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# THE GENEALOGY OF THE BOOTH FAMILY

Booth Families of Connecticut for Six or More Generations

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This volume owes its inception to the desire of Mr. Eden C. Booth to ascertain his male-line descent, which turned out to be of extreme difficulty to trace after Andrew Booth, the Revolutionary soldier, was reached. The undersigned was retained to work on the problem, and although certain circumstantial evidence for Andrew's place in the family was obtained, it seemed best to bring down all branches of the Connecticut Booths (both the Richard and Robert families) to the generation of Andrew and thus make sure by elimination that no possible or likely parentage could be postulated for him other than that which is assigned to him herein.

So much information not included in previous accounts of the family, or corrective of such accounts, had been obtained in the course of this extensive search, that Mr. Booth decided to extend it still further and to attempt to bring all branches of the Richard Booth family to the sixth or seventh generation, or roughly about 1800, and to publish the results for the benefit of all descendants. To Mr. John Insley Coddington of Washington, D.C., we are indebted for a very full account of the New Milford branch of the family and for other aid. The Robert Booth family did not multiply as rapidly as the Richard Booth family, and has not been quite as thoroughly investigated, but we think it will be helpful to include what has been collected.

While no pretense of perfection or completeness is made, even within the limits arbitrarily set, it is felt that the book will serve a useful purpose, based as it largely is on independent study of original record sources, and that it will lighten the task of any future genealogist of the family who may wish to continue the lines through the more recent generations. Every male through the sixth generation who is not positively known to have died young or unmarried is assigned a reference number, and gaps in the numbering have been left when intervening families may be incomplete. Therefore in the future it should be possible to retain the same number-reference system for individuals if and when subsequent generations are added.

#### THE RICHARD BOOTH FAMILY

1. RICHARD¹ BOOTH, born in England, about 1607-8, died at Stratford, Conn., after 1688; married Elizabeth Hawley.

Three statements or theories relating to Richard Booth have found wide acceptance, simply because they have been long in print. These are that Richard was from Cheshire, England; that he was brother of Robert Booth of Maine and of John Booth of Southold, Long Island; and that he was probably married twice. No actual evidence has been seen to support any of these statements, and some of them are probably incorrect.

It was somewhat natural, in the early days of genealogical study, to try to connect Richard Booth with the well-known family of that name in Cheshire, but his origin is as much a matter of speculation today as it ever was. His brother-in-law, Joseph Hawley, was from Parwick, Derbyshire, and an origin in that county has recently been discovered for William Beardsley who came to New England in 1635 and was an original settler in Stratford in 1639. Hence we are more inclined to believe that Richard Booth was a member of the Derbyshire contingent than that he came from Cheshire. Certainly the Booth surname is frequently and prominently found in the records of County Derby.

As for Richard being brother of other early Booths in New England, it is entirely possible, but this speculation also is thus far without a scintilla of evidence to bear it out. Many colonial families have a tradition of "three brothers" coming here from England, and there is a natural tendency among amateur family genealogists to assume a relationship between two or three early colonists of the same surname. However, all but the rarest surnames occur in many counties and a large number of parishes in England, and it did often happen that two or three families of the same surname but entirely unrelated emigrated to America.

We are without definite records of more than one wife of Richard Booth, who because of certain records mentioning relationship is deduced to have been sister of Joseph Hawley and mother of the Booth children. In the lack of a will or other specific records, we may theorize that Richard was married once, twice, or even more times. The conclusion that he was twice married is based on a single record which refers to "my now wife," the assumption being that this invariably implied the existence of an earlier wife. Often it did, but in other cases it was merely a legal bit of verbiage intended to distinguish a man's present wife from any other wife, whether a previous one or one he might acquire in the future. Hence the implications of the term are far from certain.

Stratford was settled in 1639, but the records of the early period are so meagre that it is difficult to assign a definite date for the arrival there of many of the early settlers. Richard Booth and his brother-in-law Joseph Hawley were certainly living in Stratford before 1650, and the probability is that they came to Stratford nearer to 1640 than 1650. Judging by the births of his children, Hawley may not have married earlier than 1646-7, while Booth must have married about 1640, so Hawley may have come to Stratford as a bachelor with Mrs. Booth and her husband. All the Booth children are recorded in Stratford, beginning with 1641, but the earlier children are entered together in a group, and since the entry of births does not seem to have started until 1649, the recording of the earlier Booth children in Stratford does not absolutely prove that they were all born in that town. However, it is our opinion that the Booth family came to Stratford by 1641 or shortly thereafter.

In a list without date, but certainly before 1651, of every man's fence in the old field, Richard Booth is set down for eight rods. His home lot, numbered 29, was on the present Main Street, between those of Joshua Judson and Adam Hurd and directly across the street from that of Isaac Nichols, Sr. In 1662 he signed a document as Townsman, or as later called, Selectman. His name is in the list of inhabitants drawn up for Connecticut Colony, dated 28 Mar. 1668.

He was one of those who received land by 1670 in the section known as Nichols' Farms, where one branch of his descendants lived for several generations. In an affidavit made 15 March 1687/8, he described himself as aged about eighty-one. He probably did not long survive that date. It is most unfortunate that no recorded will is found, which would have given us interesting information about his children and would have mentioned his wife if she was then living.

Only one Benjamin Booth figures in land records of Stratford, and since he bought as early as 1734, he cannot be No. 23, who was born 1720. In 1738 he acquitted the executors of the will of Lieut. Joseph Beach for his legacy under Beach's will.

On 27 Mar. 1767, he conveyed for "parental affection" to his son-in-law Eliakim Dunman [Deming, Dunning, variously spelled], twelve acres on which the latter's dwelling house then stood; and in 1768 conveyed further to Dunning, as well as to Thomas Gilbert. The last deed we have noted was a sale by Benjamin Booth on 17 Dec. 1771.

Administration on his estate was granted, 5 Aug. 1740, to Daniel Hawley and William Lampson, with Edmund Booth as surety. Edmund Booth was the heaviest creditor. The estate seems to have been solvent, but no distribution was filed.

The death record of his widow in the Newtown church records calls her widow of "M" Tho<sup>S</sup> Booth of Stratford."

His deeds show that he lived in the Parish of North Stratford (now Trumbull). There his children were baptized, but because of an unfortunate hiatus between January, 1744, and 1749, children born in that period are omitted; and Andrew failed to have his family entered in the town records. His wife Sarah was admitted to membership at Trumbull, 19 June 1743, but no record of dismissions has been seen covering the period when the family removed.

On 22 May 1762, Andrew Booth of Stratford, for £8, conveyed to his son Joseph an acre in North Stratford, the deed being witnessed by the Justice and by "And" Booth," and of course the witness could not be the grantor. Two deeds were given by Andrew Booth to his "son Joseph" in 1764, the day and month not being filled in, but both deeds were recorded 31 Oct. 1765. The first gave, for 6, the title to a small part of Andrew's farm; the second gave, "for love," half the dwelling house. Both deeds were witnessed by Noah Plumb and "Andrew Booth Jun"." [Stratford Deeds, 13:463; 14:465, 466.]

Since no other Andrew has been found in the entire Richard Booth family of an age to witness deeds in 1762 and 1764, and since these deeds were a family concern, from Andrew to his elder son Joseph, we conclude that "Andrew Booth Jun" was a younger son of the grantor. If born during the gap in the Trumbull church records, 1744-45, he would have been between seventeen and twenty, old enough to witness family deeds.

On 10 Sept. 1774, Andrew Booth and Sarah his wife, and Joseph Booth, all of Stratford, for £113, sold to Ephraim Booth, Jr., their lands at Nichols Farm. [Ibid., 19:213.] The purchaser was nephew of Andrew Booth, Sr. No further mention of the family has been found in the Stratford area.

White, second sister; Sarah wife of Levi Peck, third sister; Phebe wife of Stiles Nichols, fourth sister; and Hannah wife of Joseph Nichols, fifth sister.

These records add a fifth daughter in this family, who is omitted in Orcutt's <u>History of Stratford</u> [2:1158], and completely eliminate the son Andrew inserted by Orcutt in this family.

Reuben Booth was born 22 June 1739 in that part of the Town of Stratford, Conn., then usually called North Stratford, which formed the parish of Unity and was in 1797 set off as the Town of Trumbull. He was baptized in Unity Parish Church when two days old, 24 June 1739. Since some curious inaccuracies concerning Reuben<sup>4</sup> and his father David<sup>3</sup> Booth have found their way into print, it is well to dispose of them here. Benjamin Lincoln Swan, The Family of Richard Boothe (1862), p. 36, says that David<sup>3</sup> Booth m. (1) in June 1727 Mrs. (sic) Anne Mills, and m. (2) about 1740 Mary\_\_\_\_\_. Several children of both marriages are named, and Reuben is omitted altogether. Columbus Booth, Report of the Booth Association of the United States (1868), pp. 44-5, exactly repeats the statements of Swan respecting the family of David<sup>3</sup> Booth, and omits Reuben<sup>4</sup>. Samuel Orcutt, The History of the Towns of New Milford and Bridgewater, Connecticut (1882), p. 658, states that Reuben was baptized 22 June 1739 (which is wrong by two days) and gives no date of birth. On p. 274 of the same book, Orcutt tells the following (entirely imaginary) story: Ann (Mills) Booth d. after the birth of her son Reuben, David<sup>3</sup> Booth thereupon remarried and removed to Roxbury, Conn., Mary proved to Mary be an odious stepmother, and Reuben was compelled to leave home early and carve out a career for himself without family support. Robert C. Hine, The Hine Genealogy (1899), p. 22, makes the amazing statement that Reuben<sup>4</sup> Booth "was born at Stratford, Conn., or perhaps at Trumbull, Conn., July 21, 1740 and was baptized June 22, 1739." The story about the early death of Reuben's mother, his father's remarriage and Reuben's departure from home is then repeated from Orcutt's New Milford with some additional details. Henry Porter Andrews, John Porter of Windsor (1893), vol. 1, p. 119, says that Reuben was b. 25 May 1741.

The true facts are these: David³ Booth, son of Joseph² and Hannah (Wilcoxson) Booth, was b. at Stratford ca. 1700, removed to North Stratford, which was then still part of the Town of Stratford, late in 1738 or early in 1739, and d. there 21 June 1773 "in his 74th year" (g. s.). He m. at Windsor, Conn., 7 June

1727, Ann<sup>3</sup> Mills, b. at Windsor in 1703, d. at Stratford 19 Nov. 1793 "in her 91st year" (g. s.). Since she d. at a great age twenty years after her husband, and was named in his will, it is obvious that she was the only wife of David<sup>3</sup> Booth and mother of all his children. [It was David, No. 33, who had the wife Mary.] Therefore the story of David's second marriage and Reuben's stepmother is false. The four eldest children of David and Ann (Mills) Booth: Joanna, Anne, David and Peter, were recorded in the Stratford birth records. Reuben was born after the family's removal from Stratford proper to North Stratford, so the only place where his birth was recorded was in the Unity Parish Church records. That accounts for the omission of Reuben from the Booth Genealogies of 1862 and 1868. Orcutt, in his History of the Old Town of Stratford and the City of Bridgeport (1886), p. 1158, gives the correct facts, but did not draw attention to the errors contained in his History of New Milford.

Reuben<sup>4</sup> Booth first purchased land in New Milford on 3 March 1760. He later became a big buyer and seller of land in western Connecticut, Vermont and New York State. About 100 deeds are recorded to him in New Milford, many of them to good-sized farms. He and Col. Samuel Canfield purchased several thousand acres near Fort Edward, N.Y. He was called "one of the most energetic and enterprising business men in town (Orcutt: New Milford, pp. 274, 658). He was a member of the New Milford Committee for Inspection and Correspondence (a kind of home police of patriots), 9 Dec. 1776, and was on the committee to procure supplies for soldiers in the Continental Army, Jan. 1778. He was a delegate from New Milford to the Connecticut General Court, May 1778 and Oct. 1786. He was not recorded in New Milford in the Census of 1790, and died before that of 1800 was taken. In 1797, he stood second in point of wealth on the tax list of the men of New Milford. He died at New Milford 22 July 1800, "aged 60 years" (g. s.), and was buried in Center Cemetery, New Milford. He left a will, dated 28 April 1800, with a codicil of 7 July 1800, proved at New Milford 16 Aug. 1800. In it, he named his wife Sarah Booth, sons Reuben M. Booth, Gerardus Booth and Walter Booth, deceased sons Daniel and Carr Booth (to whose memory gravestones were to be erected), daughters Aurelia Lowrey and Sarah Bunce, grandson Elijah Boardman 2nd, eldest son of daughter Aurelia Lowrey, grandsons Chauncey Lowrey, Jr., and Carr Booth Lowrey, younger sons of daughter Aurelia Lowrey. He made his son Walter Booth, his son-in-law Chauncey Lowrey, and Philo

Ruggles executors. The inventory of his personal estate, taken 22 Oct. 1800, amounted to \$13,943.61.

In the New Milford census of 1800, the household of Sarah Booth consisted of 2 males aged 16-26 [her son Walter and grandson Elijah Boardman], 1 female 10-16, 1 female 26-45, and 1 female over 45 [herself]. Sarah, widow of Reuben<sup>4</sup> Booth, was buried at Center Cemetery, New Milford, with her husband. Excellent portraits of Reuben<sup>4</sup> and Sarah (Hine) Booth, painted by Richard Jennys, are now (1951) in the possession of Mrs. G. Dudley Booth of 12 Grove St., New Milford, widow of G. Dudley Booth (Walter<sup>7</sup>, Henry Walter<sup>6</sup>, Walter<sup>5</sup>, Reuben<sup>4</sup>). The portrait of Sarah (Hine) Booth was reproduced in an article on Jennys in New York History, vol. 30 (1949), following p. 208.

Aurelia<sup>5</sup>, b. 11 Aug. 1766; d. at New Milford, 26 Nov. 1828 ae. 62 (g. s.). At the age of 16, she had a child, named Elijah Boardman 2nd, b. at New Milford 17 Jan. 1783, and designated as her eldest child both in the Booth Family Bible and in her father's will. The child was named for the Hon. Elijah<sup>5</sup> Boardman, b. at New Milford 7 March 1760, d. at Boardman, Ohio, 18 Aug. 1823, son of Capt. and Deacon Sherman4 (Rev. Daniel<sup>3</sup>, Daniel<sup>2</sup>, Samuel<sup>1</sup>) and Sarah (Bostwick) Boardman. Elijah<sup>5</sup> Boardman served in the Revolution in 1776 and 1777; was trained as a clerk in New Haven, and commenced business in New Milford in 1781. He evidently met Aurelia Booth in the spring of 1782. He m. at Great Barrington, Mass., 25 Sept. 1792, Mary Anna Whiting, b. ca. 1768, d. at New Milford 24 June 1848, aged 80, daughter of William and Anna (Mason) Whiting of Great Barrington, by whom he had 6 children. He was a member of the Connecticut Land Company and was one of the purchasers of the Western Reserve in 1795, and one of the townships and a village in Mahoning Co., Ohio, were named for him. He was elected six times to the Lower House of the Conn. Legislature, to the Conn. State Senate, May 1819-May 1821, and was U.S. Senator from Connecticut from May 1821 to his death. His body was brought back from Ohio to New Milford for burial, 5 Sept.

1823, and his will (which did not mention a son Elijah) was proved at New Milford. [See Charlotte Goldthwaite and William F. J. Boardman, Boardman Genealogy (1895), pp. 332-333; Orcutt: New Milford, pp. 577-580; Henry Anthon Bostwick, Genealogy of the Bostwick Family (1901), p. 144.]

Aurelia Booth m. (1) at New Milford, 22 Aug. 1784, Dr. Chauncey Lowrey, b. at Waterbury, Conn., 14 Apr. 1761, d. at New Milford 29 May 1803 ae. 42 (g. s.), bur. at Center Cemetery, New Milford. He was a son of Nathaniel and Jerusha (Newel) Lowrey or Lowree of Farmington and Waterbury, who were m. at Waterbury 3 July 1760, and a grandson of Thomas Lowree and James Newel, both of Farmington. In the New Milford Census of 1800, the household of Chauncey Lowrey consisted of 1 male and 1 female aged 10-16, 1 male and 1 female aged 26-45. Dr. Lowrey, who was one of the executors of the will of his father-in-law, Reuben Booth. in 1800, d. intestate. Letters of administration on his estate were granted at New Milford 6 July 1803 to Aurelia Lowrey, Gerardus<sup>5</sup> Booth, and Elisha Bostwick, all of New Milford. Aurelia (Booth) Lowrey m. (2) at an unknown date, Daniel Waring, perhaps the Daniel Waring b. at Stamford, Conn., 10 Jan. 1761, son of Jonathan and Rachel Waring. He d. at New Milford, intestate, 22 Nov. 1826, and was bur. at Center Cemetery, New Milford.

(perhaps at Lexington, Ga.), 4 Oct. 1828, Hannah (Cummins) Upson, b. at Lexington, Ga., 15 June 1789, d. at New York, N.Y., 7 Feb. 1867, daughter of the Rev. Francis and Sarah (Davis) Cummins of Lexington, and widow of Stephen<sup>6</sup> Upson (1783-1824), B.A., Yale, 1804 (see The Upson Family in America, 1940, p. 120; C. W. Nottingham and E. Hannah, History of Upson County, Georgia, 1930, p. 23). Elijah Boardman " of Ravenswood in the town of Newtown, County of Queens, State of New York" made a will, dated 15 May 1847, proved in Queens Co., 25 Oct. 1847 (Liber 4, folio 252). He bequeathed to his wife Hannah C. Boardman, to William Clark Booth, son of Gerardus Booth deceased, to Julia, daughter of said Gerardus Booth and wife of Andrew Comstock, to Sarah Elizabeth, daughter of Walter Booth deceased and wife of Forbes Dunderdale, and residue to stepson Stephen Upson and stepdaughter Mary E. Hyatt, wife of Edmund Hyatt. The executors were step-son-in-law Edmund Hyatt, stepson Stephen Upson, and William Clark Booth. The will was proved by Edmund Hyatt who stated that the deceased left a widow, Hannah C. Boardman, and no children. The will of Hannah Boardman

- of New York, widow, dated 14 June 1855, was proved 22 April 1867 (Liber 167, p. 285, Surrogates' Court, New York, N.Y.). She left all to her children by her first marriage.
- Chauncey Newel Lowrey, b. 17 Aug. 1786, 2. bapt. at New Milford Congregational Church 2 Feb. 1802. He m. at New Milford, 26 Oct. 1809, "Miss Merwin," one of the daughters of David<sup>5</sup> and Thamzen (Comstock) Merwin, which David<sup>5</sup> was descended through Joseph<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, and John<sup>2</sup> from Miles<sup>1</sup> Merwin. Chauncev Newel Lowrey left New Milford soon after 6 Feb. 1811, on which date he deeded his lands in New Milford to his half-brother Elijah Boardman. He evidently removed to Palmyra, Ohio, for he served briefly in the War of 1812 as a Private, Lt. Charles Gilbert's (3rd) Co. of Infantry, 2nd Battalion, 2nd Regiment, Ohio Militia, from 24 Aug. to 2 Sept. 1812. He was discharged on the latter date at Cleveland, O., by Gen. Wadsworth, "fifty miles from Palmyra, his home." No further record.

It is thought that this branch of the family, after the sale of the North Stratford homestead in 1774, probably settled in Berkshire County, Mass., and Andrew<sup>5</sup> Booth, Jr., was of New Ashford during the Revolutionary period. Andrew Patterson, uncle of Joseph<sup>5</sup> Booth and uncle also of Joseph's wife, removed soon after 1772 to Mt. Washington, Berkshire County. In 1806, a David Booth was on the meeting house building committee at Mt. Washington [History of Berkshire County, Mass., Beers, 1885, 2:229]. And a Joseph Booth married Abigail Patterson (born 25 July 1791 at Mt. Washington, a granddaughter of Andrew Patterson); if son of Joseph [No. 76], his bride was his second cousin.

Andrew Booth of New Ashford, Mass., served in a Berkshire County regiment as a Private in 1777, also in 1780 [Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution, 2:275]. On one occasion he marched to Manchester, on another to near Bennington, both near Sandgate, Vt., his future home.

He may have received a grant from the new town of New Ashford, as no purchase is found recorded in Berkshire County Deeds. On 9 Feb. 1788, Andrew Booth of New Ashford, yeoman, for £60, sold to Elisha and Sylvanus McIntier of the same, 50 acres in New Ashford; witnesses, Isaac Stratton [J.P.] and Rachel Stratton [Berkshire Deeds, 24:405]. He had entered his Ear Mark in New Ashford, 7 Sept. 1787.

In 1787 Joseph Booth of Sandgate bought land there, and since he married in Sandgate that fall, it looks as if he was the eldest son of Andrew and preceded him in the move to Sandgate. For Andrew sold out in New Ashford in the late winter of 1787-8, and in the 1790 Census was listed at Sandgate with one female and with a boy under 16 years. The 1790 Census records for Sandgate are terribly written (Andrew's name is spelled "Both") and are evidently the work of an almost illiterate enumerator. Joseph Booth was not listed in 1790, and there should be more people in Andrew's household. In 1800, Andrew is listed as over 45, with a woman under 45 (perhaps a second wife if the age is correct), a boy of 10 to 16, and a girl under 10, which also seems to be a defective listing.

At Reading, Steuben Co., N. Y., in the 1810 Census, we find "Andrew Boothe" listed, just himself and wife, both over 45; and immediately beneath his name is that of "Eden Boothe" over 26, with a wife under 26, and a boy and two girls under 10. Immediately above Andrew Booth, we find Timothy Hurd listed, doubtless his son-in-law, since Hurd had married Mabel Booth at Sandgate.

In 1805, Eden Booth was appointed Ensign of Steuben County Militia, and was advanced to Lieutenant in 1808, when Timothy Hurd was made Ensign under him. Hurd later rose to be Captain and Major. [Council of Appointment, New York, pp. 796, 964, 1215, 1474.]

# The Wife of Andrew Booth

When Rev. Samuel Orcutt published his <u>History of Stratford</u> and <u>Bridgeport, Conn.</u>, in 1886, he included (vol. 2, p. 1158) among the children of Ephraim<sup>4</sup> Booth a son "Andrew; m. Jerusha Kirby in 1767." The wills of this Ephraim and of his only son Ephraim prove conclusively that there was no son Andrew in this family, but three deeds of Ephraim's brother Andrew<sup>4</sup> Booth were witnessed by an Andrew Booth, Jr., hence the existence of a younger Andrew is confirmed, but the evidence indicates that Orcutt erred in placing him in the family of Ephraim and that he should have been placed in the family of Andrew the brother of Ephraim.

The alleged marriage of the younger Andrew Booth in 1767 to a Jerusha Kirby has been a stumbling-block, because no Kirby family then lived in or near Stratford, and so such marriage is recorded in Connecticut town records nor in the records of any church in or near Stratford. Hence it was a puzzle where Orcutt obtained this statement. For a number of years, prior to 1886, Rev. Benjamin L. Swan collected data on the Stratford families, and in 1862 had published a small book on the Booth genealogy. His collections were placed at the disposal of Mr. Orcutt, as stated on page 1114 of the History. Mr. Swan was a

Andrew was the only adult male Booth in the previous generation, hence are presumed to be his children. Joseph would be named for Andrew's elder brother, but it remains possible that this was a second marriage of his brother, or that it belongs to a putative nephew of the name. The marriages of Joseph, Lois, Andrew Jr., and Lucinda, are from the Congregational Church records, while that of Mabel is from the town record.

capable genealogist, while Mr. Orcutt, although almost a professional writer of town histories, did not excel in genealogical work.

Since Mr. Orcutt could not have obtained the item about the Andrew Booth who married Jerusha Kirby from the local records in or near Stratford, it seems very probable that he found the item in the papers of Mr. Swan, and that some descendant of Andrew Booth, who knew that he originated in Stratford and that his wife was Jerusha Kirby, wrote to Mr. Swan after his Booth genealogy appeared (in which Andrew is not mentioned), either to give him information or to ask for information. The item was misplaced by Orcutt under Ephraim Booth instead of under the older Andrew Booth.

The <u>Kirby Genealogy</u> fails to identify any Jerusha Kirby who could have married Andrew Booth. However, printed sources relating to New Ashford, Mass., where Andrew Booth lived during the Revolution and until 1788, mention an Abraham Kirby as residing at New Ashford while Booth lived there. That seemed significant, and a search of Kirby deeds in Berkshire County was therefore made, with important results. The land of Abraham Kirby in New Ashford bounded on that of Andrew Booth; furthermore, the deeds show that Roger Kirby [father of Abraham] also lived at New Ashford for a time, and that Roger Kirby gave a deed in 1778 WHICH WAS WITNESSED BY JERUSHA BOOTH. This is the only occurrence of the name of the wife of Andrew Booth which has yet been found on record.

In view of the fact that Orcutt sixty-five years ago had learned of an Andrew Booth of the Stratford family who married a Jerusha Kirby, and that we find Andrew Booth of New Ashford living next door to a Kirby family, apparently with a wife Jerusha who witnessed a deed for Roger Kirby, we conclude on these circumstantial grounds that Andrew Booth married Jerusha Kirby, daughter of Roger Kirby.

Data on this branch of the Kirby family will be found in the Kirby Genealogy (pp. 168-170, passim), also the line back of Roger will be found with some corrections in Jacobus, New Haven Gen. Magazine, vol. 5, p. 1077. Roger Kirby was born according to New Haven records 14 April 1705, though it appears the year should rather be 1704, the son of Joseph Kirby by his second wife, Abiah Kimberly. He settled in the parish of Judea (now the town of Washington), in Woodbury, Conn., where he had a wife Martha and four children are recorded. It seems very probable that there were younger unrecorded children.

The four children of Roger and Martha Kirby recorded at Woodbury were:

Abraham, b. 14 July 1730. Joseph and Abiah, twins, b. 7 July 1732. James, b. 17 Sept. 1740.

It seems highly probable that there were additional children. Jerusha, to marry 1767 (a date which seems about right for her to be mother of the older children of Andrew Booth), may have been born 1746-48, and would have to be placed as a daughter of Roger, not as a granddaughter.

The copy of the Judea (Washington) church records published in 1924 in the New Milford (Conn.) Times shows that Roger Kirby and Martha his wife were admitted as members from Southbury, 2 Mar. 1749. I find no baptisms of children of theirs at Washington, nor in a copy of the early Southbury baptisms, which so far as I know may be the only copy of the Southbury church records in existence. The son Joseph married at Bethlehem, 24 Mar. 1757, Rachel Hand. Washington, Southbury and Bethlehem were all originally parishes in Woodbury.

The Kirby book states that Roger Kirby moved in 1763 to Litchfield, Conn., deeding his Woodbury property to his two sons [Abraham and Joseph]. It also states that Abraham lived in Washington until 1763; removed to Litchfield; and in Feb. 1786 settled in Middlebury, Vt., where he died 3 April 1796. The compiler seems to have been entirely uninformed of the residence of Roger Kirby and his son Abraham in Berkshire County, Mass.

Woodruff's Genealogical Register of Litchfield (p. 126) states that Roger Kirby of Woodbury, Conn., "came in 1793 to visit his daughter, Mrs. Joseph Bunnell, in Milton Society, or southeast part of Cornwall, and died there June 12, 1793, ae. 95, and was buried in the old Milton Cemetery. His daughter, Mrs. Joseph Bunnell, died in the same house, May 7, 1835, aged 93." The marriage of Roger's son Abraham is also given in this source, at Washington, 31 May 1756, to Eunice Starkweather, and the births of Abraham's children, which were evidently entered at Litchfield although the older ones were doubtless born at Woodbury [Washington]. The eldest child of Abraham was Colonel and Judge Ephraim Kirby (1757-1804) of Litchfield; most of the younger children went with their parents to Middlebury, Vt., as shown in the Kirby book.

<u>Litchfield and Morris Inscriptions</u> (1905), p. 186, gives the inscription from the Milton Burying Ground of "Mr. Roger

Kirby / died / June 12, 1793 / aged 95 years." The age is of course greatly exaggerated. The husband of his daughter was doubtless the Joseph Bunnell who was baptized at Milford, Conn., 16 Dec. 1733, son of Gershom and Margaret (Johnson) Bunnell; and died at Cornwall, Conn., 12 May 1807, ae. 73 [New Haven Gen. Magazine, 2:360; Starr's History of Cornwall, p. 441]. His wife, first name not stated, was born 1742 if her age at death is correctly stated, hence was an unrecorded daughter of Roger Kirby.

Inscriptions of the New Ashford (Berkshire County, Mass.) Cemetery contain "Kirby, Mrs. Martha, Consort of Mr. Roger Kirby, d. 16 Mar. 1789, ae. 83 y." The following Kirby deeds were found at the Pittsfield Registry of Berkshire County and were abstracted by Mr. William Herbert Wood:

18:145. 26 Feb. 1784. Abram Kirby [so signed] of New Ashford, for 123, to Samuel Starkweather of Preston, New London Co., Conn., 100 acres in New Ashford. Witnesses: [James?] Harris (J.P.), Joseph Harris.

It appears from the above deeds that Roger Kirby was still of some parish in Woodbury in 1771 when he first bought in Lanesborough, and that he lived there for the most part until 1781, though in 1778 he seems to have been stopping in New Ashford, perhaps with his son Abraham or daughter Mrs. Booth, as the latter witnessed the deed he gave that year. He was still in that region as late as 1785, when he acknowledged his last deed. The first land he owned in Lanesborough was sold 1778 to his son-in-law (although not so called in the deed) Joseph Bunnell, at whose home in Milton, Conn., he died in 1793. His wife Martha was buried at New Ashford in 1789. It is not known with whom the elder Kirbys were living or visiting at that date; the Booths sold out there in 1788, but the Kirbys may have had another married daughter still there. Abraham Kirby was definitely connected with New Ashford from 1777 to 1784, when he sold to Samuel Starkweather, probably a brother or nephew of his wife. Abraham is said to have gone to Middlebury, Vt., in 1786, and was listed there in the 1790 Census.

The history of the family seems to be that Roger Kirby remained in Woodbury until 1771, when he moved up to Lanesborough, although his son Abraham had settled earlier, perhaps 1763, in Litchfield, Conn. Then Abraham moved to Berkshire County by 1777, buying in New Ashford where his sister Jerusha Booth was living. Before 1790 the Booths went to Sandgate, while Abraham Kirby went to Middlebury, Vt.; but Abraham's eldest son Ephraim, born 1757, had gone back to Litchfield where in 1784 he married, and Abraham's sister Mrs. Bunnell returned to Connecticut from Lanesborough and also settled in Litchfield.

On the basis of the strong circumstantial evidence, it seems highly probable that Andrew Booth, Jr., of Stratford, did marry Jerusha Kirby, perhaps in one of the parishes of Woodbury, and her father's residence in Lanesborough was probably what led Booth to settle in New Ashford.

Y., 5 Oct. 1844 "in the 73rd year of his age" (Booth Family Bible), and was buried in a vault at Center Cemetery, New Milford; married at New Milford, 7 April 1798, Sarah<sup>7</sup> (usually called Sally) Clark, born at New Milford, 16 Feb. 1778, died at 18 East 37th St., New York, N.Y., 4 Aug. 1861, buried at New Milford with her husband. She was the eldest daughter of William<sup>6</sup> Clark of Colchester and New Milford, Conn., by his wife Annis Bostwick, and an elder sister of Henrietta<sup>7</sup> Clark, born 5 July 1793, died 8 Aug. 1880, who married (as his 2nd wife) at New Milford, 18 Apr. 1813, Major Beebe<sup>5</sup> Hine (Hine Genealogy, p. 77). William<sup>6</sup> Clark was descended through William<sup>5</sup> Clark of Colchester, John<sup>4</sup> Clark of Lyme and Colchester, Nathaniel<sup>3</sup> Clark of Boston and Lyme, and John<sup>2</sup> Clark of Plymouth and Boston, Mass., from Thomas<sup>1</sup> Clark of Plymouth. He was a merchant, first at New Milford, then at Westport, Conn., and finally in New York City, to which he moved in 1843. He was a delegate from New Milford to the Conn. Legislature in Oct. 1815. The will of "Gerardus Booth of Westport, Conn.," dated in April 1841, was proved at New York 5 March 1845 [Liber 91, p. 38, Surrogates' Court, New York, N.Y.]. His heirs were his wife Sally, son William C. Booth, daughter Julia wife of Andrew Comstock and the latter's children Sarah and Mary. Son William C. was appointed executor. The witnesses were John A. Weed, Thomas B. Butler and Charles Olmsted.

where he first appeared in the City Directory for 1834-5, at 171 Pearl St. He moved to 11 Platt St. in 1836-7, to 13 William St. in 1837-8, to 5 Cedar St. in 1842-3. His shop for woollen and straw goods was at 5 Cedar St. in 1844-5, at 54 Cedar St. from 1845-6 to 1848-9, at 186 Pearl St. in 1849-50 and 1850-1, at 150 Water St. from 1851-2 through 1858, at 41 Broadway in 1859 and at 39 Broadway in 1862. Meanwhile, he lived with his parents at 39 Rutgers St. in 1844-5, and alone at 35 7th St. from 1845-6 to 1849-50, at 43 7th St. from 1850-1 to 1858. After that, no place of residence was mentioned until 1862, when he was living at 18 Union Place. He retired from business about 1862-3 and went to Europe, but returned in time to persuade his brother-in-law Andrew Comstock to go to Europe with him in the summer of 1865. He spent a number of the ensuing years in Europe, but retired to New Haven in 1876. He was bur. in his parents' vault at New Milford. His will, dated 13 July 1877, in which he called himself "William C. Booth of New York, temporarily living at New Haven," was proved 12 Apr. 1882 by his greatnephew and principal heir, Andrew C. Coddington [Liber 300, p. 413, Surrogates' Court, New York, N. Y.].

Julia Maria, b. probably 29 Aug. 1802, possibly ii. 29 Aug. 1803. The New Milford Town Records and the Booth Family Bible, also Orcutt: New Milford, p. 658, and the Genealogy of the Bostwick Family, p. 214, state that she was b. 29 Aug. 1802. Her own personal Bible, however (now in the possession of her great-grandson John Insley Coddington), contains a statement written in her own hand that she was b. 29 Aug. 1803. Since her husband was b. in Jan. 1803, it is assumed that she made the entry in her own Bible after marriage, in a feminine desire to appear more youthful than her spouse. She d. at 266 Fourth Ave., New York, N. Y., at 10:30 a.m., 3 Jan. 1865, and was bur. in her parents' vault at New Milford. Her will, dated 27 Nov. 1861, was proved 7 Feb.

1865 by her daughter Mary H. Coddington, who was her executrix and sole heir [Liber 154, p. 43, Surrogates' Court, New York, N.Y.].

She m. at New Milford, 20 Aug. 1827, Andrew Comstock, b. at Redding, Conn., 23 Jan. 1803, d. at the Hotel Oesterreichischer Hof, Innsbruck, Austria, 9 Oct. 1866, bur. at New Milford with his wife. He was a son of William and Rebecca (Starr) Comstock of Danbury and Redding, Conn. William Comstock was descended through Andrew. David and Samuel Comstock from Christopher Comstock of Norwalk, who may or may not have been the first of his line in America, since he may or may not have been a son of William<sup>1</sup> Comstock of New London. Andrew Comstock, husband of Julia Maria<sup>6</sup> Booth, was a hatter, first at Redding and later at New York. He was apparently already a resident of New York at the time of his marriage in 1827, but did not appear in the New York City Directories till 1837-8, when he had a shop at 155 Water St., upstairs. In 1839-40, the shop was moved to 126 Maiden Lane, and from 1840-1 to 1843-4 it was at 174 Water St. From 1844-5 to 1857 it was at 162 Water St., in 1858 it was at 160 Broadway, from 1859 to 1861 at 53 Broadway, in 1862 at 45 Broadway, in 1863 and 1864 at 41 Broadway, and in 1865 again at 45 Broadway. Meanwhile, the family lived from 1838-9 to 1840-1 at 16 Jefferson St., from 1841-2 to 1843-4 at 24 Rutgers St., from 1844-5 to 1845-6 at 177 East Broadway, from 1846-7 to 1851-2 at Astoria, L.I., in 1852-3 at 38 West 22nd St., from 1853-4 to 1859 at 30 West 21st St., from 1859 to 1863 at 18 East 37th St., and in 1864 and 1865 at 266 Fourth Ave. Andrew Comstock, his wife and daughter Mary Henrietta visited Europe in 1853, and returned from Le Havre to New York on the Franklin, which sailed early in Sept. He retired from business soon after his wife's death in Jan. 1865, and in the summer of that year sailed for Europe again, accompanied by his daughter, Mary Henrietta (Comstock) Coddington, his grandson,

Andrew Comstock Coddington, and his brother-in-law, William Clark<sup>6</sup> Booth. After touring the Continent for more than a year, he was taken ill and d. at Innsbruck in the Tyrol. He had expressed an urgent desire to be buried at New Milford, and this was accomplished after some difficulties. It was necessary to obtain the personal permission of the Prince-Bishop of Brixen, in whose diocese Innsbruck then lay, and the Prince-Bishop for a time took a dim view of the export of a Protestant corpse to America. Andrew Comstock d. intestate, and letters of administration were granted 8 Dec. 1866 to his daughter and heir, Mary H. Coddington (Admon. Book 85, p. 296, Surrogates' Court, New York, N. Y.).

Y., 21 Dec. 1856, Postmaster of New York from 5 July 1836 to March 1841, for whom see the New York Genealogical & Biographical Record, vol. 23, pp. 190-1), and the tenth of the 14 children of his 2nd wife, Matilda Eliza (Palmer) Coddington (b. at New York, N.Y., 1 July 1800, m. there 9 Oct. 1816, d. there 14 Feb. 1882, for whome see the New England Historical & Genealogical Register, vol. 90, pp. 84-5.) Jonathan Inslee Coddington was the elder son of James Coddington (1755-1816) of Woodbridge, N. J. and of his wife Experience (Inslee) FitzRandolph (1750-1813). James Coddington was presumably the son (though proof is lacking) of James<sup>6</sup> Coddington, b. at Woodbridge 5 Jan. 1724/5, for whom see "Clarkson-Codington-Gilman Bible Records" in The Genealogical Magazine of New Jersey, vol. 21, pp. 28-9. James<sup>6</sup> Coddington was descended through John<sup>5</sup>, John<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, and John<sup>2</sup> from Stockdale<sup>1</sup> Coddington, Cuddington or Quiddington, bapt. at Blechingley, co. Surrey, England, 8 Mar. 1569/70, who lived and practiced as a barber-surgeon in London and at Dorking, co. Surrey, came to New England before Dec. 1643, settled at Roxbury, Mass., then moved to Hampton, N. H., where he d. ca. Jan. 1649/50. Jefferson Coddington, first husband of Mary Henrietta Comstock, was bapt. at St. Bartholomew's P. E. Church, New York, 5 May 1841, aged 8. He matriculated at Columbia College (now University, then located at Park Place and Church St., New York) in 1846 as a member of the class of 1850, but left college 31 Oct. 1848 "to go into business." He was a

member of the Peithologian [debating] Society at Columbia. He and an older brother, Edmund, went to California by way of Panama in 1849, but returned to New York by Jan. 1850, having stopped either going or returning in Fort Bend Co., Texas, to visit their cousin Ann Fitz Randolph (Ayers) Williams (1808-1861), wife of Daniel Williams of Oyster Creek, Fort Bend Co., and niece of Jonathan Inslee Coddington. Jefferson Coddington was admitted to the bar in New York, 17 Dec. 1852. After his marriage in 1854, he lived with his parentsin-law, Mr. and Mrs. Comstock, until 1858, when he and his wife separated and he returned to his mother's house at 238 Fifth Avenue. After his wife went to Europe in 1865, he divorced her for desertion. He m. (2) at New York, 12 Dec. 1872, Julia Fellows, b. there 30 Jan. 1840, d. at 7 East 63rd St., New York, 31 Jan. 1926, bur. with her husband in Woodlawn Cemetery. She was a daughter of Louis Strite Fellows (1798-1866) and Emily Schell (1807-1880), his wife, for whom see Rosalie Fellows Bailey, "The Fellows Family of the Hudson River Valley," N.Y. Gen. & Biog. Record, vol. 63, p. 400. By his second wife, Jefferson Coddington had a daughter, Emily Matilda Coddington, b. at 31 West 55th St., New York, N.Y., 21 Oct. 1873, resident (1951) of Newport, R.I. and the Hotel Pierre, New York, who has received the degrees of B.A. from Barnard College and M.A. and Ph.D. in mathematics from Columbia University. She m. at 24 West 58th St., New York, 5 Nov. 1917, William Henry Williams, b. at Astoria, L.I., N.Y., 16 Oct. 1876, d. at the Villa Rosa, 377 Bellevue Ave., Newport, R.I., 21 June 1943, Vice President, Trustee and

Librarian of the New York Genealogical & Biographical Society [see N.Y. Gen. &

Bio. Record, vol. 74, p. 139].

The will of Jefferson Coddington, dated 17 May 1876, was proved 19 Sept. 1876 by his widow and executrix Julia Coddington [Liber 240, p. 107, Surrogates' Court, New York, N.Y.].

Mary Henrietta (Comstock) Coddington lived with her parents after her separation from her husband in 1858, accompanied her father and uncle to Europe in 1865, returned briefly to America with her father's remains in 1866 but immediately went once more to Europe, and stayed there till early 1876. She and her son were in Paris during the War of 1870, the Commune and the siege by the Germans, 19 Sept. 1870 to 28 Jan. 1871. She m. (2) at the U.S. Legation, Paris, 3 May 1870 (as the first of his three wives), William Pierce<sup>8</sup> Dewey, mining engineer, b. at New York in 1839, d. at 1031 West 20th Ave., Los Angeles, Cal., 9 Dec. 1913, son of Squire Pierce<sup>7</sup> and Mary Eliza (Jones) Dewey. Squire Pierce Dewey was descended through Nathaniel<sup>6</sup>, Paul<sup>5</sup>, Israel4, Thomas3 and Jedediah2 from Thomas¹ Dewey of Dorchester, Mass., and Windsor, Conn.

The will of Mary Henrietta (Comstock) (Coddington) Dewey, dated at New York 9 Mar. 1876, was proved there 14 Oct. 1876 by the executors, Andrew C. Coddington and William S. Mortimer. Except for small bequests to her husband, William Pierce Dewey, and her uncle, William Clark<sup>6</sup> Booth, her estate was bequeathed to her only child, Andrew Comstock Coddington [Liber 245, p. 21, Surrogates' Court, New York, N.Y.].



This map is reprinted from the History of Stratford and shows the assignment of lots in Stratford of its earliest settlement. The numbers have no significance, except for convenience in referring to the Map.





Above picture shows the Booth Family Memorial stone in the Old Congregational Burying Ground, which was first laid out in 1676 and is the oldest burial place in Stratford. It seems very probable that Richard Booth is buried here as the inscription on the east side of the stone read; "RICHARD BOOTH, from England, one of the first settlers in this town in 1639. Born 1606. Age 82 years in 1688. Date of death unknown." Following this inscription are names, dates of birth of his children. The front (west) and south sides are shown above. Inscription on the north side lists JAMES BOOTH, son of Joseph Booth, wife Martha and children.

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
