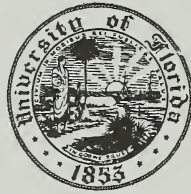

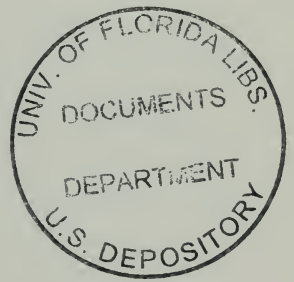

MAJOR GENERAL LAVERN E. WEBER

Chief, National Guard Bureau

General Weber began his military career as a private in the United States Marine Corps Reserve on 9 November 1942. On 1 February 1945, he entered the Officer Candidate School at Quantico, Virginia, graduating as a second lieutenant on 21 November 1945. He was assigned to the Philadelphia Navy Yard, Marine Guard Detachment, as a Weapons Instructor. He was released from active duty and transferred to the Marine Corps Reserve on 8 May 1946.

On 29 July 1948, General Weber accepted an appointment as second lieutenant in the Oklahoma Army National Guard with assignment as Commander, Headquarters Company, 180th Infantry, 45th Infantry Division. He was promoted to first lieutenant on 1 November 1948 and to captain on 1 November 1949. On 1 September 1950, during the Korean Conflict, he was called to active duty with his unit at Camp Polk, Louisiana. His unit was later transferred to the Far East Command. He was promoted to major on 1 May 1952 while assigned as S-3, 2d Battalion, 180th Infantry in combat. General Weber was released from active duty on 12 June 1952 and returned to the Oklahoma National Guard with assignment as a captain in Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Oklahoma National Guard. He was assigned as S-3, 179th Infantry, on 15 September 1952 and promoted to major on 1 November 1952.

General Weber later held assignments as Assistant G-2, G-2 and G-1, of the 45th Infantry Division. He received his promotion to lieutenant colonel on 15 May 1959. On 18 November 1964, he was made Chief of Staff, 45th Infantry Division and was promoted and federally recognized as colonel. General Weber was appointed as the Adjutant General of Oklahoma on 8 March 1965 and promoted to the State grade of major general. He was federally recognized as brigadier general on 21 December 1966 and as a major general on 28 December 1967. On 11 October 1971, General Weber was appointed Director, Army National Guard in the National Guard Bureau. He was appointed as Chief of the National Guard Bureau effective 1 July 1974.

On 28 February 1973, General Mickle was federally recognized as brigadier general. General Mickle became Commander, 167th Support Command on 1 March 1976 when the 167th Support Brigade was redesignated the 167th Support Command. He was promoted to major general on 30 July 1976.

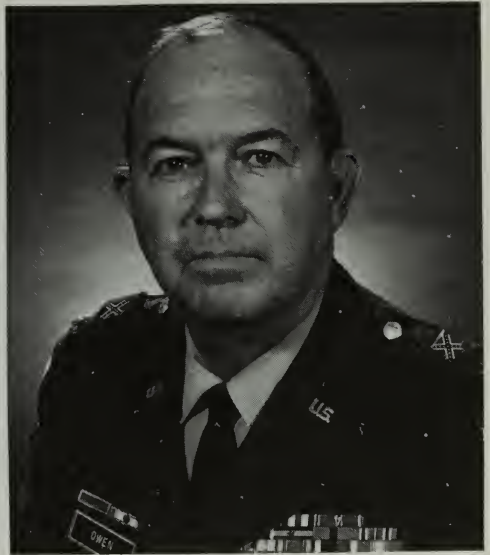

BRIGADIER GENERAL NEIL E. ALLGOOD

Assistant Division Commander, 40th Infantry Division (Mechanized)

California Army National Guard

General Allgood's military career began on 4 March 1943 when he was inducted as a private in the Army of the United States. His World War II service covered assignments in the Tank Destroyers, Infantry, Field Artillery and Signal Corps. He reenlisted in February 1946 and was discharged in the grade of master sergeant 11 February 1947.

He enlisted in the California Army National Guard in April 1947 and was assigned as the sergeant major of the then newly activated 720th AAA Gun Battalion (90mm). In June of 1947 he activated Battery A of the 720th as the unit first sergeant. General Allgood was a prime member of the task force organized to effect the conversion, following which he was reassigned to the 234th Anti-aircraft Artillery Group as Intelligence, S-2 with the full time assignment as Defense Supervisor for

the on-site program. In July 1960 he was reassigned to the 4th Battalion, 251st Artillery (NIKE-AJAX) (former 720th Battalion) as Battalion Commander and full-time Battalion Supervisor—a command he held until February 1971. The battalion during his command tenure established new missile firing and operational records for the entire Army Air Defense Command (ARADCOM)—records which stood at the time of inactivation of CONUS Air Defense in 1974.

In February 1971 General Allgood was selected as the ARNG Liaison Officer to Headquarters ARADCOM and he returned to active duty in March 1971 for a four year statutory tour. He held the position of Chief, Office of Reserve Forces, Headquarters ARADCOM from his entry on active duty until inactivation of the command and his subsequent release on 9 January 1975.

In January 1975 he participated in a DOD project group working with the Armed Forces, Federal Republic of Germany.

He returned to the California National Guard control in February 1975 and was successively assigned to positions of Chief, Office of Emergency Plans and Operations and Chief, Office of Administration. In September 1975 he was reassigned to the 40th Infantry Division (Mechanized) as Chief of Staff and on 1 August 1976 was assigned to the position of Assistant Division Commander. He was federally recognized as brigadier general on 4 February 1977.

Willard A. Shank was born in Lodi, California, on 9 November 1921. His educational background includes studies at San Jose State College, the University of California at Berkeley and its Boalt School of Law and the US Army's Judge Advocate General School.

Entering the Army Air Corps on 21 December 1941, he served initially at McClellan Field, Sacramento, now McClellan Air Force Base, and in 1942 was graduated from Officer Candidate School. Brigadier General James Q. Simmons, III, Commander, 175th Medical Brigade, California Army National Guard, was born in Philadelphia, PA on 16 April 1925. In addition to his duties as Commander of the Brigade, General Simmons serves as surgeon general for the State of California and is the Sixth United States Army Area National Guard Medical Coordinator.

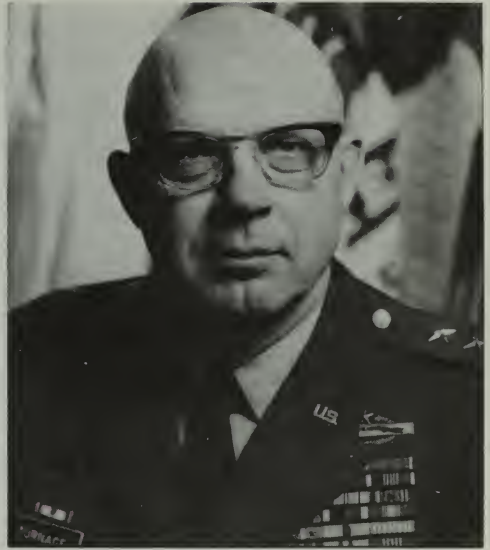

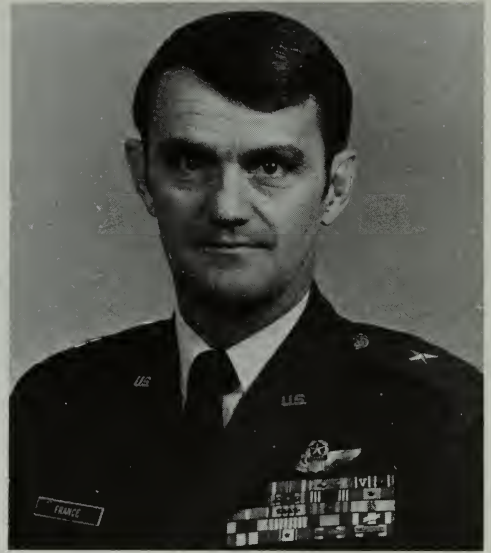

General Kennedy began his military career as a private in the United States Army on 28 July 1944. He served as an artilleryman in the Asiatic-Pacific theater and was released from active duty on 10 December 1946.

In November 1949 General Kennedy enlisted in the United States Air Force. He entered pilot training and received his wings through the Aviation Cadet training program in December 1950, at which time he was commissioned a second lieutenant.

After pilot training, General Kennedy was assigned to Perrin AFB, Texas as an instructor pilot and later was assigned to Webb AFB, Texas performing the same duty. 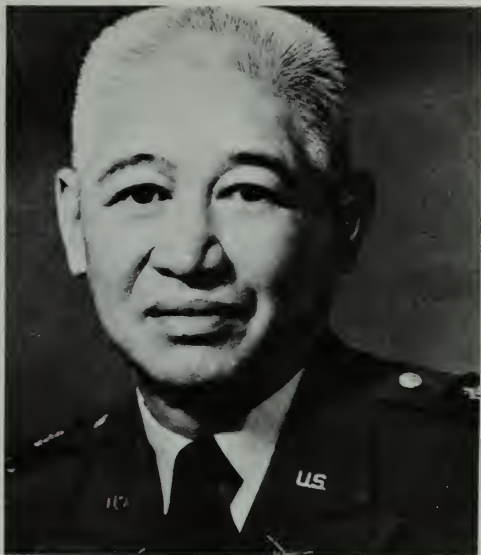

MAJOR GENERAL ALFRED F. AHNER

The Adjutant General

Indiana National Guard

General Alfred F. Ahner enlisted 22 August 1942 in what was then the Enlisted Reserve Corps and was ordered to active duty as a private on 27 March 1943. He completed basic training at Camp Wallace, Texas. After basic training, he was assigned to the 138th AAA Gun Battalion and embarked to England. He engaged in combat in France, Belgium, Germany and Austria. He attended Officer Candidate School in 1945 where he received his commission, and was assigned to Company A, 222d Regiment, 42d Infantry Division as a platoon leader. General Ahner was released from active duty as 1st lieutenant on 4 June 1946 and assigned to the Officers Reserve Corps. In January 1948 he was appointed a 1st lieutenant, Infantry in the Indiana Army National Guard with assignment to Co K, 293d Infantry. He was transferred to S-3, 1st Battalion 293d Infantry in December 1948, and was promoted to captain in March 1950. He was then transferred to S-3, 2d Battalion, 151st Infantry in October 1951. In October 1953 General Ahner was transferred to Assistant G-3, HHC, 38th Infantry Division and promoted to major in April 1954.

On 14 January 1957 he was appointed Assistant Adjutant General of the State of Indiana and promoted to lieutenant colonel in April 1958. In June 1960 General Ahner was transferred to G-4, HHC, 38th Infantry Division. In August 1960 he was appointed to the Adjutant General and received the rank of brigadier general on 8 November 1960. In January 1961 he was reassigned as Executive Officer to the Adjutant General in the grade of lieutenant colonel. He was assigned as G-3, HHC, 38th Infantry Division in February 1961, and as Chief of Staff, HHD, Indiana Army National Guard on 1 February 1965 and promoted to colonel the same date.

On 1 April 1969, General Ahner was assigned as Military Support to Civil Authorities Officer, HHD, Indiana Army National Guard. He held this assignment until his appointment as Adjutant General on 1 August 1972. General Ahner received federal recognition as brigadier general on 28 February 1973. General Bucher enlisted in the Army Air Corps as a private on 7 February 1941. He completed two maintenance schools and entered the aviation cadet program. BRIGADIER GENERAL JOHN JOSEPH DILLON

Commander, Separate Commands

Indiana Army National Guard

General Dillon began his military career by enlisting in the Enlisted Reserve Corps, Army Air Corps, on 17 July 1944. He served on active duty from 29 January 1945 to 11 August 1946. He was commissioned a second lieutenant, Field Artillery, on 28 January 1949 through ROTC at Xavier University as a distinguished military graduate and commander of the Corps. General Dillon was tendered a commission as second lieutenant, regular Army, upon completion of his academic degree. He served in the Officer's Reserve Corps and USAR until 14 January 1954. General Dillon was promoted to first lieutenant, Judge Advocate General's Corps, Indiana Army National Guard in 1954. He was promoted to captain 1 June 1956 and to major on 28 June 1960. He was transferred 18 July 1965 to Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Indiana Army National Guard, with duty as State Staff Judge Advocate.

He was promoted to lieutenant colonel 10 October 1966 and to colonel 10 December 1972. While Attorney General of Indiana, General Dillon prepared a resume of the legal responsibilities, rights and duties of the Indiana National Guard and all laws—state and federal—relating thereto. This opinion has been widely cited as a model for other states to follow. The resulting legislation protects the Indiana National Guardsmen while on duty within the State of Indiana and has also become a model for use in other states. General Dillon has served as instructor for several years for the Indiana Military Academy, State OCS, and has served as an instructor at the JAGC School Army and Air National Guard Seminars. He was assigned to command of Separate Command, Indiana Army National Guard on 25 August 1975. He was promoted and

federally recognized as brigadier general on 6 February 1976 and reassigned as Commander of Emergency Operation Center.

BRIGADIER GENERAL PHILLIPS NASON GORDON

Assistant Division Commander, 38th Infantry Division

Indiana Army National Guard

General Gordon's military association was initiated upon his enlistment in the Infantry in September 1943. Trained in Battalion Intelligence, he was in combat with the 339th Infantry, 85th Division in Italy. Wounded by German small arms, he continued in close combat, receiving a promotion from private first class to staff sergeant. He was honorably discharged from active duty in December 1945.

In August 1946, he joined the United States Army Reserve and was assigned to a Control Group until January 1951 when he received a direct appointment as a second lieutenant, Artillery.

In June 1951, General Gordon was called to active duty and assigned to the 5th Armored Division, Fort Chaffee, Arkansas. He was receiving on-the-job training for Artillery (105 mm) until October 1951 when the Military Personnel Division, Department of the Army directed his reclassification to Military Psychologist with concurrent reassignment to the Toledo, Ohio Armed Forces Examining and Entrance Station.

He served as psychologist at that location and subsequently at the Oklahoma City AFEES until he was sent to Korea in April 1956. Enroute he attended and graduated from the Adjutant General Associate Company Officer's Course, at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indiana.

Assigned to the Korean Military Assistance Group at Tague he was selected as Advisor, Korean Army Language School. He planned and implemented

an English language self-paced course for Korean Military interpreters.

Promoted to captain in December 1957, he assumed duties as the Senior Advisor to the Korean Army Adjutant General School vice a colonel (US Army) who was reassigned. He provided advisory service for administrative and personnel training until September 1957.

Returning to the Continental United States, General Gordon was assigned to the faculty of the U.S. Army Adjutant General School, Fort Benjamin Harrison. He was invited to regular Army status in the grade of captain in November 1957. As a faculty member, he was an instructor in Human Relations and Instructor Training. In September 1958, he attended the Adjutant General Officers Advanced Course and following graduation was reassigned a Chief, Personnel Subjects Division of the Adjutant General School.

Tendering his resignation from regular Army in October 1960, he applied for and received a commission in the Army National Guard, Indiana. He was assigned as the 38th Infantry Division's Assistant Adjutant General, and simultaneously was a faculty member of the Indiana Military Academy (OCS).

In January 1961, he was reassigned to duty as Chief of Staff Assistant, 38th Infantry Division, with subsequent promotion to major in November 1961. Following several duty assignments within the Division, he was appointed Division G-1 in May 1966. He served in this capacity during the period of the Selected Reserve Force (SRF).

In August 1968, General Gordon was reassigned as Assistant G-3, Military Department of Indiana. In March 1969, he was appointed Assistant Commandant, Indiana Military Academy.

Selected for promotion to colonel, he was assigned as Operations Training Officer, and then Inspector General for September 1972 until August 1974.

In August 1974, General Gordon was assigned as Commandant, Indiana Military Academy (OCS, NCO and Leadership Schools). He held this command until 21 November 1976.

On 22 November 1976, General Gordon was assigned as Assistant Division Commander, 38th Infantry Division. He was federally recognized as brigadier general on 30 June 1977.

BRIGADIER GENERAL JUNIOR H. BURKHEAD

The Adjutant General

General Burkhead enlisted in the Iowa Army National Guard 23 June 1948 after graduation from high school. He enlisted in Company 1, 3d Battalion, 133d Infantry, and progressed through the ranks to master sergeant. On 9 April 1951 he received his appointment as a warrant officer and served as Unit Administrator until 1 July 1954. On 2 July 1954 he reverted to enlisted status as master sergeant due to TOE displacement. On 1 June 1956, General Burkhead was appointed second lieutenant Infantry and served as Assistant Training Officer assigned to HQ 2d Battle Group, 133d Infantry at Sioux City, Iowa. In April 1968 the 2d Battalion (Mechanized) 133d Infantry was notified that it was being ordered to federal active duty. General Burkhead was appointed as Battalion Commander and commanded the battalion from its initial mobilization on 13 May 1968 through the battalion accelerated army training program and until the unit was ready for deployment.

On 21 March 1969 General Burkhead was deployed to Vietnam and assigned as a District Senior Advisor with the US Army Military Assistance Command. His duties were to advise and assist in support of combat operations of the seven Vietnamese regional rifle companies and forty four popular force platoons assigned in his district. Particularly noteworthy was General Burkhead's contribution to the pacification effort involving the 112,000 people within the district. He closely coordinated, advised and assisted numerous civil affairs, construction projects and actively promoted elections, appointments and training of local government officials.

General Burkhead returned from Vietnam on 12 December 1969, was promoted to lieutenant colonel on 13 December 1969, and again assumed command of the demobilized 2d Battalion (M) 133d Infantry and commanded the unit through April 1971.

In May 1971 General Burkhead was appointed as the Executive Officer of the 34th Brigade, 47th Infantry Division at Boone, Iowa. On 7 July 1973 he was appointed State Maintenance Officer for the Iowa ARNG, and was promoted to the rank of colonel on 16 August 1974. General Burkhead was appointed The Adjutant General of Kentucky on 4 January 1978.

Colonel Gardner enlisted in the Army of the United States on 22 October 1942 and was called to active duty on 31 January 1943. Colonel Palmer enlisted in the Army Air Corps as an Aviation Cadet on 1 June 1942. He was commissioned a second lieutenant and rated Pilot on 1 October 1943. General Gast began his military career in September, 1946, when he entered the United States Army and served as an Artist. He attained the rank of staff sergeant before being discharged in September, 1948. He enlisted in the Kentucky Air National Guard on 22 September 1948 and served as an Intelligence Specialist in the grade of Tech Sergeant until the unit was recalled to active duty during the Korean Conflict on 10 October 1950. From that date until 27 May 1951 he served as an Intelligence Specialist on active duty. the Squadron Commander of the 123rd Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron after the unit returned to Guard status in June 1969. In this position he attained the rank of lieutenant colonel.

General Gast served as the 123rd Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron Commander until September 1974, when he was transferred to the Headquarters Kentucky Air National Guard, located at Boone National Guard Center, Frankfort, Kentucky. At that time he was appointed as the Numbered Air Force, Director of Operations, where he served until 31 August 1967. He was federally recognized as a colonel on 14 September 1974. On 1 September 1976, he was appointed as the Chief of Staff for the Kentucky Air National Guard, where he is currently serving and received federal recognition on 2 November 1977.

BRIGADIER GENERAL LAWRENCE ADAM QUEBBEMAN

Assistant Adjutant General for Air

Kentucky Air National Guard

General Lawrence A. Quebbeman is the Assistant Adjutant General for Air, Kentucky National Guard. He has served as the special assistant to the commander, 123d Tactical Reconnaissance Wing Air National Guard prior to his appointment as Assistant Adjutant General for Air by the Adjutant General, Major General Richard L. Frymire. He was extended federal recognition as a brigadier general on 1 August 1975.

General Quebbeman was born near Corydon, Indiana, February 11, 1922. He attended and graduated from Corydon High School in May 1940. He attended Purdue University from 1940 to 1941 and later returned to his studies at Purdue in 1946, graduating in 1948 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Air Transportation Engineering. He began his military career in the United States Army Air Corps Aviation Cadet program in August 1942. General Quebbeman was called to active duty in March 1943 and served as an Aviation Cadet until appointment as a second lieutenant in March 1944 and received his pilot wings in the United States Army Corps.

On 14 March 1944, General Quebbeman entered the Instructor Pilot upgrading program and was certified an Instructor Pilot. His first assignment was flying instructor at Jackson Army Air Field in Mississippi. Later in 1944, General Quebbeman was reassigned to Craig Army Air Field and late in the year moved to First Air Force following transition to the P-40 aircraft. His assignment at First Air Force was the Replacement Training Unit of the

P-47 Combat Training School at Camp Springs Army Air Field in Maryland.

After other brief assignments, General Quebbeman was transferred to the Pacific Theater of Operations. While in transit to the West Coast, Japan surrendered and General Quebbeman was reassigned to Shaw Army Air Base in South Carolina. Following World War II General Quebbeman returned to civilian life and finished his formal education at Purdue. During this period he maintained his flying proficiency with the 331st AAF Base Unit Army Reserve, Stout Field, Indianapolis, Indiana.

In March 1949, General Quebbeman accepted appointment to the Kentucky Air National Guard and was assigned to the 165th Fighter Bomber Squadron. He left the 165th in March 1950 due to a change of location of his civilian occupation. He returned to the Kentucky Air National Guard in September 1952 and became a full-time Air Technician Ground Training Officer. In 1953 he was assigned Flight Leader and Flying Training Instructor as an Air Technician with the Kentucky Air Guard. He later served as Air Operations Officer of the 165th Fighter Bomber Squadron.

General Quebbeman also served the Kentucky Air National Guard in several other positions including Base Civil Engineer in 1957, Installation Engineer, 165th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, and Commander of the 123d Installations Squadron. In 1959, General Quebbeman was assigned Wing Operations Staff Officer with duties as Chief of the Wing Command Post. In 1962 he moved to Wing Director of Operations. Further assignments included 123d Tactical Reconnaissance Group Operations Staff Officer, and Commander of the 165th Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron in 1966.

On 25 April 1966, General Quebbeman assumed command of the 123d Tactical Reconnaissance Group. In January 1968 the 123d and assigned groups were mobilized for the Pueblo Crisis. Upon reorganization in July 1968, General Quebbeman assumed command of the 165th Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron with missions in Alaska, Panama and Korea. While performing its Korean assignment from Itazuke AFB, Japan, the 165th was awarded the Fifth Air Force "Outstanding Unit Plaque" for its performance.

The Unit was demobilized in June 1969, General Quebbeman was awarded the Air Force Commendation Medal and under his command, the 165th Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron received the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award. Upon return to Kentucky, the 123d Tactical Reconnaissance Group was reorganized and General Quebbeman was appointed Commander. He was promoted to colonel in October 1969. He served as the 123d Tactical Reconnaissance Wing Operations Staff Officer from May 1971 and assumed command of the 123d Tactical Reconnaissance Wing on 1 January 1974 through 10 December 1974.

BRIGADIER GENERAL VICTOR F. KILKOWSKI

General Kilkowski entered military service in 19 October 1942 as a reservist in the United States Army. Three months later he went on active duty and after basic training he was appointed to the Aviation Cadet Program. After 11 months of pilot training, he was graduated in February as a fighter pilot with the rank of second lieutenant. After a year as a flight instructor at Army Bases in the United States, General Kilkowski was assigned to duty in the Pacific in March 1945. From a base on Iwo Jima, he flew bomber escort missions and participated in raids against the Japanese-held islands north of Iwo Jima. During the air offensive against Japan, General Kilkowski was a flight leader in the 46th Fighter Squadron. During this period, he flew ten combat missions and logged 76 combat hours.

tion to Deputy Chief of Staff, Maryland Air National Guard in June 1959. General Kilkowski has compiled over 5000 flying hours and maintains his rating as a Command Pilot.

General Campbell's military career began when he enrolled in the U. S. Army Air Corps as an aviation cadet. He was called to active duty early in 1943.

General Campbell became Squadron Commander of the 101st Tactical Fighter Sq. in February 1971, and Group Commander of the 102nd Fighter Interceptor Group in July 1973. General Campbell was assigned as Deputy Chief of Staff for Air, Massachusetts Air National Guard on 10 February 1975. He was promoted and federally recognized as brigadier general on 6 February 1976. General Campbell was reassigned to be Commander, 102nd Fighter Interceptor Wing on 1 July 1976.

General Daley began his military career in the United States Marine Corps in January 1943. MAJOR GENERAL RALPH E. LEADER

General Leader entered Officer Candidate School on 15 February 1943 at Camp Davis, North Carolina. He graduated as a second lieutenant on 13 May 1943 and was assigned to the 445th Anti-aircraft Weapons Battalion. In October 1943, General Leader transferred to the Air Corps. He received his wings in June of 1944. After further training, he was assigned to the 14th Air Force in China. He was stationed in Siam with the 311th Fighter Group. He flew P-51s in long range dive bomb and strafing strikes against Japanese lines of communication. After V-J Day, the 311th Fighter Group moved to Shanghai. In January of 1946, he returned to the United States and left the active service in March.

General Leader joined the Air Force Reserve in 1946. He assisted in reactivating the 101st Fighter Squadron of the Massachusetts National Guard. He transferred to the Air National Guard and was assigned as a flight leader in the 101st Fighter Squadron. After serving as a flight leader for several years, he was re-assigned to the 102nd Tactical Fighter Wing as Wing Flying Safety Officer and later as Wing Operations Staff Officer. During this time, he continued to fly with the 101st Tactical Fighter Squadron and maintained a combat ready status.

In October of 1961, as a result of the Berlin Crisis, the 102nd Tactical Fighter Wing was called back into Federal service and sent overseas to Phalsbourg, France. During the year-long tour, he served as Deputy Director of Wing Operations. As such he played a major role in planning and directing deployments of the Wing to and from France. Upon return from France, the 102nd Tactical Fighter Wing reverted to National Guard status and was re-organized so as to develop at each Base a self-sufficient Fighter Group. General Leader was assigned to com-

mand the 102nd Tactical Fighter Group formerly in Boston, now at Otis Air Force Base. He continued in this position until February 1970 when he became Commander of the 102nd Tactical Fighter Wing. General Leader was appointed Chief of Staff for Air on 6 April 1976. He was promoted and federally recognized to the grade of major general on 4 February 1977.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant a year later following completion of Aviation Cadet School. During the remainder of the war, he served with the 12th Air Force in Europe as a B-25 pilot. Following release from active duty, he was assigned briefly to the Officers Reserve Corps prior to joining the Minnesota Air National Guard in March 1947.

General Goodrich's first assignment in the Minnesota Air National Guard was in the 109th Squadron as a pilot in the Utility Flight. He remained active in the Squadron until July 1950 when he transferred to the State Headquarters to become the first Air Officer on the Adjutant General's staff. General Gerard enlisted in the U. S. Army Air Corps in October 1942. He completed flight training and was commissioned as second lieutenant on 30 August 1943. After further training, he was assigned to a Fighter Group in the United States which was then immediately transferred to the Eighth Air Force in Europe. During World War II, he flew two combat tours amassing 420 combat hours in 91 missions. He destroyed eight German Fighters in the air: six ME109's and two FW190's. During one mission he destroyed four German fighters in a 12 minute battle over Leipzig, Germany.

BRIGADIER GENERAL PATRICK E. O'GRADY

General O'Grady was appointed directly as a second lieutenant with the rating of pilot with the 6th Ferry Group, Air Transport Command, U. S. Army Air Force at Long Beach, California on 14 November 1943. General Posey began his military career by entering the Army Air Corps Primary Flying School at Albany, Georgia, on 28 April 1941 as an Aviation Cadet. He received his wings and was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the United States Army Air Corps on 12 December 1941. His first assignment was at Scott Field, Illinois, as a pilot with the 10th Materiel Squadron. On 10 October 1958, he was appointed as Chief of Staff, Pennsylvania Air National Guard. He was federally recognized as a brigadier general on 2 November 1967. He has flown support type missions to Vietnam.

28th Infantry Division with General Remetta Commanding. On 19 July 1967, he was reassigned as an Assistant Division Commander, 28th Infantry Division. He was federally recognized as brigadier general on 1 December 1967. In May 1971, he was reassigned as Director, Area Group East in State Headquarters. He was promoted and federally recognized as a major general on 31 May 1972.

General Patterson began his military career by enlisting in the Enlisted Reserve Corps of the United States Army Air Corps in December 1942. The following April he began his flying career as an Aviation Cadet and received his wings in August 1944. General Patterson was assigned to Asiatic-Pacific Theater and flew combat missions in the P-51 Mustang fighters from Iwo Jima. After he was discharged in October 1946, General Patterson remained in the Air Force Reserve. In August 1947 he joined the South Carolina Air National Guard at McEntire ANG Base and has served with the unit since that time. General Corning began his military career as a private in the Army National Guard with Battery D, 147th Field Artillery at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. He was with the Army National Guard for four years being discharged as a sergeant, Cannoneer, in 1939. He enlisted in the Navy Air Corps in August of 1941 and finished flight training as an ensign in 1942. He served with the Navy for five years, flying patrol seaplanes, bombers and night fighters. He served overseas in Newfoundland, Iceland and England where he flew 104 combat missions.

Upon release from active duty and on return to Sioux Falls, General Corning helped organize the 175th Air National Guard Squadron. He was assigned as the Operations Officer. General Clippard began his military career as a private in the Enlisted Reserve Corps on 15 December 1942. He was ordered to active duty with the U.S. Army on 20 April 1943, serving in the European Theater of Operations during World War II. General Clippard was discharged as a sergeant on 21 January 1946.

General Clippard accepted an appointment as a second lieutenant, Infantry, in the Tennessee Army National Guard on 27 June 1950, and was assigned to Headquarters Company, 117th Infantry. General Clippard was reassigned to Headquarters, 30th Armored Division on 4 January 1966, serving subsequently as G-3 Air and Assistant G-3 until 31 January 1968. On 1 February 1968, he was reassigned as executive officer of the 5th Battalion, 109th Armor. General Clippard assumed command of the 5th Battalion, 109th Armor on 1 December 1968 and was promoted to lieutenant colonel on 10 December 1968.

On 1 September 1975, General Clippard was reassigned as Deputy Chief of Staff, Headquarters, Tennessee Army National Guard. General Clippard assumed his current assignment as Chief of Staff, Headquarters, Tennessee Army National Guard on 30 September 1976. Federally recognized as brigadier general on 4 February 1977.

Deputy Chief of Staff for Air

Colonel Hollowell began his military career on 23 June 1948 when he enlisted in the 49th Armored Division, Texas Army National Guard.

After moving to Dallas in 1951 he transferred to the 181st Fighter Squadron, Texas Air National Guard, where he was assigned as a unit supply clerk. On 9 December 1952 he was commissioned as a second lieutenant and was assigned as Legal Officer with the 136th Air Defense Wing, Texas Air National Guard, until he was transferred to Headquarters, Texas Air National Guard, Austin, Texas, in November 1963.

In 1956 Colonel Hollowell was elected to the Texas State Legislature. He took office in January 1957 and served five terms in the House of Representatives. During one term he served as Speaker Pro Tem of the House.

He was appointed State Judge Advocate for the Texas Army National Guard, Texas Air National Guard, and Texas State Guard on 11 December 1963, a position he held until 31 January 1968. He served as President of a Military Board which wrote the Texas Code of Military Justice which he subsequently sponsored in the House of Representatives. When the bill was enacted into law, he authored the "Manual for Courts-Martial, Texas, 1963" which was adopted and published by the Adjutant General's Department. In 1965, Colonel Hollowell was President of a Military Law Board that authored the "Texas Manual on Civil Disturbances

and Martial Law” which was adopted and published by the Adjutant General’s Department. While on a tour of duty with the National Guard Bureau in 1967, Colonel Hollowell researched civil engineering and legal matters and wrote the Air National Guard Regulation governing Operations and Maintenance Agreements.

Colonel Burke began his military career with an ROTC commission after graduation from the University of Oklahoma in 1953. General Cooper began his military career in November 1942 when he entered aviation cadet training in the Army Air Corps. Upon completion of basic and advanced training, he was commissioned as a second lieutenant in May 1944. Subsequently, he flew P-51's with the Eighth Air Force in the European Theater of Operations where he compiled 200 combat flying hours. In March 1945, he was promoted to first lieutenant. Upon release from active duty in February 1946, he was transferred to the Air Force Reserve.

In August of that year, General Cooper joined the Wyoming Air National Guard upon its reactivation and was promoted to captain in June 1948 and to major in March 1950. In February 1951, he was assigned as Commanding Officer, 187th Fighter Squadron and in March was recalled to active duty with his unit for the Korean War. Upon his release from active duty in November 1952, he rejoined the Wyoming Air Guard. He was promoted to lieutenant colonel in March 1954 and in August 1957 was promoted to colonel and assigned as Commander, 153d Fighter Group. He was named Chief of Staff, Wyoming Air National Guard, in 1958 and was assigned as Assistant Adjutant General, Wyoming Air Guard. He was federally recognized as brigadier general on 25 April 1961. General Cooper flew numerous support missions in Southeast Asia since his unit acquired the C-121 aircraft.

Wyoming Army National Guard

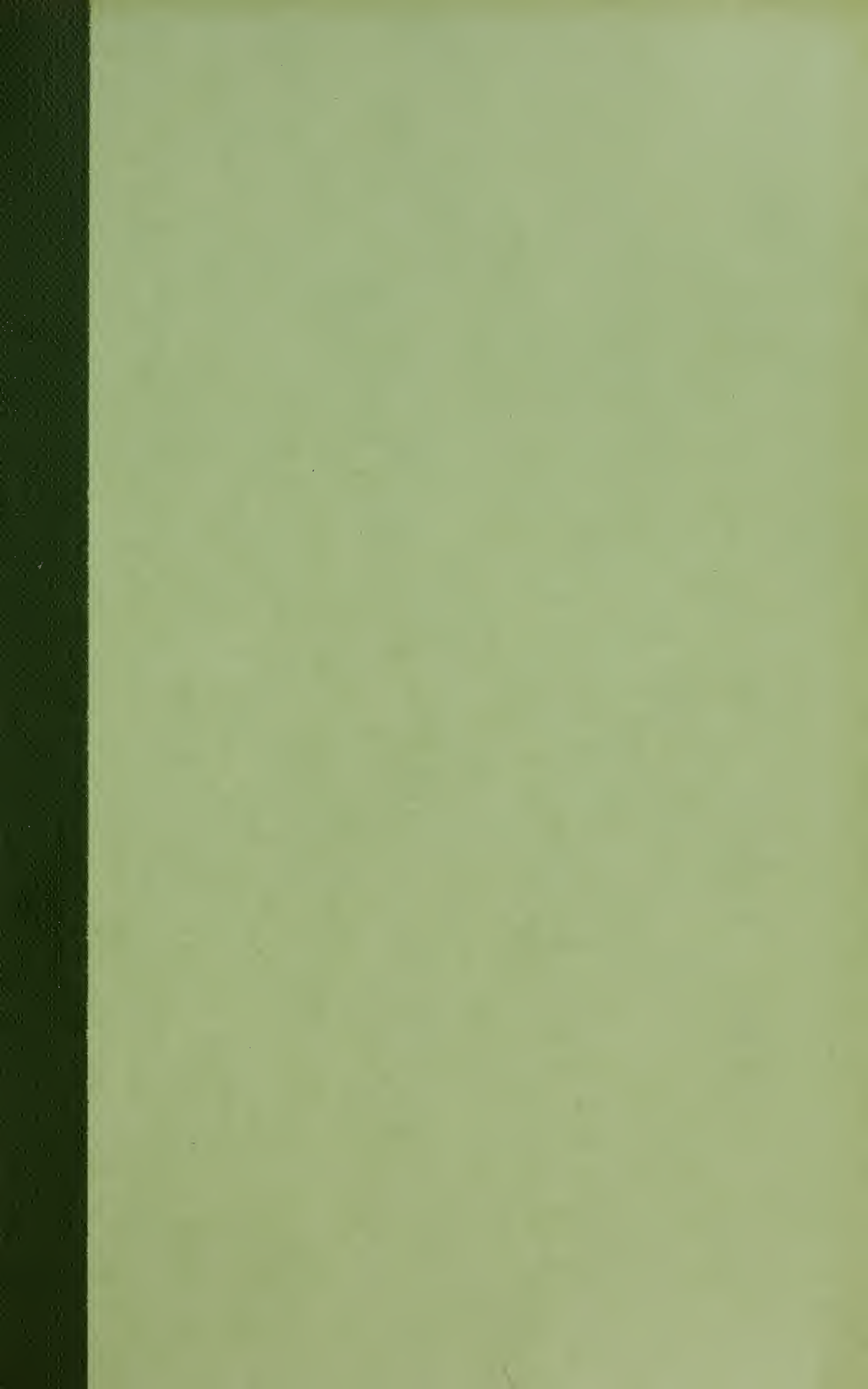
General Stimson enlisted in the U. S. Army Reserve, Third Infantry, Ft. Snelling, Minnesota 24 March 1942. He was called to active duty 19 May 1942. He later attended State College, Mississippi Officer Candidate School and was commissioned a second lieutenant 28 April 1943. During World War II, he participated in the Northern France and Central European Campaigns. On 16 June 1946, he was released from active duty and assigned to the Officers Reserve Corps. He returned to active duty 7 July 1947 with a Regular Army appointment as a first lieutenant. He was assigned to Headquarters, 7th Training Regiment, Ft. Eustis, Virginia. He resigned his Regular Army commission 5 April 1948 and was reinstated as a captain in the Officers Reserve Corps 7 October 1948.

General Stimson joined the Wyoming Army National Guard 2 January 1949. He reentered active duty 1 September 1950 with the 141st Tank Battalion, Wyoming Army National Guard on its activation for the Korean conflict. He was released from active duty on 18 June 1952 and assumed command of the 351st Field Artillery Battalion as major on 17 April 1953. He continued to serve as Battalion Commander until his promotion to the grade of colonel when he was assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment as Intelligence Officer. On 4 June 1967, he assumed command of the 115th Artillery Group and remained in this command until his appointment as Assistant Adjutant General, Army for Wyoming 10 August 1970. He was promoted and federally recognized as brigadier general 10 August 1970.
