FULLER GENEALOGY.

THE NAME OF FULLER.

From the Life of Thomas Fuller, D.D., by John Eglinton Bailey of Stretford Manchester, pub. 1874.

It is not often that the appropriateness — one might almost say significance — of a surname is so marked as in the case of "Old Fuller," as he is familiarly (but not very correctly) called. His name tends to illustrate the Roman proverb: Nomen et omen. The surname Fuller is, indeed, strikingly suitable to our Thomas Fuller (the author of Fuller's Worthies). One of his editors has said that his writings compared with others are "not only Fuller in useful matter and varied interest, but fuller in

spirit and fuller in wit, in fact Fuller throughout."

Fuller's rejoinder to the many annoying insinuations of his name was: "All the jeering on my name shall not make me go to the herald's office to the endeavour the altering thereof. I fetched it from my great-great grandfather, and hope I shall leave it to my great-great grandchild, a name which no doubt was originally taken from that useful trade without which mankind can neither be warm nor cleanly." A Fuller is one employed in woolen manufactures to mill or scour cloths to full them—to render them more compact, thick and durable. The districts in which in the fifteenth and following centuries the Fullers are commonly found are the south eastern counties of England, and in these parts they first seemed to have obtained importance. Perhaps the original home of the stock was in the county of Suffolk. shire was the great seat of the woolen cloth manufacture, with which fullers were everywhere connected. The trade of a fuller whence (as Fuller says) the surname is derived would in such a county be of importance.

The surname of the family occurs with variations, le Fuller,

Fuler, ffooler, Fulwer, Fulwar.

FIRST GENERATION.

THOMAS FULLER.

THOMAS FULLER came to this country from England in 1638. One of his descendants claims that he was of a high social standing and education. As he came on a tour of observation, intending to return, he must have been a person of wealth, surely one of an inquiring mind, to have braved the ocean voyage of that time, a long, tedious, uncertain affair of months instead of days as now. On what ship he came is not known. The record of ships and passengers are quite complete till 1636, when they came faster and all record is wanting. Where he landed is also unknown, but as accounts show, he first went to Woburn, where he lived nearly thirty years, then to Middleton, and lived there twenty years. He returned to Woburn for a few years, but died in Middleton, where his children lived. The record is given in other places of his military and town offices. The church was almost if not quite, of as much importance as the town then, and "his voice was listened to with respect" in parish meetings at Salem village, where the church, "the old historic church," stood. The district was known as the "Farms," and the inhabitants were called the Farmers. October 8, 1672, the General Court at Boston were petitioned by Richard Hutchinson, Tho. Fuller and others for permission to erect a meeting-house and maintain a minister, which petition was granted. The first meeting of the Farmers was held November 11, O. S., and Tho. Fuller was one of the committee "to carry along affairs." The meeting house was built, a plain wooden structure with six glass casements or windows on hinges. Its mounting stone was conspicuous and needed, as those from a distance came on horseback. Thomas Fuller was one of four who made the minister a gift of forty acres of land on which to build his house.

In the "rate" levied for the support of the minister, and which was assessed according to property, Tho. Fuller pays £8. 6s., and but one person paying as much or more, Nathaniel Putnam paying £9. 10s. He does not appear to have held any church office, a high distinction in those days.

It was in this little church and society that the Salem witch-craft sprang out and spread. The Fullers took little part in public, only serving as witnesses several times, though no doubt greatly stirred and disturbed as all were. Fortunately they escaped all attack by the witches. A new church was built in 1701, the first being too small. Here the Fullers attended church till 1729, when a society was formed in Middleton. Jonathan Fuller, Joseph Fuller, Sarah Fuller, Mary Fuller, Susanna Fuller and Susanna Fuller were of the twenty-four who received letters of dismission and were recommended to the new church at Middleton.

In 1638 Thomas Fuller came over from England to America upon a tour of observation, intending, after he should have gratified his curiosity by a survey of the wilderness world, to return. While in Massachusetts he listened to the preaching of Rev. Thomas Shepard, of Cambridge, who was then in the midst of a splendid career of religious eloquence and effort, the echo of which after the lapse of two centuries has scarcely died away. Through his influence Mr. Fuller was led to take such an interest in the religion of the Puritan school, that the land of liturgies and religious formulas, which he had left behind, became less attractive to him than the "forest aisles" of America, where God might be freely worshipped. He has himself left on record a metrical statement of the change in his views which induced him to make his home in Massachusetts. These verses were collected by the Rev. Daniel Fuller of Gloucester (a son of Benjamin and Mary Fuller, and great grandson of Thomas Fuller, the first ancestor). He (Rev. Daniel Fuller) graduated in 1764, died 1829. He collected these verses from aged persons, who declare that the author was urged, but in vain, to publish them. Now after the lapse of two centuries we will favor the world with a few of them.

I.
"In thirty-eight I set my foot
On this New England shore:
My thoughts were then to stay one
year,
And here to stay no more.

II.
But by the preaching of God's word
By famous Shepard he,
In what a woful state I was,
I then began to see.

III.

Christ cast his garments over me, And all my sins did cover: More precious to my soul was he Than dearest friend or lover.

IV.

His pardoning mercy to my soul All thoughts did far surmount; The measure of his love to me Was quite beyond account.

V

Ascended on his holy hill, I saw the city clear, And knew 'twas new Jerusalem I was to it so near.

VI.

I said my mountain does stand strong, And doubtless 'twill forever: But soon God turned his face away, And joy from me did sever.

Sometimes I am on mountains high, Sometimes in valleys low;— The state that man's in here below Does ofttimes ebb and flow.

If these verses do not give evidence of highest poetical culture and finish, they yet prove genuine Puritan blood, and hand down through the centuries the very laudable reason which induced Lieut. Thomas Fuller (so we find him styled in the probate proceedings on his will) to purchase and settle upon a large tract of land in Salem (afterwards Middleton). And this land, we will say in passing, is still mainly owned and improved by his descendants. He built a house on it near a stream, about half a mile from Middleton Pond and about the same distance west from Will's Hill. He did not reside continuously at Middleton, but for some years dwelt in Woburn, and was one of the first settlers and most active citizens of that town, as its records manifest. He died in the year 1698, bequeathing his remaining land to his youngest son Jacob, having previously in his lifetime conveyed lands to his other children, by way of advancement. Jacob continued residing on the farm in Middleton till his death in 1731.

From Sewall's History of Woburn.

Thomas Fuller, a subscriber to the Town Orders for Woburn drawn up at Charlestown, in December 1640, was a smith by trade, and had meadow granted him in Woburn at Bagg Rock 1648, and also 4 poles square of swamp next his shop December 28. He bore the title of "sargeant" in 1656, and of lieutenant in 1685. He was Selectman 1663, 1664, and again in 1685, and a petitioner with others to the General Court 1664 for an additional grant of land to the town. He married 13 June, 1643, His wife Elizabeth dying, he ap-Elizabeth Tidd of Woburn. pears to have left Woburn for Salem village (Danvers) about 1664, whence (leaving his sons, it is likely, to spread into Will's Hill or Middleton) he returned to Woburn in 1684, married Sarah, widow of Lieutenant John Wyman and daughter of Miles Nutt, 25 August 1684, and she dying 24 May 1688, he seems to have again removed from Woburn to Danvers and married Hannah — , and to have died abroad (Middleton). After his death his widow came to Woburn to reside with her married daughters, wives of James Proctor, Aaron Cleveland and John Wilson, etc., etc., whom the Selectmen compelled to give bonds for her maintenance, 21 June 1697.

Extract from Town Records of Woburn, 1640, copied from "Wonder Working Providence of Sion's Saviour in New England."

The "Preamble of Liberties of the Massachusetts Colonies" had the following: "The free fruition of such liberties and privileges as humanity, civility and christianity calls for, as due to every man, with his place and proportion, without impeachment and infringing, which hath ever been and ever will be the tranquility and stability of Christian commonwealths; and the denial or the deprive thereof, the disturbance, if not ruin, or both."

We hold it, therefore, our duty and safety, for the better disposing of all lands and benefits of the town of Woburne, for the preventing of all troublesome complaints and the maintenance of love and agreement, it is required that all persons admitted to be inhabitants in said town shall by voluntary agreement subscribe to these orders following; upon which conditions they are admitted:—

First order.—For the carrying on common charges, all such persons as shall be thought meet to have land and admittance for inhabitants, shall pay for every acre of land formerly laid out

by Charlestown, but now in the limits of Woburne sixpence; and for all hereafter laid out twelvepence.

Second order.—Every person taking lot or land in said town shall within fifteen months after the laying out of the same, build for dwelling thereon and improve the said land by planting either in part or in whole; or surrender the same up to the town again. Also they shall not make sale of it to any person but such as the town shall approve of.

Third order.—That all manner of persons shall fence their cattle of all sorts, either by fence or keeper; only it is requested, all garden plots and orchards shall be well enclosed, either by

pale or otherwise.

Fourth order.—That no manner of person shall entertain inmate, either married or other, for longer time than three days, without the consent of four of the selectmen; every person offending in this particular shall pay to the use of the town for every day they shall offend therein, sixpence. (This order was many times enforced.)

Fifth order.—That no person shall fell or cut any young oak, like to be good timber, under eight inches square, upon forfeiture

of five shillings for every such offence.

Among the thirty-two subscribers to these orders is Thomas ffuller.

From History of Boxford.

Maj. Gen. Dennison sold in 1663, to Thomas Fuller of Woburn, land in Middleton.

From History of Essex Co., by David Stiles.

On Dennison's claim was found iron ore and a mill was erected, and Thomas Fuller, an Englishman, who came over about 1638, was engaged by Dennison to run the mill, and subsequently became owner in 1663 and erected his dwelling on the site of the house now owned by Charles O. Frost, and his little blacksmith shop stood across the brook called Pierce's brook. The iron puddling mill remained in the Fuller family, in company with the Cave family, for many years and was set on fire, as is supposed, and destroyed by one of the parties to the ownership, then in a quarrel.

The wealth of this Thomas Fuller, and his enterprising spirit and sound judgment, gave to his posterity good positions in society which have been sustained wherever they have been scat-

tered over the world.

From "Salem Witchcraft."

Sergeant in 1656. Lieutenant 1685.

A marked feature of this people was their military spirit. They were kept in a state of universal and thorough organization to protect themselves from Indian hostilities, or to respond on any occasion at a moment's warning to the call of the coun-Authority was early obtained from the General Court to form a foot company. All adults of every description, including men much beyond middle age—every one, in fact, who could carry a musket belonged to it. Its officers were the fathers of the village. Every title of rank, from corporal to captain, once obtained, was worn ever after through life. This company had frequent drills. It was almost as much thought of as the "church," officered by the same persons and composed of the same men. It was a common practice at the close of a parade before "breaking line," for the captain to give notices of prayer, church or parish meetings. Such men as Richard Leach, Thomas Fuller and Nathaniel Putnam esteemed it an honor to bear titles in this company and held them ever after through life with pride, whether corporal, sergeant, lieutenant or captain.

In the colonial records under date of Oct. 8, 1662, we find the following: "Mr. George Corwin for Captain, Mr. Thomas Putnam for Lieutenant, Mr. Walter Price for Cornet, being presented to this Court as so chosen by the troopers of Lynn, Sa-

lem, etc., the court allows and approves thereof."

The inventory of Captain Corwin (a silver-laced cloth coat, a velvet ditto, a satin waistcoat, embroidered with gold, a trooping scarf, and silver hat band, golden tipped and embroidered, a silver headed cane) indicates the stylish uniform he wore as captain of the troopers. Each of the officers was a wealthy man, and it cannot be doubted that a parade of the company was a dashing affair.

The lapse of time having thinned their ranks an attempt was made in 1678 to revive the company. "Thirty-six men belonging" as they say, "to the reserve of Salem old troop" and very desirous "of being servicable to God and the country" petition the General Court to re-organize them as a troop of horse and

to issue the necessary commissions.

Among the signers of this petition are Thomas and Jacob Fuller. The company of troopers was kept up ever afterwards until all danger from Indians or other foes had passed away.

To the Hond Maj. Gen Dan Dennison.

Hond Sir. We the vinderwritten, belonging to the Reserve of Salem old Troope & being willing still in the best way wee can to be serviceable to God & ye country & being sensible of ye vnsettled estate of ye Troope for want of commissioned officers established amongst vs & thereby many vnsettled in or Spiritts & the Troop vnfit to doe that Service to God & the Country web otherwise it might (& Severall that would) want vncouragement to Joyne & Compleat ye Troope. We humbly make or Address to yor honors Favor, to take or case into yor Judicious Consid-We have Serious thoughts about Some meet person to be Commander in Cheife, in whom the Country & orselues might Confide & that the whole Troope might vnanimously acqueiss in. And wee humbly make bold to present Mr. William Browne Junior, to yor Honors consideration, who is well knowne to yor honors & wee conceive meetely qualified & would be to greate acceptance generally; & also Corporall John Putnam for Lieutht w^{ch} if yor Honss be pleased to Favor vs therein & see meet to encourage yor poore petitionrs herein, wee hope the Same will be or mutuall settlemt & peace & encouragemt to cheerfully attend that service

Humbly craveing pardon for o' Boldness, desire to submitt to y' good will of God in what he shall see good to direct yo' Honor in

LIEUT. THOMAS FULLER, the first ancestor of this family in this country, married, June 13, 1643, Elizabeth Tidd, probably daughter of John Tidd, of Woburn. Subsequent to her death he married, August 25, 1684, Sarah Wyman, whose maiden name was Nutt. She died May 24, 1688, and he married a third wife, Hannah ———. He died June 1698, aged 80 years, 2 months.

WILL OF THOMAS FULLER, SEN. (Probate Records, Salem.)

In the name of God amen. I Thomas Fuller Sen. In ye county of Essex in New England ye ninth day of June. One thousand six hund ninety and eight, being Sick & weak in body. But of sound mind and memory, thanks be to God for ye same doe make and ordain this my last Will and Testament; in manner and form following: that is to say, Principally and First of all, I give & Recomend my Immortall Soul into ye hands of my Merciful God. Father. Son & Holy Ghost. who gave it and only through ye merritt of Jesus Christ my Redeemer. & my body I comitt to ye Earth to be buried in a Christian like and Decent Manner at ye Direction of my Executors & Christian Friends. and touching my worldly Estate which yet Remains in my hands I dispose of as followeth.

Item—I give and bequeath to my daughter Dean, a fether Bed and that wen now belongs to itt. a ——— and a Pewter Platter and a Draught Chain and eight pounds to be paid by my Executor in money or as money within two or three years after my Decease and also I give to my daughter Ruth Wilkins, ten pounds out of my estate. to be paid in or as money wthin three or four years after my Decease, and a Pewter Platter to be given to her Daughter when she hath done with it. Item. I give unto my Daughter Deborah Shaw, her five children, three Daughters and two Sons, fourty shillings a peice to be paid wthin five years after my Decease as money or land in Lieu of it and also I give unto my Grandson David Richardson Ten pounds of money or land in Leiu of it. Item. I give unto my Grandaughter Ruth Wheeler five pounds in or as money to be paid wthin five years after my Decease. a Pillion and a Smothering Iron and linen Spinning Wheel, to be part of ye five pounds. Item. I give to my Grandaughter Bethiah Fuller fifety shillings to be paid in or as in money, to be paid wthin two or three years after my Decease.

Item. I give unto my son Thomas Fuller five shillings. Item. I give to my son Benja Fuller a flock bed and a flock bolster and a fether Pillow and Two Blankets. Item I give to my son Jacob Fuller fourscore acres of Upland & Meadow be it more or less lying at Beach Meadow & also my home field containing about three score acres be it more or less, and also about one hundred & fifty acres lying in Reding bounds of Upland & Swamp be it more or less and also my Rights in ye Saw Mill Irons and all my together with all my household Goods whatsoever and all my Debts and Dews whatsoever and I appoint & Ordain my son Jacob Fuller Sole Executor of this my last will and Testament.

Probated July 4, 1698.

Thomas Fuller probably did, as Charles W. Upham says in "Salem Witchcraft" many of the large landholders did, "adopted the practice of giving to their sons and sons-in-law outright by deed, good farms, as soon as they became heads of families, so that as the fathers advanced in life, their own estates were gradually diminished; and when unable any longer to take an active part in managing their lands, they divided up their whole remaining real estate, making careful contracts with their children for an adequate maintenance to the extent of their personal wants and comfort. In this way they had the satisfaction of making their children independent, and of seeing them take their places among the heads of the community. The effect was to anchor a family, from generation to generation, fast to its an-It led to early marriages, under circumstances cestral acres. that justified them."

On the 29th of April, 1689, "Deacons Nathaniel Ingersoll, Edward Putnam, Daniel Rea, Thomas Fuller jr. and John Tarbell came to Mr. Parris from the meeting-house," where there had been a general meeting of the inhabitants, and said: "Being the aged men had had the matter of Mr. Parris's settlement so long in hand, and effected nothing, they were desirous to try what the younger could do." Deacon Ingersoll was about fiftyfive years of age; but his spirit and character kept him in sympathy with the progressive impulses of younger men. Deacon Putnam was thirty-four years of age; Daniel Rea was the son of Joshua; Thomas Fuller jr. the son of Sergeant Fuller, and John Tarbell the son-in-law of Francis Nurse. This is the first appearance, I believe, in our history of that notorious and most pretentious personage who has figured so largely in our affairs ever since, "Young America." The sequel shows that, in this instance at least, no benefit arose from discarding the caution and experience of years.—Salem Witchcraft.

The Fullers seem to have taken little part in the Witchcraft excitement. In the trial of Tituba the slave, with Sarah Good and Sarah Osburn, Lieut, Fuller testifies with others.

I commit to the earth to be buried at the Discretion of my Exect hereafter named; and as for such temporal Estate as it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life. I give & dispose of ye same in ye following Manner & Form.

Imprimis. I give unto my son Joseph twenty shillings more than I have already given to him. which is four hundred pounds. which was

paid to him by his brother Timothy by my Order.

Item. I give my son Timothy all my lands & meadows I have in Middleton & Reading with all the buildings thereon, & also all my movable estate without doors.

Item. I give unto my Dear & loving wife Elizabeth all my indoor

movables & ye Interest in my Estate as the law Directs.

Item.—I give unto my daught Elizabeth Putnam twenty pounds more than what shee hath already had.

Item.—I give unto my Daught Ruth Knight twenty pounds more

than what shee hath already had.

Item—I give unto my Ďaugh^t Mary Fuller twenty pounds more than what shee hath already had.

Item—I give unto my Daught Lydia Peabody twenty pounds more

than what shee hath already had.

And my will is that the legacies that is before mentioned shall not be paid in silver nor in the new form & Tenor of bills of credit on this Province, but in the old form & Tenor or such bills of credit as may pass & be accepted Into ye Treasuries of Each Colonys & Provinces in this New England. And my Will is that my son Timothy shall be sole Executor of this my Last Will & Testament who shall take care for the payment of all Debts that shall be owing here & them that shall be owing from the estate at my Decease—and my Will is. that my Executor aforementioned shall not be put to pay the aforementioned Legacies to my foresaid children, but shall have four years after my Decease to pay it to them my aforesaid children And I do hereby utterly revoke Disanull & Disallow all & every other former Will and Testament & Executor by me In any ways before named willed. Ratifying & Confirming this & no Other to be my Last Will & Testament.

PREFACE.

All the descendants of the three first ancestors (Thomas, Thomas, Thom

The parentage of Joseph⁴ Fuller of Lunenburg was unknown, and as several emigrants of the name have been credited with it, the proofs of his being from Salem Village (Middleton) and that he was the son of Thomas³ are consequently given here for

the satisfaction of enquiring readers.

The two church records given show that Joseph and his wife Abigail were from Salem Village or, as it is now called Middleton. There, all of the name of Fuller, sprang from one stock. Thomas Fuller and his family being the only ones bearing that name, therefore, Joseph was a member of that family. There were three Joseph Fullers living in Middleton at the time of the marriage of Joseph and Abigail (1730). One was the son of Thomas, born Aug. 12, 1679, who married Susanna Dorman. The second was his son Joseph, born Feb. 28, 1712, who married Feb. 27, 1741, Eunice Kenney, and went to Windham, Conn., to live. Their children were Rachel, John and Elijah. This leaves the third Joseph, the son of Thomas, as our ancestor.

The marriage record at Middleton reads thus: "Joseph Fuller jr. & Abigail Putnam, were married in Middleton Mass. Nov. 11, 1730." The title of Jr. then did not mean as it does now, that he was a son of Joseph, Sen. It was used when there was an older person bearing that name, an uncle or cousin, and undoubtedly was so used in this case. As there is a deed recorded in Salem, wherein "Benjamin Fuller Sr. of Salem & his wife Sarah receipt in full, to Thomas Fuller & his son Joseph Fuller Jr. both of Salem yeomen, for ½ of a tract of

land in Reading. 11 June 1728."

Mr. David Stiles, historian of Middleton, unhesitatingly gives

this Joseph as the son of Thomas.

Ezra Stearns, who is compiling a history of Fitchburg, gives the parentage of Joseph Fuller as that of Thomas³ of Middleton.

Joseph Fuller, son of Thomas and Elizabeth Fuller, was born August 7, 1705, was baptized at church in Danvers (formerly Salem Village) Sept. 21, 1707, married 1st, in Middleton, Mass., Nov. 11, 1730, Abigail Putnam. Joseph Fuller was born in that part of Salem, Mass., that is now called Middleton, and married there Nov. 11, 1730, Abigail Putnam. She was daughter of "good old deacon Edward Putnam," a great-grand-daughter of John Putnam, the emigrant to America, and an aunt of Gen. Rufus Putnam of Revolutionary fame. They left Middleton about 1736, as

Stephen their third child was born there Jan. 1735, while in 1737 he styles himself of Lunenburg in a deed recorded in Essex Co.

From church records in Salem Village, now Danvers: "Apr 8 1739 After Publick worship ye chh being stayed, ye desire of Abigail ye Daughter of Deacon Edward Putnam, and wife of Joseph Fuller of having letters of Dismission & Recomendation to ye chh of Christ in Lunenburg, were laid before the chh and according such letters were granted her with ye consent of ye Brethren."

Records of ch of Christ in Lunenburg: "May 13 1739 Abigail Fuller was received into our Communion being recomended by ye ch. in

Salem Village."

They moved to Winchendon, Mass. At a meeting held in that place Oct. 31, 1759, it was "voted that Messrs. David Pore, Joseph fuller, Henery Hodgekins, be Surveyors of highways in said Township." They returned to Lunenburg, where she died January, 1764. He married February 6, 1765, Mrs. Rebecca Wyman, the widow of John Wyman, whose maiden name was Reed. They are said to have removed to Winchendon. If so, they must have returned, for in the church records of Middleton is this, among the deaths recorded by Rev. Elias Smith: "Jan. 5, 1769, Joseph Fuller of Lunenburg, with fever, very suddenly, being occasionally down on business at Benjamin Fuller's." Benjamin Fuller was a brother-in-law, having married Mary Fuller, sister of Joseph.

Among the Probate Records of Worcester Co.:

"An inventory of the estate of Joseph Fuller, Late of Lunenburg, dea'd, appraised by us subscribers April ye 10th 1769. Personal estate, his aparell, a coat jacket & Britches mixt cloth, 1:9:0. a stuff cold coat, Black jacket & Britches 1:4:0. a pair of lether britches, three old jackets, 15:6. Great Coat, three pair of old Trowsers 4/, three old Handkerchiefs 1/, an old Holland Shirt 4/, a new Cotton Shirt 6/, a pair of Worsted stockings 5/4, A pair of new yarn stockings 4/, a pair of Leggins 3/, 4 pair of old stockings 3/, a pair of Boots 10/, two pair of old shoes 3/, two old Hatts 5/4, three old wiggs 4/, Item, his purse 1:5:7, (then come his household goods), a glass bottle with oyle of Tar 1/, a wooden bottle 7^d, spectacles 8^d Jacknife 7^d Sleeve Buttons 8^d, two sheep shears 3/4, some wheat

in a Barrel 3/, five barrels of Cyder 1:5/8, two packages of Tobacco 1/, a tub of Pork 4/, a young mare 5:6:8, half a pew in the meetinghouse & a chair in it 5:3:0, a fether bed 2^d two pillows 3/, bed coverlid 15/, two old Blankets 12/, three old sheets 3/, old coverlid 3/, Bedstead, underbed and cord 6/, a pair of andirons 8/, old chest with Drawers 6/. Item, two notes of hand from Zebulon Dodge, 1:6:0, a note of hand from Oliver Gould, princaple & Interest, 2:4:0. Desperate Debts, Note from Paul Crocker 19:6. John Crocker, 18:0, Jonathan Parker 18:0, etc. The whole foots up to 64:11:0."

John Fuller, administrator, appeared & made oath, that ye appraisal contains a true and perfect inventory of said estate etc. May

10, 1769 Before me John Chandler, Judge of Probate.

The account of John Fuller adm. of estate of his late father Joseph Fuller, late of Lunenburg. He found enough to make the estate foot up 67: 2: 8. He charges among other things "for my time Getting ye things together, 8: 0, to a journey to Worcester and expense 8: 0 to ye administrators trouble, 2: 0; 0." After all there remains on hand 12: 0: 8, which was ordered to be divided "among ye seven creditors." The estate went into insolvency May 10, 1769. Benj. Goodridge Esq. & Jonathan Low gent. were appointed to settle it. These gentlemen "having been Duly Sworn to the faithfull Discharge of that trust, & having given Publick Notis" made an account allowing the claims of nearly 40 persons, among them Benjamin Hosley of Dearfield 8: 7: 4, Moses Meed of Lexinton 3: 1: 2, Moses Cobass, 3: 2: 0, a note of Nehemiah Fuller of Fitchburg 1: 6: 7, an account of Ephraim Whitney of Petersham 6: 0: 4, in all 147: 2: 4, chargeable to the estate. The appraisers add: "For our servis first and last in the affair forty shillings" Lunenburg Dec. 7, 1769. The estate was settled at the rate of one shilling, seven pence half penny in the pound and the account discharged.

Petition for the Protection of Township No. 4.

To his Excelancy and the whole Court, — the petition of us, the subscribers, humbly showeth, that dwelling near the frontiers of this Province and being hartely Consarned for the Interest of it as being members of the same, pertickelorly that of the most Exterior Inland fronteers, we cannot but attempt a modest Representation of our sentements to your Excelancy and honors as followeth — we humbly conceve it would be for the Good of the Province in General, as well as the fronteers in partickler that the Township called No. 4 on Connicticut River with the Asshaweletts should be protected and apprehend the Inhabitance to have ben a grate safegard to all that Lye near the senter of the province, as an arguement of which we might aledg the Repeted skirmages, those Inhabitance have had with the Indian Enemy, who in all prowebilety would have infected the Interior Parts and Consequently would have ben much more extencively mischeveas had they

not ben prevented by such a barrer. Apprehending Lickwise that these places, if defended, may be of Singular sarvice to such volinteers on there Return, as may be sent against the Enemy and that it cannot commode the publick to give the Enemy such a wide extent of Land unsettled as Lys within these Places, and tho, we must express our loall gratefule for the parternall care of the Government in allowing supplys of Soulders to the towns to which many of us belong, yet we can't but think it would have been as conducive to the General savety, as well as to the welth of the Province, to have placed them nearer the Enemies Countrey, for which Reson we shall for the futur Readily submitt to there Removefall to these Exterior Places even tho' it should not sarve our own privitt defence and advantage, — for these Resons not to mention the pitefall surcomstances of these poor inhabitance, we humbly Intreet your Excelancy and honors to protect these strong and Costley Garisons, if such a gracious answer to our prayer sutable obediance we will always submitt and your petitioners will ever pray etc.

Dec. 31, 1746.

Then follow signatures from Lancaster, Leominster, Lunenburg, Groton, Harvard, Townsend & Bolton. Among the signers of Lunenburg is Joseph Fuller.

JOHN⁵ FULLER, son of Joseph⁴ and Abigail (Putnam) Fuller, was born in Middleton, Mass., September 15, 1731, married in Lunenburg, Mass., December 18, 1755, Prudence Gibson, daughter of Junes and Hannah (Goodridge) Gibson. He was for many years a prominent man in the affairs of the town, as selectman, &c. Was a member of the legislature from 1787 to 1792. Was a delegate to the convention for ratifying the Constitution of the United States in 1788, and captain in the

4th Mass. Regiment during the Revolution.

A very fine tree still standing on the common in Lunenburg was planted by him July 4, 1776. It is a sycamore, or as it is more commonly called, button-ball, and is a large and very symmetrical tree. It was planted on the day of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, and zealously guarded by "Capt. John." The village church stood on the same common. In those days people from a distance came on horseback, and a tree was a convenient hitching-place. From his seat in church Capt. John could see this tree, and if any one tied his horse to it he quietly stole out of the church and cut the halter. So the tree was saved, has celebrated its one-hundredth birthday, and but just begins to show signs of old age.

September 5, 1756, John Fuller renewed his baptismal covenant. October 17, 1756, his wife Prudence renewed her baptismal covenant, and both were admitted to full communion October 10, 1762. He died in Lunenburg, February 4, 1801.

The epitaph on his gravestone is as follows:

"Hear what the voice from Heaven proclaims
For all the pious dead.
Sweet is the savour of their names
And soft their sleeping bed."

She died February 27, 1801. Epitaph:

"Let sorrow change to sacred mirth Know God in love hath given The pure in heart, who mourns on earth Perpetual smiles in Heaven."

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NEHEMIAH⁵ FULLER, son of Joseph⁴ and Abigail (Putnam) Fuller, was born in Middleton, Mass., January 26, 1733, married 1st, "May ye 4th 1756" in Lunenburg, Mass., Mary Conant. They lived in that part of Lunenburg which was afterwards included in Fitchburg, and his name is amongst those of the first residents of Fitchburg. He seems to have been less active in public affairs than his brother John, as his name seldom appears in the history or records of the town. He or his son Nehemiah served in the Revolutionary war in 1779. Both he and his wife Mary renewed their baptismal covenant July 3, 1757, and were admitted to full communion Sept. 28, 1766.

January 2, 1768, the Church of Christ of Lunenburg "voted to Dismiss and Recommend the following persons (then follows a list of twenty-two persons, among them Nehemiah Fuller) as suitable Persons to embody a chh state of Fitchburg, where a chh is soon to be gathered and of which Place they are Inhabitants."

She died April 23, 1799, aged 66, and with her son John is buried in Fitchburg. None other of the family are buried there. The epitaph on her gravestone is this:

"Here stands her urn,
She'll ne'er return
She's gone to worlds unknown
Her body's dead,
Her spirit's fled
The Shepherd knows his own."

He evidently married again, as this record is found: "Mrs. Hannah Fuller, second wife of Nehemiah, departed this Life 26 Nov. 1802." No record of his death is found, but his will was filed for probate February 5, 1807. He had eight children:

No further records of the daughters, Mary Davis and Hannah Foard, have been found.

Mary, daughter of Ebenezer and Ruth (Pierce) Conant, born in Concord, Mass., Feb. 17, 1734, married Nehemiah Fuller of Fitchburg. The History of Westminster gives the following interesting history of the Conant ancestry:

The name is a very ancient one and presumably of Celtic origin. A family bearing it lived in Devonshire in 1327, from which, it is probable, the American Conants descended, their immigrant progenitor, Roger Conant, coming from E. Budleigh, in the same county. Being an enthusiastic Puritan, he migrated to Plymouth in 1623, in

order that he might the better enjoy his faith and promote its interests. He was one of the party who soon after went to Nantasket (Hull) to make a settlement. At this time the Dorchester Co., an association of gentlemen, organized for the purpose of carrying on the fishing business along the shores of the new world, resolved upon establishing a colony on Cape Ann, and hearing of Mr. Conant as "a pious, sober, prudent gentleman," appointed him manager of the undertaking, a position he was pleased to accept. He accordingly transferred his residence to the other side of Massachusetts Bay and entered upon the duties assigned him. The enterprise proving unsuccessful as a business venture was ere long abandoned, but Conant and a few others determined upon forming a colony by themselves and remaining in possession of the territory. They soon, however, removed to Naumkeag (Salem), deeming the location more desirable for a permanent home. Meanwhile the English corporation, which had obtained control of all the lands in that section of the country, from the crown, regardless of the agreement made with the Dorchester Co. under which Conant and his associates claimed the right of occupancy, sold the entire tract lying between the Merrimac and Charles rivers to John Endicott and five others, who organized under the name of "The Colony of Massachusetts Bay" with Mathew Craddock as Governor. In 1628 Endicott and 100 companions came over to establish a plantation. Upon arriving they found Conant and his men in possession of the locality they designed to occupy, and there seemed likely to be a collision between the two parties concerned. But mutual statements and explanations were made, friendly counsels prevailed and no serious consequences ensued; Conant and his coadjutors consenting to unite with the new-comers in the spirit of friendly co-operation and harmony,— the place thence forward called Salem, the City of Peace. In 1630 came John Winthrop, who had superseded Craddock as governor of the corporation and who had been authorized to assume control of operations in place of Endicott, the hitherto local and temporary manager. In this way was established the colony which became 150 years later the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, of which colony Roger Conant was the forerunner and in a certain sense the first Governor.

Roger¹, Lot², Roger³, Ebenezer⁴, Mary⁵.

Ebenezer Conant moved to Westminster from Concord, lived there about two years, then moved to Ashburnham.

WILL OF NEHEMIAH FULLER,—PROBATED MAY 19, 1807.

I, Nehemiah Fuller of Fitchburg, in the county of Worcester, and Commonwealth of Massachusetts.—Yeoman.

On the 14th day of June in the year of our Lord 1806, being of a sound mind, but mindfull of the uncertainty of life—resigning myself to the conduct of that great and Good being who presides over

all worlds—do make constitute and ordain this my last will and Testament, disposing my temporal interest in the following manner.

Imprimis — I will that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid

and discharged.

Item — I give & bequeath to my son Benj. Fuller all my real and personal estate except what shall be hereafter disposed of — he paying the Legacies to my several children, hereafter mentioned.

Item — I give to my son Stephen Fuller, Fifty dollars, to be paid

him within two years of my decease.

Item. I give to my son Joseph Fuller, one hundred dollars to be paid him in two years after my decease and likewise two acres of land on which the house he now lives in stands, bounded as follows viz — Beginning at David Harris corner, thence on the turnpike road eastwardly eight rods. Thence northwardly parallel with said Harris land forty rods. Thence westwardly eight rods to said Harris land. Thence southwardly on said Harris land to the first mentioned bounds.

Item. I give to my son Nehemiah Fuller Jun. and Azariah Fuller, one hundred dollars each to be paid them within two years after my

decease.

Item. I give to my daughter Mary, now Mary Davis, my Desk

& a pair of shoe buckles (silver) that were her Mother's.

Item. I give to my daughter Hannah, now Hannah Foard a bed and bedding, that were her Mother's. A square four foot Table, a small pocket book with the contents which belonged to my second wife and likewise a blue woolen worsted quilted petticoat that belonged to my second wife.

Item. I hereby constitute and appoint my son Benjamin Fuller above named my Executor, to execute this my last will and testament. Signed, sealed, published, pronounced and declared the day and year above written, to be the last will and testament of the said Nehemiah Fuller in presence of us who have hereto subscribed our names as witnesses in presence of the Testator, and of each other.

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NEHEMIAH⁶ FULLER, son of Nehemiah⁵ and Mary (Conant) Fuller, born January 23, 1762; married April 16, 1789, Hannah Wiswall of Worcester, Mass. But few records have been obtained. The name of Nehemiah Fuller is among the state records of Revolutionary soldiers serving in 1779 and 1780. Whether it is the father or son cannot be ascertained. Nehemiah Fuller, Jr., is on the records of town meeting held in Fitchburg in 1797. And two children are recorded in that place: a daughter, name not given; a son Jotham who married Feb. 7, 1830, Martha M. Woods. Nehemiah held property in Montague and Buffalo. William⁷ Fuller writes from Ballston Spa, May 1, 1825, that: "Uncle Nehemiah last July started from Deerfield to go to Buffalo, stayed with me (at Ballston) about ten days, and was anxious to settle some business that his son Thomas left unsettled." No records are found in Buffalo.

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AZARIAH⁶ FULLER, son of Nehemiah⁶ and Mary (Conant) Fuller, born in Fitchburg, Mass., May 28, 1764; married Mercy Bemis of Westminster, Mass. No record is made of the marriage which probably took place about the first of December, 1784, as the following publications are recorded. In Fitchburg: "November 27, 1784, Azariah Fuller applied to be published to Mercy Bemous of Westminster." In Westminster: "December 19, 1784, Azariah Fuller of Fitchburg and Mercy Bemis published as the law directs." Mercy was daughter of Zacheus and Elizabeth (Lyon) Bemis, born Nov. 25, 1763. There is a tradition of a relationship with Mary Lyon of Mt. Holyoke Seminary, which may come through this Elizabeth Lyon. The History of Westminster gives this account of the Bemis family: "According to the best information

the families of this name, formerly residing in Winchester, descended from Joseph Bemis, who was born in England in 1619, and who coming to this country appeared as a resident of Watertown in 1640. He was evidently a man of ability, moral worth and religious spirit, as only such were eligible to office in those days—an honor repeatedly conferred upon him."

The following interesting extract is taken from a letter writ-

ten by a grandson of Azariah Fuller:

"It was my good fortune to know my grand parents very well, as I spent a part of the years of 1833 and 4 with them at Fitchburg. I also saw something of grandfather's brother Joseph, who at that time was a resident of the same neighborhood; and some years before say in 1826 when on a visit with my mother, I saw my great-uncle Ben, who also resided in the same town, and afterwards I saw his daughter that married a Mr. Pratt, who was an exceedingly pleasant lady. I also have a very distinct recollection of our grandmother Fuller, to whom I think we are all greatly indebted for traits of character that have been of great advantage to the descendants of Azariah Fuller. She was a well balanced, faithful, painstaking mother. I think the best traits of all her children came from the conservative qualities inherited from her. The fine looks and showy deportment came from their father."

Azariah Fuller was a man of fine character and sterling qualities. "An honor to his generation." He served in the Revolutionary war. A record of his service is given in his application for pension. He died in Hingham, Mass., March 12, 1846. Mercy (Bemis) Fuller died in Fitchburg, January 29, 1841.

Among the State records of soldiers in the war of the Revolution in Boston, Azariah Fuller appears in a descriptive list of enlisted men belonging to Fitchburg, Worcester Co., Mass. Age, 17 years; stature, 5 feet 7 inches; complexion, light; occupation, farmer.

These applications for pension were found at the Pension Bureau in Washington. He received his pension till he died.

Azariah Fuller, of Fitchburg, Worcester Co., a resident citizen of the United States, makes oath that he served in the war of the Revolution as a private soldier on the continental establishment, in Capt. Wattle's Company, Col. Smith's 6 Mass. regiment, upwards of a year from the fall of 1781, and was then transferred to Capt. Cloies' Company of infantry in the same regiment, where I served six or eight months; when the men who had enlisted during the war were discharged, and those who had enlisted for three years in our regiment were transferred to the 2d Mass. regiment, in Capt. Bradford's company; I was among these and was finally honorably discharged, 4th of January, 1784. My discharge is mislaid. By reason of reduced circumstances in life I am in need of assistance from my country for support. Azarian Fuller.

On the tenth day of July, 1820, personally appeared in open Court, before the Circuit Court of Common Pleas, being a Court of Record, within and for the said County of Worcester, established as such by the laws of said commonwealth, Azariah Fuller, aged fifty-seven years, resident in Fitchburg in said County, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolution of the control of the con

lutionary war as follows:

I enlisted on the 11th day of July, 1781, into the company commanded by Capt. Wattles, in the 6th Regiment in the Mass. line, and was soon after transferred to a company commanded by Capt. Cloies of Framingham. I enlisted for the term of three years and continued in the service until the fourth day of January, 1784, when I was honorably discharged. My discharge is either lost or mislaid and cannot now be found. My original application for a pension was dated April 4th, 1818, and my pension certificate bears date of January 29th, 1819. And I solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war" passed on the 18th of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed. AZARIAH FULLER.

Eliza is very weakly and now is, and for three years last past, has been under the care of a doctor. I am by trade, a shoemaker, but can perform but little labour, owing to loss of sight, the rheumatism and other infirmities.

This extract is taken from a description of the dedication of the monument of Bunker Hill printed in the Boston *Courier*, June 19, 1843. "The most interesting part of this portion of the exercises was the descent of the Revolutionary soldiers from their carriages and their ascent to the seats prepared for them near the orator." In the list of "these venerable men," which is given with their ages, is the name of Azariah Fuller, aged 80.

Through old family letters we hear of him in Buffalo with his brother Asa in 1815. In 1821 he writes from Harbour Creek, and in 1831 his brother John Emery Fuller writes of a visit to him, and adds: "He is doing very well. He is postmaster and held in general good reputation. He has been loaded with military honors and has sometimes been very near making all his family captains. As our sister Polly says, she has to command the whole and thinks she should rank as high as General. At any rate she has full command of six smart boys and one girl."

George Fuller was the eldest of seven children of Aaron and Fanny (Negus) Fuller. On his mother's side of the family, his uncle, Nathan Negus, was a painter of unusual talent, whose promising career was cut short by his early death. His aunt Caroline (Negus) Hildreth, the wife of Richard Hildreth, the historian, was accomplished in miniature painting and crayon portraiture. His half-brother, Augustus, a deaf mute, the third child of Aaron and Elizabeth (Hill) Fuller, was a portrait and miniature painter, and practised his profession with much success in the New England States and in New York. is no earlier record of artistic tendency in the family.

George Fuller early developed a fondness for drawing and a desire to become a painter, which was earnestly opposed by his When he was thirteen years old his father took him to Boston and found places for him, first in a grocery and then in a shoe store, but he was soon home again on the farm. When he was fifteen he joined a surveying party in Illinois, then the "far West," and remained there two years, acquitting himself so well that those in charge of the work praised him warmly in letters to his father on his return.

After three years at home, the winters of which were devoted to attendance in the Deerfield Academy, then under the charge of Luther B. Lincoln, and a famous institution of its kind, he joined his brother Augustus in his portrait-painting travels about the country. The example of his brother and his own inclination were not to be resisted, and soon the two were painting together. George Fuller's first portrait was of the bar-tender in a tavern where they stopped in Rochester. He finally decided to make art his profession, being influenced in part by the encouragement of Henry K. Brown, the sculptor. He spent the winter of 1841-42 studying drawing in Mr. Brown's studio in Albany. In 1843 he went to Boston, where he drew from casts and from life, and painted. At this time he became a member of the Boston Artists' Association. He remained in Boston until 1847, when he went to New York, where, in 1853, he was elected an associate member of the National Academy. His portrait-painting excursions extended to Philadelphia and as far South as Mobile, where, thirty years before, his uncle Nathan Negus had gone on a similar errand. In January, 1859, he was called home to Deerfield by the death of his brother Elijah; in the following June his father died. In January, 1860, haviug an opportunity to visit Europe, he embraced it, going over in a sailing vessel, travelling through France, Italy, Switzerland and Holland, and returning in August of the same year. He made many sketches in Europe, as he had done in the South, but the chief object of the trip was to see the work of artists, the old masters and modern painters, and he enjoyed this to the utmost, devoting himself to it almost entirely.

On his return he assumed the management of the farm at Deerfield, which he loved too much to think of selling. He planned at first to carry it on for five years, thinking that in that time he could make improvements which would render his personal supervision unnecessary and leave him free to follow his art. But that time did not come.

In 1875, when the bubble of inflation burst, he failed with many others, and turned to his brush once more. During the winter of 1875–76 he finished about a dozen pictures, and in February these were placed on exhibition in Boston. It was a trying ordeal. During his seclusion his contact with the world of art had been interrupted, and the pictures which he took to

Boston were the outgrowth of his own individuality, which had slowly ripened to maturity. But the exhibition met with so cordial an appreciation that his anxieties quickly vanished, and from that time forward he devoted himself wholly to painting. During the winter he had a studio in Boston, where he executed many portraits, and in the summer he painted figure-pieces and landscapes in his studio in Deerfield. He died on March 21, 1884, at his winter home in Brookline.

A friend, once a neighbor, writes: "The impressions which he made as boy and youth upon his companions would be as difficult to give in outline as one of his heads. There was no lack of humor or of wit, but neither ever left a sting, nor could one of his companions, I believe, ever recall an angry word or gesture, or an ungentle action from George Fuller. Inclined to silence rather than speech, to meditation rather than action, never seeming to have special opinions or theories to defend, he was entertaining in society in a way altogether his own. There was a certain composure, too, in his movements, so that if on a summer evening he pushed through the rose bushes before the window of a neighbor's sitting-room and leaned his arms on the sill to talk, no one was surprised. Indeed, he seemed more at his ease than if he had come in by the door.

His style of painting was as characteristic as his manner. A delicious haze was thrown over all his work that seemed to lift it into the realm of dreams."

He ordered the principal offender to be arrested, and the sergeant stepped up to him as if to repeat the order to the marines, when he drew his tomahawk, but failing in his endeavor to strike with it, drew his pistol, discharged it and killed Mr. Fuller at first shot. The sailors surrounded the body, mutilating it, till prevented by officers at the risk of their own lives. He was a noble minded, generous and warm hearted young man, with an uncommon degree of intelligence.
