FLAGS THAT TELL THE STORY OF OUR COUNTRY.



**1607 and 1620—Flag of
the Jamestown and
Plymouth Colonies**

The English flag flew over the Colony of Jamestown, in Virginia, and the Plymouth Colony, in Massachusetts, until our Independence from England was won.



1775—Bedford Flag

This was the flag carried by the Minutemen of Bedford, Mass., in the battles of Lexington and Concord that began the War of Independence. The words "Vincere aut Morire" mean "Conquer or Die."



1492—Columbus' Spanish Flag

This is the flag that Columbus raised in the New World in 1492, on the island of San Salvador. The Spanish flag continued to fly over Texas and California until the 1820's.



1774—The Taunton Flag

So called because it was first raised at Taunton, Mass., in 1774. It was one of the first flags made by the American colonists. It was a British flag but with the words "Liberty and Union" added.



1775—Culpepper Flag

The Minutemen of Culpepper County, Virginia, carried this flag into battle in 1775. The rattlesnake was a warning to the British: "Don't Tread (Step) On Me."



1775—Pine-Tree Flag

The pine tree was the symbol of the Massachusetts Colony, and this flag was flown by the ships of the newly-created United States Navy in New England waters.



1775—Bunker Hill Flag

This British flag was changed by adding the Massachusetts pine tree symbol. It was carried by American troops at the battle of Bunker Hill.



1775—Navy Jack

This was one of the first of our flags to use thirteen stripes (for the original thirteen colonies), which we still use on our flag today. It was used by the colonial navy.



1775—Grand Union Flag

This was the first flag used by all the colonies in the War for Independence. It was first used by John Paul Jones on his ship, and then by George Washington at his headquarters.



1775—Continental Flag

This version of the Pine-Tree flag may also have been carried at Bunker Hill, since it is shown in a famous painting of that battle.



1776—Liberty Tree Flag

Adopted by the Massachusetts Council. The real Liberty Tree was a big elm tree in Boston. Many patriotic meetings took place under this tree; the Sons of Liberty met there just before the Boston Tea Party.



1776—Gadsden Flag

This "rattlesnake" flag was named after the man who designed it, a delegate to Congress. He wanted it adopted as the flag of the commander in chief of the Navy, but it was not.



1776—Fort Moultrie Flag

This flag flew over Fort Moultrie in Charleston Harbor. During a battle with the British, it was shot down, and a heroic soldier risked his life to nail it up again.



1776—Rhode Island Flag

This was probably the first of our flags to use stars to represent the thirteen colonies, as our present flag uses stars to represent the 50 States.



1777—Bennington Flag

Carried in the battle of Bennington, Vermont, this was one of the first flags to have both stars and stripes.



1777—First National Flag

The first flag officially adopted by Congress. It had thirteen stars and thirteen stripes, but changes were to come as new States were added.



1795—Second National Flag

When Vermont and Kentucky were admitted to the Union, the flag showed fifteen stars and fifteen stripes.



1818—Final Flag Design

With five more States in the Union, Congress went back to the design of thirteen stripes, for the original colonies, with added stars for the new States.



1813—Flag of Battle of Lake Erie

Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry sewed this flag over his ship during the War of 1812, at the battle of Lake Erie. "Don't give up the ship" was his fighting slogan.



1836—Flag of the Alamo

Fighting for their independence from Mexico, a handful of men died fighting the entire Mexican army, under this flag. The date, 1824, was the year of the Constitution of the Republic of Texas.



1839—Texas Flag

Independent of Mexico, Texas was a separate Republic before joining the Union, but adopted the stripes of our flag along with her "lone star".

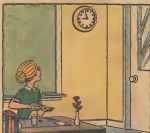


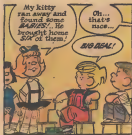
1861—First Confederate Flag

This was the famous "Stars and Bars" flag, showing stars for the seven States that left the Union and fought in the War Between the States.

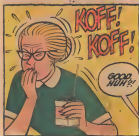
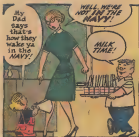
