MEXICO (STATE OF CHIHUAHUA).

UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA

Production of corn and Kaffir corn in 1918-19.

The census figures show that 45,143,000 bushels of corn were produced in 1917-18. The estimated production for 1918-19 is 41,289,000 bushels.

The same census figures show that during the season 1917-18 the Union produced 6,279,000 bushels of Kaffir Corn. The production for 1918-19 is estimated at 4,821,000 bushels.

RICE.

JAPAN.

The area under rice in 1919 was 7,622,000 acres against 7,580,000 acres in 1918. The production of cleaned rice for 1919 is estimated at 19,054,000,000 pounds against 17,184,050,000 pounds in 1918. (International Institute of Agriculture.)

JAPAN.

According to the investigation made by the Department of Communications, the consumption of rice amounts to 339 pounds per head a year which means a total consumption of 19,383,000,000 pounds. Even if the production of rice this year does not fall short of the first forecast (19,154,000,000 pounds) the supply will be insufficient to meet the demand. (Consul General G. H. Scidmore, Yokhama.)

KOREA.

The production of cleaned rice in 1919 is estimated at 2,915,060,000 pounds against 3,389,605,000 pounds in 1918. (International Institute of Agriculture.)

SIAM.

According to a cablegram from Vice Consul Hansen at Bangkok dated December 4, 1919, the Siamese Government has prohibited the exportation of rice and of all rice products for the next year owing to the partial failure of the rice crop in most of the Provinces. (Commerce Reports).

POTATOES.

SWEDEN.

The Central Bureau of Statistics of Sweden estimates the production of Potatoes for 1919 at 80,751,000 bushels. (Consul General D. I. Murphy, Stockholm, October 28, 1919).

SUGAR CANE AND CANE SUGAR.

ARGENTINA.

The area under sugar cane for 1918-19 is estimated at 231,000 acres, the production of cane at 2,425,000 short tons, and the production of raw sugar at 139,000 tons. (International Institute of Agriculture.)

GUATEMALA.

The area under sugar cane for 1919 is estimated at 40,000 acres and the production of raw sugar at 25,000 short tons. (International Institute of Agriculture.)

UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA.

The area under sugar cane for 1919-20 is estimated at 160,000 acres, The production of sugar for 1919-20 is estimated at 168,000 short tons against 164,000 tons in 1918-19.

The official estimates place the production of olive oil for 1919 between 3,500,000 and 4,700,000 gallons against 11,758,000 gallons in 1918. (American Consulate, Tunis, October 28, 1919.)

BRITISH INDIA (ASSAM).

The production of tea in Assam for 1918-19 is estimated at 253,333,000 pounds against 243,257,000 pounds for 1917-18.

ARTICLE I

SECTION 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

SECTION 2

The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

SECTION 3

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

SECTION 4

The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter or amend such Regulations.

SECTION 5

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall begin at Noon on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law provide for another Day within the same Year.

SECTION 6

The Congress shall be held at such Place as they may by Law determine; and until they meet, such Care of public Affairs as the Executive may think proper shall be taken.

SECTION 7

All bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

SECTION 8

The Congress shall have Power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes; to borrow Money on the Credit of the United States, to emit and put in Circulation Paper Money, to regulate the Value of Money, the Weights and Measures, to define and punish Offences against the Law of Nations, to define and punish Offences against the Law of the United States, to define and punish Offences on the high Seas, and on the Land near the Coast of the United States, to punish Piracy and Robberies on the high Seas, and on the Land near the Coast of the United States, to punish Counterfeiting the Coin, and to punish Forgery, to punish the Counterfeiting of Securities and Stamps of the United States, to establish Post Offices and Post Roads, to constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court, to coin Money, to regulate the Value thereof, and the Use of them, to provide for the Punishment of all Crimes, except Cases of Impeachment, to declare War, to grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, to raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money for that Purpose shall be for a longer Term than two Years; to raise and support a Navy, to make and regulate Rules of the Road, and Office of the Ports of the United States, to make and enforce all Laws necessary and proper to execute the Powers vested in the Government of the United States by this Constitution.
