



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PREFACE.

This book is the result of my desire to know something in regard to my own ancestors. Its production has largely been possible because of the efforts of my predecessors, and I desire to acknowledge my indebtedness to those who have heretofore had a share in this work, and to the host of correspondents who have for the most part so heartily responded to my inquiries.

Among the first to desire a genealogy of the family was Waitstill H. Allis of Springfield, Mass. He was much interested in the work of collecting data and historical documents and he gathered together a great many facts of value. He sent out invitations to attend a convention at Saratoga Springs, N. Y., on September 6th and 7th, 1882, for the purpose of forming the Allis Historical Association, the object being to interest all living descendants of William Allis in the task of securing data for the publication of an "Allis Memorial." Delegates were present from several states, and although no definite plans were made the occasion was a very enjoyable one. Nothing further seems to have been done relative to the association, but the data which Waitstill H. Allis accumulated was passed along and is included in this book.

The next one to actively take up this work was Hubbard S. Allis of Whately, Mass., and Prattsburg, N. Y. He spent a great deal of time in looking up and arranging facts relative to the family, and was assisted in no small way by his daughter, Mrs. Gertrude A. Billings of Whately, Mass. I have been fortunate in having her assistance also. While a resident of Prattsburg, N. Y., Hubbard S. Allis had a leaflet printed covering his own branch of the family as of June 1st, 1890, and stating that the information would be passed on to Charles Allis of Milwaukee, Wis., who would publish a more complete book.

On May 4th, 1893, Charles Allis sent to many living descendants his booklet entitled the "Allis Genealogy", with the idea of interesting them and securing from them information that would enable him to complete the unfinished and missing lines and make possible the publication of a correct and up-to-date genealogy.

I became interested in this work in the fall of 1911, when I saw for the first time the booklet published by Charles Allis, and after looking up some facts about my own line I decided to take up other lines as well, and the work from a small beginning soon grew to be quite an undertaking. It is to be regretted that some family lines are still incomplete, but after an investigation I feel sure that a part of the information is not obtainable. I have not relied on tradition in this work but have depended upon recorded facts, and hope the book will be found fairly accurate.

Again I wish to thank those who have aided in making this genealogy possible and express the hope that it will give us a better knowledge of our ancestors and enable us to become better acquainted.

INTRODUCTION.

Nearly all of the Allises in this country are descendants of William of Hatfield. It is to be regretted that he left no record of his parents or clue that would help to clear up the obscure period of his history before 1630, the year in which he sailed from England. It is recorded that a Richard Allis took the oath of allegiance in England on June 22, 1632, before embarking in the "Lion", which arrived at Boston on September 16, 1632, but where he lived here is unknown as no later trace of him can be found. It is possible that they were brothers, but as Richard also left no clue as to his ancestry we can only surmise this to be so.

It is a reasonable probability that we are descendants of the William Alis referred to in the "Domesday Book", which is the ancient record of the survey of lands of England completed by William the Conqueror in 1086. It is recorded therein that William Alis held Ellatune, co. Hants (now Allington, Hampshire), as tenant-in-chief of the king. There is no doubt but that he took part in the invasion and conquest of England by William, Duke of Normandy (called the Conqueror), in 1066-1071, and received this large grant of land from him, which rated about 360 acres and included a church and two mills. He was undoubtedly connected with the Parish of Alisay (formerly Alis), a pretty village near Paris, France, and Geoffrey Alis, possibly a brother, went to the Holy Land as a crusader with Robert, Duke of Normandy (son of William the Conqueror) in 1096. It is recorded that a Sir William Alis, with nine other knights,

was taken prisoner when fighting under the banner of the Earl of Bretton in 1091 near Yvery, Normandy. (7 Collins Peerage, 541.)

It is clearly shown by several old English records that William Alis, the owner of Ellatune, was the ancestor of Roger Alis (1161), Sir William Alis (1184), Walter Fitz Alis, Sheriff of London in 1201, Martin Fitz Alis, Sheriff of London in 1213, Sir Roger Alis and Sir Thomas Alis (in the time of Henry III, 1216-1272), William Alis (in the time of Edward I, until about 1303), and Roger Alis, Sheriff of London in 1395.

The next descendant of whom we have a record is Geoffrey Allis in 1454, whose name appears in the church records of London published by the Harleian Society. After that date the family seems to have spread out from London and the name appears in the records of various places. A record of Chichester wills shows the name of William Alys of Felpham in 1535, and a Richard Allis of Lincolnshire was one of the men eligible to serve in the wars in the time of Queen Elizabeth in 1558-1563. The descendants of Richard Allis have apparently lived in Lincolnshire ever since that time and can be found there to-day. Of principal interest among the names shown in the Lincoln records are Thomas Allis (1538-1540), Joseph Allis (1558), William Allis (1591) and Robert Allis (1620).

The Allis family in London was quite a large one until the great plague of 1665, during which it was nearly exterminated. One family lost seven members in two days, and

a reference to the burial registers will show why the name is now so rare there. Most of the entries after 1665 in the records of the Harleian Society are of the Essex Allises, which include Edward Allis, Chingford, in 1675, and John Allis, Woodford, in 1685.

It is of course impossible to establish a continuous line of descent from William Alis of Ellatune up to the present time, but after studying certain authorities on surnames and noting the regular use of the original Christian names from generation to generation it would seem to be a fact that we are his descendants.

The first record of the coat of arms is that borne by the last of the Roger Alis line when he was made Sheriff of London in 1395. Undoubtedly the coat of arms was worn by Sir Roger Alis, who was a crusader in the time of Henry III and received a grant of Hampshire land for his services from Isabella Mortimer in 1217 (*Rot. Lit. Claus*, p. 305; *Testa de Nevill*, p. 230). It is a regular crusader's arms, viz. "Or, on a cross sable, five crescents argent" (*Her. Col.* 19 R), that is, a black cross on a field of gold with five silver crescents.

It is interesting to note the different spelling of the name in various English and Colonial records, for instance, Alis, Alys, Allis, Allise, Allice, Alyes, Ellice and Ellis. There are at least two cases where after a change of residence the name was recorded Ellis, although originally Allis, namely the families of Thomas Allis of Guilford, Conn., and Abel Allis of Kensington, Conn. It is possible there are other similar cases.

1. WILLIAM ALLIS was born between 1613 and 1616, probably in Essex or London, England, and came to this country with Winthrop's fleet in 1630. The fleet consisted of eleven vessels: Arabella, Talbot, Ambrose, Jewel, Charles, Mayflower (third voyage), William and Francis, Hopewell, Whale, Success and Trial.

In the Winthrop colonists, consisting of 700 immigrants, there were three distinct communities represented: (1) those from Dorset and Devon, known as the Dorchester men, who first settled in Boston a number of years before it received that name, (2) those from Lincolnshire, who were properly called Boston men and had determined upon the name of Boston for the new settlement before they left England, (3) those from London and Essex.

William Allis came with the last named company and was no doubt one of the 39 men on the Mayflower (third voyage). They first touched at Salem, but landed at Charlton Harbor, Boston (then called Trimountain), July 1, 1630.

The Mayflower brought what was called the Braintree Company, which included with William Allis, Thomas Graves and Thomas Meekins, all of whom played an important part in the first generation of our family. Our an-

cestor was associated with Graves from the start, always lived at the same place, and the families eventually intermarried. They were both surveyors and laid out the town or fort of Charlestown, the first regular settlement of the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

The first trace of William Allis after landing was in Mount Wollaston (afterward Braintree) in 1632. That town, comprising 50 square miles, was surveyed and laid out by him before 1634, and during that year, by order of the General Court, it was annexed to Boston. Large tracts of land were granted to certain inhabitants to settle in Mount Wollaston and William Allis received 12 acres on February 24, 1640. On May 13, 1640, the inhabitants of Mount Wollaston were incorporated as the town of Braintree and, with Dorchester, Dunham, Hingham, Natasket and Roxbury, were incorporated to form the city of Boston.

On that date William Allis was made a freeman. Only those who were members of the church were allowed to take the Freeman's Oath, which gave them the right to vote and hold office. Several historians have apparently been misled by the records of the Massachusetts Bay Colony into stating that the first knowledge of William Allis was on May 13, 1640. The reason for the error was that the

official records of Braintree were first instituted on that day. He was made a freeman then because Braintree was incorporated in the city of Boston.

Our ancestor was a well-educated, capable man, and well fitted to take his place among the Puritan settlers. He was not only an experienced surveyor but also a successful farmer in Braintree. He was a prominent citizen of the town, being one of its selectmen, and had the supervision of building a road from Boston, Mass., to Providence, R. I. He lived in Braintree until 1658 and then emigrated to Wethersfield, Conn., in the fertile Connecticut valley. At that time the Massachusetts Bay Settlement was becoming somewhat crowded, and as a result the colonists left there from time to time for Connecticut, settling the towns of

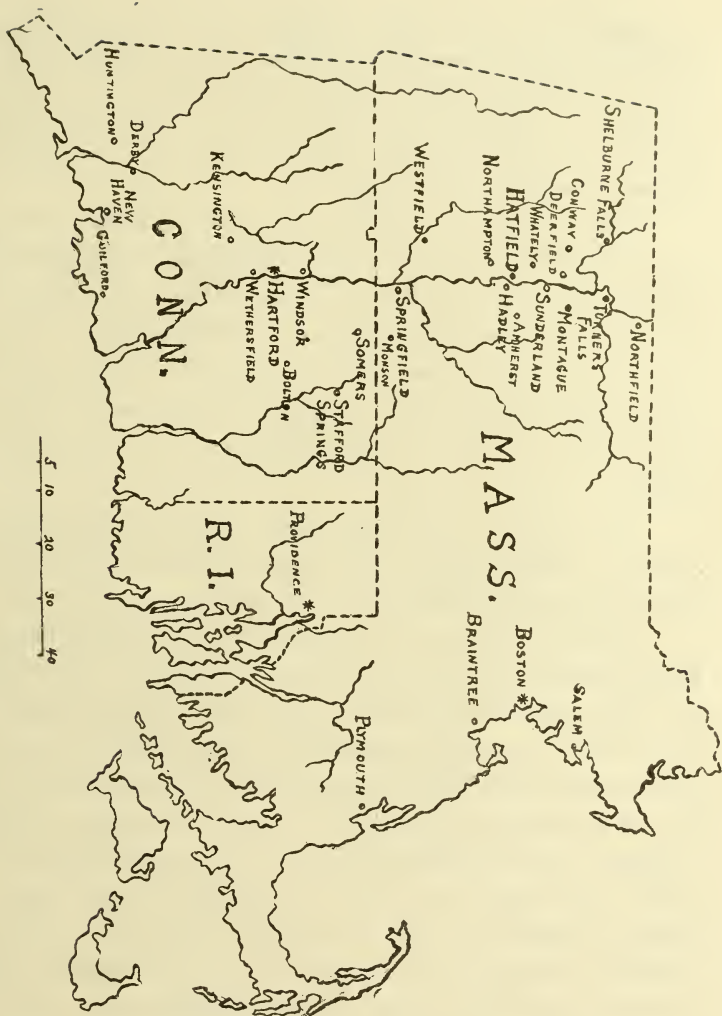
Windsor, Wethersfield and Hartford in the order named. Most of the settlers made the trip afoot through the wilderness and brought with them only such things as they needed most, leaving the remainder of their possessions to be brought around from Boston and up the Connecticut River by boat.

All went well until there arose a difference of opinion among the settlers of these three towns in regard to church government and ordinances. A crisis was reached in 1660 and a meeting was called at which a committee was appointed to go up the Connecticut River and view the lands east and north of Northampton, Mass., which had been purchased from the River Indians through Major John Pynchon of Springfield, Mass. A favorable report was made by the committee and about 60 men, 20 of whom lived in Wethersfield, agreed to move with their families to that very attractive place, and the land was shared between them and a lot assigned to each one. In that way Hadley was settled by the English from Wethersfield, Hartford and Windsor, William Allis being one of the number.

It is claimed that William Allis and Thomas Meekins, with several others, made the journey by way of the cart path through Westfield in 1661, in which year the first of the English settled in Hadley. The journey was a difficult one on account of the wilderness, the many streams to be bridged or forded and the impassible swamps, and with their heavily loaded carts, women and children, personal effects and live stock of various kinds, it took them ten days to make the trip of about 50 miles.



The Hadley lands were on both sides of the Connecticut River and had been partly cleared by the Indians. The house lots of eight acres were laid out on each side of the main street, which was ten rods wide and extended a mile north and south. Hadley was laid out somewhat after the fashion of English towns and was named after Hadleigh, Suffolk County, England.

Our ancestor's home lot was on the west side of the main street in the center of the settlement. The present meeting house, town hall and Congregational parsonage are all on the lot which was assigned to William Allis. The main street was surrounded by a continuous line of palisades during King Philip's war, enclosing the houses of the original proprietors, and those who settled later were outside the palisades.

On May 31, 1670, that part of Hadley became the town of Hatfield, and in 1771 the northern part of Hatfield was incorporated as the town of Whately.

William Allis was a leading citizen of Hatfield and a trusted lieutenant of John Pynchon of Springfield. He held the offices of deacon, justice of the peace and selectman, was often on advisory committees with prominent men of that section and in 1672 was one of those commissioned to lay out Squakeage (Northfield). He was a member of the committee which was appointed by the town on March 7, 1673, and authorized to say who should be the inhabitants of Deerfield by right of purchase or otherwise, to regulate the herding of cattle, to advise about the institution of a church and secure a good orthodox minister, etc. At a later date, namely May 7, 1673, the Great and General

Court appointed him one of a committee of six to act in all respects, to lay out the farms and to admit inhabitants to Deerfield, and in 1674 was one of those commissioned to lay out Swampfield (Sunderland).

During these years, as the Indians had been fairly dealt with by the settlers, peace existed between them until war was incited by King Philip. On October 19, 1675, the Indians numbering about 800 attacked Hatfield with the intention of destroying the town and slaying the inhabitants, as they had at the neighboring towns of Northfield and Deerfield, but they were expected by the settlers and beaten off with but small loss to Hatfield.

The Indians then assumed a defiant attitude. They stole cattle and horses from the English and appropriated a number of the outlying farms. As a result the settlers decided to take the offensive and the battle at Great Falls (now Turner's Falls) resulted. The men from the different towns to the number of 150 started from their homes on May 18, 1676, and assailed the Indians at the Falls early in the morning of the 19th, when they were asleep, killing about 175 of them with practically no loss to themselves, but when they began their homeward march this success was turned into a defeat. The Indians attacked them in the rear, and a panic was created among the English by the report that a thousand warriors under King Philip were at hand. The men were scattered, and although the retreat was conducted with bravery and skill 38 of the settlers were killed, and some became lost and wandered around in the woods for two or three days before reaching their homes.

William Allis was a captain in the fight at Great Falls and had with him in the engagement three sons, one of whom, William Allis, Jr., was killed.

The settlers now saw the need of a larger force to cope with the Indians. A cavalry regiment called the Hampshire Troop, under command of Maj. John Pynchon, was recruited from the different towns.

William Allis was at first Coronet and later Lieutenant of the mounted troops. Garrisons were established in the various towns, that of Hatfield being made up of 36 men under Lieutenant William Allis, and he was in charge of the fortifying at Hatfield in the winter of 1677-78.

For a while after the Falls Fight there was an occasional plundering expedition by the Indians, but they became scattered by famine and disease and by the English troops, and the death of King Philip on August 12, 1676, appeared to put an end to the war. Nothing more was seen of the Indians until September 19, 1677, when 50 of them from Canada, led by their chief Ashpelon and encouraged by the French, attacked Hatfield without any warning. They entered the town when most of the men were harvesting corn in a distant field, set fire to many buildings, killed 12 and captured 17 of the English, and immediately started for Canada with their captives. Mary —, the wife of William Allis, was one of those killed in the massacre, and Abigail Allis, his granddaughter, was one of those taken captive. The suddenness of the attack seemed to paralyze the settlers and apparently no effort was made to rescue their relatives and friends. Perhaps they feared that the captives might be tomahawked, if pursued, and hoped they might be spared if unmolested. The prisoners, upon their arrival in Canada, were turned over to the French, and those who survived did not again see their homes until eight months afterward.

On June 25, 1678, Lieutenant Allis married Mary, daughter of John Bronson and widow of John Graves of Hatfield, Mr. Graves having lost his life in the Hatfield massacre. She was also the widow of John Wyatt of Haddam, Conn., before she married John Graves of Hatfield. On March 16, 1681, after the death of Lieutenant William Allis, she married Samuel Gaylord.

Lieutenant William Allis died on September 6, 1678. He was evidently a prosperous man in his day and at the close of his life he had accumulated quite an estate. The inventory of his property, which was taken September 18, 1678, was as follows :

2. JOHN ALLIS was born in Braintree, Mass., on March 5, 1642, and died in Hatfield in January, 1691. He married on December 14, 1669, Mary, daughter of Thomas Meekins and widow of Nathaniel Clark. She married Samuel Belden of Hatfield about a year after

John Allis resided in Hatfield, near his Father William, owning a lot on the same side of Hatfield street, and was one of the prominent citizens of that town. He was a millwright and carpenter of note. He built many churches and was erecting the first corn mill at Mill River when he died. He was the first town clerk of Hatfield, and was one of a committee of six appointed to make a survey of and lay out highways between Hadley and Windsor, Conn. He served in King Philip's War and was in the fight at Great Falls on May 19, 1676. Afterwards he was a captain in the militia.

At the time of the Hatfield massacre on September 19, 1677, the mother of John Allis was killed, his barn burned, and his six-year-old daughter Abigail carried away to Canada by the Indians, being one of the seventeen prisoners taken. On the same day the Indians went north to Deerfield, where they killed one and captured four men, and then went across the country to Lake Champlain and Canada. During the march to Canada one of the men was burned at the stake and two other captives were killed, and all endured much suffering. The trip through the wilderness was a most difficult one.

The prisoners were held in Canada by the French until ransomed eight months later through the efforts of two of the Hatfield settlers, Benjamin Waite and Stephen Jennings, whose families were among the captives. They were young men, experienced in woodcraft and familiar with Indian customs, and they determined to ascertain the fate of their relatives and friends and redeem them if found alive.

On October 24, 1676, with a commission from the Massachusetts government, they left Hatfield for Albany by way of Westfield, that being the only travelled route to Canada. They reached Albany, but the authorities were unfriendly and sent them to New York

on a false pretense. After a time they were sent back to Albany with a pass, but it was December 10 before they were able to resume the journey to Canada. They first hired a Frenchman as a guide, who deserted them, and then hired a Mohawk Indian, who remained with them. In the face of many trials and discouragements, and at times without food, they finally reached the captives at Sorell, Canada, but they were unable to secure all of them without the help of the French authorities, and therefore went on to Quebec. They were successful in their mission and were also assigned a guard of 11 soldiers to Albany. They left Quebec on April 19 and Sorell on May 2, having redeemed all of the captives. The ransom cost about £200, which was made up of contributions from the English. The party reached Albany on May 22 and eventually arrived at Hatfield safely.

3. SAMUEL ALLIS was born in Braintree, Mass., on February 24, 1647, and died in Hatfield on March 9, 1691. He married in 1675-6, Alice —, and after his death she married Sergeant John Hawks on November 20, 1696. She was killed at Deerfield on February 29, 1703-4, during the attack by the French and Indians, at the time that her son Samuel was killed and two of her daughters (Mary and perhaps Rebecca) were captured.

Samuel Allis was a carpenter and builder of Hatfield and resided on the east side of Hatfield street. Seven children:

Nathaniel Allis settled in Bolton about the time of his marriage and was a wealthy farmer and prominent citizen of that town. His will, made in January, 1750-51, is an interesting document and is quoted herewith:

In the name of God amen. I, Nathaniel Allis of Bolton, in the County of Hartford, and the Colony of Connecticut, being under great indisposition of body, but through God's goodness of sound and disposing mind and memory, and calling to mind ye uncertainty of life, do make and ordain this my last will and testament. First and principally resigning my soule to God, the father of Eternity and my body to the earth to be decently buried, and as for those worldly goods and effects with which it has pleased God to bless me I will dispose of as followeth:

Item: I give and bequeath unto my loving wife, Elizabeth, all those movables which she bore with her at her marriage, as also provision for her maintenance as hereinafter named and provided. Item: I give unto my son, Jonathan Allis what he has already received of his brother David on account of his portion. Item: I give unto my son, Nathaniel Allis, the sum of 50 pounds money old tenor, to be paid to him as is hereafter provided. Item: I give unto my son John Allis the sum of 100 pounds old tenor, to be paid to him as is hereafter provided. Item: I give unto my son Ebenezer Allis the sum of 300 pounds old tenor, to be paid him as is hereafter provided. Item: I give to my son Timothy Allis the sum of 300 pounds old tenor, to be paid him as is hereafter provided. Item: I give to my daughter Mercy Johns the sum of 50 pounds old tenor, to be paid her as is hereafter provided, besides what I have already given her. Item: I give unto my daughter Jemina Root the sum of 100 pounds old tenor, to be paid her as is hereafter provided. Item: I give unto my daughter Mindwell Rood the sum of 50 pounds old tenor as is hereafter provided. Item: I give unto my daughter Marcy Coleman the sum of 50 pounds old tenor, to be paid her as is hereafter provided.

I give to my son David Allis all my lands in Bolton with the buildings and the appurtenances thereof, to him and his heirs and assigns forever, provided that he pay and discharge all the legacies above named to the rest of my children, which legacies I do hereby order to be paid within six years after my decease, and provided also that he, the said David Allis, maintain and subsist me and my wife Elizabeth with a comfortable maintenance during the time of each of our natural lives.

My will further is that an inventory of my movable estate be taken, and that after my just debts be paid and answered that then the remainder thereof I give to my son David to enable him to pay the above legacies. My will further is that if the state of our money be altered before the said legacies be payable that then the said David shall discharge said legacies in such money as shall then be equal to the value of old tenor at this time.

Finally I hereby nominate and appoint my son David Allis to be my sole executor of this, my last will and testament, whereof I do hereunto set my hand and seal this last day of January, A. D., 1750-51.

40. ELISHA ALLIS was born in Hatfield, December 3, 1716, and died there in the year 1784. He lived in Whately, Mass., and Somers, Conn., but returned to Hatfield, where he was a wealthy farmer. He married (1st) December 20, 1744, Anna, daughter of Sergt. John and Sarah (Williams) Marsh of Hadley; married (2nd) Sarah, daughter of Samuel Reade of Burlington and widow of Thomas Cutler, who died March 25, 1807. They both had large possessions and their marriage agreement, which is unique, is inserted:

"To all people to whom these presents shall come, know ye:

Whereas a marriage is intended by God's permission shortly to be had and solemnized between Elisha Allis of Hatfield, in the County of Hampshire, in New England, and Sarah Cutler of Warren, in the County of Worcester, widow. Now in case such marriage shall take effect, and for a competent jointure, the said Elisha and Sarah have covenanted and agreed as follows, viz.-

The said Elisha covenants and agrees to and with the said Sarah that in case the said Sarah shall survive him and become his widow, that as and for her dower in his estate he now has or inheritance he shall or may hereafter have she, the said Sarah, shall have the use, possession and improvement of one-third part of his real estate, whether housing or lands, for and during the full term of her natural life; and the said Elisha further covenants and agrees to relinquish, and does hereby relinquish, all claims in the personal estate of the said Sarah that she is now possessed of, except what is by this agreement or covenant specially agreed by the said Sarah he shall have, use and enjoy.

And the said Sarah Cutler covenants and agrees to and with the said Elisha Allis, that in case she shall survive him that she will accept the use and improvement of one-third part of his real estate, in manner and during the term aforesaid, in full satisfaction of her dower that she might claim by virtue of her said marriage (in case it take effect) to and in any other estate the said Elisha now has or may die siezed of; and the said Sarah further agrees to and with the said Elisha that he shall have, possess and enjoy, for and during the term of their intermarriage, her dower or thirds to or in the real estate of her late husband, Mr. Thomas Cutler, deceased, and the slaves, rent and profits arising from and out of the same by any ways or means whatsoever, to his sole and absolute use and benefit. And the said Sarah further agrees with the said Elisha that he shall have the use and improvement of her silver plate and other household goods that she now has, and shall furnish his, the said Elisha's, house withall, and also three of her cows during the time of her intermarriage, and at the end of such term he or his heirs shall have or enjoy one-third of such silver plate and other household goods and one of the said cows as his or their own estate forever, and also that he shall have the service and benefit of her negro slave named Ann during the term of ten years in case their intermarriage shall continue so long.

And the said Elisha further covenants to and with the said Sarah for himself, heirs, executors and administrators, that if she survives him she shall have two-thirds of the plate and household goods that he shall actually receive with and from her upon their marriage, or the circumstances they may then be in, without his being accountable for the wear thereof or being made worse by usage, and also two of the cows or other two of equal value, the several articles to be delivered and returned to her at his decease, she being then living; and in case of the said Sarah's decease before the said Elisha's, then two-thirds of the plate and household goods, also two of the cows or other two of equal value, shall be at her decease delivered and returned to

her heirs in the circumstance and state in which they were agreed to be returned to the said Sarah had she been living. And the said Elisha further agrees that if the said Sarah survives him, or his heirs, upon the intermarriage ceasing, shall have the whole of the silver plate if 'she or they desire it, she or they allowing for one-third of the value thereof to him or his heirs, to be paid in the other household goods agreed to be returned as aforesaid. And the said Elisha further covenants with the said Sarah that he will provide suitable meat, drink and washing and lodging and apparel for two of her children, namely Bethia Cutler and Oliver Cutler, until they shall arrive respectively to the age of twenty-one years, without charging them therefor or appropriating to himself any portion there. Nevertheless, it is hereby intended and to be understood that in case of said Elisha's decease before they arrive respectively to the aforesaid age, that then they nor either of them are to receive any further support out of his estate or charges toward their maintenance; nor is the said Elisha to provide for them longer than they shall dwell with him and he have the benefit of their labor and other earnings, nor is he to be at loss or charge for them in case of sickness or any extraordinary casualties or accidents befalling them.

In Witness Whereof, We, the said Elisha and Sarah, have hereunto interchangeably set our hands and seals this fourteenth day of January, Anno Domini, 1765.

At first he and his wife rode seven miles on Sundays to the Deerfield meeting horse-back, with a child in the arms of each, as there was at that time no church in Conway.

Lucius Allis was for a time a soldier in the Continental Army. On September 23, 1777, he enlisted in Thomas French's company, Col. Eleazer Allis lived in Hatfield for a few years after his marriage and then moved with his wife and family to Vermont and settled on the Lamoille River. 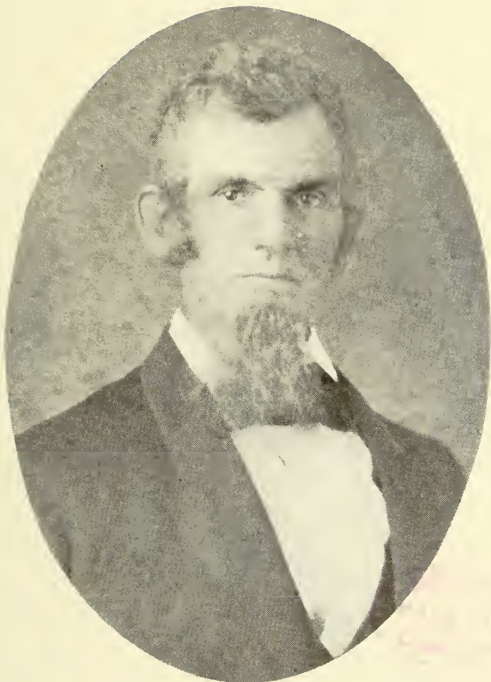

323. SAMUEL ALLIS, born September 28, 1805, in Conway, Mass., was apprenticed to learn the trade of a saddle and harnessmaker when 17 years old and remained in Conway until he became of age. From Conway he went to Williamstown, Mass., and worked at his trade six months, and then went to Troy and Ithaca, N. Y. While in Ithaca, Samuel Allis became interested in Christian work in the Presbyterian Church, and when the church decided to establish a mission among the Indians in the West, under the patronage of the American Board of Commissioners of Foreign Missions, he determined to cast in his lot with Rev. John Dunbar and Rev. Samuel Parker.

The party left Ithaca in the spring of 1834, their destination being the Flat Head or Nez Perce Indians, west of the Rocky Mountains. They went by way of the Erie Canal and Lake Erie, and crossed Ohio by stage, eventually arriving at St. Louis, Missouri. There they found that the party of traders they were to accompany to the mountains had already gone, and learning of a mission among the Pawnee Indians nearby decided to go there for a time, but before joining the Pawnees they spent several months among the missions of the Kickapoos, Shawnees and Delawares at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, learning the Indian characters, customs and manners.

The missionaries then went on to Bellevue, Nebraska, which was the government agency for the Omahas, Otoes and Pawnees. There they met the agent, in council with the Pawnees, and made known their object. The Indians were much pleased to learn that the missionaries were to come among them to teach them the truth about the "Great Spirit", and in accordance with the desire of the Pawnee chiefs it was deemed best to divide the missionaries among the different bands. The missionaries, therefore, separated and Samuel Allis went with the Loup or Wolf Pawnees.

During his trip with the Indians back to their village he had his first experience of sleeping upon the ground. The second morning after leaving Bellevue he was awakened at about three o'clock in the morning by the Indians hurrying to saddle up and leave camp, as the prairies were on fire. Quoting from his own words:



SAMUEL ALLIS

“This was the first sight of the kind I ever witnessed, and I could see by their movements that we were in danger. All were hurrying to pack their ponies, and the reader can readily imagine something of the fix I was in, for I had two horses, a saddle and a pack horse, and was as awkward in packing a horse as a monkey would be running a threshing machine, but I soon learned the art perfectly. My host was true to me in assisting me to get away and deputed two young Indians to assist me, and even held my stirrups as if I had been General Sherman or some other noted general. They have often talked and laughed at my first prairie experience, but I have since for six months at a time slept on the ground without seeing a white man’s house. When I was once mounted I had to thank the good Lord for my deliverance. On that same trip another party was surrounded by the fire and four Indians and several horses burned to death. I have several times since then been exposed to prairie fires and sometimes had to fight to my utmost ability.”

Upon arriving at the Indian village Samuel Allis was royally entertained by the chief and other prominent men of the tribe, and if he had understood the Pawnee language he would have enjoyed himself immensely. The following days were very busy ones for him, as well as the Indians, who were making preparations for their winter hunt, and he had many new experiences. During the winter he was engaged in learning the language, hunting buffaloes with the Indians, taking lessons in cooking, drying meat, dressing robes, and other employments, and attending powwow balls, concerts and medicine feasts.

During the year 1835 the Rev. Samuel Parker and his assistants established the mission among the Nez Perce Indians, Samuel Allis deciding to remain with the Pawnees.

In the spring of 1836 reinforcements arrived from the East for the Nez Perce and Pawnee missions, among whom was Miss Emeline Palmer, who became the wife of Samuel Allis a short time afterward. She was born May 19, 1808.

At that time the Indians were about to change their location, and until they had settled in their new home (which was about 100 miles west of Bellevue and was their reservation until transferred to the Indian Territory) Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Allis stopped at Bellevue. He procured four acres of land there and built a temporary house, and on account of the hostility of the Sioux they remained in Bellevue until the spring of 1842, farming and keeping stock, when they moved out on the reservation (now Geneva) and commenced operations. He built his own house, stables, sheds and fences, and raised his own crops, and was well provided for by the winter of 1844-5, even though the preceding winter was the coldest of his experience, during which a part of his livestock was frozen to death, as well as many of the Indians and their horses.

In the summer of 1845 Samuel Allis built a school-house—did all the work himself—and the following spring commenced teaching school, the Indians sending their children to him except for a period during the winter hunt, when they would leave for a few weeks. A year or two afterwards he and his family moved back to Bellevue and worked among the Otoes and Omahas until 1851, when they settled on a farm in St. Marys, Mills County, Iowa. A few years later they moved on to another farm nearby

and Samuel Allis lived there until his death on December 12, 1883, age 78.

Samuel Allis was the U. S. Interpreter for John Danver's treaty with the Pawnees in August, 1856, and held the position of Government Interpreter until about the beginning of the Civil War. He lived among the Indians on the eastern border of Nebraska for nearly forty years, and during that time was exposed to many hardships, frequently without the necessities of life, and in danger of life many times. He was invariably shown kindness by the Indians with whom he was associated, and became convinced that when they learned a person and proved him to be their friend they were kind and generous. He found them to be very intelligent in spite of their numerous superstitions, and knew them to be good orators, having heard them make many speeches to the government officials from the President down, some of which would not have disgraced the walls of Congress.

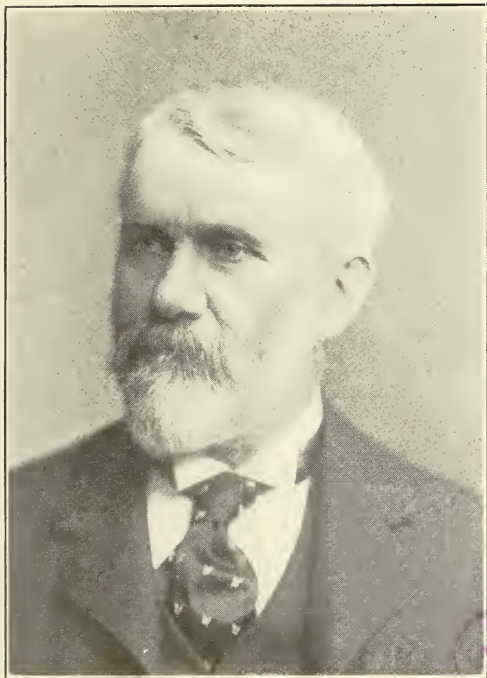

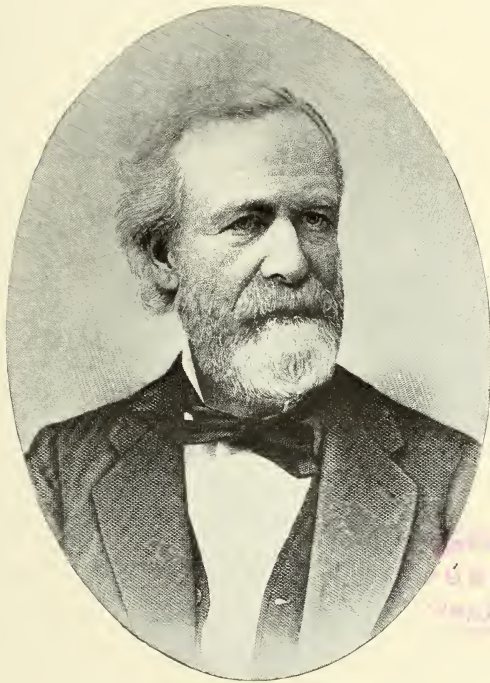

434. EDWARD PHELPS ALLIS was born May 12, 1824, in Cazenovia, N. Y. He graduated from Union College, Schenectady, N. Y., in 1845, his education having been with a view to the practice of law, but he decided in favor of an active business life and in 1846 went West, locating in Milwaukee, Wis., where he opened a leather store in connection with William Allen, under the firm name of Allis & Allen. He remained in that business until 1854 and was very successful, building in the meantime some large tanneries at Two Rivers, Wis., of which he was the active managing director.

Edward P. Allis next engaged in the banking and real estate business with John P. McGregor. In 1861 he, with Mr. McGregor and C. D. Nash, purchased the iron foundry of Decker & Seville of Milwaukee and formed the Reliance Iron Works, being made manager. Within two

years he acquired the interests of the other two gentlemen and, retiring from the banking business, gave his full time to the new venture. From that time until his death on April 2, 1889, he was sole proprietor of the E. P. Allis Company, which became one of the largest manufacturing plants of its kind in the world.

From a moderate beginning Mr. Allis enlarged and extended the original Reliance Works until the buildings covered three city blocks, and he was the life and moving spirit of the immense industrial establishment he created. Starting with a business of \$32,000 a year, with twenty employes and a payroll of \$13,000, the enterprise broadened under his management into a business of \$3,000,000 a year, with between 1200 and 1500 employes and a payroll of over \$700,000. Those iron works were the first in the country to make roller mills for the making of flour by the roller process, and were also prominent in the manufacture of steam engines, saw mill machinery, mining machinery and heavy pumping machinery. Their products were sent to all parts of the world, including Cuba, Mexico, South America, Europe, Japan, Australia, and Sandwich Islands.

The turning point in the life of the old Reliance Works came in 1869, when the city of Milwaukee voted to erect and install its own waterworks and advertised for piping and machinery. Bids came in for piping from all over the country and nobody dreamed of Mr. Allis bidding on the work as his foundry was not equipped for the making of pipe, but when the bids were opened it was found that he

had secured the contract. Of course the first thing to be done was to build a pipe shop, and in four months from the date of signing the contract the shop was completed and the first casting made, and from that time on the goods were made and delivered as fast as human skill could turn them out. He also secured the contract for the pumps and engines, and the machinery which he made and installed for the city of Milwaukee is an everlasting monument to his memory. That work brought an immense amount of engine work to the company, causing extended enlargements and improvements in the property, and the business was given such an impetus that very soon the Reliance Works of E. P. Allis became the largest machine shop in the West.

For nearly thirty years he gave to the great work of his life all that could be given by tireless industry, unflagging energy and persevering determination. Besides the Reliance Works he owned and operated the large Bay State Works in Milwaukee, a foundry on Bay Street, and rented and operated another foundry in the same city.

Mr. Allis became a fellow of the American Society of Civil Engineers in July, 1883, and always manifested an active interest in its affairs. In politics he was at first a Republican, but was later an advocate of the Greenback Party and accepted its nomination for Governor of Wisconsin.

The main cause of his phenomenal success was his unimpeachable reliability, whose word was as good if not better than his note. He was quick to decide, relied upon

his own judgment, had executive ability of a high order, and attended strictly to his business. He was quiet in manner, simple in his tastes and inclined to be reticent. He was a fine scholar and always kept fully posted on all scientific, mechanical and political matters.

On September 12, 1848, he married Margaret Marie, daughter of William W. Watson of Geneva, N. Y., who was born September 28, 1828, and died December 20, 1909, at the age of eighty-one years. Their twelve children were:

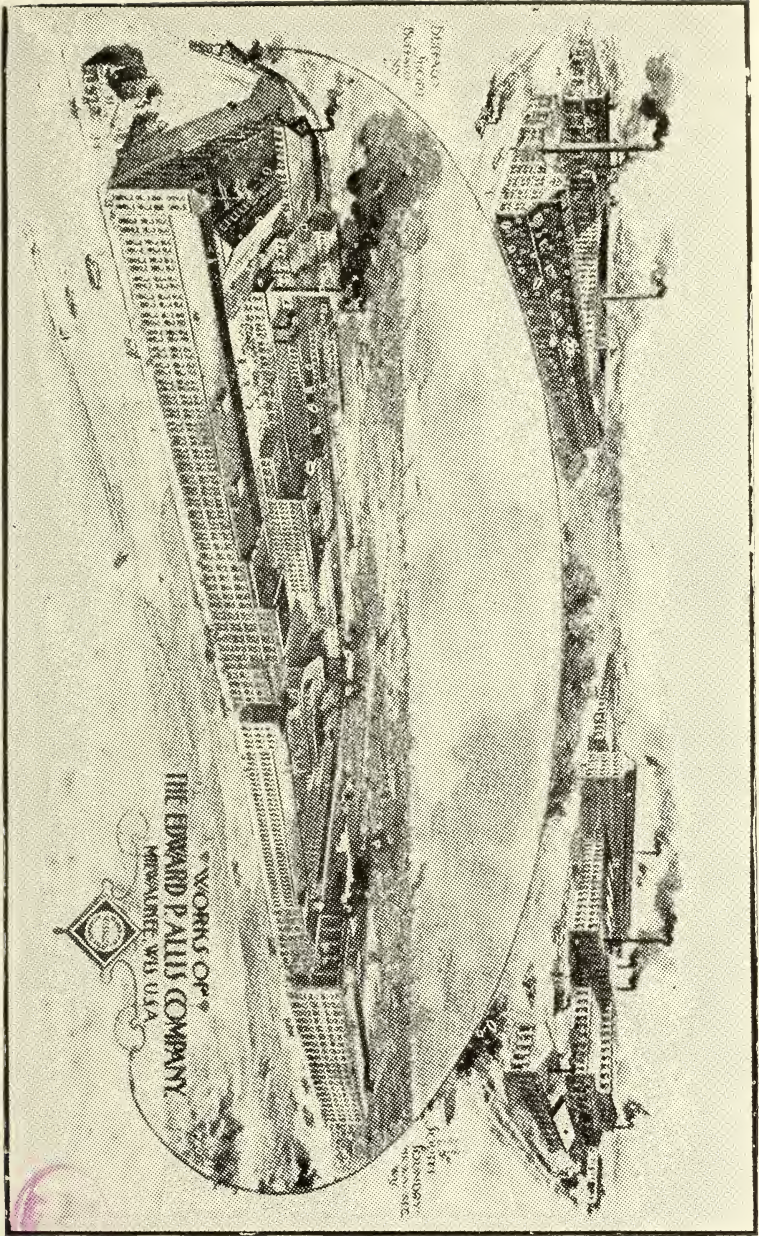

Hubbard S. Allis was educated in the town schools and the academy at Deerfield, Mass. He then went to Rochester, N. 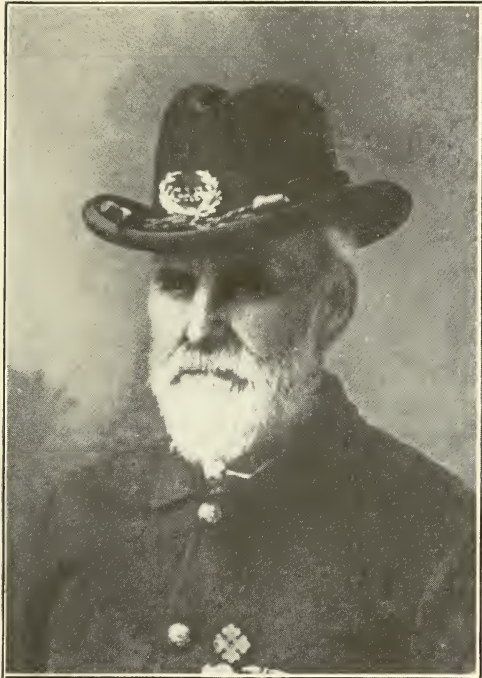

473. JOHN MATHER ALLIS was born December 15, 1839, in Danville, Quebec, Canada, and died July 16, 1899, in Valparaiso, Chile. At the age of 14 years he left Danville for Troy, N. Y., to make his own way in the world. His ambition was to obtain a good education, and to that end he attended school in the winters and worked during the summers to pay expenses. During that time he was engaged in different lines of work, and at the time of the breaking out of the Civil War was employed in the manufacture of rifle balls for the Federal army. He worked his way through Princeton University, graduating in 1866, and three years later entered the Union Theological Seminary of New York.

On June 14, 1870, he married Helen Caroline Arnold of Troy, who was born December 22, 1845. His first pastorate was in Albany, N. Y., and his second in Lansing, Mich., but he was obliged to go to California on account of his wife's health and she died there on September 18, 1875.

For the next six years he was a pastor in San Francisco, Cal., and at the same time labored extensively on the columns of the "Occident," a Presbyterian religious weekly. He then received a call to Lafayette, Ind., which he accepted, and there married Laura Livingston on June 2, 1883, who was born May 13, 1842.

While in Lafayette he was offered the opportunity to go to Chile, South America, and found a college for the instruction of young men who desired to prepare for the min-

istry, which he accepted, and in 1883 went to Valparaiso, Chile. He was not, however, limited to the teaching of theology. Besides preaching to the English congregation in Santiago (the capital of Chile and near Valparaiso, where he was finally stationed) he devoted much of his time to evangelization. He was commissioned to the United States to raise funds for the Instituto Ingles, a college that is known throughout all of South America, and he not only successfully accomplished that work but supervised the building, etc., of that handsome college upon his return to Chile. It was while in the United States on his commission that Princeton University, his Alma Mater, conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in consideration of the valuable work he was doing in connection with the Church in Chile.

Very soon after his return to Chile Dr. Allis was made President of the Mission, which was legally incorporated in 1888, an office which he discharged with skill and honor until his death. He was a favorite speaker on occasions of special gatherings of the Anglo-American community and was asked to preach in 1887 on the occasion of the fifth jubilee of the reign of Queen Victoria of England. He was an eloquent speaker and full of energy and enthusiasm, devoted to his life work, sympathetic and true. He was beloved by poor and honored by men of high degree, and was known from Lima, Peru, to La Piz, Bolivia, and from one end of Chile to the other. He had the following children:

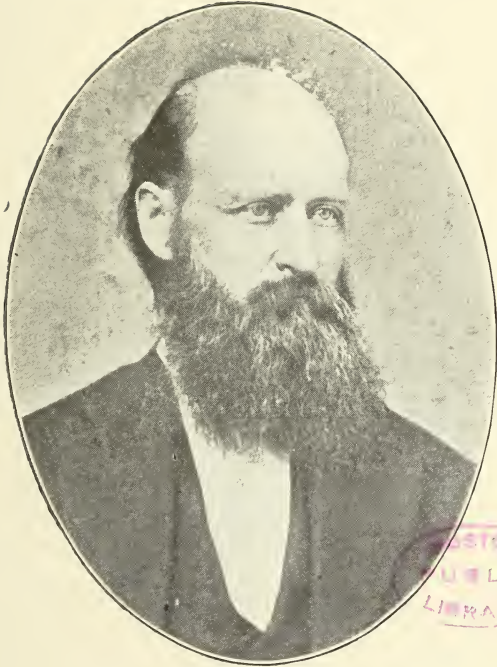

After the manner of those days he was early apprenticed to a tailor, but followed that trade only to secure a livelihood and to aid his ambition in the matter of education, until early in the 50's he drifted over into New York State and was appointed principal of the Nelsonville School in Cold Spring. He was subsequently promoted to principal of the Rock Street School, a position that he filled most successfully.

In 1862 he secured the appointment of postmaster of Cold Spring, which he held for nearly twenty years. A few years after assuming the duties of postmaster he started writing for the village newspaper under the nom de plume "Uncle John's Journal," and in 1870 formed a stock company to rescue the Cold Spring Recorder from failure. Thus the postmaster also became village editor, and gradually acquired the other interests until he became sole proprietor. In 1882 he gave his entire time to the paper and mastered the mechanical details of the printing business, but soon began to feel the effects of many years of arduous labor and gradually settled down to the routine where death found and summoned him.

From his obituary notice the following is quoted: "He was a loyal son to the town and country. He labored tirelessly and enthusiastically for the material and moral advancement of the community wherein he cast his lot; never avowedly discouraged but hopeful for the future and cheering the despondent, he laid down his last long sleep, well deserving the reward 'well done, good and faithful servant'."

Mr. Allis was a resident of Cold Spring for forty years and was closely identified with the interests of the town, holding many local offices, and was also interested in the local Y. M. C. A. and chairman of the Republican Town Committee. He was a member of the Episcopal Church and the Hudson River Lodge of Masons of Newburgh, N. Y. His eight children were:

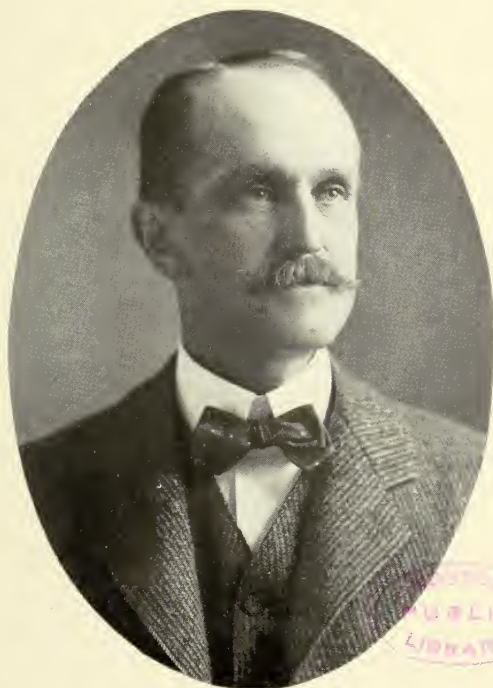

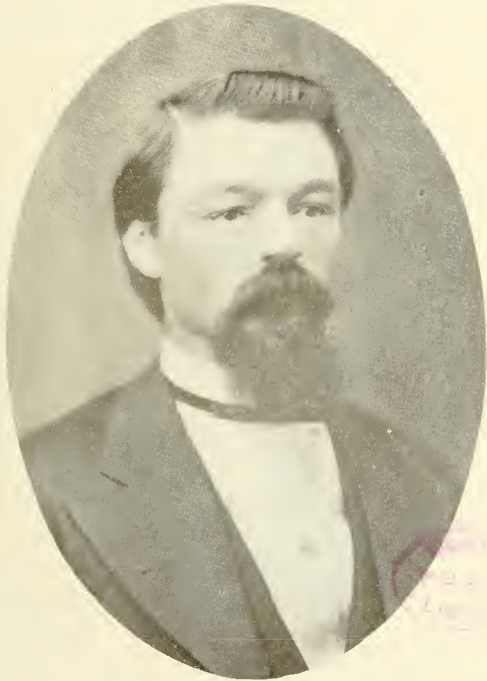

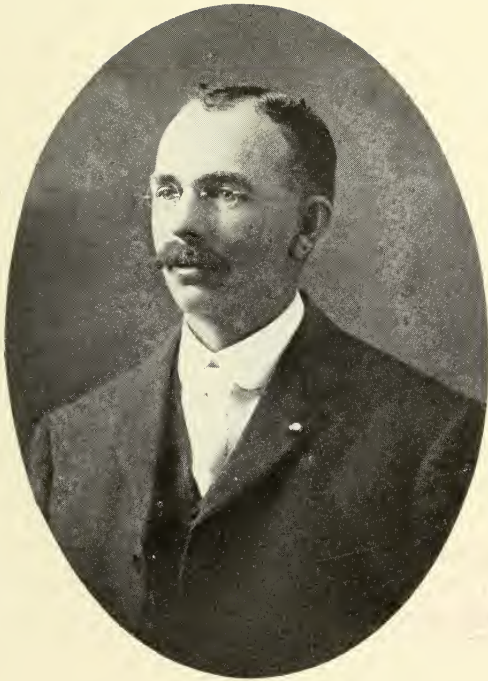
