

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PREFACE.

This work, at its inception, was only intended to contain information of the descendants of my father, but, others becoming interested, efforts were made to ascertain what could be learned of the descendants of those bearing the name Woodward who settled in Chester county, Pennsylvania, at a very early date, in order that such information might be included. some of its readers no apology is necessary for its incompleteness; to others I would state that it is difficult to ascertain the whereabouts of the different branches of the family, and, when found, many treat letters of inquiry with silent indifference. There are, doubtless, some errors and very many omissions in the work, but they are unavoidable at present. A list will be kept of those securing the book, and well-attested corrections of errors, if any, will be forwarded to them at the end of the year. I herein take occasion to express my indebtedness to Gilbert Cope, Esq., for the very valuable information which he furnished me, and to all others who kindly assisted in collecting the records of the family. THE WOODWARD FAMILY.

In this age of mental and physical activity, when so much is accomplished with ease and rapidity, it has been deemed desirable to have a published genealogical record of a family bearing the name of Woodward, said family being traced back to the early settlers in the then county of Chester in the State of Pennsylvania. The work, accordingly, was commenced, impossibilities were undertaken, as is often the case with men, and failures were made in many directions, though these did not dishearten us in our labors. The work was continued, many difficulties were overcome, and there is now presented to the reader the result of considerable labor and research. In examining the literature of the past we find that great attention has been paid to family genealogy; this attention has varied in different ages and among the different nations. Since the creation of the world we have records of families, more or less complete, for many generations, and in that book with which we should all become familiar, the Bible, they stand forth as witnesses to, and proof of, much that is found therein. As far as our observation extends, the English-speaking people, since the Christian era, have taken special interest in such matters. While it is not claimed that that which follows in this work has in itself a specific value, yet an occasional perusal of it will lead the mind from its present surroundings, and conduct it in a channel that may be both pleasant and profitable. The name Woodward is a compound one, consisting of Wood and Ward, and is a pure English word, signifying a keeper of the forest. In all our inquiries the Woodwards generally believe themselves to be of English extraction, though their ideas of their

ancestors are quite vague. From careful research we conclude that there were at least four separate settlements of those bearing the name of Woodward in the early colonization of this country. First, Those who embarked at Ipswich, England. April 10th, 1634, and settled in the province of Massachusetts. Some of the descendants of these were founders of the Connecticut, and others of the Wyoming branch. Second, The founder of the New Jersey branch, who was born in Derbyshire. England, in 1657. He immigrated to America and settled for a time on Long Island, New York, but anterior to 1686 he arrived at Crosswicks, New Jersey. The settlers bearing the name Woodward in Fauquier county, Virginia, were from New Jersey. Third, Those of Maryland, in the counties of Anne Arundel and St. Mary's, were found there among the early settlers near Saint Anne's Chapel. This chapel is supposed to have been one of the first Episcopal churches built in America. Fourth, Those of Chester county, Pennsylvania, of whom we will give more in detail. At present there is a want of definite information respecting the early settlers of this name in Pennsylvania, and while there is room for conjecture, nothing should be asserted which is not sustained by written evidence of the time. A difficulty is also presented in the variable orthography of the earlier days, by which one is made to doubt whether this or that one belonged to the family. In summing up the information received, we find that in the year 1687 a Richard Woodward purchased a tract of land in Thornbury township, then Chester county, Pennsylvania; a Robert Woodward served as a juror in 1688, and an Elizabeth Woodward mentioned in court matters in 1688; a George Woodier, also written Woodworth, a constable in 1688; and a Richard Woodward, of Philadelphia, a mason by trade, in 1605. Our information leads us to the conclusion that the first three named were brothers and sister, but at this late date we are unable to decide the relationship of the latter two to each other or to the first named. We find no evidence that George and the latter Richard left male offspring, so we can continue our reckoning in favor of the first three named. It cannot be asserted that the first four named were members of the Society of Friends, though their children were mostly mem-

bers, and it is probable the parents frequented the meetings. Richard's death is recorded by the Society, which goes to prove some near relation to the same. The Richard of Philadelphia was a member of the Society. Our researches have failed to find the time of the arrival of the Woodwards of Chester county, and the place of their nativity. History informs us that several persons bearing the name Woodward suffered persecution among the Friends of England, and one of them, named Henry, died in prison. In Worcestershire we find the names of Joan, John, Richard, and Thomas Woodward, all of whom suffered more or less for their religious opinions. In 1670 it happened that certain informers came to the house of John Watts, of Droitwich, in expectation of a meeting. There they found some persons sitting at a table, and heard John Cartwright giving thanks before meat; they also found three persons in an adjoining room. This they swore to be a conventicle, and the said John Cartwright, with one Stanley, was sent to prison. John Watts, the owner of the house, was fined £20, for which his team of horses was afterward seized; and the other three, viz., John Tyler, Richard Woodward, and Thomas Hayward, were fined and had goods taken away worth 20s., by warrant from Stainer and Perrot, the two bailiffs. A perusal of English history of the latter part of the seventeenth century will satisfy any one of the chaotic state of affairs of that country; persecution seemed to be the order of the day. While we do not now desire to discuss the cause of religious persecution, still, as a result of it, we mention, in passing, that during the reign of Charles fifteen thousand families had been ruined for their religious persuasions, and on the accession of James twelve hundred Friends were at one time released from filthy prisons and noisome dungeons, in which five thousand persons had perished for conscience's sake, the victims of a profligate monarch, himself without religion and regardless even of common morality. But when William Penn obtained the grant of Pennsylvania a better day dawned, and many saw its glory and rejoiced in its light. Penn had suffered very severely under the old dark system; he had seen thousands of his brethren and sisters, innocent men and women, dragged from their business which procured them

bread, from their homes and firesides, and from their places of worship, and imprisoned without any crime, or even the charge of a crime. He, himself, had suffered personally. In 1670 the Recorder of the city of London, sitting in his judicial capacity at the trial of Penn and Mead, publicly declared that it certainly would never be well with them till something like the Spanish inquisition should be established in England. These are some of the ills from which our forefathers desired to flee, and the new colony in America was a suitable asylum for them. We might, with profit, now consider some of the trials they were called upon to undergo in establishing themselves in their new homes. When we from choice desire and conclude to change our places of abode, it is not a hard matter generally; but if we feel compelled to do so it is quite different, so we can judge somewhat of the feelings of Richard, Robert, and Elizabeth Woodward as they bade adieu to friends near and dear to them, and started to brave the perils of the ocean, and to endure the dangers incident to setting up a home for themselves in the wilderness. In that day, without the aid of steam, the perils at sea were great, and the time of transit a long one; it is on record that, after having been at sea about two months, which was then considered a prosperous voyage, William Penn and his friends arrived within the capes of the Delaware; now the same trip can be made in eight or nine days. After their arrival they labored under what we would now call disadvantages. To prove that there was, perhaps, less dissatisfaction among them than with us at the present day, we quote the following from a piece of writing signed by some of the early settlers. They say, "And for our outward condition as men, blessed be God, we are satisfied; the countries are good, as is also the land, the water, and the air, but they that come out upon a mere outward account must work or be able to maintain themselves. Fowl, fruit, and venison are plentiful, and of pork and beef is no want; we have no cause to murmur; our lot is fallen, every way, in a goodly place, and the love of God is, and growing, among us, and we are a family at peace within ourselves, and truly great is our joy therefor." They had at this time neither horses nor ploughs, but tilled the ground with

hoes. The natives were remarkably kind to them, thanks to the friendly treaty of the founder of the colony. The colonies, when first planted in Virginia, New York, and New England, were prepared for war, and the pages of their history are stained with blood. No language can adequately describe the suffering, both of the colonists and the natives, that followed this anti-Christian course. William Penn and his colony came to Pennsylvania unarmed and defenceless, wholly unprepared for war, and he and his people lived in harmony and peace with the natives as long as the government remained in their hands, which was about seventy years. It can hardly be supposed that to carry a dirk and a pair of pistols is the best way to keep the peace of individuals. Finding Richard, Robert, and Elizabeth Woodward among the early settlers of the colony, and supposed to be brothers and sister, we commence the genealogy proper, considering them as of the first generation.

FIRST GENERATION.

I. Richard Woodward purchased, 1st month (March) 6th, 1687, from John Simcock, a tract of two hundred and thirty acres of land in Thornbury township, Chester county, Pennsylvania, as appears by later deeds. According to the style then used, the year began March 25th, and it is not certain whether the above date was at the beginning or close of the year 1687. John Simcock had purchased from William Penn, before leaving England. five thousand acres in Pennsylvania, and of this one thousand three hundred and fifty were laid out in one tract, in the western part of Thornbury, in the year 1684. Upon a part of this Richard Woodward settled, and some of his children were born there. By the court records it appears that Richard Woodworth was one of a jury in a suit between William Hawkes and Henry Reynolds, June 5th, 1688. Again, September 11th, 1688, he was a juror in two cases,—Joseph Richards versus William Buckingham, and Roger Waldron versus Thomas Colbourne. In those days deeds for land were acknowledged in open court, and a note thereof made by the clerk. December 4th, 1688, John Symcocke made over a deed dated "ye 6th day of ye 1st month, 1687," for two hundred and thirty acres of land lying in Thornbury, unto Richard Woodward, by his attorney, John Hodskins (Hoskins). August (6th month) 1689; "Ordered that Richard Woodward be supervisor of ye High Ways for ye township of Thornbury for ye next ensuing year." March 8th, 1601-2, he was one of the grand jury, and June 22d, 1693, was attested constable of Thornbury. March 13th, 1694, a Richard Woodworth was attested as constable for Upper Providence, Pennsylvania. Richard Woodward was a juror March 10th, 1695-6, and at this court John Worrall acknowledged a deed to him, dated February 15th, 1605, for two hundred and fifty acres of land in Middletown, upon which he gave a mortgage to

Worrall, dated March 3d, 1695-6. Richard Woodward was attested constable for Thornbury March 8th, 1697-8, but whether father or son is unknown. By deed dated December 10th, 1698, Richard Woodward conveyed one hundred and thirty acres of the Thornbury tract to his son Richard, and the remaining one hundred acres to his son Edward; after which his residence was, doubtless, in Middletown. March 11th, 1700-1; "Ordered yt Richard Woodward is supervisor for Middletown for ye ensuing year." March 25th, 1703, John Cantwell, servant to Richard Woodward, of Middletown, is presented for stealing a horse, saddle, and wearing apparel from Ionathan Monrow about three months since. For this he was sentenced at the November court to serve his master and Jonathan Monrow seven years equally between them, and to wear a T according to law. February 29th, 1704, Richard Woodward was one of the grand jury, and November 28th, 1704. Richard Woodworth was also one of the number. August 27th, 1706, Richard Woodward and Thomas Barnsly were appointed overseers of the poor for Middletown. It is recorded by Chester Monthly Meeting of Friends that Richard Woodward, senior, died on the 7th day of the 10th month, 1706, aged about 70 years. His time of birth, therefore, was about the year 1636, of which, and at what place, we could find no written testimony. A copy of his will, which was proven January 8th, 1706, we insert in full.

In the Name of God, Amen: the Sixth of September Ano. Do. 1706, in ye fifth year of the Reign of Queen Anne over England &ct. I Richard Woodward of Middletown in the County of Chester & Province of Pensilvania yeom. being sick & weak of body but of sound and perfect memory; praise be unto God for ye same and knowing the uncertainty of this life & Desireous to settle things in order do make this my last Will & Testament in manner & form following viz. Imprs. First I commend my Soul to Almighty God believing that I shall receive remission of all my sins & be saved by the precious Death and merits of Jesus Christ and my body to the Earth to be buried in such decent & Christian manner as my Executors hereafter nam'd shall think fitt & convenient. As for my Worldly Estate weh God hath given me my will & meaning is it shall be employed and bestowed as by this Will is Expressed and I do revoke renounce frustrate and make void all Wills by me formerly made & declare this my last

Will & Testament. Item, I give and bequeath unto my well beloved wife Jane Woodward half of the proffits that yearly accrues from my Plantation where I now live so long as she keeps my Widdow and when she marrys to quit claim to the Plantation and my will is she shall ever after have Yearly pd out of the profits of the sd Plantation six pounds current monys of this Province dureing her naturall life. Item I give bequeath unto my son Joseph Woodward ye other half of my Plantation during his mother's widdowhood and my will is he shall have & enjoy the whole Plantation (If his mother shall marry) to the use & behoofe of him & his Heirs for Ever paying as aforesd Six pounds Currt monys to his mother during her naturall life. And ever after to be the ffree Estate of him & his Heirs. Item I give and bequeath to my Daughter Martha Baker five pounds in monys or a Cow equivalent to the sum. Item I give & bequeath to my Daughter Jane Woodward twenty pound in Currt monys of this Province. Item, I give & bequeath to my Daughter Mary Woodward twenty pound Currt monys of this Province. Item I give and bequeath to my Daughter Sarah Woodward twenty pounds Currt monys of this Province. Item I give and bequeath to my Eldest son Richard Woodward four shillings or a pair of gloves. Item I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Woodward four shillings or a pair of gloves. Item I give and bequeath to my son Edwd. Woodward four shillings or a pair of gloves and my Will is that the said Richard Thomas and Edward shall guit all claims to the remaining part of my Estate real & psonal. Item I constitute and appoint my well beloved wife Jane Woodward and my son Joseph Woodward my true and lawfull Executors to see this my last Will & Testamt faithfully executed and performed according to the true intent & meaning hereof. And do order them 'my sd Executors to pay my funerall charges & all my just debts out of my personall Estate as household goods &ct. & then the remaining part of my personall Estate to be equally divided betwixt my said Executors my wife to enjoy the moiety or half part of the said psonal Estate during her naturall life and then to be equally divided her part amongst all my children or their Heirs. Lastly I will that my son Richard Woodward of Thornbury and my son Edwd. Woodward be my overseers that this my Will be faithfully performed. And I hereby declare this to be my Will and Sett to my hand & seal the day & year before mentioned.

The widow and her son Joseph sold the Middletown tract in 1712, and about 1714 she removed with her daughter Sarah within the limits of Concord Meeting, which is the last that has been observed of her.

2. Robert Woodward. The names of Robert and Richard Woodward occur together twice, as jurors, at a court held September 11th, 1688; and Robert Woodward was also a juror October 2d, 1688. March 5th, 1689-90; "Robert Woodward being Called to the Barre for speaking abusively against the majestretes, espetialy against John Simcockes, soe he submitted himselfe. Ordered that he should finde surityes for his good behavior." June 3d, 1690; "Robert Woodward Being Called to seave his Recognience, weh accordingly he appered. Ordred he should be Discharged, paying his charges." June 9th, 1696; Robert Woodward is mentioned as of Lower Providence township. September 8th, 1696; James Swaffer, of Chester township, in giving evidence respecting the theft of some articles from his house, mentioned that Robert Woodward's two sons were "att plow att his house" about that time, "and after some time his son Richard came to me & would have me to meet him at a wise man's house, & there I should here of my goods, &c." Perhaps from lack of faith in the wise man he declined to go. December 3d, 1696; Robert Woodward, of the county of Chester, yeoman, conveys to John

Powell, of the same county, yeoman, seventy-seven acres of land in Nether Providence, by Crum creek, for £60. After this Robert Woodward is mentioned as of the manor of Rocklands, a part of Brandywine hundred, in the county of New Castle, as will be noticed hereafter. The name of his wife has not been ascertained, neither the exact number of his children, though he had, at least, two sons and one daughter.

3. Elizabeth Woodward. At a court held at Chester, June 6th, 1688, mention is made of a marriage between Thomas Eavenson and Elizabeth Woodward, which was to be accomplished on or before the 6th day of the next month, and Richard Woodward became bound with Thomas Eavenson for the performance of the contract in the sum of £40. Thomas Eavenson had purchased a tract of one hundred and twenty acres in Thornbury township, 1st month 6th, 1687, next to Richard Woodward's land, and from the same person, John Simcock. November 16th, 1702, he also purchased three hundred and seventeen acres in Thornbury from Thomas Bradford, of Philadelphia, carpenter, it being part of a tract of five hundred acres originally purchased by Robert Sumner, of Wiltshire, England. Elizabeth Eavenson was living in 1717, but Thomas, in his will, mentions a wife Margaret. He died in Thornbury about the month of November, 1726, leaving five children, who were all by the first wife.

SECOND GENERATION.

CHILDREN OF RICHARD (No. 1) AND JANE WOODWARD.

4. Richard. Accepting our previous conclusions as correct, he must have been born in England, as we find him at a marriageable age in the year 1605, and in Pennsylvania. He married Esther Davis, they having declared their intentions of marriage before Concord Monthly Meeting, 1st month 11th and 3d month 13th, 1695, but the marriage certificate is not recorded. She was, probably, of a Thornbury family. Richard obtained from his father, December 10th, 1608, one hundred and thirty acres of land in Thornbury, and afterward purchased from Jacob Simcock, son of John Simcock, one hundred acres more, by deed of September 9th, 1708. He also bought ten acres and one hundred and thirty perches from Philip Taylor, who had bought of Edward Woodward. His first wife dying, he was married again, about the close of 1701, to Deborah Stanfield, daughter of Francis and Grace Stanfield, who came from Garten, in Cheshire, in the "Endeavour, of London," arriving 7th month 29th, 1683. Deborah was probably the mother of the most of his children. Richard was a member of the grand jury at a court held September 27th, 1709, and appears to have been an active member of the society of Friends, as well as a useful citizen. By deed of lease and release, dated May 23d and 24th, 1724, he and his wife Deborah conveyed two hundred and twenty-two acres and one hundred and thirty perches of land in Thornbury to George Townsend, of Oyster Bay, Long Island; and by deed of June 3d, 1724, he obtained one thousand acres in what is now West Bradford township, the south and east borders of the tract now forming part of the south and east lines of the township; it therefore forms the southeast corner of said township. This tract was patented, December 8th, 1690, to Daniel Smith, of Marlborough, in Wiltshire, England, from whom it descended to his grandson, John Smith, son of Daniel

Smith, Jr., but the purchase was made from Thomas Chalkley, an eminent minister among the Friends, who acted as attorney for John Smith. The deed for the same is still in existence, well-preserved, and in the possession of George Martin, of Marshalton, Pennsylvania, one of Richard's descendants. It is too lengthy to insert a copy of it here in full, there being greater exactness in the descriptions of land in the early days than at present, but we will give a few items.

This indenture tripartrite made this third day of June in the fourth year of the reign of Our Sovereign Lord George of Great Britain, France & Ireland, king and defender of the faith Ano. Dom. 1724, between John Smith, of London, in the kingdom of Great Britain of the first part, Thomas Chalkley of the City of Philadelphia in the province of Pennsylvania, of the second part, and Richard Woodward, of the county of Chester, the third part, yeoman. Whereas Samuel Carpenter, William Markham, Robert Turner, and John Goodsom, the former commissioners of William Penn, Esq., late proprietor of sd province by a certain grant or patent under the hands & the seal of the said province, bearing date on or about the 8th day of December, Ano. Dom. 1690, for the consideration therein named, did grant and convey unto Daniel Smith formerly of Marlborough, in the county of Wiltshire, a certain tract or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the said county of Chester, beginning at a black oak, being a corner of Thomas Langharn's land, thence east northeast by the same land four hundred perches to a corner, thence north, northwest four hundred perches to a corner, thence west southwest four hundred perches to a corner, thence south southeast four hundred perches to the place of beginning, containing one thousand acres to hold to him, the said Daniel Smith, his heirs or assigns forever, paying thereto the said proprietory, or his heirs, at or upon the first day of March in every year, at the town of Chester, an English silver shilling or value thereof in coin currency, for each hundred acre of said land to such person or persons as may be appointed to receive the same, &c.

The second purchase, made June 3d, 1724, of John Smith, by Richard Woodward, was for the sum of £270. Eded West, witness. Thomas Chalkley, agent. The land was of excellent quality; mica, flint, gneiss, and limestone was found upon the same, and a quarry of the latter is extensively worked at this date. Upon their removal to their new purchase they obtained the following certificate from the Monthly Meeting of Concord to that of Newark.

From our Monthly Meeting held at Chechester the second day of ye 9th month 1724, to the Monthly Meeting of Newark, sendeth Greeting. Whereas Richard Woodward, his wife and family, late of Thornbury, being removed and settled within the very of your meeting, having requested of us a certificate in order to be joyned to you. This may, therefore, Certify you that necessary inquiry hath been made concerning them, and we do not find but that they have been of an orderly life, and Conversation, and diligent in keeping to meetings, and as for their worldly affairs they are settled to general satisfaction as far as we can understand, so we recommend them to your Christian care. Earnestly desiring their groth and prosperity in the blessed truth in which we remain your friends, Brethren, and sisters. Signed by order of, and in behalf of s^d meeting by us.

In their new home they were members of Bradford Meeting, which was then a branch of Newark (now Kennett) Monthly Meeting. 4th month 3d, 1727, Bradford preparative meeting presents Richard Woodward for an Elder in the place of Peter Collings, to the consideration of this monthly meeting, which is approved of till further order. In 1737 Bradford Monthly Meeting was established, with its two branches of Bradford and Caln, and Richard Woodward was reappointed Elder for Bradford at the first meeting, held 3d month 19th, 1737. Being again a widower, he obtained a certificate to Newark, 8th month 18th. 1739, to marry Susanna Cureton, of New Castle county, Delaware, a widow. The marriage, however, was accomplished at Bradford meeting, 9th month 29th, 1739. Susanna procured a certificate to Bradford, dated 12th month 2d, 1739, and was appointed an overseer for Bradford meeting, 8th month 16th, 1740, in the place of Mary Marshall. She was a very active member while she lived. Her death occurred between 9th month 19th, 1741, and 2d month 15th, 1742. She was succeeded by Elizabeth Freeman as overseer. Richard's fourth and last marriage was on the 30th of the 9th month, 1743, at Kennett meeting, to Martha, widow of John Heald, of Kennett. She took a certificate of membership to Bradford, dated 12th month 4th, 1743–4. The lands which Richard bought were mostly divided among his sons before his death. His will was dated 6th month 30th, 1748, and proven November 17th, 1752. His widow died about 1755. The following is a copy of Richard Woodward's will:

I Richard Woodward of West Bradford, in the County of Chester and province of Pennsylvania yeo., being but Weak of Body, Yet of a Sound mind and Memory, and Calling to mind the uncertainty of human Life, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following, that is to say, Principally and first of all I give and Recommend my Soul into the hands of God, that gave it, and my Body I Commit to the Earth to be buried after a Christian Like, decent manner, at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named, and as for such Worldly Goods as it hath pleased God to bless me withall in this life I give and dispose as followeth this thirtieth day of the Sixth month, Anno Domini 1748: Imprimis, my will is that all my just debts and funerall Expences be fully payed and discharged by my Executors hereafter named. Item I give and Bequeathe to my well beloved wife Martha during her natural Life, one room in the Manshon house to dwell in with Liberty to pass and repass in and out of the same, and also one Bed with furniture belonging unto it. and the use of a Large Bible during her natural Life, and then to return to my son John, and Likewise the use of the Warming pan, during her Life, and then to be returned to my Executors, and also a small iron pott, I give to her during her natural Life, and then to return to my Executors, and my Will is that my said Wife shall have firewood delivered her at the house cut fit for her fire, and also twelve Bushels of Wheat, Yearly and every Year, to be provided for her, and if she dwells upon the said premisses to be Ground and Bolted, and brought home to supply her with Bread. And I also Give her one horse and one Cow and six sheep and Likewise pasturing for them in the summer season, and Hay sufficient keeping for them in the Winter season; And also the free use of one halfe the Garden and the priviledge of the Orchard for fruit, for her own use, and also to be payed unto her in Cash Yearly and every Year the sum of Eight pounds in two Equal distinct payments, one upon the Sixteenth day of May, and the other on the sixteenth day of November annually, Yet with this proviso, that at the time of my decease She Shall have payed her the sum of Five pounds let the time be when it may, which shall be allowed to be a part of the Eight pounds p. annum, makeing the other pay-

ment that year to be the sum of three pounds, and also my Will is that if the horse she may Choose for her use do not suit her Conveniency to ride, my son John who I Leave in possession of said Plantation Shall lend her one for her necessity while she dwells on the premisses. All which priveliges and sums of money by me Bequeathed, to my said wife, Shall be Levied and Raised out of that part of my Estate in Bradford where I now dwell. Item I give to my son William the sum of five shillings. Item I give to my daughter Easther Wilson the wife of Thomas Wilson the sum of five shillings. Item I give to my daughter Jane Hayes widdow the sum of five shillings. I Give to my daughter Sarah Jones the wife of Evan Jones the sum of ffive shillings. I give to Elizabeth Young the wife of John Young the sum of five shillings. I Give to my daughter Mary Entrikin the wife of George Entriken the sum of five shillings. I give to my daughter Hannah Underwood the wife of Joseph Underwood the sum of five pounds. I Give to my daughter Grace Milleson the wife of James Milleson the sum of five shillings. I Give to my daughter Deborah the sum of twenty pounds. Item I Give and Bequeath to my son Richard a tract of Land adjoyning to the place wher I now dwell, Butted and bounded by Lines, as they now stand, supposed to be about two hundred and thirty acres, be it more or less, which I give to him his heirs, and Assigns fforever, if he lives to have Heirs of his Body, Lawfully begotten, and for want of such Issue after his decease, my will is that the said Land shall be sold and if he Leaves a Widdow, one third part of the Value thereof shall be payed to the said Widow, and the remaining part to be Equally divided amongst all my Children that are then Living, Share and Share alike, Also I Give him a large Wainscot Chest that stands in the house. Item I Give and Bequeathe to my son John a Tract of Land & Plantation in West Bradford aforesaid, where I now dwell, to him his Heirs and assigns forever, if he lives to have heirs of his Body Lawfully begotten, and for want of such Issue after his decease my Will is that the said Land and plantation Shall be Sold, and if he leaves a Widow, one third of the Value thereof shall be payed to her, and the remaining part shall be eaqually divided amongst all my Children, that are then living, Share and Share alike. Also I Give to my son John one Table, a Cloathes press, a pare of Bedsteads, and an Elbow Chair. Also I Give to my son John three horses with a Cart plow, and Harrow, with horse harness and Geer belonging to them. Item I Give a Cross-cut saw to my Three sons, and my Will is that after all my debts are fully paid and my Legacies discharged, all the remaining part of my Personal Estate, in any there be, Shall be Eaqually divided amongst all my daughters, Share and Share alike. And I nominate constitute and appoint my two sons William and John my Executors, to perform this my Last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all former Wills and Testaments by me made, and do Confirm this and only this, and no other to be my Last Will and Testament.

Then personally appeared Ebenezer Worth and Thomas Worth (two of the witnesses to the within will) and on their solemn affirmations according to Law, did Solemnly, sincerely and truly declare and affirm that they were personally present, and did see and hear Richard Woodward the Testator within named, Sign, Seal, Publish, Pronounce and declare the within writing to be his last Will and Testament, and that at the doing thereof he was of sound mind and memory to the best of their understandings, and that their names Subscribed thereunto as witnesses, were of their own proper handwritings Respectively. Be it Remembered that on the Seventeenth day of November Anno Domini, 1752, the Last Will and Testament of Richard Woodward late of the said County, Yeo., deceased was proved in due form of Law, and probate and Letters of Administration was granted to his two sons William and John Sole Executors in the said Will named, being first attested well and truly to Administer & Bring in an Inventory of ye deceased's Estate into the Register General's office at Chester on or before the seventeenth day of December next ensuing and rendering a true and Just account of their Administration when Legally thereunto required.

- 5. Martha Woodward was complained of by women Friends of Chester Monthly Meeting, 11th month 25th, 1696, for some misbehavior not specified, and two women were appointed to speak to her. This is all that is said of her, and we can only suppose that the complaint was on account of her marriage. Her father calls her Martha Baker in his will, and from another source we have the record of the births of the children of Joseph and Martha Baker, of Edgmont. But few of their children were Friends. The father died about 1735, leaving Martha to survive him.
- 6. William Woodward died 9th month 17th, 1705, as recorded by Chester Monthly Meeting, doubtless unmarried.
- 7. "Thomas Woodward's Eare mark is a slit on the top, and a half penny cut out of the fore side of the near Eare; his

brand is T on ye near shoulder, and W on the near buttock."* Court record 9th month, 30th, 1703. Jeremiah Collett, Jr., acknowledged a deed to Thomas and William Woodward for five hundred acres of land in Concord, dated 3d month 13th, 1703. Thomas sold one moiety of this, 5th month 2d, 1707, to Henry Pierce, of Kennett, his own residence being in Aston township. Another deed, dated 3d month 5th, 1709, from Thomas Woodward, late of Middletown, now of Concord, and William Woodward, of Middletown, yeoman, conveys to Jasper Yeates, Esq., of Chester, two hundred and seventy-five acres of the same tract. William did not sign or acknowledge this deed from the fact of his being deceased some years before, and why he was made a party thereto is not made clear. Thomas Woodward, son of Richard, and Rachel Martin declared their intentions of marriage at Chester Monthly Meeting 6th month 28th and 7th month 25th, 1704; and on 8th month 30th, 1704, he requested a certificate for himself and wife to Concord Meeting, which was granted 10th month 25th. Rachel was the daughter of Thomas and Margery (Mendenhall) Martin, and came with her parents from Bedwin Magna, in Wiltshire, England, arriving here 10th month 16th, 1685. They resided in Aston for some years, and Thomas was taxable in 1722, but on the 4th of the 12th month of that year they received a certificate to Chester Meeting. In 1735 they removed to Goshen, taking a certificate to that Monthly Meeting, dated 7th month 20th, which stated "that they were pretty orderly in their conversation, and at times frequented our religious meetings." Mention is made of their daughters, but only one of them, Rachel, is named. time of Thomas's death is not ascertained, though it is believed to be between 1740 and 1747. Rachel, his widow, afterward returned to the neighborhood of Chester, and from thence to Wilmington, Delaware, where some of her children were living. She died in 1775, aged ninety years or more.

8. Edward Woodward obtained from his father, Richard,

^{*}The early settlers, for want of fences to confine their stock, allowed them to run at large to a great extent, but in order to identify their own they made use of marks, as well as brands which burnt the initials on the skin.

one hundred acres in Thornbury by deed dated December 10th. 1608, to which he added one hundred acres more by purchase from John Simcock 12th month 23d, 1702-3. By deed of May 30th, 1704, he sold the two hundred acres to Philip Taylor, late of Middletown, which was then Edward's residence, and on the same date purchased from Thomas Taylor, brother of Philip, the same number of acres in Middletown, near the southern end of the township. 9th month 30th, 1703; "Edward Woodward's eare mark is a slit and a half crop on the near ear, and his brand is E on the near shoulder and W on the near buttock." He was one of the grand jury September 27th, 1709. Edward Woodward, son of Richard and Jane, of Middletown, husbandman, and Abigail Edge, daughter of John and Jane Edge, of Providence, were married 3d month 24th, 1705. The certificate of marriage is recorded by Chester Monthly Meeting, and shows that among the witnesses were three Richards, Thomas, William, Joseph, and Rachel Woodward. While residing in Middletown Edward Woodward was a member of Providence Meeting, of which he and Thomas Minshall were appointed overseers 11th month 9th, 1710, in room of Randal Malin and Peter Taylor. He was succeeded by Randall Croxton 5th month 28th, 1712. "Abigail Woodward is chosen overseer for Providence Meeting, along with Rebecca Minshall, instead of Elinor Vernon;" 12th month 23d, 1712. She died 9th month 27th, 1716, and was succeeded by Jean Edge as overseer. Edward Woodward was appointed overseer of Providence Meeting 7th month 30th, 1717, in room of Jacob Edge, his brother-in-law, and was succeeded by Henry Miller 6th month 25th, 1718. He was married again 3d month 23d, 1722, at Providence Meeting, to Alice Allen, widow of John Allen, of Newtown township, and daughter of George and Sarah Smedley. She was born 8th month 2d, 1605, and at the time of her second marriage was a member of Goshen Monthly Meeting. Edward was again appointed overseer of Providence Meeting 10th month 27th, 1731, in place of Isaac Minshall, deceased 7th month 25th, 1732; he and some others were appointed to visit all the families belonging to the Monthly Meeting. 3d month 27th, 1734, he and his wife received a certificate to Goshen Monthly Meeting, and his

position as overseer was given to William Sankey. By the will of her first husband, Alice became possessed of two tracts of land in Newtown, containing one hundred and twenty-eight acres and forty-five and one-half acres. By deeds of September 25th, 1733, Edward and Alice conveyed this land to John Williamson, who immediately reconveyed it to them again. There they settled and became members of Newtown particular meeting, of which he was appointed an elder 6th month 21st, 1738, instead of Lawrence Pearson, but he was succeeded by John Yarnall 4th month 15th, 1741. Edward's third marriage was on the 15th of 4th month, 1743, at Newtown Meeting, to Elizabeth, widow of Peter Taylor, of Providence. She was appointed overseer of Newtown Meeting 4th month 20th, 1752, in room of Dowse Yarnall, and was succeeded by Jemima Thomas 5th month 19th, 1755. Edward Woodward died in Newtown in 1754.

- 9. Jane Woodward, daughter of Richard and Jane, of Middletown, was married in March or April, 1711, to Nathaniel Newlin, of Concord, son of Nathaniel and Mary (Mendenhall) Newlin, of that place. The elder Nathaniel was a prominent citizen and a large land owner. Among his possessions was a large tract of land which now forms the township of Newlin, in Chester county. This, at his death, was divided among his heirs, and one thousand six hundred and twenty acres became the property of his son Nathaniel, who, however, did not long survive him. The father died in 1729 and the son in 1731. Jane Newlin died about 1737.
- day as her sister Jane, to John Newlin, a brother to her sister's husband; they resided in Concord township. Her husband and Richard Eavenson were appointed overseers of Concord Meeting 3d month 3d, 1731, in place of Thomas West and Samuel Painter. She and Elizabeth Painter were appointed overseers of the same meeting 12th month 1st, 1741–2, in room of Edith Newlin and Lydia Mendenhall. John Newlin, her husband, died about the year 1753.

OBITUARY.

[&]quot;Died, on ye 24th of this instant, Mary Newlin, of Concord, in the one

hundred and second year of her age. She was born in the township of Thornbury in ye county of Chester in Pennsylvania, about twenty-six miles from Philadelphia, which was at that time the western frontier on the then province. She was a woman of Hale constitution, affable and Cortious to her frds; Hospitable and kind to strangers and ye poor, Industrious & temperate. She retained her memory and sight to the last period of her life. She spun and knit till within nine weeks of her death. Idleness & Sloth were her greatest bane. She was buried in frds burying ground at Concord, attended by a large concourse of relatives and friends, 11th month 26th, 1790. She told me, about sixteen months past, that she remembered when her father and others deaded the timber, and burned the leaves, and hoed in their wheat by hand, there being few horses and scarce a plow in the settlement; that the natives were very kind to them, supplying them with bear's meat, venison, wild fowl, and eggs in plenty, and thought the white people conferred an obligation on them by receiving it." (Original in possession of Mary Newlin, of Waterville, Delaware county, Pennsylvania).

- 11. Sarah Woodward and Robert Chamberlin, Jr., declared their intentions of marriage 7th month 27th and 9th month 29th, 1714, and at the meeting held 10th month 27th, 1714, the marriage was reported orderly. 5th month 25th, 1715; Jean Woodward and her daughter, Sarah Chamberlin, requested a certificate from Chester to Concord Monthly Meeting, which was granted 6th month 29th, 1715. Robert Chamberlin was the son of Robert and Mary, of Concord, and was born 8th month 17th, 1694. He married a second wife, Cicely——, who was not a member, and for this made an acknowledgement to the meeting 12th month 5th, 1721–2. He died in Concord near the close of the year 1731, leaving five children, but whether any of them were by the first wife is unknown.
- 12. Joseph Woodward, youngest son of Richard and Jane, inherited the homestead in Middletown subject to his mother's interest in one-half thereof during her widowhood. They sold the land, two hundred and fifty acres, to Daniel Cookson, of Middletown, March 10th, 1712, for £150. He was married in the 9th or 10th month, 1712, to Elizabeth Mercer, daughter of Thomas and Mary Mercer, of Thornbury. They settled in Goshen, where Joseph died 9th month 28th, 1715, which is also the date of his will. In 1724 the land, about four hundred and eighty acres, was taxed as "non-resident."

CHILDREN OF ROBERT WOODWARD (No. 2).

- 13. Richard is first mentioned in the court records in 1696, when he and a brother, whose name is unknown, were living with, or working for, James Swaffer. By a deed dated 12th month 20th, 1702-3, John Willis, of Birmingham, conveyed one hundred and fifty acres of land to Richard Woodward, late of Thornbury, yeoman, son of Robert Woodward of the manor of Rocklands, in the county of New Castle, tailor, for £60. This land was in what is now East Bradford township, not then organized, and lies adjoining the southwest part of the borough of West Chester. Another deed, dated 5th month 25th, 1711, conveyed one hundred and fifty acres of adjoining land from Nathaniel King and wife Elizabeth, to Richard Woodward, late of Thornbury, son of Robert Woodward, of Birmingham, tailor. This Richard Woodward was born 12th month 17th, 1673, and was married in the 8th or 9th month, 1705, to Mary Nayle, daughter of Henry Nayle, Esq., of Thornbury. She was born September 24th, 1684. Richard and Mary were married among Friends, and continued to be active members of Birmingham Meeting to the end of their lives. Mary survived her husband a few months and died in 1748.
- 14. Ann Woodworth and George James declared their intentions of marriage at Chester Monthly Meeting 6th month 27th and 7th month 26th, 1698, and were, doubtless, married soon after the last date. Their residence was in Springfield township, Chester (now Delaware) county, where George died in 1720. As executors of his will he appointed his wife, Anne, and brother-in-law, Richard Woodward, of Bradford. The only Richard then of Bradford was the above, son of Robert.

CHILDREN OF ELIZABETH WOODWARD (No. 3) AND THOMAS EAVENSON.

15. Richard, married 10th month 4th, 1712, at Concord Meeting, to Jemima Newlin, daughter of Nathaniel and Mary (Mendenhall) Newlin, of Concord. They resided in Thornbury township, Chester county, where his father conveyed to him one hundred and thirty-three acres of land, September 20th,

- 1711. Richard died in 1739, leaving a wife and three children, Richard. Nathaniel, and Marv.
- Ralph Eavenson appears to have had some intentions of going to Jamaica in 1707, perhaps in the way of trading, but nothing further is known of the project. He and Grace Arnold declared intentions of marriage 2d month 10th and 3d month 8th, 1710, "his father alowing of the same, and her parents giving thear consent under there hands," and the marriage took place before the 12th of the 4th month (June) 1710. It is to be inferred from the records that the parents on both sides were not members. Grace was the daughter of Richard and Sarah (Chamberlin) Arnold, of Thornbury. Ralph settled in Concord, and was an active member of that meeting. He died in 1744, leaving a wife and four children, Jacob, Joseph, Hannah, and Phebe. Grace died about the close of 1746.
- 17. Hannah Eavenson and Thomas Arnold, son of Richard and Sarah, of Thornbury, were married 10th month 30th, 1714, at Concord Meeting. They removed about 1720 to West Bradford, Chester county, where he was concerned in establishing a fulling mill. He was married again 11th month 14th, 1729, at Concord Meeting, to Ann Rattew. What children Hannah left is not ascertained.
- 18. Joseph Eavenson was married 2d month 10th, 1717, to Catharine George, of Radnor Monthly Meeting, daughter of Richard George, late of Llangyrig, in Montgomeryshire, Wales. To him his father conveyed two hundred and ninety-two acres of land in Thornbury, 8th month 12th, 1717, reserving a life interest therein.
- 19. Sarah Eavenson married John Buffington, of West Bradford, who died in 1736, leaving four children, John, Thomas, Mary, and Sarah. The widow was married 9th month 30th, 1737, at Bradford Meeting, to Anthony Arnold, son of Richard and Sarah. He died in East Bradford in 1746, leaving one daughter, Hannah, who became the wife of Colonel Isaac Taylor, of Pennsbury.

THIRD GENERATION.

CHILDREN OF RICHARD WOODWARD (No. 4).

- 20. Esther, married 8th month 22d, 1719, to Christopher Wilson, of Christiana hundred, New Castle county, Delaware, who was born about 1690, in Yorkshire, England, and died 7th month 11th, 1740. Esther was married again, 11th month 16th, 1744, to Thomas Wilson, of Christiana hundred, who was not nearly related to her first husband.
- 21. Sarah, married 10th month 22d, 1726, at Bradford Meeting, to Evan Jones, of Whiteland township. They settled in East Bradford, a little south of Marshalton, about 1740. Evan died 12th month 23d, 1772, and Sarah 8th month 28th, 1769; both buried at Uwchlan Meeting.
- 22. Jane, married 8th month 26th, 1727, at Bradford Meeting, to Joseph Hayes, son of Henry Hayes, of Marlborough. She married again, 9th month 22d, 1750, William Wickersham, of Newlin township.
- 23. William, son of Richard, of West Bradford, and Eliza Marshall, daughter of Abraham and Mary Marshall, of the same place, were married 3d month 24th, 1733, at Bradford Meeting. Abraham Marshall was a public Friend. William's father conveyed to him, June 16th, 1734, two hundred and fifty-three acres of the southeast corner of the one thousand acres. Having lost his first wife, he was married again, 5th month 13th, 1762, at Bradford Meeting, to Hannah Lewis, widow of Jabez Lewis, of Newtown. William died in 1769, and his widow 2d month 28th, 1802, aged about 88 years.
- 24. Elizabeth was married about 1733 to ——, Thornbury, but in 1748 she was the wife of John Young. No further account of her family obtained.
- 25. Hannah, married about 1735, to James Shortledge, of West Bradford, who died in the winter of 1739–40, leaving two children. Hannah was married again 2d month 17th, 1745, at

Centre Meeting, to Joseph Underwood, of Christiana hundred, Delaware.

- 26. Mary was married in the 11th month, 1736, to George Entriken, of East Bradford. He was an active member of Birmingham Meeting, but the births of his children were not recorded.
- 27. James, son of Richard, was married 2d month 21st. 1737, at Bradford Meeting, to Ann Pyle, daughter of Robert (deceased) and Elizabeth (Swaffer) Pyle, of Birmingham.* Robert Pyle was born 7th month 17th, 1684, and married in 1700 Elizabeth, daughter of James and Elizabeth Swaffer; she was born 11th month 12th, 1686. Robert's parents, Robert Pyle and Ann Gainer, were married in Wiltshire, England, oth month (Nov.) 16th, 1681. James settled on a part of his father's one thousand acres, which now includes the greater part of the village of Marshalton. He is said to have built the first stone house in that locality; it was almost entirely remodeled a few years ago, by James Embree, whose family now occupy the premises. James Woodward died 3d month (May) 25th, 1748, leaving six children. His widow and Richard Buffington declared intentions of marriage 7th month 21st and 8th month 10th, 1740, but perhaps owing to some delay and trouble about getting her children's property secured beforehand, they withdrew their intentions, and gave each other clearances. A complaint was, however, brought against them 4th month 21st, 1750, for having accomplished their marriage by a priest, or minister, for which they were disowned. They afterward made an acknowledgement, and were received, with their children. Ann died 10th month 21st, 1764, leaving four children by the last marriage.
- 28. Grace was married 4th month 2d, 1743, at Bradford Meeting, to James Millison, of West Bradford. They lived for some time on a part of her brother James's land.

^{*}A controversy once arose as to the truthfulness of this record; some believing that she was a daughter of Abraham Widdows. Investigation revealed the fact that her mother, in her widowhood, married Abraham Widdows, and had children, one of whom married — Martin.

- 29. John was married at Bradford Meeting 9th month 29th, 1750, to Sarah Barnard, daughter of Richard and Ann (Taylor) Barnard, of Newlin. They settled on part of his father's one thousand acres, where he died about 1769, leaving a wife and five children.
- 30. Richard Woodward of Richard, was disowned by Bradford Monthly Meeting, 3d month 18th, 1756, for marrying his niece. She was Abigail Hayes, the daughter of his half sister Jane and Joseph Hayes. He died in 1760 leaving three children.
- 31. Deborah, mentioned in her father's will, but nothing further is now known of her.

32. Mary, born January 26th, 1699, married Francis Yarnall. 33. Richard, born April 21st, 1700. 34. Aaron, born December 2d, 1701, married Mary Edwards. 35. Anne, born August 18th, 1703, married James Sill. 36. Susanna, born February 18th, 1705. 37. Jane, born December 7th, 1706, married Thomas Thomas. 38. Jesse, born March 19th, 1709, married Ann Regester. 39. Sarah, born March 18th, 1711. 40. Joseph, born February 5th, 1713, died 1736, unmarried. 41. Rachel, born February 5th, 1715. 42. Nehemiah, born November 19th, 1716, married Lydia Regester. 43. John, born January 26th, 1719.

- 44. Mordecai is supposed to have been a son of Thomas. When the latter removed to Chester from Aston, his son probably remained, and we find his name among the taxables in Aston for some years. He died intestate, and letters of administration on his estate were granted to Thomas Woodward September 13th, 1736.
- 45. Jesse, son of Thomas, then of Ridley township, and Jane Kendall, daughter of Thomas and Mary Kendall, of Springfield, were married 9th month 5th, 1730, at Springfield Meeting. She was born 9th month 3d, 1709. They removed

to Wilmington, Delaware, about 1738; while here he lost his wife, and by certificate dated 12th month 4th, 1743–4, he removed within the limits of Bradford Monthly Meeting, and settled in West Caln township. He was married 11th month 8th, 1744, at East Caln Meeting, to Prudence Biggs, a widow of East Caln, a daughter of Edward and Mary (Barrett) Thompson. She was born 8th month 10th, 1714. About 1747 they removed to Goshen, in 1753 to Chester, and thence in a few years to Wilmington, Delaware.

- 46. Rachel Woodward, Jr., was married in 1735 to her first cousin, Joseph Woodward, son of Joseph.
- 47. Abigail, daughter of Thomas Woodward, deceased, was disowned by Chester Monthly Meeting 8th month 29th, 1757, for her marriage out, to one John Gillam.
- 48. Lydia Woodward removed from Goshen Meeting to Wilmington, Delaware, by certificate dated 6th month 21st, 1738, and was married 11th month, 1739, to Minshall Littler, of Wilmington.
- 49. Sarah removed with her sister to Wilmington, and was married there 1st month 11th, 1741-2, to Benjamin Hance, of that place.
- 50. Mary, daughter of Thomas and Rachel, and John Talkinton, son of John, were married 1st month 25th, 1742, at Goshen Meeting.
- 51. Ann, (perhaps daughter of Thomas) was complained of by Goshen Meeting, for "marriage before a priest, to one nigher akin than Friends allow." Acknowledgment accepted 3d month 16th, 1748. She married, about 1746, Joseph Wilson, of Christiana hundred, Delaware.
- 52. Susanna Woodward (supposed a daughter of Thomas) was complained of by Goshen Meeting for marriage by a priest, to ——— Lewis, and disowned 4th month 17th, 1751.
- 53. "Jane Woodward, now Jackson," was disowned by Goshen Meeting 7th month 16th, 1753, for marriage by a priest to one not a member.

- 57. Mary, born 6th month 25th, 1712, is not mentioned in her father's will, and probably left no descendants.
- 58. Hannah, born 5th month 2d, 1715, was married 10th month 11th, 1740, at Providence Meeting, to William Hunter, son of John Hunter, deceased, of Newtown. Children not ascertained.

They were said to be of orderly lives and conversation, and "have settled their affairs here-a-ways, we believe, to satisfaction. Rachel having sometimes appeared in our meetings by way of public testimony, with which we have unity, although she is not yet recommended to the meeting of ministers and elders, so we recommend them as Friends, well respected (together with their children, being young,) to your Christian care, desiring their preservation and growth in every good work," &c. This was signed by twenty-one men and twenty-five women. Their children's names not ascertained.

76. Henry, born 7th month 12th, 1706, was married 3d month 20th, 1730, at Birmingham Meeting, to Mary Townsend, daughter of Joseph and Martha Townsend, of East Bradford. They resided for some time on two hundred acres of East Bradford, immediately southeast of Black Horse Tavern; afterward, nearer West Chester. Henry died 9th month 1st, 1790. Was a cooper by trade.

- 77. John, born 6th month 3d, 1708, and married 3d month 28th, 1729, at Concord Meeting, to Ann Pyle, daughter of William and Olive Pyle, of Thornbury. He inherited from his grandfather, Henry Nayle, considerable land in Thornbury, where he settled. They had seven children; his wife dying, his second marriage was to Hannah Brinton, widow of John, and daughter of Jacob and Ann Vernon, of Thornbury; they had four children, when, his wife dying, he was married a third time, 3d month 16th, 1763, at Birmingham Meeting, to Hannah Martin, widow of John, and daughter of William Dilworth. She died 7th month 17th, 1814, aged about 88 years; they left two children.
- 78. Deborah, born 4th month 27th, 1710, and married 3d month 21st, 1730, at Birmingham Meeting, to William Bennett, living near the forks of Brandywine creek. He was born December 23d, 1705, and was a son of Edward and Sarah Bennett, of Thornbury. They had seven children.
- 79. Richard, son of Richard and Mary Woodward, was born 10th month 21st, 1712, and married about 1737 to Hannah, daughter of Ralph and Grace Eavenson, of Concord. Another letter, dated September 24th, 1765, to James Marshall, was sent by Abraham Woodward, who had reached Bradford before the 18th of the next month. He had been disowned by Bradford Meeting before he went south, and now came with a recommendation from his neighbors respecting his good conduct, and was received into membership again. He received a certificate of removal to New Garden Meeting, in North Carolina, dated 10th month 18th, 1765. William Millikan, writing May 18th, 1768, says: "Abraham Woodward's are all well." This is the last we heard of him.

- 113. William, born 6th month (August) 8th, 1743. In the earlier part of his life, after reaching manhood, he was a country storekeeper; having succeeded in business, he afterward purchased a farm in West Bradford township, within a mile of Marshalton. There he spent the remainder of his life. His first wife was Lydia Lewis, who lived but a few years, leaving no children. He afterward married Elizabeth Stalker about the year 1790, by whom he had one son. He died in October, 1825, of a fever which prevailed in that section at that period. His wife died about the same period, of the same disease.
- 114. John, born 4th month (June) 30th, 1749, married Lydia Martin, daughter of Joseph Martin, of Bradford. They settled on the old homestead, being the two hundred and fifty-three acres at the southeast corner of the original one thousand acres.

It is now owned by his grandson, George Martin, of Marshalton. He died May 31st, 1812. His will, dated March 23d, 1812, reads as follows:

I, Joseph Woodward, of West Bradford Township, Chester County, and State of Pennsylvania, being weak in Body, but of a sound and disposing mind and memory, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following: In the first place, I Will and direct that all my Just Debts, and funeral Expences be paid by my Executors herein after named, as soon as may be, after my decease. I give and devise to my beloved Wife Rebekah, and to my Daughter Hannah, all that part of my Plantation whereon I now dwell, which lies east of a line to be run from a point in the Strasburg road, about eleven perch west of my Lane thence a course of about South five degrees East, passing between two Cherry trees standing down a few perches in the field, and thence on to a large cedar tree down in the side of a Bank near the fence, next to George Carter's line, and thence to the line of the said George Carter, to be held by them (with the messuage and appurtenances thereunto belonging) and the survivor of them during their natural lives, except as to my said Daughter Hannah, who, if she should Marry, my Will in that case is that she loose her right to the said Tract of Land, and instead thereof, she shall be paid the sum of forty Dollars annually, during the remainder of her life by those who in consequence thereof, shall become owners of the same. I also give, and bequeath to my wife Rebekah, such part of the Household and Kitchen Furniture as she may choose, the above to be considered as instead of Dower out of my Estate. I Give and devise to my four sons, James, Joseph, Abner, and Jacob, all the above described part of my plantation to be equally divided amongst them, to be held by them or their heirs or assigns forever, subject nevertheless to the above mentioned grant and devise, in favour of my wife Rebekah, and Daughter Hannah. I Give and devise to my two sons James and Joseph, all the remainder of my Plantation lying West of the above described line,

to be held by them, their heirs, or assigns, forever, to be equally divided between them they paying therefor the sum of Nine hundred Dollars for the purpose of the payment of the under mentioned Legacies, or more if wanted to make up my Daughters Legacies. I give and bequeath to my son Abner, the sum of Two hundred Dollars over and above what I have already given him, any Bonds, Notes, or accompts which I may have against him at the time of my decease to be considered as paid. I give and bequeath to my son Jacob, the sum of Three Hundred Dollars over and above what I have already given him, any Bonds, notes, or accompts. which I may have against him at the time of my decease, to be considered as paid. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Ann the sum of Three hundred Dollars over and above what I have already given her. and bequeath to my Daughter Lydia the sum of Three Hundred Dollars over and above what I have already given her. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Jane, the sum of Three hundred Dollars over and above what I have already given her. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Rebekah, the sum of four hundred Dollars. The residue of my Estate, if any, after the payment of the above Legacies, my Will is that it be equally divided between my Wife Rebekah, my Daughter Hannah, and my four sons James, Joseph, Abner, and Jacob. I will and direct that my present family who now reside in the House with me, shall have sufficient of Grain and meat allowed them for one year after my decease, if they choose to reside there together. I do hereby constitute and appoint my two sons James and Joseph, as Executors to this my last Will and Testament in Confirmation whereof I do hereby set my hand and Seal This 23d day of March 1812.

- 120. Jane, born 5th month 23d, 1739. Her birth is given in records of Uwchlan Monthly Meeting as 8th month 3d, 1739, which is very probably an error. She married William Butler, and was the grandmother of Judge William Butler, of West Chester, Pennsylvania. She died 7th month 1st, 1814.
- Pyle. His farm was a part of the original one thousand acres, and situated between the Strausburg and Valley roads. It con-

tained about eighty acres. He made no will; the homestead was possessed by his son Eli; and now a portion, at least, owned by his grandson, Maris Woodward. His wife was born in 1738, and died July, 1830.

Sheward. His farm lay west of the Downingtown road, and between the Strausburg and Valley roads, except ten acres, which was situated south of the Strausburg road, the tract containing in all about fifty acres, and was a part of the one thousand. Robert, for a time, followed the trade of blacksmithing. He died February 15th, 1791.

123. James, born 2d month 6th, 1746, married Jane Bullock. She was born October 8th, 1748. James was a wheelwright, or, as then called, a coach-maker, by trade, also followed farming; his tract, containing eighty-six acres, lay in the angle formed by the Downingtown and Strausburg roads, running east along Strausburg road seventy-five perches, and along Downingtown road north to the Valley road. He sometimes spoke in way of public testimony among the society of Friends. He died in the year 1836, and was buried at the Friends' burying ground in Marshalton. His wife died January 20th, 1835, being in her 87th year. His will, dated August 4th, 1830, reads as follows:

Be it remembered that I, James Woodward, of the township of West Bradford, in the County of Chester in the State of Pennsylvania, do think proper at this time, to make my last Will and Testament in manner and following to wit:

First, I commend my soul to God who gave it, and my body to the earth to be buried in a decent and Christian-like manner. And as to my Worldly Estate, with which it hath pleased God to bless me in this live, I order and direct it to be disposed of as follows:

First, All my Just debts and Funeral expenses I order and direct my executors to pay as soon as it can be conveniently done after my decease.

Item, I Give and bequeath to my beloved wife Jane Woodward all my household and kitchen Furniture, and all the Gold in the house at the time of my decease. I also give and devise to her during her natural life my plantation, she not use any more of the timber than will be necessary during said time.

Item, the rest of my personal Estate, the bonds and other evidences of debt, including all money that I may die possessed of, except the Gold

above mentioned I order my Executors to collect, and pay over, in one year after my decease, to my six daughters, namely, Margery, Ann, Jane, Elizabeth, Albina and Mary to be equally divided among them, share and share alike.

Item, Give and bequeath to my son James Woodward all the south part of my plantation, beginning at a stone standing in a small dam the corner of Eli Woodward's land, from thence straight westerly line three perches from and south of an English cherry tree being the largest standing near the upper end of the young orchard, thence on a straight line running in the same direction to the road leading to the valley all which I Give to him his heirs and assigns forever, he paying thereout to his brother Isaac Woodward, his heirs & assigns, the sum of eight hundred dollars, in one year after my decease and the decease my wife, my meaning is that it is not to be paid till one year after the decease of the longest liver, whether myself or my wife.

Item, I Give and bequeath to my son Moses Woodward, all the remainder and reversions of my land, to him his heirs and assigns forever, provided he pay to my executors out of the same, in one year after the decease of my wife and myself as aforesaid, the sum of twenty dollars a year for ten years thereafter, for the use of my son Aaron Woodward, my executors to pay the same over to my son Aaron, as he may stand in need of the same, provided the said Aaron becomes a sober man. Otherwise the said Moses is to have nothing to pay to my executors for the said Aaron, as my will is that he is not to have any of my estate unless he becomes a sober man. I gave a bond some years ago to James Woodward, son of Joseph Woodward deceased for the use of the said Aaron which bond I now empower my executors to get out of his hands, and forbid them to pay any part of it, as it was given without any consideration, and the above bequest is all that I intend to give to the said Aaron.

Item I Give and bequeath to my grandson James Woodward son of my son James Woodward all my wearing apparel.

Item, I Give and bequeath to my grandson James Woodward son of my son Isaac my silver watch, the above bequests to my children, to go to their heirs in case any of them should die before me and to be in full and bar of all charges to be brought against my estate by any of them.

Lastly, I nominate constitute and appoint my son Isaac Woodward, my son-in-law George Hoopes, and my son-in-law John Woodward, to be the Executors of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all former Wills be me heretofore made, declaring this, and this only to be my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourth day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty.

The words "being the largest" first interlined in the first page.

350. Joseph, born November 12th, 1799. He was partially deaf from his birth, and distressingly so in his later days. He chose farming for his occupation, and married, January 5th, 1826, Mary, daughter of Frederick and Hannah Klair, of Mill creek hundred, Delaware. Mary was born in Montgomery county, Pennsylvania, on the 30th day of March, 1808, and came to Delaware with her parents in the year 1810. After their marriage they commenced farming the property now owned by Jacob Reubencame, near Milltown, Mill Creek hundred, Delaware; this was in March, 1826, and there they lived eight years, and there their first four children were born. The desire for change, or rather the spirit for making greater efforts to better one's worldly condition was as prevalent then as at the present day; so on the 22d day of February, 1834, he bought of Charles Holmes a tract of one hundred and fifty acres, two roods, and nineteen perches of land in Christiana hundred, Delaware, lying south of a public road leading from the Lancaster to the Newport or Gap turnpike, and about three miles due west from the city of Wilmington. For this tract of land he paid \$6,200. A large amount of the same was woodland, and much of the remainder was covered with bushes, and presented a wild, unprepossessing appearance. Here he labored the remainder of his days, that is, as long as his strength permitted, which was perhaps six or seven years previous to his death. Although afflicted with partial deafness from infancy, both he and his wife enjoyed almost uninterrupted good health until the time before stated. It devolved upon them to rear up a large family of children, thirteen in all, and though they were exposed to, and

had to pass through, the many diseases of infancy and childhood, they are all living at this date, the youngest being in her twenty-eighth year. Numerous and very marked have been the changes made there since he became possessor of what is now called the "Old Homestead;" the land has been cleared and enriched, surrounded and divided with fences; a fine barn was erected in the year 1847, and still later, during the year 1855, the house was remodeled. During the year 1873 a public road was laid out through the farm, south of the buildings, thereby shortening the traveling distance to Wilmington one mile, and making the eastern border of the farm within one mile and a half of the western border of the city limits. In the year 1872 the rails of the Wilmington and Western railroad were laid along the southern border of the farm. His illness was protracted, lasting through a period of eight years. Suffering, as he did, from a diseased condition of both heart and kidneys, it was at times distressing, though not particularly painful; paralysis finally set in, and during the morning of the 5th day of February, 1875, his spirit returned to God who gave it. His remains were interred at Hockessin burying ground. His wife, though now in her seventy-first year, is enjoying good health, and resides at No. 224 West Ninth street, Wilmington, Delaware

- 351. John, born June 1st, 1801, unmarried. He followed the carpenter trade for an occupation during many years. In the year 1853 he came to spend the remainder of his days with his brother Joseph. He was a noted hunter and fisherman. He was at times severely afflicted with rheumatism in his latter years, and died December 21st, 1863. Buried at Hockessin.





APPENDIX.

The following information was kindly furnished us by some bearing the name Woodward, but not claiming themselves as descendants of those of Chester county, Pennsylvania.

THE WOODWARDS OF MASSACHU-SETTS.

Richard Woodward embarked at Ipswich, England, April 10th, 1634, in the ship "Elizabeth," William Andrews master. His age was forty-five years; he was accompanied by his wife Rose, aged fifty, and his sons, George and John, aged thirteen years. His name is on the earliest list of the proprietors of Watertown, where he settled; it is on the Charles river, north of Boston. He took the Freemans oath September 16th, 1635. His wife Rose died October 6th, 1662, aged eighty years, and he soon after married Ann Gates, of Cambridge. Their settlement dated April 18th, 1663. He died February 16th, 1665, aged seventy-six. His widow Ann died 1683. His sons, George and John, administered.

George was admitted freeman in Watertown May, 1646. By his first wife, Mary, he had eight children. He married, second time, Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas Hammond, Sr., of Cambridge village. Her father's will, proven November, 1675, gave her 100 acres of land near Muddy river, probably the same land upon which her son George afterward settled. He died May 31st, 1676. Inventory, £143, 10s. His widow Elizabeth and son Amos administered. His widow Elizabeth married Samuel Truesdale.

John Woodward, weaver, son of George and Elizabeth, was born March 28th, 1649; married Rebecca, daughter of Richard Robbins, of Cambridge, who conveyed to them thirty

acres of land in Cambridge village, near the upper falls; bounded south by Charles river, north by a way leading to the lower falls, and east by land of 'Squire Pelham. This deed was dated 1681, and witnessed by Thomas Greenwood and John Hall. Upon this land he built a dwelling house, which is still standing and occupied by his descendants of the fifth and sixth generations. He bought twenty acres of Theodore Atkins, of Boston, in 1605, adjoining his other land northwest, and east by Governor Hayne's farm, then leased by Captain Prentice. He bought another tract of Dr. Thomas Oakes in 1600, bounded south by the river, and west by Edward Pelham's land. Also of Jonathan Hydes, Sr., thirty-eight acres, bounded east by the Dedham road, and west and north by his own land. He also purchased with John Staples forty-seven acres, which they divided in 1705, he reserving seventeen acres. He was highway surveyor in 1686, constable in 1694, selectman in 1701 and 1712. He had by his wife Rebecca, in Cambridge, the following children:

John, born 7th month, 7th, 1674, died 7th month 22d, 1674. John, born July 18th, 1675. Susanna, born and died 7th month 22d, 1676. Richard, born 7th month, 26th, 1677. Rebecca, born 8th month 29th, 1679, died March, 1682. Daniel, born September 24th, 1681. Rebecca, born 2d month 2d, 1683. Mary, born October 6th, 1684, died 1689. Jonathan, born September 28th, 1685. Joseph, born November 26th, 1688. Ebenezer, born March 12th, 1691. Abigail, born May 25th, 1695. His wife Rebecca died 1696. Abigail married William Greenwood in 1715, and settled in Sherburn. Rebecca married Stephen Hunting, of Dedham. John, Sr., married again; his second wife died September 22d, 1723. He died November 3d, 1732, aged eighty-three years. His will, dated 1728, proved 1732, mentions sons John, Richard, Ebenezer, Daniel, and Jonathan, and daughters Rebecca and Abigail; those not mentioned probably died before the will was made. Inventory, £133, 9s, 7d. Ebenezer was executor.

Daniel Woodward, Sr., son of John, Sr., married Elizabeth Greely January 27th, 1704. Their children were Esther, born November 30th, 1704. Elizabeth, born November 1st, 1706.

Mary, born October 7th, 1708. Jonas, born February 8th, 1712. Daniel, born September 14th, 1714. Daniel, Sr., was selectman for three years, and died in 1749, aged sixty-eight. His wife died in 1750. Of their children Elizabeth married Jonathan Fuller in 1725; Esther married Captain Moses Craft in 1729; Jonas married Mary Cook, of Needham, in 1734; and Mary married James Richards in 1735.

Daniel Woodward, Jr., married Mary Stone in 1739. Their children, Lois, born October 6th, 1740. Samuel, born September 25th, 1742. Elisha, born July 13th, 1744. Mary, born October 21st, 1746, died 1749. Philemon, born December 17th, 1749. Mary, born December 6th, 1755. Daniel, born March 23d, 1760. Esther, born May 21st, 1762. Lois married Samuel Jackson in 1763. Philemon married Mercy Whitney in 1772. Daniel, Jr., died 1774, aged sixty, and his wife died in 1776, aged fifty-seven.

Samuel Woodward, son of Daniel, Jr., married Deborah, daughter of Michael Jackson, Sr., in 1763. Their children were Asa, born May 26th, 1764. Caty, born December 25th, 1765, died 1766. Samuel, born August 8th, 1767. Moses, born December 18th, 1768, died in infancy. Moses, born October 30th, 1770. Matthas, born June 20th, 1772. Joseph and Benjamin, born January 20th, 1774. Daniel, born February 24th, 1776. Caty, born August 25th, 1778. Mary, born March 10th, 1780. Michael, born February 20th, 1782. Samuel's wife, Deborah, died in 1785. His second wife was a sister to the first, and named Priscilla. Soon after his second marriage he removed from Newtown, Massachusetts, to Dresden, Maine, where he had two sons, Amos and Levi, and two daughters, Deborah and Priscilla. These, as well as the children who came with him from Newtown, had generally large families, except Deborah, who never married. Samuel was in the battle of Concord at Dorchester Heights, and loaned the town £120 to pay the soldiers in 1777.

The above information was furnished us by Dr. A. M. Woodward, No. 52 West Twenty-ninth street, New York city, who is a descendant of the same branch. The descendants of Richard of 1634 are very numerous. Amos, the fourth in the

line of descent, removed to Canterbury, Connecticut, and his son Enos emigrated to the county of Northampton (now Pike), Pennsylvania, in the summer of 1774, and was the founder of the Wyoming branch. He was the grandfather of George W. Woodward, Chief Justice of Pennsylvania, who recently died in Italy, and great-grandfather of Warren J. Woodward, of Reading, Pennsylvania. George A. Woodward, Lieutenant-Colonel Second Regiment Infantry, Pennsylvania Reserves, during the war for the Union, and now Colonel Twenty-third Regiment Infantry, United States Army, is a son of the late Chief Justice. Dr. A. B. Woodward, of Tunkhannock, Pennsylvania, is a cousin of the Chief Justice, his father, Artemus, having located in Susquehanna county, Pennsylvania, in 1818; he was a farmer and mason, and died in the year 1858. Artemus's father's name was Israel, and he was a teamster-boy in the Revolutionary war. A. W. Woodward, M. D., Professor of Analytical and Comparative Materia Medica in the Chicago Homœopathic College, Chicago, Illinois, believes himself to be a descendant of Captain John Woodward, who married a Miss Wheelock, and lived in Connecticut about 1750; from that time till now the family homestead has been in Hanover, New Hampshire. Dr. G. E. and the Hon. Cyrus H. Woodward, of Morrisville, Vermont, are, no doubt, descendants of Richard of 1634. The latter is collecting a genealogical record of his ancestors. Hon. William Woodward, founder of Woodward High School of Cincinnati, Ohio, of whom the city and State are justly proud, was a descendant of the Woodwards of Connecticut.

THE WOODWARDS OF NEW JERSEY.

Anthony Woodward, the founder of this branch, was born in Derbyshire, near Ashford-in-the-water, England, in 1657. On the 22d of 12th month, 1682, his sister Alice was married at Ashford Friends' Meeting to Edward Booth, Anthony, with others, signing the certificate. Soon after this he emigrated to America and settled for a time on Long Island, New York. Anterior to 1686 he arrived at Crosswicks, New Jersey, bringing with him a certificate of removal to the Chesterfield Monthly Meeting. On the 14th of the 12th month, 1686, he

married Hannah, daughter of Thomas Foulkes. In 1688, Anthony's father-in-law conveyed to him as a gift two hundred acres of land at or near the village, and it is probable he first settled there, though about that time he bought a tract of three hundred acres between the old York road and Doctor's creek. and a larger tract, also on the north side of the Crosswicks. In 1608, he purchased of William Dockwra the great Dockwra tract, extending from a point on Crosswicks creek at Fowler's bridge, near Ellisdale, along the old province, Keiths' or county line, to where said line intersects Crosswicks creek, about half way between New Egypt and Cookstown, a distance of seven miles, being bounded on the west by the Province line, and on all other sides by Crosswicks creek, for the sum of £880 current silver money. This tract now contains some of the finest farms in the State. He died in 1729, aged seventy-two years. His issue were six sons, Thomas, Samuel, William, John, Anthony, and Joseph, and three daughters, Elizabeth, Clemence, and Mary. They all survived him except Mary, who was born in 1688 and died in infancy. For further information of this branch we would refer the reader to one of Anthony's descendants, Major E. Morrison Woodward, Major Second Regiment Pennsylvania Reserves during the late war, who now lives at Ellisdale, Monmouth county, New Jersey, within musket shot of the old homestead of 1686. He published in the Bordentown Register of last year a very interesting account of the family, and is now, we believe, engaged in securing data for a more extended record, to be published in book form

THE WOODWARDS OF MARYLAND.

The settlement of the family of this name dates back to a very early period, perhaps among the earliest of the State. They were once numerous in St. Mary's county, which was settled in 1634, the year of the arrival of Richard in Massachusetts. Hon. William Woodward, Jr., of New York city, son of Henry Williams Woodward, who removed from Maryland to Georgia, informs us that his grandfather, Captain Henry Woodward, was the son of William Woodward, whose homestead

was "Bacon Ridge," near by the site of old Saint Ann's Chapel, said to have been the first Episcopal Church in America. Hon. William Woodward, of Baltimore city, now, and for many years past, prominently identified with the domestic dry goods trade, was born in Anne Arundel county, Maryland, September 8th, 1801. He has been a long and earnest worker in the Sunday-school cause. His father, Henry Woodward, died in 1822; his grandfather, William, died in 1806 or 1807, and his great-grandfather, believed also to have been named William, came to America in the early part of the eighteenth century, and settled near Annapolis, the capital of the State of Maryland. He died during or soon after the Revolutionary war. He was a member of the Church of England, as have also been the most of his descendants. William R. Woodward, No. 328, 41/2 street northwest, Washington, D. C., a prominent lawyer, is one of his descendants.

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
