PREFACE.

So much has been done since 1874 to elucidate the Geology and Botany of the County that I am induced to bring out a new edition of my former Volume, and in doing so I gratefully acknowledge the valuable help in the Geological section from Professor Prestwich, Mr. J. W. Hulke, F.R.S., Mr. Clement Reid, Mr. Jukes Browne, and Mr. Starke Gardner, and in the Botanical section from the Rev. W. Movle Rogers, without whose contributions to the Rubi and Rosæ the list would be far from complete; the frequent occurrence of his name in almost every page shows how much I am i.debted to him for the records of new stations, and in some instances of new plants. I am equally indebted to the Rev. R. P. Murray, and to Mr. H. Ridley, and Mr. W. Fawcett, who thoroughly examined many parts of the County before they left the Botanical Department of the British Museum, the former for the Directorship of the Government Gardens and Forest Department at Singapore, the latter for that of the Government Gardens at Gordon Town, Jamaica. and to the Rev. Lester-Lester, Mr. T. R. A. Briggs, Rev. E. F. Linton, and many others, whose names are attached to the localities they record.

TOPOGRAPHY.

Compared with other counties, Dorsetshire is small, having only an area of 632,025 acres, or 988 square miles. Of these in 1870 there were 453,965 acres under cultivation, leaving 178,060 for permanent pasture, heaths, woods, moorlands, and the insignificant portions occupied by town, villages, and roads. The shape of Dorsetshire is triangular, having its apex on the Devonshire, and its base on the Hampshire boundary; a narrow spur at Hawksworth runs between Devonshire on one side, and Somersetshire on the other; a broader one on the north side penetrates some distance into Wiltshire; with these exceptions the triangle is nearly uninterrupted. Its greatest length is from Lyme Regis to Cranborne, and its greatest breadth from Weymouth to Silton.

The coast-line has an eastern aspect from Bournemouth to Durleston Head and a western from St. Alban's Head to Lyme Regis. At Poole and Weymouth there are two deep indentations, besides several minor ones at Studland, Swanage, and Kimmeridge Bays, Chapman's Pool, Worbarrow, and Lulworth Cove.

The inland border of the county is marked almost exclusively by an artificial line, an insignificant portion only of it being bounded by sections of the rivers Yeo and Axe. Four ranges of hills running east and west enclose valleys of varied breadth. The Vale of Blackmore is the most extensive and takes in about one-third of the county. The Oxford and Kimmeridge Clays, which predominate, and the Lias on the west, are favourable for dairy and grazing farms. The north-western part shares rich pastures with cultivated grounds, and has a brashy subsoil, while the elevated tracts of chalk on the northern side of the county, and occasional patches farther south, are mainly devoted to the cultivation of corn, roots, and forage by which large flocks of sheep are maintained. The heath district, which stretches from Alderholt to the neighbourhood of Dorchester and takes in the Poole basin, is very unproductive. Previous to the agricultural depression the most favourable patches were brought into cultivation; these are now to a great extent returned to their normal condition of heath and furze. These wastes are of inestimable value to the botanist, and protect many a plant whose extirpation is risked by the plough-share and drain-pipe. But even here they are The greed for rare plants is a standing source of not out of danger. danger. Exchange clubs have much to account for in this respect, as they hold out temptations to the collector to take more plants than he requires for his own use or his own immediate friends to swell the herbaria of strangers and foreigners.

DRAINAGE.

Δ

The Axe or Exe, which rises at Axnoll, near Cheddington, is joined in the early part of its course at East Swillets, near Seaborough, by a tributary originating from the drainage of Lewesdon Hill, also by another from the western side of the same range, which after uniting pass through Broadwindsor and enter the main stream on its left bank near Wayford, where a third tributary from springs below Shave Lane Hill, one of the high cretaceous outliers which form the picturesque features of this attractive part of Dorsetshire, feeds it on its right bank.

Pillesdon Hill furnishes a streamlet, which after pursuing a northerly direction passes about a mile below Thorncombe, and joins the Axe near Winsham; several small rills flow into the main stream between this and the county border.

The Brit rises on the north side of Beaminster from springs under White Sheet Hill, receiving the Simene from the hills above Symondsbury, between the town of Bridport and the harbour. The Asker from springs near Askerswell runs in a westerly direction to its junction with a considerable tributary at Long Loders, it is fed by three other rivulets, one rising above the marshes of Witherston, another from the base os Eggardon Hill, both uniting at Milton, and the third, rising at or near Hook Park, unites about a nile lower down.

INDEPENDENT STREAMS.

The Bredy rises at Little Bredy, and, after passing Long Bredy, where it receives a clear crystalline stream from the overhanging heights which surround this lovely village, after receiving accessories from Gorwell, Luke, Puncknowle, and Swyre on its left bank; from Litton Cheney

Chilcombe, and Sturthill on its right; and the drainage of Shipton Beacon and the neighbourhood, much less at Grayson, it continues its course through the village of Burton Bradstock to the sea on the west side

of Burton Cliff.

The Char rises from the bases of Pillesdon and Lewesdon Hills, and, before reaching the village of Whitchurch Canonicorum it receives several minor streamlets, the most considerable of which comes from the neighbourhood of Bettiscombe, and the eastern side of Lambert Castle and Conic Castle Hills, from whence it runs in a southern direction and meets the sea at Charmouth.

A little brook, which rises at Hadden Hill and passes through Chideock, falls into the sea two miles east of Charmouth.

The Lyme, which rises at the borders of the county above Uplyme, after a course of four miles, meets the sea near The Cobb, receiving only a small confluent at Colway.

R.

The Yeo or Ivel rises near Milborne Port, where it is joined by a stream whose springs are at Charleton Hawthorn, and another from Purse Caundle, after passing through Bradford Abbas, where it is joined by a river from springs from Batcombe and Hilfield passing through Chetnole, Yetminster, and Bere Hackett; another from springs at Buckshaw, a third from Chelborough, and a fourth from Halstock.

The Frome, which rises near Evershot, passes through a Greensand valley to Swanhills, about three-quarters of a mile from Cattistock, where it is joined by the drainage of a collateral valley from springs from the hills around Corscombe and Rampisham, and lower down a rill from Chilfrome. At Maiden Newton the Frome has a considerable accession by the confluence of the *Hook*, which rises at the base of the Toller Down range and the stream which drains the valley of West Compton and Wynford Eagle. An important tributary, the *Cerne*, which rises under the Minterne and Up Cerne ranges, joins the river at Wolveton. Passing on by the north side of Dorchester and Fordington it receives a further supply at Stafford from the Winterbourne, which rises above Winterbourne Abbas, and flows into the Poole estuary without any further accession excepting the little Luckford stream, which helps to isolate Purbeck from the main-land.

INDEPENDENT STREAMS.

The Wey flows from springs near the Church at Upwey at the junction of the Purbeck beds with the Portland sands; after passing through Broadwey, Nottington, and Radipole it falls into the Weymouth Back-water, which also receives on its western side two insignificant streamlets from West Chickerell and East Fleet. A small rivulet which falls into the Fleet near Langton Herring Parsonage rises at East Elworth, in the parish of Portisham. The drainage of Whiteway Hill at East Lulworth contributes a little rill which passes close to the East Lodge gates of Lulworth Park, and falls into the sea at Arish Mill, Worthbarrow Bay.

The Puddle rises at Plush, and flows without receiving any tributary until it reaches Burleston, where it is joined by the Devilish stream from springs near Bingham's Melcombe. Near Hyde it receives an affluent, which, rising at Hilton, passes through Milton, Milbourne St. Andrew, and Bere Regis. Finally it flows into the Poole estuary below Wareham.

INDEPENDENT STREAM.

Sherford river, which rises near the base of Woodbury Hill, after flowing through Morden Park lake, passes on the north side of Wareham and enters the Poole estuary at Lytchett Bay.

K.

The Stour, which is one of the principal rivers of the county, crosses the Wiltshire border near Penselwood, and passing through Sturminster, Blandford, and Wimborne it crosses the county boundary at West Parley, a distance of about 55 miles. It receives several affluents, of which the Lidden and the Cale are in this district (E), the Winterbourne, the Tarrant, and the Allen in the F District. The Lidden rises at East Knoyle and joins the Stour at Accliff Mill, also Fernbrook, which rises at the base of the hill below Shaftesbury, as well as the stream whose junction with the Stour is at Manston. The Cale, which unites with the Lidden at Stalbridge Mill, rises near Wincanton. The sources of the Lidden are at Buckland Newton and Whitfield. A stream, whose sources are under the Bulbarrow range, after passing through Fifehead Neville, enters the Stour north of Sturminster Newton. A small stream from Fontmell Magna enters the Stour at Little Fontmell, near Hayward Bridge, which is the limit of District E.

F.

The first accession this lower section of the Stour receives is near Durweston Bridge by the Iwerne stream, which rises at Iwerne Minster; the Tarrant, which rises at Tarrant Gunville, joins it at Crawford Bridge, and the Winterbourne from the springs of Winterbourne Houghton at Sturminster Marshall. At Wimborne it receives the Allen from springs north of St. Giles and Gussage St. Michael. Below the junction of the two streams it passes through the picturesque lake of Crichel. From Wimborne the Stour continues its south-easterly direction, and after passing Canford and Hampreston it crosses the county border about half-a-mile below West Parley. Moor's river, which rises under the Pentridge range, passes through Cranborne and Verwood and crosses the county border at St. Leonard's Bridge.

G.

The Corfe river, which commences its course at North Eggleston, passes through Steeple; at Puddle Mill it receives contributions from East Whiteway and Church Knowle; near the Corfe Castle gorge a rivulet from the Blashenwell spring and the Byle brook flow into it; at Wych it ends its course in the Poole estuary. There is only one stream east of Byle's brook from springs near Westwood under Ninebarrow Down, and joined by a rill from Godlingstone it flows into the sea north of the town of Swanage. A forked rivulet after a short course from springs under Westhill falls into the sea at Chapman's Pool, and a rill from springs above Encombe House. Several independent streams flow into the Poole estuary—1, from Furzebrook and East Creech to Turner's Cove; 2, from Hixon to Middlebere; 3, from Rempstone Heath to Ower and Fitzworth.

RHÆTIC BEDS.

The Rhætic Beds first appear on the coast between Axminster and Lyme; they are characterised by Avicula contorta and pass eastward beneath the Lias, which constitutes the base of the Jurassic series commencing at Lyme Regis. British Geologists divide the Lias into Lower,

Middle (Marlstone), and Upper. This classification holds good generally from Yorkshire to Dorsetshire with little or no unconformity, while the series is grouped by Mr. H. B. Woodward into zones, each named after its characteristic Ammonites.

LOWER LIAS.

Lower Lias, 1. Planorbis zone, the chief palæontological feature of which is the first appearance in Britain of Ammonites, a group represented by 480 species in the Jurassic rocks, of these the Lower Lias has 173, the Middle Lias 54, and the Upper 79. The Lower Lias is well developed at Lyme Regis. Ammonites (Agoceras) planorbis occurs at developed at Lyme Regis. Anmonites (Egoceras) planorbis occurs at the base between the underlying Rhætic and the angulatus beds above. 2. Zone of Ammonites (Egoceras) angulatus. This zone has until lately been associated with the Bucklandi beds, but it now has a distinctive place in the Lower Lias. 3. Zone of Ammonites (Arietites) Bucklandi, the Lima Bed or Blue Lias of authors. These beds are the base of the series at Lyme Regis, and are characterised by the Ammonites A. Bucklandi, A. bisulcatus, A. Conybeari, and A. Turneri. They are 120 feet thick. The upper series represented by A. Turneri is a most of the Chymb. The Regis of this a marked feature on the cliffs east of the Church. The Reptilia of this zone are Plesiosaurus macrocephalus, P. dolichodeirus, Ichthyosaurus communis, I. tenuirostris, I. platydon, I. intermedia. 4. Zone of Ammonites (Arietites) obtusus attains a considerable thickness at Lyme Regis-from 80 to 100 feet. The lower part contains Am. Birchii, and above are bands of limestones containing Septaria. The remarkable Dinosaur Scelidosaurus Harrisoni (Owen), which is exhibited in a case in the Geological Department of the British Museum, Cromwell-road, came from the shales above the "mud-stones" of this zone. 5. Zone of Ammonites (Amaltheus) oxynotus, it constitutes the greater part of the Belemnite beds, (from the prevalence of B. acutus.) At Lyme Regis the beds are composed of black pyritous and impure shales. The Middle Lias is well exposed at Lyme Regis and is stratigraphically conformable to the lower Lias. Mr. Carruthers, F.R.S., Keeper of the Botanical Department of the British Museum, Cromwell-road, has determined two Cycalaceous plants from the Lower Lias beds of Lyme Regis, Yatesia gracilis and Mantellia (Cycadeoidea) pygmæa. No real boundary can be drawn between the Lower and the Middle Lias, but it can be approximated by distinguising the beds containing Egoceras capricornus and E. Henleyi, from those with Amaltheus margaritatus.

MIDDLE LIAS.

The Middle Lias is well exposed on the cliffs of Black Ven, Westhay, Golden Cap, and Down Cliff. At Black Ven it is 94 feet thick, at Westhay about 220 feet, at Golden Cap about 350 feet, at Down Cliff about 270 feet. The total thickness is 934 feet.

The Lower Beds, including the Belemnite bed, which contains chiefly Belemnites longissimus, are well seen at Westhay Cliff. They are 90 feet thick and consist of alternating layers of marls, shales, and beds of impure limestone, containing Belemnites and Ammonites raricostatus, shales and a thin band of limestone full of Belemnites, of which Belemnites longissimus is the most numerous. These are succeeded by the Green Ammonite beds, which are the higher portion of the non micaceous marls. The overlying three tiers of fine-grained calcareous micaceous stone are the first appearance of mica in the Middle Lias a mineral which appears at intervals up to the Upper Lias Sands. The three tiers stand out prominently in the face of the cliffs, forming ledges over

which several springs fall; they vary from 2 feet to 4½ inches in thickness, and are separated from each other by micaceous sandy clays. After the Star-fish-bed, which contains Ophicoderma Egertoni, comes a mass of marly and shaly sand, and the Margaritatus bed so-called from the abundance of Amaltheus margaritatus. A layer of marl intervenes and is capped by another series of micaceous sands, less calcareous, and brown in colour and measuring about 30 feet in thickness. A conglomerate of pebbles embedded in a ferruginous matrix with colite-

granules overlies these sands.

The uppermost member of the series, the Marlstone Rock-bed, of which Analtheus spinatus is the characteristic Ammonite, is well exposed from Pinhay Bay to Bridport Harbour. It is very hard and ferruginous, and united in one bed with the base of the Upper Lias, showing a pale cream-coloured and pink limestone on the upper, and a brown nodular limestone on the lower part. The Marlstone Rock is very fossiliferous including Ammonites, some of which pass up into the Upper Lias. There is a large assemblage of Gasteropoda, Conchifera and Brachiopoda, many of which appear on the opposite coast of France, and this, as might be expected, at a point so near the English coast. Mr. Day says: * "I have been led to believe that immediately previous to the deposition of the Upper Lias some disturbing cause for a time changed the direction of the currents which had brought here the mud and sand of the lower and middle divisions, and that in place of continuing gently to lay down these deposits the action of the water was for a time, and over certain districts, confined to the destruction of beds previously formed and consolidated." The Middle Lias occurs inland, north of Wotton Fitzpaine and in a brickyard north of Allington. The Micaceous Sands with hard blue calcareous sandstones crop out in the deep lanes of the neighbourhood, also in Short's-lane, Symondsbury, which shows the upper beds of the Middle and the lower beds of the Upper Lias; another exposure at Bothenhampton shows the Marlstone Rock capped by an Upper Lias-conglomerate.

UPPER LIAS.

Although there is no decided palæontological break between the Middle and Upper Lias there is no difficulty in finding the junction. The Upper Lias is about 70 feet thick, and includes all the argillaceous, shaly, marly, and sandy deposits between the Am. spinatus beds of the Middle Lias and the basement bed of the Inferior Oolite characterized by Anmouites (Harpoceras) Murchisonæ. † Mr. H. B. Woodward describes it as a clay-deposit about 70 feet thick resting upon the remarkable junction-bed which has been described above. It is divided into four zones—1 serpentinus, 2 bifrons, 3 Jurense, 4 opalinus. Near the summit of the Chideock Hill, at Burton Bradstock, and on the east side of Bridport Harbour the zone of Ammonites Jurense is well shown in the cliffs. Above it is a series of yellow sands, known as Midford Sands from 150 to 200 feet thick, containing concretionary nodules, with intercalated layers of comminuted shells, about a foot thick, occurring at intervals of from four to ten feet, also an upper layer of calciferous grit, and brown sand-rock. They separate the Harp. bifrons beds from the regular Inferior Oolites of Dorsetshire.

The Blue Clay of Down Cliff which lies below the Yeovil and Bridport Sands has yielded Ammonites of the genera Dumorticria and notably D. radians. This genus has a limited horizon at the base of the opalinus zone, and the top of the Jurense, of which D. radians is a distinctive species; in that case, Mr. S. Buckman adds, the blue-marl is only a part of the Yeovil Sands, as it occurs also in them. The Sands had better be

regarded as passage or transitional beds.

The Liassic seas contained upwards of 120 species of fish, many of which had symmetrical tails which distinguishes them from those of the paleozoic age, all of which, like the shark and sturgeon of the present day are heterocercal, that is to say the lobes of the tail are unequal. Reptiles swarmed at this period. Marine Lizards, some of gigantic size, made their appearance in the Rhætic, if not in the Triassic seas, and continued to the end of the Cretaceous age. Besides these marine forms, remains of Flying Reptiles, *Pterosaurus* are found in the Lower Lias, and the Crocodilian *Teleosaurus* in the Upper Lias. At the close of the Liassic period the sea-bed was raised, followed by shallow seas and estuarian conditions.

INFERIOR OOLITE.

The Inferior Oolite, which is upwards of 350 feet thick at Cheltenham, is not more than 15 feet at Burton Bradstock. It commences with the extremely fossiliferous zone of Ammonites (Harpoceras) Murchisonæ. As in the Lias the beds can be determined by the characteristic Ammonite of each zone. This is clearly shown in Mr. S. S. Buckman's monograph. The following zones follow each other in an ascending order—1 Harp. Murchisonæ, 2 Harp. Sowerbyi, which some Geologists regard as only a sub-zone, 3 Stepha. nocerus. Humphriesianus, which is well shown at Bridport, Sherborne, Wyke, &c., 4 Cosmoceras Parkinsonis, almost confined to Dorsetshire. It produces several Brachiopods, among them Terebratula sphæroidalis, T. perovalis, T. Phillipsii, Rhynchonella spinosa, R. subtetrahedra, and the bivalve Astarte obliqua.

Two and a-half miles east of Half-way House, near Sherborne, the bulk of the limestones—nearly 40 feet thick—are in the Parkinsoni zone in which Megalosaurus Bucklandi was found, now preserved in the Sherborne School Museum. This zone is represented at Walditch, Chideock, Burton Bradstock, and the neighbourhood of Sherborne by the Upper Trigonia-grits, containing Ammonites Martinsii, Am. Truellii, and the Echinoderm Hyboclypus gibberulus, and Echinobrissus clunicularis. Like the Lias the Inferior Oolite is confined to the western side of the county. The beds are much dislocated between Wayford and Beaminster and at its southern boundary they rest upon the Upper Lias Sands, and have a wide extension between Beaminster and Poorstock. A fault at Shipton Gorge causes its disappearance. At Burton Bradstock it is represented by ferruginous limestones containing a large percentage of iron, a cone of Araucarites sphærocarpus Carr., and the fruit of the genus Podocarya allied to the Pandanus, or Screw-Pine of the Indian Archipelago, were found in the cliffs of Burton Bradstock.

FULLER'S EARTH.

This argillaceous deposit of marls and clays is a transition between the Great and Inferior Oolite. It is about 400 feet thick in Dorsetshire and is divided about the middle of the series by beds of soft argillaceous limestone, termed Fuller's Earth-rock. The Fuller's Earth runs east of Sherborne in a long narrow strip south-west to Clifton Wood; after being interrupted by faults it spreads out between Halstock, and South Perrott, it then curves round by Misterton, and runs north of Beaminster to Toller Porcorum, Hook Park, Witherston, near Shipton Gorge, and includes a narrow area north of Burton Bradstock. The most western extension is at Watton Hill, near Eype (which is capped by an outlier of Forest Marble), and Puncknoll. It forms also the upper beds of Burton Cliff. The Fuller's Earth-rock is confined to the northern part of the county, where it is extensively quarried for lime and used for top-dressing the land. It is well exposed also at Milborne Port. The clays produce good grass and support an excellent pasturage. The characteristic fossils are Ostrea acuminata, Pecten vagans, Terebratula (Waldheimia), ornithocephala, and Rhynchonella varians.

BRADFORD CLAY.

The Great or Bath Oolite and the Stonesfield Slate are absent in Dorsetshire.

The Bradford Clay is considered to be a local deposit between Bradford-on-Avon and Cirencester; there is a hard-brown sandy bed of marl, ten or twelve feet thick at the upper part of West Cliff, Bridport Harbour, underlaid by fifty feet of clays, containing many of its characteristic forms, Terebratula intermedia var longionensis, T. coarctata, T. maxillata, Waldheimia obovata, W. digona, &c.; a similar bed occurs at Burton Bradstock, Puncknoll, Melbury Park, and near Weymouth, these are to all appearance representatives of the Bradford Clay.

FOREST MARRIE.

This representative of the Great Oolite consists of blue clays and marls with thick layers of limestone, comminuted shells and sandy slates. It abounds with ripple and current-marks, from which, and the wood it frequently contains, it is probable the beds were laid down in a shallow sea. In Dorsetshire the lowest portion consists chiefly of clay, with occasional this layers of fissile and sandy limestone. The whole series is estimated at 450 feet and rests conformably on the Fuller's Earth. The stone is quarried for flagstones, building, and lime. The soil is generally cold and wet and unfavourable for cultivation. The shells, which are usually fragmentary, are identical with the types of the Great Oolite. The Forest Marble forms a prominent escarpment at Lillington, near Sherborne, and on the West of Stalbridge, which is its northern extension. Fragments of drifted wood (Coniferous) are common, but all other plant-remains are absent.

CORNERASH.

This is the uppermost section of the Lower Oolite, consisting of a rubbly hard nodular limestone (not oolitic in Dorsetshire), intercalated with yellow marls and clays. It is continuous across England from the coast of Dorset to Yorkshire. It enters the county near Stalbridge, and passing on through Stourton Caundle to Holwell a fault throws it northward towards Hayden. It flanks the Honeycombe and Lillington range, and passes through North Wootton, Folke, Leweston, and Bere Hackett, where it is displaced by another fault. It appears again at Ryme, Sanford, West Chelborough, and Rampisham. It occupies an area of some six miles long, and five broad in the Valley of the Bredy, and occurs in the Vale of Weymouth from Langton Herring to Radipole. Owing to the predominance of phosphoric acid and carbonate of lime, it is superior in an agricultural point of view to the Forest Marble. This superiority is well shown at Puncknoll and Swyre, whose green pastures and brashy arable fields on their northern exposure are a striking contrast to the vegetation on the southern. The maximum thickness in this district is about forty feet. The formation is very fossiliferous, including Avicula echinata, Pholadomya bucardium, P. deltoidea, Myacites securiforme, Rhynchoella concinna, Echinobrissus clunicularis, Ostrea marshii, O. Sowerbyi, Terebratula intermedia. A Saurian, Steneosaurus Stephani* was found in the Cornbrash of Holwell.

OXFORD CLAY

Is a nearly uniform mass of dark clays and shales with occasional beds of argillaceous limestone. It occupies a large area in the Vale of Blackmoor, running uninterruptedly from Buckhorn Weston, Stalbridge, Stock, Holnest, Leigh, † Melbury Osmond, and Rampisham, where it passes beneath the overstepping Cretaceous Strata. It appears on the southern side of the Chalk at Longbredy and continues in a westerly direction where it is cut off by a fault at Bredy. Near Weymouth it is about 300 feet thick and forms the low cliffs bordering the Backwater, and The Fleet, large specimens of *Gryphaa dilatata*, are abundant and Kidney-stones, composed of reddish-brown concretions, with veins of calcapar. The

abnormal and elevated portion of Oxford Clay at the mouth of the tunnel on the Dorchester Railway near Upwey is due to a local faulted uplift along the line of the disturbance which is known as the great Ridgeway fault. The Oxford Clay is here squeezed up and brought in between the Wealden Beds on the south, and the Chalk on the north. The fossils most characteristic of the Oxford Clay are Gryphæa dilatata, Ostrea Marshii, Trigonia clavellata, Belemnites hastatus, Rhynchonella varians, Ammonites excavatus, Ophioderma Weymouthensis. The Cimoliosaurus richardsoni * perfect, with the exception of the head and a few cervical vertebræ, was discovered by Mr. Nelson Richardson in the Oxford Clay of Chickerell.

CORALLIAN.

This formation consists of a series of limestones, calcareous sands, and grits. The more calcareous portion of the series (Coral Rag) is so termed from the abundance of Corals in the typical beds of Oxfordshire and Wiltshire. In Dorset it yields but few fossils. Near Weymouth the Corallian beds form a lenticular mass, having its greatest thickness at Sandsfoot. The base is composed of calcareous sands and hard bands of grit about 30 feet thick and are well shown at the Nothe. These are succeeded by the Upper Grit series (Bencliff grit) and by sands characterised by large Doggers. The passage from the Oxford Clay is well defined. The Corallian appears in the cutting of Weymouth and Portland Railway at Rodwell. Between these two series of grits the beds are more Oolitic. The entire thickness of the series at Weymouth is about 250 feet.

Mesers. Blake and Huddleston † divide the area occupied by the outcrop of Corallian into 5 districts—I Weymouth, 2 North Dorset, 3 North Witte and Oxfordshire 4 Cambridge roof, 5 Vorkshire basin

Wilts and Oxfordshire, 4 Cambridge reef, 5 Yorkshire basin.

The Trigonia bed, which is composed exclusively of Trigonia

The Trigonia bed, which is composed exclusively of Trigonia clavellata, lies between Bencliff and Sandsfoot, in the Coral Rag section of the series. There is a good exposure of the Lower Calcareous Grit from Preston Hill to Ham Cliff, North Shore. At Ham Hill the Coral Rag is let down by a fault to a level with the Oxford Clay. There are other good sections of the Corallian at Osmington Mills, and between Broadway and Abbotsbury. At Abbotsbury there is a remarkable local deposit of considerable thickness, of a hydrated oxide of iron, containing a well marked and abundant fauna. Ammonites decipiens, Rhynchonella corallina, R. inconstans, Waldheimialampos, Teretratula subsella, Nerinca Goodhallii. Linton Hill, which is Corallian, has a considerable higher elevation than the beds of Gorwell road, which belong to the lower part of the series.

Corals of the district—Thamnastræa arachnoides, T. concinna, Thecosmilia annularis, Alcyonium.

The Corallian beds of Weymouth and Abbotsbury are separated by the denudation of the Weymouth anticlinal. The Village of Abbotsbury stands in the synclinal of Linton Hill, of which Professor Blake and Mr. Huddleston give the following table of the beds ‡:—

5 Trigonia beds, 28 feet. Gritty and shelly limestone seen on the ledges south of Bencliff near Weymouth and near Osmington.

4 Osmington Oolite, 22 feet, shows also under Bencliff; at Wyke and

3 Beneliff grit series, 20 feet. Calcareous grit, sand, and laminated sandy clays, with Doggers of indurated calcareous sandstone, at Beneliff and Osminoton.

The iron-ore of Abbotsbury yields about 43 per cent. of ferric-oxide in mass, although the colite granules contain about 73 per cent. The matrix contains a good deal of silica (42 per cent.), which gives the ore a less commercial value. In North Dorset the Corallian Beds emerge from beneath the Gault between Hilfield and Hermitage and run eastward by Glanville's Wootton to Hazelbury Bryan, whence they bend northward by Sturminster Newton and Marnhull to the west of Gillingham.

The Corallian of North Dorset contains a larger proportion of calcareous matter than that of the Weymouth district, and beds of pisolite are a special feature, consisting of small round or oval concretions about the size of peas or small beans, embeddied in a matrix of marly limestone, formed by the deposition of successive coats of carbonate of lime. A bed of pisolite is exposed in the bank of the roadway south of the Stour at Sturminster Newton.

A good section of the upper part of the group is exposed in the railway cutting west of Sturminster Newton Station, consisting of argillaceous sand, limestone, and calcareous sandstones, where they are 74 feet thick. The grits and sands are slightly shown at Cucklington, where they form a steep escarpment. There are thick bedsof limestone at Marnhulland Stour Provost, which attain their maximum thickness at the entrance of the Gillingham tunnel on the South-Western Railway. The Todbere quarries yield the characteristic fossils, Trigonia clavellata, Echinobrissus scutatus. A quarry at Mappowder has yielded Rhynchonella Thurmanni.

KIMMERIDGE CLAY.

This formation is named from a small Dorsetshire village. It is composed of a series of clays and bituminous shales intercalated with tabular layers of argillaceous limestones. The lowest beds are sandy and scarcely distinguishable from the coarse sandy beds of the upper calcareous-grits of the Corallian. These lower beds appear on the west of Ringstead Bay, they are termed "Passage-beds" by Messrs. Blake and Huddleston, and are highly fossiliferous. Mr. Damon's list contains no less than 90 species, of which Ostrea deltoidea, Pleurotomaria reticulata, pass up from the Corallian, but not Trigonia clavellata, which is so abundant in the latter. Ammonites mutabilis and Am. Berryeri are characteristic of these beds.

The Kimmeridge Clay can be traced with very little interruption, from Dorsetshire to Yorkshire. It forms the substratum of the Isle of Portland and is well shown at Gad Cliff and St. Alban's Head; through faults and disturbances both these fine headlands are geologically similar, although several miles distant from each other. An anticlinal flexure causes the beds which rise from the shore at St. Alban's Head to descend in a reverse order at the foot of Gad Cliff; they re-appear at Ringstead

Bay. * At Kimmeridge the beds are about 600 feet, consisting of a series of paper-shales, bituminous shales, and cement-stones. This is the Virgulian group of Continental authors and characterised by Ammoaites biplex, Am. Thurmanni, Trigonellites or Aptyehus sublewis, theoperculum or the peculiar appendage of some species of Ammonites, Lucina minuscula, Cardium striatulum, Astarte lineata, Discina latissima, Coccoteuthis latipennis. It is well exposed from Poxwell and Osmington to Abbotsbury, on the north side of the Weymouth anticlinal, its breadth varying from a mile to half-a-mile. It crops out on the disturbed district of Litton Cheney and Longbredy, and forms the coast-line from the south of Sandsfoot Castle to the Ferry-Bridge on the main land and is the basement-bed of the Island from Chesilton to the Convict Prison and Church Hope Cove. In North Dorset it emerges from beneath the Gault at Lyon's Gate, near Minterne, and forms the boundary line of the Vale of Blackmoor from Woolland and Sturminster Newton, to Gillingham and Mere, where it is faulted against the Upper Greensand. East of this line it occupies the broad tract of country which slopes to the foot of the Chalk-escarpment south of Shaftesbury. It is less bituminous in the Vale of Blackmoor than at Kimmeridge; it burns vividly with a bright and clear flame, but is unfit for ordinary use as fuel, owing to its unpleasant odour, resembling that of petroleum. A block of best shale when reduced to ashes loses slightly in bulk, but in weight it loses about 75 per cent., so abundant is its volatile matter. The following is the analysis of J. W. Keates, Esq., Consulting Chemist of the City of London Gasworks:—

"Nine thousand cubic feet of gas per ton. Its lighting power is equal to 16 candles (sperm), consuming 120 grs. per hour, being burned at the rate of 9.2 cubic feet in a fifteen-holed Argand burner. The lighting power of ordinary London gas is 12 candles similar to those mentioned above.

Under a certain treatment one ton of shale can be made to yield 7½ gallons of naphtha, 10 gallons of lubricating grease and oils, 120lb. of pitch, 11½ cwt. of coke, and a little pure white paraffin, also an excellent varnish. Of the 20 tabular layers of argillaceous limestone which intercalate the shale the products of two only are of any commercial value.

The distinctive character of this formation as compared with the Carboniferous Shale is that the bituminous matter is principally the result of the decomposition of animal matter. Like the Lias of the western side of the county it yields a rich supply of Saurian and Cephalopod remains, much impregnated with iron-pyrites, many of which have been figured and described by J. W. Hulse, Esq., F.R.S., and the late Sir Richard Owen. The largest number of Reptiles both in genera and species known in the secondary rocks of Britain occur in the Kimmeridge Clay. Six orders are represented, Chelonia, Crocodilia, Ichthyopterygia, Sauropterygia,

Pterosauria, and Dinosauria. These six orders contain the following seven genera :-

> Dakosaurus Crocodilia Steneosaurus Teleosaurus Enaliochelys Chelonia Pelobatochelys Icthyosaurus Ichthyoptervgia Ophthalmosaurus Pliosaurus Plesiosaurus Sauroptervgia Cimoliosaurus Ornithosanria Pterodactylus

Dinosanria Omosaurus In addition to the evidence of the proximity of land during the laying down of the Kimmeridge beds, furnished by the remains of terrestrial Dinosaurs, a fossil plant, *Pinites depressus*, has been confirmed by Mr. Carruthers, F.R.S.

A marine Alga, Caulerpa Carruthersii, *G. Murray was discovered in the Kimmeridge Clay of Weymouth by the late Mr. R. Damon, and described by him as an Equisetaceous plant, but proved to be a true Caulerpa. The present existing species are mostly tropical, a few reaching as far north as the Mediterranean, and as far south as the Cape of Good Hope.

PORTLAND BEDS.

The Portland Sands, which overlie the Kimmeridge Clay are a series of sands, with concretionary sandstones and clays, succeeded by massive colites and freestones—Portland Stone—forming the series known as the Portland Beds. The lower series consists of light-grey glauconitic sands, also coarse sandy-beds containing Trigonia Pellati and Panopæa, cement stones, and concretionary nodules. It is well exposed at St. Alban's Head and Gad Cliff and forms the southern slopes of the range of hill between these two headlands. It meets the coast-line at Winsprit and is well shown in the longitudinal valley from Pier Bottom to the south of Kingston. It reappears on the westward near Stair Cove and again at Osmington, where it takes a northerly direction to Poxwell and westerly through Chalbury,

Bincombe, Upwey, and Portisham.

The Oolites and Freestones of Portland comprise thick beds of stone-(1) "The Roach," which differs in various parts of the Island both in structure and thickness. At the Verne it is three and a-half feet thick and composed of various shells, casts only of which are preserved. Of these Cerithium portlandicum, locally called "The Screw," is the most characteristic. It is so abundant that the smallest fragment contains portions of it. Two other characteristic fossils are Pecten lamellosus and Ostrea expansa. In other parts of the Island "The Roach" is entirely made up of Plicatula and Lithodomus. At the Bill Ostrea predominates. (2) The Whit-bed, the next in downward succession, is separated from "The Roach" by a thin band of flint. It is the most valuable stone of the Island: Ammonites giganters It is the most valuable stone of the Island; Ammonites giganteus is peculiar to this bed. (3) The bottom bed is an oolite stone not so often used; it consists of limestone with nodules of flint, and rests upon a local bed of clay—Portland Clay. The thickness of the upper

portion, which is used as a building stone, is 12 feet; the lower, which is useless in this respect, is about 20 feet.

The Portland Stone fringes the coast-line from Durdle-Door to Warbarrow and caps the range of hill from Gad Cliff to St. Alban's Head. The equivalent to the Portland Roach-bed is exposed in a quarry above Encombe House. The coast-line from St. Alban's Head to Tillywhim is flanked by the equivalent to the Portland Whit-bed, locally called Portland-Purbeck.

At Upwey three beds of the series are shown. The uppermost, which is 3½ inches thick, is full of Trigonia; the middle, which is chalky and flinty, is about 40 feet thick; the lowest corresponds with the clay-bed at the Verne, Portland. They are associated with the Portland Sands from Poxwell to Portisham.

PURBECK BEDS.

The preceding Portland beds were slowly upraised, portions became a land surface, but the Dorset area for the most part was converted into a land-locked lagoon, sometimes filled with freshwater and occasionally salt or brackish water by invasions of the sea.

The marine fauna of the Jurassic seas was replaced to a large extent by terrestrial, freshwater, and brackish water species. Insect remains are very abundant in the Lower Purbecks. The preservation of these delicate remains was probably due to the fineness of the deposit, and their abundance to the occasional wholesale destruction of insect-life through sudden changes of temperature or heavy falls of rain.

These beds have their fullest development in Purbeck, where they have been divided into three groups, the Upper, Middle, and Lower. The Upper Division consists of argillaceous limestones, shales, and clays. The Purbeck Marble, composed exclusively of Paludina, belongs to this division. Other beds contain freshwater shells, Limnaa, Cyclas, Unio, Physa, &c. The Middle Division consists of shales and limestones; some of which are marine. The Lower Division, which is largely developed at Ridgeway, consists of marly limestones alternating with thin clays. It abounds with Cypridea and freshwater shells, Paludina, Cyclas, and Rissoa, and an Isopod Crustacean, Archaeniscus Brodici. Some of the beds at Ridgeway are characterised by a Pupa and a water-beetle Notonectes.

The lower beds of the Purbecks are only met with in Portland, including the Dirt-bed, which consists of a carbonaceous clay—the soil of an old land-surface containing the remains of ancient forests of coniferous trees allied to the Araucariae, and the undergrowth, which mainly consists of a Cycadian, Mantellia megalophyllum. Some of the conifers, 20 and 30 feet high, remain as they grew, standing up through the overlying Bur-bed. A considerable number of silicified stumps encased in dome-shaped concretions may be seen on a broad cliff-ledge about a quarter of a mile east of Lulworth Cove. The trunk of a large conifer lies among the debris under Gad Cliff, from whose summit it had fallen; it is encased in limestone. The covering of the Portland Oolite with a freshwater deposit may be seen at Ridgeway, Lulworth Cove, Durleston Bay. At Portland there are two dirt beds separated by a bed of limestone, 9 feet thick, termed "The Cap;" the upper, which is a foot thick, contains conifers and cycadeæ; the lower, which is only four inches thick, contains cycadeæ only.

The Middle Purbecks are largely developed in Purbeck, and differ from the Lower in their lithological character. The Swanage and Langton Quarries were of great commercial value formerly when they supplied the London streets with their cubic blocks until superseded by wood and asphalt, which have nearly destroyed this industry. One of the beds of this series, locally termed the Down's Vein, a freshwater deposit, yields the majority of the Fish and Turtle-remains; of the former are Aspidorhynchus Fisheri, Lepidotus minor, Histionotus angularis, and two species of Pholidophorus of the latter, Chelone obovata, Pleurosternum emarginatum, P. Bullocki, and the Isopod Crustaceun, Archwoniscus Brodici.

The most remarkable bed of the Middle Division is the Cinder-bed, it is about 12 feet thick, and offers the first evidence of an invasion of the sea during the deposition of the Purbecks. The upper portion consists almost entirely of Ostrea distorta, the lower contains an Ostrea and a Cardium; the middle is a narrow calcareous band about a foot thick, containing Hemicidaris Purbeckensis, the only known Echinoderm of the Purbeck series, also an Ostrea and a Serpula. At Osmington the Cinder-bed is succeeded upwards by (G) Pecten beds (F), Beef beds (E), Corbula beds, and (D) the uppermost bed of the Middle Purbecks of Mr. Austen's list.

The jaw of a small marsupial was found in the Stonesfield beds, a local deposit of the Great Oolite, restricted to Gloucestershire and Oxfordshire. Thirty years afterwards jaws and teeth of two or three species of marsupials were found on the Upper Trias of Stuttgard and Somersetshire. Mr. J. H. Beckles, stimulated by the discovery of an insectivorous mammal, Spalactherium tricuspidens, in the Middle Purbecks of Swanage, made a systematic search in 1856 in the freshwater marl-beds immediately below the cherty freshwater-series, and in three weeks his labour was rewarded by finding several marsupials in a thin layer 5 inches thick, many of which were new. Altogether there were 11 genera and 27 species. There is a valuable memoir* by Sir R. Owen on these Purbeck Mammals.

Two large crocodilians, Goniopholy's crassidens and † Steneosaurus Purbeckensis, and two species of dwarf crorodiles,‡ Theriosuchus pusillus and Nonnosuchus gracilidens were associated with the mammalian remains; the length of the former was only 18 inches and its skull 3½ inches. The balance of life was then carried on as at the present day by compensating influences, and we have in this instance proof that carnivors kept in control the undue proportion of insectivors. The land lizards, Macellodon Brodiei (of the size of the Great Land Monitor of India), and Nothetes destructor are restricted to the Feather Quarry (J. Chert-beds of Mr. J. H. Austin's list). The Purbeck Mammalia, all of which appear to be allied to Australian groups, do not extend upwards into the Tertiaries.

The Upper Division at Swanage commences with the Lower Insect-beds of Prof. E. Forbes, comprising limestones and bands of shaly clay, the latter charged with Cypridæ and well-preserved remains of beetles, especially the elytra and wings. These Insect Beds are succeeded by about 55 feet of shaley-clays and marls, containing estuarine shells and beds of gypsum. At Peverill Peak, Swanage, the upper-beds are about 30 feet thick, including a band of "Purbeck Marble" composed of the fresh water snail Paluduna elongata. It was held in high repute by the architects of the Middle Ages; there are few of our cathedrals and old churches whose pillars and window-shafts are not of this material. The interior of Kingston Church, recently built by the Earl of Eldon,

is similarly ornamented with the Purbeck Marble procured from quarries on the Encombe Estate. The church is built of "Bur stone" also from the neighbouring quarries. The "Marble" crops out at Woody-Hyde on the lower Swanage and Corfe-road and continues along the northernside of the Church Knowle and Steple Valley. It is probable the greatest part of the Purbeck marble used for ecclesiastical ornamentation was procured from these Dorsetshire beds. The remainder of the Upper Purbecks consists of a series of bands of clays and stone, the former charged with Cypridæ, the latter with Unios. At Ridgeway the beds are coarser and more sandy, and occasionally contain lignite. At Mewps Bay they are thinner and contain greater varieties of species of Cypris than at Durleston. A remarkable feature in the molluscan fauna of the Purbecks, consists in its similarity to that of the freshwater Tertiaries and of the present day, so great is the resemblance that with the fossils before us and no evidence of their geological position it would be difficult to assign them to a definite geological epoch.

WEALDEN BEDS.

Important changes took place at the close of the Purbeck period, which concluded the Jurassic epoch. The Lower Cretaceous beds comprise a succession of fluviatile and lacustrine sands and clays, which pass up into a marine group known as the Lower Greensand. The Wealden group occupies an extensive area in the country of the Weald, or those parts of Kent, Surrey, Hants, and Surrey which lie between the North and South Downs. It is not confined to this south-eastern area, but extends through the Isle of Wight into Dorsetshire, and is well shown in Swanage Bay. Here the beds are represented by alternations of red and purple-coloured clays, white and yellow sands, and occasional bands of quartzose sand-stone, or grit with lignite towards the base. The beds at Punfield are estimated to be 1,800 feet thick, at Worbarrow Bay 725, at Mewps Bay 660, at Lulworth Cove 460, and at Man of War Cove 170, showing a gradual western diminution, probably due to the shallowing of the water toward the western end of the lake. The Wealden lake occupied the same area as that of its Purbeck predecessor, but the aspect of the country may have undergone great physical and climatal changes. The Wealden Beds form the northern flank of the Valley from Swanage to Gad Cliff. At Swanage and Worbarrow the grit-beds alternate with red and green sandy-clay containing portions of silicified coniferous trees. Mr. Beckles found the foot-prints of a large three-toed land-reptile, 25 inches long. The impressions were evidently those of a living animal, as it traversed the shores of the lake. The Juanodon by which the prints were made, walked in an upright position, making use of its hind legs only for progression. The alternation of the sands and clays at Worbarrow Bay with a coarser grit-drift and the substitution of sands at Swanage show that the strength of the stream was less as it proceeded eastward. The junction of the Weald at Swanage is only hidden by a fault, but it is well shown at Worbarrow. It also appears at the foot of the chalk-range b

The total thickness of the variegated bands of the Wealden is from 1,500 to 1,800 feet. There is a complete paleontological break between it and the Lower Greensand, accompanied by considerable erosion of the Weald.

LOWRR GREENSAND.

Towards the close of the Wealden epoch there was a gradual depression of the land which gradually sank below sea-level. The exchange of a freshwater for a marine fauna is well shown at Punfield, where the junction-bed is a thin band of ironstone-grit containing small pebbles with the teeth and bones of fish—an accumulation of sediment, Mr. Meyer * remarks, such as would result from the dispersion of shore-deposits over the floor of a moderately deep lake. The fish-bones are the remains of the inhabitants of the freshwater lake when an abrupt invasion of the sea occurred, such as might be supposed to have resulted from the removal of some previously existing barrier between the sea and the lake. This ironstone-band is succeeded by two beds of clay, the lower containing Lower Greensand fossils, the other, an Arca, and the marine Crustacean (Atherfield Lobster) some of which are in the County Museum. Above these clays are the so-called "Punfield Beds," which Professor Judd placed in the Wealden group; but from the evidence obtained by Mr. Meyer of marine-shells below the Professor's "Marine Band" it is generally accepted that the whole series lying between the iron-band with fish-remains and the Gault is a littoral facies of the Lower Greensand.

The series thins out rapidly westward; at Worbarrow it is not more than 100 feet thick. The drainage of the land during the Wealden and Lower Greensand epochs was nearly the same, differing only in their catchment basins; one a lake, the other a sea. The only other exposure of the Lower Greensand in Dorsetshire is near Iwerne Minster, from Twyford to Childe Okeford, where it rests upon the Kimmeridge Clay. This tract of Lower Greensand was discovered by *Mr. Jukes-Browne in 1891.

GAULT.

This lowest member of the Upper Cretaceous strata is a bluish grey-clay At Punfield it is about 110 feet thick and appears as a blue micaceous-clay below, more sandy and lighter in colour above, passing insensibly into the Upper Greensand. It forms a narrow belt from Worbarrow Bay to Lulworth Cove in the shape of dark-greenish shales with zones of dark concretionary nodules. The Gault and Upper Greensand rest successively in Upton Valley on the Purbecks, at Upton Hill on the Portland Stone, at Osmington Mills on the Hastings Sands and Kimmeridge Clay, at Puncknowle on the Forest Marble, at Shipton Gorge on the Oxford Clay, at Lewesden on the Midford Sands, at Black Ven, Golden Cap, and Stonebarrow on the Lias.

The outcrop of the Gault enters the north side of the county near Shaftesbury and forms a slope of stiff clay-soil below the sand and sand-stones which support the Shaftesbury plateau. It is here about 70 feet thick, the upper part being a grey sandy micaceous clay, the lower stiffer with red ferruginous layers.

stiffer with red ferruginous layers.

It was formerly thought that the Gault thinned out rapidly south of Shaftesbury, and it is so indicated in the map of the Geological Survey published in 1856, but a more recent examination by Mr. Jukes-Browne has shown that this is a mistake and that the Gault is continuous below the Greensand throughout the greater part of the county.

The Gault is exposed in a brickyard at Sutton Waldon, west of Iwerne Minster, at Okeford Fitzpaine, and at Ansty, north of Bingham's Melcombe, but it seldom contains fossils. It can be traced westward as far as Batcombe and Woolcombe near Evershot Station, but there it is very thin, and no trace of it has been met with in the extreme west of the county.

UPPER GREENSAND.

In the southern part of the county the Upper Greensand accompanies the base of the chalk except where interfered with by faults. It crops out at Punfield and underlies the Lower Chalk from Ballard Down through the island to Worbarrow Bay. It appears on the coast-line at Whitenose, on both sides of the Ridgeway fault at East Chaldon and at Osmington. Farther west it forms the creat of Abbotsbury Castle Rings and descends into the Gorwell and Ashly Valley to Longbredy. It enters North Dorset near Shaftesbury and forms a plateau or terrace below the escarpment of the chalk as far as the valley of the Stour at Childe Okeford. West of the Stour the outcrop is narrower and often forms a part of the main slope or escarpment. The lowest bed of Greensand is a stiff micaceous argillaceous sand, which passes down into the Gault. The central portion consists of soft yellowish-green sands, the upper part is generally a bright green sand with occasional beds of sandstone. Near Shaftesbury there is a bed of hard and rather coarse sandstone, which has been used as a building stone, and above this are light-grey sands with lenticular layers of chert; at Melbury Abbas there is a still higher bed, a greenish-grey sandstone, which has been quarried as a freestone. All these beds, however, thin out southward, and none of them are visible near Iwerne Minster, where the formation consists chiefly of soft sands.

West of the Stour the Greensand is at first very thin, not more than 50 feet, but it gradually thickens westward to over 100 feet. From Ansty and Bingham's Melcombe the uppermost member of the formation is a hard nodular glauconitic sandstone; under this is Greensand with some hard calcareous concretions, while the lower portion consists of soft

yellow and grey sands.

In the extreme west of the county the top-bed of sandstone contains very large grains of quartz and is a coarse calcareous grit, exceedingly hard and rocky, so that it often forms a projecting ledge or bank, and can be

easily traced across the country.

In the soft sands Exogyra conica is the commonest fossil; the glauconitic sandstone above mentioned is the home of several species of Pectens, P. asper, P. quadricostata, P. orbicularis, and P. interstriatus. P. asper, P. quadricostata, Holaster lavis, Cardiaster fossarius, Catopygus carinatus are the fossils most frequently met with in the calcareous grit of West Dorset. Near Bookham and Bingham's Melcombe phosphatised fossils and nodules occur in the top sandstone, a collection of which is preserved in the County Museum. The Upper Greensand is well shown at Maiden Newton and Frome Vauchurch. A fault near Evershot throws it down, and it takes a subsidiary place at the base of the chalk of the district. It is also exposed in the valleys of Askerswell, Compton Valence, Sydling, and Winterborne Steepleton.

THE CHALK.

Lower Chalk.—According to modern classification the chalk is divided into three stages—Lower, Middle, and Upper. The Lower Chalk extends

from the top of the Greensand to the base of a band of hard nodular chalk, which is known as the Melbourn Rock. Two sub-divisions are generally made, which are semetimes called the Chalk Marl and Grev Chalk respectively, the former being characterised by Ammonites varians, the latter by Holaster subglobosus and Belemnitella plena. however, Holaster subglobosus ranges down to the base of the formation. In the north part of the county the Lower Chalk is about 200 feet thick, but when traced westward along the main escarpment it loses half this thickness. At Swanage it is estimated at 120 feet, while at Lulworth and Whitenose it is only about 40 feet thick, according to Dr. C. Barrois. It is evident, therefore, that the Lower Chalk thins rapidly towards the south-west. The basement bed is generally known as the Chloritic Marl because grains of glauconite (formerly called chlorite) are so abundant as to give it a greenish hue. At Punfield it is 3½ feet thick with phosphatised casts of Ammonites and other fossils, most of which are probably derived. It is also exposed at Arish Mill Bay, Mewps Bay, Lulworth, and at Whitenose large blocks of it lie on the shore, hay, Lulworth, and at Whitenose large blocks of it he on the shore, and are very fossiliferous, including Ammonites varians, Nautilus lævigatus, Scaphites equalis, Turrilites costatus, &c. It occurs inland as a continuous stratum, and in the west it is exposed in many quarries, especially near Cerne, Evershot, and Maiden Newton, where the lowest six inches are crowded with fossils, the commonest being Ammonites varians, A. Coupei, A. Mantelli, Nautilus lævigatus, Scaphites æqualis, Turrilites Wiestii, Discoidea cylindrica, Holaster subglobosus, Cucullæa glabra, Terebratula biplicata, T. subglobosa. At Christock in the extreme west of the county the Chlorities and is a feet. Chardstock, in the extreme west of the county the Chloritic Marl is 3 feet thick and is full of fossils, including all the species above-mentioned.

Along the inland outcrop from Melbury Hill near Shaftesbury to Hambledon Hill near Childe Okeford the Chalk Marl is well developed and consists of alternating layers of soft marly clay and hard grey-chalk. These are well exposed in a chalk-pit at the north end of Hambledon Hill which yields Ammonites varians, A. Rotomagensis, Scaphites æqualis, Inoceramus orbicularis, Pholadomya decussata, a large Nautilus, and other fossils.*

When traced westward the Chalk Marl either becomes very thin or else changes its lithological character. Chalk Marl fossils have been found at Stoke Wake and are preserved in the Dorset County Museum. Westward the Chloritic Marl passes up into firm greyish-white chalk with only fragment of Inoceramus and Ammonites Mantelli, also The Chalk Marl outcrops near the siliceous concretions often occur. top of Eggarden Hill north of Bridport. The higher part of the Lower Chalk consists of blocky whitish chalk without fossils, but there is generally a bed of soft grey-marl at or near the top, in which Belemnitella plena sometimes occurs.

Middle Chalk.—This division extends from the base of the Melbourn Rock to the hard chalky limestone known as the "Chalk-rock." at present uncertain whether this "Chalk-rock" should be included in the Middle, or regarded as the base of the Upper Chalk, but in this outline

we shall adopt the latter view.

In the north-east of the county the Middle Chalk is about 100 feet thick, at Ballard Down near Swanage it is about the same, but it thins toward the south-west and is not more than 60 or 70 feet thick at Lulworth, and probably about the same near Maiden Newton.

The Melbourn Rock is a hard whitish-limestone with layers of small rounded nodules of hard chalk, and in the country south of Shaftesbury

such rock rests directly on the Belemnitella-Marl, but on the south and west of the county beds of hard smooth whitish or yellowish-chalk come in between the nodular rock and the marl, and it is uncertain to which

division these beds belong

Above the Melbourn Rock there is a rough nodular vellowish-white chalk, in which Inoceramus mytiloides and Rhynchonella Cuvieri are common. This passes up into smoother and softer chalk, in which the small brachiopod Terebratulina gracilis is abundant. Hence the Middle Chalk is generally divided into the two zones of Rhynconella Cuvieri and Terebratulina gracilis. Sometimes the highest beds and the Chalk-rock are grouped together as the zone of Holaster planus and, classed in the Middle chalk, c.f. "Barrois Recherches sur la Terre. Cretacée."

Flints of a pale-grey colour sometimes occur in the *Terebratulina* gracilis zone, but are not everywhere present.

The Upper Chalk.—This division extends from the Chalk-rock to the summit of the formation and is sub-divided into several zones, which are characterised by the occurrence of certain fossils. These zones in descending order are :-

5. Zone of Belemnitella mucronāta of Belemnitella quadrata ,, of Marsupites •• of Micraster cor-anguinum ,,

of Micraster cor-testudinarum The Chalk-rock, which we here regard as the base of the Upper Chalk, is a hard chalky limestone splitting up into angular lumps, which are generally so hard as to make good road material, for they are not broken up by frost. Green-coated nodules sometimes occur in layers, or scattered through the rock; Holaster planus, Micraster cor-bovis, Spondylus spinosus, and Terebratula carnea are the commonest fossils. Sometimes there are two beds of hard rock with lumpy nodular-chalk between. The zone of M. cor-testudinarum consists in the lower part of rough nodular chalk with scattered nodules of grey or black-flint, solid throughout; the higher part is firm white chalk with frequent layers of flint, most of which are very rough and enclose hollow spaces with traces of sponge structure, Doryderma ramosum. This zone is generally from 70 to 80 feet thick.

The zone of Micraster cor-anguinum consists of firm white-chalk with many layers of flint nodules, some of which are black throughout; others have a milky-white band in the flint, while the higher part of the zone has flints with thick white rinds. Inoceramus involutus and Micraster cor-anguinum are the prevalent fossils; the thickness is probably 200

The zone of Marsupites consists of very fine even-grained whitechalk, brittle and splitting easily in any direction. Flints are generally rare and sometimes absent; fossils are also rare, but in some places the detached plates of Marsupites are not uncommon. This zone has been recognised in the Stour Valley, near Spettisbury and Thorncombe, also at Winterbourne Whitechurch, on the cliffs of Ballard Down, Swanage, near Whitenose, and at Bradford Peverell, near Dorchester. The zone is probably about 120 feet thick or more.

The zone of Belemnitella quadrata also consists of even-gained whitechalk, but has layers of flint nodules at distances of 4 to 8 feet apart, and the flints have generally a thick white rind. This chalk is practically unfossiliferous in most parts of the county. It may be 200 feet thick.

The zone of Belemnitella mucronata is well developed in Dorset. exposed in quarries on both sides of the Stour near Sturminster Marshall, and the western part of the Tertiary basin, it borders Bere Regis,

Piddletown, Tolpuddle, Dorchester, Wool, and Corfe Castle, also at the Foreland, and on the north of Swanage. On the north side of this basin there is at least 200 feet of chalk containing Bel. mucronata; firm white chalk with layers of rather small flints, yellow-coated and black inside.

From the above account it follows that the thickness of the Upper

Chalk in Dorset is at least 800 feet.

TERTIARY.

Towards the close of the Cretaceous period there appears to have been a general upheaval of Western Europe, which caused a considerable break without any trace of continuity of strata in these islands, no passage-beds such as those of Belgium and Denmark. Deep sea conditions were succeeded by lacustrine, fluviatile, estuarine, and marine. The Cretaceous fauna, which was utterly annihilated, was succeeded by another adapted for shallow-seas and lakes. The numerous gigantic Mesozoic Reptiles disappeared, Teleostean fish predominated over the previous prevailing ganoid fish, and a fauna comprising 584 genera and 22,723 species become extinct. The history of the change is lost, but the character of the new fauna approaches the existing types.

LOWER ECCENE.

The Thanet Beds are purely marine, having a very limited area exposed in East Kent at Berne Bay, Pegnell Bay, in the neighbourhood of Croydon, in railway cuttings about Swanley, St. Mary's, Croydon, on the London and Chatham and Dover Railway, and Reading. They are absent in Dorsetshire. Some green-coated flints at the base of the Woolwich and Reading Beds at Rempstone, Studland, and Pamphill, near Wimborne, were thought to belong to the Thanet Beds, but this has been proved to be erroneous.

WOOLWICH AND READING BEDS.

The Woolwich and Reading Beds, the former fluviatile and marine, the latter freshwater, form the base of the Eocene in Dosetshire with the possible exception of the two outliers at Blackdown and Bincombe, which Mr. Starkie Gardner says are London Clay deposits. They crop out in Studland Bay, and on the north-side of the chalk-range at Corfe Castle, East Lulworth, Coombe Keynes, Rye Hill, Bere Regis, and Bloxworth.

The Flora of the Reading Beds differs considerably from that of the

Woolwich Beds. Exquisitely preserved specimens have been found just under the mottled clays at Reading, comprising Ferns, Taxodium, Pine, Poplar, &c. Plants from the Woolwich Beds are best known from Dulwich, Croydon, and Coldham Common, near Winchester. The Woolwich and Reading Beds are beds exposed at Creadle, near Cranborne, with Ostrca Bellovacina. Blocks of indurated sandstone similar in texture to the Sarsen Stone of our downs may be seen in situ at Coombe Keynes and Broadmayne. The junction of these beds with the London Clay is usually indicated by a band of flint-pebbles—the basement bed of Professor Prestwich.

LONDON CLAY:

The London Clay, which is a marine formation, consists of ferruginous sandy-clays, with nodular concretions of limestone known as Septaria. The fauna indicates a tropical rather than a temperate climate. greatest breadth in this country is between Holt and Woodcuts—about four miles. It intervenes between the Woolwich and Reading Beds and the Bagshot series through its whole extension from Fordingbridge and West Stafford. The beds dip northward, but they lie in a syncline. Occasionally the London Clay is very fossiliferous, but as fossils only occur in isolated groups they are not easily met with.

MIDDLE ECCENE.

LOWER BAGSHOT BEDS.

This series consists of thick beds of sands and clays, yielding an almost tropical flora, and were probably derived from the wear and denudation of old crystalline rocks; they are well developed on the eastern side of the county and occupy the larger portion of the Poole Basin. The flow of the Eocene river must have been from west to east, as the grains and grits are larger and coarser at Poole and Studland than they are in the Isle of Wight.

Various coloured sands and clays belonging to the series are seen on the cliffs from Poole Harbour to the north of Bournemouth. Mr. Starkie Gardner draws a line between the Lower and Middle Bagshots at the pipe-clays of Corfe Castle and Studland and the sandy clay-beds of Alum Bay, on account of the difference between the two floras, the former characterised by the greater thickness of the beds, the purer character of the clay, and often deeply stained sands, the latter by the sandy clay-beds.

The land subsequently underwent a gradual subsidence by which the sea gained the ascendancy. Mr. Starkie Gardner says " "In the Bournemouth Beds we have deposits of the same river, but in a more open and level valley and in closer proximity to the sea. We have no evidence of the presence of marine conditions in any of the lower beds; but when we have it in the higher beds to the east it is because the land had gradually sank below the sea-level." A rich and luxuriant flora is preserved in the pipe-clays of Corfe Castle and Studland, which Mr. Starkie Gardner describes as the most marvellous Tertiary Flora that earth has or ever can be expected to yield, &c. Large fan and pinnate-leaved Palms, Ferns, Acer, Aralia, Comptonia, and other Protaceæ, Podocarpus, Acacia-pods. The presence of Eucalyptus and other Australian types suggests the probability that their distribution was a wide one before climatal and seasonal changes had altered the phases of plant-life as seen at the present day.

Mr. Starkie Gardner says that the flora of the Lower Bagshots is the first we find definitely represented on the Continent, its counterpart occurring in the Grès du Soissonais of the Paris Basin, but this being a coarse grit, the plants are badly preserved. A fine series might have been secured fifty years ago from the pipe-clays of Corfe Castle; when they were in great abundance, beauty, and preservation; no one then took the trouble to collect them; the opportunity was unfortunately lost, and there is little hope of falling in with a similar plant-bearing bed. Patches of light-clay, containing leaves enclosed with a band of sand four feet thick in some dark-clays occur between Poole Harbour and

The Pipe Clays of Studland differ from those of Alum Bay, for although the Dictyledons are the same (they are less in number), and both yield Palms; the leaves of the Studland Beds are mixed up with Ferns, Insect Wings, and Shelis indicating a near proximity to land. Leaves in good

preservation are found in the clay-pits of Branksea Island of this age, but no record of them is preserved. Studland is the only place where there will be any chance of obtaining specimens of this Lower Bagshot Flora in future, and this with much difficulty as the clays are twisted, compressed, and covered with grass.

MIDDLE BAGSHOT BEDS.

This series includes the Bracklesham with the Bournemouth Beds. There is a thorough break between the floras of the Lower and Middle Bagshots, both are dissimilar with scarcely a connecting link. The clays instead of being pure white are buff-coloured in dark lamented clays with beds of grey-sand. The leaf-bearing beds occur in the cliffs about a quarter of a mile in length near Poole Harbour, and west and east of the Bournemouth Pier. The leaves and fruits from the two localities differ from each other: those on the western or Poole side probably grew on more elevated ground. The leaves are principally of dicotyledonous forest trees. The beds adjoining the Bournemouth Pier abound in Palms, Ferns, &c. Approaching from the west, leaf-bed after leaf-bed rises composed of clay, some separated by coarse quartz-grit, each characterised by leaves more or less peculiar to itself, comprising pinnate-leaved Palm, Myrica, or less peculiar to itself, comprising plinate-leaved Paim, Myrica, Gleichæna, Godoya, Fern, and Ficus, pinnæ of Osmunda lignitum, Cactus spines, and branchlets of a Sequoia-like conifer. Beyond the Pier a bed contains Ferns, Aroid, Fan-Palms, and an Eucalyptus. The last freshwater beds contain forms of Ferns, and Rush indicating swamps. In the Marine Beds are found numerous fruits, seeds, fragments of Conifers, Palms, &c. Mr. Starkie Gardner says "It is of great interest to trace through these beds the changes from a comparatively upland to a valley flora, and then to a swamp-flora, to follow out the lowering of the land until it was covered with the sea; to trace the sea first trickling in as it were and then forming lagoons, overwhelming the mud-deposits formed by these lagoons, with shingle and sand; to realise in fact the actual shore-line now marked by river-deposits full of plant-remains on one side and of sea-fauna on the other.

The Bracklesham Beds are only represented in Dorsetshire by the Bournemouth Marine series. The Boscombe Sands, Hengist Bay Head Beds, Upper Bracklesham Sands, and Burton Beds are absent as well as

the Upper Bagshot Beds and Upper Eocene (Oligocene).

PLIOCENE.

Two molars of Elephas meridionalis from Dewlish in the Blackmore collection of the Salisbury Museum were observed by the Rev. Osmond Fisher * a few years ago, who made a close examination of the bed in which the molars had been found more than fifty years ago. Mr. Fisher and I recovered portions of at least three Elephants (Elephas meridionalis) near the summit of a steep cliff, on the east-side of the Dewlish valley, in a bed of flint-gravel and the finest sand. At first it was thought to be a high-level gravel-bed, but the result of the examination proved it to be a torrential deposit in a Chalk-fissure. Unfortunately the remains were only within a few feet of the surface, and

exposed to the destructive effects of atmospheric agencies, which had obliterated every trace of organic structure except the huge limbs, 'molars. and tusks.

During its deposition there are evidence of changes from conditions of great tranquillity to torrential. The size of the flints and accompanying debris show that the upper portions in which the Elephant-remains lay were deposited when the stream or flood passed over with the greatest force.

Professor Prestwich, in a paper upon the relation of the Willshire Level.

Beds to some in Norfolk, referring to the discovery of the remains of Elephas meridionalis at Dewlish, says that the high level fossiliferous drift at Portland containing debris derived from the Tertiary and Cretaceous Strata of the north of Weymouth may possibly belong to the same age. Its great antiquity would accord with the enormous denudation of the district since the deposition of the high-level gravel (probably of glacial date), which led to the formation of the valley between Upwey and Portland, which is six miles broad and from 400 to 500 feet deep.

PLEISTOCENE.

RAISED BEACH, PORTLAND.

This Beach extends about a quarter-of-a-mile along the east-side of the Bill and about 40 yards inland, passing under a covering of rubble-sand-loam and rock-debris. Its height is 24 feet above the present beach at the Bill. Shells abound near the "Sand-Hills," consisting mostly of Littorina, Patella, Purpura, Ostrea, and Mytilus. The sand in which they are imbedded is rich in small species. All are littoral and now living in the neighbourhood; among them is Cyanium minutum, a rare shell in the South of England but common in the North. On the East-cliff the pebbles are often cemented together by carbonate of lime into a compact conglomerate.

The beach is composed of chalk-flints and some flints from the Portland-rock; also chert from the Upper Greensand, Tertiary sandstones, New Red Sandstones, Micaceous sandstones, and Granite. The loess which accompanies the rubble-drift and sand contains freshwater-shells and fragments of the Middle and Lower Purbecks, neither of which are now in situ in the island. At Chesilton there is a rubble-bed 400 feet above sea-level and about 60 feet thick with large angular blocks of Portland Stone and Portland flint several tons in weight. Professor Prestwich shows that there are few districts in England where traces of rubble are not to be found, following the slopes of the hills inland, with land-shells and remains of animals. There is a bed of gravel and brickearth at Encombe, which has no connection with any river or valley, and probably belongs to the rubble drifts. It is 240 feet above the sea-level and half-a-mile from the sea. It yielded the remains of Mammoth, Rhinoceros tichorhinus, Cerrus tarandus, Equus, and Bos.

At Lulworth Cove and Arish Mill there are local drift-deposits belonging to this rubble-series, both of which descend to sea-level. The raised beaches are connected with the plateau-gravel, which in Hampshire and on the northern side of the Poole Basin show from the portions preserved that they originally covered a wide tableland

preserved that they originally covered a wide tableland.

The beaches of White-Nose, Weymouth, and between Studland and South Haven, are probably derived from the old flint-gravels which capped the coast-line, and comparatively few are derived from the destruction of the neighbouring chalk-cliffs.

Remains of an ancient sea-beach overspread at intervals the bed of the Weymouth Backwater. The pebbles are chiefly calcareous and a few flint, derived apparently from local material.

GRAVELS AND DRIFTS.

The plateau-gravels have already been referred to in the "Raised Beach "section. They were spread over the sea-bottom during its continuous but gradual rise, and formed the original table-land which was pared down by atmospheric and other agencies until the scooping out of the valleys commenced and the table-land reduced to the altitude of our

escarpments and hill-ridges.

South of the Verne, Portland, and about 400 feet above sea-level was a mammaliferous drift in a trough of the Purbecks and Portland Beds. It has since been worked out. It was only 50 or 60 yards wide and extended from 200 to 300 yards. The deposits consisted of red-loam, mixed with angular pieces of these two formations, with blocks of Tertiary Sarsen Stone, underlaid by a layer of water-worn rounded polished Sarsen Stone, underlaid by a layer of water-worn rounded polished pebbles with a few quartz-pebbles, and containing Mammoth, *Elephas antiquus*, Horse 2 gen. (?) Stag and Boar. The red-loam extended nearly a mile in the direction of the Verne, attaining an altitude of 500 feet. At Blackdown there is a very old gravel, older probably than the Portland mammaliferous drift. It is composed of local Tertiary materials, and is from 10 to 15 feet thick. High level gravels occur at Osmington Mill and between Preston and Osmington 300 feet above

sea-level.

The chalk-range north of Weymouth is destitute of drift, but the intermediate tract is sprinkled with drift-beds of doubtful origin.

The river-gravels occur in patches at all levels from 100 feet above the neighbouring stream and before it had cut its way through to its present level. The oldest contains mammalia of which many are extinct.

There is a remarkable flint-gravel-bed at Bucknowle, near Corfe Castle, probably of great antiquity. It includes a quantity of blocks of

quartz-sandstone and a few palæozoic pebbles.

CLAY WITH FLINTS.

This deposit is a reddish or yellowish clay full of unworn flints, its red hue is due to oxide of iron; it lies irregularily on the higher portions and ridges of the table-lands of the Upper Chalk; the base usually consists of a few inches of black-clay with black-coated flints. The carbonic acid of the surface-water acting upon the exposed surface of the Chalk, removes in solution the calcareous portions, while the insoluble matter, such as flints, iron, and silicate of Alumina, remains behind. There are few more striking instances of the solvent power of surface-water than this one which is so common on our chalk-hills.

The flints, which preserve their original shapes and forms, with edges as sharply defined as when they fell out of their original matrix, show that they have not been removed any distance from where they have

been found.

It must be admitted that much of the clayey matter may have been derived from waste of the Reading Beds which once spread far over the Chalk, for both processes, the solution of the Chalk and the embodiment of the over-lying deposit in the resulting soil would go on together.

The Clay with Flints is occasionally accompanied with loam and pebbles of flint and quartz from the Tertiary Beds. The depth of the Clay with Flints is due to the varying energy of the solvent factor.

The formation of Clay with Flints has always been going on wherever the Chalk was largely exposed to atmospheric action, or to the percolation of surface-waters beneath their caps of Tertiary Beds, and it may

still be forming now.

On a ridge of the Upper Chalk at Bagber, in the Parish of Milton Abbas, there is an overlying bed of Brick-earth, which was used in Romano-British times for the manufacture of pottery, and which appears to have supplied the neighbourhood around with domestic and funereal wares. A similar bed occurs in Park Wood, in the Parish of Houghton, from which bricks were made; the-kiln has recently been abandoned on account of the failure of the clay. Not far distant, and on the same horizon, there is a bed of sand; these are remnants of overlying Tertiary Beds.

SARSEN STONES.

The Sarsen Stones which once covered our downs and heaths before they were removed, or broken up as impediments to cultivation are concretions by the filtering action of water through a bed of quartzose sand, not usually in a continuous solid mass but in detached blocks, while the rest of the sands remained unconsolidated, sometimes used as cromlechs, standing stones, ancient circles, e.g., Stonehenge, now are used to protect the corners of village-streets and highways, and occasionally for building stones.

CHESIL BANK.

This remarkable bank of shingle is composed of chalk-flints, chert, quartzites (from the Budleigh Salterton pebble-bed), quartz, porphery, &c., extends from Portland to Burton Bradstock. It is 200 yards wide and 42 yards high at Portland; 170 yards wide and 22 yards high at Burton, and separated from the mainland by the Fleet estuary, from the Ferry-bridge to Abbotsbury, due probably to the absence of high-land or cliff, and by the diversion of the drainage from its direct course by the eastward trend of the coast, aided by tidal influx and reflux.

NATURAL PITS.*

The heaths of Affpuddle and Puddletown Heath are here and there pitted with circular gravel-shaped depressions resembling the surface sands of the upper-cone of an hour-glass soon after they have begun to pass into the lower-cone. They vary from 60 to 80 yards in circumference and are only where the underlying-chalk is covered by a thin bed of sand (Bagshot). By the percolation of the rain-water containing carbonic acid through the sands, the chalk is dissolved, and conveyed with the water through the cracks and fissures of the rock, which become widened and deepened in course of time, each calcareous atom being replaced by grains of the superincumbent sand. Professor Prestwich considers that the old Tertiary sand-pipes may have determined the formation of some of these pits.

TUFA.


A tufaceous bed at Blashenwell, south of Corfe Castle, is the last, but not the least important Pleistocene bed to be noticed. It is 8 feet thick on the left side of the road below the farmhouse, and merges into a bed of marl and loam 6 feet thick and of gravelly clay of undetermined thickness. In a quarry a little to the east the tufa rests upon a bed of

clay (Weald).

There must have been a human settlement in its immediate neigh-I nere must have been a numan settlement in its immediate neighbourhood during its formation of the tufa-bed. Flint-chips, charcoal, marine-edible-shells brought from the sea-shore (which is two miles distant), remains of deer and ox, &c.; but no kind of pottery nor worked implement. Until further evidence the question must remain unsettled. Mr. Clement Reid, of the Government Survey, who is now (1894) examining the superficial deposits of the neighbourhood, will, without doubt, obtain the needed "further evidence," and decide whether Palæolithic or Neolithic men selected this part of Purbeck as their temporary occupation.

In addition to the animal remains, and evidences of man's occupation in this tufa-bed plant-remains are locally abundant, including Oak, Elm, Sphagnum; further search may add the Beech to the number, as the Beech-feeding Clausilia laminata occurs in the deposit.

In every country and almost in every province the rhamnifolius type has a somewhat modified appearance. In England R. rhamnifolius and R. umbrosus are generally thought to be very different plants. A good deal of the dry branches, however, we see in the herbaria cannot be arranged with any degree of certainty under one or the other species. The most remarkable features common to all forms of the aggregate species are a very much branched stem, strong prickles, a small dentition of the leaves, an unusually long foot-stalk, and the roundish (broadly obovate, elliptic, or orbicular) shape of the terminal leaflet. The typical R. rhamnifolius has an angular glabrous stem, a compound panicle armed with frequent broad-based hooked prickles, and small white flowers. The upper surface of the leaves is quite glabrous, the underneath is generally covered with a close white felt. In my variety stenoplos the prickles of the flowering branch are slender and declining. The English R. rhamnifolius I saw with Mr. Rogers in several places near Bournemouth has the same armature as this variety (stenoplos) and is distinguished by larger flowers, and a hairy upper surface of the leaflets. I have seen the English R. rhamnifolius near Bournemouth, Branksome, and Daggens." W. O. Focke. Jour. Bot., 1890, pp. 101, 102. Native; woods and hedges; common. Sh. July—August.

Their remains are met with in the Forest Bed of Norfolk; none returned after the Ice age with the exception of the Scotch fir. Sir Charles Lyell gives an account of a submerged fir-forest at Bournemouth cropping out from beneath a bed of shingle, and lying in a direct line with the Bournemouth valley. Seventy-six rings of annual growth were counted in a transverse section of one of the trees, which was 14 inches in diameter. The Scotch firs, scattered over the heaths of the county, are probably the descendants of indigenous forests.

The claim of this plant to be indigenous is fully discussed by Mr. H. Turac, F.R.S., in the Journal of Botany, 1871, pp. 163-165, who considers its home to be the south-east of Europe and the adjacent parts of Asia, and that it was brought westward, and cultivated for the sake of the root which was used for medicinal purposes in the middle part of the 16th century. Turner says—

"The Acorus groweth not in England." Johnson, in his revised edition of Gerarde's Herbal, regarded it apparently as essentially a garden plant, and called it the Sweet Garden Flag, the name it now retains, omitting Garden. Mr. Turner sums up thus:—"I think with certainty that such good observers as Turner, Lobel, Clusius, Gerarde, Parkinson, and Johnson, not to mention others whose names from not being authors are less known, could not have passed by so singular a plant familiar to all but Turner in the garden and to which a special interest attached from the uncertainty and confusion prevailing as to the right name of the then much esteemed rhizome, which was in the sixteenth century largely used as a drug."



ADDENDA III.

Ophrys arachnites. Reichb.

Since the last sheets of the Flora have been printed off I have found O. apifera growing on the reported site of O. arachnites, which throws some doubt as to the propriety of retaining this rare British plant on our List. I propose, therefore, provisionally to strike it out.

Probably an hybrid between L. repens and L. vulgaris, as it always occurs in the neighbourhood of these species and nowhere else.

This plant is larger than L. repens; the palate is yellow, the upper lip white, tinged with lilac, and purple-striped, the spur as long as the corolla.

Of the three forms mentioned by Boswell Syme, Eng. Bot., Vol. vi., p. 143, the one found by Mr. H. C. Watson at Shirley, Southampton, comes nearest to this plant.
