ING and LEE arrived at the miami international Airport notel during the afternoon on that date and were occupying connecting rooms, No. 620 and No. 622. LEE registered for these rooms upon arrival.

The May 19, 1966, issue of "The Miami Herald," a Miami newspaper, contained an article on page 10A reflecting that during the evening of May 18, 1966, KING spoke before 2,000 delegates and visitors at the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association, Diflomat Hotel, Hollywood, Florida. KINS stated that churches need to overcome two myths. The first of these is the myth that legislation is of no help in meeting racial problems because men have to have a change of heart. The second myth which must be destroyed, he said, is that of exaggerated progress in desegregation.

KING concluded his talk with a defense of his philosophy of nonviolent action and a plea that violence should never be a weapon in the fight for racial equality.

The May 20, 1966, issue of "The Miami Herald" contained an article reflecting KING spoke before 1,200 students and faculty members during the evening of May 19, 1966, at the Fourth Annual Religion Lecture Series on the University of Miami Campus, Coral Gables, Florida.



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KING, according to the article, in a speech laced with ringing clerical phrases, stated the churches must help get rid of the notion that there are superior and inferior races, must bare as false the torturous logic" of those who use the product of segregation, that is the high crime rate among the Negroes, as an argument for it, and must explode the theory that "time" will bring about a miraculous cure for the problems of the day. KING stated the churches must get involved in civil rights activity or else the church is irrelevant.

KING and LEE checked out of the Miami International Airport Hotel about 8:15 a.m. on May 20, 1966, and flew to Bimini. The airline used was believed to be Chalk's Flying Service, located on MacArthur Causeway, Miami.

RE: Communist Infiltration of The Southern Christian Leadership Conference

The "Detroit News", a daily Detroit metropolitan newspaper, in its edition of May 27, 1966, on page 7-C, contained an article captioned "Freedom Rally Set, 17 Groups Join to Help Negro Voters in South." This article goes on to state the following:

"Seventeen local labor, church and civil rights groups organized yesterday in a campaign to raise \$100,000 to aid Negroes in Mississippi and Alabama voter registration drives.

"Nelson (Jack) Edwards, board member-at-large of the UAW, said the drive will conclude June 19 in a 'Freedom Rally' in Cobo Hall with UAW President Walter P. Reuther and Nobel Prize winner Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as speakers.

"'We are selling tickets at a dollar,' Edwards said, 'to raise the money. We are also starting a canister drive for donations.'

"Edwards and Horace L. Sheffield, administrative vice-president of the Trade Union Leadership Council (TULC), made the announcement yesterday in the Detroit Press Club.

VICTIMS TO BE AIDED

'Sheffield, also an international representative for the UAW, said:

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"'The money will go to help Negroes in the South who have been the victims of reprisals because they tried to register and vote. Although our effort will be aimed at helping Negroes throughout the South, we will concentrate on Mississippi and Alabama, where the situation is most critical.'

"Sheffield, who spends much of his time traveling in the South for the UAW, said Negroes there need food, clothing and a means of educating their children.

"Some of the Negro children in this area, Sheffield said, 'have never been inside a school even though they are 10 and 12 years old.'

EFFECT FORECAST

"'We feel that another 200,000 Negroes on the voting roles in Mississippi and another 150,000 in Alabama will change the character of politics in that part of the country,' Sheffield declared.

"'In the South we need to place the emphasis on real issues rather than on race,' Sheffield said, 'and when we solve this problem I feel Southerners can solve the rest of their problems.'

"Edwards said although the committee will not actively seek large donations from business and industry 'I think they will be contacted and will contribute.'

CLING TO HOME STATE

"He said the drive is aimed 'primarily at large scale people donations' instead of huge donations from corporations.

"Edwards said many Southern Negroes, driven from sharecropper dwellings because they sought to vote, have set up large 'tent cities' rather than leave their home states. "Among the rally's sponsoring organizations are: the Archbishop's Committee on Human Relations, the Booker T. Washington Business Association, the Detroit Urban League, the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance, the Cotillion Club, the Detroit Branch American Civil Liberties Union.

"Also the Metropolitan Detroit Labor and Community Association, the NAACP, the United Auto Workers, the United Steel Workers, and the Council of Baptist Pastors.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised the Chicago Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) on May 26, 1966, that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., president, Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), arrived in Chicago the previous evening, however, the exact time and method of arrival of Dr. King were not known to the source. He continued that King has a luncheon meeting scheduled for May 26, 1966, at the 50th and the Lake Restaurant, and an evening meeting to be held at the offices of the West Side Organization (WSO), 1527 West Roosevelt Road. On May 27, 1966, King has a luncheon engagement at the H and H Restaurant, 125 East 51st Street, Chicago, and will depart from Chicago for Washington, D.C. on May 28, 1966, however, his exact mode of transportation is not known.

The May 26, 1966, edition of the "Chicago Tribune", a daily Chicago newspaper, reflected that on the previous evening, May 26, 1966, King had appeared before a rally at 844 West 74th Street, on Chicago's south side, and later at a mass meeting at 1527 West Roosevelt Road, Chicago. At this time, King announced plans for a massive rally to be held at Soldiers Field, Chicago, June 26, 1966, and a subsequent march on that date to Chicago's City Hall. Aids of King were quoted as anticipating that about 100,000 persons are expected to take part in the rally and subsequent march.

The article reflected that King had stated as follows. at the 1527 West Roosevelt Road affair:

"Chicago has the finest organizations working together that I've seen any where in the country. We've been studying to see exactly what's needed and now we've emerged with concrete demands."

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King stated that he planned to have the list of demands handed to Chicago's Mayor Richard J. Daley at the conclusion of the June 26, 1966 City Hall march, however, "if the Mayor just isn't in that Sunday, we'll tack them on the City Hall door." King was further quoted as stating "we want to march by the thousands. Every church must turn out that Sunday and bring all the members to Soldiers Field. We'll stay there for about an hour or so and march on down to City Hall. Chicago will have a long hot summer, but not a summer of racial violence. Rather it will be a long hot summer of peaceful non-violence."

The "Chicago Daily News", a daily Chicago newspaper, edition of May 27, 1966, also contained an article concerning King's appearance at the offices of the WSO, 1527 West Roosevelt Road, the preceding evening, which article contained substantially the same information as set forth previously concerning the rally and march of June 26, 1966.

Additionally however, at this WSO rally, King reportedly urged all relief recipients who were present, as well as others who were not, to join the Welfare Union, an independent organization being formed to unify aid recipients in Chicago. King praised the concept of this union, stating "welfare is used to abuse the individual, to rob him of his dignity, to keep people so crippled that they never get on their feet. It is used by hungry and greedy politicians to increase their patronage.

"We've got to do something about it. We are victims of tragic staggering poverty. Our basic problem - after all the others - is an economic problem."

Continuing concerning King's activities in Chicago during this visit, the "Chicago Sun Times", a daily Chicago newspaper, reported that Dr. King had appeared as guest speaker at the annual dinner at Mc Cormick Place, Chicago, of the Ebenezer Baptist Church, 4501 South Vincennes, Chicago.

This aimer had been on the evening of May 27, 1966, and prior to his appearance here, King had held a press conference in Mc Cormick Place. He had again referred to the June 26, 1966, rally at Soldiers Field, describing the rally as the beginning of a phase of the Chicago Freedom Movement which would involve sustained non-violent action programs designed to dramatize community problems and call for immediate solutions. The marchers will demand an end to deprivation of employment, schooling, welfare, health, and housing for the Negro.

The non-violent action programs referred to would include all forms of non-violent protest from picketing to sit-ins and "tent-ins", in yet to be selected suburbs. King had stated that the organizing work begun last fall by the SCIC and the Co-ordinating Council of Community Organizations (CCCO) "must come to an end and we must get about the non-violent action which we hope will dramatize the problems and call forth a solution. I see this new phase as a peaceful, massive beginning, but I've no illusions there will be a solution here or any where else this summer."

Appearing at the press conference with King was Albert Raby, head of the CCCO, and Junius Griffin identified as the national press chief of the SCLC. Griffin was described as the individual who would actually plan the rally for June 26, 1966, and was quoted as having stated he expects Soldiers Field to be filled to capacity. Upon questioning, King stated that the final drafting of the specifics of the demands to be made at City Hall, at the conclusion of the June 26, 1966 march, would not be completed for some time. Advice on how to accomplish the goals would not necessarily be included in these demands, according to King.

The "Chicago Paily News", edition of May 28, 1966, contained an article concerning Dr. King's news conference at Mc Cormick Place, the evening of May 27, 1966. This article noted that King had referred to the Federal Aid Slum Clearance Plan announced only on Thursday, May 26, 1966, for Chicago, describing it as "much too small".

He stated that the \$3,000,000 figure which was cited as to be made available to Chicago for this purpose would not begin to cope with the massive slum problem here. He stated "e need a massive outpouring of money - billions of dollars. We need a gigantic Marshall Plan to rid Chicago of the slums that Negroes have been forced to live in for so long."

King also had stated at this press conference that he would continue to welcome the assistance, in his summer marches and picket activities, of the Blackstone Rangers and the Disciples, two south side Negro youth gangs who recently had been involved in recurrent outbursts of violence against each other, and among whom the SCLC here has attempted to recruit support for the Freedom Movement. King stated, however, that this assistance would be welcomed "provided they left their guns and knives at home. There is no place in our movement for people who carry weapons". King had noted that he has held meetings with several of these gang leaders and 15 seeking to give these youths "a sense of belonging, and to get them to redirect their energies and goals toward constructive action". He referred to a recent petition to have the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) investigate the SCLC as "absurd, misguided and erroneous". King stated that if the HCUA has degenerated to the point of honoring such a petition, then it was the most un-American committee in this country.

advised the Chicago Office of the FBI on May 30, 1966, that Dr. King had returned to Chicago, arriving on that date at O'Hare Field from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, aboard Trans World Airlines flight 327 at approximately 12:30 p.m.

The "Chicago Tribune", edition of June 1, 1966, contained an article concerning a press conference held in Chicago by Dr. King on May 31, 1966. This conference was held jointly with a Buddhist monk, Thick Math Mahn, described as touring the United States under the spoksorship of the American Friends Service Committee. This article advised that Dr. Hahn had stated he was under a death sentence in Viet Nam for speaking out against the present government there, and was touring the United States at present to promote peace in his native land.

Dr. King, at this press conference, likened the civil rights movement in the United States to the recent uprising by Buddhist monks in Viet Nam. He expressed sympathy for the five Buddhists who recently immolated themselves in protest against the government there of Premier Nguyen Cao Ky. King had stated that both the Buddhists and the civil rights workers are "inextricably bound in a cause for peace and justice and are willing to offer great sacrifices to attain their end." He stated, however, that he was not suggesting that immolation be practiced in this country "because the traditions of the East and West are so culturally different."

King, who had been conferring with Dr. Hahn during the day, suggested an immediate cessation of bombings in North Viet Nam as a prelude to peace talks, emphasizing that he did not think the United States was doing enough to establish negotiations directed toward a peaceful solution of the Viet Nam problem. He defied that his anti-Viet Nam war stand is hurting his civil rights, movement here. He stated that he was for peace, recommended the recognition of Red China by this country and the admission of Red China to the United Nations as initial steps to inside peace throughout the world.

King had continued "It is foolish to presume that we can have peace while ignoring the largest country in the world. If the United States is serious about its disarmament proposals, it will have to sit with Red China at the disarmament table."

On May 28, 1966, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, ascertained that on that date Martin Luther King, Walter Fauntroy (Washington, D.C. representative of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, SCLC, which is headed by King), Clarence Jones and Stanley Levison held a conference, called by King, to discuss his appearance on the Face the Nation television program on May 29, 1966. According to the source, King wanted their thinking on the more important questions that might be put to him, such as the present posture of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), Black Nationalism, the Black Panther Party (a third political party being advanced by SNCC), the coming Presidential Conference on civil rights and Vietnam.

Levison advised that King should remember that the press always depicts him as a moderate and that he should urge a nonviolent but militant attitude. Levison said King should urge the Negro not to take abuse and to say that the economic and political are means and that brotherhood is the end. Levison further counseled that King must make it clear that he is not part of a separatist trend and hopes to achieve unity in the Negro movement.

King next referred to the speech made by Adam Clayton Powell (Representative from New York City), at Howard University, during which Powell called on American Negroes to abandon the conference table in seeking equality and to seek rather a

position of "black power" and what he termed "audacious power". King suggested he might be asked about this speech and also about "having conferences as a whole".

In this context, Clarence Jones stated he had read about the attack on the recommendations of the conference (the Presidential conference on civil rights), the fact that SNCC is not going to take part and acts by such groups are pregative and will hurt the whole group.

Levison suggested to King that he could point out that under President Truman, a government committee pointed out that the Federal government was the biggest violator of segregation, and made recommendations, and that now the Administration has committees which have unearthed important conditions and spot-lighted them. Levison continued that, however, in the absence of a militant movement which compels the government to act, nothing usually is done. King agreed this was a good way to express it.

Walter Fauntroy suggested that one question might be where the billions of dollars for King's program would come from. Levison stated that one answer would be where did the money come from to finance a war and that the answer to this was that it was necessary as is such things as the beautifying of the nation's highways.

King next asked how he should handle a possible question about a "long hot summer". To this, Jones said he should go no further than President Johnson did when he commented on the Watts area of Los Angeles. Levison suggested that he answer it in a guarded way such as where injustice is located there is a possibility of a riot.

Levison brought up the possibility of a question on Vietnam and Jones stated that the text of King's remarks should be what was in the SCLC resolution on Vietnam. (The resolution adopted at an Executive Board meeting of the SCLC in Miami, Florida, in April, 1966, calling for military withdrawal from Vietnam). Levison suggested an additional point be made that Negroes are shouldering a heavier burden of the war in Vietnam because of the economic status of the Negroes and that there are more Negroes at the front than other Americans. He said this is an unfair position.

Levison, in commenting on what King might say regarding Secretary of Defense McNamara's statement on the draft, suggested that King could say that he could agree if the government provides equal opportunity and equal justice but, if not, it is unequal to call on anyone and that the government is unfair to Negroes and underprivileged whites in the draft.

On May 29, 1966, Martin Luther King appeared on "Face the Nation", a Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS) Television Program. To a question by one panelist, King refused to specifically predict that violence would occur in the racial field, however, he did say it would be an act of wisdom to anticipate violence.

King called for new programs in all areas costing ten billion dollars a year for the next ten years. He said the Vietnam war was halting the war against poverty. He said war was not the way to solve social problems, and "we" (the United States), must find a good fast way out of Vietnam.

King urged the United States cease the bombings, negotiate with the Viet Cong, and admit Communist China to the United Nations.

Freedom Day Rally Featuring Speaking Appearance of Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., Sponsored by Local Union, Civic And Church Organizations, Detroit, Michigan June 19, 1966

On Nav 26, 1966.

advised that a freedom Day Raily would be held at Cobo Hall on June 19, 1966, with the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. and UAW President/Walter P. Reuther as the principal speakers. He advised that this rally was being sponsored by the UAW, AFL-CIO, the Trade Union Leadership Council (TULC) and various other civic and church organizations in the Detroit area. The rally is being coordinated by Nelson Jack Edwards and Horace Sheffield, local UAW officials.

According to the site for the rally at Cobo Hall seats 9000, however, the rally coordinators anticipate that approximately 25,000 will be in attendance at this rally. Detective Mc Graw advised that in order to handle the expected overflow of persons in attendance, a public address system is going to be installed at Cobo Hall.

King hoped that his group would continue to be allied with SNCC even though that group felt he was not militant enough. On May 13, 1966, members of two traditionally rival street gangs, the "Blackstone Rangers" and "Satan's Disciples," were scheduled to meet with Doctor Martin Luther King, Jr. in the Southtown YMCA, 6545 South Union, Chicago, Illinois. This meeting reportedly had been arranged by Reverend Albert R. Sampson of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC).

Apparently these gangs had not been forewarned that the other gang was to be present, and when about six members of the "Blackstone Rangers," led by their "President" Jeff fort, arrived at the YMCA, about eight members of "Satan's Disciples" were already present and a scuffle took place between these two gangs during which several shots were fired; however, no one was injured or arrested.

Shortly thereafter, Doctor King and several of his assistants arrived at the YMCA and learning of the disturbance, they immediately left the area.

On May 19, 1966, a meeting was held in Chicago, Illinois, between representatives of the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA), Detached Worker's Program, and the SCLC.

The SCLC was represented by Reverend Andrew Young, with about ten associates including Reverend James Devel, Reverend Albert R. Sampson, James Orange, and Reverend Jesse Jackson.

This meeting was called at the request of the YMCA to air complaints relative to SCLC efforts in Chicago within the street gangs, and also to establish rules for future conduct of the SCLC in this regard.

This source noted that for several years, the YMCA in Chicago has been working through a program of "Detached Workers" employing approximately thirty full time professional workers, and approximately 300 indigenous workers who are involved with over 70 youth gangs in the Chicago area.

Basically these workers are to become acquainted with the leaders and members of the various gangs, so that they will be able to effectively channel the energies of these gang members into productive channels.

In attempting to recruit various gange into the "Chicago Freedom Movement", SCLC representatives and Reverend Albert R. Sampson in particular, were reported to have been attempting to undermine the YMCA Program in order to channel gang activities into the "Chicago Freedom Movement."

In addition to concern for the Detached Worker Program itself, the YNCA is concerned that the approach by the SCLC is extremely dangerous in that by encouraging gangs and gang members to take part in demonstrations without having personal knowledge of the individual gang members, there is a real possibility that the SCLC would not be able to control the actions of these gang members in any demonstrations.

At this meeting, Reverend Andrew Young denounced the efforts of Reverend Albert R. Sampson, stating that his efforts to undermine the YKCA Program in recruiting people into the "Chicago Freedom Movement," do not have the approval of the SCLC and in fact, were contrary to SCLC's principles.

This source also learned that in a private meeting following this conference, SCLC leaders were similarly critical of the efforts by James Crange to recruit gang members.

It was mentioned during this meeting, that the SCLC was considering moving Reverend Albert R. Sampson from the Chicago area, at least temporarily, and it was also indicated that Reverend James Bevel might be gone from the Chicago area for a period of time.

This source advised that during this meeting, on May 19, 1966, SCLC and the YMCA arrived at the following agreement:

SCLC workers will in no way attempt to undermine the work being done by the YMCA detached workers.

Further, YMCA workers will not arrange meetings between the SCLC and youth gang leaders and members; however, YMCA workers will not be excluded from any such meetings they wish to attend, and the YMCA along with various city agencies such as the Youth Division of the Chicago Police Department, will be advised in advance of any demonstrations being called by the SCLC which are to involve youth gangs, so that these demonstrations can be monitored to reduce the potential for violence.

In addition, the YMCA will allow their workers to participate in SCL, programs on their own time, but no employees are to be involved with the SCLC during the hours that they are on YMCA payroll.

A second source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on May 20, 1966, that tentative plans had been made by the SCLC and the South Shore Organization on Human Rights to hold a weekend seminar on May 21 and 22, 1966, for the purpose of indoctrinating a number of youth gang leaders and members concerning the "Chicago Freedom Movement;" however, the source advised that these plans were cancelled late on the evening of May 19, 1966, following a meeting between representatives of the SCLC and the YMCA.

Evanston, Illinois.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished information on May 17, 1966, which disclosed that Stanley Levison and Martin Luther King, President of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), were in contact on that date. Their contact, according to the source, concerned an article which Levison is writing for King. The article will present King's analysis of the recent elections in Alabama. King said he liked the article as prepared by Levison, but did want to cover a few items contained therein.

First of all, King said with reference to Levison's coverage of the Confederation of Alabama Political Organizations, (COAPO), which recently came into being, that there was also another political organization in the state. He said he was raising the question because (COAPO) grew out of the SCLC, therefore he did not want it to appear that he was blowing his own horn. King said (COAPO) is the first grassroots political organization known to the state of Alabama.

King said Hosea (Hosea Williams, Director of Special Projects, SCLC) made a recent statement in Alabama to the effect that some of the labor people were trying to put money behind Elliott (former Congressman Carl Elliott who was a candidate for Governor in the Alabama election) and give it to



Negroes to organize for Elliott. Some of the Negroes, King said, were from (COAPO). Hosea (Hosea Williams) more or less said that as a result of hard work and sacrifice "they" (the COAPO) got the Negroes to register, but now labor was trying to come in and make the decisions. King said high labor officials got word of Hosea's statement which upset them very much. As a consequence, he (King) has received three or four calls (from labor officials). In fact, Norm Hill (civil rights official of the American Federation of Labor - Congress of Industrial Organizations, (AFL-CIO) contacted him (King) and urged him to go to Washington to talk with someone in an effort to correct the misunderstanding. King concluded that in the future, he will have to rely more on wealthy people for aid in solving the economic problems of the SCLC (apparently alluding to the hard feelings caused by Hosea's statement about labor).

advised the Chicago Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on Tuesday evening, May 10, 1966, that Doctor Martin Luther King, Jr., President, Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), together with Reverend Andrew Young, an Assistant, arrived at O'Eare Airport from Atlanta, Georgia, via Delta Airlines, at approximately 7:25 this evening.

A confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised the Chicago Office early on May 11, 1966, that Doctor King had a series of meetings planned for this morning and afternoon with his Chicago SCLC Staff at the Del Prado Hotel, Hyde Park Boulevard and Lake Shore Drive. scurce advised that these conferences and consultations were in connection with the organization by the SCLC here, the co-ordinating 1 Community (mganization (CCCD), and other co-operating the desires groups of a voters registration drive in Chicago. The target date for this drive is May 17, 1966, the last day on which local voters can register at local polling places and be eligible to vote in the 1966 elections. This voters drive is to be generally on a city wide basis, but is to be concentrated in the First and Second Congressional Districts on Chicago's south side. In connection with this drive, King has planned an extensive speaking and public appearance schedule on south side street corners, at churches and shopping centers, during the period May 12 to 14, 1966, to encourage Negro voters to register. Efforts are to be made, according to the source, to insure that local Negro clergy will call for voters registration in messages to their congregations on Sanday, May 15, 1966.

An article in the "Chicago Daily News," a local daily pewspaper reflects that on Wednerday evening, King held a meeting with approximately 100 members of three south side Negro youth gangs, and requested their assistance in the crash voter-registration drive being conducted. The gange involved were the Blackstone Hangers, the Disciples, and the Cobras. The meeting lasted for several hours and was held in the St. John's Methodist Church, 7350 South Jeffery Boulevard, in the general area where these gangs operate. This article reflected that King was successful in having the gang leaders present agree to help in ringing doorbells, distributing literature, and urging people to vote rather than continue their constant warring on each other.

This article continued that earlier that evening, King had spoken to light crowds at several south side locations during the course of heavy rain storms, advising those who appeared that if people in the south could die to create a voting bill, then "Negroes of the North, where there is no obstruction, can certainly use their vote creatively and responsibly. We should make it clear that we will vote for the candidates who earn the Negro votenot own the Negro vote."

A article in the "Chicago American," a local revenuer, edition of May 12, 1966, advised that King was to appear that evening at street rallies at 140 West 61st Street, and 64th and Moodyawn Avenues. On May 13, 1966, King was to appear, along with Frenchithard, independent cardidate for Congress in the First Congressional District, at the lokies Homes Housing Project, 30th and Wabash Avenues, Chicago, to arge voter registration. King has meetings scheduled for Saturday morning at shopping centers at 55th and Lake Fark Avenues, Chicago, and at 53rd and Kimbark Avenues, Chicago. Single-potent to these appearances, he will proceed to the offices of the localsyn Organization, a south side civil rights organization, him Fast 63rd Street, to attempt to measure the success of the voters registration carpaign.

advised the Chicago Federal Bureau of Investigation Office on Kay 13, 1966, that literature is being circulated throughout the city, under the made of Doctor King, announcing a Rational Negro Holiday for May 17, 1966, and urges that interested parties contact the Warren Avenue Church, 3101 West Warren Avenue, Chicago, for

further details. Interested parties are additionally urged to unite to rally on May 17, 1966, for quality education, to urge formation of student unions to end slum education, and to protest inferior conditions and segregated schools in Chicago.

advised that this literature is being issued apparently in conjunction with a beyentt of certain predominantly Regro high schools on Chicago's north and south sides, ostensibly under the auspices of the SCLC, with the boycott, and National Negro Holiday apparently in recognition that May 17, 1966, is the 12th anniversary of the Superior Court's 1954 school desegregation decision. The 12 year period represents an entire school generation which is still alleged! experiencing segregation in Chicago public continued that the Chicago Palica Prantment has schools. heard rumers that Doctor King is to lead or play a personal roll 67(D) in a protest march which is to take place on Pag 17, 1966, in Chicago, in cornection with this school beyoutt, however, this is unverified and at present no specific information is available regarding the activities of Doctor King in Chicago, on May 17, 1966.

noted also, that President Lyndon B. Johnson is expected to be in Calcaga or May 17, 1966, and press reports locally have indicated that civil rights leaders here have requested a personal meeting with President Johnson, to protest the alleged segregation existing in the Chicago Public School System.

gation Office on May 13, 1966, that information available to his Unit reflects that Doctor King is to depart Chicago late Saturday afternoon or Saturday evening for Atlanta, although the exact departure time is not known. To date, according to there have been no incidents or disorders in connection with King's presence in Chicago.
