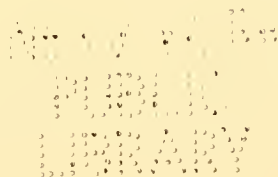

"A MID-LOTHIAN VILLAGE."

Notes on the Village and Parish of Corstorphine

"CORSTORPHINE is said to come from three derivations.

First: Cross of Torphin, the older rendering of the name Corstorphine being—Crostorfyn—from Torfin, grandson of Malcom II, or from Torphin, an archdeacon of Lothian said to have built a cross on this spot.

Second: Another derivation, that appeals to many is that of Croix d'or fin—Cross of fine gold—and tradition has it that a cross of fine gold was presented to the church by a Norman Baron.

Third: To Gaelic scholars, the derivation is, Coire, a large hollow, Stoir, steps through a wet place, and Phin, from Fionn, white—viz: The hollow with the white steps.

Adam Forrester, or Forstar, acquired the estate of Crostorfyn from Gilchrist More, brother of William More of Abercorn, in 1376. A former holder of the estate, in the

reign of Alexander II, was David le Mareschall, and it was forfeited by a David le Mareschall, in the reign of David II, and given to Malcom Ramsay.

Adam Forrester built a chapel dedicated to St. John the Baptist, he died in the castle of Corstorphine, 13th October, 1404, and was buried in the Church of St. John.

The 20th and 11th Lord, in 1890 was James Walter, the present Earl of Verulam, whose eldest son, James Walter, Viscount Grimston, is M. P. for Hertfordshire.

The armorial of the Forresters, after the Baillie marriage was, quarterly, first and fourth, argent, three hunting horns, sable, stringed gules: second and third azurem nine mullets or, for Ballie: Crest a talbot's head erased argent. Supporters, two talbots, argent motto, spero, 'I hope.' "

James E. E. Corstorphine of Scotland writes:

"The oldest legible name in the churchyard at Kingsbairns (Scotland), is William Corstorphine, who died in 1603."

From the Glasgow Mail (Newspaper): "Corstorphine, near Edinburgh, means the Cross of Torphins, though there is no means whatever now of identifying Torfin or discovering where his cross stood."

Mr. Gilbert H. Shearer of Philadelphia, Pa., writes: "Nearly forty long years have elapsed since I last saw Corstorphine, but the little village clustering around a toll gate, in a little dip in the road, is before my mind's eye."

Janet Donald of Scotland, writes:

"In regard to your name I have made inquiry and find it originated in Aberdeenshire. There is a village of the name of Torphins, your ancestors took their name from the Cross of Torphin, pronounced Corstorphine—that is the way we spell it here, some places in Scotland, it is pronounced as you spell it. There is a small place out from Edinburgh, we can almost see it from one window, they spell it Corstorphine. We have failed to find any clans of your name, but, your ancestors being from and belonging to Aberdeenshire, would be attached to the clan Gordon. That is the clan that claims Aberdeenshire."

ROBERT CORSTORPHINE was a surgeon in the army of Prince Charles Edward Stuart and was at the battle of Culloden Moor, April 16th, 1746.

After the disastrous defeat of the Scottish forces, a price being put upon his head, he fled to America with his three sons, Robert, James and John, and settled in James River District, Virginia.

The sons, Robert and James, moved to North Carolina and settled in the Halifax District, John remaining at Southampton, Va. From these three sons came all the Carstarphens in the United States.

The "U. S. Census of 1790, Heads of Families," enumerates the following persons, resident of Halifax District, North Carolina:

Robert Corstorphin, 4 males, 4 females,
6 slaves.

James Corstorphin, 3 males, 4 females,
16 slaves.

John Corstorphin, 1 male.

All the Corstorphines came originally from Midlothian County, Scotland, and modified the broad Scotch o to a, and were called Carstarphen, although family tradition says that the original Robert was known in North Carolina as Robert Corstorphine.
