GILMORE
 GILMORE MADE HIS FIRST FLIGHT ON APRIL 15, 1930, AT THE AGE OF 4 MONTHS. AT THE TIME, ROSCOE TURNER WAS FLYING FOR THE GILMORE OIL COMPANY WHICH USED A LION AS ITS TRADE-MARK. BY 6 MONTHS OF AGE, GILMORE WAS TOO LARGE TO RIDE IN THE COCKPIT, AND A SPECIAL SEAT WAS PROVIDED IN THE CABIN. THE LION EVEN HAD HIS OWN FLYING SUIT AND A PARACHUTE. DURING HIS FLYING CAREER GILMORE AND TURNER WERE INSEPARABLE, EVEN SHARING HOTEL ROOMS WHERE THEY WERE REGISTERED AS 'ROSCOE AND GILMORE'. AFTER ABOUT 25,000 MILES OF FLYING GILMORE HAD TO BE 'GROUNDED'. HE WAS THEN FULLY GROWN. HE WAS BOARDED IN A LOS ANGELES ZOO FOR THE REMAINING 25 YEARS OF HIS LIFE.

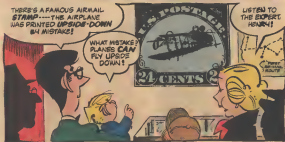

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HOW DID THE NATIONAL AIR & SPACE MUSEUM BEGIN?

THE SMITHSONIAN Institution's interest in aeronautics dates back to its early years. In 1851, the first Secretary of the Smithsonian, Joseph Henry, recommended to President Lincoln that balloonist Thaddeus Lowe be permitted to demonstrate the potential of the balloon for military observation.

The third Secretary of the Smithsonian, Samuel P. Langley, constructed and tested a number of manned and unmanned heavier-than-air craft between 1867 and 1868. Two of these unmanned "aerodromes" models succeeded in flying under steam power over the Potomac for approximately one kilometer (more than half a mile).

Langley also built an observatory behind the "Castle" to begin Smithsonian astronomical studies—and thus began the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory which, in 1868, became associated with Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Today, known as the Center for Astrophysics, it serves as a major research center adding to our knowledge of the universe.

The Smithsonian has long been interested in rocket research. Prompted by Charles Abbott, who was to become the fifth Secre-

tary of the Institution, the Smithsonian supported the early work of the American rocket pioneer Robert H. Goddard. And it was Goddard who, at the beginning of the twentieth century, recognized the potential of the rocket motor for propelling vehicles through space.

Over the years, the Smithsonian's aerospace collection has continued to grow. At present the collection contains many of the most significant aircraft and spacecraft that have taken us from Kitty Hawk to the moon and beyond.

The exterior of the 208 meter (680 feet) long, 27.7 meter (90 feet) tall National Air and Space Museum is Tennessee marble of a pearly hue. There are twenty-four major exhibition areas, some with controlled lighting, some with tinted glass windows. The aircraft and spacecraft displayed in this museum were actually flown or were used as the backup vehicles, unless the label specifically notes an exception.

Opened during the Bicentennial year, the National Air and Space Museum is a national center for the collection, preservation, exhibition, and study of the history of flight.



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WHERE IS THE NATIONAL AIR & SPACE MUSEUM?

WHEN YOU ARE IN WASHINGTON, you can easily locate the Washington Monument...the big, grassy stretch of The Mall...and the imposing dome of the Capitol. The National Air and Space Museum is between the Washington Monument and the Capitol, on Independence Avenue, which runs along side The Mall. You can see it down the street from "The Castle", the old original home of the Smithsonian Institution.

Simulations of the heavens and of space travel can be seen in the programs of the Spacearium. Realistic experiences are produced by use of the Zeiss Model VI planetarium instrument and numerous auxiliary audiovisual devices. The Zeiss planetarium instrument is a gift from the government of the Federal Republic of Germany. There is a nominal charge for admission to Spacearium presentations.

THE THEATER

World films related to flight and aerospace are presented in the Theater. The Theater employs a new projection system (IMAX) and screens that is five stories high. There is a nominal charge for admission to Theater presentations.
