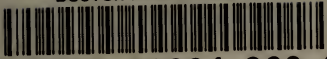

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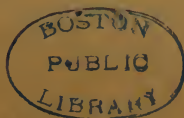

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PREFACE

THERE are many distinct groups of Parkers, whose relationship is remote and obscure. The Saybrook group, well-defined in its development, is the only one dealt with in this pamphlet; and this is not treated with any completeness, but simply so as to show forth to my children and theirs the derivation of our household from *William Parker* of Hartford and Saybrook, and to indicate some of the lines in which the family has branched out. No attempt is made to follow out the lines formed by marriages of the Parker women into other families, such as the Chapmans, Pratts, Pecks, Bushnells, Buckingham, etc., etc.

I have inserted some account of my grandmother, Mary (Peck) Parker, showing her direct descent from Henry Peck of New Haven. I have appended a sketch of my mother's derivation, taken from the "Pond Genealogy." The names in **THIS TYPE** show the line of *direct* descent to my own family. The asterisk (*) indicates that the name thus marked is carried forward for fuller treatment.

When I began this work of tracing our ancestry, nothing was known of my Parker progenitors beyond the fact that my Grandfather James was born at Saybrook in 1764. As no traces of him or of his parents could be found in or about Saybrook, my task seemed hopeless. But gradually and unexpectedly clues were found. Church, probate, and town records and old graveyards disclosed important secrets; old letters gave the dead a voice wherewith to speak and discover themselves; aged people contributed in-

valuable recollections; and, in due time, the missing links were found, and the entire chain was completed.

My great-grandfather, Matthew, with all his household, removed from Saybrook to Sharon, Conn., in 1773. About 1789 he removed to Cornwall, Vt., tarrying briefly at Clarendon by the way. In Sharon the lost links were unearthed.

I am greatly indebted to Francis H. Parker, Esq., of Hartford; who has kindly permitted me to examine and make use of his manuscript records.

I am neither surprised nor sorry to find that "my own people" in the generations past have been plain, humble folk, though by no means lacking in intelligence and influence. The records show that, as a rule, they have been industrious, intelligent, and religious.

WILLIAM PARKER

Of Hartford and Saybrook

William Parker came from England; perhaps with Thomas Wiggin, in the autumn of 1633, in the ship *James*, to Dover, N. H., and thence with William Whiting.

In 1633 "the Bristol men had sold their interest in Piscataqua to the Lords Say and Brooke, George Wyllys, and William Whiting, who continued Thomas Wiggin their agent." ("Memorial History Hartford County," vol. 1, page 269.) He was an original proprietor of Hartford, 1636; his home-lot in 1639 was on the west side of the "road from Seth Grant's to Centinel Hill," now Trumbull Street. (Ibid.) About 1649 he removed to Saybrook, where he was a large land-holder, having also much land in Hebron acquired by will from one Joshua, third son of Uncas. In the division of upland in East Hartford, in 1666, he received thirty-six acres of land, which he sold to William Pitkin and William Goodwin. In the division of land, 1674, on west side of Hartford, his share was sold to Thomas and Samuel Olcott. He probably served in the Pequot war, for in 1673, soon after numerous grants to Pequot soldiers, 100 acres of land were granted to his son William, confirming a prior grant that had "slipt recording." He filled several town offices, was frequently a member of important town committees, and was Deputy to the General Court at the special session of 1652, at the May sessions, 1679 and 1681, and at the October sessions of 1678, 1679, 1680, and 1681.

About 1636 he married MARGERY ———, who was probably a ward or relative of William Whiting, as he left

her ten pounds in his will. She died Dec. 6, 1680. He married for a second wife, prior to 1682, Elizabeth Pratt, widow of Lieut. William Pratt.

He died at Saybrook, Dec. 28, 1686. In all the records of his day he appears as one of the four or five chief men of Saybrook town. Of his parentage, birthplace, or relation to other New England settlers of his name, nothing is certainly known.

Of these children, the first Joseph, Jonathan, and Debora died early. Of Sarah, Ruth, Margaret, and David I shall give account for one generation only, and then proceed with the three brothers, John, William, and Joseph.

SARAH PARKER, eldest daughter of William and Margery, born in Hartford a “little before Michaelmas,” 1637, married in 1662 Joseph Peck, youngest son of Deacon William Peck—one of the early settlers of New Haven. They were probably married by his brother, Rev. Jeremiah Peck, minister of church at Saybrook from 1661 to 1665. In 1672 Joseph Peck and his wife removed to Lyme, where he was a citizen of importance. He was Ensign of Train-band, Justice of Peace, Town Clerk, Deacon of Church, and a Deputy to General Court for twenty-six sessions. He died in 1718, aged 77. His wife died in 1726, nearly 90 years of age. Their descendants are very numerous, and many of them have been distinguished. (See “Peck Genealogy,” page 395.) It is noteworthy that whereas, in 1662, Sarah Parker married Joseph Peck, son of Dea. William of New Haven, James Parker, her father’s great-great-grandson, in 1790 married Mary Peck, a descendant from Dea. William Peck’s brother Henry.

MARGARET, daughter of William and Margery Parker, born at Saybrook about 1650, married in 1671 Joseph Pratt, son of Lieut. William and Elisabeth (Clark) Pratt, but died before 1686, in which year Joseph Pratt married Sarah Chapman. ("Saybrook Records," vol. 3, p. 289; vol. 4, p. 368; vol. 3, pp. 539, 540; vol. 3, p. 536.)

DAVID, son of William and Margery Parker, born at Saybrook, Feb., 1656, served in the Indian wars in his youth, and received in 1678 five acres of land from the town of Saybrook for services "out of town." He was severely wounded, and felt the effects of his wound through life, as would appear from the action of the General Court

in 1682 exempting him from certain pecuniary liabilities. He had no children, and died in 1723. In his will he gave to the church at Saybrook eight rods square of land to set a meeting-house on, and also land "for the use, behoof, and advantage of an orthodox, dissenting ministry in Saybrook Old Society." ("Guilford Prob. Rec.," vol. 1, pp. 101-110.)

THE LINE OF JOHN FOR SEVERAL GENERATIONS.

JOHN, son of William and Margery Parker, was born at Hartford, Feb. 1, 1641-2. He was regarded as a proprietor at Saybrook, and given 100 pounds accommodation. He was a man of much activity and influence in town affairs. He was Deputy to General Court at May sessions of 1686, 1688, and 1700, and at October sessions 1699 and 1700. A large landholder at Saybrook and Hebron. Appointed gunner and master of the great artillery at Saybrook Fort, Nov. 30, 1683, and had charge of the fort during Andros's régime.

He married, Dec. 24, 1666, *Mary Buckingham*, daughter of Thomas, settler of Milford, and sister of Rev. Thomas S., Pastor of Saybrook Church in 1670. He had title of Lieutenant. He died at Saybrook, 1706.

JOHN,² son of Lieut. John and Mary (Buckingham) Parker, born Oct. 6, 1667, served as constable, 1694, and was one of the first to act as attorney at-law under the law of 1708. He married, Dec. 11, 1690, *Mary Jones*, daughter of Lieut. Samuel and Mary (Bushnell) Jones, and died at Norwich, Dec. 24, 1709.

EBENEZER, son of John¹ and Mary (Buckingham) Parker, born Aug. 18, 1674: shipbuilder and sea captain; married, Sept. 3, 1694, *Mary Smith*. He lived as late as 1730.

ABNER, Capt., son of Ebenezer and Mary (Smith) Parker, born May 14, 1697; was a sea captain, and also Deacon of the church; made chart of Saybrook harbor and its entrance; a very vigorous and prominent man. He married, Jan. 9, 1722, *Abigail Pratt*.

Their children were: (1) *Samuel*, born Jan. 21, 1723; (2) *Abner*, born Sept. 27, 1724, married *Keturah Nott* in 1749, and died without sons, 1756; (3) *Reuben*, born June 5, 1726; (4) *Gideon*, born April 26, 1728, married *Sarah Lay*; had children: Samuel, 1755, Sarah, and Temperance; died 1760; (5) *Abigail*, 1730; (6) *Sarah*, 1732; (7) *Isabel*, 1734; (8) *Ebenezer*, 1736.

Samuel, the eldest of these, married *Abigail Dennison*, lived in Essex, and died in 1811. His wife died in 1802.

LINE OF WILLIAM.¹

WILLIAM² PARKER, Deacon, son of William¹ and Margery Parker, was born in 1645; married, first, Cora —, about 1672, and afterwards *Lydia Brown*, Sept. 7, 1676. She died in 1728. He died Aug. 20, 1725. His will, probated in Guilford, Jan. 15, 1725-6, gives bequests to his wife Lydia, to his brother Joseph, to "cousins" Joseph and Jonathan, and to his granddaughter.

His son *William*³, born Jan. 15, 1673, never married. His daughter *Lydia*, born Feb. 13, 1690, married Wm. Gilbert, and they had daughter *Lydia*, born 1713, who is distinctly mentioned as the only surviving descendant of Dea. William and his wife. ("Guilford Prob. Rec.") She married Capt. John Kirtland of Saybrook. Dea. William Parker was a leading citizen, and very prominent in church and state. He is said to have represented Saybrook as Deputy to the General Court in more sessions than any other person, excepting only Robert Chapman. He was Sergeant in Train-band as early as 1672, and in 1678-9 the town voted him five acres of land for services "out of the town" in the Indian wars. He was elected Deacon before 1687, and probably continued in that office until his death. He was a lay member of the Saybrook Synod of 1708 that framed the "Saybrook Platform" for the churches of Connecticut. Both he and his wife Lydia were buried in the old cemetery at Saybrook, and the following inscriptions can easily be read on their tombstones:

"Here lyeth the Body of Deacon William Parker, who dec^d Aug. y^e 20, 1725, aged 81 years";

and:

"Here lyeth the Body of Mrs. Lydia Parker, y^e wife of Deacon William Parker, who dec^d June y^e 11, 1725, aged 73 years."

LINE OF JOSEPH.

Joseph Parker, son of William¹ and Margery Parker, was born at Saybrook Feb. , 164 $\frac{3}{4}$. He married, first, June 3, 1673, *Hannah Gillbord* (Gilbert), and secondly, *Mary* ———, who survived him. He died in 1725, aged 78 years.

Of these children five — Jonathan first, Sarah and Hannah, and the two Margerys, — died very early. Matthew probably died childless, if not early, for, his father dying intestate, a division of his property was agreed upon by his widow, Mary, his two sons, Joseph and Jonathan, and his daughter, Hannah Lord.

JOSEPH,² son of Joseph¹ and Hannah (Gillbord) Parker, was born at Saybrook, July 3, 1674. He married, April 29, 1705, *Ruth Williams*, and died in 1732, aged about 59 years. His wife died in 1742.

Near the graves of Dea. William Parker and Lydia his wife, in Old Saybrook cemetery, is a well-preserved tombstone, whose legible inscription tells that Hannah Parker (probably the one above) died March, 1791, in the 76th year of her age. She was unmarried, and achieved the distinction of being prosecuted for laughing in church.

In 1770 Esther (wife of Daniel Buel) deeded her share of her father's estate to her brother MATTHEW, then 58 years old.

JONATHAN,² son of Jonathan¹ and Ellinor (Post) Parker, was born Jan. 21, 1710, and died Feb. 7, 1756. He married, April 18, 1732, *Sarah Bushnell*, who died some time before 1763.

Matthew Parker, son of Jonathan¹ and Ellinor (Post) Parker, was born at Saybrook, June 24, 1712. He was a large landholder, as the Saybrook and Guilford Records show. He was named as executor in his father's will, and in the same document his father speaks of him in terms of peculiar confidence and affection, and gives him a large portion of his estate. On July 25, 1739, he married *Edith Hanes* of Flushing, Long Island. She was born in 1723, and died in Cornwall, May 9, 1796, aged 73 years. She was the daughter of a merchant, and at her marriage had a present of a female slave. He died in Cornwall, Vt., Jan. 10, 1800, aged about 88 years. In 1773 Matthew Parker sold out his property in and about Saybrook to a Capt. Buell, and the same year purchased lands in Sharon, Conn., where he settled with his family. There his daughters *Patience* and *Edith* married, lived, and died. He removed about 1789, first to Clarendon, Vt., and shortly after to Cornwall, where,

in their old age, he and his wife rested at length from their wanderings, and were buried in the Old South graveyard of that town, where also their children, Matthew, Jr., and Phebe (Richards) Parker, were buried.

The name of *Matthew Parker* occurs in the list of Sharon householders who were organized for military service in 1776. (See "Record of Conn. Men in War of Revolution," page 611.)

In the difficult task of tracing this, my great-grandfather, I was assisted and succeeded by examining church, land, and probate records in Saybrook; Sharon, and Cornwall, and by family records of Mrs. A. C. Hooker of Middlebury, and of my grandfather James's sister, Edith (Somers) Parker, whose family Bible came into my hands in a remarkable way.

PATIENCE PARKER, daughter of Matthew¹ and Edith (Hanes) Parker, was born in Saybrook, April 21, 1749; married *Elias Woodruff*, and died in Sharon, Conn., Sept. 27, 1782. Her grave, as well as that of her husband and her sister Edith, is distinctly marked in the Sharon burial-ground.

He married *Sally Strong*, a woman from Massachusetts. In 1791 or 1792 he bought 60 acres of land in Cornwall, Vt., and settled there. He died April 3, 1796. His widow removed to New York State with her eldest son.

Rev. James Parker, son of Matthew¹ and Edith (Hanes) Parker, was born in Saybrook, July 30, 1764. He settled at Cornwall, Vt., in 1789, and built a house there "north of Benj. Sanford, on the west side of the road." He was then a layman, 24 years of age. In 1790, March 4th, he married, in Cornwall, *Mary Peck* of Woodbridge, Conn. (near

New Haven), of whom and her descent I shall presently give an account. In 1798, James Parker was one of two brethren, distinguished for piety, who were chosen deacons of the church at Cornwall. Rev. Benj. Wooster was then pastor. "Matthew's History of Cornwall" says that "James Parker, from Saybrook, Conn., had been much engaged in teaching until 1804, when he commenced preaching and was ordained to the ministry. In this employment he labored with great zeal and efficiency until his death. . . . He had for several years discharged with much faithfulness the office of Deacon in the Congregational Church." He sold his farm at Cornwall in 1804, and the same year began his ministry as Pastor of the new church at Underhill. About 1814 he removed to Enosburgh, Vt., and was Pastor there till 1822. There, 1819, his wife died, and in 1822 he married widow Salome Baker, and removed to Troy, Vt., where he labored until his death, July 5, 1826. During all these years he was engaged in missionary work, and made frequent tours in Northern Vermont, under the auspices of the Missionary Society of Connecticut, in whose "Narrative of Missions" his name frequently appears with warm commendation of his work. He occasionally came to Hartford, Conn., to make his reports. A package of the sermons which he carried in his saddle-bags, on horseback, on his tours, is in the possession of the writer, his grandson. The *Vermont Gazetteer*, by Miss Hemenway, in its history of towns in Northern Vermont, frequently mentions his name, which belongs with those of Wooster, Bushnell, Merrill, Burton, and Parmelee, the pioneer ministers of Vermont. The Rev. Simeon Parmelee says "he was a man of substantial integrity and living piety. His education was limited . . . but he was a devoted man and spiritual preacher. He was companionable, and made himself agreeable in every place, but especially in the pulpit. There was a vein of humor that enlivened his conversation. . . . He was a faithful servant of the Most High God, who preached Christ and lived Him, and left behind him an honorable name."

[In the *Vermont Chronicle* of Feb. 18, 1882, appeared an article written by my father, Rev. Wooster Parker of Bel-

fast, Maine, entitled "*Those Horseback Missionaries of Vermont*," in which, among other things, he gave some account of his father, Rev. James Parker. From that article I copy and condense what follows.]

"Sixty or seventy years ago, the extreme Northern and Northwestern sections of Vermont were comparatively new, and the population was scattered. Few people had carriages, and long journeys were made in the saddle. People went to meeting on horseback, 'and the horses, hitched at the posts and along the fences near the meeting-house, looked much more thoughtful and religious than they do now.' Missionaries went about on horseback with saddle-bags. I had to wait on them when they came to my father's, and while I had no particular dislike of them, I liked their horses. . . . Several of them I knew, or rather, I knew their horses, and I respected them, though in some cases I was so very busy with my chores as to go without my supper, and give them no opportunity to 'talk religion' to me. The one I knew most about and remember best was Rev. James Parker. He lived in Enosburg several years, and there he buried his wife in the summer of 1819. . . . *She was a very positive, pious woman, a real Puritan.* He was strict enough, but always pleasant and often playful. He had that modest piety and that sharp good sense which fitted him to be an excellent missionary in a new country. He preached and labored as a missionary in many of the Northern towns on the west side of the mountain, and he organized many of the churches in the Northeastern part of the State. The people were glad to see him, and though he died at Troy, Vt., in 1826, I should not be surprised if some old Christian men and women were now living in Glover, and Hardwick, and Brownington, and Craftsbury, and other towns, who remember his plain preaching and sharp sayings in their fathers' houses when they were children. . . . He had the tact of talking plainly with all classes of people without offending them, and with children, too, so that they would remember what he said, and be glad to see him again. He used to say 'he could get the old hen if he could catch the chickens.' . . . He was poor . . . respectably, but not always comfortably poor. Nor was he a robust man in health, but his missionary trips operated as a kindly medicine, both with him and with those he visited. With a slight touch of rheumatism, . . . and with a *full load of depression of spirits*, his saddle-bags filled with articles of clothing, that psalm-book, and a package of those finely-written sermons, he would start off on a six weeks tour. That honest old brown horse understood the responsibility of the case, and would fall right into "the missionary gait," as we called it,—a very slow but regular orthodox trot, which was both becoming and easy for the rider."

In the summer of 1891, I visited the town of Enosburgh, Vt., where my grandfather was minister from 1814 to 1822. I saw the house in which he lived, the house in

which his oldest son lived, the meeting-house on the hill which my father saw framed and raised, the grave of my grandmother who died there, and, finally, an aged man who remembered the whole family and used to be my father's playmate.

On his death-bed my grandfather rejoiced that his two sons, Ammi and Wooster, were preparing to be ministers; and to his oldest daughter, who only a few months before had lost her husband, he said this fine thing: "My dear daughter, you will soon have *two* precious promises of God to plead, those given to the *widow* and the *fatherless*."

MARY (PECK) PARKER, wife of Rev. James Parker, was born in Woodbridge, Parish of Bethany, May 17, 1772. She was the eldest of three children of Lieut. Titus Peck and Rebecca his wife. In October, 1776, her father died of camp-distemper, and about eleven years later her mother married David Sperry, widower, and removed with him to Cornwall, Vt. What her mother's maiden name was I cannot, as yet, discover. In Cornwall Mary Peck met and married my grandfather, James Parker, March 4, 1790.

[I can only indicate here the sources whence, with long and patient inquiry, I have gathered the manifold facts which conclusively prove this statement of my grandmother's descent. In the *first* place, family letters and records prove that her mother was a Widow Peck of Woodbridge or Bethany, Conn., whose husband must have died prior to 1787, as about that time she married David Sperry and went with him to Cornwall. The same letters and records show where and when Mary was born and married. *Secondly*: Church Records of Cornwall show that Mary Peck's mother's Christian name was *Rebecca*. *Thirdly*: the Town, Land, and Probate Records of New Haven furnish conclusive evidence that Lieut. Titus Peck, son of Deacon Timothy Peck of Bethany Parish, died in autumn of 1776 (the exact date is Oct. 20, 1776, as shown by his tombstone), leaving a widow, *Rebecca*, and three children, the eldest of which was *Mary*, aged 4 years, born, therefore, in 1772. This correspondence of names, places, and dates points directly to the conclusion that *Mary*, daughter of Titus and Rebecca Peck, born in 1772, whose father died in 1776, is the same Mary Peck, who, born in

1772, and whose mother Rebecca married David Sperry in 1787, and went to Cornwall with him, married James Parker in Cornwall. The Sperry and Peck families were neighbors in Bethany.

Fourthly: The inventory of Lieut. Titus Peck's estate specifies "a small lot of land lying in Lebanon Swamp, 4 acres and 27 rods."

In the division and apportionment of the estate, there was given to Mary, his daughter, "4 acres and 27 rods of land in Lebanon Swamp." This was in 1781. In 1793 (three years after Mary's marriage), James and Mary Parker personally appeared in Woodbridge and conveyed to Samuel Peck a lot of land lying in a place called Lebanon Swamp (Parish of Bethany), containing 4 acres and 27 rods.

A comparison of the above italicized entries proves that the Mary Peck, who, as daughter of Titus and Rebecca Peck, received in 1781, from her father's estate, that 4 acres of land in Lebanon Swamp, is the same Mary Peck who, as wife of James Parker, in 1793, conveyed the identical piece of land to her Uncle Samuel. See Woodbridge Land Rec., Vol. 3, p. 533. N. H. Prob. Rec., Vol. 12, pp. 168, 208, 336. N. H. Land Rec., Vol. 36, p. 388. Prob. Rec., Vol. 13, p. 18.]

The following brief statement of my grandmother, Mary Peck's ancestry, on the paternal side, is taken from the "Peck Genealogy."

(1) *Henry Peck*, brother of William, came from England, and was one of the original settlers of New Haven. His brother's son Joseph married Sarah Parker, daughter of William of Saybrook, in 1662.

(2) *Joseph Peck*, son of Henry, bap. Sept. 5, 1647, married Sarah Alling.

(3) *Samuel Peck*, son of Joseph, born Dec. 29, 1677; married Abigail Hitchcock.

(4) *Timothy Peck*, son of Samuel, born April 5, 1711; married Lydia Lines. He was a prominent and wealthy man, lived in Bethany Parish, deacon of church, died in 1780, and is buried in old graveyard in Bethany, near his son Titus. His children were Timothy, Titus, Roger, Samuel, Caleb, Lydia, Penina, Martha, Mary.

(5) *Titus*, son of Dea. Timothy, born April 7, 1742; married Rebecca —, died Oct. 20, 1776. His children were Mary (my grandmother), Titus, and Rebecca. He was appointed Ensign in Second Regiment by the Colonial Legislature in 1775 (Col. Rec.). His name appears as Ensign of the Third Company of the Fifth Battalion (Wadsworth Brigade), raised in June, 1776, to reinforce Washington's army in New York. ("Rec. Conn. Men in

War of Rev.," p. 406.) He died of camp-distemper, Oct. 20, 1776, and was buried in the old graveyard at Bethany. The following is an exact copy of the inscription yet legible on his tombstone :

"In memory of Lieut. Titus Peck, who lived beloved, and died lamented by his acquaintance, Oct. 20, 1776, in his 55th year."

My grandmother Mary died at Enosburgh, July 25, 1819, in the 53d year of her age, and family letters speak of both her and her mother Rebecca in terms of great praise and affection.

SOPHRONIA, eldest child of Rev. James and Mary (Peck) Parker, was born at Cornwall, Vt., Jan. 8, 1795. She married, Oct. 20, 1816, *Elihu Marvin Royce*, of East Berkshire, Vt., by whom she had three children. After his death she married Marsh Martin of Richmond, Canada East, June, 1837, and there died, May 1, 1841. Her first husband, Elihu M. Royce, was one of the children of Stephen Royce and Minerva (Marvin) Royce, who were married in 1785, and went to Berkshire in 1793. His brother was Stephen, Judge of Superior Court for twenty-five years, and Governor of the State for two years. Both the father and mother were remarkable for ability and character, and Judge Stephen was a singularly strong and pure man. Elihu M., born July

19, 1793, was the first white child born in that settlement, and gave promise of distinction. He died at the age of 33, March 17, 1826.

He was a gentleman of unblemished character and signal abilities. He married, Jan. 23, 1851, *Mary T. Edmunds*, who was born in Derby, Vt., Sept., 1829. He died at St. Albans, April 24, 1891, universally lamented. His wife and three children survive him.

Rev. Wooster Parker, son of Rev. James and Mary (Peck) Parker, was born at Underhill, Vt., May 9, 1807. He was named after Rev. Benjamin Wooster, Pastor at Cornwall, and an intimate friend of his father. He was about seven years old when the family removed to Enosburgh. He worked on the farm, going to school for a part of each season, and finally contrived to go to the academy at St. Albans. (See the sketch of Rev. James Parker for several items of interest.) Having decided to become a minister, he went to Bangor and entered the Seminary there. He once said that "he remained in Bangor because he was too poor to get away." While he was there, Rev. Enoch Pond began his labors as Professor in the Seminary, and gave new life to it. Wooster Parker graduated from Bangor Seminary in 1832, and in September was ordained Pastor of Congregational Church at Castine, Maine. He married, Jan. 1, 1833, *Wealthy Ann Pond*, Daughter of Rev. Dr. Enoch and Wealthy Ann (Hawes) Pond. In 1836 he removed to Orono, Maine. In 1839 he preached awhile at Brewer, and in 1842 at Frankfort, now Winterport. He

was installed Pastor of Church at Dover and Foxcroft in autumn of 1842, and remained there until 1856, when he became Pastor at Belfast. This pastorate he resigned in 1870, but resided in Belfast until his death, Jan. 24, 1884. As in the case of his father, his education was a limited one—a fact which he always deeply regretted; but he was a man of excellent natural endowments, and he fulfilled a most useful and honorable ministry. He was for many years a Trustee of Bangor Seminary, and Bowdoin College gave him the degree of A.M. He was a remarkably suggestive and instructive preacher. A distinctly imaginative gift was manifest in his sermons. He was a wise and judicious counselor, and his name became a highly honored one among the ministers of Maine. He had little worldly ambition, was rather fond of seclusion, and inherited his father's disposition to "depression of spirits," and yet, was often the most cheerful and delightful companion. In the early days of his ministry, at Foxcroft, his house was "a minister's tavern," and the writer well remembers what good cheer prevailed among those country ministers at his father's house. Many of his sermons were published. At his death the testimonials of his private and public worth, published in the papers, were numerous and eulogistic.

Rev. Edwin Pond Parker, son of Rev. Wooster and Wealthy Ann (Pond) Parker, was born in Castine, Me., Jan. 13, 1836. Was fitted for college at Foxcroft Academy, under the tuition of Thomas Tash and Samuel G. Humphrey; graduated from Bowdoin College in the class of 1856; entered Bangor Theological Seminary the same autumn, and graduated 1859. During the years of college life he taught music in various towns of Maine (in winter), and spent the winter of 1853 at Southwest Harbor, Mt. Desert Island. He taught Latin and Greek in Auburn Academy, Me., during the winters of 1856 and 1857, thus earning the money requisite for his education. During the Seminary course he preached in many towns and cities of Maine, but began preaching by supplying the Rev. James Drummond's pulpit, at Auburn, for six weeks, during his absence. He was then 20 years old, and unlicensed, but Mr. Drummond *bade him* preach, and cut off remonstrance with the curt but pleasant remark: "*I license you.*" He married, at Bangor, Nov. 1, 1859, *Lucy M. Harris*, daughter of Samuel Harris, D.D., then Professor of Theology there, afterwards Professor of Bowdoin College, and now Prof. of Theology at Yale. On the 11th of Jan., 1860, he was ordained and installed Pastor of the Second Church of Christ in Hartford, Conn., in which office, after 32 years of service, he still continues, having declined calls to settle in Springfield, Boston, Brookline, and other cities. He prepared and published several collections of hymns and music for worship in church and Sunday-school, which have been widely used.

In 1890 a sermon of his was published, entitled "Thirty Years Ago," which contained many interesting reminiscences and comparisons. In 1875, he received the honor of the degree of S.T.D. from Yale College. He made many summer tours abroad, visiting Great Britain, France, Germany, Switzerland, and Italy. He was in Paris and Germany in 1870, during the Franco-Prussian War. In the earlier years of his ministry he had the unspeakable privilege of an intimate acquaintance with Horace Bushnell; also with Dr. Joel Hawes, and for many years enjoyed the rare friendship of that great-hearted genius, Nathaniel J. Burton, D.D. Of his friend and brother of

more than 25 years' standing, Rev. Joseph H. Twichell, he can only say, that he is worthy of the "goodly fellowship" of the prophets already named. "Burton, Parker, and Twichell," were names woven together in familiar speech of Hartford people, until Burton was summoned to follow their great common Master in Israel, Dr. Bushnell.

The marble font in the Second Church of Hartford was placed there as a memorial of *Emily Julia*, by her parents, and it bears her precious name.

HARRIS, eldest son of Rev. Edwin Pond and Lucy (Harris) Parker, born Hartford, Oct. 31, 1860. In commercial life. He married, in Hartford, April 18, 1892, *Dora E. Smith*, of St. Albans, Vt., daughter of Capt. Louis M. Smith. On the same day, and in one and the same ceremony, his sister, Lily P. Parker, was married to *Morris Penrose*, their father performing the double service.

LILY POND, daughter of Rev. Edwin Pond and Lucy (Harris) Parker, born Hartford, Nov. 5, 1861. On the 18th of April, 1892, she was married to *Morris Penrose* of Hartford, her brother, *Harris Parker*, being married at the same time, in the South Church in Hartford, her father performing the double service.

LEWIS DARLING, SON of Rev. Edwin Pond and Lucy (Harris) Parker, born Hartford, Dec. 6, 1863. In commercial life. He was named after two of his father's college and seminary friends—Rev. *Lewis O. Brastow* (Yale Divinity School) and Rev. *Walter E. Darling*. He was the first of his father's children to be married. On Wednesday, Sept. 9, 1891, in the Second Church of Hartford, and by his father, he was united in marriage to *Carrie Isabel Knous*, daughter of Jacob and Caroline B. Knous of Hartford.

MARY ELIZABETH, daughter of Rev. Edwin Pond and
Lucy (Harris) Parker, born Hartford, Oct. 17, 1865.

BURTON, son of Rev. Edwin Pond and Lucy (Harris) Parker, born at Hartford, June 8, 1869. Named after the Rev. Nathaniel J. Burton of Hartford.

THE POND FAMILY

In the year 1630, JOHN POND, and a brother whose name, as is supposed, was ROBERT, came to New England with John Winthrop. Governor Winthrop wrote back to his son in Groton, England, bidding him tell "old Pond that both his sons are well and remember their duty." John Pond left no trace behind him here. ROBERT settled at Dorchester, Mass., and died there in 1637. There is uncertainty as to the number and names of his children, but there is little doubt that one of his sons was DANIEL of Dedham, from whom my honored mother is descended. (*Vide Savage's Gen. Dict.*, and the "Pond Genealogy," page 6.)

DANIEL POND (son of Robert of Dorchester who came from Groton, England, in 1630) appeared in Dedham, Mass., about 1652. He was an husbandman. He married ABIGAIL SHEPARD, daughter of Edward Shepard of Cambridge, and she died July 5, 1661. He was a landholder in Dedham and Wrentham, a lieutenant in the militia, and the progenitor of a numerous race, most of whom, for a century, lived and died in close proximity to the place of his settlement. His death occurred Feb. 4, 1697-8. He was the father of 13 children.

EPHRAIM POND, fourth child of Daniel, was baptized July 6, 1656; married, Jan. 6, 1685-6, DEBORAH HAWES, died Dec. 22, 1704. They had nine children.

JACOB POND, youngest son of Ephraim, born at Wrentham, Nov. 22, 1702. Lived in what is now Pondville; was Deacon of 1st church in Wrentham; married, May 11, 1726, ABIGAIL HEATH; died March 8, 1764. She died Feb. 20, 1803, aged 98 years. They had nine children.

JACOB POND,² second son of Jacob, born at Wrentham, Feb. 14, 1730-1. Deacon of the 1st church. Married, April 21, 1756, SARAH FALES, who was born Dec. 23, 1732, and died March 20, 1821. He died June 2, 1815. It is recorded on the town books that he was "a very worthy man." They had four children. The oldest son, ENOCH, graduated at Brown University, 1777; became a minister, was settled over North Parish of Wrentham, and afterwards at Ashford, Conn., where he died, 1807. This REV. ENOCH POND had a son ENOCH, born in 1780 at Boston, married, Oct. 28, 1804, DESIRE CLARK, died at Chaplin, July 4, 1856. They had numerous children, four of whom were born at Mansfield, Conn., and one at Ashford.

ELIJAH POND, fourth child of Jacob², born at Wrentham, March 28, 1766; married Oct. 3, 1787, MARY SMITH, who was born June 10, 1769, and died at W., March 10, 1849. He was for many years deacon of the church at W. Died of apoplexy, Feb. 8, 1845. They had seven children: (1) *Harriet*, (2) *Enoch*, (3) *Preston*, (4) *Lucas*, (5) *Smith*, (6) *Mary Snow*, (7) *Henry Kirke White*.

REV. ENOCH POND, oldest son of Elijah, was born at Wrentham, Mass., July 29, 1791; graduated at Brown University in 1813, in the same class with Rev. Dr. Joel Hawes of Hartford; studied theology with Dr. Emmons, and was ordained Pastor of the church at Ward, Mass., March 1, 1815; resigned this pastorate in 1828; editor of the "*Spirit of the Pilgrims*"; chosen Professor of Theology in Bangor Seminary in 1832, and remained as Professor and President there until his death, at the age of 90, Jan. 21, 1882. He received the degree of S.T.D. from Dartmouth, in 1835.

He was an indefatigable worker, and a voluminous writer and author. Moreover he was a most godly and royal character. He was paternal towards his students, and his name and memory are affectionately cherished by all who came within the sphere of his influence. No name is more honored in the churches of Maine. His autobiography, with a preface by his grandson, the present writer, is

among the publications of the Congregational Publishing House at Boston, and contains much that is of interest concerning him and his family.

He married (1), Aug. 28, 1814, WEALTHY ANN, second daughter of William and Eunice (Daggett) Hawes, who died at Ward, Mass., Sept., 1824.

He married (2), May 17, 1825, *Julia Ann*, daughter of John and Elizabeth Maltby, of Northford, Conn., who died Sept. 9, 1838.

He married (3), July 9, 1839, *Anne Mason*, widow of John S. Pearson of Bangor, who died Sept. 15, 1874. He had thirteen children, — nine by his first wife, and four by the second.

REV. JEREMIAH EVARTS, born June 23, 1831, died Feb. 14, 1886; graduated Bowdoin College, 1853; pastor of church at Neenah, Wis., in 1859; at Platville, Wis., 1862; afterwards in Maine. Married, March 18, 1858, *Jane Wilson*, daughter of William and Julia Baird, who died in 1871. Married, second, *Lydia Hoadly*, who survives. He had eight children.

His children are: (1) *Caroline Boody*, born 1864; (2) *Samuel Newman*, born 1866; (3) *Julia Maltby*, born 1868; (4) *Mary Elizabeth*, born 1872.

Wealthy Ann, eldest daughter of Rev. Enoch Pond, D.D., and his first wife, Wealthy A. (Hawes) Pond, and the honored mother of the present writer, is a representative of three distinct and honorable families—the Ponds, the Hawes, and the Daggetts. Her grandfather, William Hawes, married *Eunice Daggett*, sister of Judge David Daggett of New Haven, and her mother spent a year in her Uncle Daggett's home at New Haven before her marriage. My mother was, therefore, a second cousin to Oliver Ellsworth Daggett, D.D., my predecessor in the pastorate of the Second Church of Hartford. My mother's father was also related to Dr. Joel Hawes, pastor for

many years of the First Church in Hartford. Wrentham, Mass., was formerly the common home of the Pond, Hawes, and Daggett families, and the old homesteads of both the Pond and Hawes families are still standing there, I am told.
