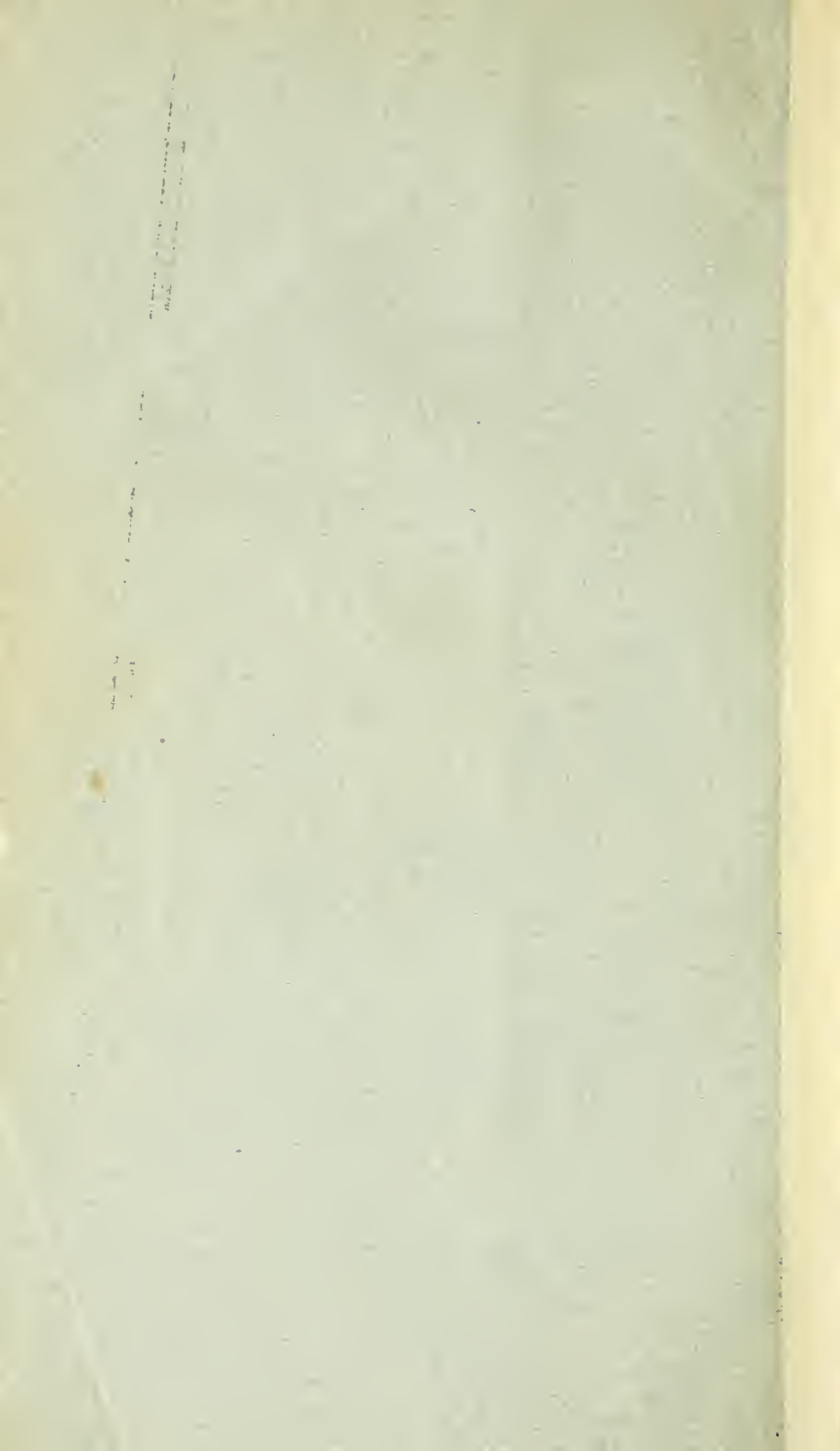

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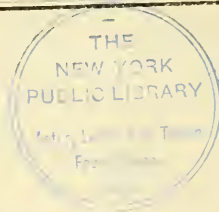

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## PREFACE.

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Owing to the great family of sons and daughters, viz: thirteen sons and two daughters, of Dan Pond, an early settler of Poultney, Rutland Co., Vt., and who is herein designated as the "Patriarch," I commenced gathering all the statistics of his descendants I could by correspondence in 1861; not, however, with a view to publication, but as a memento to be kept in my family.

In 1870 I was informed that the Rev. Samuel Fuller, of Middletown, Middlesex county, Ct., had the history of the first Ponds of America. This stimulated me to learn more of my ancestry. I accordingly opened a correspondence with him, who very readily answered my letter; and, although I obtained some very valuable information, it did not reach back to the first Ponds of America.

In 1873 I received information of some of the descendants of some of the brothers of the said "Patriarch," and also of other branches of Ponds, and of the publication of the "Genealogy of Daniel Pond, of Dedham, Mass., and of his descendants," which stimulated me to further efforts, and the result is, a large amount of information, which, however imperfect it may be, I feel it ought to be put in book form and spread before all the Pond descendants for their information also.

It will be observed that there are many of the name whose descendants have not been traced. It is hoped that some future investigator may be able to get a full history of them also, and thus be enabled to bring out a full history of all the Ponds of America.

Owing to a difficulty in reading *all* correspondence aright, some errors may have crept into the work, though I trust they will be found few and unimportant.

The work is divided into "First Generation, Second Generation," &c., &c., and all families with the Pond name chronologically arranged under their appropriate divisions; while all the descendants of daughters, when given, are given immediately after said daughters' names, either in tabular form or not, according to circumstances. The different degrees of descent of daughters' posterity are indicated by the different type in which their names are printed. In other respects the general plan of the work is similar to that adopted by the compiler of the "Dedham Settler Book."

Under the respective *male heads* of families are arranged, in tabular form, the names of the children printed in SMALL CAPITALS—

each with a distinctive numeral which is retained throughout. The sign + preceding such numeral indicates the existence further on in the work of more information concerning that individual member.

The names of heads of families are printed in CAPITALS with their respective numerals prefixed, while the numeral inclosed in parenthesis is the distinctive numeral of the father to be found in its proper place in the preceding pages. *To illustrate*, take page 47.

(29) 84 ELNATHAN JUDSON POND. The numeral 84 here prefixed to Elnathan J. Pond, as the head of this family, is the same distinctive numeral prefixed to ELNATHAN JUDSON, on page 22, while the numeral (29) is the distinctive numeral prefixed to his father, EDWARD POND, as head of that family—page 21. Again, on page 47, the sons of Elnathan Judson Pond have numerals prefixed to their names as follows: +280 EDWARD JUDSON; +281 SAMUEL WILLIAM; +282 GIDEON HOLLISTER; +284 NOAH SHERMAN; +285 FREDERICK PHILIP. Further on in the work, on pages 81 and 82 will be found the above numerals prefixed to their respective names as heads of families, in their appropriate chronological places, with the distinctive numeral of their father (84) prefixed. Thus each and every family and their ancestors and descendants may be traced independently of any other family.

Many thanks are due all who have assisted me to information necessary to the prosecution of this work. To Clark Rawson, Esq., of Schroon, N. Y. (since deceased); the Rev. Samuel Fuller, of Middletown, Ct.; Mrs. Rhoda Hayes, of Green, N. Y.; Dewitt C. Pond, of Hartford, Ct.; Francis X. Pond, of Greenview, Ill.; Col. Francis B. Pond, of McConnellsville, O.; and Dan P. Pond, of Olena, Ohio, I am under especial obligations for the large amount and varied information furnished me.

And now, may ALL PONDS and DESCENDANTS of PONDS to whom this work is DEDICATED, derive as much pleasure from the perusal thereof as I have in its compilation; and, as the "*mantle of charity*" is said to "cover a multitude of sins," I trust it will be thrown over all mistakes which may be found therein. Each one, discovering any errors or omissions relative to *his particular family*, can note the same on the fly-leaves of the book, and each error thus noted and corrected, if sent to me also, I will record the same so that some future compiler can have a more perfect copy, and thus be enabled to bring out a more perfect work.

## INTRODUCTION.

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There is a tradition running through all the Pond families that the Ponds of America descended from "three brothers who came from England." Record evidence to fully prove the tradition true is wanting. From the "Dedham Settler Book," a work published by E. D. Harris, Esq., of Saratoga Springs, N. Y., in 1873, giving the Genealogy of Daniel Pond of Dedham and his descendants, (to whom application can be made for said work) we learn that—"John Pond, and a brother whose name is not given, sons of one of Governor Winthrop's old neighbors, came to New England with the Governor in 1630. After his arrival here, Governor Winthrop wrote home to his eldest son in Groton, England, desiring him to tell 'Old Pond that both his sons are well and remember their duty.' What that 'duty' was that was so faithfully remembered we are left to conjecture. John and his brother were, doubtless, men of humble birth and small means, launched forth from the paternal roof by the old sire, to seek their fortunes in the new world. Of the former we hear nothing more. He may have returned to England, or pushed on to a more congenial climate. But one Robert, who it was surmised was the brother, sat down at Dorchester. He died in 1637." Here we have but two brothers instead of three. Now some have the tradition that "two brothers came first, and one afterwards." In a letter from Enoch Pond, of Bangor, Maine, written May 4th, 1871, we learn that—"In the Massachusetts Historical Society's Collections, series 3d, vol. 3d, page 262, Thomas Pond arrived at Boston from England in April, 1635." Here then we have record evidence of two brothers coming first, and another *Pond* coming afterwards, but no positive proof that the latter was brother to the two former.

It is said that Robert Pond, of Dorchester, had his dividend of land in 1633. None of his descendants can be traced down with any degree of certainty. There was one Robert Pond, of Milton, who was made a freeman in 1642—*supposed* to be a son of Robert, of Dorchester. If so, he must have been a lad when his father came from England. There was, also, one William Pond, of Dorchester, *supposed* to be a son of Robert of Dorchester. If so, he too, must have been a lad when he came from England. Daniel Pond, of Dedham, who settled there in 1652, was *supposed* to be a son of Robert of Dorchester. If so, he might have been American

born. There is nothing better than *suppositions* connecting them, save the names Daniel Pond, of Dedham, gave his sons, viz: John, Robert, and William, a remarkable coincidence if there was no kinship; still, we might as well *suppose* he was the son of John.

At the same time that Robert Pond, of Milton, was made a free-man (1642), there was one Samuel Pond who married and settled in Windsor, Ct. He, too, might have been a son of Robert of Dorchester, or of John, or of Thomas. In either case, he must have been a lad when brought by his father from England.

It is said that Windsor, Ct., was settled in 1635, mostly by emigrants from towns in Massachusetts, and so largely from Dorchester as to make it necessary to re-organize the church there, as well as the town; and as that was the *time* that Thomas came from England, it is very natural to conclude that he, listening to the glowing accounts of a more congenial clime, joined in with the rest; and as Samuel *might* have been a son of Thomas, his residence might have been at Windsor on their first coming from England, or soon after.

We hear no more of Thomas any more than we do of John. But Samuel marrying, acquiring land, dying and having an estate to settle, there is a commencement of records, from which we are enabled to trace, as we believe, in an unbroken line. There is, therefore, a strong presumptive proof that the Ponds of America descended from one, or more, of three brothers. If there is no truth in the tradition it seems to me that it could not have been handed down through *all branches* of Ponds to the present day. The case is here presented, not as an *undoubted truth*, but as a probable one.

The remarks of the compiler of the Dedham Settler Book as to the character of the Dedham Settler's descendants, are so applicable to the Connecticut branch of Ponds and their descendants that I give it entire.

"If but few of the immense number, whose names are found in the following pages, have arrived at distinction in the literary or political history of the country, with truth can it be said, that fewer still have brought dishonor to their name and race. In the struggle for national independence, they rose almost to a man in defense of their rights, and Revolutionary records bear ample evidence of their alacrity and zeal. Among the first to spring to arms at the receipt of the Lexington alarm, on the morning of the memorable 19th of April, 1775, there were those of the name who did not sheathe the sword, until, long years afterwards, peace had been declared throughout the length and breadth of the land, and the country for which they had sacrificed so much, no longer needed their services."

In the war of 1812, too, were found many of the name who shouldered the musket, and fought in the ranks in that sanguinary conflict. In the late terrible contest for the maintenance and perpetuity of our *Union*, many of them were found battling for the "Stars and Stripes," and, as will be seen by the perusal of these pages, many shed their blood in their country's cause.

### FIRST GENERATION.

1 We have not been able to ascertain the parentage of Samuel Pond, nor the date of his arrival in America, nor the date of his first appearance in Connecticut. It appears that he was married in Windsor, Conn., Nov. 14th, 1642, to Sarah ———. His wife's family name is not known to the compiler. He died March 14th, 1654. In the struggles, incident to the first settlement of a new country, and in the short period in which he lived, he had not accumulated a large property, (62 acres of land only,) but what he had accumulated, over and above the support of his family, was left them free from incumbrance. Here follows the inventory of his estate, as copied from the "Original Records in the State House, at Hartford, Ct.," all in "ye olden style."

## SECOND GENERATION.

(1) 3. SAMUEL POND, supposed to be the second son of Samuel Pond of Windsor, Conn., born March 4th, 1648, married Miriam Blakely, Feb. 3d, 1669. (The evidence is not positive that this Samuel was a son of Samuel of Windsor, but we so regard it for the following reasons: 1st, the name; 2d, his age; 3d, we have no record of any more Ponds in Windsor, or any other town than Branford; and lastly the name given his first-born—Nathaniel—which was but a few months after Nathaniel, son of Samuel of Windsor, was killed by the Indians.) This Samuel Pond's name was among



the signers of "New Plantation and Church Covenant" of Branford, Conn., Jan. 20th, 1667. From Trumbull's Conn. Colonial Records, we learn that: "At General Court, held at Hartford, 1672, Samuel Pond, of Branford, was propounded for a Freeman. Residence in the country then was not considered sufficient to entitle the resident to the elective franchise. It appears they were made such by a special act of the General Court, (Legislative body) as a *favor* granted, being previously propounded as a fit subject for such favor; and before they could enjoy the elective franchise they had, also, to take what was called the "Freeman's Oath," which latter feature was retained in some, if not in all, the Eastern States for a number of years subsequent to the American Revolution, requiring all citizens on arriving at the age of majority to take the "Freeman's Oath" before they could enjoy the elective franchise. Great, indeed, has been the strides from the ancient doctrine of the "Divine Right of Kings" to that of pure, simple Republicanism, recognizing the natural and inherent rights of man, and if, in the transition, our progenitors did not come up to *our* ideas of Republican Equality, and the natural "inherent rights" of man, we should remember that they had been trained in a different school, and had imbibed largely of Ecclesiastical and Kingly authority. Let us, therefore, give them credit for the noble efforts they did make in the direction they did, as by so doing our Puritan forefathers laid the foundation for building one of the noblest super-structures the world has ever witnessed.

Samuel Pond was a Deputy to the General Court from Branford in 1678—1682—1683 and 1687; and was Lieutenant in 1695. When first elected Deputy in 1678, there were but twenty-two towns, and forty-two Deputies, all but two electing two Deputies each—Branford two. We have no account of their deaths.

## FIFTH GENERATION.

Dan Pond resided at Stockbridge, Berkshire county, Mass., at the time of the birth of his youngest son, but soon after moved to Poultney, Rutland county, Vt. The exact date cannot now be determined as the town Records have been burnt, and the oldest of the Church Records are also lost. He settled on a hill in the east-

\* In one report to me it is said Dan Pond married Mehitable Munson. That her Baptismal name was Mehitable, is possible, and by being abbreviated, was called Mabel, and by long usage became her real name. Her children knew her by no other name than Mabel, and it was thus placed upon her tombstone. The old "Family Bible" in which their records were kept is now supposed to have been burnt with their son's old house.

ern part of the town, known as "Pond Hill to this day." On his tomb stone are the following inscriptions:

**DAN POND,**

DIED

MAY 27th, 1783,

IN THE 57th YEAR OF HIS AGE.

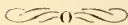
**MABEL POND,**

His 3d son, Abel Pond, moved to Poultney, May, 1782, and Dan's youngest son was along; so we *suppose* Dan Pond moved his family at that time. Mabel Pond came to her death by a cancer on her tongue, eating it entirely out of her head. They were the parents of thirteen sons and two daughters. All lived to be men and women; all married and raised families, and some large families—save one, who was taken prisoner in the Revolutionary War.

In an early day most of them settled in Vermont, and on the opposite side of Lake Champlain, in Essex county, N. Y. They generally made it a point to have a reunion as often as once a year, as long as they lived within fifty or sixty miles of each other. They had different religious views, but that was never allowed to mar their reunions, although they were perfectly independent in the expression of these views. What one claimed for himself, he was willing to grant to his brother—the right to his own private opinion. Their politics, also, varied; and in one of their reunions, at a time when Federalism and Republicanism was the order of the day, they got upon the everlasting theme of politics—each perfectly independent—each *knew he* was right, and in that discussion they became somewhat boisterous, their voices raising to a high key, and some sharp contradictions passed between them. The quick ear of their youngest sister, a matron of some two hundred or more avoirdupois, who was in the "other room" with the women, caught the unusual sound, and she quickly arose and came into the brothers' room with the exclamation, "Why, Brothers! what does this mean? *I never heard such talk in our family before!*" The brothers were silent for the space of two minutes when conversation was resumed in the ordinary tone and on ordinary subjects. The names "Federal," and "Republican," were not mentioned again during that visit. In one of their reunions, eleven of the twelve brothers then living, were present, (one had given his life in his country's defense,) and one of the twelve yet living, Benjamin, the 12th son, was in the Congress of the United States. It was proposed to have Elder Green, a Baptist Clergyman, and a favorite of many of the brothers, preach them a sermon on that occasion, which he did, selecting for his text the 42d chapter of Genesis, part of the 32d verse: "We *be* twelve brethren, sons of one father; one is not." He could, with great propriety have selected the words, "How good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." The go-a-head-a-tive-ness of them caused them to seek new and more favorable localities so that they never *all* met again. Two, only, lie buried in Poult-

ney, where they originally settled; three in Shoreham; one in Pantton; and one in Bason Harbor, Vt; one in Schroon, Essex county, N. Y.; one in Tioga county, Pa.; two in Crawford county, Pa.; and one in Ogle county, Ill.

The children of the *patriarch* Dan Pond are:

NOTE: In the above account of Rebecca's family, and descendants, I make no pretensions to accuracy. I give it as I received it. The one giving it to me gave all but his own family from the best of his recollection. Had I then contemplated the publication thereof, I should have got his own family with dates &c., but as I have not been able to reach any of her descendants by correspondence, I cannot now make it better than it is. It is, therefore, given as it is, in the hopes that others may take a *clue* from it, and obtain a more correct history of her descendants hereafter.

Bartholemew, watching his opportunity, sprang to the horse's bit, grasping that with one hand, while with the other he took the Indian from the horse, and carrying the Indian around over the rump of his horse, he placed his foot in the stirrups, mounted his horse, and put off on a full gallop, carrying the Indian thus with one hand an even mile before either of them spoke a word, when the Indian begged for quarter. at Milford, Ct. Married, first, Martha Miles, Oct. 18th, 1767, and second, Kate DeWitt. Charles Pond died in 1833. He was Captain in the Militia, and served as Major in the Revolutionary War, or at least, he was recognized as a Major by Gen. Lafayette. Anecdotes of Gen. Lafayette's faculty to call up men's names and titles, long after his intercourse with them, was frequently related of him while on his triumphant tour of these United States. I have it from an eye-witness that, while Gen. Lafayette was passing through the streets of Milford amid the shouts of thousands, Lafayette's keen military eye caught the figure and physiognomy of Capt. Charles Pond, when he rose in his carriage, and pointing out the Captain, called out "*Major Pond.*" Of course they met, when the hearty embrace in true French style was given—the tears of joy of the two veterans mingled as they coursed down their venerable cheeks. The like also is recorded when Lafayette met the venerable Barnabas Pond, of Clinton, N. Y., at the great Ovation at Utica in 1825.

Jared Pond married for his second wife the widow Mary Halsted in March, or April, 1800, born Jan. 1st, 1769, at Fishkill, Dutchess county, N. Y. She was the daughter of Platt and Ida Rogers. In July 12th, 1791, she married Dr. Daniel Halsted, who died in 1795. She moved to Bason Harbor, on Lake Champlain, Vt, in 1796, where she married Jared Pond in 1800, as above stated.

Jared Pond was a merchant, a Captain in the Militia, and a Justice of the Peace. He was a volunteer in the battle of Plattsburgh in 1814. Mary Pond was a very devoted Methodist, and devotedly

attached to her family, but not so *selfishly* as to forget duty to her country, as the following letter of hers to her husband, *written on the very day of the battle of Plattsburgh*, now here reproduced, will amply testify:

“BASON HARBOR, Sept. 11th, 1814, Sunday P. M.

“DEAR HUSBAND: I sit down to address a few lines to you, (if it please God that you are still in the land of the living) to inform you of our situation at present. We are not very well; but thanks be to God that it is as well with us as it is. Roxy is troubled with the ear-ache, tooth-ache, head-ache, &c. Harriet left us to-day. Ida hurt her foot pretty bad, an hour or two after you went away, so as to confine her since, but is much better to-day. Annanias is also lame with a pain and swelling in his heel, but not entirely confined yet.

“Sunday evening. I was called away by company coming in. There is some alarm here among women and children about an Indian that was seen yesterday in the woods near Pantan. To-day at Michael Gage's he got some bread and butter and came on this way. The neighbors have been out to look for him, but have discovered nothing more of him yet.

“A person just knocked at the door—I inquired who was there? Was answered, “Friend!” I unfastened the door and let in a young man whom I found to be Lyman Chamberlain. He tells me he saw you yesterday, and that you informed him you “should not return till you saw which way it turned.” I had concluded, in my own mind, before his coming, to request you to return as soon as any way consistent. My own poor state of health—your own poor constitution, (though I hope through the blessing of God it is better at present than mine, or your fittest place must be at home) together with (generally speaking) all our neighboring men going to the army, leaves us in rather a tried situation.

“However I wish not to complain, and shall endeavor to bear my part with becoming patience and fortitude, with the assistance of Divine Grace. There have been a number of cannon heard to-day. We are anxious for the safety of husbands, friends, and fellow countrymen. I hope the prayers of God's people are continually offered up to Him who is able to protect our army, and give success to our arms in driving back our enemies to their own borders.

May our Almighty Father protect and defend you, and return you in safety to be a blessing to your family. M. P.”

“Perhaps I shall write more before this goes.”

“Daybreak Tuesday morning. Since writing the above, I have experienced a multiplicity of scenes. Our house and barn have been filled since Monday night till this morning with soldiers from the South. I yesterday experienced an excess of joy for a few moments, on account of the victory, but was soon damped by the news of Mr. Baron's death, which also gave new cause of anxiety for your fate. Before night we received news of your being among the slain, by way of Vergennes. But the Lord is still good and gracious. I was enabled to stand the shock with a degree of fortitude, and de-

clared in the midst of my trouble in this manner: "I do not believe it!" I had so fervently commended you into the hands of our Almighty Father that I felt as though it could not be. It would be difficult to describe the anguish of our poor children on hearing the news.

But in an hour we heard that after the action you was seen and spoken with—was well and in good spirits.

"This almost overpowered my poor feeble frame—so sudden a reverse! Blessed and praised forevermore be our Eternal Father, for such I feel Him to be.

"Do return as soon as possible. I really feel as if it was best to return soon, and can't express my joy and satisfaction on reflecting that you have been preserved, and so far, have done a duty that every true friend to their country ought to do. Our poor friend Ida Barron\* is with us. Oh! how heartrending is such scenes! May the Lord support her, and sanctify it to her soul!

Once more I beseech the Almighty to return you in safety; but am still anxious for your safety. We heard cannonading last night, which appeared to be nearer than Plattsburgh. God only knows what will be the next news. Farewell." (Signature torn off.)

Jared Pond came to his death by stepping on a fish, and running the spur of a bull-head in his heel. I here introduce the following:

[Lines written by Dan P. Pond on the death of his father, Jared Pond, who died Aug. 12th, 1817. Written at Brunswick, Medina county, Ohio, 1857.]

"The morning was passing away,  
There came a dark shade o'er the room;  
It brought to my spirit dismay  
And shrouded my boyhood in gloom.

A Dove† to the window had flown,  
As if to inform us of ill;  
And when she had finished her moan,  
Went darting away o'er the hill.

*That body so fearfully still,*  
While lying at length on the bed,  
*With features so pallid and chill—*  
All told me my 'Father was dead!

The spirit so active before,  
In deeds of devotion and love,  
Could counsel and cheer me *no more*  
Until our reunion above.

\* Mr. Barron was killed just at the close of the action, after the enemy's flag had been struck, by a stray shot from some of the craft, just as he was returning his watch to his pocket, after determining the duration of the battle. He was pilot on the fleet.

† The passage concerning the "Dove" is literally true. Early in the morning on which my father died, a WHITE dove was seen sitting on the stool, or sill of one of our chamber windows. This was thought rather remarkable, as, at THAT period a dove was rarely seen with us; none that we knew of short of the city of Vergennes, six miles distant. After moaning for a considerable time, the white messenger suddenly went its way.—DAN P. POND.

Ira Pond was a very muscular and powerful man. His brothers were mostly large and strong men, but Ira would take any two of them—one in each hand—and handle them with ease. He once caught two live deer and held them. I have heard my grandfather say: "Brother Ira could chop twelve cords of four-foot wood a day." But it is but justice to say it was chestnut.

At a certain time, while he was a young man working for his brother Josiah, who was also a powerful man, a certain "*pugilist*" came to Josiah's and bantered Josiah for a fight. Josiah kept putting him off, saying: "I don't want to fight." But the pugilist seemed to be spoiling for a fight, and kept bantering and *daring* him. Josiah kept quietly at his work about his barn, which had a large yard fenced in with a tight board fence six feet high.

After awhile, Ira spoke up: "Brother Josiah don't want to fight; he *can* fight, but it is against his principles, for he is a church member. You had better take some one to fight with who is *not* a church member." "Perhaps *you* would like to take it up," remarked the Pugilist. "I don't want to fight when I have nothing to fight about, but I *can* fight, and it is *not* against my principles. I don't belong to the church, but brother Josiah does, and it is against *his* principles to fight." By talking thus for some time, the pugilist being off his guard, Ira, watching his opportunity, caught the "pugilist" by the collar with one hand, and with the other the seat of his pants, and raising the pugilist up in the air, he pitched him over the fence. The pugilist picked himself up, walked around to the gate, and came into the yard again with the remark, bowing: "By G—d, sir, I have had enough of you." "We are no fighting men," Ira replied. "Brother Josiah *can* fight, but he belongs to the church, and it is against his principles. Another anecdote and we pass on with the record.

On another occasion, when the snow was very deep, making it difficult to turn out with a sleigh, Ira and a brother were riding through the country where a certain "bruiser" by the name of Brown frequented, and who was the terror of the neighborhood, often making people give all the road; and it so happened that Brown and Ira and his brother met, when Brown motioned to Ira to give the road. Ira gave half only. Brown sung out, "give all the road." Ira jumped out, thinking his size would make Brown take a "sober second thought;" but Brown, having wound the lash of his loaded whip around his hand, met Ira with the but of his whip over his head, knocking him down, and then pitched on to him intending to give him a sound thrashing. Ira caught Brown by his hair with both hands, and drew Brown's head down so tight that he could not do anything; and so Brown sung out to his companion in his sleigh to "come and cut off his hair." His companion rose to comply, when Ira's brother arose, and pointing his finger at Brown's

companion, remarked: "Keep your seat, sir. Let them alone. He'll get enough before he is done with it." Brown's wife then spoke up: "If he does get licked, it'll be the *fast* time." When Ira had held Brown long enough to gather his thoughts fully, (for the blow of the whip had stunned him,) he let go with one hand, and with the other threw Brown off at arm's length, as he would a child, and held him there, and jumping up, gave Brown two or three blows with his other fist, when he let him go, remarking: "Now you can go, and *mind you turn out and give half the road.*" Brown got up, got into his sleigh, and, very much humbled—minus humility—for once in his life observed the golden rule, and did "as he would wish to be done by." *He gave the whole of the road.* He learned, too, that, however much of a "bully" a man might be, his match could be found. He made him a large buttery and bed-room out of sections of the tree. Not content with the plodding life of a mere farmer, he sold out, moved to Peru, Huron county, Ohio, and built a flouring mill, where he carried on a large business. Old age came upon him, when he relinquished an active business life, and rested from his labors, sold out his mill property, and subsequently moved with his son-in-law to White Rock, Ogle county, Ill. He became blind, and otherwise so debilitated as to suffer greatly in his last days; but was ever cheerful, ever full of praise to God



for his great mercy in providing an escape from the old, and worn-out body when it was no longer a fit tabernacle for the immortal spirit, and for the assurance that "in his father's house were many mansions—that building of God—not made with hands—eternal in the heavens;" where a ransomed world would all be gathered in God's appointed time. The judges gave in, "It is a tie." They tried it again, and ran even until within twenty feet of the mark, when Billious cleared the distance at a

single bound, a little ahead of his competitor, and was declared the winner. Billions declared his competitor was the fleetest man that he ever measured ground with. His weight was usually 180 pounds.

He entered the ministry in an early day, being ordained in Camden, Oneida county, N. Y.; but his ministry was at Volney, N. Y. He became a life member of the Tract Society, and also of the Bible Society. In 1837 he moved to Illinois and settled about eight miles west of Springfield, Sangamon county. His ministerial labors were mostly, in connection with the two societies above mentioned, a sort of Missionary laborer. He was connected with the Presbyterian Denomination. Abstemious in his habits and temperate in all things, he lived to the ripe age of ninety-three years, five months and twelve days. He passed away Dec. 8th, 1874, and has gone to reap the reward of a long and well spent life.

"DEATH OF EX-GOVERNOR POND. It is with painful and deep-felt sorrow that we announce the death of the Hon. Charles H. Pond, late Lieut. Governor, and part of his official term, Governor of this State. He died at his residence in Milford, on Monday the 28th inst." (The month is not stated.) "His age was, we believe, about 80. He was the son of Capt. Charles Pond, an intrepid and patriotic veteran, of the war that "tried men's souls;" the worthy son of an honored sire. Gov. Pond was educated at Yale College, and graduated in the class of 1802. He studied law with the late Roger Minott Sherman, Esq., of Fairfield, and was admitted to the bar, where he would have been one of the most distinguished had he followed that profession. But the enterprise and attractions of a mercantile life, in which several of his friends and relatives were successfully engaged, induced him to leave the lawyer's office for more active business pursuits, and he was for several years largely engaged in foreign commerce. In 1819 he was appointed Sheriff of the County of New Haven, and held that commission for several successive terms, till he voluntarily relinquished it, and retired to his paternal homestead and farm in Milford. He served as Lieutenant-Governor of the State during the last term of Governor Seymour's administration, and became acting Governor when the Russian Mission was offered to and accepted by Governor Seymour. He was a man more deeply versed in the political history of the country than any other within the circle of our acquaintance. His talents were of the first order, and his pen, whenever he yielded, was marked by the reflections of a powerful mind and the purest patriotism. No man was wiser in council—none more devoted to the true and lasting interests of his country. His intellectual strength, his genial and generous heart, his true and steady friendship, and his ready wit, made him the favorite of every circle, whether of old or young. \* \* \* As a neighbor and a friend, he had no superior, and the unpretending example of his well-spent life and Christian virtues, will tell upon the whole community, long after the hand that traces these lines shall have mouldered into dust."

### **ON THE USE OF TOBACCO.**

BY DAN PLATT POND, APRIL, 1869.

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"Should the reader of the following lines feel impressed with the thought that the strictures therein contained are "too strongly put," the writer has only to say: "That, viewing the case from his own stand-point, it is not largely overdrawn, and, furthermore, that it

was not dictated by unkindly feeling, nor was it for want of a just appreciation of the Christian Ministry, but was intended as a fitting rebuke to any member of the ministerial fraternity who, for a little sensual pleasure, will condescend, not only to defile his own person, and the property of his friends, but to endanger his own reputation as a "Gospel Minister."

How unlike the dignified and self-sacrificing spirit of the great Apostle, as exemplified in the following language:

"If meat make my brother to offend, I will eat no flesh while the world standeth, lest I make my brother to offend."—(1st Cor. 8—18.

Now, had the case required it, who has any reason to doubt but St. Paul would just as willingly have said:

"If the narcotic weed make my brother to offend, I will chew no tobacco while the world standeth."

Come, brother pilgrim, tell me true,  
What's the news, what's the news?  
Pray can't you tell me something new?  
What's the news? what's the news?  
"Our parson's name with old and young,  
Has been the theme for every tongue,  
And hence 'twould seem it might be sung—  
That's the news! that's the news!

"You know he loved the dainty quid,  
As few could love—the parson did;  
From ante-room to pulpit door  
He soiled the tidy, carpet floor,  
'Till he became the partial bore—  
That's the news! that's the news!

"With tarnished lips he spoke the word,  
And seemed to think it not absurd.  
I'll tell the sequel, if I must,  
The people mourned with sad disgust;  
The parson's calling wore distrust—  
That's the news! that's the news!

"And 'crack a joke' the parson could;  
At 'sermonizing' he was good;  
And if his friends were many score,  
They might have counted many more,  
Had he the garb of meekness wore—  
That's the news! that's the news!

"Our children think it strange, indeed,  
That ministers should use the weed!  
All stale pretention they defy,  
And promptly make the keen reply:  
'The Parson does it—why not I?'  
That's the news! that's the news!

"And should they fill the tempter's cup,  
 And quaff the deadly potion up,  
 And barter off an honored name,  
 For keen remorse, reproach, and shame,  
 I ask the reader, 'who's to blame?'  
 That's the news! that's the news!"

### THE PRODIGAL'S RETURN.

But did the parson not relent?  
 It seems as if he must repent.  
 "Oh, yes! I have good news to tell;  
 The parson has done one thing well.  
 He's cast his idol down to h—l;  
 That's the news! that the news!"

"The sisters now are all aglee,  
 They're holding special jubilee:  
 The silken gowns with trail and gore,  
 May cease awhile, to mop the floor,  
 And shorten up a foot or more—  
 That's the news! that the news!"

"May mercy keep the parson still,  
 And bind his long perverted will.  
 The people catch the glad refrain,  
 And waft it on through every lane—  
 "The prodigal's returned again!"  
 That's the news! that's the news!"

"His eye is daily growing bright,  
 The beam is out—he sees the light;  
 He's got tobacco off the brain—  
 His heart is cleansed—his head is sane:  
 The churches sound their loud *amen*—  
 That's the news! that's the news!"

The following from his pen so nearly corresponds with my own experience that I here introduce it with great pleasure. I, too, had contracted the *filthy habit*, when young; but my wife often expostulated with me on the use of the weed. It was, to her, a great trial. The "two angels of mercy were sent from above, to brood o'er my path on an errand of love." *Reason* and *Conscience* ascended the throne, and when firmly seated there, passed judgement and ordered "Execution forthwith," but granted me the privilege of easing myself down as best I could.

I accordingly adopted the following plan: I purchased a pound of what was then considered "Best Cavendish," and told my wife that, "on this pound of tobacco I am going to break myself of the habit of using the filthy weed." "I hope you will," was the reply.

I filled my tobacco-box full of small quids—about one fourth the usual size, and went about my work. As usual, my tobacco-box

came out of my pocket every few minutes, but the Judges on the bench would instantly order it back again. Thus, for a day or two, when the insane desire would be so great for a quid, the Court allowed me to put a quid in my mouth, but strictly forbade the chewing of it; and as soon as it was soaked for me to taste it a little, the Court would order me to "spit it out." Having a determined will to obey all orders of the Court, I succeeded, in the course of five or six weeks, in so far weaning myself of the filthy habit that I would not get my tobacco-box out once a week. As the narcotic poison was gradually eliminated from my system, the temptation grew weaker while my resolution grew stronger and stronger, until I had carried my tobacco in my pockets for months without the least desire for a quid—in fact the very smell of tobacco in any form became disgusting to me, and has ever remained so. Thus I broke myself of the habit in the face of the enemy. Of course, while I carried my box, I had to respond to—"give us a chew," so that about one fourth of the pound had disappeared—the balance I gave to an old lady, aged about 80, addicted to smoking, not having it in my heart to advise so old a person to break off; but to the young I say emphatically, *"touch not! taste not!! handle not!!!"* the miserable, filthy, poisonous, unclean thing!! (COMPILER.)

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### My Experience with Tobacco.

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When I was a youth, scarcely out of my "teens"—  
 A lone orphan-boy, but of limited means;  
 As I was in chat with a crony one day,  
 The use of tobacco was thrown in my way.

Just now, "little Davie" drew forth from his vest,  
 A delicate morsel, which we were to test;  
 The practice was filthy I very well knew,  
 But thought it was "manly" for youngsters to chew.

Then said little Davie, "The critter I stole;  
 I found it laid up in the old chimney-hole,

If tasting, and spitting, and *heaving* were fun,  
 'Twas fully apparent my sport had begun;

I knew I was punished, and thought of release,  
 But madly determined to "conquer a peace,"  
 So bravely persisted from morning till night,  
 Until there was proof I was "best in the fight."

The strife being over, my feelings rose high,  
 No "toad in the puddle" felt prouder than I.  
 From this time I paid for the delicate weed,  
 As sponging a living was ne'er in my creed.

(To munch the sweet morsel was hardly enough,  
 I "treated" the ladies to macaboy snuff;  
 The girls of New England would never be mean:  
 Dear ones! they perfumed it with sweet-scented bean.)

The good things 'twas said that tobacco would do,  
 Of those recollected, I'll mention a few:  
 "It baffles dyspepsia and many an ache,  
 And often is used to keep one awake."

"It holds the teeth firmly," (some wise people say.)  
 And lo! best of all, keeps blue devils away.  
 I'll mention a matter which happened one day,

\* "Uncle Tholly," the familiar name by which he was called, being an abbreviation of his name by dropping the first and last syllables. "Uncle Bartemy," too, was an abbreviation of the same name, often heard by me in my boyhood days. Probably these abbreviations, together with the rather careless manner of pronouncing the full name, have led writers to vary the orthography from the ancient "St. Bartholomew." Of the descendants of these men all but two, I believe, who have written to me have written the name as presented in this work. In getting the inscriptions from their tombstones the writing is the same; but it may have been inadvertently done. I have chosen to follow the "text" of the majority.

"Uncle Barney," and family, were reported to me, and I was about to record the same when I discovered that the NAMES of the children were the same as Barnabas'. Further investigation proved "Barney," though a proper name, to be only an abbreviation of "Barnabas." Some errors of that kind MAY have crept into this work. I will here state that, where some have double names, the first name only would be reported by one writer, and the middle name only by another writer, from which causes errors may, also, have crept into the work, though great pains have been taken to prevent it.

† On pages 41, 42, and 43, it is said: "Bartholemew Pond and his brothers Barnabas and Timothy, jr., moved from Connecticut to Whitestown, N. Y., (now Clinton) in 1787 and 1789." These are the statements as furnished me; but on page 42 it reads: "MINERVA, b. Oct. 25th, 1794, in Litchfield, Ct.;" and above it says: "'Merritt' and 'Milo' were born in Connecticut." If both accounts are correct, Bartholemew Pond must have returned to Connecticut and resided there for a number of years before he made his permanent home in Camden, N. Y. The exact date of his settlement in Camden I have not been able to learn.

Before proceeding with the "Eighth Generation" I feel like indulging in a few remarks upon the generations passed in review. Many of the younger members of the last generation are younger than the older ones of the next generation, or degree of descent. But, in looking back over the foregoing pages, one is led to exclaim:

"OUR FATHERS! WHERE ARE THEY?"

A large per-cent of the population of Poultney and Shoreham, Vt., were once Ponds. In Poultney, the last one of the name was buried in 1871, not one bearing the name left! In Castleton, Shoreham, Whiting, Middlebury, and Panton, there is a mere trace of their descendants bearing the name left. But our fathers! Where are *they*? Alas! gone! How true the saying: "The place that now knows us, will soon know us no more forever!"

Again, in Oneida county, N. Y., where the Ponds made the first opening in 1787—where are *they*? Gone! all gone!! A mere trace of their descendants in that region only is left! The go-a-head-iveness of their posterity, inherited from their active sires, has impelled them to seek more favorable localities, and they may be found scattered over these United States—particularly over the broad prairies of the West.

But many of them are whitening for the tomb! They, too, will soon be gathered unto their fathers, and the places that now know them will know *them*, too, no more forever!"

In view of the foregoing facts, and of the certainty of our soon being called to follow in the foot-steps of our fathers to *our* final resting places, I here introduce a few lines under the head of—

 Let me learn the "Song of Moses,"  
 Let me wear the conquerer's crown!

Lay me down beneath the willow,  
 Freed from pain, and toil, and care;  
 Earth may swell its rudest billow,  
*But it cannot reach me there."*

No, for he, the *man*, would not be there. True, the casket would be thus laid to rest! but the *man*, the *intellectual*, the *immortal* man, will have soared away and beyond the rude blasts of earth! For, "there is no death! what *seems* so is transition." And here permit me to introduce a few lines from the pen of R. H. Dana.

"A voice within us speaks the startling word,  
 'Man, thou shalt never die!' Celestial voices  
 Hymn it around our souls; according harps,  
 By angel-fingers touched when the mild stars  
 Of morning sang together, sound forth still  
 The song of our great Immortality!  
 Thick, clustering orbs, and this our fair domain,  
 The tall, dark mountains, and the deep-toned seas,  
 Join in this solemn, universal song.

O, listen ye, our spirits! drink it in  
 From all the air! 'Tis in gentle moonlight:  
 'Tis floating in day's setting glories; night,

 Night and the dawn, bright day and thoughtful eve,  
 All time, all bounds, the limitless expanse,

Louisa E. early manifested a disposition to "do with all her might whatever her hands found to do." She would go to school the first day, and *every day*. Nothing else could be attended to while the school lasted, and she must be foremost, too, in all her studies; and when she commenced teaching, she gave her whole attention to the calling, getting the good will of all her scholars. A rigid disciplinarian though she was, she governed without the rod, consequently her teaching was eminently successful.

In the time of the great Rebellion, she was first and foremost in the adoption of all sanitary means for the relief of the soldiers, often encouraging and cheering them with messages from her ever ready pen. The adorning of her person with *oride* jewelry and other gew-gaws was never indulged in; the cultivation of the intellectual, the immortal mind being all important with her; still she loved the beautiful in Nature, spending much of her spare time in the cultivation of flowers, and in making artificial ones for the adornment of her parlor.

At the close of the war she contracted an alliance with Lieut. Willard M. Welsher of Battery "E" (Eggleston's Battery) and they were married Oct. 31st, 1865. They settled in North-West Williams county, Ohio, where she made their home cheerful with smiles, songs, and flowers. She approached the interesting period of maternity with cheerfulness, and bore the same with characteristic fortitude and with *apparent* safety. She named her darlings very soon after they were born, and seemed to anticipate with them a happy future; but alas! how short and futile are all human calculations! The attending physician's practiced eye saw symptoms of approaching spasms—usually so fatal—and set himself to work to counteract the same; but human skill availed nothing—the spasms came on—she soon passed into a state of unconsciousness from which her system never rallied, but gradually sank until the morning of the 1st of September, 1867, when her spirit took its flight for the immortal regions of the blessed.

Thus passed away one who was an ornament to society; thus ended a life, though short on earth in years, was long in DEEDS. But—

"She is not dead, the child of our affection:

But gone unto that school,

Where she no longer needs our poor protection,

And Christ himself doth rule.

"In that great cloister's stillness and seclusion,

By guardian angles led,

Safe from temptation, safe from sin's pollution,

She lives, whom we call dead.

Francis B. Pond graduated at Oberlin College in 1846, and was admitted to the bar in 1853. In April, 1861, he enlisted as a private in the U. S. service, was elected Captain of his Company, and joined the 17th Reg. of Ohio Volunteers for the three months' service. He was elected Lieutenant-Colonel thereof, and served in that capacity in West Virginia in Rosecranz's Brigade. In Oct., 1861, he was commissioned Lieutenant-Colonel with L. P. Marsh as Col. to recruit the 62d Regiment for the three years service. In January, 1862, Col. Marsh resigned and Lieut.-Col. Pond was commissioned Colonel and ordered to the front. ## ADDENDA.

Since the manuscripts for this work were prepared and numbered throughout, and the most of the foregoing was in print, I have received the following, which, though we are unable to put in its proper chronological places, is here inserted, with explanations, to enable the reader to a better understanding, and to enable other investigators to make a more perfect volume.

I., which Regiment was soon organized as "Mounted Infantry," and, as such, gave chase to Morgan in his raid through Kentucky, Indiana, and Ohio until he was captured.

Afterwards, in East Tennessee, in the endeavor to repel Longstreet's advance upon Knoxville, in one of the skirmishes, he had his horse shot down from under him; and in another skirmish he was taken prisoner and was carried down into Georgia, but managed to escape one dark night by crawling through a hole which he had discovered in the car; and by keeping in the woods in the daytime and taking the railroad track in the night, he thought he could work his way back to his regiment, but on attempting to cross a bridge over a large stream, he found it guarded and was intercepted by the guard. Passing himself off as a rebel soldier who had been left back on the sick list with the *chronic diarrhea*, but was now better and *anxious* to get back to his regiment, the guard was made to believe his yarn; but they could not let him go on, but he would have to report to the "Post Commander" in the morning, and the "Post Commander would furnish him transportation." Stephen fell in with their suggestions as to getting "transportation," but resolved, in his own mind, to report to some other "Post Commander." So he laid himself down by the "camp-fire" as composedly as possible, but soon began to feel symptoms of a relapse of his old complaint, until he was in great misery, which excited their sympathies very much. He finally told the Sergeant of the Guard that he must let the corporal take a walk with him. He did so, and they went quite a distance from the camp-fire—near to a large barn. After waiting a considerable time, and apparently somewhat relieved, Stephen proposed to the corporal that each of them pick up an armful of broken rails so as to make up a good hot fire, and he thought he might feel better. The corporal went to gathering up his arms full when Stephen proposed to go back to the barn and get a "*good nice chunk*" which was there. The corporal went back with his arms full, but Stephen *did not* go with his "*good nice chunk*," but as quietly and expeditiously as possible pushed on towards the Union army, to report to some "Post Commander" more to his liking than the one he was leaving. He heard no more from his "Corporal."

Having pushed his journey some distance and growing faint for the want of something to eat, (for he had been limited to three "hard-tacks" for some days,) he ventured to call at a house for something to eat, which was very cheerfully given him. Nothing was said about the war until he had finished his meal, when Stephen asked the man to go out with him. He did so. Stephen then said: "Now tell me honestly, are you a Union man?" "I am, and I knew *you* was a Union soldier as soon as you stepped into the house." Stephen then informed him how he came to be there. The man replied: "You cannot go by the railroad any further north in safety, as that is well guarded by the Rebels at Cleveland and Charleston. Your best course is to strike across lots towards Chattanooga, and when you get into the Mountains call on the Union men, (naming several,) and stay there until the Rebel lines are broken." Taking leave of his "Host," with the moonlight for his guide, Stephen "struck across lots" for the Mountains, reach-

ing which he had no difficulty in finding the man to whom he had been particularly directed, but had considerable difficulty in making the man acknowledge himself a "Union man." He was fearful of Rebel spies. Stephen, however, succeeded in convincing the man and gaining his confidence. The man informed him that it would be very difficult to pass the Rebel lines at that time; that he could stay with him and welcome; but that if he was any way apprehensive as to his safety with him, he would take him into the Mountains, where he would be safe. Stephen chose to stay there. It so happened that, in a day or two, the Union Cavalry made a raid around the Rebel lines for the purpose of destroying the railroad at Charleston and Cleveland, in doing which they passed near to where Stephen was quartered, hearing which he sauntered out to "see what he could see," when lo! who should come along but the 3d Ohio Cavalry—a part of whose "boys" were his former school mates and acquaintances. As the "cavalry boys" had gobbled up squads of Rebel cavalry, there was no difficulty in furnishing Stephen a horse, when he joined in and assisted in making their descent upon Cleveland, and back again to our lines, and ultimately to his own regiment as the cavalry was sent up to Knoxville to Burnside's assistance.

Stephen Pond accompanied Sherman in his march to Atlanta; was in the battle of Resacca, and several others during that march, but was afterwards assigned duty under Thomas; was in several engagements with Hood's army; and in the last battle at Nashville, which so completely cut up Hood's army as to end the fighting in that quarter. He had served in Co. C as 1st Sergeant during the march to Atlanta and up to the battle of Nashville; was promoted to a 2d Lieut. and ultimately to a 1st Lieut. He now (1874) resides at North-West Williams county, Ohio. Issue:

## APPENDIX.

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Two of the following families of Ponds branched off from Branford, Connecticut; but through which of the sons of either the first or second Samuel Pond, of Branford, they have descended, we have not been able to determine. Josiah, Moses, and Minwell, sons of the first Samuel Pond, of Branford, of whom we have no trace, (see page 11, Nos. 9, 11 and 13,) also Bartholemew and Josiah, (see Nos. 16 and 17, page 11) sons of the second Samuel Pond, of Branford, were certainly old enough to have been the father of either of them. The fact that they all trace back to Branford as the *town* from which they descended, and as they also have handed down with them the same "tradition" that the Ponds all sprung from "three brothers who came over from England," and claim relationship more particularly with *all* Branford Ponds, I think there can be no question that they are all related. But the *degree* of consanguinity must be left for the present an open question.

The third family, hereafter mentioned, who moved from Cheshire, Ct., to New York, was a Connecticut Pond, but whether he was a descendant of the Branford Ponds, or was a descendant of Isaac Pond the first son of Samuel Pond, of Windsor, of whom we have no trace (see No. 2, page 10) we cannot determine.

We have given them a place in these pages, in the hopes that in the future some more fortunate investigator may be able to connect them all more perfectly.

It will be seen that the descendants of the following branches of Ponds lived in the same towns in Connecticut that many of the Ponds mentioned in the foregoing pages lived in. Milford, Plymouth, Bristol, Harwinton, and Torrington, have all been homes for many of the Pond descendants, all of whom trace back to Branford as their starting point.

For the following I am indebted principally to Willard E. Pond, of Ft. Scott, Kan.
