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In the summer of 1894, when the dormant feelings of kinship among the Chester County Darlingtons were suddenly stirred into new life by the letters of Thomas Darlington, of England, there arose in our hearts a general desire for union and for some outward evidence of our kinship. At once there was a search among old papers for copies of the Darlington Clan Book, in which was printed a record of the proceedings of the Sesqui Centennial meeting of the Clan in 1853, and the names of all known descendants of Abraham Darlington, as far as ascertained at that time. An association was quickly formed to meet this common impulse, and after the Bicentennial Gathering of August 30, 1804, had been held, a committee was appointed to revise the old clan book, and using that as a basis, to prepare a genealogical record of the family. The committee named consisted of Stephen P. Darlington, chairman; Annis P. Darlington and Mary C. Darlington, all of West Chester, Pa.

At the time of the appointment of the committee, it was thought that it would be possible for the members of the committee to do this work of compilation, with the aid of such volunteer assistants as should offer, but at the end of several months of earnest effort, and after the resignation of Mary C. Darlington, and the removal of Annis P. Darlington to Indiana, it was found that this was not feasible, and accordingly a plan was agreed upon whereby thirty persons became guarantors of a publication fund, and a contract was made with Mr. Gilbert Cope, of West Chester, to gather, compile and edit the needed information for the committee.

At the close of the year 1898, Mr. Cope delivered the manuscript to the chairman, and, as required by his contract, cer-

tified that it contained all the information accessible to him. Thereupon the committee began its preparations for publication. This has been delayed for a year for various reasons and causes, which the committee has deeply regretted, but has been unable to prevent. A work of this kind, undertaken at the request of the family, for the benefit of the family and with no thought of individual profit, is entitled to the earnest support of all persons interested in the outcome. Such support and interest, however, cannot be assumed; it must be made known.

One element in the apparent delay of a year was the attempt to amplify the knowledge of our ancestors in England, which is now presented in the chapter entitled "Our English Kith and Kin." It is believed that this will be found a most interesting addition to the record of our family on this side of the water. The writer desires to acknowledge the courtesy, the friendship and interested zeal which our cousin and visitor in 1894, Mr. Thomas Darlington, formerly of London, and now of Hafodunos, Aberystwyth, Wales, has shown in gathering, bit by bit, from the various parish records, the items from which has been compiled this English chapter.

This work was undertaken by the writer from a sense of loyalty to our name and lineage. It has not been a money-making scheme, and from those who find pleasure and satisfaction in the record disclosed in these pages there is due a sense of hearty appreciation to those guarantors and others who have furnished the means to carry through the publication, and who have loyally supported the committee in its efforts.

It is hoped that the index, which has been very carefully prepared for the committee, will prove a means of overcoming any errors of compilation. The scheme of the book has been to present each marriage and the children born therefrom, in their order, according to the number assigned to each name. There have been some slight variations from the rule, but it is believed they will be readily understood. The arrangement of the book is so simple that no explanation is deemed necessary, save possibly one. After the name of the eldest child of each marriage will be found certain names in italics and in parenthesis. They

give the line of ascent of that child and his brothers and sisters back to Abraham Darlington.

The committee is pleased that so many names of persons who bear the name of Darlington, or whose kindred have borne such name, have been obtained for the book; and, while it has not been possible to find our common ancestor, we cherish the belief that we have such common ancestor in the distant past, since all researches lead back to a location in England near the spot where the three counties of Cheshire, Lancashire and Yorkshire join. So we give all these cousins as hearty a greeting as if they, too, had the blood of Abraham Darlington, of Darnhall and Birmingham, in their veins.

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INTRODUCTION.

When Abraham Darlington came from Darnhall, Cheshire, England, to Chester County, Pennsylvania, in 1711,* the western wilderness pressed close upon the Atlantic seaboard, and the settlements clung to the shores of navigable water. As years went by and numbers grew, the fertile dales of Chester County still proved sufficiently attractive to his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren to induce them to remain near the ancestral homes. A few of them went into the adjoining counties or the neighboring city of Philadelphia, but the greater part continued to cultivate their farms in the old county. Through the eighteenth century, as the frontier of settlement slowly pushed westward over the Alleghanies, they remained near the eastern tide-water, and not even the mighty stream of westward travel and settlement in the first half of this century caught many of them in the rush. Most of them continued to live in Chester County, substantial, thrifty, law-abiding citizens. Friends by persuasion, farmers by occupation, happy and contented.

They cherished their kinship and rejoiced in the good name of Darlington and the respect and public esteem which surrounded it.

Accordingly, when in 1853 it was suggested that the Sesqui Centennial of the landing of the first-comer, Abraham Darlington, was near at hand, and that a gathering of his descendants at his home would be a proper way to show their pride in him and respect for his memory, the suggestion met a hearty response, and the following invitation was issued, signed by many elders of the tribe:

SESQUI-CENTENNIAL GATHERING OF THE CLAN DARLINGTON.

To be held at the residence of Brinton Darlington (grandson of the first American progenitor), in East Bradford, Chester County, on the 20th August, 1853.

The descendants of Abraham Darlington, who, in the beginning of the last century, enigrated from Darnhall, in Cheshire, England, and settled in Chester County, Pennsylvania, are cordially invited to a general family gathering, or assemblage of the tribe, at the time and place above mentioned, for the purpose of a sociable interview, free from all idle forms and ceremony, appropriate and becoming the offspring of their common parent.

It is confidently trusted that every descendant of our venerable patriarch, whether of the male or female line, who may be able to come, will be both ready and willing to participate in the family greeting.

With characteristic punctuality, they will be careful to assemble between the hours of ten and eleven o'clock in the forenon; and, in order that the gathering may be attended with as little inconvenience, or expense, as possible, each family, or group, will come provided for their own fare (in picnic style), and with every disposition to pass a few pleasant hours, on so rare an occasion, with their kindred. At 12 o'clock noon, one or more addresses will be delivered, giving a sketch of what is known of the family history.

It is earnestly requested that some one of each family will, at his or her earliest convenience, make out as complete and accurate a list as possible of the names of all the members (especially living), in their several branches, and forward the same to one of the undersigned, so that a satisfactory exhibit, or statement of our number, may be made to the meeting.

Chester County, May 25, 1853.

"The call was responded to in the right spirit, and with great alacrity, by 'the old folks, as well as the young,' and on the morning of the appointed day (which was most propitious), nearly four hundred *Darlingtons* were seen converging

toward the place of rendezvous, with that punctuality to the hour which has long been noted as a trait in the family character.

"The young men and maidens formed a goodly portion of the kindred group; and when they came together, such an array of smiling faces, bright eyes, and inquisitive looks, has rarely, if ever, been exhibited at any gathering of a single family in the ancient County of Chester.

"After a busy and exciting scene, of introductions, recognitions and hearty greetings, the assemblage was organized by a unanimous call upon the owner of the premises—the senior Darlington present—to take the chair, when the following address was read, and the subjoined report of a visit to the native place of their ancestor was made by another member of the family, who had recently enjoyed that privilege. A catalogue raisonné, or classified list of the tribe—as complete as could be obtained—was also produced, as being a suitable and interesting appendix to the other documents.

"These few reminiscences, and particulars of the family history, having been disposed of, and directed to be printed for the use of those concerned, the meeting forthwith resolved itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of luncheon, and also to indulge in the choice fruits of the season and other appropriate refreshments, which had been abundantly provided by way of dessert to the picnic fare.

"When the various topics of interest, together with the good things before them, had been amply and satisfactorily discussed, it was discovered that a couple of home-made ditties had been perpetrated for the occasion by some individuals belonging to the clan; whereupon the young folks raised their voices with such harmony and concert, in the recital, that the music caused the said ditties to be regarded as quite a tolerable portion of the proceedings—and accordingly they are thereunto annexed.

"Toward evening this Sesqui-Centennial Gathering began reluctantly to separate, all highly gratified with the occurrences of the day, the aged rather exulting at the demonstration of such a numerous and hopeful posterity of the patriarch, and the juveniles protesting that hereafter the gatherings of the clan, instead of being sesqui, ought at least to be as often as semi-centennial."*

On this occasion Dr. William Darlington was the orator, and in his address he gave the known facts as to the English origin of Abraham Darlington, and of his coming to America, his marriages and settlements in Chester County and the correspondence with the kindred left behind across the ocean, which appear in the following pages.

William Darlington, attorney-at-law, of West Chester, also told of his visit to Cheshire, England, in 1851, and of his fruitless efforts to find in the parish of Over some one then living of the name, who might prove to be of kin. We now know that inquiries made in the neighboring parish of Acton would have led to a more satisfactory result.

Following the Sesqui-Centennial, Dr. William Darlington prepared and published for the family the so-called Darlington Clan Book of 1853, a pamphlet of fifty-two pages, in which was contained an account of the celebration and a register of the names of Abraham Darlington's descendants, as far as could then be ascertained.

This, however, made no attempt to do more than print the names, and did not give dates of marriage, birth or death, place of residence, name of wife or husband or any personal notes. But meagre as it was, it proved of great interest and value, and each family has jealously guarded its copy down to the present.

In 1894, the quiet life of the Darlingtons, of Chester County, was stirred by the news of the receipt by J. Lacey Darlington, grandson of Dr. William Darlington, of the following letter:

GLYNDERWEN, ALLEYN ROAD, WEST DULWICH, S. E. Feb. 11th, 1804.

Dear Sir—The occasion of my venturing to trouble you with this letter is briefly as follows: Whilst engaged on some researches at the British Museum a few days ago, I came across a little book entitled "The Sesqui-Centennial Gathering of the Clan Darlington," which, upon examination, I found to contain an account of the American branch of my own family.

Seeing the name of Dr. William Darlington prominently mentioned in the pamphlet, I made it my next business to ascertain the names of some of his descendants who might be supposed to be still living, in the hope of re-establishing the connection between the English and American branches of our common family—a connection which seems to have been broken for about 150 years.

I was a little surprised to find from the pamphlet already alluded to that one of the American Darlingtons had failed to discover Cheshire kinsmen during a visit to this country in 1851. I think there would be very little difficulty in establishing the fact that Job Darlington, of Darnhall, your ancestor, was a cousin of Richard Darlington, of Aston. I have not the exact particulars at hand, but trusting to my memory for details, I believe that the Darlington, of Aston, of that date was named Richard, and that he was the "Cousin Richard," so frequently referred to in the letters of Job Darlington quoted in the pamphlet.*

The elder branch of the Darlingtons, of Aston, terminated in a female—Anne, daughter of John Darlington, of Aston, who married in 1770 Henry Tomlinson, of Dorfold. The Dorfold estate passed by another marriage into the family of Tollemache, the head of which is Lord Tollemache, of Helmingham.

This John Darlington had a brother, Abraham.

Both Job and Abraham are good old family names, still kept up on this side of the water. Other family names are Richard and John. My father's name was Richard; he had a brother John, and three cousins, Abraham, Job and Richard. My grandfather was Richard, and he had an only brother, Abraham.

I should be extremely glad if this letter should lead to a renewal of relations between the two branches of the family on either side of the Atlantic. I should be only too happy to supply you with any particulars regarding your Cheshire ancestry which may be within my knowledge. I shall look anxiously for a reply to this letter, which is "a bow drawn at a venture," inasmuch as I have no information as to the present whereabouts of any of my American relations.

Meantime, believe me, dear Sir,

This served to turn the thoughts of all to their common blood and ancestry, and to the English home which Abraham Darlington had left.

Cordial answers and responses crossed the ocean to Mr. Thomas Darlington, who in time was found to be a noted historical scholar, linguist and philologist, fellow of St. John's

College, Cambridge, prominent as an educator, and especially interested in the Welsh language, literature and national aspirations.

Acting under a common impulse, the elders of the tribe again met in West Chester and resolved on another reunion. The bi-centennial of Abraham Darlington's birth had passed five years before, in 1889; the bi-centennial of his landing would not occur until 1911; only forty-one years had passed since the last gathering; but these little discrepancies of date were ignored, and it was felt that the time was ripe for the cultivation of the feeling of kinship by a bi-centennial family gathering, and so it was planned to hold such a meeting on August 30, at Birmingham Park, on the Brandywine, in Chester County, Pennsylvania, one mile from the place where Abraham Darlington had his farm.

Invitations were sent out as widely as possible, and when the day dawned, bright, clear and warm, with the same punctuality that had marked the Sesqui-Centennial Gathering, the Darlingtons and their kin met in Birmingham Park. Nearly 1,200 persons were there. Thomas Darlington, of England, was there, the guest of all. From Kansas, from New Jersey, from Ohio, from Indiana, from Virginia, came Darlingtons, and those claiming Darlington blood. Many a county of Pennsylvania had sent some one back to the old county of Chester that day to renew the claims of kindred.

Greetings and letters came from South Carolina, from California, from West Virginia, from Maryland, from New York and Washington. There were present those who could not claim American kinship with Abraham's descendants, but who, themselves Darlingtons, rejoiced in such a goodly showing for the name.

The formal exercises were brief. Richard Darlington, of West Chester, the president of the Association, welcomed those present, and expressed the pride and satisfaction that all felt in the worthy record of their ancestors. Hon. Smedley Darlington, of West Chester; Thomas Darlington, of England; William Darlington Evans, of West Chester; George E. Darlington, of Media; J. Lacey Darlington, of

New York, spoke or read short papers upon Darlington characteristics, or recounting Darlington achievements, or appreciative of the worthy men of the name.

Poems by B. W. Woodward, of Kansas; Alice L. Darlington, of West Chester, and Charles H. Darlington, of Tennessee (together with that of Chandler Darlington, at the Sesqui-Centennial), were read or sung, and as the shadows lengthened and the sun sank low, the kinsmen and kinswomen slowly and reluctantly separated, all agreeing that the existence of such a body of kindly kinsfolks and the heritage of such a goodly name were subjects of just pride, and an inspiration toward high standards and individual achievement.

OUR ENGLISH KITH AND KIN.

Note.—This chapter has been compiled by Edward L. Heydecker, of New York, from data gathered by Mr. Thomas Darlington, of London, England, and of Hafodunos, Aberystwyth, Wales, who attended our Bi-Centennial Gathering in 1894. Notwithstanding the pressure of his professional duties, Mr. Darlington has devoted much time to this labor and has brought to the work zeal and interest in the subject, as well as a large amount of local and historical knowledge, and the ability of a trained scholar in the use of ancient manuscript records. All of this has been done by Mr. Darlington as a labor of love, and out of respect to his Darlington lineage.

It should, however, be explained that the subjoined account is not presented as a complete or final history of the Darlington family in England. Many documents and other sources of information relating to the family still remain to be examined, though this statement refers more particularly to the branches which are only collaterally connected with our own (i. e., the Darnhall and Whitegate) line. In view of the fact that the information which more directly concerned the American Darlingtons was required in time for the present publication, Mr. Darlington concentrated his efforts upon making the history of the Darnhall line as complete as possible, and postponed the full investigation of other branches of the family to a later date. He hopes to publish (privately) in England the results of his further investigations when completed. The expenses of the work undertaken specially for the present publication, such as fees for searching church registers, obtaining extracts from wills, etc., have been met from a fund for that purpose, made up of contributions from the following: Mrs. Francis J. Darlington, Anna B. Darlington, William Hoopes, Thomas Hoopes, Eliza R. Speakman, all of West Chester, Pa.; Edward B. Darlington, of Kennett Square, Pa.; Charles F. Darlington, and J. Lacey Darlington, of New York, N. Y.; Rev. James H. Darlington, of Brooklyn, N. Y.; Stephen P. Darlington, of Philadelphia and Thomas Darlington, of Hafordunos, Aberystwyth, Wales, and James Darlington, of Bourton Hall, Warwickshire, England.

Darlington is a Saxon name; names ending in -ington are found in the northern or north midland shires of England.

Such names are plentiful in Cheshire, as witness the following names of localities taken from the map of Cheshire: Bebbington, Puddington, Kiddington, Coddington, Mollington, Willington, Cuddington, Bartington, Outhrington, Partington, Carrington, Siddington, Torkington, Pitherington, Withington, Bellington, Haslington, Shavington, Luddington, Guddington.

The earliest mention we have found of a Darlington is in 1282, when the death is recorded of John Darlington (or John de Darlington), who was Archbishop of Dublin, Ireland, but as celibacy on the part of priests was then the rule in the Roman Catholic Church, as it is to-day, he can only, at best, be considered a collateral relative. Whence he came or who were his kindred is not known.*

Those who find rural life tedious and slow turn to the metropolis and seek commercial chances. This has been true of the Darlingtons as early as 1484, when there is mention of the name of Darlington in London. That this line continued there is evident, but the information obtained is too incomplete to warrant printing herein. It is enough for our purpose now to say that we know of nine London Darlingtons in the last century, and that we have noted in this book a line of Darlingtons who came from London to America. (See Nos. 2748 to 2776.)

Correspondence has been had wherever practicable with the several families of Darlington in England, and in each case (save the London Darlingtons) the line has been traced back

This passage reads as though information contained in it were from title-deeds in the possession of the present owner, but there is grave reason to believe that the author has taken the name Haslington for Darlington in these old deeds.

to Cheshire and to one of the following places in that county, i. c., Davenham, Great Budworth, Darnhall or Acton, which are adjoining parishes. We believe that the London Darlingtons are also of Cheshire origin.

Aside from the documents and family traditions in the possession of living Darlingtons, the main sources of information are the records in Cheshire. These are:

First.—The parish registers. The parishes which cover the area in and around the places above named are those of Whitegate, Over, Great and Little Budworth, Davenham, Acton and Wybunbury. Of these the registers of Whitegate, Over, Wybunbury and Great Budworth go back to dates varying from 1550-1560; those of Davenham to 1560 (with a gap from 1625 to 1665); those of Acton to 1655 (those prior to this date were removed or destroyed in the Civil War).

Sceond.—The records preserved at the Chester Diocesan Registry. Of these we may specially mention the Bishops' Transcripts, which are, or purport to be, transcripts filed as required by law, by the incumbents of the several parishes in the Chester diocese, and which contain the same information as is found, or should be found, in the several parish registers. Variations in detail do, however, occur as between the parish registers and the Bishops' Transcripts, neither record being absolutely complete until a comparatively recent period.

Third.—The wills on file in the Chester Probate Court. The earliest Darlington will preserved at Chester is dated 1568.

Of the sources of information above mentioned, wills are by far the most valuable and important.

From these sources it appears that in the latter half of the sixteenth century there lived in the parish of Whitegate. Cheshire, six brothers Darlington, i. c., (1) EDMUND, (2) THOMAS, (3) ROBERT, (4) JOHN, (5) RICHARD, (6), RANDLE, probably sons of Richard Darlington, of Brookhouses.

Edmund Darlington, the eldest of these brothers (see *post* under his name), was born about 1550, or not long before. Between his birth and that of the youngest of his brothers and sisters a period of sixteen or eighteen years may be supposed to have elapsed. During part of this period the births, mar-

riages and deaths which occurred in the parish were ostensibly being recorded in the parish registers; and we turn to the parish registers of Over and Whitegate in hope to find the name of the parents of these six brothers. It happens, however, that the Darlington entries in both the Whitegate and Over registers are up to 1567 very meagre. We find that Edward Darlington, son of Richard Darlington, was buried at Over on January 12, 1559; that Thomas Croft (or Cross) was married to Margaret Darlington at Whitegate on April 28, 1566, and that Alice Darlington (apparently the same Alice Darlington who married Humphrey Barker thirty-nine years later) was christened at Whitegate on May 11, 1567 (name of father not mentioned). These are all the entries which occur during the period in question.

We are left, therefore, with this positive result, that the only parent bearing the name of Darlington, mentioned in these registers during the period which included the births of the six brothers and two sisters, was called Richard. Were it not that the entries in the parish registers are obviously defective at this period, the conclusion would be inevitable that Richard Darlington was the name of that early ancestor of the Darlington line, who was the parent of Edmund, Thomas, Robert, John, Richard, Randle and their sisters. As it is, we must not claim for this conclusion the rank of more than a plausible conjecture, but, in support of this conjecture, we may further call attention to the fact that each of the brothers of this family, of whose sons' names we possess a complete list, gave the name of Richard to one of his sons; and that, as will appear in what follows, the name of Richard has been, on the whole, the most characteristic and frequently used in the families of their descendants.

It is implied in what has been said above that the particular branch of the family with which we are more closely concerned was not the only one bearing the name of Darlington which was settled at this time in the parishes of Over and Whitegate. The registers of the latter, especially, contain evidence of the existence of at least one other family of Darlington in the parish, and possibly more. How these families

were related to each other is a point on which there is no direct evidence. It would seem, however, not unlikely that the Margaret Darlington who was married to (6) Randle Darlington in 1594 was his cousin. A Ralph, or Rauffe, Darlington was living in the parish of Whitegate about 1572, and another Ralph, possibly his son, was married to Margaret Warren in 1581. Their descendants are traceable in the Whitegate Registers. A Matthew Darlington was church warden of Whitegate in 1603. He had two daughters, Catherine and Anne, born respectively in 1580 and 1583, but appears to have left no male descendants. Other families of Darlington can be traced as living at the same period in the parishes of Tarvin and Wybunbury.

Mr. Thomas Darlington informs us that family tradition assigns an earlier period than the middle or early part of the sixteenth century for the settlement of the family in Cheshire. No positive proof of this can at present be offered, but the existence in the county of several families of the name at that period points to the same conclusion.

I. EDMUND DARLINGTON, the eldest of these six brothers, lived in the parish of Whitegate, at a place called Brookhouses, a farm about half a mile from Whitegate Church. This farm has retained its name to the present day, but is not now owned by Darlingtons.

Mr. Thomas Darlington writes: "I take the opportunity of saying what I know about Brookhouses, which will possess a special interest for you as having been the earliest known home of that branch of the Darlington family from which the American Darlingtons are descended. Brookhouses, or Brook House (as it appears to be now called), is a farmhouse not far from Whitegate Church. I have not seen the present building. I should certainly have made a special effort to do so, had the present house been partially, or wholly, the same as that occupied by the Darlington family 300 years or more ago. But I am informed by the vicar of the parish that the present house is quite new, having taken the place of an older one which was pulled down some few years ago. Even the latter may quite possibly not have been the same as that which

occupied the site 300 years ago. However that may be, the farm itself remained in the occupation or possession of the Darlingtons for several generations, and it seems worth while to follow its fortunes up to the time when it finally passed into other hands.

"How long it had been in the possession of the family before the time of Edmund Darlington I have no means of ascertaining. After the death of Edmund's widow in 1602, Thomas Darlington went to live at Brookhouses with his wife and a large family, of whom more anon. He died in 1617, and soon after that we find the house in the possession of John Darlington, his eldest son, born in 1574. John Darlington died in 1633. His two children, Thomas and Ellen, being both minors, the farm passed into the hands of Richard Darlington, his younger brother, born in 1588. This Richard, who married in 1619 Anne Darlington, his cousin (and the sister of Job and Hugh, ancestors respectively of the American and Aston branches of the family), lived at Brookhouses until his death in 1667. At the time of his death, and for more than a quarter of a century previously, he was an Alderman (presumably of the Borough of Over). He left a large family, none of whom appear to have lived at Brook House after 1676, in which year his wife, Anne Darlington, died. With respect to this good lady, the following curious entry in the Marriage License Act books in the Diocesan Registry at Chester shows that in her old age she practised an important branch of the Aesculapian Art: '4 Nov., 1662. Concessa fuit licencia Annæ Darlington, uxori Ricardi de Brookhouse, ad exercendum officium obstetricis."

Edmund died, leaving a will proven in 1580. This will in substance was as follows: First, he gives his soul to Almightie God, and his body to be buried in Whitegate churchyard; & he gives 11s. VId. to the reparation of the said church.

. . . His messuage and tenement he leaves to his wife Marjorie, as long as she shall remain "sole, unmarried, and without husbond": After her death, the same is to descend to his daughter Margaret, if the said Margaret will be guided "in the choosinge of her husbond by the consent of the said

Marjorie and others my frends." But if Margaret will not "be ordered in the choosinge of her husbond in manner aforesaid, then my well is that the said Marjorie in her wydowhood shall assign and bequeath the said messuage and tenement and appurtenance thereof unto which soever of my children the said Margaret and my frends shall repose the best creditt. And if it shall happen that the said Marjorie shall depart her naturall lyfe or marie . . . before the full end and term of XII. years next ensuing," then he willed that the said messuage and tenement should be occupied and used immediately after the death of the said Marjorie "for the use of all my said children by Robert and John Darlington, my natural brothers, and by John Billington, brother of the said Marjorie, for and during so many years as . . . " (here original is illegible). Finally, he declares that his "Special will is that if the said Marjorie, my wyfe, shall marie or take to herself another husbond," then "before such marriage, the said Marjorie shall avoid from said house and tenement." After providing for the payment of debts and "funerall expenses," he makes his wife Marjoric residuary legatee, and appoints Robert Darlington, his brother, executor,

A "trewe and right inventorie of the goodes, cattailes and chattelles of Edmond Darlington of Brookhouses" is attached to the will, and purports to have been "taken, made and praised by . . . Themas Darlington" and others. As this Thomas Darlington succeeded to the possession of Brookhouses after the death of Marjorie Darlington in 1602, it seems a fair inference that, like Robert and John, he was the brother of Edmund Darlington.

Marjorie did not get married. She continued to live at Brookhouses for twenty-two years after the death of her husband. She was buried in Whitegate churchyard in May. 1602, and her will, made the same year, is preserved in the District Probate Registry at Chester. After giving in the usual fashion of words "Her soul to Almighty God &c, her body to Christian burial, and especially in the Church of Whitegate, where my late husbond was buried," she proceeds to devise the bulk of her estate to her daughter Margaret and her chil-

dren. (Margaret had evidently allowed herself to be properly guided in the "choosinge of a husbond.") She also especially bequeaths to Margaret "All my meat boards, the boards, shelves and cupboards which now are in my buttery, my dishboard, and my second best bed stock, wherein my daughter Ellinor usually lieth." To her daughter Katharen she gives "my best smock," and there are also bequests to her only godchild, and to the church work of the parish. The residue of the estate is to be equally divided between her daughters Ellinor and Isabell, who are appointed executors. The inventory attached to the will of Marjorie describes her as "of Brookhouses."

Edmund and Marjorie left four daughters: Margaret, Catharine, Ellinor and Isabell.

2. Thomas Darlington, succeeded to Brookhouses in 1602, on the death of Marjorie, widow of his brother Edmund. At that time he had been married some thirty years to Ellen Walker, the date of their marriage being given in the Whitegate register as May 24, 1572. Ellen Walker must have been young at the time of her marriage, for she lived until 1632, and between the birth of her eldest daughter Marjorie in 1573 and that of her youngest, who was baptized in 1600, she had borne six other children. The youngest child but one, Richard, was born in 1588, so that a period of twelve years elapsed between his birth and that of his sister Elizabeth (unless we suppose that the baptism of the latter was deferred unusually long). Be that as it may, it is in Elizabeth, the child of the old age of Thomas and Ellen Darlington, that we are specially interested, for she it was who married, in 1616, Job Darlington, her cousin, the ancestor of the American branch of the family. Three years later the two families were brought into still closer connection by the marriage of Elizabeth's brother Richard to Anne, the eldest sister of Job.

Thomas died in 1617, leaving issue, Marjorie, John, Margaret, Ralph, Catharine, William, Richard, Elizabeth.

3. ROBERT DARLINGTON. Nothing further known of him. He appears to have left no issue.

- 4. John Darlington left issue, Raffe (-Ralph) and seven others, as appears from the will of (6) Randle Darlington.
- 5. RICHARD DARLINGTON. He lived in Whitegate parish, but the exact place is not known. As his sons Job and Hugh lived at Darnhall, he probably lived there too. He was church warden of Whitegate in 1614, and was probably alive in 1641, as his nephew, Richard, of Brookhouses, is in that year described as Richard Darlington, *Junior*. In 1589 he married Catharine Threlfall (Whitegate) and left issue, Alice, Richard, Anne, Job, Hugh, and Abraham. He is the ancestor of the Apperican line.
- 6. RANDLE DARLINGTON. He married (Whitegate, September 23, 1594) Margaret Darlington, but the degree of kinship between them has not been ascertained. Five children were born of the marriage, viz., Randle, Margaret, Edmund, Richard and Elizabeth. Of these the deaths of three, viz., Randle, Edmund and Elizabeth, are recorded in the Whitegate registers, but all seem to have died before Randle made his will in 1611, for in this will there is no mention of either wife or children. The following relatives are mentioned in the will: Ales Barker, wife of Humphrey Barker (in connection with which note the following entry in the Whitegate Registers: "Feb. 5, 1606, Humphrey Barker, of the parish of Over, and Alice Darlington, of this parish, were married"), Richard Wilcockson, als. Darlington, "half sonne to my brother Robert Darlington"; Margaret Darlington, "daughter of Richard Darlington"; also Ales Darlington, "daughter of the same Richard," and again, "the five children of the said Richard Darlington, my brother, Richard, Hugh, Abraham, Ales, Anne"; Raffe, "son to John Darlington," and again, "the seven children of my brother, John Darlington"; "the four children of my sister who hath married John Cartwright"; Joane Darlington, "daughter of the said Raffe Darlington." His "brother Richard" is appointed overseer of the will.

In this will he mentions all his brother Richard's children, except (30) Job Darlington, the great-grandfather of the American immigrants.

Children of (1) Edmund and Marjorie (Billington) Darlington, of Brookhouses.

The registers show the date of baptism, not of birth, but as baptism usually took place shortly after birth, the date of baptism may be assumed to be approximately that of birth, in the absence of evidence to the contrary. N. B.—Wherever in the following account the date of a baptism is given, the information may be taken to have been obtained from the Whitegate registers, unless the contrary is stated.

Children of (2) Thomas and Ellen (Walker) Darlington, of Brookhouses.

- 14. RALPH, bap. December 13, 1579. He is named as the executor of the will of his brother, (12) John of Brookhouses, who also bequeathes a legacy to Ralph's son John, apparently his god-child. This son John is the only one who can be assigned to (14) Ralph with absolute certainty, but the indications point to the identification of (14) Ralph with Ralph Darlington, of Pettypool, who appears in the Whitegate registers as the father of George (1626), Ralph (1629), Randle (1632), Elizabeth (1635), Anne (1637), Jane (1639). Ralph Darlington died in 1642. Ralph Darlington, the younger, of Pettypool, married Alice Siddons in 1655 and had two daughters, both of whom died in childhood. He died in 1664. A certain Thomas Darlington (see 43), and Prudence his wife, are mentioned as living at Pettypool at the same time as the

younger Ralph and his wife, which may suggest that Pettypool is to be taken rather as the name of a locality than of a house.

This Job is the ancestor of the American line. At the age of nineteen he married, in 1616, his cousin (18) Elizabeth Darlington, aged sixteen, daughter of Thomas Darlington, of Brookhouses. He is the only one of his father's children not mentioned in the will (1611) of his uncle, Randle Darlington. Why he was omitted is not apparent. He was church warden of Whitegate in 1624-1625, and probably lived at Darnhall.

Among the names of persons belonging to Over who signed a certain Remonstrance, or Declaration of the Inhabitants of

the County of Chester, in the year 1641, are those of Job Darlington, Richard Darlington and Richard Darlington (Ir.). Job is almost certainly (30); Richard, Ir., is equally certainly (17), and Richard may be either (5) or (28), but probably the former. The remonstrance is in manuscript, and the original signatures are appended to it, which gives it special interest. In 1641 England was on the eve of the armed struggle between the King and Parliament, the first battle of the Civil War being fought at Edgehill in 1642. Job Darlington and the other members of the family who signed this petition evidently belonged to the peaceful and moderate party, who occupied a middle position between the extreme Royalists on the one side and unbending Roundheads on the other. The signatories to this remonstrance or declaration "declare that (accordinge to our Allegeaunce and our sollemne protestation, our vowes being in Heaven), wee are resolved to spend our lives and fortunes in ve service and defence of both. In maintenance of his Majesties Royall and sacred person, honour & prerogative, and in preservacon of the Parliament, and just priviledges thereof, of our true and undoubted Religion, lawes, proprieties, and liberties, which are deposited for our use and availe in that great and wise Councell, &c., &c." Brit. Mus. Harl., MS. No. 2107.

The remonstrance was also signed by John and Matthew Darlington, who appear to belong to a family living at the time at Old Marken, in Whitegate parish, but enough is not known of them to include them in this genealogy.

- 31. Hugh, bap. 1599 (Over). He married and died in 1664, leaving issue, John and Dorothy. His will describes him as "of Darnhall," and he is also so described in the register of his burial at Over, May, 1664.

41. John.

See also (63)-(69), and observations sub (14).

Child of (16) William Darlington.

42. John.

Children of (17) Richard and (29) Anne (Darlington) Darlington, of Brookhouses.

43. Thomas, bap. 1625.

Thomas Darlington, of Pettypool, had by his wife Prudence, who died in 1687, issue Ralph, Ellinor, Thomas, John. Who this Thomas Darlington was is not quite certain, but upon the whole it seems reasonable to identify him with (43) Thomas Darlington, son of Richard, of Brookhouses, born in 1625. The latter, by his will, dated 1667, bequeathed "One moiety of the Messuage, lands and premises belonging to the Brookhouse, of which I stand possessed," to his wife Anne; and the other moiety he left to his son Thomas, subject to certain charges for the benefit of the younger children. Thomas, however, does not appear to have lived at Brookhouses either before or after his mother's decease; and this would be naturally explained if he already occupied a farm in close proximity to Brookhouses. Pettypool is close to Whitegate Church. See observations under 14 and also Nos. 69 to 72.

44. John, bap. 1627. Issue Job, Mary (bap. 1652), and Anne.

George probably lived at Darnhall.

whose births are recorded in the Whitegate register should be assigned to (17), and which to (28) as the names of both parents are the same. But in the case of the *sons* assigned above to (17) there is no doubt, as they are all mentioned in the will of Richard Darlington, of Brookhouses." Another son of Richard, of Brookhouses, called Robert, whose baptismal register has not been found, but who is mentioned in the will of (12) John, was buried at Whitegate in 1657.

Barker, of Over, and had issue John, Ellinor, Elizabeth and Richard, a posthumous child. His eldest son John, born in 1668, is not mentioned in his will, which may simply imply that the child was otherwise provided for, probably by his mother, who had independent means.

In his will he appoints as overseers his "loving cozens Matthew Darlington, of Little Budworth, and Job Darlington, his brother." They are (73) and (76).

73. MATTHEW. Baptismal register not found. He lived in Little Budworth about 1668-1674, and seems to have moved later to a place called Somerford Booths, near Congleton, and

to have died there, but was buried at Over in 1702. He left no will, and administration was granted to his brother, Job Darlington, of Darnhall, as next of kin. The inference from this is that he left no children. One daughter, Elizabeth, was buried at Little Budworth in 1668.

75. Ann. bap. 1654: married, first, Shaw (see her first letter to Abraham); second, Randle Amson, of Bostock, who is said in the correspondence, under date January 30, 1718-9, to have died in May, 1716, but must really have died a year later, as he made his will on the 28th of April, 1717. This will is interesting for the light which it throws upon matters mentioned in the correspondence. He left to his wife Ann £10 yearly during her life, viz., eight pounds from Shipbrook, and forty shillings from Bostock tenement; also "one cow at her choyse, and a third part of the houshold goods (not meaning or intending the stock upon land or husbandry ware of any kind) and the little parlor below the entry for a lodging-room, and the best seat or seat-room at her choyse by the fire in the house during her naturall life." To his daughter, Mary Amson, he bequeathes £100, with a cow and a third part of the household goods, like her mother. To his step-son, John Shaw, he left twenty pounds, "to be imployed toward repairing his leas in Sumerford Booths." His son, Randle Amson, was made residuary legatee. "Also my will is that my wife and children shall live together, and that she shall rule and govern them and all concearns as if i were liveing untill such time as my son Randle shall attain the age of one and twenty years." His wife, Ann. and his brother-in-law, Randle Yonde, of Little Budworth. are made executors, and William Wrench, another brother-inlaw, overseer. One of the witnesses to the will is (76) "Jobe Darlington." We learn from the letter of Ann Amson to Abraham Darlington, dated 15th January, 1736-7, that she had then only two children alive, who are probably to be identified as John Shaw and Mary Amson. There is nothing to show that Randle Amson, the younger, was her own child.

76. Job, bap. November, 1655, at Whitegate. He lived at Darnhall, as appears elsewhere (see No. 73), and, as is known

from his letters to Abraham, the emigrant, his son. On November 27th, 1680, he obtained from the Bishop's Court at Chester a license to be married to Mary Neild, of Budworth Parva. According to the terms of the license, the marriage ceremony was permitted to take place at Great Budworth, Little Budworth, or Witton. It was actually performed on the 6th of December next following at Witton Parish Church, i. e., at Nantwich.

Mary Darlington died December 18, 1728, and was buried at Over. Job was churchwarden of Whitegate in 1700 and died in August, 1731, and was buried at Over. He left a will as follows:

"In ye name of God Amen. I Job Darlington of Darnhall in ve parish of White-gate & County of Chester, Yeoman, being weak but of sound & perfect mind & memory blessed be Almighty God for it do make & ordain this my last Will & Testament in manner and form following upon ve twentieth day of December in ve year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & thirty. First I give & bequeath my Soul to Almighty God yt gave it mee hoping vt he will forgive mee all my Sins through ve Merits of my Blessed Lord & Saviour Jesus Christ who hath Redeemed mee by His Death and Passion by true faith & belief in Him & my body to be buried at ve direction of my Executors hereafter named in this my last Will & Testament. Imprimis, my Will and mind is vt my Son Mathew Darlington shall maintain my daughter Jane with meat drink & sufficient apparrell fitting for one in her condition & upon consideration yt they cannot agree to live together then she shall have four pound ten shillings paid her yearly during her life, to be paid her one half on Michaelmas Day & ye other upon Lady Day at even and equal payments, ve first payment to be paid on ve first Feast after my decese. Item, my mind and Will is vt my Son Joseph Darlington shall have my estate at Darnhall & all appurtenances thereto belonging during ye term of my life & yt he shall pay my Daughter Mary Four pound yearly or sufficient Menteanance after her husband's discese during her life and mentenance in ve meantime upon condition of her Husband be not able to maintain her upon consideration vt she will come to live with my Son Joseph. Furthermore I do nominate & appoint my sons Mathew & Joseph Darlington to be my true & lawfull Executors to see this my last Will & Testament perform'd———

JOB DARLINGTON (L. S.) ——Seal'd sign'd and declared in the presents of ——RICHARD DAVENPORT ——JOSEPH DARLINGTON ——RICHARD DAVENPORT. Witnesses ——Proved in the Consistory of Chester the second day of June, 1733.

He left issue Matthew, Mary, Jane, Abraham, Joseph, Daniel, John.

This John may be identical with (141), John Darlington. (See Burland Branch). This identification rests upon the fact, which is sufficiently well attested, that the Aston and Burland Darlingtons of the next generation were cousins; the marriage register of (141), John (of Brindley), with Elizabeth, has so far not been found, and until the contrary is shown, the possibility will remain that she may be identical with (82), Elizabeth, which would equally well account for the cousinship.

- 82. ELIZABETH, bap. 1672 (Whitegate).

83. RICHARD, a posthumous child, born 1674 (Whitegate). He is the "cousin Richard" of the correspondence between Job and his son, Abraham. He married twice (first), 1699, Mary Anderton, of Whitegate, who died February 17, 1716 (Whitegate), and (second), on the 24th of November, 1718, Mary Cocksey, of the parish of Acton. The death of the first wife is referred to in the correspondence, under date of May 2, 1717; and the second marriage is mentioned under date of 30th of January, 1718-9. He lived at Darnhall until his second marriage, when he moved to Aston juxta Mondrum in Acton parish. He died in 1736 and was buried, not at Acton, but at Over, by the side of his first wife, as is recorded in the Over registers.

on October 31, 1736, and he is there described as "Richard Darlington, yeoman, of Acton." By his first wife he had several children, of whom one son, John, and several daughters (all married), survived him; also two sons, Abraham and Benjamin, by his second marriage. He had property in Darnhall and in Aston, and by his will, dated 1735, proven 1739, he left the Darnhall estate to his elder son, John, of the first marriage, and the Aston property to Abraham, the son of the second marriage. He was churchwarden of Whitegate in 1708.*

Child of (73) Matthew Darlington, of Little Budworth.

84. Elizabeth, died 1668.

Children of (76) Job and Mary (Nield) Darlington, of Darnhall.

85. MATTHEW, bap, May 3, 1683 (Whitegate).

In a letter of 30th January, 1718-9 (76), Job, writes to (86). Abraham, that Matthew is a miller at Stableford Mill and "hath married a young woman that hath a father and mother, but neither brother nor sister, and she is heir to a pretty tenement." But in a letter of May 30, 1721, Job writes that "Your brother Matthew hath light of a wife worth a hundred and fifty pounds. . . . his father-in-law is very hard and likewise very poor." In 1733 (88) Joseph, writes to Abraham that "Your brother Matthew is married to a woman in Dudon and has four children and has been married near 15 years and is now in good health." So that he married about January 30, 1718-9, at the time Job wrote first about it. Ann Amson writes 15 January, 1736-7, "Your brother Matthew is married but very poorly and lives very low in the world." And on April 3, 1746, Joseph writes that Matthew had sold his interest in the farm at Darnhall (apparently to Joseph), and was living in Darnhall or Over parish. So he did not seem to prosper. He had four children before 1733, the deaths of two of whom, Martha and

^{*} There was an Abraham Darlington, settled at Wilkesley, in Audlem parish, who died in 1756, leaving a will. This line continued for many years, and held a position of wealth and importance. The appointment of Abraham Darlington, of Wilkesley, as one of the valuers under the will of (83) Richard Darlington, points to a connection between the Wilkesley and the Aston branches, but this connection has not been fully investigated.

Jane, are recorded in the Over registers in 1736 and 1740 respectively.

86. Aeraham, bap. March 13, 1689-90, at Whitegate. This is the American immigrant.

Dr. William Darlington stated in the Clan Book of 1853, and it has been generally believed, that Abraham Darlington came to Pennsylvania about 1711. But he was married then, and must therefore have been in the country some time before. His aunt (75) Ann Amson, writes that she was "Ann Shaw, when you left the country" (p. 69). She was born in 1654 [see under (75)], and could scarcely have had children after she was fifty, viz., after 1704; therefore, if either of the Amson children mentioned in her husband, Randle's, will were her own, and she is called therein the mother of Mary Amson, Abraham must have left England before 1704. Of course her recollection may have deceived her as to the date of his leaving, but Dr. William Darlington in his oration in 1853 stated that there was a tradition that Abraham did not serve out the whole term of his apprenticeship, which began in 1701.

Mr. Thomas Darlington writes: "Before leaving the Darnhall branch of the family, however, I may briefly refer to the light thrown by entries in the parish registers upon a subject which I am aware is especially interesting to many of the Darlington family in Pennsylvania, namely, the connection of the family of their ancestor, Abraham Darlington, with the Society of Friends. There is no evidence whatever of the connection of any member of the family in England at this time with any religious body outside the Church of England. On the contrary, the post of churchwarden at Whitegate was frequently held by a member of the family. Matthew Darlington, for example, held this office in 1603, Job Darlington in 1624 and 1625. Richard Darlington (probably (17), Richard, of Brookhouses), was sidesman in 1638, and churchwarden in 1660; Job Darlington, the ancestor of the American branch, was churchwarden in 1700; and Richard Darlington in 1708. The last named, Richard, was the "cousin Richard" of the eighteenth century correspondence. After he removed to the parish of Acton, the office of churchwarden continued to be filled in that

parish from time to time by members of his branch of the family, but I am unable to give dates in this case."

87. Daniel, bap. June 19, 1692, at Whitegate. He probably

died young.

- 88. Joseph, bap. December 3, 1694, at Whitegate. Married in 1722 Hannah, daughter of Samuel Tomlinson, of Darnhall, He lived at Darnhall and resided on his father's farm, buying out his brother. Matthew, and adding to it the farm of Joseph Jellicoe, so that he was probably in a comfortable position in life. He had seven children, three boys and four girls, in 1733. as he then wrote to Abraham. By his will, which is dated 1763, he left certain estates in Clayanger and Barthomley to his son, John Darlington, who was, however, only to come into the enjoyment of them after the decease of the testator's wife, Hannah Darlington, or at the age of twenty-one, if she should die previously; meantime trustees were appointed. The goods and chattels now settled on his son, Joseph Darlington, were to be his full share and part. Legacies were left to his three daughters, Elizabeth, wife of Joseph Hassall; Mary, wife of Joseph Robinson, and Ellinor Darlington. To his daughter-in-law, Elin, "I only give one shilling, etc." The will is witnessed by Jane Darlington, the sister, who, as we learn from the letter dated April 3. 1746, lived with the testator.*
- 89. MARY. "Married a man in Haslington, a blacksmith, and has no children." Joseph's letter, October 20, 1733.
- 90. Jane. She did not marry, and lived with her brother. Joseph, in Darnhall.
- 91. John. This is the brother who came to America, after Abraham, or with him. There is no entry of the birth of (89) Mary; (90) Jane, or (91) John, in the Whitegate register.

A branch of the family, which there is some reason to believe

was closely connected with the Aston branch, was settled at Wilkesley, in the parish of Audlem, during a portion of last century, and seems to have enjoyed a position of some wealth and influence.

139. ABRAHAM DARLINGTON, of Dodcott, cum Wilkesley, is named in the will of Richard Darlington, of Aston, proven in 1736. This Abraham died twenty years later, leaving property to his son, Abraham, and to the children of his late son, John.

140. ABRAHAM DARLINGTON (the second), of Dodcott, cum Wilkesley, died in 1782, leaving an only son, John, who is described as of Copthall Buildings, in the parish of St. Stephen, London, E. C.

THE BURLAND BRANCH.

This branch has been settled, and has owned property, at Burland and Brindley, in the parish of Acton, since the early part of the eighteenth century. The Burland property is now in the hands of Mrs. Elizabeth Darlington, aunt of Mr. Thomas Darlington, our visitor of 1894. The Brindley property passed out of the name nearly a hundred years ago.

141. John Darlington (see 80), of Brindley, settled at Brindley, in the parish of Acton, about the year 1700. He had by his wife, Elizabeth, two children, (142) Abraham (afterwards of Burland), baptized November 22, 1704, and (142½) Thomas (afterwards of Brindley), bap. April 5, 1715; and, it is thought, another son, John, born about 1707, whose baptismal register has not been found. Elizabeth, the mother of these children, died in 1728, and her husband some five yeafs later.

142, ABRAHAM DARLINGTON (of Brindley, afterwards of Burland), married in 1739 Phœbe Pulford, of the parish of Malpas, and had:

Thomas Darlington (161) married in 1888 Annie Edith Bainbridge. His children are as follows: (167) William Aubrey Cecil, 1800: (167) Edith Rosalind, 1803; (169) Ethel Irene, 1896; (170) Dorothy Gwenllian, 1899. Lois (162) married Thomas Hockenhull and has one son (171) Thomas Darlington Hockenhull. Joseph (163) married Eva Parker and has one daughter (172) Marian, and one son (173) Richard. Leonard (166) is unmarried and resides at Grahamstown, South Africa.

We may add here a few biographical particulars with regard to Mr. Thomas Darlington (161), which will be of interest, especially to those who attended the bi-centennial gathering in 1894. Mr. Darlington was born at Burland on February 22, 1864, and received his early education at Acton Grammar School and Whitechurch Grammar School; he afterwards pro-

ceeded to The Leys, a well known public school at Cambridge, whence he entered St. John's College, Cambridge. He passed through his University course with distinction, becoming first Scholar and then Fellow of St. John's College. He was also Classical University Scholar of the University of London, and qualified for the Gold Medal in Classics at the examination for the degree of M. A. He is thus a Master of Arts, both of the Cambridge and London Universities. He has held several important educational appointments, including a mastership at Rugby (perhaps the most famous of English schools), the principalship of Oueen's College, Taunton, and the secretaryship of the University of Wales, and he is now Her Majesty's inspector of schools for Mid-Wales. He has published several books, including a work on "The Folkspeech of South Cheshire"; and he has contributed articles in Welsh and English on historical. literary and other subjects, to some of the leading magazines of England and Wales. He has recently been entrusted by the British Government with the duty of visting Russia and reporting upon the Russian educational system.

Abraham Darlington (151), of Burwardsley, born at Burland in 1808, married Mary Jackson in 1837, and had issue:

174. JOHN, born 1837, now living at Parry Sound, Ontario, Canada, has a family, number not ascertained.

175. RICHARD, emigrated to Australia, and is now dead, leaving three daughters, all married.

176. Phoebe, born 1840, married Robert Kinsey, and has two daughters living.

177. Job, born 1842, married Miss Millard, of Donoughmore, County Cork, Ireland; lives at Donoughmore, and has issue. Job (now living at Burland), and other sons and daughters.

178. Benjamin, born 18.45, married Jane Brereton, of Harthill, lives at Barrow, near Chester, and has two sons and two daughters.

179. ABRAHAM, born 1847, married Phœbe Darlington, of Burland, in 1873, also lives at Barrow, and has issue: Abraham (1874); Daniel Herbert (1877); Mabel (1879); Lois (1882); Phœbe (1887).

180. SOLOMON, born 1849, married Elizabeth Darlington, of Burland, and died without issue.

Another family, closely associated with the Burland branch, lived during last century at Brindley Hall, also in the parish of Acton, but not to be confused with Brindley Old Hall, which was owned at the same period by one of the Aston Darlingtons. John Darlington, of Brindley Hall, was born in 1707 and died in 1778. He left an only daughter, Elizabeth, who married another John Darlington, born in 1740, died at Brindley Hall in 1802. How the two John Darlingtons were connected together (otherwise than by marriage), is not quite clear.

THE WYBUNBURY BRANCH.

The history of this branch during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries was investigated primarily with the view of ascertaining whether Robert Darlington, of Hatherton (see below), could be proved to be identical with (3), Robert Darlington, of the Darnhall and Whitegate line. It was soon found that the two Roberts were different, and that any connection between the Wybunbury and Whitegate families must be sought for in an earlier generation, possibly in the one immediately preceding that of the two Roberts. As the later history of the Wybunbury line appeared to throw no light upon the history of the Darnhall family, it was not deemed necessary to pursue the investigation into the eighteenth century. But it is thought worth while to record the results of the investigation here, so that they may form a point of departure for further research, if such should be undertaken.

The history of the Wybunbury family, so far as it has yet been investigated, begins with a dispute about a will. The depositions in the case are preserved at the Chester Diocesan Registry, and though they are clearly only a fragment, they are still sufficient not only to enable us to determine the relationship of the principal persons concerned, but also to give us an interesting glimpse of the life of our forefathers in a quiet Cheshire parish in the days of good Queen Bess.

The story is briefly as follows: (182), Edmund Darlington,

of the parish of Wybunbury, died on the 25th of October, 1583. Shortly before his death he made a will in the presence of his father (181), Radulphus (or Ralph) Darlington, his brother (183). George Darlington, and Isabella Darlington, who appears to have been his sister-in-law. He named Thomas Holland, his uncle-in-law, and Margery, his wife, executors of the will, and Richard Darlington, his "base sonne," was also named either as an executor or an overseer. Ralph Darlington took charge of the will, intending to hand it over to Thomas Holland. and meantime put the will in his purse for greater safety. But alas! before he had an opportunity of delivering the will to Thomas Holland, the old man "wente to the newe castle," i. e. Newcastle under Lyme, in Staffordshire, "to the marquet thynkinge to buye a cowe there." The money intended for the purchase of the "cowe" he placed "in the sayde will in the sayde purse; and as he was tendinge the marguet, his purse was cutte; soo he loste the sayde will." This led to difficulty: somebody apparently it was another son (184) Robert, whose name also occurs in the depositions, but according thereto had not been mentioned in the will—was dissatisfied. We are given a glimpse of the old father's distress at having, by his misadventure at the fair, given occasion for strife in his family: "valde tristis in litem vocatur," is what the old record says of him. But we do not know, nor does it concern us at present to inquire how the matter was finally settled.

At the time the depositions were made George Darlington was forty years of age; his brother, Edmund, was probably older, as he left a son of sufficient age to be made an executor or overseer of his will; the youngest of the three brothers was probably Robert, who married, according to the Wybunbury registers, as late as 1576. The registers also record the marriage of Cicelye Darlington (whom we may suppose to have been a daughter of Ralph), with John Fletcher, in 1560. We shall probably not be far wrong if we place the birth of Ralph Darlington, who heads the Wybunbury line, at about 1510.

Edmund's son, Richard, was already dead at the time the depositions were taken. George left no male descendants.

For all the purposes of the late history, therefore, we are con-

cerned only with the descendants of (184), Robert Darlington, of Hatherton, who married Jane, or Joan Harding in 1576 and died in 1615, and those of Thomas Darlington, of Hough, who died in 1632; and we shall see that there is reason to believe that the Hough family was an offshoot of the Hatherton line.

184. Robert Darlington, of Hatherton, whose will was proven in 1615, left £1,00 to each of his children, (188) Edward, and (191) Anne, and the same sum (conditionally) to his son (186) Robert; legacies were also left to his daughter, Bridget (Taylor), and her son, John, and to (204) Edward, grandson of the testator, and son of the aforesaid Edward; his wife, Joan, was made residuary legatee, and she, with (189) Thomas Darlington, were named executors.

Of the above named children, the baptisms of Bridget and Robert only are recorded in the Wybunbury registers, which, however, contain an entry of the baptism of another son (187) Randle, not mentioned in the will; and we also find the death of "Francys, daughter of Jane Darlyngton, widow," recorded in 1621.

189. THOMAS DARLINGTON, of Hough, who died in 1632, left a will, in which he names the following relations:

Brothers, Edward, Randle, Robert. Sisters, Bridget and Jane. Sons, Thomas (mentioned as dead), and another son, unnamed in the will, and therefore his only surviving one (we learn from the register that his name was Robert). Daughters, Mary, Margaret (mentioned as a widow), Elizabeth, Rebecca, Sara and Frances.

All the sons and daughters of Thomas Darlington, of Hough, can be traced in the parish registers, which were pretty carefully kept after the year 1600. Before that date they were evidently not kept at all fully. However, the coincidence of the names of his brothers, Edward, Randle and Robert, and of his sister, Bridget, with those of the children of Robert Darlington (not to mention minor coincidences connected with the names of his sister, Jane, and his daughter, Frances), renders it almost certain that Thomas Darlington, of Hough, was the son of Robert Darlington, of Hatherton. The fact that he does not appear among the legatees of Robert may simply mean that

he was otherwise provided for. Randle is not named in the will, either, though he was undoubtedly the son of Robert.

Assuming this connection of the Hatherton and Hough families, we may present the Wybunbury line so far as the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries are concerned, as follows:

THE DAVENHAM BRANCH.

A very important branch of the family, off-shoots of which are settled respectively at Wigan, Chirk (Denbigh), and at Bourton, Warwickshire, trace their origin to Moulton or Bostock, in the parish of Davenham. Both these townships are about four miles from Darnhall. Information as to this branch of the family, so far as relates to its history during the last century and a quarter, has been furnished by Mr. Hayward Radcliffe Darlington, son of Mr. James Darlington, J. P. and D. L. of Bourton Hall. Warwickshire: and this has been supplemented by information obtained through the Vicar of Davenham, who has been kind enough to search the register of Davenham parish for the period between 1560 and 1770. The earliest register of this parish dates from 1560, but between 1560 and 1625 no Darlington entries have been found. There is a gap in the registers from 1625 to 1665. With the year 1683 (marriage of Ralph Darlington* and Alice Deacon), the Darlington entries begin.

The founder of the fortunes of this branch of the family was (242), Mr. Joseph Darlington, of Alison Hall, Lancashire, who appears by the Davenham register to have been the son of (241), William and Mary Darlington, of Bostock, and to have been born June 13, 1781. This William, who is represented by the family tradition as having died when his son, Joseph, was quite young, must have married late in life, as he is apparently the same William who appears in the Davenham baptismal register, under date of March 25, 1725, as the child of Ralph

and Alice Darlington, of Bostock. He was the youngest child of a large family, the eldest of which was born in 1703, but the parents are clearly not identical with the Ralph Darlington and Alice Deacon who were married in 1683.

242. Joseph Darlington, son of William, of Alison Hall, Lancashire, was born at Moulton June 13, 1781, and was christened at Davenham Church. He married Margery, only daughter of William Fisher, of Park Hall and Bradley Hall. Lancashire. He died in 1862, and is buried at Standish. He left issue (243) John (died 1852), who married Jane, daughter of Thomas Richard Weston, and left two daughters, both now dead, viz., Jane Scott, married Sackville Phelos, Newlands, Machynlleth, and Margaret Weston: (244) Ralph, of whom anon; (245) James, of whom anon; (246) Alice, who married the late Rev. W. G. Davies, rector of Cemmaes, Machynlleth, Montgomeryshire, and died in 1871, leaving two daughters, both dead; (247) Ellen, who married Dr. Thomas Fisher, and died a widow in 1802, without issue; (248) Elizabeth, who married Alfred Hewlett, of Haseley Manor, near Warwick, and has two daughters. Amy, married to Arthur Baldwin Woodcock, barrister-at-law, and Ada, unmarried.

P. for the County of Denbigh; (2521/2) William Robert Darlington, Solicitor, Perth, West Australia; (253) Anne Clayton Darlington, and (254) Ellen Jane Darlington. Mr. Ralph Darlington (244) was thrice Mayor and afterwards Town Clerk of Wigan, and was active and prominent in business and political affairs in his county. He died suddenly at sixty-six years of age, in 1890. His son (250) Henry Darlington, of Wigan, married Edith Blanche, daughter of Thomas Johnes Smith, Captain 65th Foot Regiment, and first Chief Constable of the County of Chester, and has issue (255) Henry Clayton; (256) Cecil Ralph; (257) John St. Clair; (258) Blanche Mary; (259) Sidney Harriet; (260) Eleanor.

245. JAMES DARLINGTON, J. P. and D. L., son of Joseph, of Bourton Hall, Rugby, was born November 11, 1827, at Adlington, and was educated at Northwich, near Davenham. married, September, 1861, Frances Radcliffe, daughter of John Radcliffe, Esq., of Radcliffe, Lancashire, and has issue three sons, (261) Hayward Radcliffe Darlington, M. A. and LL. M., barrister-at-law, who was educated at Harrow and Cambridge, and married Dora, daughter of John Sheriffe Hill; (262) Travers Taylor Darlington, died young; (263) Willoughby Scott Darlington; and six daughters, (264) Evelyn Mary; (265) Maude Frances, who married Harold Cave, son of Sir Lewis Cave (a judge of the High Court), and has two daughters, Marjory and Nancy, and a son, John Darlington; (266) Helena Radcliffe; (267) Lucy Elizabeth; (268) Agnes; (269) Constance Winifred. Mr. James Darlington (245) has led a very active life, being engaged in coal mining and associated therein with the late Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone, and in political matters in his county. He has held many public and official positions, is Deputy Lieutenant of the county, and has been in the Commission of the Peace since 1863; was High Sheriff of Warwickshire in 1886, and in 1880 was elected a member of the First County Council. Prior to his removal to Bourton Hall, Warwickshire, he resided at Meriden Hall, in the same county.

THE DARLINGTON COAT OF ARMS.

Some Darlingtons of England make use of a coat of arms as shown on the accompanying plate, of which the following is a description:

Arms: Azure guttee argent, on a fesse between three leopards' heads or, three cross crosslets gules.

Crest: A winged pillar, surmounted by a globe.

Motto: Cruce dum spiro spero.

This description of the Arms of Darlington is to be found in Fairburn's Crests, Vol. II., plate 33; in Burke's Heraldry, published in 1847 by Henry G. Bohn, York street, Covent Garden, London, and in a Book of Family Crests published in 1882 by Reeves & Turner, 196 Strand, London.


John Darlington, K. L., late of Netherwood, Ilkley, Yorkshire, England, wore the above coat, but used two crests, which he describes as follows:

Crest: A leopard's head and a winged pillar surmounted by a globe.

A set of china, decorated with his arms as described above, was presented by him to Mr. Stephen P. Darlington, of West Chester, after a visit by the latter, in 1875, to his house in Yorkshire.

The Darlingtons of America who use the arms generally use the coat as first described above, with slight variations. Thus, the descendants of Peter Darlington, of New York, (formerly of Edinburgh, Scotland), have the winged pillar without the surmounting globe. This coat and crest is also used by G. Darlington Richards, of New York.

Joseph G. Darlington, of Philadelphia, and Henry P. Darlington, of Chicago, use the coat and motto as above described,

but have as crest a leopard's head. It is to be noted, however, that the leopards' heads upon their shield and crest are larger than as shown on the plate herewith, and are full faced.

Mr. Henry P. Darlington in 1877 made inquiry in London on the subject, and obtained from Jarrett Brothers, London, England, an opinion sustaining the validity of the arms as used by him.

Mr. Thomas Darlington, of Hafodunos, Aberystwyth, Wales (formerly of London), who attended our reunion in 1894, in response to inquiries on the subject has written that he is unable to learn of any authentic grant of arms to anyone named Darlington, but that Darlington arms such as described above are, or have been, used in evident good faith by several families in England, though not by his own.

With the coming of the printing press and the schoolmaster, coat armor lost its former significance. When men learned to read, they no longer needed arms and seals to identify men and attest their formal deeds, and the only use now made of arms and crests is to show one's lineage from worthy ancestors.

The Heralds' College was charged in olden time with the registry of coats of arms and with all things pertaining to heraldry and ancestry. All royal grants of arms were registered there, because the registry involved the recording of the known pedigree of the recipient of the grant, and its decrees and rulings on the subject of coat armor were decisive. It was through the Heralds' College that we hoped to find our line of ancestry, provided we there found a registered grant of coat armor. But for the past 200 years its activity and its authority have steadily decreased, and many of the arms and crests now used in Great Britain are not to be found in the archives of the Heralds' College. Yet no one questions the authenticity of these arms, and the books published on the subject mention and describe them along with the duly registered coats of arms. In many instances arms were worn, even in the days when the Heralds' College was active and powerful, without being registered therein, such being the result of long usage in families, who knowing their right to the arms did not deem it necessary to register them.

It would therefore seem that the arms of Darlington, as shown on the plate herein, are in use by families of Darlington who trace their descent from Darlingtons of Cheshire and Yorkshire, whence came Abraham Darlington; and, though it cannot be positively asserted that his family has used them, any of his descendants who feel inclined to use them may do so without any hesitation, and free from any fear that it is an unwarranted assumption on their part.

ABRAHAM DARLINGTON, OF BIRMINGHAM.

The settlement of Virginia was begun at Jamestown in 1607; that of New England by "The Pilgrims," in 1620, at Plymouth; Maryland, at St. Mary's, in 1634, and Manhattan, now New York, by the Dutch, in 1623. While these colonies increased and prospered, comparatively little progress was made in the settlement of the intervening territory between New York and Maryland. The Swedes gained a permanent footing on the Delaware in 1638, but they never penetrated inland, and in 1693, or fifty-five years afterward, there were only 188 families, which included those on both sides of the river. This small increase may be due to the fact that in 1655 the Dutch overthrew the Swedish authority on the river, and they in turn were conquered by the English in 1664. With the advent of the Dutch rule the settlement on the South River, as the Delaware was styled, became a dependency of the government at New York. In 1675 John Fenwick led a colony of Friends to Salem, N. J., and in 1677 another like settlement was made at Burlington. William Penn, a prominent and wealthy Friend, having been interested in the New Jersey settlements, and desiring to found a colony where religious freedom might be enjoyed, obtained from King Charles II. a charter for the territory forming the present State of Pennsylvania. This was dated 4th of March, 1680 (1681 N.S.), and was granted largely in consideration of a debt of £16,000 due from the British Government to Admiral Sir William Penn, father of William Penn, above mentioned. The latter at once began to sell lands to prospective settlers, and prior to his embarking for his province, August 30, 1682, he had disposed of more than 500,000 acres.

Among these purchasers was Thomas Rowland, of Acton, in

Cheshire, who obtained 1,000 acres by deeds of lease and release, dated 2d and 3d of March, 1681-2. In an account of the persecutions of Friends, in 1683, it is stated that "Thomas Roland of Acton was also fined 5s., which a neighbor paid to keep him from prison, he having no goods left; for all his personal estate had been lately seized by an Exchequer Process for £20 per month, for absence from his Parish Church." Prior to this he had conveyed, by deed of May 22, 1682, one half of his purchase to "John Dutton, of Overton, in the said County, yeoman, and Mary his wife." A tradition in the Dutton family is to the effect that Thomas Rowland was an uncle to Mary Dutton, yet the consideration for the land sold to them was not less than the price at which William Penn was then selling land.

The story of persecutions further states that in 1681, "From one John Dutton, of Overton, the Prosecutors extorted a Demand of 7s. by forcibly haling him out of his House when his family were in Bed, carrying him to an Alehouse, and threatening instantly to send him to Goal; by which they so affrighted a Kinswoman of his that she paid them." (Besse's "Sufferings

of the Quakers," i. 108.)

It will be made to appear later that Mary Dutton was a Darlington before marriage. She, with her husband and four children, probably arrived in Pennsylvania in the summer of 1682, and by virtue of an order from the surveyor-general, dated 10th of 7th month (September) 1682, there was laid out for John Dutton, on the 8th of October following, 500 acres on the west side of Upland (now Chester) Creek, in what was organized soon after as Aston Township, Chester County.

The children of John and Mary Dutton were, John, b. 10 mo. 29, 1675, at Marbray, Cheshire; Edward, b. at Overton, 1 mo. 18, 1676-7; Thomas, born at same, 3 mo. 3, 1679; Elizabeth, born at same, 11 mo. 27, 1681; Robert, born in Pennsylvania. Of these, Elizabeth died in Pennsylvania 10 mo. 23, 1682. The descendants of the others are largely traced out in the Dutton Genealogy, published in 1871. John Dutton, the father, was buried 5 mo. 4, 1693, as shown by the records of Friends in Philadelphia; from which it would appear that his death occurred in that place.

Another purchaser of land from William Penn was John Nield, of Benton, in the County of Chester, England, who obtained 250 acres by deeds of 21st and 22d of March, 1681-2. According to the conditions and concessions agreed upon between William Penn and the early settlers, those who came into the province as servants were to have fifty acres of land at the end of their term of service, and this induced some who were not of the poorest to come in that capacity. We find that John Nield came as a servant with Thomas Janney, who arrived in the Delaware River 7 mo. 29, 1683. He was to serve five years from the date of arrival, and was to receive, in addition to the fifty acres from Penn, another fifty acres from his master. He appears to have been assigned by Janney to Robert Taylor, who also came from Cheshire. A survey of 250 acres was made for John Nield in Aston Township, next north of the Dutton tract. on the 10th of December, 1682. On the 12th of December, 1693, John Nield presented to the court a complaint against his late master, Robert Taylor, for not paying him "the custom of the country." This was probably a new suit of clothes at the expiration of his term. His master was ordered to pay him the said custom of the country.

In that day and place marriageable women were not long without suitors, and Mary Dutton became the wife of John Nield in a little more than a year after the death of her first husband. At a court held at Chester, 12th of September, 1694, articles of agreement were produced by George Strode, for the payment of certain annuities to John Nield and Mary his wife, during their lives, for the true performance of which a bond for £250 was also produced (dated 20th of August, 1694), which was probably about the date of the marriage.

At an Orphans' Court, 5th March, 1694-5, "William Brown and John Baldwin was called and appeared to answer the complaint of John Dutton, Edward Dutton and Thomas Dutton. The Court allowed that John Neeld & Mary his wife, at the request of the orphans, be guardians for the above named complainants, and do also allow Thomas Cartwright and Joel Baily as security for John Neald and Mary his wife, to the value of two hundred and fifty Pounds. And it is also ordered

that the old Guardian's accounts be paid and cleared before us at the Court by the new ones."

John Nield not being a Friend, the following action was taken by the women's monthly meeting, of Chester, 1st of 5th month, 1695: "The meeting orders Lydia Carter and Ann Brown to speak to Mary Neeld, to see if she be willing to condemn her taking of John Neeld to be her husband, he not being in the profession of the truth." At the next meeting the following humble acknowledgement was produced, which must have been considered quite sufficient:

"To Friends of ye Monthly Meeting of Chester:

"Dear Friends, whareas I tooke my husband John Neals, being not a friend nor so much as in ye profestion of truth, against ye mind of this meeting, which I am now sencibell have been to the dishonour of God, to the griefe & Reproch of his popell & to the Great hurt of my own condition both inwardly & outwardly; I do therefore hereby for the Clearing of truth & the obtaining the unity of friends againe, which I am sencibell was Justly broken by my marrying as abovesaid, Acknowledge my evill in soe doing; & that if I had not went nor Acted against but with the advice & in ye unity of this meeting I had not fallen into this snare soe much to ye Reproach of truth, nor to the wounding of my own soule as I have now done in this matter & I desire I may be a warning to all others that may be Concerned in ye like Case.

"MARY NEALL.

"ye 4th day of ye 6th month 1695."

In the tenth month, 1688, John Nield was a member of a petit jury, and in the first month, 1691, he was one of the grand jury. He was also at different times the constable and supervisor of the township of Aston.

From papers preserved by the Darlingtons of Chester County it appears that early in the eighteenth century two youths, Abraham and John Darlington, sons of Job and Mary Darlington, of Darnhall, a small township in Cheshire, about thirty-six miles from Liverpool, came to Pennsylvania. They were nephews of John and Mary Nield, and tradition says their coming was influenced by inducements held out by this uncle, which were not realized upon their arrival. Perhaps it may have been that John Nield, having no children of his own, had promised to do something for their advancement; but as it subsequently happened, after the death of their aunt he married a

young wife and had some children to provide for. There is just the possibility that John Nield was a brother to the mother of these young men, but the view here taken is that his wife was their father's sister.*

The oldest document preserved by the family is the following indenture of apprenticeship of Abraham Darlington to Jonathan Youde:

This Indenture, made the tenth day of January, in the thirteenth year of the Raign of our Sovraigne Lord king William by the grace of god over England, Scotland, France and Ireland, &c., and the year of our Lord god one thousand seven Hundred and One Between Job Darlington of Darnall in the County of Chester, yeamon, of the one part, and Jonathan Youde of Waverham in the said County aforesaid, sadler, of the other part.

Now this Indenture Witnesseth that the said Job Darlington for the Consederation of ten pounds ten shillings of good and Lawfull money of England to be paid att May next Ensueing after the Sealing of these saide Indentures by the said Job Darlington to the said Jonathan Youde and for the Consederation thereof the said Job Darlington doth and by these presents binde his son Abraham Darlington to the said Ionathan Youde to Learne his art, trade or mystery after the manner of an Apprentice to serve him from the day of the date hereof for and dureing the full Terme of seven years next ensueing; dureing which term the said Apprentice his saide master faithfully shall serve, his secrets keep, his Lawfull Commands gladly Every where obey; he shall do no damage to his said master nor see it to be done by others without Letting or giving notice thereof to his saide master: he shall not waste his saide master's goods nor Lend them unlawfully to any other persons; he shall not commit fornication nor contract matrimony within the said [Term?]: Att cards, dice or other unlawfull games he shall not play whereby his saide master shall incurr any damage with his owne goods nor the goods of others; he shall not absent himself day nor night from his master's service without his Leave; nor haunt Ale houses, Taverns nor play houses, but in all things behave himself as a true and faithfull Apprentice ought to do dureing the said term: and the said master shall use the utmost of his endevor to teach the said Apprentice in all things belonging to his trade as he can himself and Likewise to procure suffitient meat, drink, washing and Lodging and aporns during the whole term and to pay one

shilling every year to the sd Apprentice; and if the said Jonathan Youde shall dye within the said term he shall cause his Executers to chuse three men of the same trade for the said Job Darlington or his Executers to chuse one of them to teach the said Apprentice the Residue of his term by the charge of the said master Jonathan Youde: and for the due peformance of these agreements the said Job Darlington and his son Abraham Darlington do hereby respectively bind themselves to the said Jonathan Youde and their Respective Executors & administrators in the penall sum of twenty pounds of Lawfull English money in witness whereof the sd parties have hereunto Interchangably set theire hands and seals the day and veare first above written.

The date of Abraham Darlington's birth has been fixed at 1690, but this would make him very young at the time he was indentured as an apprentice. There is a tradition that he purchased a portion of his time in order to get sooner away to this country, yet this is doubtful. A letter from his parents, written in 1713, states that they had previously sent two letters, which would scarcely indicate an absence of five years on the part of the son. Were it not for the letters which have been preserved, the presence of the other brother, John, in this country, would now be unknown to the descendants of Abraham, as no public record thereof has been discovered.

Abraham Darlington had arrived in Pennsylvania as early as 1711, and had become somewhat affiliated with Friends, probably through the influence of his aunt, Mary Nield. There was no record kept at that time of those who joined in membership with this society. On the 28th of 11th month (Jan. O. S.), 1711, Abraham Darlington and Deborah Carter appeared at Chester Monthly Meeting of Friends and declared their intentions of marriage. Jacob Howell and John Remington were appointed by the men, and Mary Worley and Lydia Vernon by the women, to inquire into the clearness of the said parties

respectively. At the next meeting they again declared their intentions, and nothing appearing to obstruct, they were given liberty to accomplish their marriage according to the good order of Friends. John Sharples, Thomas Vernon, Mary Worley and Lydia Vernon were appointed to see that it was so accomplished, and on the 31st of 1st month (March), 1712, they made report to that effect.

Of John Darlington, tradition states that he went to Maryland. When or whom he married has not been discovered. Abraham appears to have established himself in his calling of a saddler at or near Chester. The earliest letter from their parents which has been preserved, is as follows:

DARNHALL, March of 28th, 1713.

DEAR SONS:

This is to Aquaint you That I Received two Leters from you, the one Dated the 21st of the 6th month 1712 the other the 24th of the 12 month 1711 that which was writ las as we Recd first And wee have sent two letters wee give thanks to Allmighty God for preserveing you and Pray to him Continually to preserve you and wee are glad to Hear Abraham hath married to please both himselfe and our Brothe whom wee hope will be aiding and Asisting to you both In our Abstance by giveing you good advice and wee pray that you will be Carefull of both soul and body for you are in a strang Country wee are all in good helth Blesed be Allmighty God for it we have no nuse in England but wee are like to have a generall peac with all nations McLees both are ded Natt: And Thomas wee are a Little trobled to hear you live so far from each other Samil Hewerd is married to Lewes Beavons daughtor of Waverham Coz. Richard Davenport's family are well and all desire to be Remembed to you and Rich Darlington's family ould George Rabon and Mary are both Liveing but she is very weak yong George Rabon is married good Abraham & John pray presen both our Dear Loves to our Dear brother John Neild and his wiffe our Dear Sister their sons unknown to us and all his familly hopeing thatt he will take a fatherly Care of you in our sted now you are so far of us [torn] hear John Call wee hear is in England In Cognito his wife is alive so no more at pesnt But our dear love to our Brother and sister and both of you praying to God for you all wee Rest your Dear father and mother

Respecting John Calley, the following minute was made at Concord Monthly Meeting, 4 mo. 14, 1708: "This meeting orders into the hands of John Dutton The sum of eight pounds for the use of John Cally towards his passage to England, he being taken by the french in Coming hither and sustained great loss thereby; which money the above said Cally promiseth to pay if Ever he com safe hither Again."

Joseph Carter, the father-in-law of Abraham Darlington. came from Cheshire, England, in 1608, and settled in Edgmont township, Chester (now Delaware) County, then or soon after, as he appeared at court in 1701 as constable for that township. At Chester Monthly Meeting, 9 mo. 28, 1698, "Joseph Carter, late of Newton meeting in Cheshire, in old England, produced his certivicate to ve satisfaction of the meeting." He may have been a widower at this time. He became a member of Providence particular meeting, a branch of Chester Monthly Meeting, and for a time appears to have been in good standing, but on 6 mg, 30, 1708, it is recorded that contrary to the advice of Friends he "hath actually married to one who doth not any wayes profess the truth with us," and is therefore disowned from membership. This marriage was to Sarah, widow of Richard Bond, and daughter of Allen Robinett. He afterward lived in Providence township, and later in Ridley.

The death of Deborah Darlington must have occurred as early as 1715, and we have no account of any issue by this marriage. On the 24th of 7th month, 1716, Abraham Darlington requested a certificate from Chester Monthly Meeting to that of Middletown, in Bucks County, in order to proceed in mar-

riage with Elizabeth Hillborn, daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth Hillborn. Joseph Coebourn and William Swarford were appointed to make inquiry as to his clearness of similar engagements with others. Two months later the following document was signed:

"From friends of Chester Monthly Meeting In the province of Pensilvania the 26th day of the 9th Month 1716,

"To friends of Middletown Monthly Meeting in the County of Bucks, Greeting:

"Dear friends, After the Salutation of indeared love, These are to Acquaint You that the Bearer hereof Abraham Darlington A member of Our Meeting have Signifyed Unto us his intention of Marriage with Elizabeth Hilbourn Daughter of Thomas & Elizabeth Hilbourn of Your Meeting, And requesteth our certificate on that account.

"Now These may certifie all whom it doth concern that according to the good Order Established amongst Friends due inquiry have been made concerning him And we do not find But that he is clear from all Other women In relation to Marriage & of an Orderly conversation So We recommend there further proceedings to your care and remain your friends and brethern in the truth.

At Middletown Monthly Meeting, 9 mo. 1, 1716: "Abraham Darlington and Elizabeth Hillborn, Jr., appeared at this meeting and declared their intentions of marriage with each other.

This being the first time, this meeting doth expect that the said Abraham do bring a certificate to our next monthly meeting from the monthly meeting to which he belongs to Certifie his clearness in matters relating to marriage & other things needful." Women Friends appointed Mara Wildman and Margaret Twining "to enquire into her clearness from all other men relating to marriage."

10 mo. 6, 1716: "At this meeting Abraham Darlington & Eliza. Hillborn, Jr., appeared and declared their intentions of marriage with each other; this being the second time, the said Abraham produced a certificate from Chester Monthly Meeting, to which he belongs, of his clearness in relation to marriage. Therefore this meeting doth give their consent and leaves them to their liberty to accomplish their marriage when they may see fit in the truth, and John Penguite & Zebulon Heston are appointed to see that they do it according to truth: And Thomas Hillborn requests that it may be at the house of Stephen Twining in Newtown which is granted." In the women's meeting, "account being given by those appointed to inquire that nothing is found but that she is clear from all others This meeting gives consent that they proceed on & also appoints Agnes Penquite and Ann Chapman to see that the marriage be orderly accomplished and make report thereof to the next monthly meeting,"

11 mo. 3, 1716: "The friends appointed to see Abraham Darlington and Elizabeth Hillborn's marriage decently accomplished do report that it was orderly and decently accomplished so far as they saw."

8 mo. 3, 1717: "Likewise Isabell Carter & Elizabeth Darlington desires each of them a certificate from this meeting, so the meeting appoints Ann Parsons and Mary Thwaites to draw them against the next monthly meeting." (Women's minutes, Middletown Mo. Mtg.)

At Chester Monthly Meeting (of women), 2 mo. 28, 1718, the following certificate was produced:

From our Women's Monthly Meeting, in Middletown, in Bucks County, the seventh day of the ninth month, one thousand seven hundred and seventeen, To the Monthly Meeting of Women Friends, held at Providence, in Chester County, Greeting: Whereas our friend, Elizabeth Darlington (being married amongst us and is removed to within the bounds of your meeting), hath requested of us a Certificate. These may therefore certify to you, or whom else it may concern, that she is the Daughter of honest Parents and hath been orderly in her conversation so far as we find, so that we have unity with her and do desire that the Lord may be with her and that she may grow in the Truth. And now recommending her unto your care we rest your friends and sisters in the unchangeable Truth.

Signed by order and in the presence of our said Meeting by

If Abraham Darlington actually resided for a time in the borough of Chester, he had removed to Aston township by 1715, being taxed there in that year to the amount of two shillings sixpence. He remained there till the year 1723. The site of his residence was pointed out to the late Dr. William Darlington by his father many years prior to 1850, near Village Green, but it is doubtful if any of the present generation is aware of the location. If he owned land in the township the deed does not appear to have been recorded. The next letter from his parents is dated in 1717.

Loving Chilldern & deare: After my deare Lov & youre mothers & All youre Brothers & Sisters to you This is to Let you understand That wee are all in good hellth At this presant ritting Blessed Be god for it & wee hop Thise Lines will find you in the same wee Are vary sory That our Letters do so much miscarry But wee have Receveed 3 letters from you & my Brother in A vary short Time consarning Both your wellfare & your gret los of friends * But wee must prayes god for The Crosis on us As well as for The Blising hee hath Bestod upon us But The 2 Last Letters Talkes That Robart dutton will come to Chesshire To see A Bout Brother Nelld consern & I was rejected By John Calle & I sent you A letter of the matter & you rit me word I must desist & I did so & my Brother Ever sinc hee went ffrom our house hath much douttet in mee But I never was * fallce To him nor no man ellce But Allis The Dont Like a repprobat Bridbat Reprochfull woman. My dear and loving Children. This is to acquaint you that I and your Mother and Brothers and Sisters are in good health at this present writing, blessed be God for it, & all other of his mercies bestowed upon us all. My cousin Richard Darlington and all his family are well, and desire to be remembered to you all; and he is married again. George Rathbon and his 2 sons, George and Thomas, remember to you all; and cousin Richard Davemort and all his family are in good health that are alive, but his Wife is dead; and Randle Amson died May, 1716. Brother John Done's Wife is dead. Your Brother Mathew followeth milling and grinding of corn, and rents a mill called Stableford Mill; and hath married a young Woman that hath a father and mother but neither Brother nor Sister, and she is heir to a pretty Tenement. Her fortune is thought to be worth £200. Good Children follow and observe and keep God's Word and commandments; for our Saviour Jesus Christ saith if you love me keep my commandments: St. John, the 14th Chapter and the 15th verse. Be sure to fear God with a pure heart; for the Lord looks upon the heart. Bring up a child in the fear of God when he is young and he will not depart from it when he is old. As for our part we live middlingly, not very rich nor very poor. England is a place of great Taxes for to defend us from great Enemies, both by sea and land. Good children remember my kind love and my wife's to Brother Neeld and his wife,* unknown, and our dear love and hearty prayers for you all. Good children send us word how you all stand and live, and how my poor child and thy dear Brother John doth, and all his do and live; and we hope his Wife hath better health. John Mason and his Sisters are gone out of Darnhall long since. Thy Brother Joseph is a jolley young man, bigger than thy Brother Mathew. As for my part I am deaf on the right side; hath been syringed with warm water and it doth me no good at all; But on the left ear I hear reasonably well,-blessed be God for all his mercies which he hath bestowed upon us: Likewise I am very lame of a hip, which is called a sciatica. And pray thee Abraham, send us word whether John Cally be alive or dead, or whether he ever made Neeld any account of his money which he took of him in Cheshire.

My dear son Abraham, I saw on Tuesday last, Joseph Carter, thy first father-in-law. Brother and he desired to be remembered to you all; and when you send again remember your love to many of your acquain-tances in Yorkshire, for many desire to be remembered to you all; so our prayers for you all. Knowledge and understanding come by reading of God's Word and good Books; and be sure to keep constant to prayer, for it is our duty so to do. So I rest with my Blessing to you all, and my prayers constantly for you all, whilst we remain thy dear father and mother.

Honest Abraham, I brought your father's [sent his—interlined] Letter with me to London but durst [not] deliver it as it was directed; for it was directed by way of London, and not coming by the Post, there is an act of Parliament of forfeiting five pounds for any Letter carried any Post road by any messenger: so this is my hand, who with love and service to you and Brother, I remain your loving friend,

The foregoing letter, evidently wholly written by Jos. Jellicoe, is directed "To Mr. Abraham Darlington, in the Township of Aston, in the County of Chester, near Chester Mill, in Pensilvany."

Chester Monthly Meeting included the particular meetings of Chester, Middletown, Providence and Springfield. Abraham Darlington frequently represented Chester Meeting at the monthly meeting, which was held at Providence, but on the 26th of 4th month, 1721, he requested a certificate to Concord and Chichester Monthly Meeting for the convenience of being joined to Chichester particular meeting, which was nearer to his residence. According to custom, persons were appointed by men's and women's meetings to make inquiry respecting him and his wife, and a certificate was signed for them at the next meeting, 5 mo. 31, 1721.

They continued to reside in Aston township until the spring of 1724, when they removed to a farm in Birmingham township, on the Brandywine Creek, which Abraham had purchased from James Miller and wife by the then customary form of conveyance, by lease and release, as follows:

It must be remembered that until 1752 the year began on March 25, so that the foregoing release was executed near the close of the year 1723, or, according to New Style, February 1, 1724.

The land so purchased is nearly comprised by the farms of Sellers Hoffman and Francis C. Biddle, the latter owning 102 acres of the eastern part, together with the site of the original buildings. Some of the timbers in the barn are said to have been taken from the old house.

Besides frequent service in the various township offices of constable, overseer of the poor and supervisor of the highways, Abraham Darlington also filled the office of coroner for Chester County. In that day the law prescribed that each elector should vote for two persons each for the offices of sheriff and coroner, and of the two receiving the highest number of votes the gov-

ernor made choice of one to serve in the designated capacity. Thus we find the following entries in the colonial records:

October 4, 1727: "For Chester County, John Taylor and Philip Taylor being returned for Sherifs, and Abraham Darlington & John Mendenhall for Coroners, John Taylor is appointed Sherif & John Mendenhall Coroner." "And Commissions are accordingly ordered to the said Persons for their respective Offices."

October 4, 1729: "For Chester County, John Taylor & John Owen being returned for Sherifs, & Robert Park & Abraham Darlington for Coroners, John Owen is appointed Sherif, & Abraham Darlington Coroner."

October 3, 1730: "For Chester County, John Owen & John Bennit being returned for Sherifs, & John Wharton & Abra. Darlington for Coroners, John Owen is appointed Sherif & John Wharton Coroner."

The next letter to Abraham Darlington from his connections in England was written by a good, officious old aunt, Ann Amson by name, not dated, but evidently soon after the decease of his father, in 1731.

DEARE COZN:

I haveing this opportunity by a nightbur sending to his Sister leving in your parte of ye Cuntry and she giving an account of you and promised to gett a letter to youre sister in Law and for this troble I begg your parden but being soe near a relation and desirous to heire from you and likewise your Brother John I was at ye funarall of your ffather I in Quaird of your welfaire and your Brothers but hee [Joseph?] would give me noe account nor directions how I might rite to you I maid all ye Inquary I could if your father had left you or brother any thing but could not find yt he had I desire at the recept of this will be so kind to send word how you both doe and when I know how to rite to you will send a full account of all afaires which is all but my Blessing to you both but desire ye first oppertunity heire from you and how to direct to you from you Loving ant

who was Ann Shaw when you Left ye Cuntry. Direct for mee at Bostock Green in Cheshire neer Middlewich.

The next letter is from Joseph and Hannah Darlington, and the superscription reads thus: For Abraham Darlington, Saddler, living in Birmingham, near Brandywine, in Chester county, Pennsylvania; to be left at the Pennsylvania Coffee House, in London. Post paid, 4d. Single sheet.

Oct'b'r ye 20th, 1733.

Ever Loving Brothers & Sisters after all our dear loves to you all presented earnestly desireing all your healths and welfare as we enjoy at this present I Received a letter from you dated the 12 of the 6th month which exceeding Rejoyced all our hearts after soe long a Time to hear from yea and that yea are yet alive & in the land of the liveing and that you have such a hopefull posterity and I earnestly beg of god all mighty to bless preserve & keep you in all your ways Our father and mother are both Dead my mother died the 18th of December 1728 & my father died two year since the last August I have been married about eleven years and in that time have had 7 children three boys and four Girls my wifes name is Hannah Daughter to Samuel Tomlinson of Darnal Your Brother Mathew is married to a woman in Dudon and has 4 children and has been marryed near 15 years and is now in good health Our sister Mary married a man in Haselington a Blacksmith and has noe children & they are in health. I live now at Joseph Jellicoes House and hould it all together with our own Estate & Blessed be all mighty God live very well & should be very Glad if yea had a mind once more to see your native Country; if not you if Brother John's old woman should happen to die, he haveing noe children, if he thought good I should be glad to see him. Our sister Jane is in good health and lives with me. our Relations George & Mary Rathbon are both dead a good while ago & their sons George and Thomas are both married & live both in Weverham George at the old house & Thomas at their other House Your old master Jonathan lives very well and is at Park Gate and married an old woman I can give no further account of Ralph Bassnett or for Reason he left this Country and the woman that brought your letter landed at Bristol which is allmost as far of as London and the letter but come to me by chance after it had lain a long time Joseph Jellicoe has sold his Estate to Mclee and was mentained by the Town before he dyed and his widow has at this time one shilling and six pence a week towards her mentainance. Cozen Davenports famyley and likewise Cozen Darlingtons family and most famileys Continue as they wear we all earnestly desire that you will send us a letter by the very first opportunity and direct for me to come by the way of London to be left at Namptwich at Thomas Pownal's in Beam street he was our school fello, we have nothing more that we can think of but our hearty prayers to God allmighty for your healths & prosperity & still shall Remain whilest we are your loving Brother & Sister

Three years later the good Aunt Amson wrote again to Abraham Darlington, as follows:

DEAR NEPHEW:

I Reed your Letter the 1st Jany 1736 which I am glad for to Hear of your Health and all other Relations and that I may Hear from you ownsh a year for to Know How you and all your ffameley and your Brother John Doe whilst I live in this world which will give me great sateffaction and as to your ffather will I have taken perticuler care for to make all the Enquire I can and I find that there is no will made as ffar as I can Larue and all the Answer I could get that he had nothing for to make a will on and your Brother Joseph saies that he will write to you and give you a full and Trew Account of all his ffathers circumstances at His Deth and your Brother Matt is married but very Poorely and Lives very Low in the world your Brother Joseph has put in 2 Lives in the Lease of your ffathers Estate and has it to Take up His money again. I have ownly Two Children alive which are Both married and Live very well and I Desire an Answer and Direct as you did before for me at Bostock Green which is all from your lovering Hant

The last letter from England which has been preserved, is from Joseph Darlington, and is as follows:

DARNHALL, April the 3d, 1746.

Loving Brothers, John & Abraham:

After our most affectionate Love presented to you, I having a convenient opportunity of sending to you by the hand of Darnall Gardiner's Son, this comes to let you know that we are all alive and in good health, praised be God. I live in the accustomed place,-my Sister Jane living with me. Mathew lives within the said Town. Mary lives in Haslington with her husband, a Smith. Mr. Lea having sold Darnhall, Mathew thought proper to sell his title, since which the House is pulled down, and built up to Jellicoe's, and the two places annexed together. John Darlington, George Rathbone and Thomas, Richard Davenport and John Howard give their service to you both. About the last of November last we were under the most dreadful apprehensions of receiving a visit from the French and Highlanders of Scotland, to the number of nine or ten thousand, who advanced through . . . and Macclesfield, and so on to Derby,-raising the most exhorbitant contributions, and almost ruining the country as they passed; but thanks be to God, they missed us; But now they are retired to Scotland, where his Majesty's forces are in pursuit of them: and so I subscribe myself your most affectionate Brother,

JOSEPH DARLINGTON.

Postscript: Pray direct your letters to Joseph Darlington in Darnhall. We have a large sea-port called Liverpool, from whence small vessels come twice a week to Winsford, a mile distant, from the river Wever being made navigable. Pray be kind to the Bearer, whose name is William Davenport, if he delivers the Letters. I received yours from the hand of Samuel Harper, a year ago,—who staid with me a week, giving me great accounts, and whom I received with great joy.

In his home on the Brandywine Abraham Darlington continued to take an active interest in the affairs of his meeting. He was appointed an overseer 5 mo. 17, 1732, in the room of William Seal. He and William Dean were succeeded as overseers by John Townsend and Benjamin Cock, 12 mo. 2, 1735. On 6 mo. 4, 1740, Abraham Darlington brought a complaint to the monthly meeting against Concord Preparative Meeting, and a committee was appointed to hear the charges. The cause of the grievance was not specified in the minutes. He was again appointed overseer of Birmingham Meeting 1 mo. 3, 1745-6, in the room of James Jefferis, deceased. He was subsequently appointed an elder, but was released from this service 5 mo. 8, 1760.

The late Dr. William Darlington remarks: "Whether our first American progenitor carried on his trade of a saddler after he came to his Brandywine farm, I am unable to say; but it is well known that his agricultural pursuits did not prevent him from becoming an extensive and popular practitioner of physic and surgery in the region round about him. In those days medical schools had not been established in this hemisphere. and educated physicians, in rural districts, were 'few and far between.' It is therefore certain that Abraham Darlington never had an opportunity to be indoctrinated by learned professors in the institutes of the healing art. Like many of his medical contemporaries, he took the profession in the natural way, and was resorted to from necessity. But tradition assures us that he learnt to prescribe with a good degree of skill and judgment, and was somewhat celebrated for his chirurgical dexterity among broken bones and dislocated joints.

"His aptitude for these humane offices seemed, to some extent, to become hereditary in the family, for a son and daughter, Thomas and Rachel, were quite expert and much employed in the same capacity; and some, also, of the third generation were considerably addicted to venæsection and tooth-drawing among their afflicted neighbors. It was deemed by sage observers of the vicinage to be a grave mistake, or oversight, that one of his grandchildren—being a seventh son—was not expressly dedicated to the Esculapian profession; and I may add, that when I commenced my medical career I was sometimes consulted by aged persons who recollected my descent, in the avowed hope and trust that some portion of the old family gift might peradventure be inherited."

In support of this traditional claim of medical practice the following letter, addressed to "Doct. Abraham Darlington," is offered:

UNKNOWN FRIEND:

According to your desire I send you the prices of the things you mentioned in yours. I have also sent you a List of many Drugs, together with the price set down in your money; and if any thing in my way will suit you, or any of your friends (to whom would be glad if you would show the List I send you), I shall be glad to serve you to the utmost of my power. Which is at present needful from your humble Servant,

Boston, Sept. 1, 1743, near the Townhouse.

By deed of January 25, 1750-1, Abraham Darlington purchased from John Strode, of East Bradford township, 200 acres of land in this township, lying adjacent to the southwest corner of the present borough of West Chester. This land was subsequently divided between his sons, Thomas and John, as will be noticed hereafter.

Catherine Hillborn, a sister to the wife of Abraham Darlington, brought a certificate from Friends of Falls Monthly Meeting, Bucks County, to Concord Monthly Meeting, dated 4 mo. 4, 1746. She was married at Birmingham Meeting, 4 mo. 20, 1763, to Benjamin Hawley, of East Bradford, a widower, born in London, October 5, 1703. He was somewhat better educated than usual for that day, and taught school in Birmingham for a time. He kept a diary for many years, in which

numerous items of information are briefly recorded. He died 7 mo. 29, 1782, and his widow, Catherine, 5 mo. 13, 1789, aged 93 years and 3 months. The following entries are taken from his diary:

12 mo. 28, 1771: "Elizabeth Darlington Departed this Life about 4 P. M."

29th: "We heard that Elizabeth Darlington Departed this Life yesterday. I and my wife went to Abraham's. She staid all night."

30th: "Second Day: Cloudy: Some Rain & a little snow: I went to Abraham's to the burial of Elizabeth Darlington."

2 mo. 9, 1776: "Abraham Darlington the Elder Departed this Life this morning: to be Buried on first Day next."

11th: "First Day: Clear & Cold wind,—hard frost: I went to the Burial of Abraham Darlington at Birmingham."

The sixth day of the fifth month (called May), in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred seventy two, 1772, I Abraham Darlington of Birmingham, County of Chester and Province of Pennsylvania, Yeoman, being weak of body but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to God therefor,—knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and Testament, in the following manner and form:—

First, It is my will, and I do order, that in the first place all my just debts and funeral charges be paid and discharged.

Item, I give, devise and bequeath to my son Abraham Darlington, all and singular my lands messuage or Plantation whereon I now live, situate in Birmingham aforesaid, to have and to hold, all and every the said Messuages, Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, and Premises with their and every of their Rights, Members and Appurtenances, for—and to the use of my said son, Abraham Darlington, his heirs and assigns forever; upon condition that he pay all such Bequests and Legacies as shall be hereinafter mentioned: I also give and bequeath to my said son, Abraham Darlington, my clock and clothes-Press; also one feather Bed bedding & furniture thereto belonging which he has had some time in possession.

Item, I give and bequeath to my Daughter Deborah Taylor, relict of

- Samuel Taylor deceased, the sum of Fifty Pounds, lawful money of Pennsylvania to be paid to her or her heirs by my son Abraham Daylington in four years after my decease, out of my real estate.
- Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Pyle, wife of Isaac Pyle, the sum of Fifty Pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania, to be paid to her or her heirs by my son Abraham Darlington, in four years after my decease, out of my real estate.
- Item, I give and bequeath to my Daughter, Hannah Jefferis wife of William Jefferis, the sum of Fifty Pounds, lawful money of Pennsylvania to be paid to her or her heirs by my son Abraham Darlington, in four years after my decease, out of my real estate.
- Item, I give and bequeath to my Daughter Rachel Seal Relict of William Seal the sum of Fifty Pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania to be paid to her or her heirs by my son, Abraham Darlington in four years after my decease, out of my real estate.
- Item, I give and bequeath to my two Grand-children John Brinton and Rebecca Brinton children of John Brinton by my daughter Rebecca his former wife the sum of Twenty Pounds each, lawful money of Pennsylvania to be paid to my said Grand-children—that is to my Grandson John Brinton at the age of twenty one years and to my Grand-daughter Rebecca Brinton at the age of eighteen years, by my son Abraham Darlington out of my real estate.
- Item, I give and bequeath to my Son Thomas Darlington the sum of Twenty Pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania, to be paid by my Executors hereinafter named in twelve months after my decease.
- Item, I give, devise and bequeath unto my Son John Darlington, all and singular the Messuage Plantation or Tract of land whereon he now liveth situate in East Bradford, to have and to hold all and every the said Messuages, Lands, Tenements Hereditaments and Premises with their and every of their Rights, Members and Appurtenances (except what Privileges of Water, &c. I have before excepted, in my Deed to my son Thomas Darlington) to and to the use of my said son John Darlington his heirs and assigns forever; and also my silver watch, and the sum of Twenty Pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania to be raised and levied out of my Personal Estate and to be paid by my Executors hereinafter named in twelve months after my decease.
- Item, I give and bequeath to my Grandson Abraham Pyle, son of Moses Pyle the sum of Twenty Pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania, to be raised and levied out of my Personal Estate; and to be paid him by my Executors hereinafter named in twelve months after my decease.

- Item, I give and bequeath to my Grand daughter Lydia Woodrow, wife of Simeon Woodrow, the sum of Twenty Pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania, to be raised and levied out of my Personal Estate and to be paid her by my Executors hereinafter named in twelve months after my decease.
- Item, I give and bequeath to my Nephew John Darlington, the sum of Five pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania, to be raised and levied out of my Personal Estate, and to be paid him by my Executors in twelve months after my decease.
- Item, I give and bequeath to my Niece Mary Darlington (but now the wife of John Slack), the sum of Five Pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania, to be raised and levied out of my Personal Estate and to be paid her in twelve months after my decease by my Executors.
- Item, It is my will and I do order that all my Books of Physic & Chirurgery be equally divided between my Son Thomas Darlington and my Daughter Rachel Seal.
- Item, It is my will and I order, that all my wearing apparel of all sorts be divided between my three Sons, Abraham, Thomas and John Darlington and that the remains of my Personal Estate after all just debts funeral charges and all bequests and legacies to be paid that the said remains be equally divided between my four Daughters, Deborah Taylor, Elizabeth Pyle, Hannah Jefferis and Rachel Seal, or to their heirs, share and share alike.
- Item, I likewise constitute make and ordain my three Sons Abraham, Thomas and John Darlington Executors of this my last will and Testament, and I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disannull all and every other former Testaments, Wills Legacies and Executors by me in any wise before this time named willed and bequeathed ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and Testament. In Witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and date of the year first above written.

Respecting John Darlington, brother of Abraham, very little is positively known, though the impression has gained that he was the ancestor of various Darlingtons in the South, and especially that he was the father of John and Mary Darlington, mentioned in the will of Abraham. Dr. William Darlington, writing in 1850, says: "The history of that nephew, John Darlington, seems now to be entirely lost. The niece, Mary, I knew well. She had two sons, Jesse and Abner, and a daughter Sarah, who married Henry Logan, whose son, Eli Logan, is now living and has children. Jesse had children, but Abner was never married."

A note, made perhaps by Dr. Darlington's brother Thomas, says: "Abraham Darlington mentions in his will his nephew, John Darlington, and niece, Mary Slack, children of his brother,

called Long Joseph, I think."

Joseph Darlington, writing from Darnhall, October 20, 1733, to his brother Abraham, says: "if brother John's Old woman should happen to die, he having no children, if he thought good I should be glad to see him." Perhaps she did die and he married again and had children; or perhaps some of Joseph's children were induced to try their fortunes in America. Mary Slack was born, however, about 1733.

The records of the Old Swedes Church, Wilmington, Del., show the marriage of John Darlington and Mary Way, April 13, 1765. This may have been the nephew of Abraham Dar-

lington.

The same records also show the marriage of John Darlington to Elinor Armstrong, February 4, 1773, possibly a second marriage on his part. Some descendants of a John and Elinor Darlington will be given hereafter. (See No. 2574.)

In this connection it may be stated that one Elenor Darlinton was a witness to a deed from Joseph Hayes, of Marlborough, to Theophilus Canby, of Birmingham, October 6, 1743. Again, Ellenor Darlinton was witness to a deed from Nicholas and Ann Fred to Edward Brinton, July 26, 1746, for land in Birmingham, close by the farm of Abraham Darlington. The spelling of the name would rather indicate relationship to the Darlintons of East Caln and Nantmel. (See Nos. 2313 and 2412.)

Among the papers of the late Thomas Darlington was an indenture, dated October 12, 1769, by which Jane Darlington, "Daughter of John Darlington, of the township of Birmingham, in the County of Chester, in the Province of Pennsylvania, hath & by these Presents doth of her own free will & accord, by and with the Consent of her sd Father, bind and put herself an apprentice unto Samuel Painter and Esther his wife, or heirs, of the township of East Bradford," for the term of fourteen years. Supposing that she were to be free at 18, this would place her birth in 1765, and it may be that she was the daughter of John Darlington and Mary Way. Of her further history nothing is known.

MARY DARLINGTON and John Slack were married at the Swedes' Church, Wilmington, June 18, 1770. Isaac G. Gilpin, under date of 2 mo. 14, 1823, says: "Mary May, once Darlington, maiden name, and once Slack, widow of John, buried this day, aged near 90 years."

Of her children, Abner Slack, of Birmingham, died intestate, and letters of administration on his estate were granted to William Speakman, December 21, 1818. Sarah married first Rees Colgan (Scolgan, says her grandson, Eli D. Logan), who died within a year. Thomas Cheyney, Esq., records the marriage of Henry Logan, of Pennsbury, to Sarah Scogings, of the same place, February 16, 1791. Children:

Sidney, b. 4 mo. 16, 1793; m. John Frame. No children. Albina, b. 8 mo., 1795; m. David Williams, and had children. Richard, John. Elizabeth Ann. Henry and Sarah.

HANNAH, b. 7 mo. 28, 1797; m. Thomas Williams, and had

children, Albin, Sally Ann, Mary, Sidney, Thomas and Hannah. By second husband, John Achoff, of Thorndale, she had one son, John Achoff, of Downingtown.

Mary D., b. 4 mo. 30, 1800; d. unmarried.

ALBIN, b. 11 mo. 4, 1802; d. young.

Sarah, b. 2 mo. 23, 1805; d. young.

JOHN, b. 12 mo. 1, 1807; had two children, Rachel Ann, who died young, and Elisha, living near Thorndale.

Ann S., b. 4 mo. 3, 1813; living unmarried.

JESSE SLACK m. Elizabeth Pike, and had three children.

Jesse d. unmarried.

SARAH ANN m. John Underwood, of Parkerville, and had Edith, John, William, Jesse, Gilpin Darlington and Sarah.

WILLIAM m. Mary Seeds and had two daughters, Lydia, living at Hamorton, and another.

EII LOGAN, b. 9 mo. II, 179I, in what is now Pocopson township, d. 6 mo. 22, 1880, in East Marlborough; m. 6 mo. 11, 1829, by William Newlin, Esq., to Martha Reed, b. 3 mo. 18, 1797; d. 9 mo. 14, 1866; daughter of James and Hannah (Carrington) Reed, of East Marlborough. She and her husband were buried at Unionville Cemetery. Eli Logan settled in East Marlborough about 1820, on a small farm, to which he made additions by purchase until he had 250 acres. He carried on farming and lime-burning, and at the time of his death had a two-thirds interest in 1,296 acres in Kent Co., Del. Children:

Sarah J., b. 3 mo. 19, 1831; unmarried.

ELI D., b. 5 mo. 28, 1833; unmarried, at the homestead.

John R., b. 9 mo. 25, 1834; d. 3 mo. 22, 1893; m. Therissa Jones, of Unionville.

James A. B., b. 11 mo. 15, 1837; unmarried, at the homestead.

Children of (1) Abraham Darlington and Elizabeth Hillborn.

2. Mary Darlington, b. in Aston, 1 mo. 14, 1717; m. 2 mo. 29, 1736, at Birmingham Meeting, to Moses Pyle, son of John Pyle and his first wife, Lydia Thomas, of Thornbury township. Robert Pyle, the father of John, was of Horton, in the county of Wilts, England, and m. 9 mo. (Nov.) 16, 1681, Ann Stovy, daughter of William Stovy, of Hilperton, in Wiltshire. They came to Pennsylvania in 1683 and settled in Bethel township, where were born to them—beside their eldest child, Sarah—seven children, Robert, William, John, Mary, Jacob, Joseph and Daniel. Of these John married Lydia Thomas, daughter of Peter Thomas, in 1710, and a second wife, Susanna Chamberlain, in 1716.

Moses and Mary Pyle settled within the limits of Londongrove Meeting, taking a certificate of membership from Concord to New Garden Monthly Meeting, dated 8 mo. 4, 1736. Mary's death probably occurred about 1739, and we find that Moses Pyle, of Newlin township, was married a second time, at Londongrove Meeting, 10 mo. 9, 1741, to Mary Cook, daughter of John and Eleanor Cook, of Londongrove. In 1767 he was living in New Castle County, and was suffering pecuniary embarrassment, but in 1772, sold his mills and plantation to pay his debts. About 1779 he settled in Little Britain township, Lancaster County, where he died in the first month, 1784. Beside two children by the first wife, he had by the second, Hannah, Mary, Phœbe, Ruth and Amos.

3. Deborah Darlington, b. in Aston, 7 mo. 13, 1719, was m. 10. mo. 16, 1741, at Birmingham Meeting, to Samuel Taylor,

of East Bradford township, son of Abiah Taylor and Deborah Gearing, of that place. His father, who was the son of Abiah Taylor, senior, of Didcott, in Berkshire, was m. 2 mo. 18, 1604. to Deborah, daughter of John Gearing, of Stanford in the Vale, in that county. The son is said to have visited America in the way of trade before his settlement here, but it was not till 1702 that he located in Chester County. Having a reversionary interest in the estate of Joane Dew, a tenement in Stanford in the Vale, he exchanged this for 1,250 acres of land in Pennsylvania. belonging to John Toovey, of Henley upon Thames, Oxfordshire, grocer, in London, by deeds of March 4 and 5, 1701. The land had been purchased from William Penn by John Toovey, October 17 and 18, 1681. In the deeds of 1701, Abiah Taylor, Jr., is styled of Harwell, in the county of Berks, mercer. The land had not been located, but on the 19th of 1st mo., 1702-3, a warrant was granted "at the request of Abiah Taylor," to take up 500 acres in right of Toovey's purchase. This was located in the Chester Valley, near Thorndale, 29th June, 1703. Another warrant was granted on the 6th of 2d mo., 1703, for 475 acres, the remainder of Toovey's purchase-liberty land in Philadelphia deducted—and with this James Logan wrote to the surveyor, 8th of 2d mo., 1703, as follows:

"The Prop'ry having wrote very particularly & expressly to ye Comm'rs to accommodate Abiah Taylor wth Land for a Settlemt we have been pvailed upon to grant him his remaining 475 acres in ye remainder of that vacancy where Tho: Buffington took up his on Brandywine; the Warrt for wch pray execute with Expedition and if there should prove (any overplus?) suffer none to be thrown out that may prove useless; but rather oblige him, if possible, to take ye whole on ye same terms Buffington had it, or else take less than ye aforesaid quantity and leave the rest for a settlemt for some other."

Six days later Secretary Logan wrote again to Isaac Taylor, the surveyor, as follows:

"I lately sent thee a wart for 475 acres to be laid out near T. Buffington, wch if not yet executed, I desire thee to add to it five acres more to compleat his purchase, there being but twenty acres allowed for his Liberty Land."

From the minutes of the Commissioners of Property we learn that Abiah Taylor had sold 250 acres of his land, unlo-

cated, to Richard Lewin. The first warrant being still unexecuted, James Logan wrote again, 4 mo. 11, 1703:

"In executing ye first Warrt granted to Abiah Taylor for 500 acres I desire thee to lay out what that Tract laid out on Brandywine (together with 20 acres allowed for Liberty Land) wants of his whole complemt of a thousand acres, that he may be putt to no more trouble & upon ye Return we shall make a minute to justify it."

The land in Caln being thought miscrably barren, it was given up, and instead 200 acres were taken up in Bradford, near the tract on Brandywine, and 350 acres in what is now East Marlborough, 1706.

The Brandywine tract included 430 acres, surveyed 2 mo. 14, 1703, and on this Abiah Taylor settled. In 1724 he built a brick house thereon, which is still standing. His children were Ann, who married Richard Barnard: Abiah, who died unmarried; Deborah, who married Jonathan Parke, and to whom her father gave the 200 acres on Taylor's Run, near the homestead; Alice, who married Daniel Hoopes, and Sanuel. A mill was build on the run which enters the Brandywine near the brick dwelling, about 1730. Abiah Taylor died about 1747.

Samuel Taylor m. first, 11 mo. 12, 1737, at Goshen Meeting, to Mary Smedley, daughter of Thomas Smedley, of Willistown. She left one child, Abiah, who married Ann Trimble, built a substantial stone house near his father's, and died 12 mo. 3, 1801, at Lancaster, a Member of Assembly, then in session.

Abiah Taylor and Deborah, his wife, by deed of 1 mo. 26, 1741, conveyed to their son Samuel 399 acres of the homestead, reserving the mill and remainder of the 430 acres of the original survey, which he devised to Samuel's son. Abiah.

The will of Samuel Taylor, of East Bradford, yeoman, is dated 1 mo. 24, 1759, and proven March 12, 1759. He devised to his wife various household articles, a home and the use of the northwest part of the land during life. This included certain rocks on the Brandywine which have since been known as "Deborah's Rocks." To his son Abiah he gave a few acres on the eastern side of the farm, and directed that the residue should be divided between his other sons, Samuel, Abraham, John and Isaac, by his father-in-law, Abraham Darlington, Ed-

ward Brinton, Jonathan Parke, Samuel Grubb and Thomas Worth. These four sons were to be kept at school until they were taught as far as the rule of three, and put to apprentice to such trades as they inclined to. His four daughters were to be taught to read and write a good legible hand. As executors he appointed his friend, Joseph Matlack, of Goshen, and his son, Abiah Taylor.

Deborah Taylor, widow of Samuel, was buried at Goshen meeting, 2 mo. 10, 1803. From this fact it may be inferred that her husband had been buried there, near his first wife.

4. ELIZABETH DARLINGTON, b. in Aston, 1721, was m. 9 mo. 21, 1750, at Birmingham Meeting, to Isaac Pyle, son of William Pyle and Olive Bennett, of Thornbury township, and grandson of Robert Pyle and Ann Stovy. That she might be fitted out with a suitable assistant in housekeeping, the following document was executed:

Articles of Agreement made by & between Abraham Darlington junior of the Township of Birmingham, in the County of Chester and Province of Pennsylvania, carpenter, of the one part, and Elizabeth Darlington of the same place, Junior, of the other part, witnesseth that the said Abraham Darlington hath bargained and agreed with the said Elizabeth Darlington jr. for to keep and provide for one negro Girl, named Patience, with meat, drink, washing and clothing, and lodging, and to have the said negro a servant during the full term of the natural life of the aforesaid Elizabeth, and no longer; and at the death of the said Elizabeth the said negro Girl is to return unto the said Abraham Darlington or his Heirs, Executors, Administrators or Assigns, as his own property, and for his service: whereunto the aforesaid parties have interchangeably set their hands and seals the day & year above written.

Isaac and Elizabeth Pyle settled on half of a tract of 455 acres of land in West Marlborough, which his father had devised to him and his brother Job. Division of the whole tract had been made between the brothers 2 mo. 15, 1743, and Job taking the southern part it was judged that he should pay his

brother £15 on account of the difference in the quality of the land.

Isaac Pyle was appointed an overseer of Londongrove Meeting 3 mo. 2, 1765, in place of Francis Swayne, released. William Swayne, Isaac Pyle and Thomas Sugar were appointed, 2 mo. 1, 1766, to visit families. These, with Joshua Johnson and Francis Swayne, were again appointed to the service, 1 mo. 2, 1768. Isaac Pyle desiring to be released, was succeeded by William Swayne as overseer, 3 mo. 6, 1773. On 12 mo. 7, 1776, he and several others, men and women, were appointed a committee of conference "for the revival and support of our discipline in this difficult time." Isaac Pyle and others were appointed a committee on schools, 3 mo. 6, 1779, and on 2 mo. 5, 1780, he was appointed one of the committee to have oversight of cases of suffering by Friends on account of their conscientious scruples against war.

Isaac Pyle died 11 mo. 8, 1794, and by his will, dated April 8, 1794, devised to his wife the use of the brick end of his house, during widowhood, with maintenance by sons John and Thomas; also £250 and some furniture. To son Thomas he gave 100 acres of the land, and the remainder to son John. To son Job he gave £50 and his "cordwinder tools," and to his daughters a residue of the personal estate. Elizabeth Pyle died 3 mo. 4, 1806, according to the records of the meeting, but Isaac G. Gilpin, who married a niece, notes in his diary that she died on the 5th, and was buried on the 7th. at the Grove (Londongrove), aged 84 years and 6 months.

5. ABRAHAM DARLINGTON, JR., b. about 1723, was first in. in 1769, as set forth in the following certificate:

"These are to certify whom it may concern, that Abraham Darlington and Mary Nicklin were lawfully joined together in the Holy Estate of Matrimony and pronounced Man and Wife, on the 18th day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and sixty nine, by me.

"Rector of the Swedish Church at Christiana,"

For this marriage outside of the Society of Friends, Abraham was disowned 3 mo. 4, 1769. The parentage of his wife has not been definitely ascertained, but she probably belonged

to a family of the name in Concord township, of whom Joseph, son of Joseph and Susanna, married Mary Hopton, daughter of John Hopton, of Bethel, and died prior to 1752. Mary Darlington died 5 mo. 31, 1774, and was buried at Birmingham Meeting, 6 mo. 2. Her four children died young.

By the devise of his father Abraham became the owner of the homestead of 200 acres in Birmingham, and he appears also to have learned the trade of a carpenter. We have no evidence that he took an active part in the Revolutionary War, but having lost his membership in the Society of Friends he was not restrained by their discipline, which not only forbade war, but also all participation in the pulling down of old or the setting up of new governments. Some of their members were discowned for what was called "taking the test," or giving in their adhesion to the new government. The following certificate illustrates the point.

I do hereby certify That Abram Darlington, Birmingham, hath voluntarily taken and subscribed the Affirmation of Allegiance and Fidelity, as directed by an Act of General Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed the Thirteenth Day of June, Anno Dom. 1777. Witness my Hand and Seal the First Day of June, Anno Dom. 1778.

Dr. William Darlington, who was born in 1782, says: "The Test Law, so called, which required the Affirmation of Allegiance and Fidelity here referred to, was regarded as very oppressive by the Friends and many others who were indisposed towards the Revolution, or had doubts as to its results. And the scandal of the time, as I have understood, was, that John Hannum, a very active, and, it was said, unscrupulous politician, issued the certificates without ceremony, and without stint, to all who were willing to vote his favorite ticket!"

Abraham Darlington's second marriage is set forth in the following certificate:

These are to certify, That on the twenty second day of November, one thousand seven hundred eighty six, Abraham Darlington, of the Township of Birmingham, County of Chester and State of Pennsylvania,

and Lettice Ryan, of the Township of Goshen, County and State afore-said, were duly married, agreeably to an act of General Assembly of the said State, in that case made and provided, before Thomas Cheyney, one of the Justices of the Peace in and for the County aforesaid, and the witnesses present: In confirmation whereof the said Parties have hereunto set their hands,—she the said Lettice, according to the custom of marriage, hath assumed and subscribed her name by the Sir-name of her husband.

Lettice Ryan was the daughter of Charles Ryan, or Ryant, of Goshen, by his first wife, Ann Chamberlin, daughter of John and Lettice Chamberlin, of Aston. By his second wife, Hannah (Townsend) Sharpless, Charles had a daughter Ann, who became the mother of Townsend Haines, judge of the courts of Chester County, 1851 to 1861.

Abraham Darlington, of Birmingham, Chester County, being aged and somewhat infirm, made his will 12 mo. 21, 1798, proven April 6, 1799, in which he devised to his daughter Mary her mother's wearing apparel, a bed and furniture, bureau, a brown mare colt now rising two years old, a pied heifer calf, all the pewter, china ware and teaspoons of every kind, and £150. The plantation was to be sold, together with the residue of personal property, and the money divided between his four sons, Benjamin, Charles, Abraham and Jesse, as they became of age, for whom he appointed William Sharpless and Jacob

Haines as guardians. Amos Brinton, miller, was appointed executor.

The farm was sold at public sale, 11 mo. 1, 1799, and purchased by William Brinton, whose wife was a daughter of John Darlington, for the sum of £3,013.

6. Thomas Darlington, b. in Birmingham about 1725, m. Hannah Brinton, daughter of Edward and Hannah (Peirce) Brinton, of Birmingham, granddaughter of William and Jane (Thatcher) Brinton, and great-granddaughter of William and Ann (Bagley) Brinton, who came from Nether Gournall, parish of Sedgley and county of Stafford, England. Having declared their intentions of marriage before Concord Monthly Meeting, 3 mo. 4 and 4 mo. 1, 1754, and no obstructions appearing, they were given permission to accomplish the same, according to the following certificate:

Whereas, Thomas Darlington, son of Abraham Darlington, of the Township of Birmingham in Chester County, in the Province of Pennsylvania, yeoman, and Hannah Brinton. Daughter of Edward Brinton, of the Township, County and Province aforesaid, yeoman, having declared their intentions of marriage with each other before several monthly meetings of the people called Quakers, held at Concord in the said County and Province, according to the good order used among them.—and having consent of Parents and Relations concerned, their said proposals of marriage were allowed by the said meeting:

Now these may certify all whom it doth concern, that for the full accomplishing their said intentions this twenty fifth day of the Fourth Month, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and fifty four, they the said Thomas Darlington & Hanna Brinton appeared in a public meeting of the said People met together at their public Meeting House at Birmingham; and the said Thomas Darlington, taking the said Hannah Brinton by the hand, did in a solemn manner openly declare that he took the said Hannah Brinton to be his Wife,-promising with God's assistance, to be unto her a loving and faithful husband until death should separate them; and then and there the said Hannah Brinton did in like manner declare, that she took the said Thomas Darlington to be her husband,-promising, with God's assistance, to be unto him a loving and faithful Wife until death should separate them,-or words to that purpose: And moreover, they the said Thomas and Hannah, (she, according to the custom of marriage, assuming the name of her husband,) as a further confirmation thereof, did then and there to these presents set their hands: And we whose names are underwritten, being also present at the solemnizing of their said marriage and subscription in manner aforesaid, have to these presents, as Witnesses, hereunto set our hands the day & year above written.

Thomas and Hannah Darlington doubtless settled upon a part of his father's land in East Bradford, though it was not till June 9, 1760, that Abraham Darlington and Elizabeth his wife executed a deed of gift to their son, Thomas Darlington, of East Bradford, for 100 acres, the southern half of 200 acres purchased from John Strode. On the same date Abraham Darlington executed a lease of a water right to Thomas, for 999 years, for the purpose of watering meadows. The latter was to have the use of the water on the second, third, fifth and sixth, and on the afternoon of the seventh days of the week. For the remainder of the time its use was reserved for the other part of the land.

By deed from John Morton, Sheriff, June 19, 1769, Thomas Darlington became the owner of 54 acres 64 perches of land in Goshen, which had belonged to Michael Lovel. This lay on the eastern side of the Wilmington road. Thomas Darlington,

Jr., son of Thomas and Hannah, purchased 55 acres of land in Goshen, from Thomas Williamson and Abigail his wife, by deed of June 7, 1787, and conveyed the same to his father, February 9, 1789, for £300. Joseph Taylor, from Berkshire, England, erected a mill on Pocopson Creek, in what was then Kennet township, and with Elizabeth, his wife, February 13, 1738, conveyed the same, with 103 acres of land, to his son, Benjamin Taylor. Isaac Taylor, son and executor of Benjamin Taylor conveyed this property, November 3, 1789, to Thomas Darlington the younger, of East Bradford, yeoman; and the latter conveyed it to his father, April 21, 1790, for £403.

Thomas Darlington and William Jefferis were appointed overseers of Birmingham Meeting, 1 mo. 1, 1759, instead of John Taylor and George Entriken, and Thomas was succeeded by John Townsend, 2 mo. 6, 1765. Hannah Darlington was appointed an overseer, 6 mo. 3, 1778, in the room of Joanna Townsend, and was succeeded by Rachel Sharpless, 3 mo. 3, 1784. Thomas Darlington was disowned by the meeting, 2 mo. 6, 1788, for refusing to abide the award of referees in a matter of dispute.

Under date of 12 mo. 17, 1808, Isaac G. Gilpin, of Birmingham, wrote thus: "Thomas Darlington, my father-in-law, died about one o'clock P. M. of an apoplectic stroke, aged about 83 years. No previous disease except a slight indisposition in the morning of the same day. Buried at Birmingham, 19th, at 11 o'clock. He has left of children 9; grandchildren, 46; of greatgrandchildren, 4. He has had 11 children and lived to see them all married to his mind & satisfaction & comfortably situated in their livings & circumstances. He and his wife have lived together about 54 years."

The will of Thomas Darlington, of East Bradford, being aged and infirm, was dated 5 mo. 15, 1808, and proven January 7, 1809. He devised to his wife, Hannah, a home and privileges, with maintenance by sons Emanuel and Brinton, the family Bible, William Penn's Select Works, Sewel's History, Thomas Chalkley's Journal, riding chair and harness, etc., and £400. To son Edward, Swinburn on Wills. To son Abraham £25 and five books on chirurgy and physics. To son Jesse £50.

To son Amos the plantation whereon he lives, about 55 acres, in Goshen, and £50. To son George a merchant mill and 101½ acres in Pennsbury, he paying £100 in one year. To four children of daughter Hannah Gilpin—George, £5; Ruth, £100; Hannah, £100, and Jolm, £5, when of age. To son Stephen, £400. To daughter Elizabeth, wife of Isaac Taylor, £200. To son Brinton, the homestead with about 75 acres of the land, and the clock after his mother's death. To son Emanuel, a tract of land in Goshen, 54 acres purchased of Michael Lovel, and the residue of the land in East Bradford, about 75 acres in all, with use of water in the ditch five days in the week. Also the desk and bookcase after his mother's death. Executors, wife Hannah, and sons Edward and Abraham.

Hannah Darlington, widow of Thomas, died about noon on the 12th of 10 mo., 1811, and was buried on the 13th at Birmingham Meeting.

As an illustration of Thomas Darlington's reputation in the line of surgery, it is related that a farmer, in removing a stack of hay, slipped his foot between the rails in the bottom and falling over dislocated his ankle. A regular physician was summoned, but by the time he arrived the foot was much swollen and in bad condition. The doctor gave it as his judgment that amputation would be necessary, to which the sufferer demurred and said he must have Thomas Darlington's advice. Thomas was accordingly sent for, and after inspecting the injured member, said he believed it could be saved. With that the doctor mounted his horse and rode away in disgust. With some assistance Thomas placed the bones in position and made a box in which the foot was confined until nature effected a cure.

Thomas was very handy with tools, and among other things constructed a compass or surveying instrument, by which he could measure lands quite accurately.

7. JOHN DARLINGTON, b. in Birmingham about 1727, was m. 3 mo. 17, 1751, at Providence Meeting, (now) Delaware County, to Esther Dicks, daughter of Peter Dicks, of Providence, and Sarah (Hayes) his wife. Her grandfather, Peter Dicks, senior, a flax dresser, of the city of Chester, England, with his wife, Esther, came to Pennsylvania about the begin-

ning of the year 1685, and settled in Birmingham. He was a witness to the will of John Worthington, on board the "Friendship of Liverpoole," January 16, 1684-5. Among the purchasers of land from William Penn was James Dicks, of Eccleston, Cheshire, England, weaver, who bought 250 acres by deed of March 3, 1681, and by deed of August 16, 1684, conveyed the same to Peter Dicks, who is said to have been his son. As witnesses to this last deed were Roger Dicks and Job Dicks, names which we find duplicated among the children of the second Peter; and of these Roger was a prominent preacher among Friends. The land purchased from Penn was located in Eirmingham, where Peter, senior, died in 1704.

John and Esther Darlington settled on the northern part of his father's land in East Bradford, where their great-grandson, John H. Darlington, now resides. The present house was built in 1761 and remodeled in 1853. Being a blacksmith by trade, John Darlington also erected a shop near his dwelling. By deed of October 29, 1756, he purchased from Henry Hale Graham and Michael Lovell, 54 acres 62 perches, in Westtown or Goshen, "no matter which, or in part of both." By will of his father he inherited 100 acres in East Bradford, upon which he settled, and by deed of June 7, 1787, obtained from Thomas Williamson and Abigail his wife, 48 acres 50 perches in Goshen, adjoining the homestead. This last he conveyed to his son John, August 12, 1707, for the consideration of £400. On the same date John Darlington, of East Bradford, yeoman, and Esther his wife, conveyed the two other tracts of 100 acres and 54 acres 62 perches, to their son Job Darlington, for the sum of £1,000. The deed to their son John also included an undivided quarter interest in a small hill, known as the mine hill, in East Bradford, and one-fourth of all the ore or mineral that may be found therein. This hill, which is a conspicuous feature in the landscape, near Darlington Seminary, has never, to the writer's knowledge, vielded any ore or valuable mineral.

The date of Esther Darlington's death is unknown, but it probably occurred before 1804, as it is not mentioned in Isaac G. Gilpin's diary, beginning with this year. He notes the death of John Darlington, 2 mo. 2, 1813, and that he was buried on

the 5th at Birmingham, aged about 85 or 86 years. He died intestate.

8. HANNAH DARLINGTON, b. in Birmingham, was m. 4 mo. 30, 1752, at Birmingham Meeting, to William Jefferis, of East Bradford township, born in Chester township May 12, 1729; son of William Jefferis and grandson of Robert Jefferis and Jane (Chandler) his wife, who were married about 1692, in this country, both from Wiltshire, England. William Jefferis, senior, married Elizabeth' (Ring), widow of John Nield, the uncle of Abraham and John Darlington, already mentioned. Robert Jefferis having settled soon after the year 1700 in East Bradford, at the present residence of Charles S. Carter, died in 1738, and was succeeded by his son William, who died 11 mo. 23, 1777, and was buried on the 25th at Birmingham Meeting.

William and Hannah Jefferis settled on or near the land of his father, of which he inherited the greater part, but he did not long survive the latter. His will was dated December 10, 1777, less than a month after his father's death, yet it was proven before that of the latter, on September 21, 1778, and it is probable that his death occurred soon after the date of his will. To his eldest son, William, he devised the homestead, when of age. The will of Hannah Jefferis, of East Bradford, widow, is dated September 18, 1795, and proven October 15, 1795, showing

pretty nearly the time of her death.

9. RACHEL DARLINGTON, b. in Birmingham, was m. 4 mo. 25, 1765, at Birmingham Meeting, to William Seal, b. 10 mo. 17, 1726, d. 10 mo. 10, 1769, son of William Seal and Hannah Gilpin, of Birmingham. He was first married 4 mo. 15, 1748, to Susanna Temple, daughter of William and Hannah Temple, of Pennsbury, by whom he had children, Joseph, Hannah, William, Caleb, Benjamin, Thomas and Rachel. At the time of his marriage to Rachel Darlington he was residing in Christiana Hundred, New Castle County, but about a year later removed to Birmingham, where he died. By his will, dated 10 mo. 5, 1769, proven October 30, 1769, he directed that in three years his real estate should be divided among his nine children, by his brother, Caleb Seal, and brothers-in-law, Thomas Temple and Abraham Darlington. Benjamin Hawley,

in his diary, 10 mo. 10, 1769, says: "Wm. Seal Departed this Life of a flux this morning or Last Night"; also that he was buried on the 11th. Thomas Seal, son of William, died 10 mo. 12, 1769, in the morning, and was buried on the 13th, at Birmingham.

In corroboration of what has been said of the medical and surgical skill of Rachel Seal, Benjamin Hawley notes in his diary, 5 mo. 2, 1772, that "Rachel Seal came to Bleed my wife & John." He further informs us that Isaac Miller and Rachel Seal were married at her own house, 7 mo. 3, 1777. He was a widower and a first cousin to her first husband, and for this marriage she was disowned by Friends, 11 mo. 5, 1777. The discipline of the Society did not permit of marriages between first cousins, and this was also applied to first cousins by marriage. Furthermore, Isaac Miller's first wife was a sister to William Seal's first wife, so that he was considered a brother-in-law. Such connections are now allowed among Friends.

The death of Rachel Miller has not been ascertained. Isaac Miller was born 3 mo. 2, 1727, and died in Pennsbury township, 1 mo. 20, 1815; buried 22d at Kennet Meeting.

10. Job Darlington, b. in Birmingham, d. young.

II. REBECCA DARLINGTON, b. in Birmingham; was m. 12 mo. 28, 1763, at Birmingham Meeting, to John Brinton, of Kennet (now Pocopson) township, son of John and Hannah (Vernon) Brinton, of that place. John Brinton, the elder, was a brother to Edward Brinton, whose daughter was the wife of Thomas Darlington. He purchased from Joseph Taylor and Elizabeth his wife, February 15, 1737, 195 acres of land in Kennet, whereon he settled and died, about 1748, leaving the land to his son John, when of age. The latter was born about 1739. Rebecca lived but a few years after marriage, and in 1770 John married a second wife, Phœbe Osborne, daughter of Samuel and Frances Osborne. For this marriage, "by a priest," he was disowned, 3 mo. 6, 1771. About 1776 he married a third wife, Mary Rogers, widow of Robert Rogers. John Rogers, a son of the last wife, says of his step-father that he had two children by the first wife and three by the second. The latter were Phœbe, who married George Entriken, John, and another whose name is unknown. Samuel inherited from his grandfather Osborne 150 acres of land in Northumberland County, Pa.

John Brinton's residence was on the hill above Lenape Station. At the time of the Battle of Brandywine some of the British soldiers passed by, and finding the owner of the property a strong sympathizer with the American cause, arrested him and with threats compelled him to hurrah for King George, to which he defiantly added—"Washington!" Finding him incorrigible they took him a prisoner to Philadelphia, where he suffered much abuse and hardship. His step-son says that he went as a volunteer in the American Army, and when he returned home, by his intemperance and mismanagement, he spent the whole of his property and became poor, and worked at his trade, which was that of a tailor.

He was probably obliged to mortgage the property in order to pay legacies to his brothers and sisters, and the indebtedness increased until finally Sheriff John Gardner conveyed the homestead, August 1, 1782, to John Franklin, of Philadelphia. In 1785 it passed into the possession of Casper Wistar, whence came the name of Wistar's Ford, on the Brandywine. In 1837 the property was conveyed by Sarah Pennock, daughter of Casper Wistar, to John Entriken, who resided there many year.

John Brinton died in West Bradford, at the residence of his son-in-law, George Entriken, December 4, 1825, in his 87th year.

THIRD GENERATION.

Children of (2) Mary Darlington and Moses Pyle.

12. Lydia (Mary, Abraham), m. 6 mo. 15, 1757, at Londongrove Meeting, to Simeon Woodrow, son of Isaac and Mary (Cheevers) Woodrow, of West Fallowfield township. They resided in West Marlborough until 1762, when they removed to Birmingham, but returned within the limits of New Garden Monthly Meeting in 1764. In 1767 "Simeon Woodrow is complained of for not paying his just Debts, which is thought to be occasioned thro' mismanagement in his outward affairs."

For this and some other misconduct he was finally disowned 6 mo. 3, 1769. In 1771 they probably returned to the neighborhood of Birmingham, but by 4 mo. 1, 1775, were settled within the verge of Hopewell Monthly Meeting, Frederick County, Va., to which Lydia and six children received a certificate from New Garden. Two other children, born after their father's disownment, were admitted at Hopewell 5 mo. 3, 1779. At a later date several of the family appear to be members of Crooked Run Monthly Meeting, Va., but the dates of the parents' deaths have not been ascertained.

13. ABRAHAM PYLE was probably brought up in his grandfather Darlington's family, the meeting records showing that he was removed from his father's house when about six months old, and a certificate transferring his membership from New Garden to Concord Monthly Meeting issued o mo. 5, 1761. He was disowned 4 mo. 4, 1770, for his marriage by a magistrate to Jane Webb, a member of Kennet Monthly Meeting. She was also disowned by Kennet, 2 mo. 15, 1770, but on her acknowledgment was reinstated 11 mo. 12, 1778. Their movements are somewhat indicated by the following transfers of her membership, viz.: To Bradford, 3 mo. 11, 1779; to Kennet, 5 mo. 14, 1784; to Nottingham, 5 mo. 15, 1788; to Kennet, 4 mo. 30, 1791; to New Garden, 4 mo. 14, 1796; to Nottingham, 5 mo. 5. 1798. They probably settled in or near Little Britain. Lancaster County, about this latter date, but their further history has not been traced.

Children of (3) Deborah Darlington and Samuel Taylor.

14. SAMUEL (Deborah, Abraham), b. in East Bradford 9 mo. 29, 1742; d. there, unmarried, 2 mo., 1765. He devised the land which he inherited from his father, with the dwelling house, to his brother Isaac, subject to the payment of £60 to each of his brothers, Abraham and John; and £10 to his friend, Deborah Scarlet, daughter of Nathaniel Scarlet. Residue of estate to his mother, Deborah Taylor. This land consisted of two tracts, the first of which contained 59 acres 55 perches, opposite "Deborah's Rocks," and also including 19 acres 35 perches subject to his mother's use during life. The second

tract was 17 acres 20 perches of woodland on the east side of the Brandywine, near the present paper mill.

15. ABRAHAM, b. 8 mo. 5, 1744; d. 1819; m. 11 mo. 3, 1773, at Bradford Meeting, Hannah Woodward, b. 3 mo. 7, 1753, daughter of William Woodward, of West Bradford, and wife Eliza, sister to Humphry Marshall, the botanist. Second marriage, 1 mo. 1, 1789, to Sarah Trimble, b. 8 mo. 28, 1744; d. 4 mo. 2, 1833; daughter of James and Mary (Palmer) Trimble, of West Bradford.

In the division of his father's estate Abraham received about 115 acres of the southern part of the whole tract. He died intestate, and letters of administration were granted to Sarah Taylor, his widow, March 24, 1819.

16. MARY, b. 5 mo. 31, 1746; d. 9 mo. 30, 1805; m. 4 mo. 23, 1766, at Birmingham Meeting, to Samuel Sellers, b. 4 mo. 9, 1742; d. 9 mo. 21, 1805; son of Samuel Sellers and Jane Wood, of West Bradford (now Pocopson) township. His father died about the beginning of the year 1786, leaving 200 acres of land to be divided between his sons, Samuel and Jonathan, and of which Samuel obtained about 80 acres. He was a weaver as well as a farmer. Upon the establishment of Marlborough Meeting the membership of this family was transferred from Bradford to Kennet Monthly Meeting, 7 mo. 8, 1801. Samuel Taylor, nephew of Mary Sellers, notes in his diary, 10 mo. 7, 1801: "This day my Father took my Grandmother to Saml. Sellers' In a cart; then he went to John Nutt's and brought two pairs of bedsteads."

17. John, b. 7 mo. 7, 1748; d. 2 mo. 15, 1823; m. 5 mo. 4, 1770, at Bradford Meeting, to Ann Sellers, daughter of Samuel and Jane (Wood) Sellers, of West Bradford. He obtained 90 acres of the middle portion of the parental homestead, and resided thereon until his death. He also purchased from Benjamin Townsend and wife, by deed of 1 mo. 11, 1774, 111 acres near by, but sold this in 1789 to John Hickman, of Thornbury.

18. Deedrah, b. 10 mo. 31, 1750; m. 10 mo. 2, 1777, at Bradford Meeting, to Jonathan Sellers, son of Samuel and Jane Sellers, of West Bradford. He inherited 120 acres of land from his father. Deborah was buried 8 mo. 26, 1781, at Bradford

Meeting, and a few years later Jonathan married again. By his will, dated 11 mo. 24, 1816, and proven January 20, 1817, he devised the homestead to his son Joseph, subject to legacies of \$600 each to daughters Asenath, Hannah and Sarah, who were also to have the furniture, and while unmarried a home and privileges. To his first wife's daughters, Elizabeth and Lydia, he devised a bond which had belonged to their mother; to each a cow, and to Lydia \$160 additional.

19. ELIZABETH, b. 3 mo. 29, 1753; d. unmarried.

20. ISAAC, b. 8 mo. 6, 1755, inherited 87 acres 60 perches of his father's lands, lying on the western side of the Brandywine. and including "Deborah's Rocks," with 13 acres in which his mother had a life estate. He also inherited his brother Samuel's share of the paternal domain, 76 acres 75 perches, upon which stood the brick mansion of 1724. His membership was transferred from Concord to Bradford Monthly Meeting by certificate dated 7 mo. 7, 1779, and on 7 mo. 14, 1780, complaint was made that he had deviated "from our Christian testimony against war so far as to pay money to redeem a horse taken & sold for his fines & taxes for warlike uses"; and had also accomplished his marriage by the assistance of a Baptist teacher. For these deviations he was disowned 11 mo. 17, 1780. His wife was Susanna, daughter of William and Mary (Musgrove) Baily, of West Marlborough. By deed of August 22, 1788, Isaac Taylor and Susanna his wife conveyed to Joseph Downing, of East Caln township, the homestead and land devised to Isaac by his brother Samuel; and Joseph Downing and Mary his wife, December 2, 1797, conveyed the same to Samuel and Abiah Taylor, sons of Abiah, the half brother to Isaac.

Isaac Taylor and family removed to Philadelphia 4 mo. 1, 1800, and were soon visited with sickness, by which two of the children died in the 6th month. Samuel Taylor, in his diary, 6 mo. 18, 1800, says: "Isaac Taylor's family came down with the Flux about this time." 7 mo. 23, 1800: "This morning I went & brought Richard Jones's Family Waggon to bring Isaac Taylor from Phila., who was there sick." 7 mo. 24th: "My Father Returned from Philada. with Isaac Taylor and Family." Isaac died in Philadelphia, 1825, and Susanna, his widow, 3 mo.

- 1, 1829, aged 69. They were buried in Friends' graveyard, Sixteenth and Race streets.
 - 21. RACHEL, b. 9 mo. 30, 1758; d. unmarried.

Children of (4) Elizabeth Darlington and Isaac Pyle.

- 22. Job (Elizabeth, Abraham), b. 7 mo. 28, 1751; d. 3 mo. 28, 1830; m. 5 mo. 18, 1775, at Bradford Meeting, to Ruth Harlan, b. in East Marlborough, 11 mo. 31, 1750; d. in Londonderry township, 1837; daughter of Joel and Hannah (Wickersham) Harlan, of Newlin township. They resided for a time in Londongrove; afterward in Londonderry, where Job kept a tavern for several years. On 7 mo. 7, 1787, Londongrove Meeting brought a complaint against Job Pyle, that he, "Notwithstanding the caution & advice of his Friends, did accept of the office of a collector of a Tax for Defraving the expence of War, which Divers of his Brethren Religiously scruple to pay; which office subjected him to the necessity of Returning their names to a magistrate, in consequence whereof Distraint was made upon their Goods." For this he offered an acknowledgment 8 mo. 4, 1787, which was accepted. By his will, dated March 24, 1827, he devised to his wife \$2,000, a home and privileges. To sons Joel and William the land whereon they resided, in Pennsbury township. To son Job the land whereon he resided in Londongrove. To sons Joshua and John the homestead. To daughter Elizabeth \$1,500. To daughter Mary Pyle \$2,000. To son Ziba \$3,000.
- 23. Thomas, b. in West Marlborough, 12 mo. 24, (or 10 mo. 28), 1754; d. 2 mo. 18, 1836; m. 5 mo. 23, 1782, at Londongrove Meeting, to Rachel Webb, born 2 mo. 4, 1760; died 12 mo. 23, 1842; daughter of Benjamin and Jane (Smith) Webb, of West Bradford township. He was a farmer in West Marlborough township.
- 24. Joiln, b. 9 mo. 14, 1756; d. in West Marlborough 5 mo. 1, 1799; m. 5 mo. 19, 1790, at Londongrove meeting, to Ann Passmore, b. 6 mo. 6, 1764; d. 7 mo. 22, 1858; daughter of George and Margaret (Strode) Passmore, of West Marlborough. She married again, 3 mo. 11, 1807, at Londongrove

Meeting, Joshua Speakman, of Newlin township, son of Ebenezer and Mary Speakman.

In the assessment of West Marlborough, made 1st mo., 1799, John Pyle was possessed of 100 acres of land, a log house, 16 by 18 feet. frame barn with stone stabling, 25 by 40 feet. His brother Thomas had 90 acres, a stone house one story high, 18 by 23 feet, log barn with stone stabling under, 23 by 30 feet, a log shop, 16 by 16, and a small log tenant house. In that day many of the dwellings were of logs.

It is said that when John Pyle married he took his wife to live in the house with his parents, and continued there, but this is open to question, as his father speaks in his will of a brick end to the house. John's land lay next east of his brother Thomas' and about a mile directly north of Londongrove Meeting House.

25. Mary, b. 4 mo. 5, 1758; d. 10 mo. 24, 1825; m. 4 mo. 7, 1779, at Londongrove Meeting, to James Smith, of Lampeter township, Lancaster County, b. 10 mo. 9, 1752; d. 2 mo. 8, 1824, son of John and Margaret (Dickinson) Smith, of Lancaster County. They removed to West Marlborough in 1787. Isaac Pyle, father of Mary Smith, in the 3d month, 1786, agreed with Thomas Barnard, of W. Marlborough, for the purchase from the latter of a plantation in that township for his son-inlaw, James Smith, but after paying upward of £400 toward the purchase, Thomas Barnard declined to perform the covenant on his part. Isaac Pyle conveyed his right to the property to James Smith, for £300, gold and silver, by an instrument dated 10 mo. 21, 1786, and which was placed upon record. Whether James Smith obtained possession without a suit has not been noticed. In 1700 he had 110 acres, a two-story stone house, 21 by 31 feet in size, with stone kitchen, 12 by 17; a frame barn with stone stabling, 28 by 36,

26. ELIZABETH, b. 8 mo. 27, 1760, received a certificate from New Garden to Philadelphia Monthly Meeting for the Southern District, dated 6 mo. 1, 1782. She was married 5 mo. 4, 1791, at Pine Street Meeting, to John Wilson, boatbuilder, son of Thomas and Ruth Wilson, of Chichester, Delaware Co., Pa. She was his second wife and was buried in Philadelphia. He

was buried at Burlington, N. J., they having resided at both places. By his first wife he had a daughter, Margaret, who married George Prior.

He and his partner, Boyer Brooke (Brooke & Wilson), built the first steamboat, in 1786, for John Fitch, the inventor. The account book of the firm, 1782-1790, is now in possession of Sarah G. and Julia McClintock (see Nos. 460 and 462). From this it appears that the cost of building the boat was about £52.

27. OLIVE, b. 5 mo. 10, 1762; m. 5 mo. 7, 1788, at Londongrove Meeting, to Samuel Cookson, son of Samuel and Jane Cookson, of West Nottingham, Md. They probably resided for a time in Wilmington, but she died in Baltimore, Md., 3d month, 1803.

Children of (5) Abraham Darlington and Mary Nicklin.

- 28. MARY (Abraham, Abraham), b. in Birmingham, 11 mo. 4, 1769; buried at Birmingham Meeting, 8 mo. 26, 1770.
 - 29. Abraham, b. 6 mo. 24, 1771; d. young.
 - 30. ELIZABETH, b. 11 mo. 22, 1772; d. 9 mo. 26, 1773.
 - 31. Joseph, b. 4 mo. 2, 1774; d. young.

- 32. Mary (Abraham, Abraham), b. 6 mo. 2, 1787, was admitted into membership at Birmingham Meeting, 9 mo. 7, 1803, and was a pupil at Westtown Boarding School, 1804-5. She married Matthew Beans, of Bucks County, Pa., b. 2 mo. 2, 1787; d. 9 mo. 30, 1876; son of David and Sarah (Vickers) Beans. She probably died about 1820. She had a son, William Darlington, born January 9, 1809, who was deaf and dumb.
- 33. Benjamin, b. 8 mo. 24, 1789; d. in New Jersey, 1869; m. in 1817, Sarah Hopper, b. in Gloucester Co., N. J., 1794; d. in 1869, two days after her husband.
- 34. CHARLES, b. 2 mo. 13, 1791; d. at Mauch Chunk, Pa., about 1830; unmarried.
- 35. ABRAHAM, b. 9 mo. 26, 1793; d. 9 mo. 13, 1801, at Jacob Haines's, near West Chester.
- 36. Jesse, b. 6 mo. 4, 1796; d. 11 mo. 4, 1835; unmarried. He was a harness maker and had a shop at the southeast corner of Gay and High streets, West Chester, prior to 1818.

Children of (6) Thomas Darlington and Hannah Brinton.

37. EDWARD (Thomas, Abraham), b. in East Bradford, 6 mo. 13, 1755; d. in Birmingham, 4 mo. 1, 1825, and buried at Birmingham Meeting, 4 mo. 3d; m. at Birmingham, 3 mo. 8, 1781, to Hannah Townsend, b. East Bradford, mo. 17, 1760; d. 8 mo. 9, 1826, and buried at Birmingham on the tenth; daughter of John and Joanna (England) Townsend, of East Bradford, They settled on a farm of 282 acres, in Birmingham, which was devised to him by his grandfather, Edward Brinton. He was a public spirited citizen and frequently employed in the service of the community. In the last century each township maintained its own poor, but on February 27, 1798, there was passed "An Act to provide for the erection of Houses for the employment and support of the Poor in the Counties of Chester and Lancaster." and providing for the election of six directors, two of whom should be retired annually, to be succeeded by others. The commissioners appointed by this act to carry it into execution in this county were Joshua Ashbridge, Edward Darlington, Moses Marshall, Robert Miller, John Davis, John Rinehart, James M. Gibbons, Samuel Carter and James Johnson. Edward Darlington was a prominent and efficient member of this commission, and it is said that on coming to the present site he put down his foot emphatically, and declared it to be the most suitable place they could find. He was subsequently elected to the Assembly, in the years 1802, 1803, 1804, 1811 and 1813. The following is a synopsis of his will, dated 6 mo. 4. 1817: To wife, Hannah, the use of the mansion house till son Edward was of age, and of a part of it afterward, with maintenance from sons Thomas, Ziba and Edward: To son Thomas 87 acres 122 perches of land, subject to legacy of \$267 to daughter Sarah D. Painter: To son Ziba another part of the land, 89 acres 33 perches, subject to a legacy of \$267 to Sarah D. Painter: To son Edward the residue of the land. about 104 acres 86 perches, he paying his sister Sarah the sum of \$534: To son William a map of the State of Delaware. Dickinson's writings, McMahon's Gardening and Swinburn on Wills. To son Thomas a "weather glass," walnut breakfast table, map of the world, and Smith's edition of the Laws of Penna.: To son Ziba a desk and bookcase, map of Pennsylvania, and Carey & Bioren's Laws of Penna.: To son Edward the clock, Scott's Gazetteer, and remainder of mounted maps: Residue of books to be divided among all the children: To daughter Sarah some furniture. A codicil, July 26, 1820, provides for an apprentice lad named Cheyney Pyle.

Edward Darlington was one of the trustees of Birmingham

Meeting property, 1793 to 1819.

38. ABRAHAM, b. 8 mo. 28, 1757; d. in Thornbury, Chester Co., 2 mo. 14, 1844; m. 3 mo. 22, 1781, at Kennet Meeting, to Susanna Chandler, b. 10 mo. 10, 1760; d. 5 mo. 12, 1849; daughter of Isaac and Esther Chandler, of Kennet. He is said to have learned the trade of a blacksmith with Richard Strode. of East Bradford, after which he appears to have removed within the limits of Kennet Monthly Meeting, taking a certificate from Concord Monthly Meeting, dated 12 mo. 8, 1779. After marriage they settled in Westtown township, where his parents conveyed to him, for 10 shillings and natural affection, 54 acres 64 perches of land which the father held by deed from John Morton, sheriff, dated June 19, 1769, and formerly owned by Michael Loyell, of the Island of Antigua, merchant, Thomas Darlington had also purchased from Sheriff John Gardner, November 6, 1782, 157 acres in the western end of Thornbury township, on which he placed his son Jesse; but the latter and his brother Abraham shortly concluded to exchange locations. Accordingly Abraham and Susanna, his wife, by deed of August 10, 1789, conveyed the Westtown tract to his brother Jesse, and on the same date Thomas Darlington and Hannah, his wife, conveyed to their son Abraham the Thornbury tract, for £225 and natural affection. This land lay directly east of Birmingham Meeting and the dwelling was perhaps less than eighty rods distant. Here, as in Westtown, Abraham carried on the business of blacksmithing in connection with farming. It was said of him that he could produce the desired shape in the iron with fewer strokes than any other artisan, and when done the work was perfectly adapted to its intended use. In 1792 he purchased to acres of woodland in

Westtown, on the Wilmington Road, and in 1798 a small addition to this. He was commissioned a justice of the peace by Gov. McKean, April 6, 1806, and continued in that office until the change of the Constitution, in 1838.

The will of Abraham Darlington, of Thornbury, is dated September 23, 1830, with codicils of June 16 and November 16, 1833. To his wife he devised a home during life, with maintenance. 75 shares of stock in the Bank of Chester County, and \$2,000; to son Isaac, \$1,000; to son Thomas, 7 acres of woodland in Westtown, and \$500; to son Benedict, \$1,000; to son Abraham, the homestead, about 157 acres, and remainder of woodland in Westtown, subject to his mother's maintenance; to daughter Hannah, \$1,000; to daughter Esther, \$1,000; to daughter Eliza, \$1,000; to daughter Cidney, \$2,000; to son William, a house and lot at southwest corner of Gay and Church streets, West Chester, and \$2,000; residue in ten shares to all the children.

39. Thomas, b. 1 mo. 21, 1760; d., unmarried, 2 mo. 22, 1793. He was disowned by Concord Monthly Meeting, 4 mo. 5, 1780, for military exercise and taking the "Test of Allegiance" to the new government. In 1787 he purchased 55 acres of land in Goshen, but in 1789 conveyed this to his father, and then bought a mill and 103 acres on Pocopson Creek, in what is now Pocopson township, but the next year he sold this also to his father. He now removed to Baltimore and entered upon a mercantile career, which, however, was but brief. The following obituary is from *The Baltimore Daily Repository* of March 4, 1793:

"Died, on the 22nd ultimo, on board the brig Minerva, captain James Boyd, on her passage from St. Eustatia to this port, Thomas Darlington, jun., aged about 33 years; a young man of respectable connections in Pennsylvania, being a native of that State, but of late years a merchant of this town. His lively, active turn for business, together with his assiduous attention thereto, promised fair to possess him of a handsome estate in a few years; but alas! how uncertain are all temporal objects. He who a few weeks past was in the prime of life, and enjoying the pleasing expectation of acquiring abundance,

is now removed to another state of being,—which sudden change has occasioned a general alarm among his surviving acquaintances. Through the kind and humane interposition of captain Boyd, who from a desire of not wounding the feelings of his aged parents and numerous relatives, more than what might be supposed from the unexpected loss of a favorite son and connection, carefully preserved his corpse until his arrival,—which was on the 2d instant, about noon; and yesterday the same was interred in the Friends' burying ground of this place. The respect shown to the memory of the deceased, was evident, on this solemn occasion, by the numerous concourse of citizens who attended."

Dr. William Darlington remarks that the "alarm" above alluded to "was probably owing to the circumstances of the disease, of which my uncle died, being the West India Yellow Fever, which was very fatal that year in Philadelphia." The funeral was from the dwelling of Joseph Townsend, in Baltimore, who was probably the author of the above obituary.

40. JESSE, b. 2 mo. 16, 1762; d. in Middletown, Delaware County, 4 mo. 26, 1812; m. 10 mo. 4, 1787, at Middletown Meeting, to Amy Sharpless, b. 11 mo. 17, 1758; d. 1 mo. 3, 1831; daughter of Benjamin and Martha (Mendenhall) Sharpless, of Middletown. Both were buried at Middletown Meeting. Jesse received a certificate from Concord to Bradford Monthly Meeting, dated 12 mo. 6, 1780, and brought one back, dated 2 mo. 14, 1783. During this period he had doubtless served an apprenticeship to the weaving trade, in which he is said to have shown remarkable patience with tangled threads. After marriage he settled on a farm belonging to his father, in Thornbury township, close to Birmingham Meeting, but by deed of August 10, 1789, purchased from his brother Abraham a tract of 54 acres in Westtown township, to which he removed. Amy Darlington was appointed an overseer of Birmingham Meeting, 6 mo. 5, 1793, in place of Rachel Sharpless. By deed of November 24, 1796, Jesse Darlington and wife conveyed 36 acres of land in Westtown, part of the 54 acres above mentioned, to John Rankin, and removed to Middletown township. Jesse Darlington, of Middletown, and William Poole, of Wilmington, executors of Samuel Sharpless, by deed of 2 mo. 11, 1797, conveyed to Isaac Glover Gilpin, of Birmingham, the Sharpless homestead, with 150 acres in Middletown, and 9 acres in Aston, for £2,200; and Isaac G. Gilpin, with Hannah, his wife, conveyed the same to Jesse Darlington 2 mo. 13, 1797, for the same sum. The latter built an addition to the house, in 1802, which is now the residence of his grandson of the same name. Jesse and Amy were buried at Middletown Meeting.

41. Amos, b. 3 mo. 15, 1764; d. in West Goshen township. 8 mo. 9, 1828; m. 3 mo. 12, 1789, at Birmingham Meeting, to Elizabeth Powel, b. 4 mo. 13, 1771; d. 5 mo. 21, 1841; daughter of Benjamin and Hannah (Davis) Powel, of East Bradford. He was a cabinet-maker by trade and settled on 55 acres of land in West Goshen, belonging to his father, and which he inherited by the will of the latter. He also purchased 10 acres of land in Westtown from the heirs of James Davis, by deed of March 18, 1793, and 5 acres of woodland in another place, from George Given and Elizabeth, his wife, March 23, 1809. Later he purchased from John Darlington, Ir., and Achsah, his wife, October 9, 1821, 48 acres in West Goshen, immediately south of the borough of West Chester and next to the line of East Bradford township. By his will, dated August 1, 1828, he devised the homestead to his wife, during life, in order to maintain his son Hilary and daughter Ann Eliza; to son Thomas, for the same term, the land purchased from John Darlington. After wife's death the lands were to be appraised, and son Amos was to have the homestead, except the western field, and son Thomas the remainder of the land, they paving the other children their shares.

42. George, b. 8 mo. 22, 1766; d. in Pennsbury (now Pocopson), township, 5 mo. 31, 1826; m. 5 mo. 28, 1795, at Bradford Meeting, Lydia Barnard, b. 8 mo. 6, 1770, in Newlin township; d. 5 mo 31, 1826; daughter of Richard and Lettice (Baker) Barnard, of Newlin. They settled in Pennsbury, on land of his father, which the latter subsequently devised to him. There were about 102 acres of land and a grist mill, which George operated. He also bought about 178 acres adjoining

this and extending to the Brandywine Creek. He and Lydia were active members of Birmingham Meeting, of which both were overseers, and she an elder at the time of her death. He was a trustee of the Packer estate, consisting of 200 acres, in Pennsbury, devised for the use of poor Friends of Concord Monthly Meeting. By his will, dated 12 mo. 18, 1837, he devised to his son George the southwest part of the land, including the mills and about 43 acres, together with nine shares of stock in the Bank of Chester County; to his son Joseph the middle part of the land, 1163/4 acres, and a note for \$275 against him; to son Stephen the remainder of the land, 120 acres—these three to pay the debts and legacies to the other children; to son Richard \$125, beside the \$900 already given him; to son Cyrus \$125, beside the \$1,000 already given him; to daughter Hannah \$050, beside the household goods already given her, to the value of \$150; to daughter Lydia \$950, beside \$150 in goods already given her, and to daughter Eliza \$725, in addition to \$350 in goods already given her.

43. STEPHEN, b. 10 mo. 25, 1768; d. in Fayette Co., Pa. He took a certificate from Concord Monthly Meeting to Redstone, dated 4 mo. 8, 1801, and was married 11 mo. 10, 1802, at Redstone Meeting, to Rachel Cattell, b. 1776, daughter of Jonas and Elizabeth (Roberts) Cattell, of Favette County. She was the Clerk of the women's meeting at the time of her marriage. Her death occurred after a short illness, on the 22d of 2d mo., 1848, near Brownville, Fayette County, in the 72d year of her age; "a valuable and useful member of Redstone monthly and particular meeting, and an elder about forty years. From her youth she has been a diligent attender of Friends' meetings, and manifested a lively concern for the maintenance of Gospel order in the church. In the removal of this dear Friend, her family and friends have sustained an irreparable loss." Stephen died at his residence, near Brownsville, 11 mo. 13, 1857, in the ooth year of his age. "He retained his mental faculties to the last, and was concerned for the faithful support of the doctrines and testimonies of our religious Society as held by early Friends; and in the end was favoured with a peaceful close."

44. Hannah, b. 1 mo. 27, 1771; d. 1799; m. 12 mo. 11, 1794.

at Birmingham Meeting, to Isaac Glover Gilpin, b. 4 mo. 13. 1757, in Birmingham township (now Delaware County); died there 6 mo. 11, 1840; son of George and Ruth (Caldwell) Gilpin, of that township. His grandfather, Joseph Gilpin, was married 12 mo. 23, 1601, at Baghurst, in the county of Southampton, England, to Hannah Glover, and in 1605, with his wife and two children, came to Pennsylvania and settled in Birmingham township, where thirteen other children were born to them. His wife's uncle. William Lamboll, of Reading, England, had purchased from William Penn 625 acres of land, and this was surveyed in Birmingham in 1684; 100 acres of this were conveyed to John Brunsden, of Bucklebury, in Berkshire, August 2, 1684; 100 acres more to Hannah Gilpin, October 12, 1604, subject to the life interest of her mother, Alice Glover; 75 acres to Joseph Gilpin, December 9, 1704, and 250 acres more, May 18, 1716. George Gilpin, the tenth child of Joseph and Hannah, obtained a portion of the homestead, and there died 10 mo. 15, 1773. Some of the lands descended to his son, Isaac G. Gilpin, who is thought to have followed the seas for a time, and also to have had an interest in flouring mills at Wilmington. He was styled of Wilmington when married, and he then settled on his lands in Birmingham. He was a well educated farmer, for the time, and possessed of a strong individuality. He kept a diary, or notes of marriages, deaths, etc., from 1804 to 1838, from which many dates have been obtained for this work.

45. ELIZABETH, b. 2 mo. 7, 1773; d. in Pocopson township, 2 mo. 24, 1857; m. 10 mo. 24, 1799, at Birmingham Meeting, to Isaac Taylor, b. 3 mo. 12, 1778; d. 9 mo. 22, 1831; son of Isaac and Hannah (Arnold) Taylor, of Pennsbury (now Pocopson) township. Joseph Taylor, son of Abiah Taylor, of Didcott, Berkshire, England, was married 1 mo. 16, 1700, to Elizabeth Haines, of Harwell, in that county, and came to Pennsylvania about 1708. He became the owner of over 1,100 acres in what is now Pocopson township, then Kennet, and built the mill on Pocopson Creek, afterward of George Darlington. His son Benjamin succeeded him in the possession of the mill and a considerable part of the land, to which he made addition by pur-

chase. His son, Isaac Taylor, senior, inherited the western part of his father's land, comprising about 350 acres, and he in turn was succeeded by his only son who survived infancy, Isaac Taylor, Jr., above mentioned.

46. EMANUEL, b. 6 mo. 28, 1775; d. in East Bradford, 3 mo. 16, 1837; m. 6 mo. 12, 1806, at Kennet Meeting, to Martha House, b. 4 mo. 5, 1776; d. 7 mo. 28, 1825; daughter of Amos House, of Pennsbury, by Sarah, his wife, daughter of John and Joanna Townsend, of East Bradford. He settled on and inherited the southern part of his father's land, in East Bradford and West Goshen, the residence being in the former. Martha was an elder of Birmingham Meeting.

47. Brinton, b. 12 mo. 23, 1781; d. 8 mo. 28, 1860; m. 11 mo. 12, 1807, at Willistown Meeting, to Sarah Garrett, b. 4 mo. 24, 1785; d. 2 mo. 19, 1854; daughter of Isaac and Elizabeth (Thatcher) Garrett, of Willistown township, Chester County. He inherited the homestead, in East Bradford, with about 75 acres of the land; and at his house, in 1853, was held the "Sesqui-Centennial" gathering of the Clan Darlington.

Children of (7) John Darlington and Esther Dicks.

48. SARAH, (John, Abraham), b. 1 mo. 1, 1752, in East Bradford; d. 6 mo. 16, 1822, in Birmingham; m. 8 mo. 29, 1778, at Chester, to Amos Brinton, b. 12 mo. 22, 1754; d. 11 mo. 28, 1823; son of George and Esther (Matlack) Brinton, of Birmingham, and grandson of Edward and Hannah (Peirce) Brinton. The following is a copy of their marriage certificate:

"These are to certify all whom it may concern That Amos Brinton and Sarah Darlington were Joyned together in Holy Matrimony according to ye Constitution of the Church of England, on the 29th Day of August in ye year of Our Lord 1778. Given from under my hand in ye Borough of Chester Day & Date aforesd.

Anglæ

GEO: CRAIG, Ecclæ Presbtr."

For their marriage "by a priest" he was disowned by Concord Monthly Meeting, 8 mo. 4, 1779, and she 2 mo. 9, 1780. On the back of the certificate is this endorsement: "We Came to live here the 30th of October, 1778." His grandfather, Ed-

ward Brinton, by will dated May 30, 1778, devised to him 20 acres of land on the Brandywine, south of and adjoining the land of Abraham Darlington, upon which was a "water corn mill" and a saw mill. He was also one of the executors of his said grandfather, and evidently a man of ability. In 1799 he was assessed with 15 acres of land, including dwelling house, etc., at \$30 per acre; 1 mare at \$60, 3 cattle at \$18 each, 1 mill and I sawmill at \$1,500. Sarah was received again by Friends, 8 mo. 8, 1792, together with her four children.

40. Job. b. 12 mo. 20, 1753; d. 5 mo. 26, 1841; m. 12 mo. 21, 1797, at Bradford Meeting, to Rebecca Hoopes, b. 3 mo. 1, 1772; d. 1 mo. 20, 1817; daughter of Joshua and Susanna (Garrett) Hoopes, of East Bradford. She received a certificate from Bradford to Concord Monthly Meeting, 2 mo. 16. 1708. By deed of August 12, 1707, John and Esther Darlington conveyed to their son Job the homestead, of 100 acres, in East Bradford, and also 54 acres in Goshen. Job also became the owner of the Indian King Tavern, West Whiteland township, with 38 acres of land, by deed from Thomas Mercer, dated April 1, 1822; this he conveyed to Joseph Himes, of West Chester, April 2, 1838, for \$2,500. His second wife was Hannah Mercer, daughter of William and Mary Mercer, of East Bradford, and for his marriage by a magistrate to one not a member his acknowledgment was accepted by Birmingham Monthly Meeting 8 mo. 7, 1820. His will is dated October 2, 1832, in which he gives nearly all the household and kitchen furniture to his wife, Hannah, during life, and then to his granddaughter, Hannah Rebecca Mercer, with remainder to her mother; to son Joshua, the Indian King tayern, he paying \$2,000 to the estate; to daughter, Esther Mercer, \$800 and a few articles of furniture; to son John, \$1,000; to sons, Garrett and Job, the homestead, stock and farming utensils, subject to the widow's privileges and maintenance, and \$100 to be paid her by Garrett, while Job was to pay into the estate \$900. A codicil, March 29, 1838, states that Joshua, having sold the Indian King and retained the balance of the money over \$2,000, the devise to him is void.

50. Joseph, b. 12 mo. 12, 1755; d. in April or May. 1821;

disowned 12 mo. 6, 1780, for accompanying two members in their marriage out of meeting; m. 4 mo. 16, 1801, at John Dilworth's house, by John Graves, Esq., to Hannah Dilworth, of East Bradford. By deed of 3 mo. 28, 1805, Benjamin Hawley, of East Bradford, and wife, Mary, for £585, conveyed to Joseph Darlington, of Goshen, 79 acres, 24 perches of land in the northern part of East Bradford township, part of 195 acres patented to Hawley January 18, 1790. Joseph's will is dated April 14th and proven May 12th, 1821, in which he gives all his estate to his wife during her widowhood; afterward to be divided among all his children.

51. ELIZABETH, b. 8 mo. 15, 1757; m. about 1776 to Abel Otley, b. about 1747; buried 12 mo. 4, 1831, aged 84; son of James Otley, sometime of Goshen, who married May 1, 1744, Ann Peirce, daughter of Gainer and Sarah (Walter) Peirce, of Goshen. Ann Otley, mother of Abel, died in Westtown township; buried 10 mo. 25, 1813, aged 88. When Abel Otley went to call upon his first wife her father asked him "what he was after." He replied, "that gal," pointing to Elizabeth. John Darlington did not look favorably upon the match and an elopement by night was the result. Elizabeth was disowned by Concord Monthly Meeting, 9 mo. 4, 1776, for marriage by a magistrate to one not a member. After her death Abel was admitted into membership at Birmingham and became a substantial Friend. He married 5 mo. 5, 1796, at Birmingham Meeting, Hannah Sharpless, daughter of Nathan; and she died 2 mo. 28, 1804, and was buried at Birmingham. In 1700 Abel Otley was the assessor of Westtown township, and returned for himself a stone house and frame barn, \$500: 50 acres of land, at \$50 per acre; two horses, at \$50 each, and two cattle, at \$16 per head. By trade he was a plasterer.

52. ESTHER, b. 7 mo. 7, 1759, was married March 27, 1813, by John Graves, Esq., to Andrew Hackett, being his second wife. His first wife, Mary Ann Brady, died 8 mo. 5, 1811. No children by the last wife. By the first he had Joseph, b. 1800; Susan (m. Joseph Brinton), Elizabeth (m. Cyrus Darlington), James and William.

53. Deboraii, b. 5 mo. 1, 1761; d. 11 mo. 22, 1840; married

William Brinton, b. 6 nio. 11, 1756; d. 8 mo. 12, 1832; son of George and Esther (Matlack) Brinton, of Birmingham. They were disowned by Concord Monthly Meeting, 10 mo. 4, 1780, having accomplished their marriage "by a priest;" but she was reinstated 6 mo. 6, 1798. By the will of his grandfather, Edward Brinton, he inherited 175 acres of land in Birmingham, next south of that devised to his brother Amos, and also joining on the Abraham Darlington tract. In 1799 this was assessed at \$25 per acre, beside which he had three horses, at \$50 each, and nine cattle, at \$18 each. Stock under four years old were not assessed. At a public sale, 11 mo. 1, 1799, William Brinton was the purchaser of the Abraham Darlington tract of 200 acres. This was rated at \$22 per acre in the assessment, but sold for £15.

54) Leah, b. 8 mo. 24, 1763; d., Honeybrook township, 1855, and buried at Bradford Meeting, 6 mo. 4th; m. 4 mo. 19, 1787, at Birmingham Meeting, to David Lewis, of East Bradford, b. 11 mo. 8, 1750; d. in West Bradford township, 6 mo. 4, 1834; son of Jabez and Hannah (Garrett) Lewis, of Newtown township, Delaware County, Pa. His mother was now the wife of William Woodward, of West Bradford. David Lewis was a tailor, and in 1799 was assessed with a good stone house and shop, a frame barn, 28 acres of land, two horses and two cows. Later he moved to West Chester and for a time kept tavern, but returned to West Bradford about 1820.

55. RACHEL, twin with Leah, died unmarried.

56. John, b. 3 mo. 17, 1766; m. 8 mo. 13, 1812, before Jacob Baker, Alderman, in Philadelphia, to Achsah Taylor, b. 5 mo. 4, 1783; daughter of his cousin, John Taylor and Ann Sellers, of East Bradford. His parents conveyed to him, by deed of August 12, 1797, for £400, 48 acres 59 perches of land in Goshen. This land was conveyed by John Darlington and Achsah, his wife, to Amos Darlington, October 9, 1821. The time and place of death have not been ascertained. As they have no living descendants, it may not be improper to state that Achsah's reputation as a veritable Xantippe was well known.

57. ZILLAH, b. 9 mo. 5, 1769; d. 9 mo. 12, 1844; m. Jonathan

Cope, b. 12 mo. 22, 1762; d. 6 mo. 10, 1840, and buried at Bradford Meeting; son of Samuel and Deborah (Parke) Cope. of East Bradford. Jonathan was first married to Susanna. daughter of William and Mary Mercer, of East Bradford, by whom he had a daughter. Phoebe, afterward the wife of Joseph Gheen. Zillah was disowned by Concord Monthly Meeting, 8 mo, o, 1707, for her marriage by a justice, but in 1816 her acknowledgment was accepted and her children admitted into membership by Birmingham Monthly Meeting. They belonged to the West Chester Particular Meeting, of which Jonathan was an overseer. He had learned the trade of a blacksmith and edge tool maker, and had a tilt-mill on Broad Run, in East Bradford, where he made augers and gimlets which were of wide reputation. In 1700 he was assessed with 150 acres of land, valued at \$8 per acre, beside the buildings, \$450, and one horse and two cattle.

Children of (8) Hannah Darlington and William Jefferis.

58. Jane, (Hannah, Abraham), b. 10 mo. 20, 1752; was disowned by Concord Monthly Meeting, 1 mo. 9, 1782, for marriage out of meeting to one not a member. Her husband's name was Frederick Wolf, but of his parentage or further history nothing has been learned. Their children, William, Abraham and Mary, are mentioned in their grandmother Jefferis's will, 1795.

59. ELIZABETH, b. 4 mo. 7, 1754; m. 10 mo. 28, 1776, at the Old Swedes' Church, Wilmington, to John Hickman. He was perhaps a son of Francis or Joseph, sons of Joseph, who was a son of Francis Hickman, who came from Wiltshire, England, about 1685. Benjamin Hickman, son of Francis, senior, was the ancestor of most, if not all, of the Chester County Hickmans, but the above John was not of his line. Elizabeth was disowned by Friends for her marriage "by a priest" to one not a member. They probably migrated to North Carolina.

60. RACHEL, b. 8 mo. 14, 1755; d. 1 mo. 21, 1835; m. 1775, to Griffith Roberts, said to have been the only son of John Roberts, an Englishman, whose second marriage was in 1754 to Jane Jefferis, a cousin to the father of Rachel. Rachel was

disowned 2 mo. 7, 1776, for marriage by a magistrate, but on 12 mo. 9, 1789, her acknowledgment was accepted and she received a certificate to Kennet, 2 mo. 3, 1790. Griffith Roberts was admitted into membership by Kennet Monthly Meeting, with his children, 4 mo. 11, 1793, and the family received a certificate to Hopewell, Va., 3 mo. 13, 1794; thence to Redstone, Fayette County, Pa., 2 mo. 4, 1799. He died 6 mo. 7, 1823, aged 73 years.

61. HANNAH, b. 4 (or 6) mo. 7, 1757; m. David Harris, and for her marriage "by a priest" to one not a member was disowned by Concord Monthly Meeting, 1 mo. 6, 1779. They probably went southward, but their further history is unknown.

62. Rebecca, b. 8 mo. 18, 1759; was living in 1777, but is not mentioned in her mother's will. 1795.

63. WILLIAM, b. 9 mo. 5, 1761; d. 5 mo. 27, 1848; married first, about 1784, to Ann Woodward, daughter of Richard and Hannah (Taylor) Woodward. He inherited the homestead by the will of his father. He was disowned 2 mo. 6, 1782, for mustering with the militia. In 1786 he was assessed with 150 acres, three horses, four cattle; in 1799, with 115 acres, three horses and five cattle. With his wife and seven children he started to Redstone, October 7, 1800, by wagon. He married again, July 4, 1806, Martha Mendenhall, daughter of Joseph and Jane (Collins) Mendenhall, of Fayette County. They resided on a farm two miles west of Uniontown, now belonging to heirs of John Snider. Some of their descendants write the name Jeffries.

64. ABRAHAM, b. 2 mo. 22, 1763; d. 10 mo. 18, 1822; married first, to Martha Way, b. 2 mo. 19, 1768; d. 3 mo. 17, 1797; daughter of Joshua and Lydia (Chandler) Way. Second marriage, 9 mo. 20, 1798, at Birmingham Meeting, to Ann Carter, widow of James Carter, of East Bradford; b. 12 mo. 28, 1761; d. at Richmond, Ind., 9 mo. 14, 1844; daughter of Jacob and Ann (Blakey) Sharpless, of Concord. Abraham bought and settled on a farm in West Caln township, and was an overseer of Caln Meeting. He died at the home of his daughter, Lydia Grier, in Clinton County, Ohio, while on his way to attend Indiana Yearly Meeting of Friends.

65. Agnes, b. 9 mo. 2, 1764; living in 1777, but not mentioned in her mother's will, 1795.

66. JoB, b. 6 mo. 9, 1766; d. 1 mo. 1, 1846; received a certificate from Concord to Hopewell Monthly Meeting, Va., 7 mo. 6, 1791, and was married 12 mo. 10, 1794, at Middle Creek Meeting, to Rebecca Long, of Frederick County, Va., daughter of Owen and Lydia Long, at which date he resided in Berkeley County. With his wife and child he received a certificate from Hopewell, 2 mo. 6, 1707, to Redstone, Favette County, Pa. He was married again, 3 mo. 6, 1800, at Sandy Hill Meeting, to Rebecca Burnett, of Union township, widow of John Burnett and daughter of Stephen and Mary Vail. She did not long survive, and he, with his own two children and his last wife's children, by her former husband, Rachel and Mary Burnett, received a certificate from Redstone, 3 mo. 1, 1805, to Miami, O., and in 1807 settled on a farm in Chester township, Cliuton County, where he died. He was married a third time, about 1810, to Elizabeth Reynolds, a widow, daughter of Joab and Isabella Nicholson, of Erie County, Pa. By her first husband she had two children, Jeremiah N., and Isabella Revnolds, of whom the first made a vovage around the world about 1831-4. His journal, of over 500 pages, is in possession of Jeremiah R. Jefferis, of Ashland, O.

67. Lydla, b. 5 mo. 17, 1768; d. 9 mo. 24, 1850; m. in Chester County, 6 mo. 10, 1788, by a Baptist minister, to Jacob Aughe, not a Friend; and for this she was disowned 2 mo. 4, 1789. This name was written Eage, or Edge, in the meeting records and in the will of Hannah Jefferis, 1795. Of the antecedents of Jacob Aughe nothing has been learned, though there was a Jacob Aughey, a miller, who was assessed in Pikeland township, 1774, with a tenement and grist mill and one cow.* Jacob and Lydia appear to have resided in Rockingham County, Va., in 1794, and she died at the residence of her son Jesse, Frankfort, Clinton County, Ind. Jacob was born

^{*} In 1789, Isaac Shunk, from Pikeland, was the miller at what is now Lenape, East Bradford, and he, with Jacob Aughey, were sued by Moses Mendenhall for a small demand. Shunk was probably surety for his employee.

February 10, 1765, and died February 2, 1819—probably in Warren County, O. Their son William, born 1794, writing in 1870, says: "During the Battle of Brandywine my mother was in a cellar with a hogshead turned over her, and the balls whistling through the house above her." This last incident should be received with caution, as the family residence was near two miles from the battle ground, though close to the line of march of the British army.

- 68. Mary, b. 12 mo. 10, 1770; d. young.
- 69. MARTHA, b. 2 mo. 17, 1773; d. in infancy.

Children of (9) Rachel Darlington and William Seal.

70. ABRAHAM (Rachel, Abraham), as a minor, received a certificate from Concord to Goshen Monthly Meeting, 5 mo. 7, 1783. By deed of November 30, 1791, he and his brother Joshua released to their half-brother, William Seal, the lands of their father, in Birmingham, about 175 acres, for the consideration of £200. Abraham received a certificate from Goshen to New Garden 7 mo. 5, 1793, and thence to Wilmington, 7 mo. 4, 1795. He is said to have died unmarried.

71. Joshua, b. about 1768-9; d. in Philadelphia with yellow fever, 1798; was m. 12 mo. 1, 1791, at Kennet Meeting, to Ann Taylor, b. 8 mo. 11, 1769; d. 7 mo. 30, 1822; daughter of Isaac and Hannah (Arnold) Taylor, of Pennsbury. He took a certificate from Concord to New Garden, dated 2 mo. 8, 1792, and his wife one from Kennet, 2 mo. 16, 1792. They received one thence to Wilmington, 7 mo. 4, 1795, with their two children, but she returned to Kennet, 1799, by way of Philadelphia; 2 mo. 12, 1801, she again received a certificate to Wilmington, and returned to Kennet in 1807. At the time of her death she was the owner of a house and 13 acres of land in Pennsbury—perhaps a part of her father's estate, which she devised to her son William.

Children of (11) Rebecca Darlington and John Brinton.

72. John, (*Rebecca, Abraham*), disowned by Concord Monthly Meeting, 1 mo. 7, 1784, for mustering with the militia. His further history unknown.

73. Rebecca, received a certificate from Concord, 11 mo. 7.

1781, to New Garden, and from thence back to Concord, 12 mo. 4, 1784. She was disowned 4 mo. 4, 1787, for marriage to her first cousin, Caleb Woodward, b. 10 mo. 10, 1757; son of Nayle and Lydia (Brinton) Woodward, of East Marlborough township. He married a second wife, Elizabeth Baldwin, b. 4 mo. 19, 1773, daughter of Anthony and Mary (Harlan) Baldwin, by whom he had children, Caleb, William, Joseph, Elizabeth, Mary, Elvina, Baldwin and E. Malinda. He resided in East Marlborough, near Unionville, where he died about 1840. By his will, dated February 18, 1839, he devised all his estate to his daughter, Elvina Woodward.

FOURTH GENERATION.

Children of (12) Lydia Pyle and Simeon Woodrow.

74. MARY (Lydia, Mary, Abraham), b. about 1758, married "by a priest," 1775, to Thomas White, b. 12 mo. 22, 1746, in West Caln, Chester County; d. prior to 1780; son of Nathaniel and Mary (Kerlin) White, of Frederick County, Va. Thomas removed to Virginia, taking a certificate from Bradford Monthly Meeting, dated 6 mo. 15, 1770. They were disowned 9 mo. 4, 1775, on account of their marriage, but her acknowledgment was accepted 8 mo. 7, 1780, by Hopewell Monthly Meeting, and her two children received into membership. She was married a second time, 11 mo. 16, 1780, at Hopewell Meeting, to Mahlon Smith, son of William and Ann Smith, of Loudoun County, Va. By her first husband she had Joseph, b. 3 mo. 14, 1776, and Nathaniel, b. 5 mo. 10, 1777.

75. ISAAC, received a certificate from Hopewell to Crooked Run, Va., 4 mo. 7, 1788. No further record.

76. Lydia, received certificate to Crooked Run, 3 mo. 3, 1788. No further record.

77. ELIZABETH, disowned by Hopewell, 7 mo. 4, 1785, under the name of Elizabeth Cadwallader, for marriage by a "hireling teacher."

78. RACHEL, received a certificate from Hopewell, 11 mo. 3, 1788, to Crooked Run. She married Abraham Neill, b. 9 mo. 26, 1753; fifth son of Lewis and Lydia (Hollingsworth) Neill,

of Frederick County, Va. The Jolliffe Genealogy says: "Abraham Neill was perhaps the most polished of all the sons, was of a firm character and very determined when his mind was made up. He added largely to his inherited estates, which were mostly south of Winchester. He was not a Friend. His father left him the large tract of land he bought of his brother John, and a tract of land in Berkeley County, purchased of Thomas Hart, a house and lot in the town of Winchester, purchased of Isaac Parkins, and other lands, a negro woman named Hannah and her child, and a complete outfit of farming implements."

79. ABRAHAM, removed with his parents to Virginia; probably died unmarried.

80. Simeon, and 81. Phebe, admitted into membership at Hopewell, 5 mo. 3, 1779. No further record.

Children of (13) Abraham and Jane (Webb) Pyle.

82. John (Abraham, Mary, Abraham), married, but the name of his wife is unknown. Amos K. Bradley, Wakefield, Lancaster County, is said to be a grandson, but will not answer inquiries.

83. Moses, probably died unmarried.

84. Lydia, married —— Boyce, and according to the record of 1853, had children, Moses, Abraham, Daniel, Rachel, Mary Ann.

Children of (15) Abraham and Hannah (Woodward) Taylor.

85. WILLIAM W. (Abraham, Deborah, Abraham), m. 8 mo. 17, 1829, by Thomas Sargent, minister of the gospel, Philadelphia, to Merab Taylor, daughter of his uncle, John Taylor. He died at Hillsdale Factory or Paper Mill, East Bradford, and administration on his estate was granted to B. Franklin Pyle, December 22, 1845. Merab afterward resided in West Chester for a few years, but died in East Bradford and was buried at Bradford Meeting 12 mo. 21, 1866. They had a son who died in infancy.

86. ELIJAH continued to reside on the paternal acres, which had passed into the possession of the children of his uncle, Abiah Taylor, and his home, an old log house with remarkably

uneven floors, was a rendezvous for several persons whose relationships it will not be attempted to explain. By his will, dated August 19, 1854, he gave to Joseph Stidham \$50. To Sarah Ann Taylor, who was an inmate of the family during childhood, a walnut bureau and \$50. Residue to housekeeper, Jane Ingram, and Emmor Taylor, who resided with the testator. Executors, Emmor Taylor and Sarah Ann Taylor. Elijah was buried at Bradford Meeting 3 mo. 29, 1855. A neat stone house has been erected close by the site of the old log one—the first on the east side of the Brandywine below the paper mill. Joseph Stidham was for several years a "character" around West Chester, being rather weak in intellect, though harmless.

87. Benjamin, married and went westward, where it is believed there are numerous descendants, but no addresses have been obtained.

88. RACHEL, m. 11 mo. 21 1811, to William Lamborn, b. 3 mo. 19, 1790; d. 7 mo. 31, 1861; son of John and Naomi (Webb) Lamborn, of Kennet. She died 10 mo. 8, 1823, and he married second Charlotte Simpson, 7 mo. 20, 1824, by whom he had Susanna, Naomi, Martha and Lydia. Third marriage, 7 mo. 2, 1835, to Lydia Mills.

By second wife, Sarah Trimble, he had:

89. Mary, d. unmarried.

Children of (16) Mary Taylor and Samuel Sellers.

- 90. Deborali (Mary, Deborah, Abraham), b. 3 mo. 4, 1767; d. in Delaware 7 mo. 17, 1845; made acknowledgement 8 mo. 8, 1809, to Kennet Monthly Meeting, for marriage by a magistrate to one not a member; m. William Pennock, son of John and Eleanor (Pusey) Pennock, of Birmingham township. No issue.
- 91. SAMUEL, b. 7 mo. 1, 1769; d. 12 mo. 24, 1850, in Pocopson township (formerly West Bradford); m. 10 mo. 17, 1810, at Marlborough Meeting, to Sarah Pennock, b. 4 mo. 19, 1782; d. in Kennet 7 mo. 3, 1855, and buried at Kennet Square; daughter of Caleb and Ann (Thompson) Pennock, of East Marlborough. He was a farmer and veterinary surgeon; buried at Bradford Meeting.

- 92. Lydia, b. 11 mo. 18, 1771; d. 3 mo. 19, 1772.
- 93. ABIAH, b. 2 mo. 21, 1773; d. 8 mo. 18, 1805; unmarried.
- 94. Jonathan, b. 3 mo. 15, 1776; d. 8 mo. 19, 1854, in Pocopson, and buried at Bradford Meeting; m. 12 mo. 26, 1810, at James Chamberlin's tavern, Marshallton, to Jane Wickersham, b. 10 mo. 16, 1787, in Newlin township; d. 11 mo. 1, 1866, in Pocopson, and buried at Bradford; daughter of William and Elizabeth (Pusey) Wickersham, of Newlin. They resided on a farm at Locust Grove, (now) Pocopson township.
- 95. Isaac, b. 7 mo. 23, 1779; d. in Pocopson 5 mo. 21, 1855, and buried at Bradford Meeting; m. Sarah Baily (daughter of Samuel and Susanna Smith Baily, of Newlin?). She died 5 mo. 21, 1843. Isaac was a mason, and purchased from his uncle, Jonathan Sellers, five acres of land, 4 mo. 1, 1815, and fifty-six acres more from Jonathan's son Joseph, 1 mo. 9, 1822. This was in West Bradford, now Pocopson, township.
 - 96. Mary, b. 8 mo. 13, 1782; d. 2 mo. 21, 1791.
 - 97. ISRAEL, b. 3 mo. 20, 1785; d. 11 mo. 19, 1854; unmarried.

Children of (17) John and Ann (Sellers) Taylor.

- 98. SAMUEL (John, Deborah, Abraham), b. 8 mo. 2, 1772; d. unmarried, and buried to Bradford Meeting, 5 mo. 13, 1824. He resided with his father, in East Bradford, and from a portion of his diary preserved, 1798-9, appears to have been employed at farming and attending a sawmill. The administration of his estate was granted to David Lewis, May 31, 1824.

ated a grist mill, now long idle, close by the old paper mill. After his death his widow removed to West Chester.

Funeral from the residence of Joseph Townsend, West Chester, 11 mo. 11, 1857. Interment at Bradford Meeting.

He read law with Joseph Hemphill, afterwards judge of the District Court of Philadelphia, and was first admitted to the Philadelphia bar, and after practicing there for a time removed to West Chester, and was admitted to the bar of Chester County in the year 1808, where he continued in the practice of his profession until his death. During a considerable portion of this period his practice was extensive. He was for many years solicitor of the Bank of Chester County, and for several of the sheriffs, and was also a commissioner under the bankrupt law of 1841. At his death he was the oldest member of the bar. It was at his house, the northeast corner of Gay and Church streets, that Lafayette was entertained and lodged, July 26-7, 1825.

Dr. Darlington says further of him: "Mr. Pyle was a man of profound learning in the law, and of skill in its administration, and was so regarded by all his associates. The profession never had a member in its ranks whose life was more unsullied, or who better deserved the reputation of a strictly honest and upright man. He was singularly retiring and unobtrusive in his disposition, but was nevertheless a most cheerful companion to

all who sought his society. To the younger members of the bar he was peculiarly kind and courteous, ever ready to assist them, and to guide their inexperience by his own mature opinions. It seemed as though his nature was incapable of harboring enmity against anyone. His legal skill. integrity, and conciliatory spirit made him ever a sure and kind guide to his clients and an honorable example to his professional brethren."

William Lacey, with his father-in-law, William Parlett, and Elizabeth his wife, produced a certificate to Middletown Monthly Meeting, Bucks County, from "Newport In ye Isle a Whight ye I of ye 4 month 1698." John Lacey, of Wrightstown, son of William, was m, 2 mo. 22, 1718, to Rachel Heston, daughter of Zebulon and Dorothy (Hutchinson) Heston, of the same township. Their son John, b. 7 mo. 23, 1723, m. 3 mo. 14, 1746, Jane Chapman, daughter of Abraham and Susanna Chapman, of Wrightstown. Gen. John Lacey, son of the latter, b. 12 mo. 4, 1752; d. 2 mo. 17, 1814, was a prominent character in Bucks County during the Revolution. He married, 1781, Antis Revnolds, daughter of Col. Thomas Revnolds, of New Mills, now Pemberton, N. I. Thomas Reynolds was the son of Patrick Reynolds, a native of Ireland, and married Elizabeth Budd. daughter of David Budd, by whom he had two daughters, Catharine, who married Smith Osborne, and Antis, wife of John Lacey. These last were the parents of Catherine Darlington.

The following sketch of Dr. Darlington is taken from the history of Chester County, 1881:

Dr. William Darlington, the eldest child of Edward and Hannah (Townsend) Darlington, was born near the ancient village of Dilworth, now called Dilworthstown, in Birmingham township, April 28, 1872. He descended from ancestors each branch of which, as far as it can be traced, was an unmixed race of plain English Quakers. He was early inured to the severe labors of agricultural life, and when old enough to hold the plow was kept at work in the summer, and only permitted to go to school in the winter season. He obtained a good English education under John Forsythe, an Irish Friend, one of the best teachers of that time in the county, and in the spring of 1800

entered the office of Dr. John Vaughan, a reputable physician, of Wilmington, Del. While pursuing his medical studies he also acquired a knowledge of the French language, and there developed a passion for the study of languages which enabled him afterwards to master the Latin, Spanish and German, During the scourge of vellow fever in 1802, all the physicians in Wilmington fled but Dr. Vaughan and his pupil, William Darlington, who continued heroically at their posts and rendered faithful services in that fearful epidemic. In the winters of 1802-3 and 1803-4 he attended the medical lectures in the University of Pennsylvania, and June 6, 1804, graduated, being the first citizen of Chester County who took the degree of Doctor of Medicine in that university. The subject of his inaugural thesis was "The Mutual Influence of Habits and Disease," which received a flattering compliment from the distinguished Prof. Rush. At the close of his second course of medical lectures he attended the botanical lectures of Prof. Benjamin Smith Barton, and thus began his first acquaintance with that science whose beauties and pleasures he, in later years, did so much to illustrate, and in so successful a manner as to make his name known and respected throughout the botanical world. On receiving his diploma, he returned to his native place and commenced the practice of medicine. In the following year he was appointed physician to the Chester County Almshouse, and also surgeon to a regiment of militia. The latter appointment, however, caused his disownment by the Society of Friends, of which he was a member, as it was contrary to their discipline to assist in or encourage war in any manner whatever. In 1806 Dr. Darlington was appointed surgeon to an East India merchantman belonging to Philadelphia, and made a voyage to Calcutta, whence he returned the following year. A sketch of the observations made during this voyage was, some years afterwards, published in the form of familiar letters in the Analectic Magazine. In the year succeeding his return from Calcutta he settled in West Chester and resumed the practice of medicine, and was soon in the enjoyment of an extensive and profitable practice. He was married June 1, 1808, to Catharine, daughter of Gen. John Lacev, of New Jersey, an officer of distinction in

the Revolutionary War. In 1811 he was made a trustee and secretary of the West Chester Academy, then about to be built, and these offices, then conferred on him, were continued more than half a century, and up to his death. In September, 1814. during the war of 1812, he went to the camp on the Delaware River as an ensign in the American Grays, a volunteer company of West Chester, and there was chosen major of the first battalion, in which his company was assigned; in which post he served until the corps was disbanded. In 1814 he was elected to the Fourteenth Congress of the United States, and in 1818 and 1820 elected to the Sixteenth and Seventeenth Congresses from the same district. During his second term the celebrated Missouri question agitated the Union from one end to the other, and called forth the ablest efforts of the best men in Congress. On that question Dr. Darlington was found ranked with those who were desirous to restrict slavery, and raised his voice in a most able speech in opposition to its extension. While serving his three terms in Congress he was distinguished for untiring and assiduous industry and attention to the duties of his station. In 1822 he was appointed by the Secretary of War a Visitor to West Point, and his report attracted great attention throughout the country.

In 1825 Pennsylvania commenced her grand scheme of canals and railroads, and Dr. Darlington was one of the members of the first Board of Canal Commissioners, and was associated with such men as Albert Gallatin, John Sergeant, Robert W. Patterson and David Scott, whose names hold a distinguished place in our country's annals. He served in that station two years, during the last of which he was president of the board. In 1826, in conjunction with some of his intimate friends, he assisted in organizing the Chester County Cabinet of Natural Sciences of which he was president from its origin; and in the same year he published his "Florula Cestrica," being a catalogue of plants growing around the borough of West Chester. The arduous duties of the office of canal commissioner calling him away from home more than was either convenient or agreeable, he resigned that office the next year, and was almost immediately thereafter appointed prothonotary and clerk of the

courts of his native county by his political and personal friend, the late lamented Governor Schulze, the duties of which office he continued to discharge till 1830. In 1828 he and some of his medical friends co-operated and formed the Medical Society of Chester County, of which he was unanimously placed at its head, which position he held until 1852, when he resigned, and was immediately elected an honorary member. In 1830 the Legislature appointed him one of the commissioners to lay out a State road from the Delaware River, near New Hope, to the Maryland line, in a direction towards Baltimore. About the same time, through the exertions of himself and other prominent citizens, the West Chester Railroad was built by a company of which he was the first president, and superintended the construction of the road. In 1830 he was elected president of the Bank of Chester County, of which institution he had been one of the commissioners named in the charter for receiving subscriptions of its capital stock, and a director almost ever since its establishment in 1814. He was re-elected annually and continued in that station at the time of his death. In 1837 Dr. Darlington published his "Flora Cestrica," a description of the flowering plants of Chester County, which was a new edition of his former work, much enlarged and greatly improved. In 1847 he prepared and published his "Agricultural Botany," and in 1843 he collected the letters, memoranda, etc., of Dr. William Baldwin, a native of his own county, who was also passionately devoted to botany, but who died at an early age, while on the expedition up the Missouri under Major Long. These remains were given to the world in a volume entitled "Reliquæ Baldwinianæ." The pioneers of botany in Pennsylvania were Humphry Marshall and John Bartram, both of Chester County; and Dr. Darlington collected in 1849 such portions of their correspondence as still remained in existence, comprising, together with their own letters, those of many eminent botanists of the day, and published them in one large volume, with illustrations of their homes, under the title of "Memorials of Bartram and Marshall." The doctor's son, Lieut. B. S. B. Darlington, who for seventeen years had been an officer in the United States Navy, died at Portsmouth, N. H., in 1845, of a disease contracted during the first cruise of our squadron on the coast of Africa under the stipulations of the Ashburton treaty which concerned the slave-trade. His youngest son, who bore his name. was acting colonel of the Eighteenth Pennsylvania Cavalry during the War of the Rebellion of 1861-65. In 1853 the name of Darlingtonia Californica was given in his honor by Dr. Torrey. of New York, to a new and remarkable variety of pitcher-plant found in California, and a similar honor had been conferred on him in 1825 by Prof. De Candolle, of Geneva, for the doctor's eminent services in the beautiful science of botany. Shortly after the death of Lieut, Darlington, that afflicting dispensation was followed by one still more severe and poignant in the death of the doctor's wife. She had borne him four sons and four daughters, and for nearly forty years had been his faithful counselor and partner. Soon after her death he became a member of the Protestant Episcopal Church, the congregation of which he had years before assisted in forming, as well as in aiding in the erection of its church edifice.

Dr. Darlington died April 23, 1863, aged nearly eighty-one years, with his mental vigor unimpaired, but his physical system worn out by a long and active life. In his earlier years he was an ardent politician, and a warm Republican of the school of 1800, and was long a leader of the Democratic party of his county. He was a zealous supporter of the administrations of Lefferson and Madison, and of the economical doctrines of the American system, as advocated by Clay, Carey, Niles and Calhoun, before the latter turned nullifier. The radical tendencies of the Democratic party, in the campaign of 1824, caused him to abandon that party for the more conservative principles of the men who supported Adams and Clay, and he was from that time onward a Whig and Republican. As a political writer he was hold, nervous and sententious, with a strong vein of sarcasm running through his compositions, while as the author of numerous literary addresses and scientific dissertations, delivered before bodies of that character, his style was easy, plain. and flowing, mingling wit and humor with knowledge and instruction. As a physician he enjoyed an extensive practice, and while he continued his medical labors he was confessedly at the

head of his profession in Chester County. He received the degree of Doctor of Laws from Yale College, and that of Doctor of Physical Science from Dickinson College, and he was elected a member of more than forty literary and scientific associations, among which may be mentioned the American Philosophical Society of Philadelphia, and the Botanical Society of the Netherlands, at Leyden.

The last work in which he was engaged was "Note Cestrienses," or notices of Chester County men and events, the joint production of himself and his friend, I. Smith Futhey, each contributing a portion thereof. Dr. Darlington was then nearly eighty years of age, and the work was only finished a few months before his death.

His extensive herbarium of plants and his scientific works he bequeathed to the Chester County Cabinet of Natural Science. His remains repose in the Oaklands Cemetery, near West Chester, in the establishment and embellishment of which he took a deep interest. The following is the epitaph inscribed upon his memorial stone, written by himself twenty years before his death: "Plantæ Cestrienses, quas dilexit atque illustravit. super tumulum eius semper floreant." (The plants of Chester, which he loved and described, may they blossom forever above his tomb.)

To the above it may be added that it was doubtless due to Dr. Darlington's interest in the family history that the idea of a gathering of the "Clan Darlington" in 1853, was brought to a successful issue. On this occasion he was the orator of the day. In 1850 he began the collection of documents relating to his ancestry in a manuscript book, which has been freely drawn upon for this work.

157. Thomas, b. 6 mo. 27, 1784; d. 2 mo. 17, 1866; unmarried, and buried at Birmingham Meeting. He inherited a part of his father's land, but continued to reside with his brother Edward, at the homestead, and with the family of the latter until his death. By deed of July 11, 1838, he conveyed his part of the land to his brother Edward for the sum of \$5.265.75. Being an executor of the will of Amos Brinton, who in turn was executor of Abraham Darlington, the eldest son of the first Abraham, many of the old family papers came into his hands through this channel. He was also one of the executors of his father's will, and the latter was an executor of his father. Thomas Darlington. Through these and similar channels the papers which came into his hands were sufficient to fill two large trunks. He not only took much interest in these, but was pleased to show them to others, and in 1863 the compiler was delighted with the loan of many of them for the purpose of copying them. It was doubtless he who brought these papers to the attention of his brother, William, and led the latter to suggest a gathering of the whole family.

158. ZIBA, b. 6 mo. 1, 1788; d. in West Chester, Pa., 11 mo. 7, 1876, and buried at Birmingham Meeting. He inherited a part of the homestead, and also purchased the adjoining farm to the eastward, in Birmingham, Delaware County, this being the original place of settlement of the Brinton family, and the mansion house erected about 1704. It is on the West Chester and Wilmington road, a short distance south of Dilworthtown. He was first married 2 mo. 19, 1829, to Hannah Webb, b. 7 mo. 5, 1700; d. o mo. 2, 1843; daughter of William and Jane (Carpenter) Webb, of Pennsbury township. Their three children died in infancy, and perhaps unnamed. His second marriage, 3 mo. 5, 1850, was to his cousin, Ruth C. Gilpin, b. 8 mo. 8, 1707; d. in New Garden township, 5 mo. 21, 1801; daughter of Isaac G, and Hannah (Darlington) Gilpin, of Birmingham, About 1860 they removed to West Chester, and resided on North High street. During the war of 1812-14 he was a sergeant in Capt. Titus Taylor's company, "American Greys," who went into camp at Marcus Hook. On this account a military company took part in the exercises at the time of his burial. He was quiet and unostentations, dignified in bearing, and though much given to charity, he left a considerable estate to be divided among his relatives. The family papers came to him at the death of his brother Thomas, and after his own death, passed to his nephew. Thomas H. Darlington. widow spent the last years of her life with her niece. Ruthanna Michener, near Toughkenamon village.

159. Sarah, b. 7 mo. 19, 1790; d. 5 mo. 12, 1818; m. 9 mo.

Land

2, 1813, in Philadelphia, to John Painter, son of Samuel and Elizabeth (Bennett) Painter, of Birmingham, Delaware County. They settled at Sandy Spring, Montgomery County, Md., where she died. He m. a second wife, Eliza Palmer, 2 mo. 7, 1821, who d. 9 mo. 9, 1821, and he d. 6 mo. 8, 1824, aged forty-five or forty-six years. Sarah had two children, Hannah, b. 7 mo. 4, 1814, and Jane, b. 12 mo. 24, 1815, both of whom died in infancy—one of them, 5 mo. 22, 1816, was buried at Concord Meeting, the 24th.

160. Samuel, b. 11 mo. 6, 1793; d. 12 mo. 25, 1794.

161. JANE, b. 9 mo. 9, 1796; d. 1 mo. 3, 1817; unmarried.

162. Edward, b. 12 mo. 16, 1798; d. 5 mo. 6, 1851; m. 3 mo. 23, 1831, to Hannah Sharples, b. 10 mo. 4, 1805; d. in West Chester, 7 mo. 3, 1882; daughter of Nathan and Martha (Price) Sharples, of West Chester. He inherited the homestead with a part of the land, to which he made additions by purchase from his brothers, Thomas and Ziba. This farm was called "Darnhall" in memory of the ancestral home in England, though it is probable that the name was not conferred until an interest was aroused in the family history, about 1850. Edward was not so robust as his brothers, and about 1825 made a voyage to Europe on account of his health. About twenty years after his death his widow removed to West Chester and the property passed out of the name, being purchased by Abram Huev.

Children of (38) Abraham and Susanna (Chandler) Darlington.

163. ISAAC (Abraham, Thomas, Abraham), b. in Westtown township 12 mo. 13, 1781; d. West Chester, 4 mo. 27, 1839; m. first to Mary Peters, daughter of William Peters, and niece of Judge Richard Peters, of Philadelphia, who died 8 mo. 31, 1823; second m. 9 mo. 3, 1827, by John Graves, Esq., in West Chester, to Rebecca Fairlamb, b. 4 mo. 10, 1785; d. 4 mo. 29, 1859; daughter of John and Susanna (Ashbridge) Fairlamb. She being a Friend, made an acknowledgement for her marriage by a justice, and retained her membership with (Orthodox) Friends until her death. The following sketch of Isaac Darlington is taken from the history of Chester County:

While he was yet young, his father and family removed to . Thornbury township, near Birmingham Meeting House, where he was brought up and had his home until he had nearly reached the age of eighteen years. His father had been taught the trade of blacksmith (for in those days it was usual for young men of reputable family to learn some mechanic art), and was an excellent workman; but he was also a practical farmer, and carried on both occupations with extraordinary energy, skill and success. He likewise, for a number of years, filled the office of justice of the peace with great credit to himself, and to the entire satisfaction of the vicinage. He was a hard worker on the farm through the day, and did the smith work for the neighborhood during the noon intermission, and in the evening, often wielding the hammer until late bedtime. His sons were early initiated into the same industrious habits. and Isaac, being the eldest, as soon as he acquired sufficient strength to swing a sledge-hammer, labored continually with his father in the fields, and was moreover taught to blow and strike in the smith shop at noon and in the evening. Probably no boy in Chester County was trained to more laborious habits in early life than Isaac Darlington.

His education was simply English, with a fair start in mathematics, and his schooling was limited to the winter season as soon as he reached an age or was strong enough to work on the farm or take his stand by the anvil. It is true he had the benefit of the instruction of John Forsythe, the best schoolmaster of that period and region of country, and under that tuition he made extraordinary progress. Isaac Darlington's physical constitution was remarkably sound and vigorous, and from his earliest youth his intellectual powers and attainments so far exceeded those of his juvenile contemporaries as to excite the admiration of all who knew him. At the age of fifteen years his aspiration reached beyond the farm and smith-shop; but as his father did not then perceive the importance of a thorough education for such faculties (a circumstance much to be regretted, for he was endowed with a singular aptitude for learning), instead of sending the boy of so much promise to a seminary, where his powers could be adequately trained and

developed, he was merely permitted to take charge of an insignificant country school. In this occupation Isaac Darlington was engaged for two or three winters, and acquitted himself with remarkable success for so juvenile a teacher, whose pupils were often his seniors. In his eighteenth year, dissatisfied with the drudgery, and impatient under the routine duties of a rural pedagogue, as then practiced, he turned his attention to the profession of the law and became a student in the office of Joseph Hemphill, Esq., at that time a distinguished member of the bar at West Chester. Although, like most county towns of that day, West Chester was a place of perilous dissipation, especially among the young men of the legal profession and sundry idle hangers-on of society, Isaac Darlington, amid it all, applied himself so successfully to his studies that he was found duly qualified, and admitted to the bar, November term, 1801, some two or three weeks before he was twenty years old. Tradition says that when the committee asked him if he was of age he carelessly replied, "Not quite"; and, judging from his finely developed, manly form and nonchalant manner that he must have nearly reached that period, one of them remarked that a few days, more or less, were of little consequence; and, with a complimentary report in his favor, the precocious minor forthwith took his stand among the veterans of the Chester County bar. The powerful grasp of his intellect enabled him-maugre the prevalent, unpropitious habits of the time-speedily to take a high and influential position among his professional seniors who then attended the county courts and adorned the West Chester bar.

In the years 1807 and 1808 he was elected to the State Legislature, where he was an active member; but finding the position to interfere with his practice, he declined a further continuance in that station. At a special election, however, in February, 1816, to supply a vacancy caused by death, he was chosen to the same body without opposition. During the war of 1812-15, although a zealous member of the political party opposed to that war, when the strife began to be serious Isaac Darlington aided in raising a company of volunteer infantry for the defense of altar and firesides, was the first lieutenant

and master-spirit of the corps, and on the call of the Governor, in 1814, after the sack of Washington City, marched with it to the camp formed for the protection of Philadelphia. He there served as adjutant of the Second Regiment of Pennsylvania Volunteers until the close of the campaign.

At the general election in 1816 he was elected by the district composed of Chester and Montgomery Counties a member of the Fifteenth Congress, and served through the term, but declined being again a candidate. In December, 1820, he was appointed deputy attorney-general for Chester County, which office he held until May, 1821, when he received the appointment of president judge of the judicial district composed of the counties of Chester and Delaware. This situation he held until his death, April 27, 1830.

Judge Darlington was twice married, first to Miss Mary Peters, by whom he had two interesting daughters, the eldest of whom especially was distinguished for rare personal and mental endowments; but he survived them both, and has left no descendants. His second wife was Miss Rebecca Fairlamb,

who survived him nearly twenty years.

164. HANNAH, b. Westtown, 5 mo. 16, 1783; d. near South Charleston, Clark County, O.; m. 5 mo. 7, 1807, at Birmingham Meeting, to Jonathan Peirce, b. East Marlborough township, 3 mo. 30, 1785; d. Green Plain, Clark County, O., 1 mo. 31, 1852; both buried in the cemetery at South Charleston. He was the son of Jacob and Hannah (Buffington) Peirce, of East Marlborough, Chester County, They removed from Chester County to Ohio in 1825, and received a certificate from Kennet to New Garden Monthly Meeting, Ohio, dated 2 mo. 7, 1826.

165. THOMAS, b. 11 mo. 14, 1784; d. 11 mo. 8, 1860; m. Mary Brinton, b. 6 mo. 24, 1788; d. 1 mo. 27, 1828; daughter of Joseph and Mary (Martin) Brinton, of Thornbury township. They resided in Westtown, and for many years lie kept the tavern on the Wilmington road and "Street Road," at what has long been known as "Darlington's Corner."

166. BENEDICT, b. 9 mo. 22, 1786, in Westtown; d. 7 mo. 17, 1864, in Londonderry township; m. 11 mo, 1, 1807, in Birmingham, to (256), Rachel Otley, b. 3 mo. 27, 1788, in Westtown; d. 12 mo. 14, 1861, in Londonderry; daughter of Abel and Elizabeth (Darlington) Otley, of Westtown; both buried at Fallowfield Meeting, Ercildoun. Their son Abel gave the following account of his father:

Soon after marriage he settled on a small farm of forty acres in Westtown township, on the Wilmington Road, about onethird of a mile north of Darlington's Corner, then and long after known as "Parker's Woods." He worked at his trade, carpentry, for a few years, and about 1810 to 1812 began manufacturing eight-day wooden clocks. Jonathan N. Hatch, Russell Vibber and Thomas De Wolf (all from Connecticut, I think), made and fitted up the wooden works, or movements, and my father made the cases-about seven feet in height, and peddled them round the country. One of these remained in his possession at the time of his death, and which I have since given to my daughter, Susan Peirce, of Philadelphia, and is yet a very good timekeeper. About the year 1814 or '15 he began the weaving of heavy cotton goods, with about a dozen looms, and also began storekeeping about the same time, both of which he continued until the fall of 1841. In the spring of 1826 he bought the Titus Taylor farm, of about 100 acres, adjoining on the east, and during the same summer built a large stone house, 34 by 46 feet, on the site of the old log house which he had previously occupied; and this new house he continued to occupy as a store and dwelling until the fall of 1841, when by reason of heavy losses, sustained by endorsing for Ionathan N. Hatch (whose cotton factory on Crum Creek was burned), he was obliged to leave the old homestead. He moved to Sassafras Neck, Cecil County, Md., where he remained until the spring of 1846, when he removed to Londonderry township, Chester County, where he purchased a farm of 200 acres from the executors of William Cranston, and on which he continued to reside until his decease. His early education was quite limited. obtained at common country schools, and only about three months in each year, notwithstanding which he subsequently acquired such an amount of information and intelligence as is rarely attained by anyone under similar circumstances, having a very active and inquiring mind, and unusually retentive memory. He and my mother were both members of Friends' Society. On the subject of politics and political economy he was a disciple of Henry C. Carey—a thorough protectionist. His death was quite sudden. He had not been confined to bed at any time. He arose that morning and dressed himself as usual and was seated in his chair reading a newspaper and conversing with my wife, when suddenly the paper dropped from his hands and he said, "What is this?" and in a few moments ceased to breathe, and died without a struggle. The cause of death was ossification of the valves of the heart.

167. Авганам, b. in Westtown 7 mo. 17, 1789; d. 7 mo. 31, 1879; m. 4 mo. 14, 1819, at West Chester Meeting, to Susan Hoopes, b. West Goshen township 3 mo. 2, 1796; d. in Thornbury 8 mo. 18, 1872; daughter of Jesse and Amy (Cope) Hoopes, of West Goshen; both buried at Birmingham Meeting. He continued to reside at the homestead of his father, in Thornbury, Chester County, just east of Birmingham Meeting. In 1860 he and his wife celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in the presence of several relatives, and on the ninetieth anniversary of his birth a family reunion was held at Birmingham Meeting House, on which occasion he was in his happiest and liveliest mood. Like that of two of his brothers, his death came suddenly. He arose in usual health, and after breakfast walked to the barn, as was his usual custom, but on the way back to the house became suddenly ill and died in a few minntes.

168. CLEMENT, b. 7 mo. 4, 1791, in Thornbury; d. 8 mo. 19, 1791.

169. ESTHER, b. 5 mo. 5, 1793; d. in West Chester 1 mo. 7, 1877; m. 11 mo. 10, 1814, at Birmingham Meeting, to James B. Roberts, b. at or near Quakertown, Bucks County, Pa., 11 mo. 27, 1784; d. in Charlestown township, Chester County, 8 mo. 29, 1822, and buried at Pikeland Meeting; son of Edward and Mary (Burson) Roberts, of Charlestown. He was a farmer, and in 1814 and 1815 was elected a member of Assembly from Chester County. His farm was near Charlestown village. After his death his widow returned for a time to her father's, but for several years prior to her death resided

on Chestnut street, West Chester, opposite the Friends' Meeting House.

170. Susanna, b. 11 mo. 11, 1795; d. 9 mo. 15, 1803.

171. ELIZA, b. 5 mo. 26, 1797; d. 3 mo. 17, 1878; m. 11 mo. 20, 1817, at Birmingham Meeting, to Thomas Hoopes, b. 7 mo. 27, 1794; d. 5 mo. 9, 1880; son of Jesse and Amy (Cope) Hoopes, of West Goshen. They resided at the ancestral home of his father and grandfather, on a farm directly north of and adjoining the borough of West Chester. He was of a mechanical turn, and besides a saw mill, had a machine shop connected therewith. He and his uncle, Ezra Cope, manufactured a number of mowing machines, under a patent which they obtained in 1825, and which were used for several years throughout the neighborhood. Thomas and Eliza Hoopes lived to celebrate not only the fiftieth, but also the sixtieth anniversary of their marriage.

172. CIDNEY, b. 2 mo. 19, 1799; d. 7 mo. 7, 1868, in West Chester; unmarried.

173. CHANDLER, b. 11 mo. 4, 1800; d. 3 mo. 29, 1879; m. 11 mo. 21, 1832, to Hannah Monaghan, b. 10 mo. 29, 1808; d. 1 mo. 11, 1883; daughter of James and Hannah (Jackson) Monaghan, of West Fallowfield township, Chester County. They resided in Kennet township, about a mile east of Kennet Square. Though a plain farmer by occupation. Chandler Darlington was well informed and deeply interested in the social questions of the day; fearless in the advocacy of right and justice, and undeterred by the unpopularity of his views. He took an active part in the meetings at Longwood, where all questions affecting the welfare of humanity were freely discussed. The slave, fleeing from oppression, was assisted on his way to freedom, and those in need of counsel and advice were certain to find a friend in him. At family gatherings he was among the most interested, and generally contributed some verses appropriate to the occasion and replete with good sense. After his death his widow removed to West Chester. She conveyed to the borough a valuable lot of ground for the use of a public library, and upon which a building was soon after erected by private contributions. For several years a library has been

maintained by the earnest and unselfish labors of a board of ladies, but the borough has at last agreed to be responsible for its support. They had no children.

174. WILLIAM, b. 10 mo. 19, 1804; d. 12 mo. 6, 1879; m. 3 mo. 19, 1829, to Catharine Paxson, b. 10 mo. 20, 1806, in Cecil County, Md.; d. in West Chester 7 mo. 24, 1886.

The following is taken from a memoir printed by the Philosophical Society of West Chester:

William Darlington studied law with his celebrated brother, Judge Darlington, who was the eldest of the twelve children of their parents and who had been distinguished at the Chester County bar nearly twenty-five years before he certified to the court on January 30, 1826, that "William Darlington has served a regular clerkship and studied the law with assiduity under my direction for the term of three years, and also that he is a person of integrity and good behaviour."

On the following day he was duly examined by Ziba Pyle, William H. Dillingham and Townsend Haines, who reported to the court "that they find him well qualified to practice as an attorney of this court," whereupon he was admitted and sworn in at the bar, January 31, 1826, before his brother, who was then the presiding judge. He had then just entered his twenty-second year. The discipline, flexibility and ease which collegiate training is supposed to best supply were in his case attained by self-culture, quick observation engrafted into the stock of native good sense, super-added to such educational facilities as the local schools afforded, and with a natural aptitude for the practical adaptation of circumstances and means to ends he became, like his illustrious brother, a man of intuitions. He digested the principles of law into an almost unerring legal apprehension of things, so as to judge instinctively what was in harmony with law in its higher sense, and in his riper years became like Lord Bacon's model judge, whose "speech was with gravity, as of the sages of the lawnot talkative nor with impertinent flying out to show learning," and "mixed well his freedom of opinion with decorous respect for the opinions of others."

He presents another of the innumerable instances of men,

without having ever entered a college, rising above and excelling those who have been systematically college-bred—the logic of which is, perhaps, that greater force of character is always necessary to such an achievement. The character of Chief Justice Marshall is a brilliant example of this.

It is said that for some years next following Mr. Darlington's admission to the bar, his professional business was chiefly confined to the Orphans' Court and that he came slowly into the Common Pleas. He, however, must soon have demonstrated his abilities, because, notwithstanding his competitors at the bar were such men as John Edwards, Benjamin Tilgham, William H. Dillingham, Isaac D. Barnard, Townsend Haines, Thomas S. Bell and Joseph J. Lewis, Mr. Darlington had the distinction and honor of being chosen from among them, within a dozen years after his admission, and when he was less than thirty-three years of age, and elected a member of the State convention to remodel the Constitution, where he bore so active and discreet a part that thirty-five years later, when further amendments were to be considered, the people with one accord recommissioned him to represent them in the Constitutional convention of 1873, where he made perhaps a hundred important speeches. The record of the debates in that convention shows that he spoke to business more than five hundred times, and in the language of a distinguished Philadelphia member of that body, "never talked nonsense." One of the measures which he especially advocated was female suffrage.

Mr. Darlington's leading characteristics were courage, sagacity, equanimity, aptness, precision, brevity and force. All verbosity and attempts at style were discouraged and discarded by him. He sought to come directly to the very core of the business in hand by a torrent of cogent and masculine reasons.

He served the office of Deputy Attorney-General for Chester County from 1835 to 1838, during the administration of Governor Ritner, but had a distaste for the practice of criminal jurisprudence. It was in the deeper and richer mines of legal science that he most loved to delve, consequently his practice

was of the most desirable and lucrative kind. He utterly abhorred the stirring up of unnecessary litigation, cumbering the trial lists with frivolous and vexatious suits, which must necessarily fall at the first touch of the judicial wand.

Mr. Darlington was steadfast to his profession from the commencement of his practice, in 1826, to the moment of his death, when he sank down in the corridor of the court house, on the sixth day of December, 1879, while on his way to the court room to try a cause.

His practice was chiefly confined to the county courts in Eastern Pennsylvania and the Supreme Court of the State, although he was frequently engaged in the District Court of the United States at Philadelphia, and was a member of the Supreme Court of the United States at Washington.

There was nothing dramatic nor startling in his career, but he kept right on in the higher levels of local practice, surrounded by a large and wealthy clientage, whom he served always with the utmost alacrity and fidelity.

> "Untainted by the guilty bribe, Uncursed amid the harpy tribe."

About the year 1851 he made a voyage to Europe, where he accomplished the grand tour and crossed the Alps.

He was at the Great World's Fair, at London; repeatedly visited the Houses of Lords and Commons, where he heard in debate Lord Brougham, Lord John Russell, and Mr. Whiteside, who was one of the counsel for O'Connell at his trial. He attended the Peace Congress at Exeter Hall and heard Richard Cobden, Sir David Brewster, Lord Ellenborough, Duke of Argyle and Elihu Burritt, and afterwards met those famous men at private evening entertainments given in their honor. He attended an anti-slavery meeting in London, presided over by Samuel Gurney, and addressed by Joseph Sturge and by a fingitive slave, when the fugitive slave law of the United States was under fire of the whole moral world.

He also visited the Courts of Exchequer, Queen's Bench, Vice Chancellor's, etc., where he met with much civility from the wearers of the wig and gown. Abbott Lawrence was then our Minister, and from him Mr. Darlington received polite attentions.

During this tour he was a most industrious sightseer, and kept a journal, which will be highly valuable to his family, his friends and future biographer.

In England he endeavored to discover facts relating to the Darlington lineage, and visited Darnhall, a small township or tithing of ten farms, twenty-six miles southeast of Liverpool, near Winsford Station, on the London & North Western Railway. From that station he walked about the country several miles among the villages, and at the village of Over the vicar in charge of the parish allowed him access to the ancient parish register, which was without an index, and which he found tedious to turn over leaf by leaf; but he succeeded in finding the following entry: "Job Darlington, of Darnhall, in ye parish of Whitegate, yeoman, was interred August ve 11th, 1731"; this he relied upon as being identical with the father of the immigrant ancestor of the Pennsylvania family to which he belonged. He also visited one John Darlington, who was living on a lease of ninety acres under Lord Delamere, at an annual rent of seven hundred and fifty dollars; but he could not trace any kinship nor gain any information, except that the name is common in the villages and large towns of that part of England.

Mr. Darlington never returned to England, his subsequent travels being chiefly confined to the United States, where he visited and studied many of the principal cities of the West and South.

He also visited the chief cities and towns of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and contrasted them with those of our Republic. He was one of the first of our people to cross the continent by rail to San Francisco.

Being very fond of natural scenery and outdoor life, it was his delight to go in summer to some cool resort upon the mountains or by the sea and spend a few weeks, accompanied by members of his family, and to return home rejuvenated to take up his professional labors again.

He was asked during the late Exposition at Paris, "Why do you not quit work, go to Europe, and add ten years to the duration of your life?" He replied: "At my time of life I should not like to go alone and leave my wife, and I fear she is not strong enough to bear the exposure and fatigue of the journey." Thus was he ever thoughtful, considerate and tender, and this brings us to the contemplation of his private life. His domestic life was fortunate and happy. On March 19, 1820, he married Catharine Paxson. Four sons and two daughters were born to them, all of whom, save one child who died in infancy, survive him. On March 10, 1870, the golden wedding was celebrated at their residence in West Chester, attended by all their children and grandchildren, and by a large assemblage of relatives and friends, among whom were Isaac W. Van Leer and William A. Speakman, and perhaps others, who were guests at the marriage fifty years previous, and who there witnessed a fine illustration of the declaration in the proverb that "children's children are the crown of old men, and the glory of children are their fathers." Mr. Darlington lived to see his children all married, well established and flourishing, and it was his delight to prosper them. He had happily acquired a love of reading, and, like Sir Samuel Romilly and Edward Gibbon, the historian, he rigidly kept up his non-professional readings to fortify his soul.

> "Olympian bards who sung Divine ideas below; Which always find us young, And always keep us so."

Possessing a well-selected library, his evenings were spent at home among his family and books. His literary tastes, although varied and quite ardent, seemed to incline more to modern history, which, it is believed, he read more as a record of events than as showing a development of thought in a strictly literary sense.

Among his favorite books were: Gibbon's "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire," Allison's "History of Europe," Macaulay's "History of England," Bancroft's "History of the United States," Prescott's "Histories," Taines' "English Liter-

ature," Bulwer's "Historical Characters," "Reports of English State Trials," biographies and speeches of famous statesmen, chancellors and lawyers. He was fond of the Waverley novels, Bulwer's and Dickens' novels, especially the "Pickwick Papers." He delighted in good poetry, and retained in his memory many of the best passages of the best authors and towards the close of his life frequently entertained his family by lengthy recitations of them; on such an occasion one of his daughters inquired of him: "Father, how can you remember all that?" "Remember it!" he exclaimed, "it is so beautiful that I cannot forget it."

He knew the "Essay on Man" by heart. He was emphatically a scorner of cant, bigotry and pretentious goodness. despised hypocrisy wherever found. He feared no man, and believed that "to confront the gods without any misgiving was to know Heaven," but was humble before God. and would reverently repeat Pope's "Universal Prayer" as containing his He had a birthright in the Society of Friends, but further than that he was not personally connected with any religious denomination, although he was a liberal contributor to the Methodist Episcopal Church of West Chester, with which members of his family were connected, and was a great admirer of Bishop Simpson. He recognized and availed himself of the fact that he was naturally gifted with a genius for finance, and he directed his energies to the acquisition of a fortune, not from a sordid greed of lucre to be hoarded with miserly care for its own sake, but as a means of establishing his family in ease and comfort, for he firmly believed that he that provideth not for those of his own household is worse than an infidel; and he was heroic in the maintenance of this principle, but when he had accomplished the task, he gave to charity and forebore to be mercenary.

It cannot be said that he was unsatisfied in getting, or princely in bestowing, but rather that he was always prudent and discriminative. His money-making injured nobody. He peeled the rods and made the circumstances, but he bought no man's birthright for a mess of pottage, yet, although the youngest son, he acquired the greatest estate. A gentleman once ex-

pressed to him a wish to be equally successful in getting rich and then he would be content. To which Mr. Darlington replied: "Don't deceive yourself; contentment does not always increase with property, according to my experience."

No two men are ever alike in character, but rather are they as various as their countenances. The character of William Darlington needs perspective, like a great building, which, standing near, we do not appreciate its harmony of proportions. He was not a man of society, yet society committed to him many of its most sacred public and private trusts, pecuniary and otherwise. A great part of his power was latent; he was an influence felt even where he did or said nothing. There was a potency in his presence. He was often solitary, but never lonesome.

He was a man who, in the strong language of Napoleon, was "victory organized." He rose up out of the common level, lifting up others with him,

"Not propped by ancestry, Whose grace chalks successors their way,"

but by the force of his own merits acquired high station and great wealth; yet he was not puffed up, proud or aristocratical, but remained plain, unpretending and true hearted; was easily approached, and always interested in the wants and purposes of the people, countenancing worthy young men and taking an active part in affairs.

Although more than seventy-five years of age and subject, during the past year, to occasional indisposition, his eye was not dim nor his natural force abated; his tall form continued erect, his step elastic, his hair was but slightly tinged with gray, his spirits were buoyant and his whole mind alert and capable as ever when the hand of death arrested the stroke of his mighty heart, and he instantly sank without apparent suffering, in the arena of his best achievements.

"A gentler heart did never sway in Court."

Men of the bar suddenly realized that they were bereft of a courteous elder brother who had endeared himself to them as counselor and friend; a standard of the court had fallen; the court adjourned. At a meeting of the members of the bar in the court room eulogies were pronounced; commemorative resolutions were recorded in the dockets of the court. The corporations of the borough, the bank, the several chartered companies to which he belonged, and this society which he helped to establish, and of which he was an active member, all paid official honors to his memory, and all followed his body to its place of interment at the Oaklands Cemetery, on December 9, 1879.

terested in the subject of education, serving as a director of public schools and trustee of school property; was an active member of Doe Run Meeting and Fallowfield Monthly Meeting, and was one of the originators of the Chester County Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

O., where he engaged in the manufacture of woolen goods. Meeting with a heavy loss by fire, they removed to Iowa Territory, where Martha died, near Muscatine, 7 mo. 4, 1817. He m. second, 1840, Amelia Charity Hall, b. in Madison County, N. Y., 11 mo. 18, 1813; d. in Cedar County, Ia., 8 mo. 22, 1860. She was a minister in the Society of Friends, at Muscatine. He was married a third time, but the name is not reported. In 1869 Brinton Darlington was appointed Indian agent for the Chevennes and Arapahoes, two of the most warlike tribes under the care of the War Department. To reach the scene of his labors he was obliged to travel by private conveyance from Lawrence, Kan., the terminus of the railroad at that time. The commanding officer urged upon him the necessity of accepting an escort of troops, as these Indians had recently been on the "warpath." He courteously but firmly declined the offer, trusting in the God of Peace for protection. These Indians, by treaty with the government, had agreed to relinquish large tracts of land in Dakota and Colorado, and to accept in lieu

thereof a reservation in the Indian Territory, with a guarantee of annuities in goods and a regular stipulated issue of rations. On this reservation he was to locate them and to keep them there, to issue their annuity goods and rations in just proportions to each. To educate, civilize, and in every possible way endeavor to make useful citizens of the roving, untamed people of his agency, was the work entrusted to him by the department. These Indians were rich in ponies and in the revenues derived from the sale of furs, buffalo robes, etc. The buffalo were so numerous at that time that a possibility of their extinction was not thought of. Accustomed as they had been to living by the chase, and game being so abundant, it was no easy task to induce them to think of a change in their mode of life; but with his heart in the work, and trusting in a Divine power for wisdom and for protection, by a kind but firm course, he gained such an influence over these people that they remained on their reservation and were commencing to open farms. They placed many of their children in school; and though some restless spirits gave him trouble at times, they were controlled by him and by those yielding a loyal obedience to his wishes. He endured many hardships and privations, but was encouraged by their confidence and their increasing willingness to adopt a better mode of life. A strong friendship was formed, and the outlook was hopeful. The work caused a mental and physical effort too great for his strength. In the spring of 1872 he died from an attack of brain fever, and at his especial request he was buried at the agency, among these people. They manifested great sorrow, and on the occasion of his burial they passed, one after another, to look once more on him whom they had trusted, the floor being wet with the tears they shed in silence. To this day they speak of him as their best friend, and talk of his love to them with tearful eyes. There was no outbreak among them while under his care. The agency and the post office are named in honor of his memory, Darlington. (Letter of Anna C. Hoag, 1804.)

206. Jesse, b. 3 mo. 4, 1813; d. 1 mo. 1, 1843, at Addison, Mich.; m. at Rollin Meeting, 8 mo. 20, 1836, to Susanna Talbot, b. Jefferson, O., 3 mo. 27, 1815, and still living; daughter of John and Rachel (Ball) Talbot. He was buried at Rollin Meeting, Mich. He and his sons were carpenters.

207. Ann, b. 7 mo. 30, 1811; d. at Muscatine, Ia., 2 mo. 8, 1867; m. James Cattell, b. 8 mo. 18, 1815; d. 5 mo. 11, 1895, at Des Moines, Ia.; son of James and Deborah (Haines) Cattell. His first wife was Hannah, daughter of David and Margaret Cattell, b. 10 mo. 11, 1818; d. 1 mo. 7, 1842. Third wife, Sarah Walton, d. 6 mo. 15, 1894.

208. WILLIAM, b. in Washington County, Pa.; d. near Salem, O., 5 mo. 19, 1872; m. Catharine Williams, b. 3 mo. 13, 1807, perhaps in Robeson township, Berks County, Pa.; d. in Salem, O., 9 mo. 19, 1896; daughter of Daniel and Jane (Jackson) Williams. They resided at the homestead, near Brownsville, Pa., until 1865, when they removed to a farm just north of Salem. After William's death his widow moved into the town. They were both intelligent and serviceable members of the Friends' Meeting. From the absence of a palate his articulation was difficult to be understood by most persons. No children.

200. GEORGE Fox (Hannah, Thomas, Abraham), b. in Birmingham, 7 mo. 17, 1705; d. 11 mo. 10, 1868; m. 4 mo. 11. 1822, at Kennet Meeting, to Elizabeth Harlan, b. 2 mo. 6. 1798; d. 6 mo. 25, 1884; daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Harlan, of Kennet, Chester County. They settled in the homestead with his father and sisters. Isaac G. Gilpin had not been a very progressive farmer, but when his sons took charge of the farm they adopted new methods, including the sowing of clover and burning of lime for the land. The limestone was hauled from quarries in the Great Valley, in which John D. Gilpin took the principal part, and was often as far on the way as West Chester by sunrise. George busied himself about home, providing wood for burning the lime, and clearing up the neglected fence rows. Before their father's death the land was divided into three parts, George F, and John D, taking their shares north of the State Road, and their sisters. Ruth and Hannah, that on the south side, upon which new buildings had been erected. George was a pillar in the Friends' Meeting at Concord and served in various township offices, as well as a director of the poor of Delaware County. Toward the close of his life he and his wife sold their farm and went to reside with their daughter, Ruthanna Michener, in New Garden township, where they died.

213. JOHN DICKINSON, b. 10 mo. 22. 1799; d. 11 mo. 16, 1887; m. 1 mo. 18, 1823, to Sarah Taylor, b. 4 mo. 6, 1799; d. 9 mo. 23, 1837; daughter of Stephen and Hannah (Mercer) Taylor, of Westtown. She was indisposed only three days, and her father-in-law notes that "I lived with John sixteen weeks and two days, and she treated me very kindly, and we lived in harmony for all that appeared." John and his wife

settled at first on that part of his father's land which subsequently became his sisters'; afterward on the north side of the State Road. He was for a number of years a justice of the peace, and was one of the county commissioners at the time when the court house and jail were erected at Media, the new county seat of Delaware County. He married a second wife, Mary Weston, and a third, Lydia Webster, both of Chester County, but had no children by either of these. About 1860 he disposed of his farm, and with his wife, removed to New Garden township, to live with his daughter, Ann G. Brinton. His widow died at Kennet Square 1 mo. 25, 1899. The farms of George F. and John D. Gilpin, in Birmingham, are now owned by Alban Harvey, who resides upon one and his son, Evans, on the other.

217. ISAAC, b. 1 mo. 20, 1806; d. in West Chester, 2 mo. 1, 1892; unmarried. He was possessed of a considerable estate.

Joseph D., b. 7 mo. 17, 1808; d. 2 mo. 1888; m. 1 mo. 3, 1838, at West Chester, to Deborah Vernon, b. 8 mo. 26, 1805; d. 8 mo. 27, 1886; daughter of Mordecai and Deborah (Hoopes) Vernon, of East Marlborough township. He owned and resided on a farm in Kennet township, near Kennet Square, where they died. Both buried at Union Hill Cemetery.

219. Brinton, b. 1 mo. 13, 1810; d. at Pottsville, Pa., 8 mo. 28, 1830; unmarried.

220. SAMUEL, b. 3 mo. 28, 1812; d. 9 mo. 2, 1889; m. 5 mo. 18, 1850, to Ruth Hannah Carter, b. 9 mo. 27, 1819; d. 7 mo. 29, 1889; daughter of Joseph and Minerva (Webb) Carter, of East Bradford township. He was a farmer for a short time in

Birmingham township, Chester County, after which he returned to the homestead, in Pocopson, where he died.

221. REBECCA D., b. 1 mo. 23, 1814; d. 1 mo. 13, 1844; unmarried.

Children of (46) Emanuel and Martha (House) Darlington.

222. SARAH (Emanuel, Thomas, Abraham), b. in East Bradford, 6 mo. 10, 1807; d. 3 mo. 25, 1881; m. 10 mo. 11, 1827, at Birmingham Meeting, to Simon Barnard, of Newlin township, b. 8 mo. 7, 1802; d. in West Philadelphia, 5 mo. 17, 1886; son of Joseph and Mary (Meredith) Barnard, of Newlin. They were warm sympathizers in the anti-slavery cause and active members of Longwood Meeting of "Progressive Friends." About 1857 they removed to West Chester, where Simon was for some years in the lumber business. Their last residence was on Elm avenue, West Philadelphia.

223. HANNAH, b. 3 mo. 1, 1809; resided for several years in West Chester, but died near Pine Grove Forge, Lancaster county, 4 mo. 22, 1870; unmarried. Like all of her sisters, she was an earnest opponent of slavery and interested in all reform movements.

224. PHOEBE, b. 11 mo. 25, 1810; d. 12 mo. 29, 1896; m. 5 mo. 1, 1848, in West Chester, to Simpson Preston, of Coleraine, Lancaster County, b. 5 mo. 19, 1816; d. 12 mo. 29, 1893; son of Amos and Margaret (Smith) Preston, of Londongrove township. They resided for a time in West Chester. She died at the residence of her son, Forest, in Coleraine township.

225. MARY, b. 10 mo. 9, 1812; d — —. 1855; m. 5 mo. 3, 1849, at her sister, Hannah's, in West Chester, to Moses Whitson, b. 8 mo. 24, 1798; d. 2 mo. 14, 1853; son of Thomas and Hannah (Starr) Whitson, of Sadsbury, Chester County, being his second wife. No children.

226. AMOS, b. East Bradford, 11 mo. 30, 1814; d. there 4 mo. 16, 1866, and buried at Birmingham Meeting; m. 10 mo. 15, 1840, at Philadelphia, to Sarah H. Strode, b. 8 mo. 1, 1811; daughter of Richard and Frances (Osborn) Strode, of East Bradford. They resided at the homestead of his father. His widow lives with her son, Richard, in West Chester.

Children of (47) Brinton and Sarah (Garrett) Darlington.

227. ISAAC G. (Brinton, Thomas, Abraham), b. in East Bradford 8 mo. 16, 1808; d. in West Chester 10 mo. 28, 1879; m. 11 mo. 18, 1830, to Sarah Mercer, b. 3 mo. 17, 1804; d. 6 mo. 24, 1873; daughter of Jesse and Betty (Baily) Mercer, of Westtown. They lived two years in West Marlborough, but in 1833 he purchased a farm of ninety-eight acres in East Bradford, on the west side of the Brandywine, from his father-inlaw and resided thereon near forty years. In addition to farming he established the manufacture of ice cream, which attained a widespread reputation for excellence. In common with his father's children, he possessed a strong individuality and independence in thought, with considerable mechanical talent.

228. Brinton, b. 10 mo. 19, 1813; d. 8 mo. 1815.

229. Thomas B., b. 8 mo. 10, 1815; m. 10 mo. 19, 1843, at her father's, Evalina Harvey, b. 6 mo. 25, 1818, in Birmingham, Delaware County, Pa.; daughter of Eli Harvey and Rachel Hollingsworth, of Chads' Ford. They settled at the homestead, with his parents, and in 1853 he erected a new brick house about fifty feet northwest of the old one, over the foundations of which the public road now passes. He has been among the most intelligent farmers of the community and also a successful apiarist. The water of the stream which passes through the farm is still used for irrigating meadow ground, as stipulated by the lease of 1760. Thomas and Evalina celebrated their golden wedding in 1803.

230. HILLBORN, b. 3 mo. 5, 1817; d. at Concordville, Delaware County, 4 mo. 26, 1886, and buried at St. John's P. E. Church, Concord; m. 1 mo. 31, 1855, at "Sarum Farm," the residence of Abraham W. Sharpless, Amelia Sharpe, b. 11 mo. 16, 1819, at Montreal, Canada; daughter of William Sharpe and Nancy Luckin, who were buried at that place. He was graduated M. D. by the University of Pennsylvania, and located at Paoli; but being seized with the gold fever, he sailed to California by way of Cape Horn in 1849, and followed mining for three years. Returning to Pennsylvania, he succeeded Dr. George Martin to a lucrative practice at Concordville. In addition to his professional duties, he was much interested in

public measures, and a student of history. He was one of the organizers of the Chads' Ford Farmers' Club, and among those entertained at his board were some of the leading scientists of the day. His widow lives with her laughter, at Doylestown, Pa.

231. ELIZABETH, b. 2 mo. 2, 1821; m. 3 mo. 5, 1840, at West Chester, to William Torbert Ingram, b. in West Goshen township, 12 mo. 9, 1817; son of William Ingram and Rebecca Pyle, of West Chester. He purchased from his father a farm of 107 acres in East Bradford, whereon they settled, and which he has successfully cultivated. On this farm is an elevation commanding a panoramic view of the surrounding country, which has been locally named Mount Bradford, a few acres of which have been purchased by Somers N. Smith, of the Neafie & Levy Shipbuilding Co., with the intention of erecting an observatory thereon. Torbert Ingram, as he is usually called, though in his eighty-first year, takes an active part in the work of the farm and an interest in public affairs. Being of a philosophic turn of mind, he is frequently referred to affectionately as the Sage of Mount Bradford.

232. SARAH ANN, b. I mo. 2, 1824; d. in West Chester, 7 mo. 24, 1882; m. in East Bradford, 3 mo. 15, 1849, to John F. Ingram, b. in East Goshen, 3 mo. 21, 1821; son of William and Rebecca (Pyle) Ingram, of West Chester. He was a farmer in Westtown township till about 1865, when he removed to West Chester; was for ten years a school director, and three years a member of the borough council. For several years he has been living with his son in Penn township, Chester County.

EDWARD (Sarah, John, Abraham), b. 11 mo. 4, 1780, in Birmingham township; d. 5 mo. 16, 1849; m. 4 mo. 4, 1811, to Susanna Bond, b. 6 mo. 29, 1791; d. 12 mo. 15, 1826; daughter of John and Sarah (Elliott) Bond, of Harford County, Md. As a young man he went to Maryland and engaged in the milling business at Joppa Mills. After marriage he was for a time at Jerusalem Mills, Harford County, but upon the death of his mother he returned to Chester County and took the homestead

and mills on Brandywine, at Brinton's Bridge, and resided in the stone house built by his father, and now connected with the mill property. He subsequently built a better stone dwelling further from the bridge.

They settled first at the mill of his father, in Birmingham, Chester County, but afterward resided at different places in Birmingham, Delaware County. Both buried at Birmingham Meeting.

Joshua kept the Indian King Tavern, in West Whiteland township, for several years, and after his

Haines, widower, who d. 2 mo. 1863, and was buried 2 mo. 22, 1863, at West Chester.

John followed the business of a tailor in Kennet Square, but in 1861 bought a farm in Kennet township, at Rosedale Station (Norway P. O.), where he still resides, with his son, Edward B. Darlington.

This institution, not proving very satisfactory, was discontinued, and Caleb bought the farm. He subsequently owned and farmed three other places—the last one about a mile above Willow Grove, on the Doylestown pike, in Moreland township, where he died. A few years before his death he visited Friends in England, in company with a minister of that Society.

Bradford until 1847, when they removed to East Goshen, and be became a storekeeper at Rocky Hill. His death was caused by the kick of a horse. Both buried at Goshen Meeting.

Cope, b. 11 mo. 1, 1824; daughter of Joseph and Rachel W. Cope, of East Bradford. He learned the trade of a potter with Jesse Kersey, in East Caln, and with his successor, Enos Smedley, there and in West Chester, after which he purchased a farm in Franklin township and erected a pottery thereon, which he operated in connection with farming. He was also much interested in horticulture. His widow resides at Lincoln, in Lower Oxford township.

In 1814 or '15 they migrated to Miami County, O., where they spent the rest of their days. He was a farmer and hatter, having learned the latter trade after he had a family, and followed it twenty or twenty-five years.

There being no Friends' Meeting near he united with the Universalists and assisted in the organization of a church at Palestine, of which he continued a faithful member till death. The most of his descendants are Universalists in faith and members of the church which he helped to organize. Being by education opposed to slavery, he naturally became a Republican, to which party all of his descendants belong. He gave to each of his four sons 80 acres of land and a good start in life, to which they have added much more. All have been agriculturists, and the grandchildren, with the exception of a brief period as teachers, have remained with and assisted their parents until starting out in life for themselves. It is claimed that the family has not produced a drunkard or criminal of any kind. They have held two annual family reunions, the last being on June 16, 1808, when a permanent organization was formed, with Squire Jefferis as president and William E. G. Jefferis as secretary. Three of the sons of Darlington L. Jefferis served in the Civil War, and a grandson took part in the war with Spain.

I said to the woman: 'Madam, you can go with this man, or you can stay in the city, for under the law you and your children are now free. Which do you want to do?' She answered that she desired to remain, and accordingly I assisted her to arise, and despite Wheeler's protestations and physical resistance, we got the woman and her children off the boat."

Judge Kane, of the United States District Court, was appealed to, and issued a writ, directing Passmore Williamson to produce the slaves, but the latter replied that they were not now, nor had they been, in his custody, or detained by him. For this he was adjudged guilty of contempt, and an imprisonment of three months was the result.

J. Lacey Darlington, in early life, managed his father's farm in the southern part of the borough of West Chester, afterward entering into partnership with John Tweddle, of Albany, N. Y., in the manufacture of malt. In this business he was very successful and returned to West Chester with a handsome competence. He purchased a farm in West Whiteland and erected a pretentious dwelling at the southwest corner of Church and Barnard streets, now the property of the Westminster Presbyterian Church. He was elected to the presidency of the West Chester & Philadelphia Railroad, since purchased by the Pennsylvania Railroad. About 1853-4 he was editor of the Farm Journal, an agricultural monthly published for a time in West Chester, and a few years later was actively interested in the establishment of permanent fair grounds for the Chester County Agricultural Society, of which he became president. Subse-

quently he was elected president of the Oxford Agricultural Society. Prior to this he had become involved in some business enterprises undertaken by his brother William, by which the greater part of his accumulations were swept away, and in their old age he and his wife retired to St. Luke's Home, New York, where he died. He was interred at Oakland Cemetery, near West Chester.

Henry S. Evans came to West Chester and was apprenticed. at the age of thirteen years, to Charles Miner, proprietor of the Village Record, to learn the printing business. At the expiration of his apprenticeship he started out to seek his fortune, and after an unsuccessful attempt in New York found work for a few weeks in Germantown. He then issued a prospectus for the Waynesburg Press, in Chester County, and started with 500 subscribers. In 1834, Charles Miner, wishing to retire from business, offered the Village Record to Mr. Evans, who gladly accepted it, and moving to West Chester, assumed control. Under his management it grew in circulation and influence until it became a leading country paper in the State. In 1846 the Whigs elected him to the Assembly and re-elected him in 1847 and 1848. His abilities and energy soon made him one of the leading members of the House, and he exerted much influence on legislation. In the session of 1849 he was the Whig candidate for Speaker, the Democratic candidate being William F. Packer, of Lycoming County, afterward Governor. Twentyone ballots were a tie, but on the twenty-second three "Native Americans" turned to Packer and elected him. In 1851 Mr.

Evans was elected to the State Senate for the district composed of Chester and Delaware counties, and in 1854 he was a prominent candidate for Governor. At the close of his senatorial term he resumed his editorial work with his usual vigor, but his health, never very robust, began to fail, and in 1869 he took a trip to Europe. Returning much invigorated, he was again elected, in 1870, to the State Senate, this time from the district composed of Chester, Delaware and Montgomery counties. Before his term was half over he was taken sick and died.

Emily Franklin's mother was Anne Emlen, daughter of James and Phœbe Emlen, and sister to James Emlen, who resided for several years in West Chester, Edward Darlington m. second, in Philadelphia, 12 mo. 11, 1851. Mary Leland Hawley, b. there 3 mo. 24, 1813; daughter of Lemuel and Susan (Pusey) Hawley, of that place. She lives with her daughter Mary at Williamsburg, Va.

At an early age Edward C. Darlington entered the Village Record office to learn the printing business under the late Henry S. Evans. Finishing his apprenticeship, he went to New York, where he formed the acquaintance of Horace Greeley, and the acquaintance soon grew into a warm friendship, Mr. Greeley making him an associate editor of The New Yorker, but his health breaking down he was compelled to resign his position. In 1842, in connection with his old employer, Henry S. Evans, Mr. Darlington purchased the Lancaster Examiner, and went to Lancaster. Associated with him was William Butler, now the

distinguished judge of Chester and Delaware counties, then only a boy in the *Village Record* office, who was sent by Mr. Evans to represent his interest. Shortly after Mr. Darlington purchased the whole business and continued the publication of the *Examiner* alone.

Hon, John W. Forney, now of the Philadelphia Press, was then the editor of the Democratic paper in Lancaster, and the young editor found himself brought face to face with one of the ablest editors in the State, backed by the Hon. James Buchanan. But though only twenty-three years of age, Mr. Darlington ably sustained himself, and soon won the respect and confidence of his party friends, the Whigs. In 1851 he was elected by the Whig party to represent Lancaster County in the Senate of Pennsylvania, and served three years with marked ability. By a curious coincidence his old employer, Henry S. Evans, was elected to the Senate the same year and served during the same term. Shortly after his term as Senator expired, Mr. Darlington was a candidate for the nomination to Congress, but was beaten by the late Thaddeus Stevens. In 1859 he sold out the Examiner to Messrs, Hiester, Huber & Kline, owing to poor health and his eyes becoming weak. Shortly after he purchased a farm near Yorktown, Va., where he afterwards removed with his family. The war coming on, the farm was entirely ruined under the devastating tread of the two armies. The fatal miasma which lurks along the shores of the Chesapeake Bay ruined his health, which was frail before, and left nothing to fight the disease to which he fell a prey.

The deceased was a profound reader, a deep thinker—indeed, a man of unusually magnificent mental ability—and an able and trenchant writer. Inheriting talents of high order he employed and increased them, and he made his paper one of the best in the State, his editorials displaying an ability rarely found outside the metropolitan journals. Excessively quiet and undemonstrative in his manners, his worth and sterling integrity made for him hosts of warm personal friends, who will deeply regret his untimely death. Had he remained a journalist Mr. Darlington would have won for himself a name as one of Chester County's most gifted sons.

He was commissioned Major of the 18th Pennsylvania Cavalry; was wounded and lost a leg in the first day's fight in the Wilderness, and after being a prisoner seven weeks, was captured by Sheridan and sent to West Chester. He was commissioned postmaster at West Chester June 3, 1865, and held the position nearly twelve years. but the pain in his stump wore upon his health and made him unfit for any work or duty, so that he resigned before the expiration of his term. His widow is at Christ Church Hospital. Address, Station W., Philadelphia, Pa.

Reared on a farm, at the age of seventeen he entered the

office of the Village Record, at West Chester, as an apprentice, and there laid the foundation of his professional career. Upon the death of his father, in 1853, he returned to the farm, where he remained for two years, and then, in partnership with Enos Prizer, purchased the Bucks County Intelligencer, a weekly paper published at Doylestown. The partnership of Prizer & Darlington was terminated by the death of the former in 1864, when his interest was purchased by the survivor, who retained an interest in the paper until his death. Under his able management the Intelligencer took rank as one of the leading county newspapers of the State, and through its columns the editor wielded much influence in local politics. The journal was a model of what a county paper could and should be, and was always found arrayed for the betterment of the town and county. In Doylestown Mr. Darlington was prominently identified with a branch of the Friends' Meeting, the public library, and the building of a town hall, a co-educational seminary and the public waterworks. He represented the Republican party of Bucks County at several State conventions, and was delegate to the National Convention at Cincinnati, in 1876, when Haves was nominated for president. He held appointive offices as trustee of the Harrisburg State Insane Asylum and the West Chester State Normal School, and at the time of his death was secretary of the commission for building the Norristown Hospital for the Insane. On the founding of the Pennsylvania State Editorial Association he was chosen its first president. In addition to the above he held many other minor positions of trust, and was widely known as a man of the strictest integrity. great geniality and true benevolence.

3 mo. 22, 1791; d. 2 mo. 18, 1834; son of James and Susanna (Dutton) Barnard, of Aston and Chester, Delaware County, Pa. She died suddenly, from the bursting of a blood vessel, 2 mo. 14, 1823. James Barnard was sheriff of Delaware County. 1702 and later filled the offices of Clerk of Courts, Prothonotary, Register of Wills and Recorder of Deeds, in which he was assisted by his son, Isaac D. Barnard. After the father's death the son was retained by his successor, and afterward held a similar position in the Prothonotary's office, in Philadelphia, 1800-11. He then commenced to study law under William Graham, Esq., in Chester, but before completing his studies he entered the military service of the United States, in the war with Great Britain, in which he distinguished himself for skill and bravery. He was admitted to the bar of Chester County May 1, 1816, and quickly became one of the most popular men of the community. He was appointed Deputy Attorney General January, 1817, and filled the office nearly four years, being elected to the State Senate in the fall of 1820, to represent Chester and Delaware counties. In 1826 he was appointed by Gov. Shulze to be Secretary of the Commonwealth, but one year later he was elected to the United States Senate, and there remained until 1831, when declining health caused his resignation. In 1821 he was commissioned major general of the third division of the militia of the State, beside which he occupied other positions of trust and honor. He left no descendants.

Thomas S. Bell studied law under James Madison Porter, and he was admitted to the bar in Philadelphia, April 14, 1821. He removed to West Chester the following month and was appointed Deputy Attorney General in 1823, which position he filled until August, 1828. In 1829 he was appointed one of the visitors to West Point, and in 1837 became a member of the convention to revise the constitution of the State. In 1838 he was returned to the State Senate from the district composed of

Chester and Montgomery counties, but there being a contest the seat was afterward awarded to his competitor, Nathaniel Brooke. On May 16, 1839, he was appointed by Gov. Porter president judge of the district composed of Chester and Delaware counties, to succeed his father-in-law, Judge Darlington. November 18, 1846, he was appointed by Gov. Shulze a judge of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, which position he Iteld until December 1, 1851, when the tenure of office was changed by the constitution. He was also from March until December. 1855, president judge of the district composed of Wayne, Pike. Carbon and Monroe counties, and represented Chester and Delaware counties in the State Senate, 1858, 1859 and 1860. His second wife, Keziah Hemphill, was the daughter of William Hemphill, Esq., and granddaughter of Col. Joseph Mc-Clellan, by whom he had issue.

During the Civil War he served three years in Company B, Fourth Ohio Cavalry. In 1894 his address was 2223 Grant avenue, Denver, Col.

Edward learned the bricklaying trade, but instead of following it went to Wilmington and engaged in the grocery business, and from 1851 to 1862 was in partnership with his brother Thomas at Second and Market streets. Levi G. McCauley received his early education in the public schools of Luzerne County. Afterwards he attended in succession, Abington Seminary, Berwick Academy, and Wyoming Seminary. After leaving school he became a practical mechanical engineer. When the war broke out in 1861, he joined the battalion of 200 men raised by John McCauley, his father, in Susquebanna County.

On account of his age, the elder McCauley was refused a commission by Gov. Curtin, and his son left that batallion and joined a company of Wilkesbarre men, which had been recruited by Col. E. B. Harvey. Young McCauley was mustered into service as a private at Camp Wayne, West Chester, in the spring of 1861. He was rapidly promoted to first sergeant, then to first lieutenant, Company C, Seventh Pennsylvania Reserves. On July 20, 1863, he was commissioned a captain, and through General Order No. 65. War Department, he was brevetted major on November 7, 1865, for meritorious services. At the battle of Charles City Cross Roads, Major McCauley lost his right

JOSEPH DARLINGTON, OF EAST CALN, AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

2313. Joseph Darlington appears among the taxables of Aston township, in 1715, as a single freeman. How much earlier he was there is uncertain, as there is no earlier list preserved except those of 1603 and 1606. Being in the same township with Abraham Darlington it would seem probable that they were related, yet the absence of any allusion to Joseph in the letters from England indicates that the relationship was not very close. The next list of taxables is for the year 1718, when Joseph is found in Goshen township, and also in Willistown, which may imply that he owned property in one township and resided in the other. In 1710 he was in Goshen and still unmarried, but in 1721 his name is among the married householders of Caln township, where he continued till his death. In 1737 he was also taxed in Nantmel township, from which it is inferred that he held real estate in that as well as in Caln. The memorandum book of John Taylor, surveyor and conveyancer, shows that about 1731 Joseph Darlington and Mary, his wife, conveyed 200 acres of land to Thomas Smedley. This was probably in Willistown township, but the deed, like many others of that period, was not recorded.

The lands of Joseph Darlington, in Caln township, comprised 250 acres on the western branch of Brandywine. By subsequent divisions of townships it became a part of East Caln, then of Brandywine, and later of West Brandywine township. Breou's Farm Map, 1883, shows the land in possession of Shepherd H. Hunt, William Buchanan, Albin H. Reid and Isaac Swinehart, of whom the last two also owned lands out-

side the original lines. At an earlier period the tract appears in the name of George Carter, from whom Joseph Darlington may have purchased.

The maiden name of Joseph's wife has not been discovered. Perhaps she was related to the Irwin family. Joseph died intestate and letters of administration were granted to Mary Darlington, his widow, 2 mo. 28, 1748-49. Her sureties were Samuel McCree and Robert Irwin. The inventory of personal property, made by John McDermand and John Man, 3 mo. 22, 1748-49, amounted to £94 15s. To what religious denomination the family belonged is uncertain, though their associations seem to have been with Presbyterians, and they were not far from the Brandywine Manor Church. The date of death of the widow has not been noticed.

He was probably son of George and Jane (Matlack) Irwin, of West Nantmel township, formerly of New Jersey. Tradition says that William and Grace were cousins.

The will of William Irwin, of West Nantmel, yeoman, is dated 2 mo. 12, 1795, he being aged and infirm. All estate, real and personal, to be sold. To eldest daughter, Mary, wife of Charles Blair, £5; to daughter Sarah, wife of Ephraim Allen, £100 and my bald mare; to daughter Grace, wife of James Dunwoodies, £200; to granddaughter Grace Smith, £5, a bed and bed clothes, and half the pewter; to granddaughter Ruth Allen, £40, a bed and bed clothes, half the pewter, my hackney mare and a cow; to grandson William Allen, a saddle, silver sleeve buttons; to granddaughter Grace Allen, silver shoe buckles, two ewes and one lamb. Executors to purchase one dozen school bibles and divide among my younger grandchildren, so that daughter Mary's get four, daughter Sarah's four, daughter Grace's three, and granddaughter Grace Smith one; each person receiving one to have name and age written therein; toward

walling graveyard at Brandywine Meeting House, £16; tombstones to be placed at my grave; executors, sons-in-law, Ephraim Allen and James Dunwoodies, to execute deeds for the land, including forty rods to John and Richard Peirsol for a graveyard. The witnesses were Robert Irwin, William Loage and David Robinson, Junior.

Sallie L. Smith, of Glen Moore, Chester County, writes thus: "I feel that you have made a mistake in putting Joseph Darlington as the father of Grace Irwin; it was Robert Darlington, his wife was Elizabeth Irwin. He was called Colonel or Lieutenant Darlington, and lived on the Horse-shoe Pike, above Mackelduff's, and kept tavern about the time of the Revolution. 'Betty' was a woman of good discernment and quick temper. My grandfather, Samuel Lewis (see No. 2342), used to say to my mother, when a child, of high spirit: 'Child, you are like our great-grandmother, Betty Darlington.' There must have been some knowledge of them in that generation.

"William Irwin lived on the farm now owned by John Morris, also a descendant. I was told by Sallie (Allen) Gilmore (2355) that he owned a great deal of land. He gave the land and a good deal of the money to build what is now called Harmony M. E. Church, back of Morgantown, near Joanna Furnace, in Berks County; it to be used as a union meeting, and the Presbyterians do now hold services occasionally to still maintain the right.

"Rev. John Carmichael, of Brandywine Manor, was a great friend of William Irwin, and it is said once gave Grace, daughter of William, a great fright while visiting them. On coming down stairs he stumbled and fell and his wig came off; and Grace, a little thing in the hall below, ran screaming to her mother that Mr. Carmichael had knocked his head off."

2315. ROBERT, married, but the name of his wife has not been discovered. The Irwins say that Elizabeth Irwin married Col. Robert Darlington, but the writer can find no evidence that this Robert was the son of Joseph, as Joseph's son died early in 1777, while another Robert, son of William, of Nantmel (see No. 2417), was at that time and later in the army. One Robert married Catharine Henderson, 11 mo. 15, 1762,

according to records of the pastor of St. John's P. E. Church, Pequea, a few miles from the Darlington homesteads. If this were Joseph's son it must have been his second marriage, but the question remains in doubt.

Robert Darlington, of East Caln, died intestate, and letters of administration were granted 6 mo. 6, 1777, to Joseph Darlington, his sureties being Robert Lockart and Archibald Irwin, on a bond for £500, which was signed by Joseph Darlinton, the spelling of the name in that day. The inventory of the property in Chester County was made by Samuel Halliday and John Willson, exhibited 6 mo. 6, 1777, and amounting to £259 2s. 11d., his wife's clothing being valued at £8. An inventory of property in Northumberland County, made 4 mo. 12, 1777, by Samuel Allen and Robert Martin, at the request of Robert's son Joseph, amounted to £100 13s. This included a lease for five years on real estate, and improvements thereon, valued at £60, some farming utensils, and horse, cow and pig.

In 1764 Robert Darlington was assessed in East Caln with 130 acres and buildings, seventy acres of woodland, four horses, five cattle, six sheep. In 1774 he had the same land, four horses, three cattle, six sheep. As the eldest (and only) son of Joseph he inherited a double share of his father's estate, or one-half thereof, but no legal division was made during his life. His practical ownership of the 250 acres in East Caln, which had belonged to his father, was acknowledged, and on 3 mo. 15, 1785, his heirs petitioned the Orphans' Court for a division thereof, and a jury was appointed for the purpose. On 3 mo. 18, 1788, Mary, wife of Samuel White, petitioned the court, setting forth that her father, Joseph Darlington, died intestate, leaving a widow, since deceased, and three children, Grace and Robert, also now deceased, and the petitioner, and that he was possessed of 250 acres of land in East Caln. It was awarded that the heirs of Grace Irwin should have one-fourth. those of Robert Darlington two-fourths, and Samuel and Mary White one-fourth.

Robert Darlington left six children, Joseph, William, John, Abraham, Mary and Jane. On March 20, 1781, Abraham and Mary, being over fourteen years of age, petitioned for guardians, and Robert Lockart and Samuel Pickens were appointed. At the same time, on petition of Jean Lockard, Robert Lockard, William Darlington and John Darlington, the court appointed George Irwin to be guardian of Jane Darlington, under fourteen years of age.

2316. Mary, m. Samuel White, of East Caln, who died intestate, and letters of administration were granted to Mary, the widow, 3 mo. 17, 1789, her sureties being James Lockhart, Jr., and Aaron White. In 1764 Samuel White was assessed in East Caln with 150 acres of land, three horses, four cattle, six sheep.

2317. ELIZABETH, probably d. young. John Irwin, of Caln township, in will dated 9 mo. 19, 1728, devised as follows: "Item: I give and bequeath to Elizabeth Darlington, daughter of Joseph Darlington, the sum of five pounds Lawfull currant mony afores'd, to be paid to her by my Brother Robt. at the age of fifteen years or the day of her marriage, which shall first happen." This is all the reference which has been found to her name.

2321. JOSEPH (Robert, Joseph). On 4 mo. 30, 1787, Joseph Darlington, of Frederick County, Va., yeoman, for £80, conveyed to Richard Thomas and Richard Downing, Jr., of Ches-

ter County, his two-sevenths and one-half a plantation whereon his father lived, in East Caln, at the time of his death; bounded by lands of Thomas Fisher on the east, by Samuel Denny on the west, by Archibald Irwin on the north, and by ——— Liggett on the south, 250 acres. No further record of Joseph.

2322. WILLIAM, of Brandywine township, by deed of 12 mo. 25, 1795, conveyed to his brother, John Darlington, for £15, his one-seventh part of their father's land, said to amount to nineteen and three-quarters acres. His further history unknown.

The following may relate to him:

William Darlington, of East Caln, in Chester County, Pennsylvania, a private of Capt. Wallace's company of the Flying Camp, on his solemn oath doth depose and say: That they, the prisoners, were very roughly used at Harlem in their way from Fort Washington to New York: that at New York eight hundred of them were stowed into a house called New Bridewell; that it was a cold open house, the windows not glassed; that on the Monday they received their provisions; that they had not one mouthful from early the unfortunate Saturday morning till then; that then, and so on afterwards, their rations, for three days each individual, were one-half pound of biscuit, half a pound of pork, half a pint of pease, half a gill of rice, and half an ounce of butter, the whole not more than enough for one good meal; that they were defrauded of this petty allowance, two days' rations, each week: that they had no straw or hay to lie on, and no fuel but one cart load per week, for the eight hundred; that at nine of the clock at evening the Hessian guards would come in and put out their fires, and would lay on the poor prisoners with heavy clubs for sitting round the fire; that their water was very bad, as well as their bread, beyond all comparison bad, except once good biscuit, and once good baker's bread. That they began to die like rotten sheep with cold, hunger and dirt. That those prisoners who had any good wearing apparel on them, such as buckskin breeches or good coats, were necessitated to sell them to purchase bread to keep them alive. That they were used most cruelly. That the enemy seemed to take a kind of infernal pleasure in their sufferings.

Grier, administrator of Elizabeth Darlington, show that the real estate sold for \$1,000.75, and that the net proceeds were divided between John Darlington, Elizabeth Curry, Abraham Darlington, Jane Butler, Joseph Darlington, John Curry and Margaret Dougherty.

2407. Anne Rebecca, b. 7 mo. 31, 1871; d. 11 mo. 4, 1887; buried at Forest Hill Cemetery, Piqua, O.

2408. Martha E., b. 9 mo. 3, 1874; m. 10 mo. 20, 1891, Leonardus K. Bennett, b. Greene County, Mo., 4 mo. 14, 1871; son of John L. Bennett and Martha Wood, of Plainfield, Greene County, Mo., where they reside. He is a farmer, owning forty acres of land. Children: Arvel Benson, b. 10 mo. 24, 1891; Edna Marie, b. 1 mo. 17, 1893; Lawrence Venan, b. 12 mo. 8, 1895.

2409. JOHN S., b. 2 mo. 1, 1877. 2410. WILBUR GRANT, b. 10 mo. 8, 1879. 2411. KATIE O'TERRALL, b. 2 mo. 16, 1882.

WILLIAM DARLINGTON, OF NANTMEL, AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

2412. WILLIAM DARLINGTON first appears among the taxables of East Caln township in 1730. In 1732 he was in Nantmel township, and after the division of the township he is found in West Nantmel, until his death, in 1757.

Robert Parke, of East Caln, visited his native land, Ireland, and returned to America in 1728. In his diary of the return voyage he notes, June 11, 1728: "This day one Margaret Darlington took the smallpox, and three of her children being down in it." This appears in a brief history of the Parke family, written by James Pemberton Parke, of Philadelphia, nearly fifty years ago, who remarks further: "The object of this voyage was probably to procure servants for the new settlers, for on his return in 1728, the list of passengers gives sixty-three servants on board, six of whom belonged to himself. This return voyage was disastrous from the prevalence of the smallpox, which caused the death of several." The list of passengers would now be very interesting if preserved.

It may be suspected that Margaret Darlington was the wife of William Darlington, and she may have been one of those who perished from the smallpox. At all events, William Darlington married a second wife, Mary, whose maiden name has not been discovered. It is a question whether William Darlington was nearly related to Joseph Darlington, of East Caln. They eventually settled in adjoining townships, and in each case the name was formerly written Darlinton. In the churchyard of St. John's P. E. Church, West Caln township, close by the line of Lancaster County, we find a tombstone with

this inscription: "Here lieth the body of Wm. Darlinton, who departed this life Sept. 10, 1757, in the 67th year of his age.

"He practiced virtue and her laws preferred: Beloved when living, and now dead revered. By all lamented as a man sincere: Of free good nature and of memory dear."

WILL OF WILLIAM DARLINGTON.

"In the name of God, Amen: Septbr ye 7th 1757: I William Darlinton of ye township of West Nantmell & County of Chester, being sick and weak in Body but of perfect mind & Memory, thanks to Allmighty God, & calling to mind ye mortality of my Body & knowing that it is apointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament; that is to say, principally and first of all I recommend my soull to God that gave it & my body I give it to ye earth to be buried in a Christian like & decent maner at ye discrition of my Executors, nothing doubting but at ye Generall resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Mighty power of God and as touching such Worldly estate wherewith it hath plesed God to bless me with in this life I devise and dispose of ye same in following maner and form.*

"Imprs: I give and Bequeath to my well Beloved wife Mary Darlinton & my two sons Joseph and Robert all my estate Reall & Personall after ye following legacies, to be equally devided between them. Item: I give unto my son John Darlinton three Hundred Pounds to be paid at three equal gales in three years from the 27th of November next after ve date above written. Item: I give unto my son Marudith Darlinton three hundred Pounds, to be paid likewise in three anuall gales to be paid as my son John's is. Item: I Give unto my son William Darlinton twenty pounds if ever he comes personly to demand it. My wife Mary Darlinton and my son Meridith I likewise constitute, make and ordain my onely & Sole Executors of this my last Will and testament: all my goods and Chattles by them freely to be dispos'd of as they shall se cause to ye best advantage and I do utterly disalow, revoke & every way disanull all former will or Wills testaments or bequeathments or Executors by me in any wise before this time named or bequeathed, ratifying & Confirming this and none other to be my last Will and testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seall ye day and year above written.

WILLIAM DARLINTON (his mark and seal).

"Publish'd pronounced and declar'd by the said William Darlinton as his last Will and testament in present of us

JAMES CULBERTSON, JOSEPH PARK, ROBERT BROWN."

"Chester, October 6th, 1757: Then personally appeared Joseph Park and Robert Brown, two of the witnesses to the above written Will, and on the 12th day of the same Month Personally appeared James Culbertson ye other witness to sd Will, and being duly Sworn on the holy Evangelists of Almighty God did depose and say that they were Personally present and did see and hear William Darlinton the testator above Named Sign, Seal, Publish, pronounce and declare the above writing as and for his last Will and testament, and that at the doing thereof he was of sound mind and memory to the best of their understandings and that their Names thereto set and Subscribed were of their respective proper hands Writing.

"Sworn Before

"Jo. PARKER, D. Reg'r."

William Darlington was a lieutenant in Capt. James Graham's company of Associators, 1747-8. See Second Pennsylvania Archives, ii., 507.

His widow married Samuel Mackelduff, a widower, of West Nantmel, by license dated June 29, 1762. He died June 3, 1782, in the seventy-first year of his age, and was buried at Brandywine Manor Presbyterian Church. His will, dated April 3, 1782, contains the following provision for his wife:

"Item: I Give and Bequeath unto my beloved Wife Mary the Just and full sum of Twenty Pounds Lawfull money of Pennsylvania yearly and Every Year During her Natural Life, to be paid Her by my Executors as aforesaid, as also the priveledge and Liberty to Live in the Room of the West End of my present Dwelling House during her Natural Life as aforesaid, with fire wood always provided for her at the Door and also it is my Will and I Do hereby order that she shall have a Horse provided for her to ride on when she pleases during the Term aforesaid; but if she should not Incline to Live in the Room in my House as aforesaid but should move away then it is my will that she shall not have the Liberty or priviledge to Rent the same or put any Person therein on any pretence whatsoever. And Also it is my will and I Do order the Room aforesaid aloted for Her residence of my wife shall be furnished with a Good Bed and Beding and other Needfull and Necessary Furniture During.

the Term aforesaid, which said Yearly Legacy and priveledges Given and Bequeathed unto my Wife as aforesaid shall be Deemed and taken as in full and ample Compensation of her Lawful Dower, in lieu of her one thirds of my Estate either real or personal."

The testator left two sons, Joseph and Samuel, and grand-children, Samuel and Martha Mackelduff, children of his son James, who died in 1777. Mary Mackelduff, his widow, died in West Nantmel in October, 1789, and in her will, dated October 1, 1789, proven November 2, following, makes this representation:

"My husband Samuel Mackelduff's decease being in the Month of June in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred eighty two: agreeable to his last Will and Testament I was to have and to hold a convenient Room furnished with what was needfull and necessary and the sum of twenty pounds in Specie, to be paid yearly and every year during my Natural life; but the sons and heirs of my dece'd husband, Samuel Mackelduff and Joseph Mackelduff, have not paid me exactly agreeable to their father's good Intentions Saving the two first years after the decease of my husband, I received my Room furnished with what necessaries I stood in need of and twenty pounds in Specie each year. I have received nothing since the year 1784 save my Room and some of the necessary articles I stood in need of, but have not nor no person for me received any part of my twenty pounds per Annum for upwards of five years at this date & if it should pleas God to Spare me some time yet to come it is my Will and sincere request that there shall not any abatement be made otherwise than by a written Receipt from myself which shall be given if they or any person for the said heirs shall at any time whilst I am in being pay me less or more of my just demands Against the said Estate.

"Item: I give, devise and bequeath unto my son Robert Darlington the half of all that will be due from the heirs of the Estate of my husband, Samuel Mackelduff (The Estate itself must be Answerable

for my just Demands).

"Item: I give and bequeath the other half so coming unto my son Robert's two sons, viz., William Darlington and Thomas Darlington. And it is my will that whatsoever just demands my son Joseph Darlington shall have against my son Robert that it shall be paid before any Division is made."

As executors of the foregoing will she appointed Levi Griffith and her grandson, William Darlington.

Children of (2412) William Darlington and His First Wife.

2413. John. b. perhaps in Ireland, is believed to have married Mary Bruce. At Bradford Monthly Meeting of Friends, 6 mo. 20, 1754: "Caln Preparitive Meeting Complains against Mary Bruce, now Darlinton, for having accomplished her Marriage Contrary to ouer Rules and Desipline with a man not of our Sosity, having been precoshend before marriage. Therefore This Meeting appoints Jane Park and Rose Mendinhall to provoide a testamoney against her and produse it to The next Meeting."

At Bradford Monthly Meeting, held at Caln, 8 mo, 15, 1754; "Mary Darlinton appeared hear and prodused a few Lines to Condem her out goings in Marriage which was here Read and Excepted and ordered to be published in Caln first day meeting." She was probably the daughter of James and Deborah Bruce, of Caln township. In 1750 John Darlinton was a single freeman in West Nantmel. After marriage he resided for a time in Uwchlan township, and his wife received a certificate from Bradford to Goshen Monthly Meeting, 4 mo. 15, 1756. Uwchlan Monthly Meeting being established by division of Goshen Monthly Meeting, 1763, the former granted a certificate for Mary Darlinton, o mo. 6, 1764, directed to Bradford, On May 1, 1764. John Darlington purchased from Peter Buffington and wife Hannah two lots, containing together an acre and 23 perches, in London Port, now called Wagontown, West Caln township. In the same year he was assessed in West Caln with four lots, a house, "one cattle and one horse." By deed of April 4, 1772, John Darlington, of West Caln, tanner, and Mary his wife, convey to James Clemson, of Sadsbury, hatter, the two lots purchased from Peter Buffington, for £150. After this they removed westward and Mary received a certificate directed to Warrington Monthly Meeting, York County, Pa., 9 mo. 16, 1774. Joseph Darlinton devised his lands in West Nantmel to his nephews, after the death of his widow, with the condition that they should pay to each of his half brothers, John and Meredith Darlinton, the sum of £150. In 1814 James Lockhart became the owner of this line, and on December 8, 1825, John Darlinton, of Juniata township, Perry County, Pa., executed a release or general quit-claim in favor of Lockhart. No specific interest is mentioned, but it was doubtless the above legacy.

2414. MEREDITH, m. about 1758, Sarah David, or Davis, daughter of Rees and Catharine Davis, of Earl township, Lancaster County. This family of Davis, with other Welsh emigrants, is said to have settled for a brief period in or near Radnor township, but later removed to Lancaster County and founded Bangor P. E. Church. Rees David made his will in 1751, proved 1753, in which he mentions his son Gabriel and daughter Sarah, with others. Gabriel Davis, in will. 1801. mentions his sister. Sarah Darlington's daughter, Margaret, and David Davis, in his will, 1700, names his nephew, John Darlington, My friend, Horace Edwin Hayden, of Wilkes Barre, Pa., whose wife is descended from this David Davis, says that the latter, with Meredith Darlington, went to Virginia in 1789 and bought 600 acres of land on Pearis Run, of Abel James, of Philadelphia. He has a certificate from John Cordell, the old surveyor of Frederick County, Va., dated 1700, in which he certifies to land surveyed as part of the David Davis and Meredith Darlington tract." The family record is said to show that Meredith Darlington died 8 mo. 18, 1783, which cannot be correct if he purchased land in 1789. He was a freeman in West Nantmel in 1758, but does not appear later as a taxable in Chester County. It is likely that he settled in Lancaster County for a time, before going to Frederick County, ۷a.

2415. WILLIAM. From the manner in which this person is mentioned in his father's will it would seem that he was probably lost sight of or not in this country. Perhaps, on his mother's death, he returned to Ireland. No further trace of him has been discovered. He may have been the eldest son, and it might be questioned whether he or his father was the lieutenant among the Associators of 1747-8.

The parish records of St. Paul's, Baltimore, Md., show the marriage of a William Darlington to Ann Hind, 6 mo. 4, 1745, but nothing further is known of these. The village of Darling-

ton, Md., is said to have been named for a family now extinct there.

Children of (2412) William and Mary Darlington, Second Wife.

2416. Joseph, b. about 1738; d. Honeybrook (formerly West Nantmel), 2 mo. 22, 1805, aged sixty-seven years; m. Mary Graham 9 mo. 22, 1761; daughter of James and Mary Graham, of West Nantmel. In the churchyard of St. John's, at Compassville, are tombstones with these inscriptions: "In memory of Joseph Darlinton, who departed this life 22d February, 1805, aged sixty-seven years. Much loved in life and in Death Lamented. A truely honest Man." "Sacred to the Memory of Mary Darlinton, consort of Joseph Darlinton, who departed this life on the 7th day of August, 1813, aged seventy-six years, three months."

In 1764 Joseph was assessed in West Nantmel with 100 acres of land, two horses, three cattle and six sheep. His brother Robert also had 100 acres, and perhaps the two represented their father's holdings. In 1799 Joseph had 150 acres in Honeybrook, four horses and six cattle, a stone two-story dwelling house and large stone barn. He also had a slave. Being very sick and weak, he made his will January 22, 1778, to the following effect: To William and Thomas Darlington. sons of brother Robert, all my lands in West Nantmell, whereon I live, and one messuage and lot in York Town, after my wife's death; they paying my two half brothers. John Darlington and Meredith Darlington, £150 each in the following manner: £50 each in one year after coming into possession of the property, £50 more in two years and £50 more in three years. My niece, Mary Darlington, daughter of brother Robert, to have £100 at eighteen, out of the personal estate. Wife, Mary, to have residue of personal estate and use of real estate during life, and she, with my trusty friend and stepfather, Samuel Mackelduff, to be my executors. Signed by Joseph Darlington.

Mary Darlington, widow of Joseph, by will dated August 4, 1813, devised the greater part of her property to her Graham relatives, but gave to the trustees of the General Assembly of

the Presbyterian Church £100 as a permanent fund for the civilization of the Indians of North America.

2417. ROBERT. The writer is inclined to think this was the person who married Catharine Henderson, November 15, 1762. His first appearance as a taxable was in 1763, in West Nantmel township, where he held 100 acres, as per assessment of the following year. He seems to have disposed of this after a few years. At the Court of Quarter Sessions, August 29, 1769, he was a petitioner for and received license to keep a tavern in West Nantmel, known by the name of George the Third, which property he rented from William Starrett. The petition is signed in very neat penmanship by Robert Darlinton, but among those who recommended him was a Robert Darlington, whose signature may not be an autograph.

In 1770 he again petitioned and was allowed license, but with a reprimand for allowing persons to drink to excess, and especially his landlord. In August, 1771:

The petetion of the Heads of the Presbyterean Coungregtion of ye forks of brandwine, Freeholders In the County of Chester Humbly Sheweth

That your Petetioners ar much Disturbed when met in a Congregational Capacity for the worship of Almighty god on the Sabbath Day by a Serten Tavern that is now kept by Robert Darlingtown within a few perches of our Meeting House. That as unLawfull games are practised and not good order at all observed on the Lord's Day at his house kept by the Afore Said Robert Darlingtown but stroung Liquor Reteald to peaple that Comes to publick Worship we are thereby much injured and disquieted. We therefore humbly pray your Worships to take the premisses into your Seriouse Consideration and grant such Relief as in your Wisdoms you shall Judge proper, and your petetioners as in duty bound shall pray.

A rejoinder to the above, purporting to be from the friends of the petitioner, though not signed by anyone, is quaint and somewhat historical, as follows:

West Nantmill Township, Augst ye 22d 1771.

To any Gentleman of the Bench to whom these presents may Come:
Know ye that the Bearer Robert Darlinton obtained Lisence from

his Honour the Governor by the Benches Approbation these two years past and now acts under that Authority. But as his House or Tayern is Near to the Presbeterian Meeting House (he being a Church of England man) Some of the Heads of which is Incens'd Against him and is Determined to petition the Court Because he Sells some Small Refreshments to persons on the Saboth Day: But perhaps if Matters be duly Weighed mr. Darlinton will not appear in Such a Criminal manner as will or may be Insinuated. The Case is Justly this, there is no water for the Congregation when assembled but in mr. Darlinton's Draw well which is Scarcely two Perches from his Door and in Very hot weather there is Many Repairs to his well and as it is Stagnating water some Inclines for the preservation of their Health to throw a small Quantity of Rum into the water it Being More Cooling and less Prejudicial, as also Many Rides on the Saboth morning some 10, some 15 & some 20 Miles and are Obliged of Necessity to go to the Tavern to Refresh Both themselves and their Horses, and we think if a Tavern Keeper should Deny a moderate Refreshment to any Civil Person when Civily Call'd for the Dont Answer the trust Reposed by his Honour, and as we Know not the Weakness of Different Constitutions and a Refreshment Denv'd to persons may be attended with bad Consequences and Might Expose the Tavern Keeper as Acting a Criminal part. Another Complaint these Ruleing Elders have Against mr. Darlinton is, they are Inform'd, that he is a free Mason, and some times, as they say that he allows of a Lodge or Club as they Call it to be kept at his house. we Know nothing of it for our parts. But be it as it will is that a sufficient Reason that his Temporal Interest Should be Hurt that pays such a High Rent: has he not a Right to previlidge as wel as Another Kings Subject. how many of the heads of the province in Philadelphia are free Masons and publishes their Processions in our publick papers & is that a sufficient Reason to turn them Out of Government, Besides mr. Darlinton Some Years ago Attended our Northern Armies and Exposed his Life and fortune to Danger for the Defence of his King and Country he is the son of a good father & has Behaved himself well Amongst us from his Infancy and we Look Upon him and Likewise his Wife to be Quallifyed for the Business and More so than a Good many of our Tavern Keepers in the County they are Manerly, Kind and friendly and Shews Respect to their Guests and will not suffer any Rudeness to their Knowledge and are Very Human and Hospitable to the poor and Distress'd Travilers and we are well assured that this Character Can be well Attested by all that Knows him Except a few pregedised persons, Therefore we hope you are Gentlemen that will pay proper Regard to a person of such a Character and Grant him your Aprobation to his Honr ve Governor for his License ve Ensuing year,

P. S. and if so be that your worships Should not see Cause to Grant him the Licence where he now Lives it would be very agreeable to us and Likewise to several more of the Congregation if that your worships would Grant them to him for a place of his about a mile Distant and the Body of the Congregation Doth think that it is a more suitable place for a publick house and Likewise there is a person now Living on said premises that Can be well Recommended for aforesaid Business.

His petition was allowed, but the endorsement does not say at which place. In 1772 he presented a petition signed by sixtynine persons, of whom four were Joneses, of Berks County. His location was described as "in the forks of two roads, the one leading from Mr. Harrises Ferry, By Messers Grubbs Iron works to the City of Philadelphia, Known by the Name of the Paxton Road; The Other from said Road to Mr. Peirsols Mill, from Thence Through a place Called the forrest to Reading Town." Among the signers to this petition was another Robert Darlinton. It was rejected.

The following extract from "Records of the Revolutionary War," by W. T. R. Saffel, is believed to refer to this person:

"Lieutenant Robert Darlington, of Colonel Watts' Regiment of Flying Camp, was captured at Fort Washington, November 16, 1776, and was confined on Long Island. He was admitted to parole May 26, 1777, but was ordered into the New York City prisons on the 17th of August, 1777, where he was supplied by Mr. Pintard and Mr. Beatty, and was honored on the off June, 1779, with a warrant for one hundred and sixty-seven dollars from His Excellency, Gen. Washington. He was exchanged at Elizabethtown, May 14, 1781, and returned to his home in Chester County, Pa. Lieut. Darlington was an able officer, a ripe scholar, and polite gentleman."

The further history of Robert Darlington has not been traced. It may be inferred from the tenor of his mother's will that he had become reduced in circumstances and a debtor to his brother Joseph.

Children of (2414) Meredith and Sarah (Davis) Darlington.

2418. WILLIAM (Meredith, William), b. 7 mo. 29, 1795; is said by his nephew, Harvey Darlington, to have had no family.

2419. JOHN, b. 5 mo. 8, 1761, perhaps near Winchester, Va.; d. Newark, O., 1816; m. Mary Edwards, of South Carolina, d. Newark, O., 1834; both buried at Cedar Hill Cemetery.

2420. Rees, b. 3 mo. 29, 1763; probably died young or unmarried.

2421. Joseph, b. 7 mo. 19, 1765; d. West Union, Adams County, O., 1851; m. Sarah Wilson, of Lewis County, Ky. He lived within three or four miles of Winchester, Va., whence he removed about the close of the last century to Adams County, O. He built the third house in West Union, the county seat; was a member of the first constitutional convention of Ohio, a member of the first Legislature of the State, and was a clerk of the courts of the county for about forty-five years consecutively. His grandson, N. W. Darlington, says of him: "He had been most of his life of eighty-six years a most exemplary member and exceptionally useful elder in the Presbyterian Church." From a sketch by N. W. Evans, in the Portsmouth Press, the following is taken:

Ed., Press—Ae we grow older we find more and more pleasure and satisfaction in contemplating the character of those who have preceded us on the stage of action, and particularly those whom we knew as aged persons when we were children. Memory goes back to them, and we wonder what were their trials and tribulations when in active life.

Among those whom we like to contemplate is Gen. Joseph Darlinton, one of the pioneers of Ohio. When the writer first knew him he was eighty-one years of age, and the writer was a child. Well do I remember visiting him in his sitting room. He had a wood fire in a large fire-place in an old fashioned stone chimney. In the plainness of that day the room was uncarpeted, and a plain deal table, with a single drawer, stood about the middle of the room. A common wooden chair was at the table, at which the general sat and wrote. The drawer of the table had a wooden knob to draw it open and to close it, and to the drawer was tied a piece of buckskin which the general used to wipe his pen upon. His hair was white as snow, was somewhat long, and he combed it back of his ears. A more grave or dignified man I never met. To me, as a boy, his pres-

ence was awe-inspiring. In the room with him, seated on a plain rocking chair, was his aged sister, Margaret Edwards—Grandmother Edwards, as I was always taught to call her. She was one of those old ladies who always had pleasant smiles and kind words for the children. She wore the lace cap of those days, without which an elderly lady never appeared, and with her glasses, she looked like a benediction. She always seemed glad to meet and talk to the children, and to sympathize with their childish notions.

Gen. Joseph Darlington was born about four miles from Winchester, Va., July 19, 1765. His father's name was Meredith and his mother's Sarah. Those were the days of large families, and here are the names of the children of his parents: William, John, Reese, Joseph, Gabriel, David, Margaret and Meredith.

The Darlintons came from Durham County, England, near the town of Durham. One located in New England, one at Winchester and one in South Carolina. The one who located at Winchester dropped the "g" out of his name for some reason now lost in the mists of the past. But whether Meredith, the father, was one of the three who came from Darlington, England, or a descendant, I am unable to say. I am inclined to think he was born in England. He seems to have acquired his first land in Frederick County, Va., on the 12th of March, 1771, when his son Joseph was five years old. The conveyance was by lease and release. The lease was made one day and the release the next. The lease was made March 12, 1771, for 427 acres. Gen. Joseph Darlinton appears not to have conveyed his interests in Virginia until September 3, 1811, when he released to George Glaze an interest in 120 acres in Frederick County, conveyed to Meredith Darlington by Joseph Lupton. This release was acknowledged by Gen. Darlinton in open court, in West Union, O., October 2, 1817, and certified by him, as clerk, and by John Thompson as judge of the Common Pleas. There are Glazes living on this identical tract at the present time. It was on the Glaze farm, originally owned by the Darlintons, where the British and Hessian prisoners, taken at Saratoga in 1781, were kept, and one field on that farm is to this day known as the Barracks field, being the one on which stood the barracks in which those prisoners were confined. It was one of the boyhood pleasures of Gen. Darlinton to visit those prisoners daily and converse with them. I do not know when he came to Ohio, but it must have been prior to 1800, as in 1802 he was a member of the first constitutional convention of Ohio, and was then prominent in the State. He owned some 700 or 800 acres of land adjoining West Union, and an addition to the town was made on the west end. He was clerk of the Court of Common Pleas of Adams County over forty years, retiring in 1851, when the office became elective. He was also recorder of the county many years.

He was the most methodical and precise man ever known in Adams County. His hours of going and coming to his office were so well known, and so certain and fixed, that people set their watches and clocks by his movements. He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church at West Union, and its principal pillar. In business matters he had the confidence of the entire community, and his judgment on any subject went at par, if not at a premium, everywhere he was known.

Gen. Darlinton always alluded to Winchester in affectionate terms and loved to converse about it. He and his neighbors, Abraham Hollingsworth and Nicholas Burwell, all of whom were from Winchester, no doubt spent many pleasant hours together in converse about their boyhood home. He owned the site of Winchester, in Adams County, O., and laid out the town, which he named in honor of his own loved Winchester, Va.

When he left the clerk's office in West Union, O., all the unclaimed costs which had been paid in forty years were found there in packages, in the very money in which they had been paid, much of which was then (1851) worthless, owing to its having been on banks of the wild-cat order. Gen. Joseph R. Cockerill, father of Col. John Cockerill, of the New York Commercial Advertiser, was his successor in the clerk's office.

Had Gen. Darlington died of any ordinary disease the whole county would have turned out to his funeral. But he died in July, 1851, of that awful scourge, Asiatic cholera, and when he

was laid to rest in the cemetery only three persons were present, one of whom was George M. Lafferty, of Stout's P. O. I have heard the names of the others, but cannot now give them.

He was styled "Captain" Harvey Darlington, was quite wealthy, and in a letter written by or for him, November 3, 1804, says: "I am an old bachelor, hale and hearty, and still voting the Democratic ticket." He gave it as his understanding that his great grandfather was John Darlington, instead of William, as already shown. He wrote the name Darlinton. Evalina, m. —, Schultz and was living at Zanesville, 1894, aged seventy-nine years. She had a son, Robert D. Schultz, who made quite a fortune in the soap manufacture, and is the father of B. V. H. Schultz, of Chicago, Ill., and of W. D. James Darlinton, deceased, was the father of Charles Darlington, a lawyer, of Xenia, O., and of Jennie Green, of Cleveland, O., who has no children. Charles has a son.

2426. WILLIAM (Robert, William), Inherited, by the will of

his uncle Joseph Darlington, a half interest in 224 acres of land in Honeybrook township, Chester County. William Darlington, of Frederick County, Va., and Eleanor, his wife, by deed of 9 mo. 19, 1806, conveyed this interest to John Jones, of Berks County, Pa., subject to the life interest of Mary Darlington, widow of Joseph. Eleanor did not sign this deed, but executed a release for the land, 5 mo. 8, 1808. No further trace of these has been discovered.

2427. Mary, mentioned in the will of her uncle Joseph Darlington, 1778; she being then a minor. No further record.

2428. Thomas, b. 3 mo. 9, 1770; d. 5 mo. 5, 1856; m. 3 mo. 4, 1801, Isabella Henderson, b. 7 mo. 15, 1769; d. 9 mo. 18, 1842. Thomas Darlington, of Baltimore County, Md., farmer, and Isabella, his wife, by deed of 11 mo. 29, 1810, conveyed to John Jones and Owen Bruner, both of Berks County, Pa., a half interest in the land devised by Joseph Darlington to his two nephews, William and Thomas Darlington. After this Thomas removed to Anne Arundel County, Md., but about 1827 went to Claysville, Washington County, Pa., and later to North Union township. Favette County, where he died.

2430. MEREDITII DARLINGTON, b. near Winchester, Va., 3 mo. 21, 1795; d. Newark, O., 5 mo. 6, 1842; m. there, 12 mo. 13, 1821, Susan Forry, b. Shippensburg, Pa., 11 mo. 1, 1799; d. Newark, 2 mo. 24, 1885; daughter of Daniel Forry and Nancy Rush, said to be a cousin to Dr. Benjamin Rush, signer of the Declaration of Independence. He was a tanner.

2431. MARGARET, m. a Wilson and had children: Sarah, living at Newark, O., unmarried; Joseph, d. Cincinnati, O., leaving son, a lawyer, there; Jerusha, m. to a Dr. Wilson, Iron-

ton, O.; John, d. 1849, en route to California, unmarried; Jane, living at Newark, O., unmarried. No further record of this branch.

2432. Maria, b. 1 mo. 5, 1790; d. Newark, O., 3 mo. 23, 1831; m. Miami County, O., 8 mo. 15, 1809, Bradley Buckingham, b. Ballston, N. Y., 6 mo. 9, 1784; d. Newark, 2 mo. 7, 1850; son of Ebenezer Buckingham (Stephen, Daniel, Rev. Thomas, Thomas of Milford, Conn., 1637), and Esther Bradley.

He removed from New York State to Ohio, with his parents, in 1799. At about the age of nineteen he commenced life as a surveyor, and in pursuit of that calling walked over the most of the States of Ohio and Indiana. The Indians were constantly near his party and he made many friends among them by his courage in the hunt. At one time, when far away from any cabin or white men, he was bitten by a deadly snake. It was the work of an instant to open his penknife and cut the flesh so deep as to put him out of danger. He never lost his pleasure in the hunt, and his grandchildren took great delight in hearing the older uncles tell of the times when their father came home with a deer across his saddle, and wild turkey hanging from the pommel. These hunts were his recreation when needing rest from the active business of life. Later in life, as a merchant, farmer and joint owner of a mill, he amassed a fortune and became one of the chief men of the place. He was public spirited, and foremost in works of charity, and a liberal supporter of the Presbyterian Church during his entire life; was one of the largest contributors to the building of the First Presbyterian Church of Newark, O. His children remember him as a kind and indulgent father, whose maxim was: "If you can say nothing good of a person, say nothing at all." His ready sympathy and unfailing kindness made him universally respected and loved.

Maria (Darlington) Buckingham was a woman of great force of character, a devout Christian, who trained her children with untiring zeal in the principles of the Christian religion and doctrines of the Presbyterian Church, of which she was a member from her early youth. She had perfect faith in the efficacy of the Catechism and Watts' hymns, and fixed them in the minds of her children, saying they were the best legacy she could leave them. After her death her husband m., 1835, Eveline Wilson, b. London, O., 11 mo. 31, 1814; d. Newark, 6 mo. 2, 1842, by whom he had children.

2433. FIDELIA, m. Isaac Wilson. Those of their children who were addressed failed to respond, but from others the following account is given of them: Margaret m. a Mr. Moore, but left no children; Louisa, living in Idaho, married and has a son; David, living near Newark, O., has been twice married and has two sons in the hardwark rtade, in Newark; George, a contractor, living in Newark, is married, but has no children; Sarah, m. to Mr. Colville, now a widow, living with her children in Newark. O.

2434. Reese, d. 1855; m. first a Holmes, second a Murphy. By last wife left two daughters and a son: Sarah m. a Col. Freeman, of the United States Army, who has two sons living; Emily, deceased, m. a Mr. Granger, of Zanesville, O., left quite a family, who are among the best citizens and quite wealthy; Charles, living in Logan County, O., is married, but has no children; a man of means and good information.

No further record.

2436. JOHN MEREDITH, d. 1864; m. Nancy — and had three children, John, Harvey Allen and Newton. Harvey Allen, the survivor, in 1896 lived at Winchester, Adams County, O. No further record.

2437. GEORGE WILSON, d. 1886; unmarried; aged eighty-eight.

2438. CAREY ALLEN, d. 4 mo. 30, 1874; m. Eliza Holmes, who d. 1860. Children: Carey Allen and Catharine, of whom the first is living in Montana.

2439. Joseph Davis, killed by lightning, 6 mo. 24, 1883; m. Maria ———, who d. 10 mo. 31, 1858. Children: Maria and Carey Allen, of whom the last lives in California.

He owned a farm of 250 acres at Gainsboro, and kept tavern there, where wagoners would stop over night going and coming from Baltimore. The old sign bore the inscription, "Kept by Meredith Darlinton," which was the way he always signed his name.

He was for many years a merchant and owner of mills, in Newark, where he lived and died, respected by all. No children.

2464. FIDELIA, b. 8 mo. 16, 1812; m. Newark, 12 mo. 8, 1831, Rev. James Harrison, b. Orange, N. J., 10 mo. 29, 1802; d. Waterloo, Ia., 5 mo. 26, 1877; son of Thomas Harrison and Nancy Osborne, of Newark, N. J. He took his academic course at Bloomfield, N. J., and his collegiate course at Williams College, Mass., after which he taught a classical school at Alexandria, Va. In 1828 he entered Princeton Theological Seminary and remained three years, preparing for the ministry. In 1831

he took charge of the First Presbyterian Church at Newark, O., and while there married, and soon after removed to Dresden, where he remained as pastor of the Presbyterian Church for ten years. He was a scholarly man, of more than ordinary ability, strong as a sermonizer and expounder of the Scripture. He died surrounded by his family, and all the people said, "A good man has fallen." His wife, at the age of thirteen, entered an academy at Zanesville, and spent two years in taking a preparatory course. She was then sent to Troy, N. Y., to finish her education under Madame Emma Willard, returning home in 1830. In 1855 she moved with her family to Waterloo, Ia., where for many years she aided her husband in the arduous duties attending the life of a home missionary in a new country.

At the age of thirteen Ebenezer entered the Ohio University at Athens, and graduated from that institution in September, 1833. The spring following he entered the Western Theological Seminary at Allegheny City, Pa., where he remained two years: then spent nine months as a teacher in Edgworth Female Seminary, at Braddock's Field. Pa. In September, 1836, he was licensed to preach the Gospel by the Presbytery, in Granville, O., and ordained in September, 1838, at Lewinsville, O. In May, 1830, he removed to Coshocton and remained in charge of the Second Presbyterian Church until May, 1846, when he received a call to the First Church of Canton. For nearly thirty years the devoted preacher ministered to the spiritual wants of his congregation, and only resigned his pastorate to accept the position of principal of the Putnam Female Seminary, at Zanesville, O. In March, 1866, he buried his wife, one whose counsels and prayers, and sympathies and labors, greatly aided him in his work for the Master. Her name, her virtues, her self-denying labors, are remembered with gratitude by very many in the congregation in which her life was spent. The Sabbath evening before his death he preached in the Putnam Presbyterian Church, Zanesville, O., from the words: "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul, or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul."

The above shows the extent of this family so far as ascertained, except that a Mrs. Pattie D. Johnstone, of Augusta, Ga., is the daughter of (2577) John A., or of (2578) James Darlington. The occurrence of the name of Job in the family at an early period gives a little color to the idea of their descent from the father of Abraham Darlington, of Birmingham. The marriage of John Darlington and Elinor Armstrong, 2 mo. 4, 1773, is recorded at the Swedes' Church, Wilmington, Del., and among the baptisms at the same church, in the year 1750, we find the entry: "Eleanora, born June 25th, baptized July 6th; parents, Robert and Elizabeth Robinson Armstrong." These entries may refer to the wife of the South Carolina settler.

The address of William R. Darlington, of Allendale, having been obtained, he was requested to furnish some account of his ancestry. In a letter of March 23, 1805, he gave an outline sketch of the family from his great-grandfather down, to which he adds the following: "My grandfather was a large slave owner for the time and the section in which he lived. It has been said that when he first settled in Carolina his neighbors, who were squatters, were not willing to live near so many negroes, so they pulled up and left the neighborhood. My grandfather had a family of negroes known as the Toney family. These negroes were a high type of their race, one selling at my father's sale forty-five years ago for \$2,200. This family of negroes were always designated from the others as the high charactered Virginia negroes. When I was a very small boy an old woman, grandmother of this valuable negro, used to tell me tales of the Revolution, incidents happening in Virginia. I mention these negroes, as through them we trace our ancestors to Virginia."

This correspondent having written to a relative for information, received the following response:

"445 Broad St., Augusta, Ga., 3-27-1895. "Col. W. R. Darlington, Allendale, S. C.:

"MY DEAR COUSIN—Yours of the 23d inst., requesting me to give you all I know of the family history, was received duly. It has always been a source of regret to me, knowing so little of our ancestors. Of one tradition I have always felt fully assured; that

of coming of a good stock. What I remember to have heard is the following: Our great-grandfather was named John. He came, together with a brother, from England to Pennsylvania. Our grandfather, Job Darlington, came to Bornwell County, South Carolina, after the war of 1776. He had, or his family had, once lived in Maryland. He either came to South Carolina from Maryland or Virginia; he did not come from Pennsylvania. Our grandmother was Elizabeth Nelson. I wrote, as you requested, to old Uncle Sam, but he was too young to remember anything at all of his old master. All he could tell me was their names. The above is all that I know of our ancestors. I wish you every success in hunting up the family history, provided always, that you find them all with a clean record. Our family name is unsullied.

"Thanks for your kind invitation to visit you; nothing would afford me more pleasure, and hope I may be able to do so one of these days.

W. R. Darlington also obtained from the County Clerk the following certificate:

"South Carolina.

"Barnwell County:

"I, W. Gilmore Simms, Clerk of Court, do hereby certify that at the request of W. R. Darlington, Esq., of Allendale, I have made a search of the records of this office with reference to the Darlington Family. The first time the name occurs on the record is a deed made by John Darlington to Mary Gray, of a tract of land on Savannah River, in Orangeburg District (now Barnwell), in trust for the eldest daughter. This land was granted to John Darlington in 1785 and conveyed to Mary Gray Aug. 10, 1786. Darlington's wife, Elinor, joined with him in signing the deed, and also renounced her inheritance in the land, at the same time signing the deed as Elinor Darlington. The deed was recorded in 1807, Book C., page 139. The records of the Probate Court show that John Darlington died in 1807, leaving a personal property of slaves, horses, corn, &c., amounting to six thousand dollars; and the sale bill shows that most of the personal property was bought by Elinor the wife and Job Darlington, the son, administrators. Job Darlington, as appears by the record, died in 1826, leaving a very large body of real estate and a personal estate consisting of slaves, mules, cattle, &c., amounting to over eight thousand dollars. His wife, Elizabeth, qualified as administrator. The name of John A. Darlington appears upon the record in 1826, and he must have been a brother of Job. Thomas Darlington appears upon the record in 1836, and from then to 1831, eight tracts of land were conveyed to him by divers parties, all in the region bordering on the Savannah River. Given under my hand and seal this 1st day of July, 1896.

W. R. Darlington, writing July 3, 1896, says: "I send you what information I can get from the records, etc. You will please send me some more blanks, as my father had two brothers who left children. John A. Darlington, referred to in the Simms letter, was the elder son of Job Darlington, I have been on the lookout for some old family Bibles, etc., but thus far I have been unable to obtain any information from that source. I will soon send you the names and ages of all the South Carolina Darlingtons (approximating ages). I am almost sure we are of the line of John, and that John A. Darlington referred to was John Armstrong Darlington, as I had a brother who died fifty years ago, whose name was Pickens Armstrong Darlington. I can't get the family of Darlingtons aroused. I only know five male Darlingtons, myself, two sons and two cousins. I am now having the records of Charleston County examined, as it was once Orangeburg District, and I may find something of interest there. I am getting very much interested in the work."

Though more than once requested, no further communications were received from this correspondent, and the history of this branch is concluded with the following item from a southern paper:

Special to The State:

"Beaufort, S. C., March 15 (1897).—Mr. Thomas D. Darlington, familiarly known all over the State as Tom Darlington, traveling agent for the tobacco house of Messrs. M. Furst's Sons & Co., of Savannah, Ga., arrived in town yesterday, accompanied by his lovely and charming bride, formerly Miss Lyde Toccoa Irby, daughter of Dr. W. C. Irby, of Laurens, and niece of ex-Senator Irby.

"There are few better known or more popular young men than the groom, who is the eldest son of Col. W. R. Darlington, of Allendale, Barnwell County, and connected with the best and most prominent families in that county. Everybody likes Tom Darlington almost as much as they love the gallant colonel, his father, and as the family of Irby is as prominent and distinguished in the social scale, the union of these two hearts brings the up country and the low country in closer communication than ever. THOMAS DARLINGTON, OF CANADA.

2733. Thomas Darlington, of Ballytony, near Arklow, County of Wicklow, Ireland, m. Anna Jones, of the same county, about 1806. It is thought the family were landed proprietors and had been seated there for a considerable time. Having met with financial reverses, Thomas Darlington concluded to remove to America, and a pocket bible, which belonged to his son, contains the date, 5 no. 19, 1833, written on board the Duncan Gibb, Atlantic Ocean. They settled in the township of Darlington, Canada, near Bowmansville, Durham County. He died at Strathroy, at the age of eighty-seven years.

2734, ROBERT, b. 1807; was sent to Dublin with a view to his education for the ministry in the Episcopal Church, but owing to the financial reverses, was early recalled. After the arrival of the family in Canada he settled in Whitby and engaged in business in Pickering village, where he performed the duties of a local preacher, class leader and Sabbath school teacher. He m. Hartland, Niagara County, N. Y., 10 mo. 31, 1839, Sarah Annie Hunter, b. Thornton, Yorkshire, England, 11 mo. 8, 1816; d. Brooklin, Whitby, Ontario, 3 mo. 24, 1896, and buried at Groveside Cemetery; daughter of James Hunter, M. D., and Elizabeth Story, of Lewiston, N. Y. In 1840 Robert Darlington was taken into the itinerant work on the Whitby Circuit, as a supply. At the following conference he was received on trial, and two years later was ordained for special purposes that he might take charge of a circuit. He was an earnest laborer, prayerful pastor and preacher, and traveled on the Nelson, Peterborough, Colborne and Markham circuits with acceptance and success. His health failing he retired to Brooklin in 1848, where for nearly thirty-three years he was in charge of the post office, and for many years he was treasurer and secretary of the Brooklin Branch Bible Society, and also treasurer of the municipality in which he lived. He died 4 mo. 4, 1881, and was buried in Groveside Cemetery.

About the year 1827, John Joseph Darlington removed to New York City, where he established himself in business, first at 82 Broadway, and afterwards on South Seventh street, Williamsburg. His residence was on South Fourth street, Williamsburg. In the year 1852, returning from a visit to England, he jumped from the vessel to the wharf before the gang-plank was out, missed his footing, and was drowned. His wife, Elizabeth, died about 1837.

2753. Joseph James, b. at Due West, S. C., 2 mo. 10, 1849; was graduated from Erskine College in 1860, received the degree of A.M. in 1872, studied law in the office of Richard T. Merrick, Washington, D. C., was admitted to the bar at Washington in 1875; was elected professor of contracts, personal property, and bills and notes, in the Law Department of Georgetown University, in 1881, and received the degree of LL.D. from the Georgetown University in 1887. He married on 7 mo. 21, 1885, at Washington, Elizabeth R. Meador, who d. 4 mo. 22, 1800.

2754. MARY E., b. at Due West, S. C., 12 mo. 5, 1851; was educated at Due West Female College, and at Shorter Female College, Rome, Ga.; engaged in teaching, and for a time was professor of Latin and mathematics at Cooper-Limestone Institute, but retired from her vocation in 1889, and went to Washington, D. C., where she now lives.
