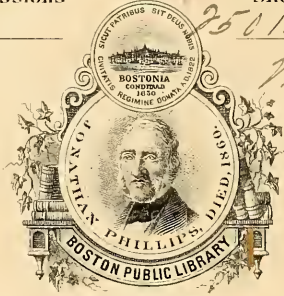

1525.

JOHN JOSSELYN of high Rodyng in the Countie of Essex, Esquier. Philip now my wife. Cecily late my wife. Certain Manors and lands to wife Philip for life, with these remainders:—(i.) the right heirs of my body; (ii.) the heirs male of my brother Rauffe Josselyn; (iii.) my cousin Rauffe Josselyn, son of John Josselyn late of Sheryng, and his heirs male; (iv.) Philip and Geffrey, brothers of last named Rauffe, and their heirs male; (v.) my right heirs. Prayers for souls of myself and of my wives, of Cecily and Phelip my children, of my father and mother, of Thomas and George Bradbury, of Robert Fitzherbert and Elizabeth his wife. Indenture dated 18 June 16 Henry VIII., made between (i.) me the said John, (ii.) Sir Geffrey Gate, K^t, upon the marriage of my son and heir Thomas, with Dorothy daughter of said Sir Geffrey. George Josselyn to have an annuity of cvj^s viij^d out of my manor of Hidehall, until he be preferred to a benefice of xx^m yearly. Thomas Bradbury, my brother-in-law, late citizen and alderman of London, gave the manor of Manewden in Essex to Jane late his wife, for life, remainder to my son Thomas Josselyn and his heirs, remainder to his cousin William Bradbury, son of his brother Robert Bradbury.

To be buried in the priory of Kings Hatfelde by late wife Cecily. Son Thomas now under xxiiij years. Anne Josselyn my daughter (spinster.) Jane my daughter and her husband. Costs and charges that I have borne for Cecily my late wife in suing for a special livery of her lands before our marriage "and otherwise for an hundred pounde sterlinge to John Fitzherbert for my said wife paide without lawe or conscience seying that she was first wedded to the sonne of the said John Fitzherbert having nothyng by him and afterward solde her ageyn to me for the said hundred pounde." John Tyrell, K^t, Humfrey Fitzherbert, William Bradbury and Sigesmond Coton, esq^{rs}, my feofees. Cousins George, Gabryell, and John Josselyn. My brother Gates. S^r Roger Wentworth, Knight, John his son and heir, and Anne his wife, my cousin. E^xors, wife Phelip, Robert Norwiche, serjeant-at-law, Thomas Awdeley, Benjamyn Dygby, gent., and John Wiseman. My

master Sr John Veer, K^t, overseer. Witness : Sr Geoffrey Gate, K^t, Guy Crayford, gent., Dame Joane Bradbury widow, Henry Susshe. Dated 12 July 17 Henry VIII. Proved 13 February 1525 by relict. Power reserved &c.

DAME ELIZABETH CLIFFORD late wife to Sir Robert Clyfford Knight of Aspeden in the diocē of lincoln. To be buried by said Sir Robert in the church of Aspeden. Elizabeth, daughter to Thomas Clyfford, Esq., my son. My sister Anne Burton. Niece Elyanor Snowe, gentlewoman. Elizabeth daughter to Robert Barlee, gent. Elyanor Eldergate. Prayers for my soul and for the souls of Sir Raufe Joslyn and Sir Robert Clyfford, Knights. To Thomas Stonar my teit in Aspeden Street which Humfrey Griffen did dwell in, for his life, with remainder to my said son Thomas. Edward Mygar. Xpōfer Cheppe my godson. Residue of goods, with all manors, lands &c. to said son Thomas. Exors, son Thomas Clyfford and Thomas Stonar, Witness : Sir Robert Newman "parishe prest" Sir Georde Hoggesdon. William Snowe. Dated 1 May 1525. Proved 20 July 1526 by Thomas Clifford in person, and by Richard Felde, proctor to the other exor.

SIR THOMAS JOSSELYN of Newehale Josselyn in the Countie of Essex, Knyghte. To be buried in the parish church of Sabridgworth, co. Herts., in the chancel. To my wife Dame Dorathe Josselyn "all my pearles and stones and all my Jewells—all my plate of siluer and siluer and gilt—and all my houshold stuff—at my manor or mansion house of Newhalle Josselyn." John Gybbe, Thomas Perry, and John Ingolde stand seised of my manor of Highe Rothing and my lands in High Rothing, Gythorp Rothing, Kyngs Hatfelde and Canfeld or elsewhere in Essex, to the performance of my will as by a deed dated 30 September 4 Elizabeth. I will that my feoffees stand seised to the use of my said wife and of my son John Josselyn and the survivor of them, with remainder to the heirs male of my son Richarde Josselyn. Remainder to my son Thomas Josselyn and his heirs male. Remainder to heirs male of said John Josselyn. Remainder to my son Henrye Josselyn and his heirs male. Remainder to my son Edwarde Josselyn and his heirs male. Remainder to right heirs. To my son Richard my household stuff at Hide Hall, co. Herts. To my daughter Jane Kelton, wife of Richard Kelton gent. 100^l. Sr John Wentworth and wife. My son Glascock. Cousin Mathew Bradbury. My sister Dame Jane Wentworth. Son Henrye and Anne his wife. Wife Dorathe and son John, exors. Friends, George Hadley, Esq. and Roger Trigge, gent., overseers. Witness : John Spytty, Richard Choppin, Robert Wasket, John Gybb, Roger Trigge. Dated 1 October 4 Elizabeth. Admon (with will annexed) 18 October 1564 to Dame Dorothy Josselyn the relict, the exors renouncing.

DAME DORATHEY JOSSELYN of Highe Roofdinge in the Countie of Essex widowe, late the wife of S^r Thomas Josselyn, Knighte, deceased. To be buried next said husband in the church of Sabbesforde. To each of my sons "a ringe of golde." My daughter Jane Kelton. Humfrey Josselyn (minor), son to Humfrey Josselyn. Servant Richard Lucas. I make my brother, S^r Henry Gate of Seamer, co. Ebor, Knight, my sole ex^{or}, paying my debts expressed in a schedule annexed to a deed indented made by me to my said brother, dated 7 July 18 Elizabeth. To Edwarde Josselyn, my son, the moiety of my remaining goods and to his daughter Marye Josselyn (minor) 20^l. S^r William Cordell, Knight, to be overseer. Witness: Richarde Lucas, John Pickeringe, Hughe Glaue. Dated 10 June 1579. Adm^{on} (with will annexed) granted 14 February 1582 to S^r Henry Gate, K^t, who renounces ex^{or}ship.

THOMAS JOSLIN of Rocheford in the Countie of Essex, yeoman. To be buried in the church yard of Rochford. Land called Lytle Snares in Hockley, to the use of the poor of Rochford. To Edmond Thorneton, the elder, of Much Stanbridge. My kinsman Edmonde Thorneton of Shopland, John Freeborne, and Christopher Pake of Prittlewell, 40^l to the use of "the moste distressed and religious Ministers of the church of God." Mr. Culverwell of Much Stanbridge. Mr. Roger the elder, the preacher of Weathersfeild. Mr. Neagoose of Lee. Mr. Andrewes of Barlinge. Mr. Joslinge my kinsman, the preacher of Goodeaster. Mr. Catlyn of Bromfield. Mr. Dykes, a preacher in prison. Mr. Derrick. Ezechias and Samuel Lockin (minors) and their mother^l My sister Elizabeth Sumner and her children. My sister Joane Lee, 20. by the hands of John Elliott of Litle Stambridge, no part going to her husband. Kinswomen, Jone Thorneaton, Lyddia Lee, and Rose Ellyott. My sister Phillis Gooddy. Wife's kinswoman, Margery Bachiler (a minor) 10^l. To the children of my brother Rafe Joslin of Roxwell, 150^l. To Henry Joslyn of Monesinge, my land called Thistledon's, (my wife's third excepted). Residue of houses and lands to wife Margaret for life. The remainder of a house in Rochford called Waterings, I give to William Taynetor and his heirs, remainder to James Nuttall, my wife's second son. The remainder of the residue of houses and lands I give to John, son of my brother John Joslynn the elder. I give my lease of the Wickhouse grounds in Childerditch and Westehornedon to Margaret my wife and John Joslin, son of my brother John Joslyn the younger, with remainder to the same John and his heirs, remainder to the youngest son of my brother John, the elder. My brother Rafe Joslin and Simon Joslyn shall be guardians to the said John in his minority. John Alyor. James Edgiott. Marie Eve of Rochford, and Thomas, Suzan, and Anne Eve, her children. My daughter-in-law Elizabeth Sams, daughter to Henry Sams late of Totham. My sons-in-law Edward Sams, Charles Nuttall, and James Nuttall.

Thomas, son of James Nuttall. The three children of Charles Nuttall. James and Marye, children to James Nuttall. To Jeffery Joslyn I give his debt to me. William Hudson of Rochford. My sister Bayllie's three younger children. Residue to wife Margaret, e^xtrix. Witness: Thomas Burnett, Tobias Hudson, Thomas Woode. Dated 5 March 1604. Proved 12 December 1606 by relict and e^xtrix.

EDWARD JOCELINE. To son Henry Joceline, and to daughters Jane and Elizabeth Joceline, 50^l each. To my son Lovet, who married my daughter Anne Joceline, 40^l, so that he procure his wife a life-estate in the farm at Nutworth, where his father dwelleth. To my daughter Sydey, 30^l, to be bestowed on "some prettye house" to remain to her daughters. To William Sydey the younger, 5^l. To Wallgraue Sydey. To the children of my son-in-law Richard Stubbins, 60^l of the mony my son Peter Gate oweth me, the remainder whereof I give to Joceline Gate, his son. To Mr. Wallis 5^l, he being my overseer. To my son Henrye, and daughters Jane and Elizabeth, my e^xors, all household stuff &c. they bestowing "a faire graue stone upon me with some Epitaph to shewe who I was and whence descended, vid^e the fourth sonne of S^r Thomas Joceline, K^{nt} of the Bath, and that I married Marye, the daughter and heire of one Lambe of Midlesex, by whom I hadd manye sonnes and daughters." My cousin Anthony Joceline oweth me 8^l, to be paid at his marriage. Witness: Richard Wallis, clerk, Jane Joceline, Eliz: Joceline. Undated. Proved 26 April 1627 by Henry Joceline. Power reserved &c.

RALPH JOSSELYN of Roxwell in the County of Essex, yeoman. To wife Dorothy, a yearly rent of 20^l for life, she abiding with my sons Ralphe and Symon. My brother Symon Josselyn. I have given unto my eldest son John his full part of my estate, amounting to about 800^l. Raphe, son of said John. Mary and Anna my daughters. To my son Richard, 200^l for his portion, and in recompense of 15^l given him by will of my brother Thomas Josselyn, deceased. To my son Joseph Josselyn, 160^l. To son Nathaniell, 100^l. My daughter Elizabeth. Residue of goods to sons Ralph and Symon Josselyn, my e^xors. Son Nathaniell Josselyn, overseer. Witness: Ma: Bridges, William Rochell, William Smith, Cha: Smyth. Dated 3 September 1628. Proved 4 May 1632 by Ralph and Simon Joslin, the sons and e^xors.

1636.

THOMAS JOSSELIN, one of the secondaries in the Office of the Kings Ma^{ty}s Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer. If I die in London, to be buried "in the Chauncell of the Parrish Church of Greate S^t Bartholomewes where I dwell." If I die in the country, to be buried "in the church of Little Horkesley neere to my father." To wife Susanna Josselin the capital messuage wherein I dwell, with its lands in Little Horkesley, and a messuage and lands called Baldwynes &c. for life, with remainder to Thomas Josselin my son (a minor) and his heirs and assigns. Said wife, my cousin Edmund Saunder, esq̄, and my friend Mr. William Duckett, exors and trustees. Tenement in Lavenham, co. Suff. in tenure of Mary Josselin widow (my brother's late wife). My daughters Jane and Elizabeth (minors). My brother Phillip Josselin and his wife, and his brother-in-law Mr. William Witham. My brother John Josselin's heirs. My brother Francis Josselin. My son to be kept at school, at the university, and at the Inn of Court. Mary Light, my sister's daughter, hath since her mother's death been partly maintained by rents of tents at Coggeshall. My brother Ancell, my said sister's former husband. Brother Lyte now living. Susanna and Frances Locke, my wife's daughters. Thomas Hide. Dame Phillip Carey, wife of Sir Ferdinando Carey, and her children. My sister Amyce and her children. My brother Amyce. Witness: Vincent Welly, Henrie Hamond, Tho: Hide. Dated 4 August 1635. Proved 26 April 1636 by exors.

SORRELL JOSLYN of Christ Church parish in London, bachelor. *Nuncupative will.* All goods to brothers and sisters equally. Witness: John Millward, Barbara Bott. Dated 9 May 1639. Adm^{on} (with will) granted 16 May 1639 to Richard Joslyn the brother.

JOHN JOSLIN of the parish of Slethians in the county of Cornwall, yeoman. Annis, wife of Henry Murton. John and Charity Murton. Kinsman John Tubb of S^t Allen, and his children. Kinsmen, Richard Smalley and Francis Smalley. Jane Smalley. Margaret Earle. James Lawry and his four brothers, and Johan Lawrie their mother. Henry Carverth the elder. Richard and Dorothe Harris. Phillis, the wife of William Lance. Residue to Henrie Bath, and James Bath his brother, of Slethians, my exors. Witness: Will: Knava, Edward Stephens, Withm Spurway. Dated 23 November 1640. Proved 14 May 1642 by exors.

SYMON JOSLYN of Puckeridge in the parish of Braughing in the county of Hertford, draper. To son Thomas Joslyn the ware in my shop, he paying my debts, and 20^l to my father Markwell. To my four daughters, Elizabeth, Maria, Sarah, and Margaret Joslyn, the profit of my corn in Braughin, Standon, and Starford, at their ages of 18 years or marriage. My brother Thomas Joslyn of Chelmsford. To Anne Kendricke "her mothers Trunke and Bible and silver bodkin and silver thimble and my second great Kettle and box w^{ch} was Margaret^r." To Margaret Joslyn, my daughter, "her mothers Trunke." My son-in-law John Kendricke (under 21 years) and my daughter Joane Joslyn (under 18 years). My friend Thomas Mensant and my son-in-law Joseph Chunn and his wife. Dorotheie, wife of John Churrie. Residue to son Thomas Joslyn, exor. Witness: Thomas Measant, Dorotheie Churrie. Dated 28 May 1645. Proved 21 July 1645 by exor.

SYMON JOCELINE of Easthaningfeild in the county of Essex, yeoman. To my eldest son Symon Joceline, my part of the messuage &c. called Boulungehatch in Roxwell and Newlandfee, with lands called Flax Hoppett, Willow Lease, Badhams, Asponfeild, Pearecrofte, &c., and so much of Moateshott whereof no use is limited by a certain deed of the division of the two parts of the said messuage &c. called Boulungehatch, made between Ralph Joceline of Roxwell, co. Essex, yeoman, Thomas Joceline of Barham, co. Suffolk, yeoman, and Rebecca his wife, and me the said Symon, of the one part; and Aron Benton and John Parey of London, gent., of the other part. I give my customary messuages and lands in Rettingdon to Peter Joceline. To my three daughters, Anna, Sarah, and Grace Joceline (minors), £100 each, over and above the sum of £50 which Peter Awecrofte, my late father-in-law (their grandfather), gave to my said three daughters and to my son Peter Joceline. Household stuff &c. given to my children by their grandfather and grandmother Awecroft. Residue to eldest son Symon, my exor. My brothers, Nathaniell and Richard Joslyne, overseers. Witness: Thomas Luncher, George Solme. Dated 28 September 1649. Proved 6 February 1655 by exor.

SIMON JOSSLIN of Rayne in the county of Essex, yeoman. To my wife Ellin Josslin 5^s. To my son Simon Joslin my messuage &c. in Rayne called "Fortyes." To my son John Josslin my messuage wherein I dwell in Rayne Street. To my son Thomas 35^l. To my son Matthew 25^l. To my daughter Mary 15^l, and to my daughter Annis one shilling. To Mary and Sarah Maidwell 20^s each. Residue to sons Thomas and John, exors. Witness: Thomas Westley, Joseph Hills. Dated 28 July 1655. Proved 15 October 1655, by exors.

William Sidays two daughters by his first wife. Elizabeth Till, a daughter of my sister Siday, and her eldest daughter. Dorothy Stubing and Izabell Ward, daughters of my sister Martin. Edward Lovett son of my sister Lovett. Mary Siday, daughter of my sister Siday. Jonathan Mathewe of Okenton and Alice his wife. Robert Mathewe, my godson. The children of my sister Anne Bucknall. Matthew and Elizabeth, children of my brother Matthew Josselin. Residue to wife Sarah, my e^xtrix. Friends, John Goulding and Thomas Stace, overseers. Witness: Edward Palmar, Daniel Stace. Dated 17 August 1657. Proved 23 November 1657 by e^xtrix.

RALPH JOSSELIN of Cranham Hall in the county of Essex, yeoman. I give to my daughter Dorothy 100^l, owed me upon bond by M^r Ford, minister of Great Warely, she paying my daughter Grace 20^l. My nephew Ralph Jocelin, minister of Earl's Colne. Residue of goods &c. to daughter Elizabeth (unmarried). Said cousin Ralph, and my daughters Dorothy and Grace, e^xors. Witness: Richard Joslin, Ann Hampson. Dated 27 November 1656. Nuncupative Codicil dated 21 March 1656: I give 20^l in the hands of Captain Stracy to my daughter Grace, wife of Robert Johnson. Witness: Martyn Curtis, Ann Howard. *No Probate clause.* Proved between 23 and 29 December 1657.

To my brother Richard Joslin 30^l, and to Mary Joslin, his daughter, by Anne his wife, 10^l. My brother Daniell Joslin, citizen and mason, and Rebecca his wife, and Elizabeth their daughter. My brother Edward Joslin. My brother Francis Joslin (minor). My sister Theoball Joslin (a minor). Elizabeth Overton of St. Margarets, Lothbury, spinster. My uncle Richard Playford of S^t Olaves, Hart Street. Residue to brother Daniell Joslin, exor. Witness: James Smith, Henric Playford. Dated 6 March 1657. Proved 15 April 1658 by exor.

Residue to daughter Ann. Wife Mary, ex^{trix}. Witness: Mary Bushee, Samuell Stracye. Dated 14 August 1658. Proved 31 January 165⁸₃ by relict and ex^{trix}.

GILES JOSCELINE of Brabraham in the county of Cambridge, yeoman. To my son Arthur Josceline, all household implements and stock in Brabraham. My sons Francis and Edmond. "My best silver flaggon, and three silver spoones I give and bequeath vnto my sonne Giles," to whom I give my household stuff and stock in Linton. To my son Francis and his heirs all messuages lands and teñts in Little Abbington, Brabraham and Pampisford. To my son Arthur and his heirs my house and closes in Balsham. To my son Edmond and his heirs my free and customary messuages and lands in Depden, co. Essex, in occupation of Seamor. To my sons Francis and Edmond Joscelyne my freehold messuages and lands in Depden, in occupation of Beadle. Residue of messuages and lands to my sons Gyles and Arthur. To my son Richard, 5^s (he having had his portion). To my grandchild Richard Josceline, 10^l at 21 years. To my sons Francis and Edmond, 20^l each at 28 years. Residue to sons Gyles and Arthur, exors. Witness: Thomas Rickard, Robert Hacke, Edmond Joslin. Dated 17 September 1662. Proved 11 November 1662 by exors.

ELIZABETH JASLIN of Shadwell in the parish of Stebunheath, co. Mx., widow. To my daughter Hannah Woolward, wife of William Woolward, mariner, 60^l, which, at her death, shall be given to her children William and Elizabeth. Stephen North. Residue to Hannah Woolward and Thomas and Stephen Cockshutt. Said Hannah and Thomas, exors. Son-in-law Woolward and friend M^r Anthony Knightsbridge, gent, of Chensford overseers. Witness: Christopher Jackson, John Shott. Dated 21 November 1666. Proved 5 January 1668 by exors.

1670.

JOHN JOSCELYNE of Fering in the county of Essex, esq̄. To my eldest son Nathaneel Joscelyne and his heirs, the messuage in Fering wherein I inhabit, with its free and copyhold lands. To my youngest son John Joscelyne, my messuage and lands in Layer Bretton. Certain messuages and lands near Sturmer, after my death descend to the heirs of Mary my late wife, begotten by me, and in default the fee simple is in me, and whereas my late father, myself, and my son Nathaneel had our education in Emanuel College in Cambridge, in case both my sons die without issue, I give the said messuages and lands to the Master and Fellows of the said College [for various purposes, amongst others, the augmentation of the Hebrew lectureship at Queen's College founded by testator's great uncle and godfather, John Joscelyne esq̄. Testator was born in Sabridgworth, where his cousin S^r Robert Joscelyne, Bar^t, now dwells]. My chambers in Gray's Inn I give to my son Nathaneel. Cousin S^r Robert Joscelyne, my best friend Richard Harlakenden, esq̄, my kind brother-in-law W^m Pennoyer, esq̄, and my sister his wife, Hezekiah Haynes and John Eldred. Exors to buy "Two dozen of Escutchions of the Armes of my Family and present them among my other friends." M^r Butcher, minister of Fering. Residue to son Nathaneel my exor. William Pennoyer overseer. Witness: John Cox. Dated 26 May 1668. Codicil dated 25 August 1670. Proved 21 November 1670 by exor. *Admōn de bonis non* granted 19 February 1671 to Anne Joscelyne, relict and ex^{trix} of said exor, dec^d.

NATHANIEL JOSCELYNE. "Had not I best aske my Father if I dye in this Sicknesse whether he will continue the payment of of my wifes portion and enjoyne my brother to buy the lands and receive the money and take the lands after her death." "If my wife be with child of a sonne, I give the lands in Sturmere and Feering to it and the

heires males of its body and for want of such issue to my brother and the heires males of his body the rem^r to my right heires." And for that I fynde no Creast vnto the same as comonly to all auncient Armes there belongith none, I the sayd Clarencieux Kynge of Armes By power and aucthorytie to my Office annexed and granted by Lifes Patentē vnder the great Seale of England haue assigned geuen and granted to these his auncient Armes the Creast herafter followinge. Vidz̄t, vpon the healme on a Wreath, siluer and asur, a Lyon seant siluer with a Crowne on his head, houldinge in his fore foote a battayll Axe gould, manteled gules, dobled siluer, as more playnly aperith depicted in the margent. To haue and houlde the sayde Armes and Creast vnto and for the sayd Robert Gall gentleman, and to his posteritye and to all the posteritie of Robert Gall his father with their differencis, And he and they the same to vse, beare and shew forthe in Shield, Cote, Armor or otherwayse at his and their Liberty and pleasure, with oute Impediment, Lett, or Interuption of any person or persons. 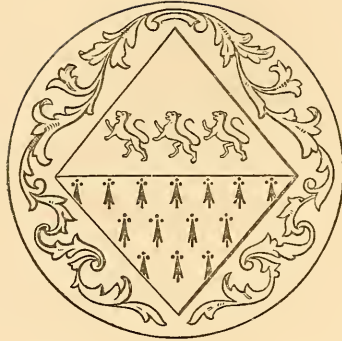

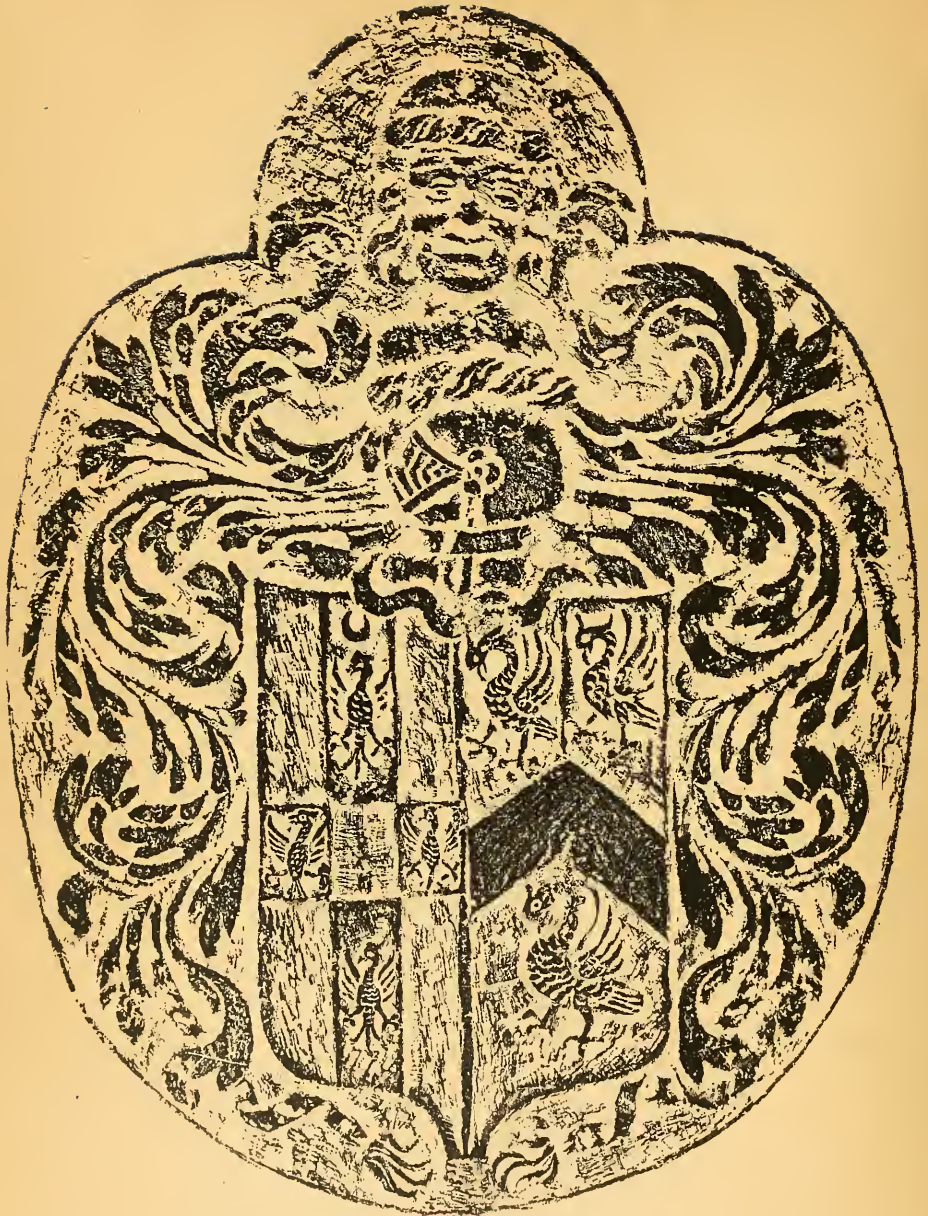

4th EDWARD IV. (146 $\frac{1}{2}$).

Thomas Spynneys and John Chylston of Thurston, demise to Maria Beman of Wolpet, and John Clement of Stowelangtote, three roods of meadow called Cobbeshyll, which they formerly held conjointly with William Abell of Pakenham of the feoffment of John Stobs and William Hye of Pakenham, to have and to hold for the aforesaid Mary and John Clement, their heirs and assigns. Witnesses:—William Smyth, William Hert, John Fouler, John Banyard, and John Fysshe, of Pakenham.

16th EDWARD IV. (147 $\frac{6}{7}$).

William Smyth of Pakenham demises to Robert Clerk, John Pryour, William Hert, and Thomas Cage, all of Pakenham, three pieces of arable land:—(1) Five acres and a half at Stalmer; (2) Three roods in Fowleslowe field, between the lands of the Cellarer of S^t Edmunds and the king's highway leading to Bury, and the land of the Manor of Netherhall; (3) Three roods in the same abutting on the land of Henry Straunge, esquire, formerly of Abell Beman, which pieces of land he lately held conjointly with William Smyth, Citizen and Scrivener of London, John Rous of Pakenham, John Walsham, lately of the same, and formerly of Norton by Wolpet, and John Seymour, deceased, of the demise and feoffment of Simon Ive, lately of Pakenham, John Cok, lately of Chevington, Robert Canham lately of Pakenham, and Thomas Maltward, lately of Felsham, to have and to hold to them and their heirs, etc. Witnesses:—John Cage, Thomas Rose, Robert Gambown, Richard Croke, John Byrd, Thomas Mayster, with many others.

17th EDWARD IV. (1477).

Exchange between Richard, Abbot of S^t Edmunds, the Prior and the Convent, on the one part, and Robert Clerke, Richard Abell, and John Pecok of Pakenham, on the other part. The latter give three acres arable in town and fields of Pakenham, of which one acre and a half lies in Apyscroftfeld, abutting east, west and south, on lands of Pakenham Hall, and north on Hellewey; half an acre lies in Netherapes-croftfeld, abutting north, east and west on said manor, and south upon Monkespath; another half acre lies in the same field, abutting north, east and west, on said manor, and south on Sheep Close; another half acre lies in Kanelowesfeld, abutting north and south-west on said manor, and east on Castellwey. In exchange for a certain pightle called Teyntowreyerd, parcel of the manor called Rycardes Hall in Pakenham aforesaid, in which pightle is being erected, builded, and completed by will and licence of the said Abbot, Prior and Convent, a certain house called "a chircheous sive a Gydehalle" for the use of the said townfolk

inhabitants of Pakenham for ever. On condition that the aforesaid three acres shall belong to the Manor of Pakenham Hall to the use and profit of the Cellarer of the said Monastery in exchange for two pieces of land containing by estimation four acres of arable, more or less, parcels of the Manor of Pakenham Hall, whereof one piece is reckoned for three acres and-a-half lying at Londongate, next the land of Thomas Rose on the west, and the king's highway called Lavenham wey on the east, one head abuts on the lands of William Aubry towards the south, and the other head on the king's highway called Bury wey, and on another piece of land, parcel of the same four acres towards the north. And the half acre lies in the same field next the king's highway, called Bury wey on the north, and the lands of divers men on the south. The east head abuts on the aforesaid three acres and-a-half, and the west head abuts on the aforesaid Manor of Pakenham Hall. And the said half acre is called Goryland, which two pieces, containing four acres, shall belong to the Manor called Rycardes Hall, to the use and profit of the Treasurer of the said Monastery, or of the Supervisor of the said Manor in exchange for the aforesaid three acres, for which four acres the Treasurer of the said Monastery or the Supervisor of the said Manor called Rycardes Hall shall pay yearly to the Manor of Pakenham Hall threepence at the two terms of the year, Easter and Michaelmas, in equal portions. The two parts of this Indenture sealed by the parties respectively in the Chapter House of Bury on the 1st of June in the 17th year of King Edward the Fourth after the Conquest.

2nd HENRY VII. (1486).

Robert Clerke, Richard Abell, and John Pecok of Pakenham, give to Henry Cage of Pakenham, Robert Cage, John Hert, William Crysten of Grymston, Thomas Holdder, William Pryour, Walter Pecok, John Clerke, junior, John Herne, Benedict Fordham, Thomas Fysshe and William Sergeaunt of the same, their heirs and assigns, a pyghtle called Teyntouryerd, formerly parcel of the Manor of Rychards Hall with a certain house built thereon called a "cherchhous sive a Gilde Halle" (as in No. III.) And they guarantee it to the aforesaid Henry, Robert, John, William, Thomas, William, Walter, John, John, Benedict, Thomas and William, their heirs and assigns, against all people. Witnesses:—John Barnard, John Fysssh, William Hert, John Pryour, Robert Gambown, John Baron, William Herne and others. Pakenham, 10 Dec: 2^d Hen. VII.

3rd HENRY VII. (1488).

Robert Clerke and John Fysch of Pakenham give to William Gylle, John Herte, William Crysten, senior, and William Crysten, junior, of the same. Two acres of arable lying in Stalmerfeld between the land of William Crysten on the west, Robert Clerke on the east, abutting on a pitle of William Gylle on the north, and on the land of the said Robert on the south, their heirs and assigns. And Robert Clerke guarantees William Clerk against all people. Witnesses:—William Crysten, Richard Wymbyl, Roger Calabyr and others. Dated at Pakenham 15 May, 3^d Henry VII. since the Conquest of England.

7th HENRY VII. (1492).

I, Thomas Smyth of Walsham, give to Robert Cage of Pakenham, Katherine his wife, John Nunne of Drenxton, and John Hoo of Hetesett, their heirs and assigns, one half acre of mowable meadow lying in the meadow of Langham, next the meadow of Ixworth Priory on the south, and the meadow of the heirs of John Badwell on the north, one head abutting on the water course to the east, the other head abutting on the land late of John Carpenter called Canownnyshyll to the west, which aforesaid half acre I lately held conjointly with John Glover of Stanton. Know ye also that I have appointed my beloved in Christ, John Hawys, junior, to deliver seisin &c. Dated at Langham 12 April in the 7th of Henry VII. since the Conquest. Sealed with a capital R. Witnesses:—Bartholomew Wymbyll, John Shukford, William Hawys, Robert Cook and others.

8th HENRY VII. (1492).

William Aubry and John Wade of Wolpet demise to John Goodson, Vicar of Pakenham, Robert Copenger of Wolpet, and Henry Cage of Pakenham, a piece of land estimated at half-an-acre, more or less, lying in the town of Wolpet in the field called Droveweye, between the land of the said John Goodson on the east, and the land late of Henry Creme on the west, abutting on the land of Richard Numan on the south, and of divers men on the north, which piece of land we held of the gift of Edward Seman, as more fully appears by a document from him to us [*no such document is to be found*]. Witnesses:—John Bawde, James Lane, Richard Numan, and others. Sealed at Wolpet the penultimate day of September in the 8th year of Henry the Seventh since the Conquest of England.

INDENTURE, 21st HENRY VII. (1505).

William Clerke, Richard Petyte, John Fyston, and William Fysh of Pakenham demise to Thomas Rose, sen., William Rose, Robert Sergeaunt, Robert Note, and George Ferwe of Thurston, three pieces of land lying diversely in the town and fields of Thurston. The first, estimated at one acre, lies in the field called Langlond, between the land late of John Roshebrok on the south, and that late of Thomas Becon on the north, abutting east on Medewewey, and west on Litolbussheweye. The second, estimated at three acres, lies in the same fields between the land of the aforesaid John Roshebrok on the south, and that late of Edward Rose, now of John Bacon, on the north, abutting as the former piece. The third piece, estimated at seven rods, lies in the same field between the lands late of Edward Rose, now of John Bacon, on the south, and that of Nicholas Sergeaunt on the north, abutting as the former. These among other lands and tenements we held jointly with Robert Cage, now deceased, of the demise of George Tysoo, Chaplain, as appears more fully by a document dated the Octave of the Assumption in the eleventh year of Henry the Seventh since the Conquest of England [*no such document is known*].

The aforesaid Thomas Rose, William Rose, Robert Sergeaunt, Robert Note, and George Ferwe, their heirs and assigns, rendering to us our heirs and assigns three pence yearly at Michaelmas. And if it fall out that the said three pence of rent should be in arrear and not paid in any year at the said feast, in part or in whole, it shall be lawful to us, our heirs and assigns, to enter and distrain, and to take, remove, and retain the distresses till satisfaction is made with full arrearages. The one part of this indenture, sealed by us, to be retained by the aforesaid Thomas, William, Robert, Robert, and George, the other part, sealed by the above, to be retained by us. Witnesses:—Robert Rery, Vicar, George Tysoo, Chaplain, John Ferwe, George Rosshebok, Thomas Becon, and others. Dated at Thurston 5 October, 8th of Henry VII., since the Conquest of England.

John Perkin, deceased, left to his wife, Margaret Perkin, for life, and after her death to his executors, John Gryffyn and Robert Scott, one acre and half-a-rood of land lying between lands belonging to the town of Pakenham on the west, and abutting on Greystok Mille weye towards the south, which acre and half-rood they surrendered to the use of John Cage [*John Cage was Vicar of Pakenham from 1501 till his death in 1548*] and Robert Stokes, who are to pay yearly to the lord at the usual terms, twopence, one half-penny, one farthing, and one half-farthing.

5th HENRY VIII. (1514).

John Cage, son and heir of Katerine Cage, gives to John Hawys of Westrete in Walsham one acre and a-half of meadow lying in the meadow of Langham, next the meadow of Ixworth Priory on the south, and that of Richard Poley on the north, abutting on the water course towards the east, and on the land of John Carpenter, called Cannownys-hell towards the west. This land came to him as heir of his mother the last feoffee, who had held it jointly with Robert Cage her husband, John Nunne of Drenxton, and John Hoo of Hesett of the gift, Thomas Smyth of Walsham, as more fully &c. [*no such document appears*]. Sealed at Langham 10 March, 5th Henry VIII., since the Conquest of England. Witnesses (endorsed):—John [*blank in orig.*], John Rocheman, John Fullere, William Grymesby, and many others.

6th HENRY VIII. (1515)

John Cage, son and heir of Katherine Cage, of Pakenham gives to Richard Cobdock and William Clerk, executors of Robert Cobdok, a close called Stalmer in the town and in the field of Pakenham called Grymstonfelde. “Item: I give & bequeath to y^e Church & to y^e Town of Pakenham a Close of 4 acres Inclosed lying at Stonhill and 4 acres at Hardale, & an half acre at Stonhill to that intent to keep mine Obitday yearly during for ever under this Form. That is to say 4^d to y^e Clerk to say Dirige, 4^d to y^e Ringers and 4^d to Poor Folk. And y^e residue of y^e profit of y^e said Land to be used to y^e profit of y^e said Church of Pakenham.” By a subsequent provision he leaves on certain contingencies half of “the tenement that I died in” to the Church of Pakenham. This will contains the only trace of so-called “superstitious uses,” and probably escaped the spoilers' hands owing to its smallness, or to its being included in the feoffment of 1538.

(enrolled 12 February 1805), William Manistre grants &c. to the said Lord Calthorpe &c. all the &c. upon Trusts (reasonable repairs excepted), first for the reparations of the Church of Pakenham, next for the Common Town Charges, and the residue for the maintenance of the poor.

55th GEORGE III.

Hepworth Enclosure Act allots lands in Hepworth in exchange for lands in Stanton and Hepworth.

58th GEORGE III.

Walsham-le-Willows Enclosure Act allots lands in exchange for lands therein described.

In 1820 1 acre 2 rods in Langham and Badwell Ash are exchanged for 2 acres 12 rods 6 perch in Hepworth adjoining the 20 acres already held there.

The income was expended, as appears by the churchwardens' books, in repairs of the Church and other Common Town Charges, such as building a bridge, paying a schoolmaster, vaccinating children, paying for militia substitutes, and in allowing old people to live rent free in the Workhouse or Guildhall. The Parliamentary Charity Commissioners report that in 1822 a petition was presented to the Court of Chancery stating (very inaccurately as appears from the above) that the whole income had for some years past been applied towards the repairs of the church, and asking for a new scheme. This was ordered on the 6th of April 1826, providing that the income of the lands, which were guessed at as being Stokes' gift, should go towards church repairs and the rest towards poor people belonging to the parish of Pakenham who did not receive parochial relief, such people to be selected by the trustees, or the major part of them, at their discretion. The Commissioners recommended that in view of the small number not in receipt of parish relief, such industrious and necessitous persons as these should first be relieved, next such as received only occasional parish relief, as the Trustees thought proper, the balance to be applied for the benefit of any other poor persons whom the Trustees should select, provided that it should not be done in lieu of parish relief. These recommendations were never adopted, and the charities were distributed under the order of 1826 until the year 1863, when a new scheme was sent down by the Charity Commissioners, joining the supposed Stokes' gift with the Town Estate again, and dividing the income into three equal parts, one for the church, one for education, and the third for selling coal or clothing at a cheap rate, or for a penny bank, or, in effect, for almost anything of like nature which the Trustees might think desirable. At the same time the requirements of belonging to the parish and of not receiving parish relief were removed. The Rev. Charles W. Jones, Vicar, Robert Stedman and G. W. Mathew, churchwardens, the Rev. Walter John Spring Casborne, clerk, the Rev. Charles Jones, clerk, late Vicar, James Jannings, farmer, and Frederic Gough, Lord Calthorpe, were constituted Trustees, the Vicar and Churchwardens to be Trustees *ex officio*, vacancies of the other Trusteeships to be filled by co-optation subject to approval by the Charity Commissioners. In 1884 a fresh order was made, placing all the parish charities, viz: Cook's, Bright's, and the Poor's Estate or Poor's Firing, under the same management as the Town Estate and Stutter's Charity, *i.e.*, the Vicar and Churchwardens being *ex officio* Trustees and the Rev. Prebendary

Harry Jones, Thomas Thornhill, Esq̄, M.P., Henry Outlaw, farmer, Alfred Peck, thatcher, and Dennis Burton, beershop keeper, being non-official trustees. Non-official vacancies to be filled up by the parishioners at a parish meeting. In 1897, in accordance with the Local Government Act 1894, the non-ecclesiastical charities were again separated from the Town Estate, which last remains as before.

Knowe yee that whereas Edward Paltock of Kingston vpon Thames in the County of Surrey gentleman, the sonne of Robt Paltock of the saide County and place gent: whoe beareth for his auncient Coat of Armes Asure an inscuchion with in an Vrle of cinq fieules gould: And wanting further for an ornament vnto his said Coat-Armo^r a convenient Creast or Cognisance fitt to be borne, Hath requested mee the said Garter by vertue, power and aucthority of myne Office to appoint hym suche a one, as hee may Lawfully bear wthoute wrongdoing, or preiudize to any others; The which his due request I the said Garter haue accordingly accomplished and graunted in manner, and forme following: That is saye, forth of a Wreath of his cullors on a hill vert, a Greyhound seiant sable flecked argent, colored or, Mantled, and doubled as in the margent ys depicted. All which Armes and Creast I the said Garter doe by theis p̄ntē ratify, confirme, gyue and graunt vnto the said Edward Paltock and to all the posterity of the said Robert Paltock ffather of the said Edward, to vse, beare, and shewe forth in Signett, sheild, ensigne, Coat-Armour, or otherwise, at his and their free liberty and pleasure withoute lett, impediment, or interruption of any person or persons. In Witnes whereof I the said Garter haue herevnto sett my hand and seale of Office the fourteenth daye of Feabruary in the nyynth yeare of the raigne of our soveraigne Lord James by the grace of God King of England, ffrance, and Ireland, Defendo^r of the faith, &c. and of Scotland the xliiiijth.

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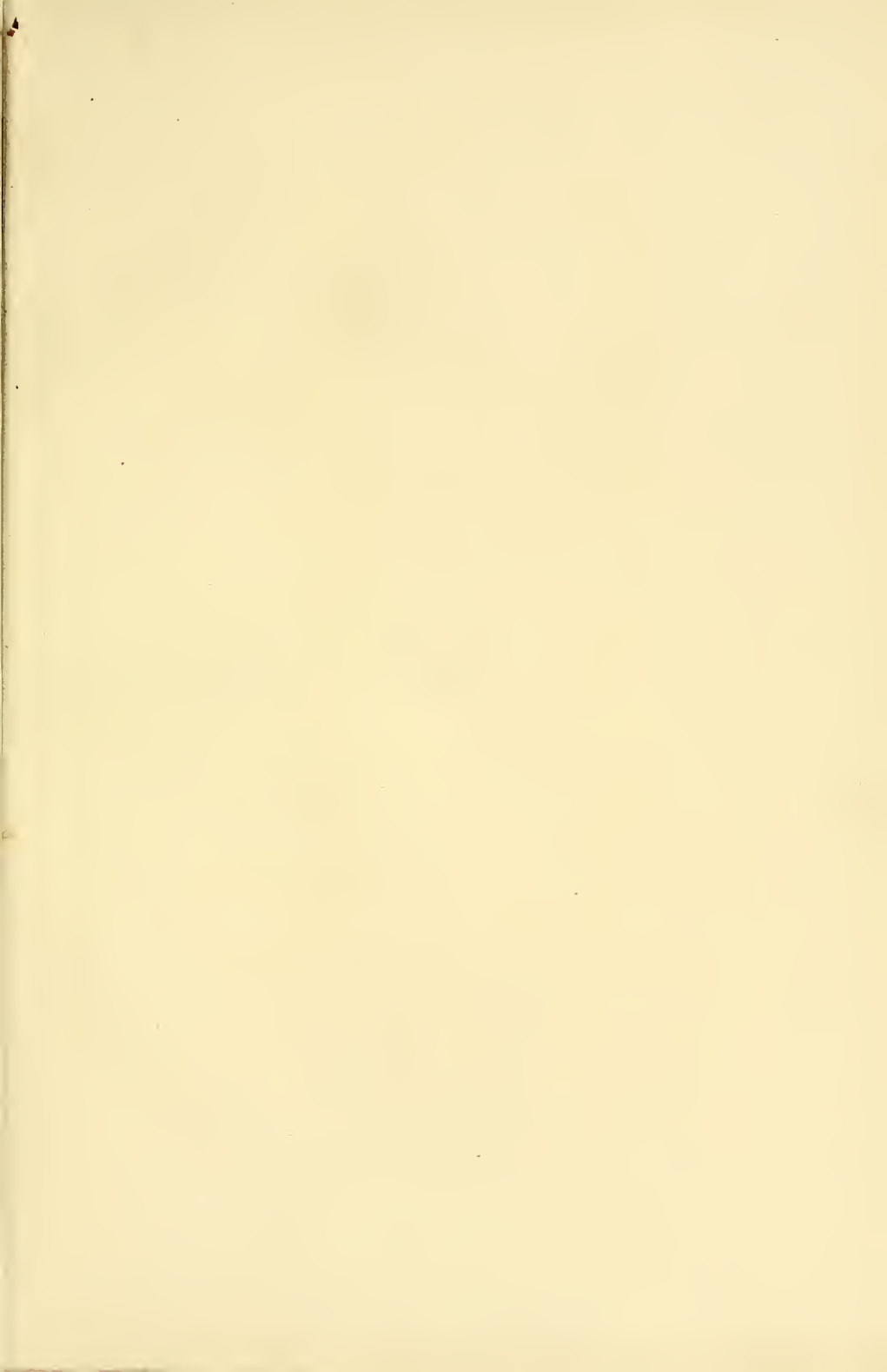
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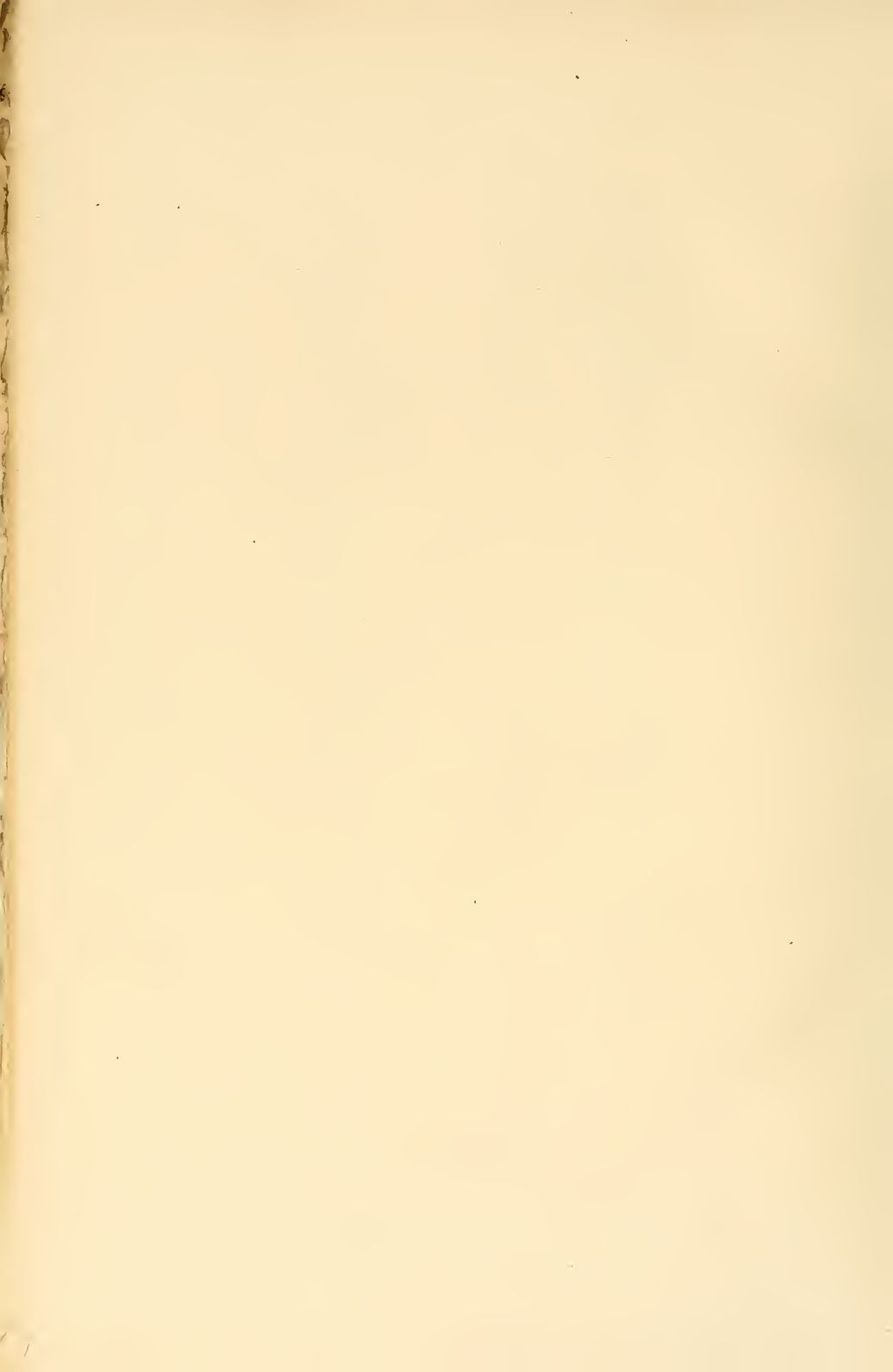
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
