The attached states Martin Luther King, Jr., arrived in Washington, D. C., 2-6-68 and participated in a silent vigil at Arlington National Cemetery. Subsequent information received that last evening King held a meeting at the Church of the Redeemer with approximately 200 people in attendance. Stokely Carmichael, former Chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, was present with a number of his followers. After King's speech. Carmichael commented that any ideas brought forward should be restricted to the topic of the evening which was the Washington Spring Project. According to the source, King and Carmichael have a personal meeting scheduled for today.

Pertinent parts of this information will be furnished to the White House, Attorney General, interested Divisions of the Department, the military, and other appropriate agencies.

Washington Spring Project Racial Matters

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, learned on February 2, 1968, that on that night Andrew Young (Executive Vice-President of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference) (SCLC) and Stanley Levison were to meet with Leon Davis and Moe Foner at their office, 709 Eighth Avenue, New York to discuss the Washington, D. C. project and how Foner and Davis can make a contribution.

The same source advised on February 3, 1968, that on that date, Stanley Levison and William Rutherford, Executive Director of the SCLC, discussed a list of contributors (to the SCLC). Levison stated he had examined this list and that there are no big donors on 1t. Rutherford mentioned that a suggestion had been made of having a group meeting of the larger contributors and having someone talk to them and solicit contributions. Levison suggested Andrew Young as the person to handle this matter.

Rutherford inquired if Levison would be in Washington, D. C. on Tuesday (February 6, 1968) and Levison was uncertain, noting that he was supposed to meet with "two staff guys" to bring them together with "a staff guy from 1199" (Local 1199, Drug and Hospital

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Employees Union, New York City). According to Rutherford, there would be a meeting of the march by clergymen on Monday (February 5, 1968) with the march on Tuesday (February 6, 1968).

The source learned on February 4, 1968, that Stanley Levison was again in contact with William Rutherford. Levison brought up the matter of contributors to the SCLC stating that he had been thinking about having those who had given \$1,000.00 or more, about 60 people, invited to someone's house, such as Harry Belafonte's place. He said some of the people would be Govenor and Mrs. Nelson Rockefeller, Mary and Stephen Rockefeller, and Franklin D. Roosevelt, III. Levison noted that on February 5, 1968, he was meeting with some "staff guys" and was going to put them in contact with the hospital workers whom he and Andrew Young saw recently. He added that "they" were assigning a full-time staff person "to us."

Rutherford noted that Martin Luther King, (head of the SCLC) was to speak to the Clergymen Concerned about the Vietnam war on Tuesday morning (February 6, 1968) and that the (SCLC) Board meeting would begin at 2:00 P.M.

"The New York Journal American," a former evening New York City newspaper, in its issue of February 5, 1947, contained an article which reflected that Moe Foner was banned from membership in the Flushing Chapter of the American Veterans Committee because he admitted he was a Communist.





Leon Davis

"The New York Times," a New York City daily newspaper, July 18, 1966, page 19, contained an article on Leon Julius Davis whom it described as the President of Local 1199, Drug and Hospital Employees Union. The article noted, in part, "Mr. Davis is a critic of United States policy in Vietnam, and last spring he joined with some 20 other labor leaders to form the tradeunion division of the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy.

"Mr. Davis and his local, an affiliate of the Retail Wholesale and Department Store Union, American Federation of Labor (AFL) - Congress of Industrial Organizations (CIO), have often been labeled leftists. In 1948, Mr. Davis appeared before a House of Representatives labor sub-committee and refused to say under oath whether he was a Communist. Later he stated he was not."

The article also noted "In recent years he has also become increasingly involved in the civil \bigcup rights movement."

Donald F. O'Donnell, Chief Counsel of the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations (chaired by Senator John L. McClellan) which currently is conducting the hearings concerning riots and civil disorders, has requested information concerning the demonstration being planned by Martin Luther King, Jr., in Washington this spring. King has publicly stated that he intends to conduct massive civil disobedience in Washington this year unless specific demands for congressional action to solve the problems of poor Negroes are met.

Enclosed is a brief summary of pertinent information concerning King's plans for this event. The information contained therein is of a public source nature.

In addition to furnishing the enclosed write-up to O'Donnell, it is felt we should keep the leadership in the House of Representatives and the Senate advised of pertinent developments concerning these demonstrations insofar as that they might affect the Congress. Hence, it is believed a copy of the enclosed write-up should be furnished to Speaker of the House McCormack and Senate Majority Leader Mansfield for their information.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the enclosed write-up be approved and returned to the Crime Records Division so that a copy can be furnished to O'Donnell, Speaker of the House McCormack and Senator Mansfield.

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
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

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, learned on January 31, 1968, that on that date, Stanley Levison was in contact with William Rutherford, Executive Director of the Southern Christian Lateralaship Conference (SCLC). Levison noted that he met medently with Harry Wachtel, Clarence Jones, Bayard Rustin, and Mike Marrington, and that Rustin "showed his true colors" by opposing civil disobedience. He said Rustin is also opposed to involving the war issue.

Levison, in referring to the civil disobedience counciling, planned by King, for Washington D.C. (WDC), in the fpring of 1938, felt that tactics must be agreed upon in the near future so that persons who have been making inquiry can be told what tactics will be used.

Rutherford told Levison that Andy Young (Executive Vice-President of the SCLC), had written out some of the station to be used. He said that, for example, during the first week, calls will be made on Congressman by people from 17 different areas. During the second week, calls will be made on heads of departments such as the Secretary of Labor. On the first visit, demands will be made and on the second, as sit-in will be conducted.




With respect to a proposed civil rights newspaper, Levison feels it should follow the formula of "The Southern Courier", which, he said, can humanize the news without vulgarizing it. He emphasized that, although SCLC policy must be the policy followed by the newspaper, efforts must be made to avoid a dull, uninteresting style.

Rutherford noted that King has an SCLC Board meeting on Tuesday, and Wednesday, (February 6 and 7, 1968), a clergy march on Monday, and a private meeting with (Stokely) Carmichael and with other Black leaders in WDC, and then will go to Philadelphia "and do the same thing". Rutherford added "meet once with the ministers and once with the Black Power people to try to neutralize them".


The source advised that he gathered the impression that the above described activity by King will be in connection with organizing for the spring civil disobedience campaign in WDC.

Levison and Rutherford also discussed financial contributors to the SCLC. Levison said he had suggested to King that they get about 25 contributors together and meet with them for several days and let them ask King as many questions as they care to. Levison stated that he would check the list of contributors and check with Rutherford as to where they should hold this meeting since it should depend on the residence of most of the contributors.




In "The Saturday Evening Fost", issue of July 11-18, 1964, page 76, Bayard Rustin is the subject of a feature article captioned: "The Lone Wolf of Civil Rights." In it, Rustin is said to have come to New York in 1938, as an organizer for the Young Communist League (YCL), and as such, he had the jcb of recruiting students for the "Party". Furthermore, the article reports that during his first years in New York, Rustin gave most of his earnings to the "Party." He reportedly left the "Party" in 1941, the article states.

The YCL has been designated pursuant to L Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily Worker", February 11, 1957, page 1, column 2, reported that Bayard Rustin, Executive Secretary, War Resisters League, was an observer at the 16th National Convention of the Communist Party, United States of America, (CP,USA), held in New York City, on February 9-11, 1957.

The "Daily Worker" was an East Coast Communist publication until it ceased publication on U January 13, 1958.



Another confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 19, 20, 1964,



that Bayard Rustin contacted Benjamin J. Davis on those dates and sought his advice as to how he could escape from a speaking engagement to which he was committed. On the latter contact, Davis told Rustin that he was working on his request and had contacted friends who had contacts with the group to which Rustin was to speak.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on January 21, 1964, that as of that date, Benjamin J. Davis was National Secretary of the CP, USA.

"The New York Times", August 24, 1964, page 27, column 4, reports that Benjamin J. Davis, National Secretary, CP, USA, died in New York City on the night of August 22, 1964.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 5, 1965, that Harry Wactel and Clarence Jones were planning on attending a Research Committee meeting of the SCLC at the office of Harry Wachtel, New York City, on that date. According to the source, it was mentioned that Michael Harrington, a National Committee member of the Socialist Party would also attend.

NATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning the National Lawyers Guild:

"National Lawyers Guild

- "1. Cited as a Communist front.
 (Special Committee on Un-American
 Activities, House Report 1311 on the
 CIO Political Action Committee,
 March 29, 1944, p. 149.)
- "2. Cited as a Communist front which 'is the foremost legal bulwark of the Communist Party, its front organizations, and controlled unions' and which 'since its inception has never failed to rally to the legal defense of the Communist Party and individual members thereof, including known espionage agents.'



Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. is one of several nationally known personalities invited to speak on campus this year as part of KSU's convocation series. On January 19, 1968, King, accompanied by an unidentified aide, arrived at Kansas City, Missouri, via commercial airline, believed from Chicago, Illinois. King was met at the airport by Professor William W. Boyer, Head of the Political Science Department, KSU, and by Kansas State Senator George W. Haley, a prominent Negro and advocate of a fair housing measure expected to be introduced soon in the Kansas Legislature. King and his party were flown to Manhattan, Kansas, by aircraft chartered by KSU, and arrived at the KSU campus about 9:50 AM.

Commencing at 10:00 AM, King spoke for about an hour to an audience of 7,200 student, faculty, and townspeople assembled in Ahearn Fieldhouse. The speech was carried live by Radio Station KMAN, Manhattan, and taped for rebroadcast later in the day by KSU Radio Station KSAC. There was periodic applause during the speech, and a standing ovation at the end. A brief question and answer period was followed by a coffee held at the Student Union. There were no incidents, and King's speech seemed generally well received. King departed the campus at 11:50 AM for Manhattan Airport, where he took the 12:18 PM flight of Frontier Airlines enroute east, presumably with destination Chicago, Illinois.

In his speech on "The Future of Integration", King traced the history of the Negro in the United States since 1619, eventual freedom from slavery, and various favorable court decisions in recent years. He noted there has been considerable progress, but said there is still a long way to go. He said the nation needs antidiscrimination laws, despite the argument that morality cannot be legislated, and also needs strong fair housing laws. He stated that in Mississippi there have been 62 murders of Negroes and civil rights workers and burning of 58 Negro churches, which have gone unpunished.

King renewed his opposition to the Vietnam war as an unjust and ill-conceived war being waged by the Administration instead of waging a war on poverty at home. He said the Government spends \$500,000. for each Viet Cong killed while spending only \$53. a year for each recipient in the war on poverty.

King noted that President Johnson in his recent State of the Union message wondered what has caused "restlessness across the country despite the nation's affluence." King said the reason is "we have allowed the means by which we live to out-distance the ends for which we live."

King said he still believes in non-violence and noted "Violence creates many more problems that it solves. If the Negro resorts to violence, he is leaving to unborn generations a legacy of bitterness." He warned, however, that "riot is the language of the unheard" and said "it would be an act of moral irresponsibility for me to condemn riots and not to be as vigorous in condemning the existence of intolerable conditions in our country which cause people to be so angry, so bitter, that they see no alternative but to engage in this kind of violence."

In the "Oakland Tribune," a daily newspaper published in Oakland, California, in the Blue Streak edition on January 15, 1968, it was reported that Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. visited the San Francisco-Oakland Bay area, Sunday, January 14, 1968, to visit JOAN BAEZ, her mother, and IRA SANDPERL, along with other anti-war demonstrators imprisoned at the Santa Rita Rehabilitation Center.

Miss BAEZ, her mother, and numerous other persons were arrested during Stop The Draft Week (October 16-21, 1967) demonstrations at the Oakland Induction Center, Oakland, California, and are presently serving sentences at the Santa Rita Rehabilitation Center, a place of incarceration operated by Alameda County, California.

JOAN CHANDOS BAEZ, white female, born January 9, 1941, at Staten Island, New York, resides at Carmel Valley, California. She is an internationally renowned folk singer, a proponent of peace, and is Vice-President of the Institute for the Study of Nonviolence (ISNV), which she finances and operates in Carmel Valley.

IRA JAMES SANDPERL, white male, born March 11, 1923, at St. Louis, Missouri, resides at Carmel Valley, California. During 1952 and 1953, a source advised that SANDPERL was active in protesting the injustice of the ROSENBERG case in the Palo Alto, California, area.

Dr. KING, according to the news item in the 'Oakland Tribune," said he "will recruit 3,000 workers from 15 cities to lead some 100,000 people he expects to stage massive civil disobedience demonstrations in the nation's capital in April."


He also stated he was returning to Atlanta, Georgia, to start the recruiting of the 3,000 people who will be trained for two months in non-violent techniques. He added that Miss BAEZ and Mr. SANDPERL attended the first planning meeting for the forthcoming demonstrations which were held at Arlie House, Virginia.

Dr. KING said cooperation between whites and Negroes in civil rights matters is "temporarily on the decrease," but he hoped his Washington campaign would renew the alliance between enlightened whites and Negroes. He said he chose Washington as the target for his civil disobedience campaign "because the chief stumbling block to ending the intolerable conditions of the Negro is Congress." He added that he is sure that the government "will arrest us, will block us in any way they can, but we will not be run out of Washington. We will stay there until we get some response, even if it takes all summer and longer." He said his central demand would be "for Congress to provide a job or an income for all Americans."

She told Levison that, at a council meeting of New York SANE, on January 9, 1968, the council decided to go ahead with something, possibly in three weeks in Manhattan Center, supporting those who were indicted. She also noted that she had received an invitation from the National Conference for New Politics (NCNP), to attend a meeting to discuss an NCNP Madison Square Garden rally on February 5, 1968, for Dr. Spock. She stated that the NCNP has not made any commitment on this date as yet and that she had been told by an employee of the NCNP that they were booking all of Dr. Spock's speaking engagements.

Levison felt that it would be impossible to fill Madison Square Garden on such short notice and that if the NCNP sponsors the rally there will be resistance with a minimum of emphasis on the other issues which he said would not be sound. He said it would then speak for only one element of the Peace movement instead of trying to find a common ground on which all could speak together.

Crowder questioned whether Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., would attend such a rally if it is held. Levison was uncertain, stating that under normal conditions King would not attend a NCNP rally now but, since it is for Spock's defense, King might feel ne has to attend.

Crowder suggested that if King attends it would reunite King and Spock on a platform and provide new leadership for the Peace movement. Levison disagreed stating that King has no intention of being the leader of the Peace movement with Spock and if the NCNP tries to turn them into the leaders King would disavow it.

Levison opined that the position of Sanford Gottlieb (a national officer of SANE), that a joint statement on defense of Dr. Spock and those indicted with him is irrelevant, is unsound and rigid. Levison said that what is needed is a clear statement of the issues involved, a clear, militant statement signed by a hundred major leaders throughout the country. He suggested running a full-page ad on this and said more publicity would come from it than from a Madison Square Garden meeting.

Crowder agreed and asked Levison to assist her in its preparation. Levison asked for time stating such a statement has to be drafted not only from a standpoint of clarity of the issues but also the standpoint of who is going to be asked to sign it.

The source further advised that on January 10, 1968, Levison was in contact with Martin Luther King, Jr. Levison mentioned to King that the NCNP is trying to hold a Madison Square Garden rally on February 5, 1968, in defense of Spock and that there are considerable inter-organizational problems in connection with it because SANE and some other organizations are not sure that they want to sponsor such a rally with the NCNP. He asked what King's attitude would be if he is asked to speak at it.

King felt he would have to do it, noting that he was not sure of his schedule but that, if he is free, it is something he should do.

Levison counseled that King has to back Spock but said he was not happy about King appearing on a platform that is solely that of the NCNP because it would again make King and Spock the two leaders. He said King again would be faced with the question of whether King and Spock will run as a ticket in the presidential elections. He advised that if it becomes obligatory for King to appear, King may have to disavow the fact he is pushing to become a leader of the Peace movement. He warned that the NCNP would try to make King and Spock the leaders of the Peace movement. He noted that the NCNP has so many troubles of its own that King's identification with it at the present time is something to go at very slowly.

King wondered if there is a possibility of the rally being jointly sponsored. Levison said he had gathered that the only organization which might join with the NCNP is the Fifth Avenue Peace Parade Committee, but that the other (peace) groups would not be co-sponsors because of a hassle over what the focus of the rally will be. He said the NCNP's tendency will be to push the idea of resistance (to the draft) while the others will want to deal with issues such as civil liberties and the illegality of the war. He added that his guess is that the NCNP will want this to be their own meeting and will put pressure on King to appear.

King noted that there is time to decide because he has not as yet received an invitation. He added that he knows he will have to do something for Spock.

Levison asked King what he thought of a statement, setting forth all the issues, to be circulated around the country and signed by one or two hundred leading figures. He






Re: Proposed Madison Square Garden Rally, New York City, February 5, 1968, in defense of Dr. Benjamin Spock

said this would be published as a full-page ad in "The New York Times" newspaper. Levison said with such a statement, with people of quality politically subscribing to it, it will make more of an impression than a rally.

King felt that such a statement would be good.

Levison counseled that, if the rally is held, he feels it will be a fiasco and that King should not accept an invitation immediately if it is offered. He said that King should allow time for them to determine what the sponsorship of such a meeting looks like. He repeated that a statement, such as he described, would be more valuable then appearing at a Madison Square Garden rally.

King agreed with this and they decided to discuss it further.

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


Levison informed King that he would like to get a group of wealthy people together and obtain pledges from them in an effort to finance this program. 

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS:

Recently, King was in conference with his principal advisor and long-time secret Communist Party member, Stanley Levison, concerning this program. It was Levison's idea to get a group of wealthy people together and obtain pledges . from them in an effort to finance King's civil disobedience program.

The following information has been supplied by confidential sources of this Bureau who have furnished reliable information in the past.

Martin Luther King, Jr., was born in Atlanta, Georgia, on January 15, 1929. He is the son of a Baptist minister. He was raised in a home where he had every comfort and security. He had the advantage of coming from a family that was devotedly religious and wanted their son to follow in his father's footsteps.

Upon graduation from high school King entered Morehouse College, Atlanta, Georgia, in 1944 and remained there until he received his A.B. degree in 1948. He then entered Crozer Theological Seminary, Chester, Pennsylvania, where he was one of six Negroes among 100 students. the Plafker Award as the most outstanding student, was President of the Senior Class, and received the J. Lewis Crozer Fellowship for graduate study in the university of his choice. King graduated from Crozer Theological Seminary with a Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1951 and then went to Boston University, Boston, Massachusetts, where he secured a Ph.D. degree in 1955. 100 - 106670

Upon graduation he was offered the pastorate of 27 1967 two Baptist churches in the East and teaching posts in three colleges. King chose the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama. After becoming established in his church, he founded the Montgomery Improvement Association and led the successful Montgomery Bus Boycott Classified by 80 Fell that won him national fame. In March of 1957, he founded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) with himself as President. He still holds that position today.

In 1963 Negro leaders, principally A. Philip Randolph, President of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters Union and head of the Negro-American Labor Council, had proposed a march on the Nation's Capitol sometime in the Fall of 1963. After conferring with his principal advisor, Stanley David Levison, who agreed that the time is now, King seized the initiative and secured the cooperation of the other Negro leaders in backing King's proposal for an earlier march, a move that put King squarely in the forefront of the civil rights movement in the United States. Today when King speaks he is the voice of 20 million Negroes living inside our boundaries.

Stanley David Levison, who wants to be known only as a successful businessman and New York City attorney who has been helping the civil rights movement, is a shrewd, dedicated communist and is known as such by King.




Levison gravitated to King's group in 1956 at which time he applied equal dedication to King and the Party. He developed a close relationship with King. In 1958 he was known in King's group as "Assistant Chief." In 1961, he was Assistant Treasurer of SCLC.

In support of King's activities since 1956, Levison has expended prodigious efforts in King's behalf. He has actively engaged himself in fund-raising efforts for SCLC. Through the years, Levison has made himself so valuable to King that King does not make a speech,





write a book, or make any policy decisions without first consulting with Levison. As an example, King requested that Levison and another advisor submit five minute speeches which King could use in accepting the Nobel Peace Prize. King then selected the best material from these speeches. In King's most recent book entitled "Where Do We Go From Here?" Levison edited every chapter prior to turning it over to the publisher.




Another individual also attending King's summit conference on "black power" was New York attorney Clarence Jones. During the mid-1950s Jones held a position of leadership in the Labor Youth League, an organization which has been designated as subversive pursuant to Executive () Order 10450.

Another of King's advisors, Bayard Rustin, also attended this conference. At one time Rustin was an employee of King's but King had to let him go because his organization started having problems







than his admitted than his admitted than his admitted than his admitted affiliation with the communist movement in the late 1930s. He had probably supported various communist causes and was one of a select group of observers permitted to attend the CPUSA's 16th National Convention in 1957. For a number of years Rustin maintained contact with the Party's National Secretary, Benjamin J. Davis, who died in 1964. During 1963 Rustin frequently conferred with Davis and took the attitude that he did not care who knew it. These individuals are also known as King's advisory or research committee.



In the Spring of 1967 King changed his activities from the civil rights movement to the Peace in Vietnam movement. On April 4, 1967, in a speech at the Riverside (Church, New York, New York, he attacked the United States Government's involvement in Vietnam and called the





United States the "greatest purveyor of violence in the world today." On April 15, 1967, he was the featured speaker at the Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam march in New York, New York.

King currently is directing his attention in an effort to organize massive civil disobedience in the Nation's Capitol and 10 to 15 major cities throughout the Nation in early Spring of 1968. By conducting these demonstrations he is attempting to spur Congress into passing legislation which will remedy the plight of the Negro.



Communist Infiltration of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) Internal Security - C

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, learned on December 13, 1967, that Martin Luther King, Jr., and Stanley Levison discussed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), of which King is president. King said that for the first time he has noted that some effective administration is developing.

Levison told King he wanted to raise the question with him of getting together a group of wealthy people, specifically in connection with the civil disobedience program, in order to get a special pledge of financing from them. He suggested they might even hold a two day retreat to orient them and discuss the subject with them. Levison noted that they have a list of possibly ten to fifteen persons who have given the SCLC more than one thousand dollar donations. He said that they might add a few others to this group, but that they have to select a place for the meeting. Levison felt that they could tell those who attend that they need a certain amount of money and what part each will pledge. He said each of these persons might be able to go to someone else because there will be a problem of interpretation for middle-class whites and middle-class. Negroes.



KING SAYS HE MAY INDORSE SEN. McCARTHY

Dr. Martin Luther King said yesterday Sen. Eugene McCarthy [D., Minn.] has talked to him concerning the senator's candidacy for President.

McCarthy has challenged

McCarthy has challenged President Johnson on the Viet Nam issue, declaring the war "immoral." King has been a frequent critic of the war.

"As you know, it has been my policy not to support political candidates in the past," the civil rights leader told reporters before his address at the 11th annual dinner of the Joint Negro Appeal in the Sheraton-Chicago hotel.

Hasn't Studied Platform

But he said he has been reconsidering his position. Asked if he agreed with specific planks in McCathy's peace platform, King said he had not studied it yet.

King again said he opposed the war because millions of dollars being spent on the effort could be better used to fight the war on poverty in this country.

He said "Selma and Birmingham style tactics" will be used in Washington, D. C. next year to draw altention to civil rights and economic problems.

Maps Plans for 1968

He was referring to nonviolent demonstrations he has led in those two Alabama towns in the past.

"We have mapped our plans for 1950 but we want to meet with various groups yet."

King is director of the Southern Christian Leadership conference. He called his form of demonstrations "alternatives to riots."



APPENDIX

UNITED KLANS OF AMERICA, INC. KNIGHTS OF THE KU KLUX KLAN (UKA)

Records of the Superior Court of Fulton County, Georgia, reflect that this klan organization was granted a corporate charter on February 21, 1961, at Atlanta, Georgia, under the name United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of America, Inc.

A source advised on February 27, 1961, that United Klans was formed as a result of a split in the U. S. Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc. According to the source, the split resulted from a leadership dispute and United Klans has the same aims and objectives as the parent group. These are the promotion of Americanism, white supremacy and segregation of the races.

The first source and a second source advised in July, 1961, that United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of America, Inc., merged with Alabama Knights, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. The merged organization established headquarters in Suite 401, the Alston Building, Tuscaloosa, Alabama. The organization is directed by ROBERT SHELTON, Imperial Wizard, and is the dominant klan group in the South, with units in several southern states.

Second source advised that at a meeting at Prattville, Alabama, on October 22, 1961, the U. S. Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, merged with the United Klans of America, Inc., Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

"KINGDOM: Didn't Martin Luther King stop off in Eimini this week to urge Harlem Congressman Adam Clayton Powell to return to New York in the face of growing opposition from his constituents and so that Powell will be available during King's proposed 'massive dislocation' of Washington in April? King, by the way, has picked sunny Miami for a final meeting with disciples and a mapping of strategy for a March. He'll be here in mid-January."

On December 5, 1967, it was determined that Bernard Lee, Special Aide to King, was then registered at the Dupont Plaza Hotel, 300 Biscayne Way, Miami. On December 11, 1967, it was determined that Lee was no longer registered there.



TRADE WITH COMMUNISTS

(Mr. LIPSCOMB (at the request of Mr. Skubitz) was granted permission to extend his remarks at this point in the Record and to include extraneous matter.)

Mr. LIPSCOMB. Mr. Speaker, the propaganda campaign by the administration to promote trade with the Communists is continuing. The administration is conducting a systematic and widespread campaign to sell the American people on such trade under the theme of "building bridges."

How ironic that this theme is used, for while the American public at home is being seduced with the refrain "building bridges," their sons in Vietnam are being killed and maimed in combat efforts to destroy real Communist bridges.

A recent example of the "bridge-building" propaganda is contained in a Department of State booklet entitled, "Private Boycotts versus the National Interest." With attendant newspaper publicity thousands of copies of the booklet were made available to the American public on September 7.

Not only does the Department in the booklet attempt to sell the idea generally of expanding trade with Communist nations, it attempts to convince the American public and members of this House and the other body of the merits in a piece of legislation which was sent to the Congress last May 11 to provide the executive branch with authority to negotiate commercial agreements with the U.S.R. and Eastern European Communist nations.

The Department of State booklet is remarkable for what it says and it is remarkable for what it falls to say.

Throughout the booklet one encounters self-serving terms such as "peaceful trade" or "trade in peaceful goods." It mentions trade in terms of Christmas tree ornaments, hams, vases, ashtrays, baskets, and tobacco. But the Department of State booklet does not discuss the kind of items the Communist countries want to and are obtaining from us which help build up their economic and military potential. Many export licenses have been granted which permit shipments to the Soviet Union and other Communist countries of advanced equipment and machines.

The Department of State does not comment on exporting American technology. And yet with increasing frequency the Federal Government grants licenses to export to the Communists technical data and prototypes.

In all Communist states military and economic factors are closely interrelated. There is every reason to believe that past exports of American technology could be used against us in our current war against communism in southeast Asia. And continued exports of American technology could be used against us in this and future wars. There is no reason to believe otherwise.

According to the administration's "bridge builders," there is no harm done if we trade with the "good" Communists. Those who control the Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria, and Yugoslavia are placed in that category. The administration "bridge builders" whenever possible avoid mention of the fact that these Communists are each day assisting North Vietnam.

Recently, at the very time that the State Department was distributing its latest propaganda booklet on building bridges, Radio Moscow was boasting that the Soviet Union has pledged to give North Vietnam all the aid it needs to strengthen its defenses and keep itself going economically. Radio Moscow boasted of the modern weapons, transportation equipment, drugs, food, and clothing it has given North Vietnam. Radio Moscow also boasted of how it has trained North Vietnamese pilots. And, according to Radio Moscow "All this help will continue." Significant amounts of supplies are also being sent to North Vietnam from other Eastern European Communist nations.

I call upon the administration to halt its efforts to propagandize the American people in this way. The American people will not be fooled or coerced into believing that the trade the Communists have in mind is in our national interest.

Mr. Speaker, I submit that all this confusion about Vietnam across this great country of ours is hampering our war effort; has given power out of all proportion to those small groups who want us to get out of Vietnam. Many people are misreading the public pulse and continue making speeches reflecting the views of highly vocal small pressure groups.

Mr. Speaker, I submit that this great body should not be swayed back and forth daily by the whims of these small

groups. I say that the buck stops here. A lot of the confusion on the Vietnam issue is being generated right here in the Congress. The Congress can make a solid contribution to the conclusion of the war by going on record as supporting all military action necessary to win the war.

Let us give notice to the rest of the world. Let us show precisely the extent of our resolve.

If this body unanimously endorses a stronger policy in southeast Asia, then we can get on with the job without having to be more concerned with domestic opposition than with the enemy.

And what of the effect this wrangling has on our troops in Vietnam, on our allies, on the wavering underdeveloped countries, and on the Communist countries.

The morale of American troops remains high, but how long can their combat efficiency remain unimpaired when they daily read of bickering in the highest levels of Government and around the country. No American wants to sacrifice his life for a cause that he constantly hears is not a just cause. No American

And what of the effect of this "dialog" is having on Communist, on the enemy? All indications are that it has been a large factor in their decision to hang on indefinitely. Why? Because they read our "soul searching" on Vietnam policy as a sign that we are weak and divided and will waver and guit.

Our men in the field are doing a great job. Ground and air operations in the south have severely limited the ability of the enemy to move and fight on ground of his own choosing. The bombing in the north, carried out by the Air Force and the Navy, has been costly to the enemy; made it more difficult for him to send men and materials to the south, and has in fact reduced the flow of men and materials to the south.

But we have imposed severe restrictions on our military commanders in the field. Particularly on those men carrying out air attacks on North Vietnam. Our military men are nearly unanimous in saying that the bombing program is a vital part of our strategy to defeat the enemy.

But the North Vietnamese have not been hurt badly enough to want to end the war. It is probabily an axiom of war that victory cannot be attained or war ended so long as both sides believe they can win. We know we can win. But we have not convinced the communists that they cannot win.

It follows that the communists will not see the advantages of peace until they see the enormous disadvantages of carrying on a fight with the greatest power the earth has ever seen.

Let us use some of this power. There is no point in using peashooters in a war

The big bogeyman in all this is Communist China. Many peoples seem to be convinced the Chinese will intervene in the war if we escalate the bombing. In early 1965 there were also many people convinced that the introduction of large numbers of American troops into South Vietnam would bring the Chinese in. Nothing Happened. Many were convinced that bombing the north would bring China in. It did not. Bombing the Hanoi and Haiphing areas produced little reaction from China.

There is little indication that bombing in itself, regardless of its extent, will bring the Chinese in. There are a number of reasons for this. First, the Chinese have proved themselves to be extremely cautions, and very aware of the destruction that will be visited on China if she challenges the United States. Second, the Chaos in China is so great that the loyalty of large numbers of troops is in question, and the Chinese are in no condition to wage war against the United States. Third, the North Vietnamese are unlikely to call in the Chinese unless they decide we are determined to overthrow their Communist government. It is plain that this is not our intention.

Mr. Speaker, it is obvious to me that we have gone as far along the road to negotiations as we can without some movement from the other side. A negotiated settlement means both sides have to compromise. Further, even to begin negotiations requires some measure of compromise, a decision to accept less than complete humiliation of the other side. We have already made several concessions, and have indicated that the United States is willing to accept less

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I have received your letter of December 6th, with enclosure, and the interest and concern which prompted you to write are appreciated.

In response to your inquiry as to whether there is any legal action that can be taken against persons who openly advocate civil disobedience, the FBI is strictly an investigative agency of the Federal Government and does not determine whether prosecution will be instituted in any situation. Such decisions, insofar as violations of Federal laws are concerned, are within the province of the United States Department of Justice.

I can assure you we will continue to discharge our responsibilities in the internal security field with the highest degree of thoroughness and dispatch, and that any information obtained which might indicate a violation of law over which this Bureau has investigative jurisdiction will be furnished to the United States Department of Justice for prosecutive consideration.

I am enclosing some material which contains my views regarding civil disobedience.

I am writing because I am greatly concerned, as I am sure many americans are, about the growing trend toward civil disobedience. For several months <u>martin</u> Luther ming has openly pledged to lead "waves of the oppressed and disinherited upon Washington". This demonstration, according to his words, will engage in open non-violent civil disobedience.

I believe in freedom and civil rights. But as I understand the law, our freedom and our civil rights are not without certain limitations. These limitations, as I understand, are for the purpose of guaranteeing the freedom and civil rights of others.

It appears to me that there should be a law prohibiting open advocation of civil disobelience. We have laws prohibiting treason, sedition, and the fomentation of riots. Is there any legal action that can be taken on this matter? Or do the people of these United States simply have to endure?

Flease do not feel that I am an antagonist and, therefore, disregard my letter. I am simply an interested person seeking an answer for these questions. I would appreciate a reply. REC 47 100 106670 - 2173

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King Reveals Strategy for Capital Siege

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., laying blame for poverty and racism on the federal government, said Monday he will launch prolonged, disruptive demonstrations in Washington next spring with the help of antiwar groups.

"We will go there, we will demand to be heard and we will stay until America responds." King said at a news conference.

King said his organization, Southern Christian Leadership Conference, "will lead waves of the nation's poor and disinherited" into the national capital to demand government action for "jobs or income for all."

THE CAMPAIGN probably will begin "around the first of April," King said, and at first will involve 3,000 volunteers from 10 major cities— which he would not specify—in some type of civil disobedience.

King said the new move might turn into the first major merging of antiwar and civil rights forces. "As we escalate it, all peace groups will be c_lled in." he said. These groups will be drawn in to support the "jobs or income" demands, he said.

The United States is fighting two wars, one in Vietnam and the other against poverty and injustice at home, he said. "And we're losing both."

KING SAID targets would be federal agencies, Congress and perhaps the White House. The question of pitching tents in the capital would have to be settled later, he said.

King, who announced plans for a Washington campaign three months ago, said again he considered this a "kind of last resort for nonviolence."

"Very frankly," he said, "this is a search for an alternative to the riots." King predicted the worst violence in U.S. history unless there is favorable response to demands for action a ainst poverty and racial discrimination.

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

II. GENERAL RACIAL CONDITIONS

LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA



In the "Los Angeles Sentinel," Los Angeles Negro newspaper, of October 19, 1967, page Al, was an article reporting a cutback in the Teen Post program in the Los Angeles area, to prevent the complète cancellation of other anti-poverty programs. The Economic and Youth Opportunities Agency (EYOA) approved a budget of only \$500,000 for the Teen Posts instead of the present budget of almost 1.6 million dollars. The EYOA also announced the discontinuance of several fringe programs.

In the "Los Angeles Sentinel" of October 26, 1967, page B5, was an article reporting that Dr. Wade Jackson, chairman of the board at St. Stephen's United Community Association, charged the EYOA with discrimination. Mr. JOE MALDOHADO, local head of the EYOA, had charged the group in September with a discrepancy in funds, fired the project director, and refused to fund the Headstart program of the association. Jackson indicated he would ask for a federal investigation of the charges.

In the Los Angeles "Herald-Dispatch," Los Angeles Negro newspaper, of November 2, 1967, page 1, was an article reporting approximately 300 workers for the Neighborhood Adult Participation Project (NAPP), funded by the EYOA, faced dismissal on November 13, 1967. Many of the workers, according to the article, would have to return to welfare since they are not trained for other employment. The article was critical of the EYOA for hiring people for a period of two to three years, then letting them go without helping them find other employment.

In the "Los Angeles Sentinel" of November 2, 1967, page A7, was a column written by Stanley G. Robertson, reporting that Harry E. Dolan, a member of the Watts Writers Workshop (WWW), run by screenwriter Budd Schulberg, had been hired by Warner Brothers to do the screenplay for a hit musical entitled "No Strings." The column criticized the black nationalist attitude and those who preach separation of the races, and pointed out that Dolan would probably not be a writer today but for his contact with and training by Schulberg.

In the "Los Angeles Times" of November 3, 1967, II-1, was an article reporting that an office for the Watts Renewal Project had been opened at 1516 East 103 Street, Los Angeles. The office will house the Community Redevelopment Agency staff, the Office of Community Development, the Watts Citizens Advisory Committee, and Social Service Agencies. The office is to serve primarily as headquarters for the planned redevelopment of the Watts area.


In the "Los Angeles Sentinel" of November 9, 1967, page 1, was an article reporting that former school teachers Donald Daniels, age 32, and Lee Wheeler, age 38, who had pleaded guilty in September to one count each of statutory rape involving a 17 year old Negro female student, were sentenced on November 7, 1967, to three years probation. Both teachers, who are Caucasian, resigned shortly after their arrest in February 1967.

In the "Los Angeles Times" of November 9, 1967, II-6, was an article reporting that the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) had proposed a series of steps to integrate Los Angeles City schools, which would not require large amounts of money. They proposed the following steps:

Instead of building conventional neighborhood schools, the district could build "educational parks" and complexes to draw students from various racial groups.

Use of the "Princeton Plan" of pairing two or more nearby schools to serve a larger area.

Use of "magnet schools" with superior educational programs to draw students from various areas.

The simple procedure of revising school boundaries.

The ACLU also suggested that if it was made clear there was a district-wide program to end discrimination, flight to "lily-white" schools and neighborhoods would be less tempting.

In the "Los Angeles Times" of November 15, 1967, II-8, was an article reporting that Marquette Frye, one of two brothers whose arrests were credited with starting the Watts riot in August 1965, had been tooked on suspicion of burglary in Altadena, California, by Los Angeles County Sheriff's Office (LASO) deputies. The officers, responding to a call by a market employee at 4:24 AM, arrested a man in the parking lot of the store after finding a window of the store broken. They arrested Frye and another individual in a pick-up truck two blocks away.








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


LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA



In the "Los Angeles Sentinel" of October 19, 1967, page Al, was an article reporting that Reverend Martin Luther King had recently advised the "Sentinel" he planned to "establish a beachhead" for his "operation breadbasket" in California within the next six weeks, "to break the white establishment's stranglehold." King indicated his first activity would be in Los Angeles and the Sen Francisco area. King referred to similar operations in Chicago and Cleveland, which he described as "militant' non-violent resistance" in answer to the Black Power advocates. The primary objectives of King's activity are to secure more jobs for Negroes, upgrade Negro jobs, pursuade markets to stock goods manufactured by Negro firms and ask white businesses to advertise more in Negro publications. The article reported King's operation in Chicago resulted in 25 thousand jobs and an increase in Negro income of an estimated 16 million dollars a year plus the expanding of the Negro economy generally.



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

In the "Santa Ana Register," newspaper of Santa Ana, California, was an article reporting that Keith Lowe, Negro "black nationalist, University of California assistant professor," told approximately 40 students at the University of California at Irvine that violence was a "cleansing force" and guerrilla warfare tactics must be used to achieve a social revolution in the United States. Lowe criticized Russian Communism for "falling victim to its own bureaucracy" and pointed out in contrast that the "Chinese revolution is creating a spiritual revolution of the individual." He stated advancing technology has given society the means for oppression. He said, "We must, through guerrilla tactics, destroy this ability of technology to oppress us." (Issue of November 11, 1967).

In the "Los Angeles Herald-Examiner" of November 6, 1967, page A4, was an article reporting that Jacques Torczyner, national president of the Zionist Organization of America, stated at a press conference that there was a "definite anti-Semitic tendency" within the Negro movement in the United States. He stated it was the responsibility of the Negro leadership to put an immediate end to the situation.

In the "Loc Angeles Times" of November 8, 1967, I-28, was an article reporting that New York Rabbi Mark H. Tannenbaum, of the American Jevish Committee, had charged that Congress, by refusing to support the anti-poverty program, was undermining Nogro hopes and "raising the specter of a black nationalist war of liberation." Tannenbaum stated that he based his conclusions on a recent tour of the slum areas of several major cities.

supremacy doctrine was on the upswing in various schools in the Los Angeles area. He believed this might be temporary, however, and attributed it to the great amount of publicity being given the doctrine by the newspapers. In the "Los Angeles Times" of November 17, 1967, I-1, was an article reporting that bus drivers for the Rapid Transit District (RTD) in the Los Angeles area had announced they would conduct a walkout unless drivers in the South Los Angeles area and other "high crime" areas, were protected by armed guards on the buses, in the light of numerous robberies and assaults upon drivers in that area in recent years. Los Angeles County Supervisors allocated almost two million dollars for armed guards and two-way radios on local buses, but union spokesmen stated the offers were not enough to stave off a walkout. Sheriff Peter Pitchess stated he did not favor armed guards on buses, and RTD Manager, Dale Barratt, stated he did not think the RTD should arm any of its men. The walkout is scheduled for November 27, 1967, unless guards are provided. A suggested source of the guards was from the ranks of retired police and sheriff's officers, and retired military personnel. The RTD further proposed allocating over \$1,700,000 from its reserve fund for the installation of two-way emergency radios in buses. District Attorney Evelle J. Younger ordered a "get tough" policy on prosecuting persons charged with robberies and assaults on bus drivers.





VII. OBJECTIVES SOUGHT BY MINORITY COMMUNITY AND POSSIBLE POINTS OF CONTENTION

LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

In the "Los Angeles Times" of October 23, 1967, I-3, was an article reporting that William Elkins, Director of the Teen Post program in the Los Angeles area, announced the situation at Manual Arts High School was proof that the Teen Post program should not have been cut back in funds. He stated administrators and volunteers of the program had worked in the high school area "keeping our kids off the streets." Elkins stated he and other administrators are attempting to have fund cuts reinstated locally, or obtain funds from the Office of Economic Opportunity in Washington, D.C.

MANUAL ARTS HIGH SCHOOL (MAHS)

In the Los Angeles "Herald-Dispatch" of October 26, 1967, page A8, was an article reporting that Mrs. Margaret Wright, "militant leader of the United Parents Council" (UPC), had won the bettle, in that Mr. Robert Danahy, whose ouster as principal at the high school was demanded by black nationalist groups, would leave the school in February 1968. Mrs. Wright stated that despite the fact that Denahy was leaving, this would not solve the problems at Manual, Jefferson, Carver (Junior high school), and other schools in the area, unless the Board of Education took steps to honor the 5-point program offered by the mothers in the area. This proposed program is as follows:

- (1) At least one full-time security officer should be assigned to schools in the area for the protection of faculty, staff, and law-abiding citizens.
- (2) Institute a more complete guidance program.
- (3) Greater use of special schools for problem students.
- (h) A better health program for the schools.
- (5) Replacement of worn-out and out of date books.

In the "Los Angeles Harald-Dispatch" of October 26, 1967, page 1, was an article reporting that Celes King III, president of the Central Los Angeles Branch, Hational Association for the Advancement of Colored Paople (NAACP), disavowed any responsibility for the "riotous disturbances" at MAHS. He stated the situation erupted because of the refusal of the School Board to honor the protests of parents. King stated charges had been filed with the School Board against principal Denahy in May 1967, asking for an executive session concerning the principal, however, the Board refused to hold the session on the technical ground the requests were not in writing. King stated he was trying to bring the entire matter before the courts, by obtaining an injunction against the spending of further funds by the Board in the building and maintenance of schools, to resolve the matter.

In the "Los Angeles Sentinel," October 24, 1967, page Al, was an article reporting that Judge Ralph Nutter had issued a restraining order against Mrs. Margaret Wright to keep her from intersering with classes at MAHS. The article reported that half the 180 teachers at the school had appeared before the Board of Education to demand an injunction against "molestation by outsiders," and added security guards outside the school. School Board President, Mrs. Georgiana Hardy, announced the Board had voted to seek a court order banning all outside demonstrations at the school, to provide funds to improve education, and urging principal Denahy to stay on his job. Joseph M. Brooks, executive secretary of the Los Angeles Teachers Association, announced his group supported the MAHS teachers in their demends and threatened to close Los Angelos schools if their demands were not met. Walter Bremond, chairwan of the Black Congress, described as a group representing 25 Negro organizations, was quoted as stating the Board of Education was not "off the hook" by its token appearement. He stated his group would continue to press for general improvements, not only at MAHS, but in all city schools.

VIII. REACTION OF LEADERS AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY TO MINORITY DEMANDS

IOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

In the "Los Angeles Times" of November 2, 1967, II-4, was an editorial by Nick B. Williams regarding the Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee, which is investigating the causes of riots. The editorial recognized the committee might come up with some evidence of participation by subversive organizations, or even of conspiracy, but expressed the opinion that basic social and economic conditions were one of the primary causes of rioting and a change in these conditions would be the best means of preventing riots.

In the "Los Angeles Times" of November 7, 1967, II-1, was an article reporting that Governor Ronald Reagan, in addressing a convention of California grocers, told them his administration was ready to move to stop riots before they start. He stated the chief function of government was to "protect society from the lawbreaker." Reagan's further remarks were a discussion of his administration.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, learned on November 19, 1967, that on that date, Stanley Levison and Martin Luther King, Jr., discussed an invitation which King had received to attend the one hundredth anniversary celebration of the birth of the W.E.B. DuBois to be held in Carnegie Hall, New York City, in February, 1968. King wanted Levison's opinion on accepting this invitation. King said that he did not know who is sponsoring the celebration, that Jack O'Dell had called him once, but that another person had been the main caller. added that he had also been urged to attend by a person he met at a luncheon. King noted that there will be only one speech at the luncheon and that they want him to make it. He feels that he should accept because of the contribution < that DuBois made to Negroes. He said he knows "Freedomways"; magazine has something to do with it.

Levison stated that he would want to know the sponsoring group so that it could be determined if it is reasonably broad or very narrow. He said that if the sponsorship is narrow including just people around "Freedomways", it should be broadened.



The records of the New York State Secretary of State, Albany, New York, show that the Certificate of Incorporation of Freedomways Associates, Inc., was filed on March 2, 1961.

On May 24, 1961, a source advised that a report was given on "Freedomways" at a meeting of the National Board, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), held on May 24, 1961. It was stated that the central purpose of "Freedomways" is to develop a theory and positive criticism of currents in the Negro Movement, as well as to raise the level of understanding and discussion taking place in Negro life today and to project a socialist and pro-Soviet orientation.

On May 25, 1961, a second source advised that "Freedomways" was set up for the CP, USA by JAMES JACKSON.

The First Quarter, 1967, issue of "Freedomways", self-described as "A Quarterly Review of the Negro Freedom Movement" published by Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, 799 Broadway, New York City, lists the following as its editorial staff:

JOHN HENRIK CLARKE, Associate Editor ESTHER JACKSON, Managing Editor J. H. O'DELL, Associate Managing Editor JOHN L. DEVINE, Art Editor

A third source made available information on July 1, 1964, indicating that JOHN HENRIK CLARKE attended the first and founding meeting of the American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS) which was held on December 19, 1963, and continued on January 10, 1964.

This source also made available information on August 14, 1964, indicating that CLARKE is an "Associate" of AIM

A source advised on April 9, 1963, that on April 7, 1963, at a meeting of the District Committee of the Communist Party, United States of America (CPUSA), of New England, held in Boston, Massachusetts, HERBERT APTHEKER stated he was developing an organization called American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS), which would eventually legalize the CP. He stated AIMS would publish literature on History, Science, Physics, Archeology and other subjects which would be put out quarterly with various supplements.



A fourth source reported on August 29, 1965, that AIMS issues a "Newsletter" every other month. This source also made available the information that AIMS issues publications and holds symposiums concerning Marxism.

A fifth source advised on May 9, 1967, that as of that date, AIMS was located on the fifth floor west of 20 West 30th Street, New York, New York.






