What was WSIS



Two phases:

- Geneva 2003 – Declaration of Principles and Action Plan
- Tunis 2005 – Tunis Agenda (financial and internet issues)

Core principle:

- ‘a people-centred, inclusive and development-oriented Information Society’

Outcomes include:

- Institutional framework (action plan, WSIS Forum, IGF)
- approaches to international discussion (including multistakeholder participation)
- ten- (and now twenty-) year review
