FRIENDS OF CIVILIAN PUBLIC SERVICE CAN HELP BY . . .

- Planting land with produce which, when harvested, will go to the camps.
- · Canning supplies for C. P. S.
- Giving any surpluses on hand to the camps now.

CREDIT FOR GIFTS OF FOOD . . .

For contributions of those foodstuffs which are listed by the camps as essential, the camp director will issue a receipt at the time the gifts arrive in camp. This receipt will carry a monetary value—the current market price which the camp would have paid, had the gifts been bought.

This amount will be automatically credited to the meeting, church or group of which the contributor is a member, if the director is furnished with this information.

Credited gifts in kind can be deducted on income tax returns just like cash contributions to C. P. S.

GETTING FOOD TO CAMP . . .

When supplies of food for Civilian Public Service are available, they should be brought to a local "depot"—a selected home or church basement—and word sent to the Yearly Meeting C. P. S. Committee; to the American Friends Service Committee, 20 South 12th Street, Philadelphia; its branch offices at 544 East Orange Grove Avenue, Pasadena, California; 1830 Sutter Street, San Francisco, California; 189 West Madison Avenue, Chicago, Illinois; or to Chase Conover, 101 South 8th Street, Richmond, Indiana.

As soon as sufficient quantities are collected, arrangements will be made to pick up the food and transport it to camp. Contributions should be tagged with the name, address and meeting or church affiliation of the donor.

Containers will be returned to the contributor after being emptied, if they are properly marked.
