



# THE NAME INGALLS

The name INGALLS is of Scandinavian origin and is derived from "The Ingialld", a valley or glen in Norway. In those ancient days men were known only by a given name and were distinguished by their occupation or some other thing that identified them from other men. John lived on a mountain, so he was known as John of the mountain, which later on when men took two names, became John Mountain. So it is easy to see how the people of "The Ingialld" should be known as the Ingalls, or as the Ingles, or some like variation of this name. We find the name in various forms today, such as Ingals, Ingles, and Engles.

# THE NORTHMEN

These bold and restless men of the North, known as "Northmen" or "Norsemen", first crossed the seas to Denmark where they occupied the coastal lands and gradually mixed with the native people and in later years became "Danes". They were a fierce and warlike race and began to sail in their rude craft the neighboring seas and prey upon and subjugate the people which they found in their wild adventures along the coasts. They sailed along Western Europe to France, to Spain, and through Gibralter into the Mediterranean. They landed in England and settled there nearly five hundred years before the historic voyage of Columbus. They pushed boldly westward by way of Spitzbergen, Iceland, and Greenland until they reached the eastern coast of North America.

#### LEIF ERICSON

In the year 1000 Leif Ericson, son of Eric the Red, who had planted a colony in Greenland, made a temporary settlement in America, which was named "Vine Land" or Vinland". As the vine does not grow north of 47 degrees of latitude, this settlement was probably somewhere on the New England coast. Several voyages were made according to Norse sagas to Vinland on which the voyagers encountered Indians whom they called "Skrælings" or inferior men. At the time of Columbus in 1492 these voyages had been long forgotten and he never heard of them. In this forward surging of the wild and hardy men of the North we can well imagine that the people of the Ingialld took part and thereby carried their name to Normandy, to England and to America.

#### THE NORTHMEN OR DANES INVADE ENGLAND

In the middle of the ninth century the Northmen or Danes descended in force upon the shores of Britain where they established themselves and waged war against the Anglo-Saxons, who had some 200 years before overrun and conquered England. When Alfred the Great became king of England in 871 A.D. his first great task was a contest with the Danes. In 878 A.D. he succeeded in forcing the Danes to a treaty of peace which confined them to the County of Lincolnshire; and it was from Lincolnshire that the first Ingalls Family came to America. The name of Ingalls is common in Lincolnshire, England, to this day.

#### THE NORTHMEN INVADE FRANCE

The Northmen or Danes, not only held part of England but on the mainland of Europe they went to the South and in France found a fair and fertile province where they settled and called it Normandy. In the year 1066 A. D., William the Conqueror, Duke of Normandy, invaded England and at the Battle of Hastings overthrew the English king and became the ruler of England. Thus the Northmen of England and the Northmen of France built up the English people in England. They are partly Scandinavian and partly Anglo-Saxon.

#### THE DOOMSDAY BOOK

In 1086 King William ordered a survey and valuation to be made of the whole realm outside of London. The returns of this survey were known as the Domesday or Doomsday Book. The English people gave it this name because like the "Day of Doom" it spared no one. By means of this "Book" each man's name, possessions, and responsibilities became known. The Doomsday Book is still in existence. It records our family name in England, stating that the name came from Normandy with King William. It records a Baron Ingald, a tenant of King William at Rerabi and Elvestone, Leicestershire, 1080 A. D. who came from Normandy. We may assume that the people of the Ingialld went to France as well as to England.

### RECORDS OF "INGALLS" WILLS

The earliest record of Ingalls Wills found in England is the Will of Henry Ingalls, grandfather of Edmund and Francis Ingalls, the first to come to America. The Will was made in 1555 and an abstract was found in the Probate Court attached to Lincoln Cathedral. The Will gave to his wife, Johan, his property during her natural life. It gave to the maintenance of the high altar, twelve pence. The balance of his effects was to be divided amongst his six children after the death of his wife. It names his wife, Johan, executrix, also a son, James, and a brother-in-law, Thomas Wytton.

The next Will recorded is that of Robert, the father of Edmund and Francis, made in 1617. "In ye name of God, Amen. Robert Ingalls of Skirbeck in the County of Lincoln, Yeoman, being sick in body but of good and perfect memory, etc.: Give Elizabeth, my wife, during her natural life all my effects; after her death to Edmund, My Elder Sonne, who was lawfully begotten; and for want of issue after Edmund's decease to Francis, My Youngest Sonne, and failing issue to the natural heirs of Robert Ingalls forever. Give to the poor of Skirbeck ten shillings, one half at once.

Wife, Elizabeth, and Edmund, Sonne, Executors."

#### THE FIRST "INGALLS" FAMILIES IN AMERICA

The first family of Ingalls that came as settlers in America were Edmund and Francis Ingalls, the sons of Robert Ingalls of Skirbeck, Lincolnshire, England. Their descendants are widely distributed in this country. They have been in the front ranks of every immigration to new sections. They have always been found with the rugged hand and pioneer spirit in subduing the wilderness and building up a great nation.

# GENEALOGY OF JACOB INGALLS IN AMERICA

EDMUND INGALLS, son of Robert and grandson of Henry Ingalls, was born at Skirbeck, Lincolnshire, England, 1598. He came to Salem, Mass., with Governor Endicott's company in 1628. With his brother, Francis, and four others he began the settlement of Lynn, Mass., in 1629. He was a man of good character even though the following court record is found "20/4/1646 Edmund Ingalls was fined for bringing home sticks in both his arms on the Sabbath Day from Mr. Holyoke's rails: witnesses—Obadaya Flood, Joseph Flood and Jane Flood." These witnesses were probably jealous neighbors, and the incident goes to show how strict the Puritans observed the Sabbath in those early times.

Edmund Ingalls was engaged in farming and with his brother, Francis, started the first tannery in Lynn, Mass. His name is often found on the town records showing that he was one of its prominent citizens. In March 1648 while traveling to Boston on horseback, owing to a defective bridge, he was drowned in the Saugus River. His will was probated September 16, 1648 and his estate appraised at 135 pounds. His wife Ann was made executor of his will. They had ten children of whom four were sons; namely, Robert, John, Henry and Samuel. Francis Ingalls left no male descendants.

John Ingalls, the second son of Edmund and Ann Ingalls was born at Skirbeck, England in 1625. He was married May 26, 1667 to Elizabeth Barrett of Salem, Mass. He left Lynn previous to 1687 to live in Tiverton, Rhode Island. The following record shows that he moved to Bristol, R. I. "John Ingalls of the church of Bristol, R. I., 1687 late of Tiverton, R. I." He next moved to Rehoboth, Mass. where he lived until he died at the age of 96. It is recorded, "Old John Ingalls died December 31, 1721." John's brother, Robert, stayed on the Homestead in Lynn, Mass. Henry went to live in Andover, Mass., and Samuel to Ipswich, Mass. John and Elizabeth Barrett Ingalls left four children: John, Elizabeth, Sarah and Edmund. They lived in Rehoboth, Mass., from which town the Jacob Ingalls Family came.

EDMUND INGALLS, the youngest son of John and Elizabeth Barrett Ingalls, was born either at Bristol, R.I., or Cumberland, R.I., about 1680. He went with his parents to Rehoboth, Mass., before 1694. He married Eunice Ludden of Braintree, Mass., Nov. 29, 1705. They had seven children, all of whom married and settled in Rehoboth or neighboring towns. The children in order of birth were: Benjamin, Elizabeth, Ebenezer, Edmund, Eunice, Joseph and Samuel. He died at Rehoboth about 1755.

JOSEPH INGALLS, the fourth son of Edmund and Eunice Luddin Ingalls, was born at Rehoboth, Mass., Nov. 29, 1718. He married Cordellay Ann Bullock about 1740. They had a large family of children of which Joseph, Jr., was the father of JACOB INGALLS. He moved to Otsego County, N.Y. State and died there in 1790.

\*Joseph Ingalls, Jr., the eldest son of Joseph and Cordellay Bullock Ingalls was born June 8, 1744 at Rehoboth, Mass. He married Roby Norton in 1763. He was a Revolutionary soldier from 1775 to 1780. He went with his family to Otsego County, N. Y. Later he lived with his son, Jacob, in Westerlo, N. Y. He is buried in Locust Cemetery, Norton Hill, N. Y.

\*Jacob Ingalls, son of Joseph and Roby (Norton) Ingalls, was born at Rehoboth, Mass., June 27, 1764. He married Susannah Goff, October 9, 1793. They had five sons and one daughter. The sons were: Enoch, Henry, John, Truman and Cyrus. The daughter, Cornelia, died in infancy. Jacob Ingalls was a Revolutionary soldier and the following record is found in the Massachusetts' Revolutionary Roll:

"Ingalls, Jacob, Rehoboth, descriptive list of men raised to reinforce the Continental Army for the term of six months, agreeable to resolve of June 5, 1780. Returned as received of Justin Ely, Commissioner, by Brig. General John Glover at Springfield on July 11, 1780: age 16 years, stature 5 feet 3 inches, complexion ruddy, engaged for town of Rehoboth.

Arrived at Springfield July 10, 1780; marched to camp July 11 under command of Ensign Bancroft; also, private in Captain William North's 1st company, Col. Henry Jackson's 16th regiment; pay roll for June and July, 1780; also, service from July 24, 1780 — 8 days; pay roll for six months service and returned by Brig. General Patterson as having passed muster in a return, dated Camp Totoway, October 25, 1780.

Pay roll for six months men raised by the town of Rehoboth for service in the Continental Army during 1780; marched to West Point July 7, 1780; discharged Dec. 9, 1780 — 5 mo. 12 days, including 10 days (200 miles) travel home; also, private, Capttain Simeon Cole's Company, Col. Dean's regiment. Service Mar. 6, 1781, 10 days, company raised to serve on a 40 days expedition to Rhode Island but discharged Mar. 15, 1781 by order of Major General Lincoln."

Jacob Ingalls left Rehoboth, Mass., and went to Otsego County in New York State after the Revolution. In 1793 he came to the town of Westerlo, made a clearing, built a log cabin, and then returned to Rehoboth for his bride. So industrious and hard working was he that in 1818, twenty-five years after he had made a clearing in the wilderness, he won a silver tea set, valued at \$150, offered by the Albany County Agricultural Society for the best fenced and best kept farm in Albany County. The farm contained 160 acres of land. He lived on this place until his death Oct. 17, 1841. He is buried in Locust Cemetery near Norton Hill, N. Y.

# **ENOCH INGALLS FAMILY RECORD**

ENOCH INGALLS, the eldest son of Jacob and Susannah Goff Ingalls, was born June 9, 1794 on the Jacob Ingalls Homestead near Lambs Corners in the town of Westerlo, N. Y. The Homestead is now owned and occupied by Henry R. Ingalls. Enoch married Nancy Bishop, the daughter of James and Cecelia Bishop, on Nov. 11, 1819. Nancy Bishop was born at Hemlock, N. Y. June 8, 1798 and died at Walworth, Wis., Oct. 27, 1889. Enoch lived in the town of Westerlo until 1850 when he went to Walworth County, Wisconsin. Most of his descendants still live in Wisconsin. He died at Walworth April 25, 1872.

Enoch Ingalls and Nancy Bishop Ingalls had seven children, all of them born in the town of Westerlo, N. Y.

- \* I. Alfred Ingalls, born Dec. 12, 1820. He died at Walworth, Wis., Aug. 1, 1900. He was a Union soldier in the Civil War, Company K, 5th Regiment of Wisconsin. He enlisted in 1864 and served until Lee's surrender at which he was present. He was a large farmer at Windom, Wis., until 1893 when he retired to live at Linn, Wis. He visited his relatives in New York State about 1886. He was not married.
  - II. Silas Ingalls, born April 12, 1823. He moved with his parents from Westerlo, N. Y. to Wisconsin in 1850. He married Helen Snell, the daughter of John P. and Mary Ann (Scouton) Snell, June 8, 1856. He died at Linn, Wis. Sept. 4, 1887. Silas Ingalls came to Wisconsin when the country was new and took up a large tract of land on the south shore of Lake Geneva. He was a teacher and taught the first school on Bigfoot Prairie. He visited his relatives in New York State with his brother, Alfred, about 1886.

Silas and Helen Snell Ingalls had seven sons:

1. Jerome Ingalls, born May 1, 1857. He married for his first wife, Olive Van Allen of Crystal Lake, Illinois, on Nov. 12, 1885. She was born Nov. 2, 1862 and died Aug. 16, 1908. He was a boat builder and contractor on Lake Geneva. He died Dec. 25, 1926.

Jerome Ingalls and Olive Van Allen Ingalls had one daughter:

a. Edna Blanche Ingalls, born Sept. 13, 1891. She married William Fosbinder and they live at Walworth, Wis. He died in 1947.

Jerome Ingalls married for his second wife, Emma Minison, who lives at Walworth, Wis.

2. Wallace Ingalls, born Nov. 21, 1859. He married Emma J. Tooker June 2, 1886. She was born March 28, 1862 at Bigfoot, Ill. He graduated from the Albany Law School at Albany, N. Y. in 1882. He practiced law at Elkhorn, Wis. and was elected County District Attorney. He moved to Racine, Wis. and practiced law there. He died Feb. 6, 1936.

Wallace Ingalls and Emma Tooker Ingalls had four children: a. Ralph Ingalls, born April 5, 1887. He married Emma

- Saybrook. They have children and grandchildren.
- b. Harold Ingalls, born Nov. 9, 1890. He married Lillian ————. They have one son.
  - a. *Harold Ingalls*, *Jr*. He is married, has one daughter, is a lawyer and lives at Homestead Farm, Walworth, Wisconsin.
- c. Marion Ingalls, born April 27, 1892. She is married and lives at Racine, Wisconsin.
- d. Helen Marie Ingalls, born Sept. 1, 1895. She is married ried and lives at Racine, Wisconsin.
- 3. Henry A. Ingalls, born Nov. 22, 1861. He married Effic Owens April 8, 1893. He graduated from Union Law College of Chicago in 1891. He became a mining contractor, residing at Oakland, California. His wife, Effie, died in 1936. They had two children:
  - a. Carl Owen Ingalls, born Feb. 4, 1894. He married Ruth P. Gamble about 1920. They have two daughters:

    Jane Ingalls who married Robert McLain 1942.

- \* 4. John P. Ingalls, born Jan. 28, 1864. He graduated Bachelor of Laws from Northwestern University in 1893. He practiced law at Racine, Wis., until 1898. He served in the U. S. Army in the Spanish-American War. He was a member of Co. F, First Regiment Wisconsin National Guards and was mustered into the regular army to serve two years He later practiced law in Chicago, Ill., with an office in Walworth, Wis. He was not married. He died in 1914.
  - 5. Frank Ingalls, born December 20, 1867. He was a farmer in town of Walworth, Wisconsin. He died Sept. 28, 1942. He married Fidelia Wilkinson in 1890. They had one child:
    - a. Eva Helen Ingalls, born Dec. 14, 1891. She married Clarence Wells Alger. She died June 29, 1934.

Frank Ingalls first wife died soon after the birth of their child, Eva Helen. He married for his second wife, Laura Martin, on Jan. 31, 1894. They have three children:

HARVEY INGALLS, the third son of Enoch Ingalls and Susannah Goff Ingalls was born May 28, 1837 on the Jacob Ingalls Homestead at Lambs Corners, N. Y. He married Huldah Rugg, April 20, 1873.

He went to Wisconsin with his parents in 1850, and then later to California, where he was engaged in gold-mining in Plumas County for four years. He returned to Wisconsin. He went to Minnesota to Cottonwood where he engaged in farming. Finally he came back to Walworth County, Wis., where he resided until his death. He died Aug 24, 1909. She died Feb. 3, 1921.

Harvey Ingalls and Huldah Rugg Ingalls had eight children:

- I. Hannah Ingalls, born May 10, 1874. She married Edelbert L. Warner July 16, 1894. They live at Zenda, Walworth County, Wisconsin. They have one son:
  - \* 1. George Ingalls Warner, born May 13, 1895. He married Nora Kruse in 1936. They live in Berlin, Wisconsin. He served in the U. S. Navy 1917-1919 World War I.

# CYRUS INGALLS FAMILY RECORD

CYRUS INGALLS, the youngest child of Enoch and Nancy Bishop Ingalls was born at Greenville, N. Y., Sept. 16, 1844. He married Rachel Bailey, Jan. 5, 1873. She was born in England July 22, 1853. He died Feb. 7, 1901. She died April 12, 1912.

Cyrus Ingalls went to live in the town of Linn, Walworth County, Wis., at the age of about six years with his parents. His older brothers, Alfred and Silas, had come to Wisconsin in 1844, the year in which Cyrus was born. Alfred took up the homestead in Linn, Wisconsin, and in 1850, Enoch Ingalls, his father, took over this homestead from Alfred and lived there until Enoch died in 1872.

The homestead then was taken over by Cyrus where he always lived until his death in 1901. Finally, it was acquired by his oldest son, Herman H. Ingalls, who was born there and lived there all his life. Herman died in 1940. His family are still living on the Old Homestead, which is now operated by his son, Norman H. Ingalls.

Cyrus Ingalls and Rachel Bailey Ingalls had seven children:



## CYRUS INGALLS FAMILY RECORD

CYRUS INGALLS, son of Jacob and Susannah Goff Ingalls, was born May 12, 1802, on the Ingalls Homestead near Lambs Corners, now owned and occupied by Henry R. Ingalls. This tract of land in the wilderness was bought by Jacob Ingalls who came to the town of Westerlo in 1793 from Rehoboth, Mass. Jacob worked four days a week for a Mr. Campbell to pay for the land, made a clearing, built a log cabin and then returned to Rehoboth for his bride.

Cyrus was the youngest of six children. His brothers were Enoch, Henry, John and Truman. Cornelia, a sister, died young. They all settled in the neighborhood of their birthplace except the eldest, Enoch, who migrated to Wisconsin in 1850.

Cyrus married Hannah Griffin of South Westerlo in January 1822. She was the daughter of Smith Griffin and Milly Ann Griffin. They owned and lived on the farm on Lot 100 of the Van Rensselaer Patent, located on top of the hill west of Horseshoe Bend, known in later years as the Edwards' Farm, now owned by Frank Davis. From 1822 until 1839, he carried on progressive and prosperous farming on this place. He was seriously injured by some farm machinery and died soon after as a result of these injuries.

Cyrus Ingalls purchased property in the village of South Westerlo and in 1838 was co-owner with Henry Morehouse of the carding and weaving mill there. His widow sold her share of the mill in 1840 to William Calder who operated the mill for many years. Cyrus was prominent in politics serving as Justice of the Peace and Town Constable. He died in 1839. His widow, Hannah Griffin Ingalls, lived forty-two years after his death, dying at the home of her son, Thaddeus, at Thayers' Corners in 1881. They are buried in Locust Cemetery near Norton Hill, N. Y. They had four children:

- I. Lozina, born August 25, 1822. She married Justus Mabey on November 11, 1840. He was the son of Amiel and Nancy Elliot Mabey and lived on the farm now known as the Alston St. John Farm. Justus Mabey died August 27, 1864. Lozina Mabey died July 8, 1880. They had three children:
