

PUBLISHER'S PREFACE

H

HOUGH a number of books with the biographies and portraits of Confederate generals have been published since the close of the Civil War, Hall's volume is one of the harder ones to locate and always brings a premium when it is sold. A check of auction records for the last twenty years shows that only one has appeared at a public sale. To see one offered in a dealer's catalog is quite unusual. Among the last shown was one in an Eastern dealer's recent catalog at \$100. It was a rebound copy and not in the original binding. Mr. Wright Howse in his *U.S.iana* lists the book as "obtainable only with considerable difficulty at prices ranging between \$100 and \$300." The copy used for this facsimile

edition was a rebound copy that had been purchased originally in 1904 for \$35 and bound in England the following year at a price of \$10.

William F. Kelleher, the well-known and distinguished authority on Americana from Cliffside Park, New Jersey, has this to say about the Hall:

This has become very scarce. Possibly the original issue was a comparatively small one, but for whatever the reason, in the past two decades the series has become virtually unfindable.

Not a single copy has turned up at public sale at auction in the United States in the past twelve years (and possibly a much longer period). I checked all records back to 1950. The last copy that I personally recall seeing in a dealer's catalog was about fifteen or more years back at \$85. It was rebound in full leather. [The Hall] is of outstanding excellence, and to the best of our knowledge and belief is a series that has never been surpassed.²

For this reason, it is not surprising that many collectors and Civil War buffs are not even aware of the existence of Hall's collection of portraits of Confederate generals.

The original edition was not published in book form. It was done as a series of portraits which were etched or engraved on separate sheets of white paper. Biographical sketches were printed on separate sheets of cream-colored paper. The portraits and sketches were then gathered and inserted in a box-type binding known as a solander box or case. One of the few sets in the original solander case is in the New York Public Library, to which the publisher is grateful for the following description of the original binding:

Our copy of C. B. Hall's *Military Records of General Officers of the Confederate States of America* (1898) is in its original ¾ dark blue Morocco solander case, gilt. The front and back covers are in a blue-grey cloth and the top, bottom and front sides, which drop to enclose the box, are of blue marbled paper. The front cover is lettered in gilt. There is no information in the book or on the Library of Congress card as to the number of copies published.³

Not too much is known about Charles Bryan Hall. The following short biographical sketch from *The New York Historical Society's Dictionary of Artists in America* provides about all of the readily available information about him:

HALL, CHARLES BRYAN (1840-after 1906).

Engraver of portrait and subject plates. A son of Henry Bryan Hall, Sr., he was born in Camden Town, London, August 18, 1840, and came to New York City with his father in April, 1851. He studied for a time with his father, but in 1855 was apprenticed to James Duthie of Morrisania (New York). After service in the Civil War, he worked with George E. Perine in New York City, but he later joined his father and brothers in the firm of H. B. Hall & Sons, later H. B. Hall Sons. After 1899, C. B. Hall carried on the business alone. He was living in New York City as late as 1906.4

According to the National Archives and Records Service, Hall, at the age of 21, was mustered in the Union Army on December 9, 1861, at New York and was discharged for disability at Aquia Creek, Virginia, on June 29, 1862. He served in the 71st New

York Militia Infantry and the 95th New York Infantry.⁵

in this facsimile edition, just as it did in the original.

In presenting this facsimile edition of Hall's *Military Records of General Officers of the Confederate States of America*, the publisher made no effort to correct typographical errors in the original such as the obvious misspelling of some names in the author's list of generals and in some of the biographical sketches. Thus in the list of generals Henry Heth appears as "Harry Heth," General Breckinridge as "Breckenridge," General Rodes as "Rhodes," and General Loring as "Lorring."

Every effort has been made to keep the flavor of the original, such as retaining the original numbering of the pages. As mentioned above, the original was not in book form. Only the biographical pages were numbered, and these in serial order. The original arrangement of the portraits has been retained with each appearing on a right-hand page and the biographical sketch on the left-hand page. In order not to destroy Hall's continuity, the two-page biography of General Wheeler results in a blank page

For the convenience of modern readers and libraries, the page size has been slightly reduced. The original was portfolio size 12"x16" and, as mentioned, done on separate sheets. By merely reducing the margins of the original, the present size was made possible. No changes have been made in the content. For easy reference, however, an

alphabetical list of the generals has been included on the last page of this edition.

The binding of the facsimile edition is as near that of the original as possible. The design on the front cover and the backbone are from photostats of the copy in the

New York Public Library.6

Hall's etchings and engravings represent high perfection in the art, and it is likely that many of the fine reproductions in books produced at the turn of the century were made by the Halls.



FOREWORD.



HE history of the greatest civil war the world has ever seen—and I trust ever will see—has yet to be written. So great was the struggle, so farreaching its effects, so diversified its consequences, that it has been an impossible task for the historian so far to free his mind from partisan influences and to refrain, however unconsciously, from coloring incidents to suit his own opinions. My lifework has been to provide worthy material, both textual and pictorial, for the future historian as well as the student of to-day. For over twenty years I have labored in the searching of authentic records for the accumulation of facts, and the present work is part of the result of that labor. I submit to the public as complete a roster of the Generals of the Confederate States Army as is possible to obtain. It is as complete as human effort can make it, and I

claim for every statement contained therein that before acceptance it was submitted to a most laborious and searching investigation for verification. I give the rank of each officer in the Confederate States Army, and, wherever it existed, his rank in the United States Army before the war. The officers' ante-bellum records, both military and civil, are set forth in extenso and with an exactitude that I do not believe can be impugned. When it came to procuring portraits of the Confederate officers I found a very uphill task, indeed. To one thousand portraits of United States officers I could find some twenty-five or thirty of members of the Confederate States Army. This was a very one-sided state of affairs, and I determined, so far as it lay in my power, to remedy it. After infinite trouble, almost endless correspondence, and many long and often fruitless journeys, I secured the splendid gallery of authentic portraits set forth in this present volume. In most cases and, indeed, wherever possible, the portrait is one taken during the war and shows the man as he was known to his own soldiers and contemporaries. In some instances war-time portraits did not exist, and in such cases I have secured photographs or other pictures taken before or since the time of "the late unpleasantness." The mechanical labor alone involved in the etching or engraving of the one hundred and eight portraits on steel and copper contained in this volume will be readily appreciated, while the expense of my researches and the production of the book has been equally as great.

In the volume now published are included the records and portraits of the Confederate States Army Generals, Lieutenant Generals and Major Generals, placed in order of rank. It is a work worthy of public support, and upon its reception will depend the publication of my other collections. Should the book meet with the proper encouragement, I propose to issue further volumes containing the Brigadier Generals. Being, of course, more numerous, the Brigadier Generals alone will occupy three volumes, each as large as the present, and will be published at the same price per volume. In addition to the collections already noted, I have made a similar one relating to all the Confederate States governmental and departmental officials, Governors of Confederate States, signers of the Confederate States Constitution, and generally of all those persons who played leading parts in the great war drama. The publication of this other collection will

also depend upon the reception accorded to the volume now ready for issue

Colonel Charles C. Jones, Jr., who himself published the first roster of Confederate Generals, and than whom no one was more competent to speak, thought highly of the present work, and in various letters to myself wrote in terms which it might seem presumptuous in me to repeat. He considered it both of great historical and pictorial value. Whatever be the fate of my work from a financial standpoint, I shall never regret being the means of handing down to posterity the records and portraits of the men who, by a long and heroic struggle (whatever our opinion of the justness of their cause), deserve a better fate than oblivion. To keep their memories green has been a labor of love and one that, whatever be its financial success, will at least have afforded a pleasant occupation for many years which might easily have been spent in less worthy and a less congenial manner.

I am greatly indebted to General Marcus J. Wright, of the War Records Office, Washington, D. C.; to John Boyn, Esq., Commander-in-Chief of the Confederate Veterans of Kentucky, and to the late Colonel Charles C. Jones, Jr., of Augusta, Ga., for valuable aid in securing many of the portraits and in correcting records, and to James T. Dennis, of Baltimore, Md., for many of the

autographs from his invaluable collection.

Brigade composed of the First, Seventh, Eleventh and Seventeenth Virginia Regiments Infantry, being the Fourth Brigade, First Corps, Army of the Potomac.

Division composed of the brigades of Kemper, Pickett, Willcox, Anderson, Pryor and Featherston, Army of Northern Virginia.

Commanding First Corps, Army of Northern Virginia, from August 13, 1862, to August 15, 1863.

At battle of Fredericksburg, November 19, 1862, corps composed of the divisions of Anderson, Pickett, Ransom, Hood and McLaws, and the artillery battalions of Colonels Alexander and Walton.
