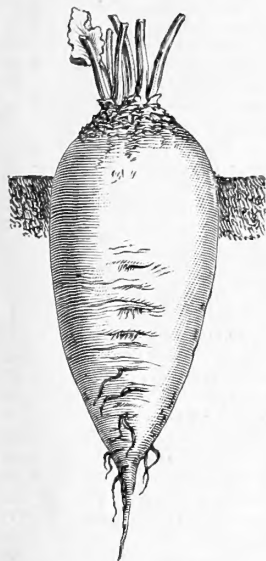

FLOWER SEED.

Special Cultural Directions.

Referring to the letters in the fourth column of the Flower Seed List.

A Sow for succession from April to June, for summer and autumn blooming. Prepare the ground thoroughly by digging, adding a good supply of leaf-mould or well-rotted manure, making the surface fine and smooth. Sow thinly, lightly covering.

B Sow in gentle heat, in a well drained pot or pan of light soil. Sow thinly and cover lightly with a fine, sandy soil. Shade from bright sunshine, and water when necessary through a fine rose watering pot. Transplant to open ground, when all danger of frost is over. The seed may also be sown in a cold frame in April or open border in the latter part of May, but will not flower so early. Transplant or thin out before the plants get too large.

C Sow from April to June or in August, in a well prepared bed of light soil, covering the seed lightly. Keep clear of weeds, and thin out the plants if too thick, sufficiently early to allow them to develop their growth.

D Sow in spring, in a well drained pot or well prepared hot-bed of light, peaty, sandy soil. Place in a moderately warm temperature, shade from bright sunshine and keep moist, transplanting when ground is in proper condition, or in open ground after May 10th, for late flowers.

E Sow in open border in April or May, and thin out or transplant, giving each plenty of room.

F Sow any season, in a pot prepared as follows: let the pot be one-third full of drainage or broken charcoal; over that rough sittings of mould, and the surface with very fine soil, half of which should be composed of fine, sharp sand; water with fine sprinkler; scatter the seed thickly over the surface, covering very lightly; keep from the direct rays of the sun. As soon as the plants show a third leaf transplant into seed pans, three-fourths of an inch apart, giving a little air to strengthen them. When the plants begin to touch each other, they should be transplanted singly into small pots and keep them in a cool, airy part of the greenhouse near the glass. Re-pot when necessary.

PEARL OF SAVOY POTATO.

Extracts from the *Rural New-Yorker*, August 9 and 30, 1884.

EXPERIMENT GROUNDS OF THE "RURAL NEW-YORKER."

"**PEARL OF SAVOY.**—This was the first to sprout—the first to bloom. The foliage was wide-spreading, and began to die July 16th. THE SEED WAS BADLY SPROUTED WHEN PLANTED. The tubers were dug JULY 29th. The yield was at the rate of 699.09 bushels to the acre; 18 3/4 to the hill. Among the best, five tubers weighed two pounds four and one-half ounces. Sixty per cent. of the yield were of marketable size. The skin is nearly the color of Early Rose; eyes not prominent; quite uniform in size and shape; no very large potatoes, few small ones. The seed was received from Joseph Breck & Sons. Sold at \$5.00 per barrel."—August 30.

"**VICK'S EXTRA EARLY.**—The claim is made for this that it is the earliest potato in cultivation, and of excellent quality. It was sold at \$2.00 per pound last season by James Vick, of Rochester, of whom we received the seed. It was planted April 7th. The vines were bushy and low. They began to die July 16th, and the tubers were dug July 30th. The yield was at the rate of 370.55 bushels to the acre. Among the best, five weighed one pound three ounces. They averaged 18 3/4 to a hill, and 27 per cent. were of marketable size."

Drainage Insures Certainty of Crops

The cultivator of level, undrained lands is continually harassed in mind about the uncertainty of his business. He must wait until the season is well advanced to plow his land. Then, if he plants, he is uncertain whether the weather will be favorable or unfavorable. It may "turn off wet," and the constant evaporation, keeping the land cold, causes the seed to rot. If the season be favorable for the germination of the seed, and the young and tender plants appear, then it may "turn off showery," and the land become so wet as to place it out of his power to cultivate it, and the crop turns out badly; or, if the season be dry in the after part, the land, which is naturally wet, will dry out and become hard, and the crop damaged. Hence it is that such a farmer must plod along and scratch, wet or dry, and depend on uncertainties, accept his fate and blame Providence.

But the farmer who cultivates land which is **THOROUGHLY UNDERDRAINED**, can break it a week or ten days earlier in the spring; the soil is loose and friable, and he can plant fully ten days earlier, with a positive certainty that the seed, if good, will germinate; he can cultivate sooner, and with a third less labor to both man and beast; can be stirring the soil in twenty-four hours after a heavy rainfall. The soil is warmer, and promotes the more rapid growth of the crop, and is less liable to damage from late frosts in spring or early frosts in autumn, practically lengthening the season for growth and maturity fully thirty days, or if the weather should be dry, the roots, descending deep into the earth, bring up moisture from below, producing an abundant yield. Whether the season be wet or dry, the farmer on drained land has a certainty of an abundant yield, which enables him to mature his plans without liability to failure. The experience of the past seasons of extreme drouth in some localities has fully demonstrated the fact that drainage protects against damage from this cause.

Soils underlaid with clay, if underdrained, will average fully one-third increase of products, in many instances more than double the product, and in some instances it insures an abundant yield where little, if anything, could be grown before.

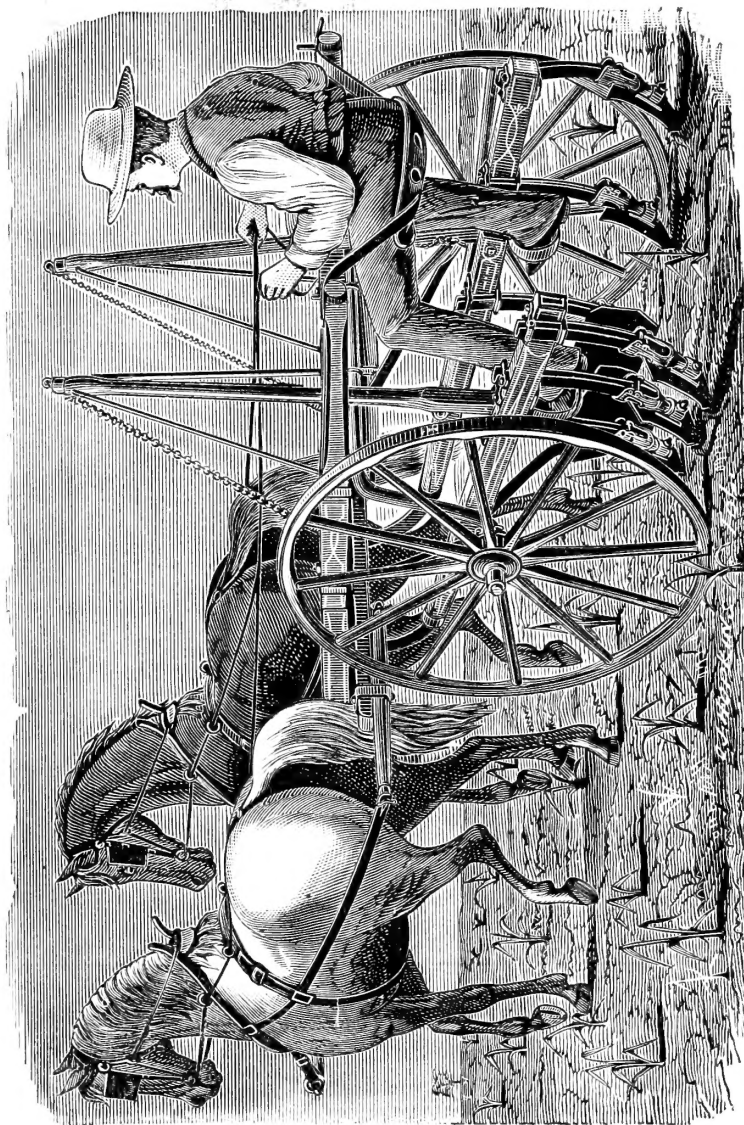
