Condo project plan

Fort Erie's councillors want to see a plan put in nlace for the future development of Bay Beach.

During a council-in-com mittee meeting on May 4 a recommendation from Town staff was approved to hire Planning Partnership, a Toronto-based firm, at a cost of \$100,000 to develop the Bay Beach Master Plan.

Ward 5 Coun. Don Lubberts didn't support the recommendation and said he voted against it because of a potential conflict of interest.

A partner with the firm was involved with planning a 12-storev condominium project. The Molinaro Group. a Burlington-based devel oper, spent years planning a controversial condo project in the Bay Beach area but scrapped the project at the last minute in 2013.

The Molinaro Group filed

a lawsuit last year against the town and its councillors seeking damage. Ed Lustio, the Town's lawver said the conflict of interest has been reviewed and the firm's employee, who was involved with planning the condominium project will not be involved in the development of the new master plan

Fort Frie man charged

A Fort Erie man has been arrested and charged with multiple violent offences. Niagara Regional Police say last Wednesday, they began an investigation into an incident which occurred the previous night.

As a result of the investi gation, a 37-year-old man from Fort Erie was arrested. Charged with assault, sexual assault, overcome resistance by attempting to suffocate, forcible confinement and utter threats is Bichard Brant Police say the accused and victim are known to each other.

A dandelion is a dandelion is a coltsfoot

The late Bert Miller introduced us to this spring flowering plant. As Bert often did he asked questions of us. "What do you see?" My answer was simple. " A dandelion." He replied, "Look at their stems." Not a dandelion.

Coltsfoot

Bert plucked one. There was no smooth dandelion stem. Instead little leaf-likes were attached to the coltsfoot stem. Otherwise first glance — dandelions.

Bert Miller knew a lot about the medicinal values of our native plants. As we looked at the coltsfoot plant I recall him saying a word that sounded like "pertussis" He told us to look on our cough medicine bothes. "You will find that ingredient often in cough sysups" He told that our colonial lorefathers would take all of the

coltsfoot plant — flower, stem, leaves and root and boil it down into a syrup — and an effective cough syrup!

For many years as you enter Marcy Woods you will find a colony of Cotsfoot plants just before you enter the nature preserve. This is early spring usually before dandelions arrive. The leaves resemble a colts foot. Hence the name.

Did Bert say "pertussis" or was it just "tussis?" I am not sure. The scientific name for coltsfoot is Tussilagi farfara. It is derived from the Latin tussis, meaning cough and ago, meaning to act on. Bert was right about coltsfoot, and its medicinal use.

Look for our "dandelion-like coltsfoot this spring.

A quote from American journalist, Michael Levy, "... this might be one of the worse years for ticks which carry Lyme disease..."

That was last year. Hopefully this year's hermit where will decimate many ticks. Here is some information about ticks in Niagars. Ilike Wainfleet Conservation area. Thave walked the paths there over the years. All I remember are humgry mosquitoes. I never thought of ticks until the Wainfleet Conservation Report last year. Here are found the Black-legged ticks that can carry Tyme disease. Of the 46 Black-legged tested Over half tested positively for Tyme diseased Wainfleet site is monitored for the disease.

Correct me. So far the incidence has been very low.

Let's hope this year that the number will be lower Remember to check your body for ticks or tick bites after nature walks such as in Marcy Woods. Stay on he trails! Check your dog too.

Finally May on the Friendship Trail on my trusty electric scooter. Things look good on the trail. Rode down to Six Mile Creek bridge.

Good shape. Next day headed West past Gorham Road to Cherry Hill Blvd. Fences repaired and good riding. One open fence area for owner access on south side. Met more than nine walkers, runners, cyclists and roller bladers.

at Point Abino. Brother Ed, Keith Bailey and I enjoyed a rare sight. We have seen up to eight egrets at Frenchman's Creek, Never at Point Abino.

How come? Buffalo TV News reported at a beach south of Buffalo with many dead Doublecrested cormorants. Why?

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Health Corner

The Danger of a Cracked Tooth

Do you remember the last time your dentist recommended a crown for your tooth with a large filing in it? Recent studies have shown that your dentist was right all along

In this study, scientists measured the amount of force needed to break teeth with different sized fillings The teeth in this study ranged from ones with no filling to ones with fillings that are 1/4 of the width of the tooth, as well as 1/3 and ½ of the width of the tooth.

You will be shocked at what they have found. They discovered that when a filling in a tooth exceeds 1/3 of the width of the tooth, you will be twice as likely to break the tooth or crack the tooth When a filling in a tooth exceeds 1/2 of the width of the tooth, you will be 3 to 4 times more likely to break the tooth.

Now, this does not mean you will break all of these largely filled teeth. However, it means that when you have



a large filling, you are at a significantly higher risk for a tooth fracture or a crack.

Here is the concern When you wait for a tooth to break, there is a possibility that your lasting treatment options dentist may not be able to fix for your largely restored, that tooth. Even if the tooth is fixable, the underlying tooth structure could be damaged where by the longevity of that tooth would be reduced.

If you happen to crack a tooth (rather than fracture the tooth), the problem is more significant. A crack, once it starts, cannot be stopped. Sometimes these cracks can run down to the nerve of the tooth or the bone, which makes it extremely difficult to fix and can cause

some serious discomfort Unfortunately, a lot of the cracked teeth end up being extracted

Here is the good news. Some of these weak teeth can be effectively protected with full coverage restorations (crowns, onlays, caps) which can over the hiting surfaces of the teeth. Since there are less wedging effects compared to fillings, these restorations can give long structurally weak teeth. The key is to get these type of restorations earlier rather than later, before the cracks occur.

Losing a loved one is hard but when a parent loses his or her child, the pain is unimaginable.

"It's absolutely horrible when a young life is cut short and Kelsey's life was cut short," Lana Hill said.

Hill's daughter Kelsey, a shy 13 year-old, died on Dec. 13, 2011 after a 15-month battle with a neuroectodermal tumour, an aggressive form of hrain cancer.

Over the course of chemo and radiation treatments, Kelsey had one wish — she wanted to help other children fighting cancer.

"Before her diagnosis, Kelsey was a shy girl. But afterward, she finally found her voice," Hill said about her daughter.

The band is coming off a year in the studio creating their newest album 111 Songs. The album's title isn't figurative; the band actually recorded 111 songs in studio, each with a different sound and meaning to it.

"When we did our last album (White Paint) we did a bundle where you could get a t-shirt and a CD and if you paid an extra 10 bucks you would get a custom song about yourself. Ten bucks what a deal." Versteeg

said. "It turned out to be not quite the best deal for us though because it took us a ton of time and money to get it done. But we did and looking back on it it's a pretty fond memory."

When they came up with the idea they never expected it to turn out the way it did. Some may have tried to go back on their promise when presented with such a tall task, but not Hollerado.

"Every day we would go grab a coffee, sit in Tim Hortons and say what did we get ourselves into Then we would head to the studio and record for the day," said Versteeg.

This isn't the first time Hollerado has come to Fort Erie, so when they heard they were chosen to be the first show at the Bell Tower they were honoured.

"It's awesome, it's honestly such an honour because last time we were there it was great. The staff and the crowd were amazing"

The venue itself is every bit as unique as the band, which spent the entire month of February in 2009 touring, playing 28 shows in 28 days.

"Buildings are not built this way anymore, that's what makes them unique," said Pizzicarola. "This is a historical building in the downtown core, the spaces in the building are very unique."

Pizzicarola said he hopes the Bell tower in Bridgeburg does the same thing the Sanctuary did for Ridgeway, which has been a destination for people to see "great and hugely talented musicians in a small boutique venue"

The Bell tower will hold approximately 250 people for the Hollerado show, but musical acts are just the tip of the iceberg, according to Pizzicarola, they'll offer much more to the community.

"There will be an art gallery, kids summer art camps and classes. It will be an event centre and a host for concerts." In addition, residents running start up businesses or residents that run businesses out of their home could find use for the Bell Tower.

We are also developing a coworking studio space where creative businesses and artisans will workalfordable office space where there are individual studios for rent by the day, month or year and shared space for the business collective such as a conference room, meeting room, print room and lounge with Khchenette', said Pizzicarola.

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Italo Canadian Club marks half-century of tradition

The Italo Canadian Club has kept the Italian tradition alive for 50 years.

The community is invited to help members of the Italo Canadian Club to mark half a century during a gala dinner and dance on Saturday, May 30.

"We're the only heritage group in the community to have a club in Fort Erie," said club member Nino D'Ambra.

"With this celebration, we hope to keep our traditions alive in the community."

Armondo Nigro, a member of the Italo Canadian Club, came to Canada in July 1961. When he arrived, he was struck by how different Canadian culture is from Italian culture.

"In Italy, everyone socialized.

There would be a large square that people would gather but when we arrived here, we didn't have that."

It took years after Nigro arrived, but with the help from friends and other members of the community, the faalo Caradian Club was built in June 1965.

"Not many people realize that members of the Italo Canadian Club have done a lot of work for the community," Nigro said.

The club hosts monthly pasta nights with proceeds going to various charities. The organization also sponsors minor sports program and community projects and is home to Garrison Little Theatre.

In the early days, the club had 70 members and that number ballooned to more than 200 members during the 1980s and 1990s.

But that number has dwindled again as the club's members have moved away or died. Nigro said he would like to see membership climb again.

"Everyone in the community is invited," he said. "No matter what culture, everybody is welcome."

Nigro said he would like to see the club become a community centre for not just the Italian community, but for everyone.

Stevensville church a witness to history

Nestled in the heart of Stevensville, a small, aging church has survived many years on Ridgemount Road.

Founded in 1840, St. John's Anglican Church is worthy of recognition as a historical building in Fort Erie. It existed before a

It existed before a number of important events in Canadian history including Canadian Confederation and has seen little change from the days of the horse and the buggy.

"It has survived a lot," said Charlene Nigh, a member of the church's congregation. "It remains one of the oldest original church buildings in Fort Erie."

This year mark's the church's 175th anniversary and the small congregation will host a variety of events to celebrate.

Nigh encourages the community to participate in the church's annual strawberry festival in June, a community barbecue in August, the annual fall fair and garage sale in October and a big 'homecoming dinner' in November.

"(St. John's is a special place and we

want everyone in the community to celebrate with us," Nigh said.

Church member Doris Miller said St. John's will continue to serve the needs of the community for many years to come. What keeps the congregation of less than a hundred members going is "a little stubbornness and determination."

"Our church is a community. It's really the people that keep us people, We wouldn't be here if it wasn't for the people who continue to come every Sunday and our members who aren't always able to attend service each week but support us throughout the year."

The little church's roots begin in Niagara-on-the-Lake, with the arrival of Reverend Robert Addison in Niagara.

Addisoñ was commissioned to come to Niagara in 1792 to serve 800 families scattered across the district of Nassau, starting at Forty Mile Creek on Lake Ontario, extending to Niagara and along the river to Fort Frie.

As there were no churches in the area during this time, Addison rode about the district, conducting services at

any location available to him. He conducted services at 01d Fort Erie, at the home of John Stanton and at Kirby's Mill. Addison went on to become rector of St. Mark's Anglic an Church in Niagara-on-the-lake.

Under new leadership, Reverend John Anderson, who eventually became the first rector of St. Paul's Anglican Church, saw the need for another church to serve the needs of the Town.

One acre of land was purchased from Charles Hibbard and the building was constructed at 2251 Ridgemount Rd. near Bowen Road.

Anderson served as the church's first rector. A glass stained window, known as 'The Good Shepherd Window' was installed behind the altar to honour his memory.

In 1910, the chancel was added and the church hall, where the congregation once organized community plays, was constructed in 1957.

Statement of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest:

This old Ironwood Tree is one of the few of its age standing alone in the open on public lands and accessible to the residents of Fort Erie. More importantly, core testing of the tree out its age at Circa 1866 at the time of the Fenian Baids that occurred at Bidgeway Battlefield Park. It stands today as a reminder of the important battle and historical event

On June 2, 1866 Fort Erie was invaded by the Fenian Army. These Irish Civil War veterans intended to hold Upper Canada "hostage" and use this position to negotiate Ireland's

The subsequent Battle of Ridgeway and battle at the Fort Erie dock, while a tactical victory for the Fenians, ended quickly with the intervention of the United States government.

A consequence of these battles was that residents throughout Upper and Lower Canada realized that they could not rely on Britain for protection, giving support to the growing movement for Confederation. Canada became a country one year later.

The Battle of Bidgeway is the first battle of the modern Canadian Armed Forces: the first casualty of the modern forces was here in Ridgeway; and a catalyst to Confederation happened at Ridgeway Battlefield Park. Some historians call this "The Battle that made

Cleanup crew scaling back its efforts

The cleanup crew charged with the task of cleaning up a chemical spill in Fort Erie is scaling back its efforts.

"The Region staff as well as the contractors have done a fantastic job and I am extremely satisfied, said, Ron Tripp, the Region's commissioner of public works.

"The Region has been working on cleaning the road side ditches and we've achieved a clean condition."

Helena Street between Garrison Road and Albany Street has been closed since March 9 when the Ministry of the Environment was alerted to a chemical spill that occurred at 833 Helena St.

The spilled materials have been identified as acetone. toluene and xylene, a solvent-type substance found in paints or adhesives.

The Niagara Region has been working with the ministry and an environmental cleanup company to clean the spill

"As to how we go forward with recovery of those costs (associated with the cleanup) and dealing with the site, which is still contaminated, is yet to be seen as positive or affective.

The Region's public works committee issued a report in March that stated the cleanup had cost nearly \$1 million with the operation having a daily expense of \$45,000.

Tripp said that number has varied as the cleanup operation has been scaled back. When it is confirmed, Tripp said the total cost of the cleanup would be made public.

During an open house bosted by the Town of Fort Frie in April. Tripp said the Region is "a victim of this spill" because some of the chemicals migrated to ditches along the Regional road and property.

According to a director's order issued by the ministry, contaminants from a chemi cal spill have reached Lake Erie waters.

The order issued by the ministry states that on March 10, ministry officers and Niagara Region staff confirmed through observation "the contaminants discharged from the site (had) drained downstream into a local water course referred to as the Kraft Drain and along that drain to Lake Erie."

Paul Widmeyer, the ministry's Niagara district officer, said the Niagara Region responded to the spill by increasing sampling of the water treated by the Bosehill Water Treatment Plant, which takes its water from the lake.

The Region has been sam pling water "in their road side ditch and at the intake of the Rosehill Drinking Water Plant since the spill was discovered. In addition, a ministry officer has sampled local drinking water wells."

"They (the Region) found no impacts to the local drinking water supply," Widmeyer said. "Our review of the Region's sample results has also found no impact to the local drinking water supply."

Widmeyer said the order, which was issued to ten parties associated with the site of the splil, including Cavern Petrochemical Co. Ltd., 1350095 Ontario Limited and DTZ Barnicke Niagara Limited, has 11 directions that must be completed. One direction requires those parties named in the order to provide documents to the ministry describing how much contaminated material

has been removed from the area and the site

He could not say how much contaminated material has been removed from the site and surrounding area.

"The order has been appealed by a number of the named parties. That matter is currently before the Environmental Review Tribunal."

Widmever said the Environmental Protection Act requires the polluter to pay for the clean up and it allows anyone who has or had control of a property "in circumstances like these to do work to clean-up a spill."

Bill Powell, a technician for Tech Services Niagara, said clean up efforts was "killing business" Helena Street.

"But the last few weeks it has been okay. Business seems to be getting back to normal," said Bill Powell, a technician for Tech Services Niagara.

"The first five weeks after the pill, it was really bad. I had about one to two walk-ins a day. I normally have about 10 to 20 people who walk into the store.

Following reports in the media about the chemical spill. which occurred at 833 Helena St. in Fort Erie, Powell said staff from Niagara Region placed a sign in at Garrison Road and Helena Street alerting residents that businesses are still open.

"I'm not all concerned by it (the spill)," Powell said, "I live right down the street in front of the spill. I didn't smell anything and I didn't see anyone (the cleanup crew) wearing masks."

"I think at first people were afraid because they didn't know what had been spilled but I think as time has gone on, people have kind of forgotten about it. I'm not an expert but I think they are almost finished.

There are a lot less trucks now and a there are only a few people there cleaning it up still!

"On the basis of the information we've been given, they (the Region) have contained the spill effectively," Fort Erie Mayor Wayne Redekop said.

They (ministry officials) want to make sure they have managed the site well before they open that road," Redekop said. "We were told early on that it

could be closed for as much as

two months or longer. In my view, they (the region has been) responsible in doing the job."

Redekop said town staff is in the midst of a discussion about what the Town can do to ensure that a similar situation doesn't occur.

"Right now, we are talking to determine what level of service we can provide in terms of enforcement of our bylaws and safety.

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Council hits the brakes on bus plan

A Region committee's decision to not take a necessary step toward an intermunicipal transit system is a disappointment to one of its biggest backers.

Former regional councillor Debbie Zimmerman called it a "historic moment" when Niagara Region's public works committee voted in September to remove the words "pilot project" from an inter-municipal system and to build toward a permanent one.

For the Region to start up such a system requires a so-called triple majority -a majority of those on council, and a majority of local councils (seven of 12) that represent a majority of eligible voters.

On Thursday, the Region's committee of the whole put the brakes on staff working toward getting that triple majority, with a motion by Port Colborne regional Coun. David Barrick.

His plan puts the initiative on hold in favour of asking the municipalities of Welland, St. Catharines and their transit commissions to work together on a new model of serving other municipalities.

"Disappointing, holy Hannah!" Zimmerman said Monday afternoon.

"The fundamental debate here has been we've been engaging people to support getting GO Transit (trains), but how do we do that when we don't have a seamless system?"

The Region has been funding inter-municipal transit under a pilot project started in 2011. In it, grants are provided to Niagara's three main transit operators -- St. Catharines Transit, Niagara Falls Transit, Welland Transit -- to provide the service.

The pilot was to last three years, but was extended to September.

A report to council Thursday showed a mapped out strategy staff was prepared to undertake to get the triple majority.

The strategy included two presentations to each of Niagara's 12 communities. The first would give an overview of inter-municipal transit and get feedback on what a bylaw creating the service should include. The second meeting would be to present the bylaw developed with their input and to ask for support.

But approval of Barrick's motion put that on hold.

He and Niagara Falls Mayor Jim Diodati said they favoured the connectivity models currently in place with certain municipalities -- Port Colborne pays Welland Transit to run a bus to Port, while Fort Erie is connected to Niagara Falls by that town's transit system and Thorold is serviced under a agreement with St. Catharines Transit.

Diodati said he and the mayors of Welland and St. Catharines and their transit commissions have had ongoing, informal discussions for years about providing service to outlying municipalities.

"The idea we had discussed was rather than forcing transit and forcing (municipalities) to pay for a service that maybe they don't want or can't afford, that we would do it as a service that you pay for? Diodati said, using Grimsby as an example that could be serviced by St. Catharines Transit.

He said that model can be employed as "the system grows and matures into a full system."

"Eventually "| one day this will become one great big system. It's a big geography and not enough demography and until it all comes togetber, that's in the future. But until that time, I think it's a natural way.

"We're not talking about eliminating regional

service "; we're just saying it's a different approach -the communities that want it can pay."

Diodati said the triple majority is "never going to happen. So that's just a waste of time and waste of nergy."

While hopeful Barrick's motion will be rejected at next week's regional council meeting, Zimmerman said a single-fare system is integral to moving people around Niseara. "To abandon a singlefare box is just silly, at this stage," she said. "A single fare-box is what makes it easy for people to travel through the region."

Fort Erie residents jailed in Australia

Two Fort Erie residents arrested in Australia in connection with what authorities called one of the largest methamphetamine busts in the continent's history have been sentenced.

Catherine McNaughton, 31, was sentenced to four years and nine months behind bars for one count of attempting to traffic and James Kelsey, 28, received an eight-year jail term for three counts of attempting to traffic.

The two Niagara residents were arrested in the fall of 2013 in connection with the trafficking of 650 kilograms of ephedrin hidden in vanilla powder jars.

Ephedrine is a chemical used to manufacture methamphetamine.

"Drug crime traffickers seek to profit from the production and distribution of illicit drugs," said David Adsett, deputy director of the Office of the Commonwealth Director of Public Prosecutions.

"Law enforcement agencies are increasingly intercepting these criminal activities and the sentences imposed in this case clearly demonstrates the seriousness. When you are convicted of such crimes, be aware that you'll face the prospect of very lengthy terms of imprisonment."

Also sentenced was Edmond Proko, 48, who received a 14-year jail term for trafficking and attempting to traffic a commercial quantity of ephedrine.

All three will be deported back to Canada after serving their sentences.

Born in Montreal, he was a graduate of McGill University with post-graduate degrees in theology from the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas in Rome.


He launched the magazine Fatima Crusader, dedicated to Our Lady of Fatima, in 1978.

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Mom to donate kidney to another boy after son's death

St. CATHARINES, Ont. -- It was supposed to be a gift of life for her child: Her left kidney. A perfect match and a chance for her 18-year-old son to get off the leash of dialysis and have the healthy life he deserved.

But it wasn't to be.

Three days before the transplant, David MacKinnon had a stroke. He died June 8, 2011, on what was to be the day his mother, Michelle, would have given him a kidney.

And in that moment, under the weight of a mother's grief, Michelle turned to David's doctor and made a promise: "You find me a person who deserves this kidney as much as David did, and I'll donate it."

She was expected to fullfil her promise Wednesday.

In an operation at the Toronto, General Hospital, Michelle, 46, will give that left kidney to a young boy. A boy she does not know, whom she has met only twice, but whose mother made an emotional plea on Facebook that ended up at the top of Michelle's news feed in March.

The boy's parents can't donate a kidney to their son, and they were running out of options.

She sent a note to the mother on how she had already gone through the array of tests for her son and that maybe, she would be a match for the young boy.

Turns out, she was

Michelle's kidney will be removed during a threehour-plus surgery, then transported to another hospital where the boy will be ready and waiting.

"David deserved to have a good life," says Michelle. "And I honestly believe that my kidney would have worked for a long time.

"Maybe that's a mother's instinct or wishful thinking. But that didn't happen. It was cut short unexpectedly.

"So this isn't for me, and it's not David that I'm helping now, but I'm finishing what I started with David. For another family."

David had been sick all his life. Doctors could not give it a name, but in simple terms there were tiny holes throughout David's body.

In June 2010, when David was

17 years old, he was in renal failure. His parents, Michelle and Dave of Niagara Falls, were told he needed dialysis to take over what his kidneys could no longer do and purify his blood, but that ultimately his best chance for survival was a kidney transplant.

He started dialysis in his home, tethered to a machine every day for 12 hours. A year later, he needed dialysis at the St. Catharines, Ont., hospital, four days a week.

"It took everything away from him," says Dave. "I wish I could have switched spots with him."

Their hope converged on a transplant.

But David's surgery was cancelled and postponed two times for various reasons, and he died before the third attempt.

St. Čatharines nephrologist Dr. Danny Lagrotteria cared for David in his final year of life. He is also a director on the David Gregory Foundation, an organization founded by Dave and Michelle to honour their son's memory and raise money and awareness for kidney disease.

"She never really felt like that kidney was hers," he says. "That if it couldn't go to her son, then she needed, not just wanted, it to benefit another person, another family, another community."

Now just days before the surgery, she is at peace. There are risks to any surgery.

She knows, too, there is always a chance the boy's body will reject her kidney.

She tries not to dwell on what is beyond her control.

"No matter what happens, I've done what I can do," she says. "I'd like to think David is looking out for me"
