouldest only give us the scriptural and sweet assurance that we love thee, and are called according to thy purpose, that thou wouldest teach us the certainty of

thy word that all things shall work together for our good, and then come what may, we will delight in thy will and rejoice in thy salvation.

But, O Lord, let us rise out of the contracted sphere of personal feeling, or even the delightful circle of family and social interests, into the fulness of thine own love, who wilt have all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. O pour out of the Spirit in these last days upon all flesh. Make this a year of large blessings to the whole earth. May Zion arise and shine, finding her light is come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon her. May thy ministers be wise to discern the signs of the times, and to instruct thy people in them. May thy church every where be prepared for the coming of the Lord, and brought to a waiting and longing for his appearance. Let the groans of creation, and its earnest expectation, waiting for the manifestation of the sons of God, at length cease in thy promised kingdom; and the kingdoms of this world at length become the kingdom of our Lord and his Christ, and he reign for ever and ever. Amen.

CXXII.

EVENING PRAYER.

Thy goodness, O our God, endureth yet daily; and thou, Lord, art nigh unto all them that call upon thee, to all that call upon thee in truth. Thou wilt fulfil the desire of them that fear thee, thou also wilt

hear their cry, and wilt save them. In the confidence of thy faithful promises we now call upon thee for help and grace in all the duties of that year on which we have entered, and for a full blessing upon all its various events.

Pardon, through the blood of Jesus, all our past sinfulness and unfaithfulness. Enable us all to believe in him, and receive thankfully his atonement; and being justified by faith, may we all of us have peace with thee through our Lord Jesus Christ.

And being thus reconciled ourselves unto thee, we would come before thee according to thine own direction, that first of all supplications, prayers and intercessions, and giving of thanks be made for all men.

O God, look in tender mercy upon all our relatives and friends; where they know and love thee, increase, confirm and strengthen their faith and love. Where they are yet unconverted, O that this may be an acceptable year for their true conversion.

Regard with thy favour our President, and all those invested with authority. Preserve them from their peculiar spiritual temptations and dangers, and make them large and increasing blessings to our church and our country. Guide all in the administration of the affairs of state to such measures as will promote thy glory and the true good of this nation.

O Lord, behold us in tender pity, and spare us as a nation, though we deserve thy wrath. Let not

the rich trust in riches, but in thee. Let not the poor injure others, or take thy name in vain. May all remember the solemn account hereafter to be given, and all now seek each other's real good. O remove far away all murmuring and complaining, all hard-heartedness and selfishness, all covetousness and infidelity, and make us a righteous nation, keeping the truth.

Bless increasingly every year the many Religious Societies thou hast raised up amongst us for diffusing thy truth both at home and abroad. O Lord, strengthen the hands of all thy servants engaged in these works of love. May churches be built, may the ignorant be educated, may the Scriptures and pious books be circulated, may the wicked be reclaimed, may the gospel be preached through our country, till every corner of the land be replenished with Christian light and truth.

We ask for the same blessings on our wide and extended country. May faithful pastors of thy flock be multiplied, congregations be gathered, the means of grace be established, the blessings of the Sabbath be made known, and thy kingdom mightily grow and increase.

Prosper all efforts for the good of Zion, and especially bless the means used to revive thy church and worship among the Jews. May it be the happy beginning of the promised bright and glorious day of Zion's glory, and the blessedness of Gentile nations.

We pray for full success to all missionary labours among the heathen. Wherever thy missionaries have gone forth preaching Christ to those that know him not, O Lord, bless their labours. Gather in speedily thine elect; take out of the Gentiles a people to thy name, and then return and build again the tabernacle of David which is fallen, that the residue of men may seek after the Lord, and the whole earth be filled with thy glory.

O Lord, we entreat thee, pour out thy Spirit from on high, and let the wilderness become a fruitful field, and the desert rejoice and blossom as the rose. May thy purposes of mercy be in this year largely ripened and accomplished, and may we have the joy of seeing the kingdom of darkness diminishing and falling, and the kingdom of light and truth, of love and joy, of holiness and peace, making rapid advances in every part of the world.

Hear us, for our Redeemer's sake.

CXXIII.

FIRST LORD'S DAY IN THE YEAR.

MORNING PRAYER.

O Lord God, who hast made heaven and earth by thy great power and stretched-out arm; who didst rest from all thy works on the seventh day, and bless it, and sanctify it; the great, the mighty God, the Lord of hosts is thy name. Great in counsel, and mighty in work, thine eyes are open upon all the sons of men to give every one according to his ways, and ac-

according to the fruit of his doings: we worship, on this thy holy Sabbath, thee our God, our own God, because thou art the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

O Lord, it is thy day, the first Sabbath of another month, the first Sabbath of another year: we raise then to thee our grateful thanksgiving, for the blessings without number which we as a family enjoy, and for all thy goodness which encompasses us about on every side. Not, O Lord, that we are better than others; O help us deeply to feel and bewail our great sinfulness in thy sight, both as a family together and each in his own soul. The light of thy mercies may indeed fully manifest to us our great inconsistencies, our deep ingratitude, and the vileness of all our offences. But to sovereign grace and free love we owe every thing. Thou wilt have compassion on whom thou wilt have compassion, and mercy on whom thou wilt have mercy; and, therefore, we are spared and blessed. Thou hast made us to differ, and we will glory in thee alone.

O Lord of all mercy and goodness, grant that this Sabbath may be to us a commencement of Sabbaths more holy, more profitable, and more happy in communion with thee, than any which we have hitherto passed upon earth. May the talents which thou hast intrusted to us, whether time, or property, or influence, or strength, or abilities, be far more than ever heretofore traded with, or laid out, for thy honour,

and glory, and the good of others. Whatever our talents be, whether many or few, or only one, still may we each diligently occupy them till our Lord shall return. May every gift of thy Spirit bestowed upon us, be in this year more beneficially employed in thy service, remembering that the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal.

O Lord, grant that in this year we may all of us be made fuller and richer blessings to each other, and to all around us. May none of us fail of thy design of love in bringing us together, and near to each other, that we may be fountains of light and comfort, of help and happiness to each other. O let us never be a grievance and burden, but a constant spring of joy and gladness to all about us.

May this year be favoured with special revivals of grace in our family, in our congregations, in our church, in our country, and in all the churches of Christ. O may thy people grow rapidly, in these last days, in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. May our faith be more lively and laborious, our hope more patient and abounding, our love more fervent and unwearied this year, than it has ever yet been.

Let the folly of those who, in their voluntary humility and worshipping of angels, intrude into things which they have not seen, vainly puffed up in their fleshly mind, and not holding the head, become more and more manifest, and let them proceed no farther.

Rebuke the unclean spirits now abroad. Bring to nothing all designs for the spread of infidelity, popery, and lawlessness, so that those seduced may be ashamed and converted. Let all these devices of the enemy only advance the kingdom of Christ, ripen the knowledge, mature the graces, and enlarge the numbers of thy people.

O let thy church awake and arise from the dust; let her take unto her her beautiful clothing, her robes of righteousness, her garments of salvation, and her ornaments of a meek and quiet spirit. May thy people every where be raised up together, and made to sit together in heavenly places in Christ; having their conversation in heaven, and their affections set on things above. Thus may thy church look forth as the morning, fair as the sun, clear as the moon and terrible as an army with banners.

And O come and bless us in thine house and ordinances this day. Begin this first Sabbath, O our God, with overflowing grace and love to each of our souls, through Jesus Christ our only Saviour.

CXXIV.

EVENING PRAYER.

How excellent is thy loving-kindness, O Lord; therefore the children of men put their trust under the shadow of thy wings; they shall be abundantly satisfied with the fatness of thy house, and thou shalt make them drink of the river of thy pleasures. From

the heart we thank thee for the fresh privileges of this first Sabbath of another year, and for the quickening calls of thy providence, and of thy word, to devote ourselves afresh to thee.

We have indeed hitherto been too much like barren trees, planted in a fertile vineyard, but bearing no fruit, and cumbering the ground; but thou graciously, in the riches of thy goodness, forbearance, and long-suffering, hast spared us for another year, and still continuest to us the care of thy providence, the means of thy grace, and the strivings of thy Spirit. O Lord, grant that this long-suffering may be for our salvation; that this goodness may lead us to repentance. O that we may at length be neither barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. If any of us are yet dead in

sins, O God, who art rich in mercy to all them that call upon thee, quicken us and make us new creatures in Christ Jesus. Are any of us cold and dull in spiritual things, we entreat thee renew a right spirit within us: quicken us according to thy command to love thee with all our heart and mind and soul and strength; quicken us according to the sureness and fulness of thy promises, and never leave us nor forsake us till we rise from the life of faith and love here to the enjoyment of eternal life in thy heavenly kingdom.

O Lord, we trust that thou hast put into all our hearts at this season some fresh desires to live more unto thee, some new purposes of walking more closely with God, and more watchfully resisting the temptations of the world, the flesh and the devil, that thou hast led us to form some good designs and plans for the year now before us. O strengthen us with might by thine own Spirit to bring these desires and purposes to some good effect.

We earnestly entreat thee to grant thy grace that our prayers may be more spiritual and fervent, more full and constant: that our searching the Scriptures may be more persevering and deep, more devout and practical; that our public and social worship may be in spirit and in truth; less formal and more earnest and fervent. We ask that our intercourse with each other may be less trifling and vain and empty, and more full of thee and of those things which belong

to our everlasting peace, so that we may ever be seeking to please each other to our mutual edification. May we be growing up into Christ in all things. Whether sickness or health, pain or ease, joy or sorrow, weakness or strength, may all be accomplishing thy gracious designs of love for our growth in grace, and our being weaned from the world. In our slightest affliction may we not lose sight of our sin, as justly requiring it, and in our heaviest trials may we discern the strength and fulness of thy love in sending them.

O Lord Jesus Christ, dwell in us and give us thy Spirit, that we may ever abide in thee, and so be really fruitful. Remove not the candlestick from our church and from our land. May we as a nation prize our inestimable religious privileges; repent of all our evil ways; be watchful and strengthen the things that remain which are ready to die, and so be spared and blessed, and made a full blessing to all other nations, to Jews and Gentiles in every land, through Jesus our Redeemer. Amen.

CXXV.

CHRISTMAS DAY, DECEMBER 25.

MORNING PRAYER.

O our merciful Father, we thy sinful and rebellious children bow before thee in grateful adoration, to thank thee for that astonishing love, manifested as on this day, above eighteen hundred years since,

in sending Jesus Christ in our nature to save us sinners. O what love was this that thy only-begotten Son, being in the very form of God, should not disdain the virgin's womb, should take upon him the form of a servant and be made in the likeness of man. We bless thee, we praise thee, we glorify thee, for those good tidings of great joy that there was born unto us, as on this day, a Saviour, even Christ the Lord.

Open to thy ministers the great mystery this day commemorated, that they may fully declare the wonders of redeeming love to thy churches. [Bless those of us especially who hope to go to thy holy table, and there to obtain in

the breaking of bread, the communion of the body of Christ, and in the cup of blessing the communion of the blood of Christ. May we find a double blessing in commemorating the Saviour's death on the day of his birth, receive Christ into our hearts, evermore to dwell there, and daily through his Spirit mortify and crucify the lusts of the flesh.]

Bless all thy churches through the earth, in the commemoration of this wonderful and all-surprising mystery of love. O Lord, pardon all the great profanation of this sacred season, which has so long dishonoured thy name. O let it not be desecrated by mere carnal mirth and worldly pleasure. May we never lose sight of all the awful guilt of man which required this humiliation of the Son of God, and of the holiness and purity to which He has redeemed us at such a costly sacrifice. May we never act inconsistently with the great and mysterious truths of His incarnation this day celebrated.

May thy Holy Spirit be largely granted, through the incarnate Redeemer, not only to us now as a family kneeling together, but to all the members and branches, kindred and connexion of our several families. May family love and union and all the ties of kindred, never decrease or diminish amongst us, but enlarge and be strengthened, till time be swallowed up in eternity.

Bless all lands with the light of thy glorious gospel. May Christ, the light of the Gentiles, speedily

shine over all the world; may Christ, the long-expected glory of thy people Israel, at length in all his majesty and love be revealed to thy waiting people.

O Lord, we thank thee not only for the great miracle of thy love in the incarnation of our Lord and Saviour, but for the farther miracle of his being born in many a sinner's heart from age to age, even to this day. O still help thy church. Thou knowest how great are its dangers, how strong are the pillars of the kingdom of darkness, and how mighty the Prince of the power of the air, who now worketh in the children of disobedience; but, O thou who art stronger than he, be in us, and prevail within us over all our foes, and hasten the full triumph of thy church in thine own kingdom, for thy name's sake.

CXXVI.

EVENING PRAYER.

Thanks, eternal thanks be unto thee, O Father, for that blessed truth which we have this day commemorated, that the Eternal Word, who was in the beginning and was with God and was God, was made flesh and dwelt among us. All glory be unto thee, that unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given, and the government is upon his shoulder, and his name is called Wonderful, Counsellor, the Mighty God, the everlasting Father, and the Prince of Peace.

O help us, Lord, to ponder these things in our hearts as Mary did, and to adore thee more and more, and to admire the wondrous fact that God sent his Son, made of a woman, made under the law, to redeem us, and give us the adoption of sons. May we live as becomes those brought nigh unto thee, in so glorious a relation that Jesus, thy own Son, is not ashamed to call us brethren. May we realize the certainty, the fulness, the freeness and the glory of that salvation which Jesus, by his incarnation, accomplished.

Enable us also not only to look at all that Jesus in our nature did for us on earth, but to look upward and see that same nature carried into the heavens, and that same Jesus now appearing in the presence of God for us. May we know that he can enter into all the feelings, distresses, sorrows, wants, and desires of humanity, and into all our temptations, being touched with the feeling of our infirmities, having been tempted in all things like as we are, sin only excepted. May we be assured then of his sympathy, his compassion, and the tenderness of his fellow-feeling towards the children of men, and gladly commit our cause and interests and our immortal souls to him who was born, and lived, and died for us, and be constrained by his love to devote ourselves to him.

We beseech thee also now to give us grace not only to look at the birth, and life, and death of Jesus here below, and at his present seat at thy right hand, and his interceding there for us, but also to look forward to the quickly approaching period when the same Jesus shall return again to our earth in like manner as he ascended from it. When his feet shall once more stand upon Mount Olivet, no longer in his lowly form of a servant and a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief, no more for suffering and sacrifice, but crowned with glory and honour, coming in the glory of the Father with all his holy angels, King of kings and Lord of lords, to overthrow all his enemies and to reign for ever and ever. For that coming in glory make us truly prepared and ready; may we be looking for it and expecting it. May we have on all the armour of light. May we be manifestly the children of the light and the children of the day. May our conversation be in heaven and our affections set on things above, that looking for Jesus from heaven, he may change our vile body and fashion it like unto his glorious body, according to the working of his mighty power.

Write upon our minds the truths which have been brought before us this day. Let not our faith fail in the time of trial. Teach us to keep judgment and to do justice, knowing that thy salvation is near to come and thy righteousness to be revealed. O may we seek heavenly and not earthly treasure, and may

our loins be girt, and our lights burning, and our souls waiting and watching for thy appearing, O blessed Jesus, to whom with the Father and the Holy Ghost be all honour and glory now and evermore.

CXXVII.

THE LAST LORD'S DAY OF THE YEAR.

MORNING PRAYER.

O ever-living God, which is, which was, which is to come, before the mountains were brought forth, or ever thou hadst formed the earth and the world, even from everlasting to everlasting, thou art God. O Lord, thou shalt endure for ever, and thy remembrance unto all generations, and blessed be the Lord our God, the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ from everlasting to everlasting.

O Lord, we thy frail creatures, whose life is as a vapour, whose years pass away as a tale that is told, who dwell in houses of clay whose foundation is in the dust, and who are crushed before the moth, fly to thee the eternal God as our refuge. O support and sustain us by thine everlasting arms, and give unto us eternal life in Christ Jesus our Saviour.

We now confess unto thee the innumerable sins of the past year, all our Sabbath iniquities, and the iniquities of our whole lives. O Lord, how can we look back without being ashamed and confounded for our own ways. We desire now to remember before thee our evil ways and our doings that were

not good, and to loathe ourselves in our own sight for our iniquities and for our abominations. Enable us to look back on all the way thou hast led us these many years in this wilderness-world, to humble us, and prove us, and teach us what is in our own hearts. O Lord, we find more and more that our hearts are deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked, and that all evil proceeds out of them, and there is no good thing in them.

Create then in us a clean heart, O God; renew a right spirit within us. Cast us not away from thy presence, and take not thy Holy Spirit from us. May we learn in all our sinfulness and weakness, corruption and depravity, more of the grace and glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. May we learn wholly to renounce all hopes in any righteousness of our own, and to boast only in thee, all the day long, and to praise thy name for ever and ever. May we see that all our righteousness and strength is in the Lord, and that his grace is all-sufficient for us.

And while earthly Sabbaths are passing away, and we lose one after another; may our souls in them, and through them, be ripened for keeping that eternal Sabbath which thou hast promised to thy people. May even our most humbling experience of our corruption, through the mighty energy of thy Spirit, in overcoming evil with good, and bringing good out of evil, produce in us poverty of spirit, contrition for sin, strong faith, ardent love and more en-

tire devotedness to our divine Redeemer. Thus may our infirmities themselves magnify thy power and grace, and all things work together to make us vessels of mercy meet for the Master's use.

Nor let this last Sabbath of the year pass without a gracious revival and refreshing from thy presence, and fresh, and more fixed, and more successful purposes of heart to walk in newness of life; and to give up ourselves, and all we are and have wholly to thee.

We ask for the same blessing for all our brethren in the Lord, in our own congregation, and in all the churches of Christ through the wide world. O let thy gracious purposes of love and all thy long suffering and forbearance with the sinful sons of men, save multitudes from perishing, and bring multitudes to repentance, that countless numbers of immortal souls may be saved in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ.

CXXVIII.

EVENING PRAYER.

O Lord our God who hast made the Sabbath for man, and given it to be a sign between us and thee, that we might know that thou art the Lord our God who sanctifieth us, we bless thee for all the vast mercies and privileges of our Christian Sabbaths, during the past year. We thank thee for all the instruction received in them, for all thy holy ordinances, the

light of thy word, the preaching of thy ministers, and the abundant means of grace which we have enjoyed. Thou hast greatly exalted us in religious privileges and spiritual advantages. Mighty works thou hast done for us in this favoured country, and we bless together, and we magnify together thy loving-kindness.

But, Lord, we mournfully acknowledge that we have not rendered again unto thee according to thy goodness. We have as a family walked unworthy of our high calling, and have been too much like the unfruitful tree, barren year after year, and only cumbering the ground. It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not.

Lord, vouchsafe unto us in the review of the past, a far more lively gratitude for all the proofs and tokens of thy goodness towards us, and a far more humble and penitent and contrite heart under the deep sense of our own inconsistency, unfruitfulness, and unworthy returns unto thee. Give us full purposes of heart to cleave more closely unto the Lord our God, hereafter; to honour and sanctify the Sabbath more, and to give it up more strictly and entirely to its sacred duties.

Impress upon our minds, O gracious God, the lessons of this day; the shortness of time, the near-

ness of judgment to come, the unspeakable importance of thy favour, the inestimable value of our never-dying souls, and the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus our Lord, so that we may count all but loss to win Christ and to be found in him. O let us not seek earthly treasure, but strive to gain heavenly riches. Let us not call evil good, and good evil; but do thou purge our understanding, and give us to see that thy will is altogether good, and teach us to delight in doing it.

To thee we commit all that is now before us another year. How little can we discern what is coming to pass! but help us to confide in thee, and to see that every sorrow, sickness, and trial is guided by infinite wisdom and love. O may the fruit of all thy providential dealing be abundant in righteousness and joyful conformity to thy will.

Bless every member of this household. We thank thee for the love which from eternity provided so many temporal and spiritual comforts for us: for the ties of Christian affection, and the bonds of holy love which unite us as one family here below; and for the blessed hope of being eternally united in thy kingdom of glory, near at hand and yet to come.

Bless the people of this place. Let not thy preached word return unto thee void. Bless all the secret meditations, and the social intercourse of thy people here. May the poor be rich in faith, and the

rich abound in good works, and all be united together in pure and holy love.

Bless us more than ever thou hast yet done, according to the fulness of thy love in the approaching year. Assist us in duty, preserve us from temptation, guard us from danger. May we walk in the fear of the Lord, and yet more may the love of the Lord constrain us, that we may render a delightful service to thee, and find it perfect freedom. Honour us with large usefulness here, preservation in the hour of temptation, and full joy in the day of Christ. All these great things we ask of thee, for the worthiness of Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour.

CXXIX.

LAST DAY OF THE YEAR.

MORNING PRAYER.

O ever-living God, the eternal and unchangeable Jehovah, the great I AM, which is, and was, and is to come, whose years fail not, we the children of a day, formed of the dust, whose flesh is as grass, and all our goodliness as the flower of the field, soon fading and passing away, come unto thee, whose mercy is from everlasting to everlasting on them that fear thee. We come in the name of one who bears our form and is partaker of our nature, while he is also one with thee, equal with God, even Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, to-day, and for ever.

O Lord, when we look back on the year now

closing, how great has been thy goodness to us, how patient thy forbearance with us, how wonderful thy grace toward us. Mercies have surrounded us from day to day, from week to week, from month to month, from the beginning to the end. Mercies at home and mercies abroad, mercies in journeying and mercies in resting, mercies in our own family and with relatives and friends. We have been preserved amidst dangers, we have been kept from evils which we merited, and even in our deepest trials we have experienced the most abounding goodness and love. Grant the same blessings to all the dear circle of relatives, and friends, and neighbours whom we would especially at this season remember. O let not these more lengthened and marked periods of time and providence pass away, without more earnest prayer, more determined purposes of living to thee, a more plentiful effusion of thy Holy Spirit, and an enlarged and full revival of thy work of grace in all our hearts.

And as our salvation is continually nearer and nearer, and we see the day of the Lord approaches,

may thy church every where make ready for his coming; may thy people be like the wise virgins, and have oil in in their vessels and be watchful. O may we have our loins girt and our lights burning, so as to be all ready to welcome our returning Lord and Saviour. Hear us for his name's sake.

CXXX.

EVENING PRAYER.

O our God, thy years are throughout all generations. Of old thou hast laid the foundations of the earth, and the heavens are the work of thy hands. And may thy Spirit inspire in us holy resolutions and firm purposes of walking in newness of life. Revive thy work in the midst of the days in our hearts, in our church, in our country, and in all the churches of Christ. As we approach nearer the day of Christ, may thy people be more and more longing and prepared for his appearance. Every where may this solemn season speak with a powerful and quickening voice to all men, and rouse the careless and awaken the slumbering, and lead us all to Jesus, our only and complete Saviour, for fresh life and strength in thy ways. Hear us, for his name's sake.

CXXXI.

PRAYER BEFORE BAPTISM OF A CHILD.

Give thy full blessing to our efforts, that there may not only be in this child another member added to our family, but another member trained up in the household of faith, for a heavenly and eternal home, through Jesus our Redeemer.

CXXXIII.

CXXXV.

(On any day in the week previously.)

O gracious Redeemer, who in thy tender love to us, the same night in which thou wast betrayed, didst take both bread and wine, and give them to thy disciples, as showing thine own body broken for us and thine own blood shed for us, and for many, for the remission of sins, and didst command that this should

be done in remembrance of thee, we bless thy holy name for this gracious appointment, and for its continued observance to this day. O Lord, may those of us who hope to go on the next Sabbath to thy table, be assisted by thy grace in giving time to self-examination and prayer. Do thou impart to us a lively feeling of our own sinfulness and unprofitableness and a simple dependence on thy merits. Do thou give us to hunger for the bread of life. Do thou enable us to discern thy body and to feed on thy flesh in our hearts, by faith, with thanksgiving. O prepare us, by thy grace, that we may with a true penitent heart and lively faith, receive that holy sacrament, so that we may spiritually eat thy flesh and drink thy blood; that we may dwell in thee and thou in us, and that we may be one with Christ and Christ with us. Grant us these inestimable benefits, for thy great name's sake.

CXXXVI.

AFTER COMMUNION.

(To be added to the other prayers.)

O Lord our God and Saviour, who hast admitted some of us, unworthy and sinful as we are, to that heavenly feast of love in which we feed on Christ the true bread of life, keep alive in our hearts a lively remembrance of so great a token and pledge of thy favour and goodness towards us. May we ever keep in mind with what we have had commu-

nion, even the body and blood of Christ, and that we are united to the people of the Lord as one bread and one body. May we therefore come out from the world, and have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness. Whether we eat or drink, or whatsoever we do, may we do all to thy glory. May we give no offence or cause of stumbling to any one, but please all men in all things, not seeking our own profit, but the profit of many, that they may be saved. May we especially love the brotherhood, and feel our union and oneness with all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity. Hear us, for his sake. Amen.

CXXXVII.

LORD'S DAY MORNING.

BEFORE COMMUNION.

Our heavenly Father, in whose house there is bread enough and to spare, receive us thy sinful children, returning unto thee in the name of Jesus Christ. O give unto us the spirit of prayer, and show us our weakness and wants and sinfulness, and thy power and riches and willingness to assist us, and let the Holy Spirit himself help our infirmities, that we may offer unto thee acceptable worship.

Thou hast appointed this holy day for thine own service; write thy gracious law in our hearts, and enable us to lay aside all worldly thoughts and cares,

O may our souls be raised, by the Holy Ghost dwelling in us, to that true and saving faith which this ordinance is so especially designed to aid us in attaining. May we discern Christ as the bread that came down from heaven, which gives life unto the world. O Lord Jesus, may we come to thee for this bread, that we may never hunger, and believe on thee, that we may never thirst. O may we eat thy flesh and drink thy

blood, and so have eternal life and be raised up at the last day. And may the eating of this bread and the drinking of this cup, be an effectual means of thy grace to give us this communion of thy body and thy blood. O heavenly Father, may Christ crucified be set forth among us evidently before our eyes. May he manifest himself to our souls in the breaking of bread, so that we may have a lively, quickening, soul-affecting and reviving view of his death for us, and true fellowship with his sufferings. May we also know the power of his resurrection, and that he is now seated at thy right hand; and by faith may we behold our risen Saviour appearing in heaven in thy presence for us, as the Lamb slain in the midst of the throne, and as the true High Priest of his people, ever living to make intercession for us. Give us also, by the Lord's supper, to gain a full assurance of his return in thy glory. Seeing that as oft as we eat this bread and drink this cup we show forth his death till he come, may each ordinance show us the passing away of the days of darkness and the quick return of our heavenly Lord. May we be helped by this solemn memorial to be found watching, praying, and allready for his coming.

We farther ask of thee a great increase of love, both to our Lord Jesus Christ and to each other. May we see that we, being many, are one bread and one body, for we are all partakers of that one bread; and so may love to each other be enkindled and

greatly quickened and strengthened. May we sympathize more with each others' wants and joys, and by our love to the brethren know that we belong to the household of faith.

Strengthen us hereby also for all the sacrifices, self-denial, labours, firmness, love, patience, forbearance, and persevering zeal of the Christian life, that having partaken of this heavenly food, we may go to all our duties refreshed and invigorated for all our appointed work.

We pray for a full blessing on the ministers appointed over us and all thy people, and on all the congregations that gather together in thy name. May great grace be upon them all, and the Lord Jesus be magnified this day in the conversion and edification of a countless multitude who shall be his in the day when he makes up his jewels. Hear us for his name's sake.

CXXXVIII.

LORD'S DAY EVENING.

AFTER COMMUNION.

O thou that dwellest in the highest heavens, before whom the heavenly hosts are worshipping, and with devout adoration crying out, Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts, worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power and riches and wisdom and strength and honour and glory and blessing: we too would join our feeble praises to them. We would now

unite with them, saying, Thou art worthy to receive all blessing and honour and glory, for thou wast slain and hast redeemed us to God by thy blood, out of every kindred and tongue and people and nation: all glory be to thee.

O Lord, we thank thee that thou hast not this day dealt with us as we deserved, and that thou hast passed over, through our great High Priest, the iniquity of our holy things. We praise thee for the good hope in Jesus, that our services, imperfect as they are, are accepted of thee, and that the prayers which we have offered up shall be answered.

O give unto us all the good things which we have been this day asking of thee, accept the sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving which has been offered in thy house and at thy table, and write upon our hearts the truths of thy holy word which we have this day heard.

Give especially the full blessing of thy holy communion to those of us who have been to the holy table of the Lord. May we abide in Christ more entirely, and may he dwell in our hearts by faith, and may we be rooted and grounded in love. May the spirit of this holy communion remain with us. May our repentance be made more deep and intense; may the dying love of Christ be brought out before us in more vivid and impressive colours; may we feel that our weary and heavy-laden souls, approaching to him, shall find true rest, and that he is the sure

and full propitiation for all our sins. Give us more of his Spirit, of ardent, forbearing, self-sacrificing, costly, laborious, humble and persevering love,—a love not of words only, but of deeds; a love ready for toil and pain and suffering, and yet free and cheerful, even to the unworthy and ungrateful. Feeling this love of Jesus to us, may we join in spirit the angelic song, and sing, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good-will towards men.

O Lord, seeing thou art our God by covenant engagements and immutable promises, and thou art ever near to us and present with us, grant us grace ever to seek thy face, and to walk with thee, to live as in thy sight, and to do thy will.

And as solemn communion-vows now rest upon such of us as have been to thy table, may we remember that it would have been better not to have vowed, than, having vowed, not to perform. May we neither repent of the vows nor be slack in the performance of them. Assist us hereafter to go through all our daily duties under the constraining influence of thy love.

And bless all our fellow-communicants at thy table and our fellow-worshippers in thy house, and prosper thy word wherever it has this day been preached, to the conversion, healing, sanctifying and strengthening of multitudes of precious souls, and to the glory of thy great name.

O when shall the day arrive when all the ends

of the world shall remember the Saviour's sufferings and turn to thee, and all the kindreds of the nations worship before thee, and know that the kingdom is the Lord's, and he is the governor among the nations. Hasten the happy time, for our Redeemer's sake.

CXXXIX.

BEFORE COMMUNION ON THE LORD'S DAY.

(To be added to the usual Family Prayer.)

LORD'S DAY MORNING.

O Lord our God, who hast told us that the cup of blessing which we bless is the communion of the blood of Christ, and that the bread which we break is the communion of the body of Christ, and who hast called us by a solemn command to do this in remembrance of thee, we beseech thee to give a special blessing to those members of our family who hope this day to partake of the Lord's supper. O may Christ manifest himself to us there, as he does not to the world. May we find of a truth that he receiveth sinners and eateth with them. May we have joy and peace in him, which the world can neither give nor take away, and may this joy be our strength. We entreat thee to grant that this thine ordinance this day may be very quickening and reviving to our souls; may our corruptions be mortified by the death of Christ, and may all Christian

graces be imparted and increased, while remembering his dying love at his table. O hear us, for his name's sake.

CXL.

MARRIAGE IN A FAMILY.

O thou blessed Saviour, who didst work thy first miracle at a marriage, and hast declared in thy word, that marriage is honourable in all, and hast set it before us as signifying the great mystery of the union between thee and thy church, we earnestly unite in prayer together for a blessing,—that full blessing from the Lord, which maketh rich and addeth no sorrow with it,—on this marriage in our family. God Almighty grant to both thy servants all temporal and spiritual good, and let this be a union full of spiritual advantage and mutual comfort and edification. May the husband love his wife, as Christ loved the church; may the wife submit to the husband as unto the Lord, and may fresh and full views of all the oneness, grace and loving-kindness there is betwixt Christ and his people, be continually thus opened to them, and daily may they become more and more like him. O hear us, for our Redeemer's sake.

CXLI.

THANKSGIVING AFTER CHILD-BIRTH.

Blessed be the Lord, who has inclined his ear to us and heard the voice of our prayer. Gracious is the Lord and righteous; yea, our God is merciful. As a family, we render unfeigned thanksgiving unto thee for thy tender mercy in carrying her, at the head of this family, safely through the trying hour of child-birth, and for sparing and preserving both mother and infant. O how great is thy goodness; how multiplied are thy mercies day by day. We would, in the sorrows of bringing forth children, learn our fallen state and the evil of sin, and in deliverance from those sorrows and the joy of a living child born into the world, we would see thy goodness. We desire also to be led by this birth to remember that Child who is born and that Son who is given, through whom cometh salvation, not only from temporal danger but from eternal ruin, if we continue in faith, and charity, and holiness, with sobriety. O Lord, may we pay our vows unto thee in the presence of all thy people, and may thy mercies constrain us to present ourselves a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable unto thee, which is our reasonable service, through Jesus our Redeemer.

CXLII.

The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away, help us, O our God, to say from the heart—The will of the Lord be done, blessed be the name of the Lord. We thank thee that Jesus himself, by weeping at the grave of Lazarus, has sanctified tears of sorrow. We thank thee that Jesus himself, by praying “If it be possible, let this cup pass from me,” has sanctified desires for the removal of our sorrows; but give us, like him, also to say from the heart, The cup which my Father hath given me, shall I not drink it? not my will, but thine be done. Preserve us then, we beseech thee, from all murmuring and repining thoughts; enable us to glorify thee in this great trial. May patience have its perfect work in us at this time. May we discern why this affliction has visited our family, and each be humbled for his own sins in thy sight. May we have entire confidence in thy wisdom and love, and be assured that all shall work for good, and may all thy design in this affliction be accomplished in each of us, through Jesus our Redeemer.

CXLIII.

PUBLIC FAST-DAY.

O Lord, who hast given such plain commands, for thy people in times of national chastisement, to sanc-

tify a fast, call a solemn assembly, gather the people, sanctify the congregation, assemble the elders, gather the children, and those that suck the breasts; we desire grace of thee to join with our whole hearts in the humiliation of this day. We beseech thee to grant that we may turn unto thee with all our heart, and with fasting, and with weeping, and with mourning, and rend our hearts, and turn unto thee, the Lord, who art gracious and merciful, and slow to anger, and of great kindness, and repentest of the evil.

O Lord, we acknowledge our deep national sinfulness as justly causing thy righteous displeasure. We have been full of pride and high-mindedness, boasting and vain-glory, covetousness and earthly-mindedness, neglectful of the poor, and murmuring against the rich, lovers of the world and lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God, and therefore these evils have come upon us. O may we break off our sins by righteousness, and our iniquities by showing mercy to the poor, if it may be the healing of our disorders and the lengthening of our tranquillity.

CLXXXI.

FOR ALL THE MINISTERS OF CHRIST.

Thou hast said, Declare thou, that thou mayest be justified; we do put thee in remembrance, we do call upon thee to pardon our sins; that, filled with the sense of thy pardoning love, we may with singleness of aim seek thy glory and do thy

will, deny ourselves, take up our cross and follow thee. And now unto him who has washed us and cleansed us from our sins in his own blood, who has prepared a glorious kingdom for us, and made us kings and priests unto God and his Father, unto him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.

CCV.

FOR EARNESTNESS IN RELIGION.

O thou, who hast commanded us to give diligence to make our calling and election sure, give unto us holy zeal and earnestness in serving thee. Is it a slight thing, O Lord, to come out of a world lying in wickedness, to obtain salvation, to escape eternal wrath, and to win eternal glory? Oh awaken our slumbering souls, let us not by a spirit of trifling and levity fall short of this eternal glory. Thou hast told us the ruin of those who make light of thy gospel; thou hast told us, straight is the gate, and narrow is the way that leadeth unto life; oh, work in us then mightily according to thine own power; teach us to use that holy violence by which the kingdom of heaven is taken by force; the straight gate being set before us, may we press into it; may we hunger and thirst after righteousness, and desire spiritual blessings, with the same eager thirst with which men desire that which is absolutely necessary for their bodies. Hear us for his sake whose strength is made perfect in our weakness.

CCVI.

FOR LOVE TO GOD AND HIS PEOPLE.

Oh Lord, our heavenly Father, whose loving-kindness to us is from everlasting to everlasting, we may indeed say thou hast dealt bountifully with thy servants, only let our hearts answer to thine own full and overflowing thoughts of wisdom and love to us. Shed abroad, by the Holy Ghost, thy love in our hearts. Deliver us from the misery of selfishness, and teach us not to live to ourselves, but to him who loved us, even so that he spared not his own Son for us. Let our love to Jesus be fervent, like hers whose many sins were forgiven, and who loved much, and like that of Paul after his conversion. And grant, Lord, that we may love all our brethren in Christ with a pure heart fervently, and that the love of thy people towards each other may increase more and more. May we joy in the thought that there is one God and Father of us all, and that all we are brethren. Hasten that Philadelphian state of thy church when it shall every where be said, See how these Christians love one another! The Lord make us to increase and abound in love one towards another, and towards all men, and thus establish our hearts unblameable in holiness before thee, O God, even our Father, at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ with all his saints. Amen.

CCVII.

THANKS FOR FAMILY LOVE, AND PRAYER FOR ITS
INCREASE AND ABOUNDING TO ALL MEN.

O our God, if we have been comforts to each other in times past, all praise and glory be to thee. Make us far more than hitherto, in times to come mutual blessings. The fountain of thy grace is exhaustless, O may we more and more be the means of conveying it to each other. Whether we be united or separated in body, may we be more closely bound by the ties of Christian affection, and all the tender bonds of faithful love. Knowing that there is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, oh let not one among us forsake the Father of mercies or despise thy grace; but may we all walk in the ways of holiness here, that we may reach thy heavenly kingdom hereafter. O Lord, make us to increase and abound in love one toward another, and toward all men, according to the love of the first disciples, and establish our hearts unblameable in holiness before thyself at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ with all his saints. Amen.

CCVIII.

FOR CHRISTIAN GRACES.

Almighty Father, who hast in thy word called us to be partakers of the mind that was in Christ

Jesus, and to put on, as the elect of God, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, long-suffering, forbearing and forgiving one another, even as Christ forgave us, and above all to put on charity; we entreat together from thee grace thus to adorn thy gospel and glorify thy name day by day. Work in us to will, and work in us to do of thy good pleasure, that we may work out our own salvation with fear and trembling. O may all those dispositions which our divine Lord has pronounced to be blessed, be imparted to us. Give us poverty of spirit, mourning for sin, meekness of spirit, hungering and thirsting after righteousness, mercifulness and purity in heart; may we be peacemakers, and if persecuted for righteousness' sake may we rejoice and be glad. Thus may we be truly the salt of the earth, and the light of the world, and a real blessing to all around us. But, O Lord, our hearts are so full by nature of all that is opposite to the mind of Christ, and so evil and selfish, so proud and vain, that nothing but thine own Holy Spirit can deliver us from the pollution and slavery of sin, and produce this thine own holy likeness in us. O grant then that we with open face may behold, as in a glass, the glory of the Lord, and be changed into the same image from glory to glory, by the Spirit of the Lord, through Jesus our Redeemer.

CCIX.

PRAYER AGAINST OUR SPIRITUAL ENEMIES.

O Lord, thou knowest that we have great and mighty enemies. We have a heart of fearful wickedness within, O teach us to subdue the lusts of the flesh, and bring forth the fruits of the Spirit. An insnaring world is around us, teach us to know its snares, of which we are so ignorant; and since thou hast said, This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith, O give us this conquering faith. Teach us above all not to be ignorant of the devices of Satan, our cruel, real, hateful foe, who is always striving to drag us to destruction. Thou knowest, Lord, where this great enemy of our souls has any peculiar advantage over us. As thou didst pray for Peter, so that his faith failed not, watch over, guard and keep us that we too may not fail. Oh give us the shield of faith to quench his fiery darts, and make us more than conquerors through him who hath loved us. Bruise Satan under our feet shortly, and give unto us a new song of praise and thanksgiving. And when we fall, for there is no man that sinneth not, may we experience the peculiar faithfulness and tenderness which thou showest unto thy backsliding children, and know the truth of the promise, "I will heal their backslidings, I will love them freely, for mine anger is turned away from them." Hear us for Christ's sake.

CCX.

ON RECEIVING INJURIES FROM OTHERS.

Merciful Parent, God of all grace, we come before thee with the joyful assurance that we are approaching One of infinite wisdom, almighty power, holy love, and unfailing goodness and compassion. Man, we find by our own experience, ever fails in some points; O may we be led, the more we see of human weakness, waywardness, hardness and unkindness, to cease from man, whose breath is in his nostrils, and to delight in the glory of our God. And if others do us evil, may we have that especial grace from thee which leads us to seek to overcome evil with good. May we live in the Spirit, and walk after the Spirit. May we remember our own many and great and oft-repeated offences against thee, and thy free and renewed and full forgiveness of all in Christ Jesus. May we follow the example of thy forgiving love, who for Christ's sake hast forgiven us. O let not our hearts dwell, Lord, here below, fixed on the cares and troubles of this lower world, but may we live in the light of thy love and be daily more and more prepared for thy coming glory. Enable us to rise above the clouds of this world, to the glorious sunshine of that eternal love which thou hast revealed to us, and in which we hope to dwell with thee for ever, through Jesus our Redeemer.

CCXI.

PRAYER FOR PATIENCE.

O Lord, who seest our sad impatience and fretfulness when disturbed by any thing that crosses and goes contrary to us, have mercy upon us, and pardon our great sinfulness. O help us to learn of Jesus who was meek and lowly in heart, that we may find rest to our souls. May we thus walk worthy of our calling, in all lowliness and meekness, with long-suffering, forbearing one another in love, endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. In our patience may we possess our souls, and let that patience have its perfect work, that we may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing. Give us grace to remember that the servant of the Lord must not strive, but be gentle to all men, patient, and in meekness instructing those that oppose themselves, showing all meekness to all men. Give us this Christ-like and humble spirit, to the glory of thy great name, and the daily peace and comfort of ourselves and all around us, through Jesus our Redeemer.

CCXII.

TO BE DELIVERED FROM COVETOUSNESS.

Give us, Lord, full confidence in thee, not only for present mercy, but for all that is to come; thus let our conversation be without covetousness. May we

all remember thy solemn charge to take heed of covetousness, for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesses. Give us a large heart for thee and for thy cause, and so may we be rich towards God. Let us be content with such things as thou hast given us, and let us trust in thy gracious promise that thou wilt never leave us, wilt never forsake us. And not only let us trust thee in temporal things, but as regards our eternal interests also, may we believe that thy sheep shall never perish, neither shall any pluck them out of thy hand. Thus enable us, O our God, to be careful for nothing, but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let our requests be made known unto thee, for our Redeemer's sake, who, though Lord of all, for our sakes became poor, that we through his poverty might be rich.

CCXIII.

FOR GRACE TO WALK IN THE PATH OF DUTY.

Enable us, Lord, to fulfil our duties to thee and to each other. May we know that the path of duty is the path of happiness; make us quick to discern it, and bold and steadfast to pursue it. Knowing that the Lord is our helper, and that thou art the rewarder of all them that diligently seek thee, may we go on fearlessly in a straightforward course, seeking thy glory; but may we never in the boldness of the true disciples of Christ forget the humility and meekness

which becomes us. May we give up and mortify all our self-wisdom, self-will, and self-righteousness, and be ever ready to concede to others, where concession does not interfere with the glory of our Saviour; looking to him who pleased not himself, but endured the contradiction of sinners, and so attained the joy set before him. Hear us for his name's sake.

CCXIV.

FOR GRACE TO CONFESS THE TRUTH.

We thank thee, Lord, for the many precious promises of thy word, and for the assurance,—I will never leave thee nor forsake thee. May we, trusting in this, boldly say, The Lord is my helper, I will not fear what man can do unto me. Preserve us, we beseech thee, from being ashamed of the gospel of Christ. May we know that it is the power of God unto salvation. May we be valiant for thy truth, and never fear to speak it with boldness; but make us at the same time meek and humble, as those whose sins have been pardoned by the blood of Christ, for his sake. Amen.

CCXV.

FOR LIKE-MINDEDNESS TO CHRIST.

Lord, thou hast said, "Ask, and ye shall have, seek, and ye shall find, knock, and it shall be opened unto you." In full confidence that what is spoken

in thy word shall be fulfilled in those counterparts of thy word, thy works of providence and grace; we ask for thy Spirit, and for faith and love. More especially we pray for the image of Christ, that his meekness, gentleness, holiness, patience, zeal, and every other lovely part of the Saviour's character may be inscribed upon our hearts, may direct our words, and be manifest in our actions. Thou hast said, "If any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his;" O give us the spirit of the Saviour. May we abide in him like the branch in the vine, that we may derive from him strength, support, and beauty, and bring forth much fruit. Hear our prayer for his name's sake. Amen.

CCXVI.

FOR GRACE TO FOLLOW THE EXAMPLE OF A
SUFFERING SAVIOUR.

O Lord, who hast shown many wonders of love in creation and providence, yet none so wondrous as the history of the sufferings of thy beloved Son, give us to know more of his love and patience, and may we learn from him patiently to receive whatever strokes our heavenly Father may send as the chastisement of our sins. May we remember that we are called as his disciples to suffer for well doing, and that it is a privilege and happiness to suffer for his sake. And may we copy not only the meekness and gentleness of Jesus, but his true and holy zeal.

May we remember how great was the burden of our sins that lay upon him, and yet how being strong in the Lord, he endured even to the end. O teach us that the fountain of his eternal strength is open to us also, and may we yield to no temptation, but be delivered from the fear of our enemies, and fight manfully under his banner against the world, the flesh, and the Devil. May we know that Jesus is the same yesterday, to-day, and for ever; that the good Shepherd is watching with tender care over his sheep in the wilderness of this world; that he walks in the midst of the golden candlesticks, and is with us every hour in the fulness of his dying love, the riches of his grace, and the depth of his heavenly wisdom; and so may we be strengthened to endure joyfully his cross in the way to his eternal joy, for his name's sake.

CCXVII.

FOR HOLINESS.

O holy, holy, holy Lord God Almighty, who hast commanded us to be holy, for thou art holy, and hast assured us that without holiness no man shall see the Lord, we, thy sinful creatures, whose hearts are deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked, come together to thy mercy-seat to obtain mercy and to find grace to help in time of need. Help us, we beseech thee, to come out and be separate from an evil world, and not to touch the unclean

thing. Help us to believe thy loving-kindness in redeeming us from all iniquity, and pardoning all our sins, and in assuring us that thou wilt receive us and be a Father unto us. Having these promises, O may we cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and of the spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of the Lord. Write these thy laws in our hearts, we beseech thee. O thou very God of peace, sanctify us wholly, and grant our whole spirit, soul, and body, may be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

CCXVIII.

FOR HOPE.

O God of hope, fill us with all joy and peace in believing, that we may abound in hope, through the power of the Holy Ghost. May we know that when Christ shall appear we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is; and may we hope to the end, for the grace which is to be brought unto us at the revelation of Jesus Christ. Amidst all the delay of our hope, may we still continue to expect and quietly wait for thy salvation, knowing that we are saved by hope, and if we hope for that we see not, then do we with patience wait for it. Give us then, we beseech thee, this sure anchor of the soul and this helmet of our salvation, that we may be preserved steadfast, immoveable, and always abounding in thy work here, till our hope be realized in the full fruition of thy glory in the world to come.

CCXIX.

FOR JOY AND PEACE IN BELIEVING.

O thou who hast called us always to rejoice and in every thing to give thanks: we know, O Lord, that thou art our God, our Father, and our portion, and that we are each exactly in those circumstances which thou dost in thy deep wisdom see best for us. May we then glorify thee by joy and peace in believing. Thou hast commanded us to rejoice; give what thou dost command, and then command what thou wilt. May this joy be our daily strength for every duty. And O that thou wouldest also grant that our joy and peace may be the means of bringing others unto thee. May they say, We will go with you, for the Lord is with you. Enable us to say unto them, as Moses did unto Hobab, Come with us, and we will do thee good; for the Lord hath spoken good concerning Israel. Hear us for Christ's sake,

CCXX.

FOR PREPARATION FOR THE COMING OF CHRIST.

Give unto us, O Lord, a simple faith in the testimony of thine own word, and a real expectation of those great, awful, and blessed events which are coming upon the world. May we know that thou comest speedily; may we watch the signs of the times, and prepare for thy return. Teach us how

overwhelming to our earthly sight, our timorous hearts, our sin-burdened consciences, would be any glimpse of that glory which thou art preparing for us, that we may seek to have our sins cleansed in the blood of the Saviour, and our hearts filled with that perfect love which casteth out fear, that we may be more and more prepared to stand in thy holy presence. O grant us such grace, that when thou dost come and knock, we may be ready to open unto thee, to dwell for ever with thee, and for ever behold the glory of the Lord. Hear us for thy great name's sake.

CCXXI.

PRESERVATION FROM THE PECULIAR ERRORS OF
THESE TIMES.

O Lord, thou God of all truth and holiness, who hast charged us not to believe every spirit, seeing that many false prophets are gone out into the world, but to try the spirits whether they are of God, give us grace to prove all things by thy law and testimony, and to hold fast that which is good. Preserve thou us from every unclean spirit, whether of infidelity, or lawlessness, or Popery, or any other false spirit which comes out of the mouth of the dragon, or of the beast, or of the false prophet.* May we constantly be looking for the coming of Christ, and know perfectly that the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night. Grant us grace to watch and

keep our garments undefiled. Do thou clothe us with the heavenly armour of light, and give us well-grounded assurance that we are not appointed unto wrath, but to obtain salvation by our Lord Jesus Christ. O may we keep the word of thy patience, and so be kept by thee from the hour of temptation which shall come upon all the world to try them that dwell on the earth. O hear us, for our Redeemer's sake.

CCXXII.

PRESERVATION FROM THE SPECIAL TEMPTATIONS OF THESE TIMES.

O merciful Father, who hast warned us that in the last days perilous times shall come, we mourn before thee that we have in our days so many sad tokens of these times. We entreat thee earnestly so to grant us thy grace that none of us, no not one, may be found among those who are lovers of themselves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, without natural affection, truce-breakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good, traitors, heady, high-minded, lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God, having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof. May we ever turn away from such, and continue in the things which we have learned and been assured of. Enlighten us by the holy scriptures, given by thy inspiration, which are able to make us wise unto salvation

through faith in Jesus Christ, and profitable for doctrine, reproof, correction and instruction in righteousness; and enable us to hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering, and thus thoroughly furnish us unto all good works, through the same Lord Jesus, our Redeemer.

CCXXIII.

THAT THE HOPE OF COMMUNION WITH ANGELS
IN GLORY MAY QUICKEN US TO PRESENT OBE-
DIENCE.

O Lord, who hast caused all holy scriptures to be written for our learning, that we by patience and comfort of the scripture might have hope, lead us by the accounts given in thy word of the appearance of angels in thine earthly temple, and of their ministering to the heirs of salvation, to look forward to the day when thou shalt appear in thy glory, with all thy holy angels. They that minister unto thee shall then be ten thousand times ten thousand, and thousands of thousands; and we praise together and bless thy holy name that thou givest us the hope that when we are raised up in glory we shall be equal unto the angels, being the children of God, even the children of the resurrection. That we may attain this glory, may we now choose the way of thy commandments, may we now live by faith, and be a people made ready for the Lord; may we forsake the vain pleasure of the world, and being

filled with joy and peace in believing, may we serve thee here with reverence and fear, that we may be fitted to serve thee with unbroken joy and delight in thy temple above, for Jesus' sake. Amen.

CCXXIV.

FOR GRACE TO REALIZE THE PRESENCE AND LOVE
OF CHRIST.

May we think, O Jesus, on thine ever watchful providence, and remember that nothing, however small, that concerns us, escapes thy notice, that thus we may feel that we have an ever-present, ever-gracious friend. Give us too to know that it is a crucified Saviour who is thus present with us, he who loved us unto death, who gave his life's blood for us. Grant, O Saviour, that when we read of all thy sufferings, and of thy tender love and care for thy first disciples, our love to thee may grow more warm, more fervent, more true, and more sincere. O may we love thee and keep thy words, and thus obtain the promise that the Father will love us, and thou, O Jesus, with thy Father, wilt come unto us and abide with us. Hear us for thine own name's sake. Amen.

CCXXV.

FOR GRACE TO REALIZE THE UNCHANGEABLENESS
OF CHRIST.

O Jesus, who art the same yesterday, to-day, and for ever, teach us to know how unchangeable thou

art in thy glorious nature as the Son of God, and as the Son of man, still wearing our form upon thy throne of glory, and about to come again in that form once more to bless our earth. Teach us by blessed experience the unchangeableness of thine offices of love; still as Immanuel be with us, as our Prophet teach us, as our Priest plead for us, as our King rule over us, as Jesus, save and deliver us from our sins. Oh may the ever-enduring power of thy salvation be our stay and comfort; though we be vile as the expiring thief, stubborn as the hardened Jews, blind as the unbelieving Gentiles, may the same mighty power which saved them, ransom and deliver us. And as we read in thy holy word of each instance of thy goodness, may we delight in the thought that thy mercy and tenderness are still the same, thy love an unbroken stream which shall but widen as it flows, till the whole earth be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea. Never, Lord, let the sinful chains of custom, the deadening influence of an unbelieving world, or the secret unbelief of our own hearts hide from us the blessed truth that Jesus is the same yesterday, to-day, and for ever. Since thou art the same mighty Lord, whose glory the prophet beheld, and cried, "Wo is me for I am unclean, a man of unclean lips," may we never approach thee but with deep reverence and godly fear, since thou art ever united to us, bone of our bone, and flesh of our flesh. May

we now by faith carry on a blessed interchange of communion with thee, till we see thee as thou art, and know as we are known.

GRACE BEFORE MEALS.

O Lord, bless this provision for our use, and make us truly thankful, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Or this:

Thou givest us, O Lord, all things richly for enjoyment, and whether we eat or drink, or whatever we do, may we do all to thy glory, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

GRACE AFTER MEALS.

We thank thee, O Father, who hast given us our meat in due season. May we live to thy praise through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Or this:

Blessed be our God, who daily loadeth us with his benefits, for all his goodness to us through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

COMMENCEMENT OF PRAYER.

Lord, teach us to pray.

LORD'S PRAYER.

(At the beginning or end of the Family Prayers.)

Our Father which art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in

earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil; for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

CONCLUSION OF PRAYERS.

Rom. xvi. 27. To God only wise, be glory, through Jesus Christ, for ever. Amen.

1 Tim. vi. 16. To whom be honour and power everlasting. Amen.

Jude 25. To the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen.

Ephes. iii. 20, 21. Unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we can ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, to him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus, throughout all ages, world without end. Amen.

CONCLUDING BLESSINGS.

The peace of God be with you all, now and evermore.

Or,

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Ghost, be with us all evermore. Amen.

Or,

The Lord bless you and keep you.

The Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you.

The Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace.

Or,

The God of love and peace be with you.

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
