



Part Circle Corrugated Culverts for Driveway and Alley Entrances.

"The use of pure iron corrugated culverts in the part circle form at driveway entrances is already quite common in cities on the Pacific coast and might be widely adopted to great advantage. The following letter from Mr. S. J. Van Ornum, Consulting Engineer of San Francisco, Cal., sets forth a very practical plan for this construction. No. 10 gauge corrugated American Ingot Iron should be employed, and probably it would be found advantageous to protect the concrete at the ends of the corrugated arch by the use of a light angle iron."

Dear Sir:—When I was in Burlingame and San Mateo the other day, my attention was attracted to the driveway culverts along the streets constructed of four or six-inch pipes surrounded by concrete or asphalt surface.

A small circular pipe at driveways is an abomination as it can not have sufficient capacity for the storm water flowing along the gutters. It also easily clogs with leaves and debris and when clogged it is very hard to clean out. Because of this disadvantage, some cities prohibit the use of driveway culverts entirely, but most cities allow them to be used specially when the parking is so narrow that an easy slope from the sidewalk to the gutter can not be made.

The thought occurred to me of constructing driveways and alley culverts of corrugated iron part circles resting one edge in a notch in the gutter and the other edge in a notch near the top of the curb. I have drawn two cross-sections showing this idea. The upper cross-section shows the gutter sloping toward the curb and the lower cross-section shows a gutter having different cross-sections. The curb face in each case I have made eight inches. These two cross-sections I believe are typical examples of gutter cross-sections for both paved and unpaved streets in this state.



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THE following contribution toward the history of one of the early families of our country, is the result of investigations and correspondence during the past five years; and while it is not as complete as might be desired, yet it is believed to be of sufficient value to warrant its publication.

The work has been a growth, extending far beyond the original design,—which was merely to trace the line of the author's ancestry back to the settlement of the country, and to collect the history of the descendants of his great grandfather, making perhaps a pamphlet of a few pages. In carrying out this design, however, traces were found of other branches of the original family, and the plan was gradually enlarged, until it comprised the entire history of the descendants of George Weekes, in the direct line, so far as possible to obtain it.

Information has also been sought in regard to the early history in England of the family of which George Weekes is supposed to have been a member, and with some good degree of success.

While the work has involved a great amount of labor, and some hundreds of dollars of expense,—far beyond any expectation of pecuniary compensation,—the author feels abundantly rewarded for his labor by the pleasure experienced in the doing of it, and will be content if the subscription list shall prove adequate to defray the cost of publication merely.

Several hundreds of letters have been written, to all parts of the country; libraries have been searched; family, town, and other histories,—city and town directories,—county. town, church, and family records,—monumental inscriptions,—have IO PREFACE.

been examined; localities have been visited; every clew has been followed, as far as practicable. Both public and private records have in many instances been found to have been very imperfectly kept, and in some cases to have been destroyed. It is probable that a large proportion of the persons not traced died in childhood, or in early life without issue; others probably removed to parts unknown, and may be represented by descendants who have no knowledge of their ancestry for more than two or three generations. A colony from Dorchester went to South Carolina in 1695, and founded a settlement which they named *Dorchester*; they afterward removed to Midway, Georgia. Some of the early untraced members of the Weekes family may have gone with this colony: while traces of families of the name have been found in that region, not enough has been learned to determine their origin.

More than 1,100 names of descendants of George Weekes, in the direct line, have been found, about half of whom are now living; also, about 1,000 names of children whose mothers were Weeks by birth.

A very few members of the family to whom repeated letters of inquiry have been written, have been too indifferent, or too careless, to reply at all. A few others have replied briefly and imperfectly, and could not be induced to be more definite or full. But by far the greater number have responded cheerfully, offering to add anything desired as far as in their power; and some have entered heartily into the spirit of the matter, and industriously sought for information, thus rendering valuable aid, and lightening the labors of the author. While he is deeply grateful to all who have so cheerfully assisted him,—too many to enumerate in this connection,—he feels that especial thanks are due to W. Hill Budgett, Esq., of Bristol, England; to Hon. Wm. B. Trask, of Boston, Mass.; to the late Mrs. Eunice (Weeks) Little, of Granville, O.; to Mrs. Dorothy (Weekes) Nickerson, of South Harwich, Mass.; to

Justin W. Weeks, of Watertown, N. Y.; to George W. Weeks, of Clinton, Mass.; also to William F. Weeks, of New York City, for information in regard to the Hardwick family; and to Mrs. Charles L. Alden, of Troy, N. Y., and Dr. Stephen Wickes, of Orange, N. J., for the history of the family of Thomas, of Huntington.

The plan of the work does not comprise a record of all the descendants of George Weekes; but only those of the name, with the children of such,—those of other surnames of the second and later generations not being included.

Those of each branch or sub-family are placed together: the descendants of an elder brother, for instance, are followed out to the present date, before the history of the one next to him in order of birth, is entered upon.

Immediately after the list of children in any branch of the family, the children of daughters are given, before the families of sons are taken up.

Individuals who are Weeks by birth are numbered in the order of their first appearance in the record, and indexed by such numbers: children of other surnames are not numbered. In a few instances, where a name has been inadvertently overlooked in the original numbering, or has been afterwards added, the preceding number is repeated, with an italic a attached. The individuals in the families of Thomas, of Huntington, and Nathaniel, of Hardwick, are numbered for convenience of reference to family connection, but are indexed according to pages.

When a name is to appear later, as the head of a family, reference is made in connection with its first appearance, to the place in order of numbers where such further history is to be found: for example, on page 39, after the mention of EBENEZER (33), as one of the children of HEZEKLAH (26), is the reference in parenthesis, "[after 242]"; on turning to

number 242 in regular order, (p. 62,) the history of EBENEZER and the names of his children will be found, succeeding such number.

When an individual is so introduced a second time, his original number is repeated, in large figures, in a line by itself.

The small figure at the right of the head of a family, indicates the number of his generation, George Weekes being reckoned as first.

The names in parentheses, following the head of a family, show (in reverse order) the line of descent from George Weekes. In some cases, instead of the line of ancestry, reference is made to the father or to a brother only, (thus, "s. of preceding," bro. of preceding,"), when the record of such relative has just been given, with little or no interval between.

Names are given as written by the persons themselves or by near relatives, or as found in the records, even when the spelling is unusual,—except where such spelling is evidently an unintentional error.

Dates are given as found in the records: the earlier dates being "Old Style," and the later, "New Style." When the year is given thus, ("1669-70,") in connection with dates from January I to March 25, in the earlier years, the first number is the year according to Old Style, the other according to New Style. March was the first month until 1751: January was reckoned the first month of 1752. There is also a difference of eleven days between the Old and the New: August 3, 1741, Old Style, would be August 14 according to New Style.

Sometimes there has been found a conflict of authorities in regard to dates: in some such cases, preference has been given to the one that seemed to be sustained by the best evidence; in others, both are given.

Some errors in names and dates have no doubt been made, the sources of information being imperfect; but the effort has been made to secure as great a measure of accuracy as practicable, and it is believed that few mistakes of importance will be found.* The author will be grateful for information of any such that may be detected. Such errors as have been found while the work has been going through the press, are noted in the *Errata*, at the end of the book.

A number of ancient documents connected with the history of the family, have been found, literal copies of which are inserted.

The original signatures of George Weekes and his wife, and of a number of their early descendants, have been discovered, and fac-similes will be found in their appropriate places.

Such information as has been obtained in regard to other families of the name,—whether early settlers or more recent comers,—is given, though in many cases but fragmentary. The family of THOMAS, of Huntington, L. I., is given with a good degree of fulness; also those of THOMAS, of Hardwick, CORNELIUS, of Ware, and ROLAND, of Petersham, (descendants from JOHN, of Falmouth, Mass.)

Abbreviations used are as follows: b. born; bp. baptized; bro. brother; d. daughter, died; g. grand; l. lived, lives; m. married; prob. probably; pub. published; r. removed; s. sister, son; w. wife; wd. widow.

A few blank leaves are inserted at the end, for the use of such as may wish to continue the records of their own immediate families.

^{*} It may be noticed by any who should compare the data given in Savage's Genealogical Dictionary, with those found in this work, that there are some discrepancies. In all such cases—except the dates of baptisms—the author has been guided by original records, examined by himself personally: the dates of baptisms were copied for him by Wm. B. Trask, Esq., of Boston, from the original church records.

Any additional information, of value, obtained subsequent to the publication of the present work, will be published in a supplement, or deposited with the New England Historic Genealogical Society, Boston, Mass. Such information is requested, from all into whose hands this work may come.



DERIVATION AND HISTORY.

WEEKES, WEEKS, WEKES, WIKES, WYKES, WICKS, WICKES, WYCKES, WYCKS, WIX, WEEK, WICK, WICKE, WYCHE, WYCK, WYKE, WEICK, WEIK, DE WIKE, DE WYKE, VAN WYCK, VICK, etc.,—are but different forms of the same name, or names of like origin; taking their rise from the Saxon wic, wyc, wich, or wiche, and related forms in other European languages,—akin to the Latin vicus, (village), and the Greek oikos,

anciently foikos (house),—and having a wide range of application, the general signification being, a dwelling-place.* This element is found in composition in such names as, Berwick, Warwick, Highweek, Norwich, Wickham, Wickford, Wykeham, Wickington, etc.

The name, in some of its various forms, is of great antiquity in England, and is borne by families between some of which there is no connection.\(^+\) The early emigrants to this country, bearing the name, appear to have been mainly, if not entirely, from the south of England, and were probably from among its gentry and yeomanry of Norman origin. They were generally men of enterprise,—some being also men of culture and of means, who at once assumed positions of honor and influence. Some of these were no doubt nearly related to each other, as indicated by traditions among their descendants, as well as by marked likeness of physical and mental characteristics.

GEORGE WEEKES,

One of the early Puritan settlers of Dorchester, in the Massachusetts Bay Colony, is said by the early chroniclers to have been of "an ancient and honorable Devonshire family," whose original name was WREV, and whose seat, in the latter part of the 14th century, was at North Wyke, in Tawton Hundred, about twenty miles westerly from the city of Exeter.

^{*}Some ingenious student of names has given a curious but improbable derivation of the name WEEKS from William, thus: William, Will, Wilkin (i. e. little Will), Wilkins, Wilkes, Weekles, Weekes, Weeks.

[†] An inscription on a brass tablet in the floor of St. Clement's church, Hastings, Sussex, England, still to be seen, indicates the burial place of 'Thomas Wekes, who died in 1163. Thomas Wykes was bailiff of Hastings in 1651. William de Wike held a knight's fee in Kent in 1166. William and Gerard de Wyke lived in Kent about fifty years later. In 1335, Sir Stephen de Wike was living at Canterbury. In 1347, Stephen de Wyke was at Wyke, Westgate, Kent. The following also were of Kent: Thomas Wyke, syndic of Poor Priests' Hospital, Canterbury, 1373; John Wykes, Esq. 1395; Richard Wyke, 1403; John and Thomas Wyke, 1412; Edmund Wykes, in list of gentry, 1428; John and William Weeks, gent., in time of Charles I. Others were in Sussex, Somerset, Berks, Herefordshire, Gloucestershire, Yorkshire. Sir Peter Wyche, of Somerset, was ambassador to the Grand Signor in 1627.

There is a tradition that the family of George Weekes was of Huguenot origin; another, that its descent is from Dutch refugees from the persecutions of the Duke of Alva. But if he was of the Devonshire family, these traditions would appear to have no foundation; for this family has a history reaching far back of the era of either Huguenots or the Duke of Alva.

In the absence of certain knowledge of the birthplace or English residence or line of descent, of George Weekes,—it seems proper to give such facts as have been learned in regard to the history of the name in Devonshire. These facts have been obtained in part from personal examination of some of the histories mentioned, and have been in part kindly furnished by W. Hill Budgett, Esq., of Bristol, England, who is connected with the family in England, and who has enjoyed peculiar facilities for procuring information in regard to its history. The name of the family appears in the records referred to, in a variety of forms: Wyke, Wykes, Wike, Wikes, Week, Weeks, Weeks, Weeks.

In an account of the WREY family, in Playfair's British Antiquities, the earliest name given is that of

Robert le Wiren,

who married Sybil Abbott, and who was living in 1135, the first year of King Stephen.* He was succeeded by William (m. Alice Kelly), Elias, Elias (m. Joanna Holwaye), Richard (m. Alice Norris), Stephen, Thomas (m. Elizabeth Yeo), Walter. Walter had a daughter Jane, who m. John Wykes, of Cocktree, who was a relation of the family, and had taken the name of Wykes.† Their son Roger held a fourth part of a knight's fee in Wyke Chavleigh, in the barony of Oakhamp-

^{*}The name of Robert le Wrey indicates a Norman origin: his father probably came to England with William the Conqueror.

[†] Westcote, in History of Devonshire, in 1630, makes a similar statement. Sir Wm, Pole gives the original name of John Wykes as Burnell,

ton, in 1346. The possessions of the Wrey family are said by this author to have been of great extent.**

The same writer states that the Wrey family, in some of its branches, is descended from Charlemagne, through Louis le Debonair, the Emperor Charles of Germany, the Baldwins (Earls of Flanders), William the Conqueror, and his successors to Edward III. Domesday Book (1068–1071) gives the name of Viscount Baldwin as holding lands in "Wiche," Tawton Hundred, Devonshire.†

Sir William Pole (or Poole), who died in 1635, in "Collections toward a Description of the County of Devon," gives the following account of the North Wyke family:

The family of Wrey was originally of Wrey Barton, in the parish of Moreton Hampstead; they also held North Russell, and North Wyke.

WILLIAM LE WREY⁺ held the fourth part of a knight's fee in North Wyke, parish of South Tawton, 27th Henry III, 1242. From him followed Walter (1277), Roger, Walter, Roger, who in 1345 held a fourth part of a knight's fee in North Wyke, of the barony of Oakhampton. He had son WILLIAM, who married Katharine, daughter and co-heiress of John Burnell, of Cocktree, South Tawton, and who, in time of Richard II (1377-1399) assumed the name of WYKES. By this marriage he became possessed of Cocktree, and of Ilton Manor.

^{*}Other localities in the neighborhood bore the names, East Week (or Wyke), West Week, Weektown (i. e. Wickington), High Week, etc. (See Westcote's Devonshire, 1550: Polywhele's Devonshire, 1792.)

[†]The owners of the lands in the district termed "Wiehe," at this time, were,—the Bishop of Constance, Count Moreton, Viscount Baldwin, Robert de Albemarle, Radulfus de Pomerei, Odo, and Eldred; the last two being "thanes." The lands of all these except Eldred, were occupied by tenants, whose names were,—Brismar, Ordulf, Rainer, Ednod (sub-tenant under Rainer), Ulveron (described as "libera femina," a free wooman), Alward, Brietrie.

[†]Polwhele (Hist, of Dev. 1792) says: "North Week was (says Risdon) the land of William de Wigorin (or Chamberlam) in the reign of Henry III., whose posterity assumed the name of Week, from their dwelling, ** * John Week sold North Week to George Hunt, on whose death (about 1630) the lands were divided between Luxton and Clapp, who married relations of Hunt." [Wigorin is probably but another form of Hunt.]

WILLIAM WYKES had sons Richard and Roger. Roger, of Bindon, Axmouth, had John, who had John and Richard: John had William (living in 1600), who, as well as his uncle Richard, died without male issue.

Richard, Esq., of North Wyke and Cocktree, son of William, m. Elizabeth Avenell, and had William, Margaret, and Joan.

William, Esq., son of Richard, m. Jane Prideaux, and had John, Richard,* William, Jane.

John m. Elizabeth de Pawkswell, and had John, of North Wyke and Cocktree, who m. Mary, d. of Sir Roger Gifford, and had Roger, Mark, William,† John, Erkenwalde, Walter, Christopher, Edith, Gertrude, Honor.

Roger, Esq., of North Wyke, son of John, m. Jane Duke, and had Maria [or Jane] (m. Nicholas Fursdon, who d. 1618), John (living in 1620), Frances, Catherine.

John, son of Roger, m. Maria [or Grace] Arscott, and had Roger (b. 1605), John, Elizabeth, Grace, Mary.

The following account of the Honeychurch branch is taken in part from the record, in the Royal College of Arms, at London, of the Visitation of Devonshire by the Heralds, in 1620, and partly from more recent family records.

Sir RICHARD WEEKES, of Honeychurch, married —— Carey, or Cary, of Clovelly, Devon, by whom he had Richard, who had Richard and Symon. Richard had one daughter, but no sons.

Symon (armiger) married —— Hopwood, and had Henry and William. Henry had no issue.

William, of Honeychurch, married Arminell Yeo, of Hatherleigh, Devon, and had Ann, Matilda, Symon, John, William, Joseph, Arminell, and Izott.

^{*}He appears to have been contemporaneous with Sir Richard, of Honeychurch (mentioned later on this page), and may have been the same person.

[†] Perhaps the same with William who was living at the Visitation of Devon by the heralds in 1563: the locality is termed "Northwick" in the record.

See note * under Richard, above.

Symon (living in 1620), eldest son of William, married Mary Stukeley, of Ashton, Devon, and had Catharine, Francis† (b. 1590), John, Granville, Mary, Isabella, Arminell. Francis m. Wilmott Coffin, of Portledge, and had Symon (b. 1618, living in 1620), Mary.

John, second son of William, m. —— Distin, and had John, Henry, Mary.

William, third son of William, m. Elizabeth Mortimer, and had William.

Joseph, fourth son of William, m. Mary Molford, of Cadbury, Devon, and had Joseph, Richard, Elizabeth, Mary, William.

Joseph, son of Joseph, d. at Westham, Sussex; he left his estates in Sussex to his brother Richard, by will dated May 2, 1658, (now in possession of W. Hill Budgett, Esq., of Bristol, whose wife is a descendant from Richard, in the sixth generation).

Richard (b. about 1640), l. near Goudhurst, Kent, or Hawhurst or Ewhurst in Sussex; had son

John (b. about 1662, d. 1758), of Broad Tenterden, Kent, m. Jane Boreman, and had William W. (who had John, William, and John C., M. D., of Rochester), Richard, John (not m.), Sarah.

Richard, son of John, m. Anne Oliver; d. at Shoreham, Sussex, 1753, aged 53; had only son

Richard, M. R. C. S., (b. 1751, d. 1823,) of Hurstpierpoint, Sussex; m. Charity, only child of Rev. Wm. Hampton, and had Hampton, Richard, Mary Ann, Grace.

Hampton, M. D. (b. 1780, d. 1855), of Hurstpierpoint, then of Brighton, m. Sarah, d. of Wm. Borrer (High Sheriff for Sussex in 1801), and had William H., Richard, Sarah R., Mary A., Kate, Frederick, George, Henry, Francis A.

Richard, son of Hampton, (b. 1808, d. 1871,) had William

[†]Lord of the Manor of Honeychurch and Broadwood Kelly, (according to Samuel Lysons, in Magna Brittania, art. *Devonshire.*)

Hampton Carlile, who had Cicely, Philip Hampton (now of Hurstpierpoint), Cecil.

Frederick, son of Hampton, (b. 1815,) m. Elizabeth Marshall, and had Henrietta Mary (m. Rev. G. W. Banks, of Worth, Sussex), Sarah Elizabeth (m. 1st, John Hilditch, and 2d, Wm. Hill Budgett, of Bristol).

George, s. of Hampton, (b. 1817, d. 1880,) of Hurstpierpoint, was Deputy Lieut. for Sussex; m. Lucy A. Boxall, and had Julia Georgiana.

Francis A., s. of Hampton, m. Mary A. Ashton, and had Maud, Francis, Ashton (b. 1848).

Richard, F. S. A., F. R. S., bro. of Hampton, m. Mary Marshall, and had Carey, Emily, Arthur, Charles Hampton (now a Master at Charterhouse School).

Sir William Pole mentions Sir Amidas de Wike as living in Devonshire in the time of Henry III (1216–1273), who had son Lawrence, who had sons Walter, Richard, William, and others. He also mentions William Wikes, as having been chosen Recorder of the city of Exeter in 1360.

The coat of arms of Wykes, of North Wyke, also of Wykes of Cocktree and Weekes of Honeychurch, is described in Burke's Heraldry as. "Ermine, three battle-axes sable": the crest, "an arm embowed, in armor proper, holding a battle-ax gules."* The mottos, or legends, are: "Cari Deo nihilo carent," (Those dear to God lack nothing); "Vitæ via virtus," (The way of life, virtue); "Præsta et persta," (Stand first, and stand firm).

The records of the North Wyke and Honeychurch branches of the family, as above given, are evidently not complete; and while the name of George is not found in these records prior to the emigration to New England, this fact does not invalidate the claim that George, of Dorchester, was of this family.

It is quite possible that he was descended from William, of Exeter; as Roger Clap, whose sister was the wife of George Weekes, was a resident of that city some time before his coming to this country in 1630. But this William was probably of the North Wyke family. Symon, emigrant in 1634, (of whom, however, no trace has been found in this country,) is noted as of Exeter.

There is now no trace of the family at Honeychurch; and North Wyke is not now the designation of any locality in the neighborhood. Investigations made personally by W. Hill Budgett, Esq. (before mentioned), and by John A. Weekes, Esq., of New York City, have resulted as stated. Many records and monuments were destroyed during the civil wars.

An account of the Wykes family of Herefordshire is found in the "Visitation of Herefordshire, A. D. 1569," in the Harleian MSS. in the British Museum; beginning with William,* who lived early in the 15th century. Some descendants lived in Somerset, also some in London.

As the early family traditions, as well as the statements of the early historians, claim that George Weekes was from Devonshire,—as the earliest immigrants wrote the name Weekes,—as no trace has been found of any other than the Devonshire family and its branches in England using this form,—and as no contradictory evidence has been found,—his connection with this family is assumed, and its coat of arms appropriated as a suitable heading to this chapter. The battle-axes on the escutcheon, and the blood-stained ax held aloft by a mailed arm, constitute a decidedly warlike emblem; and down to this day, through the centuries that have elapsed since its origin, there has been found in the family a goodly measure of combativeness, in such manifestations as occasion has required. And the regard for purity and justice, indicated by the ermine ground, has not been wanting.

GEORGE WEEKES,

OF

DORCHESTER.

GEORGE WEEKES, from Devonshire, England, (place and date of birth not known,*) came to Dorchester, Mass., in the same ship with Rev. Richard Mather, in 1635, five years after the original settlement in 1630. There is a tradition, that four brothers came together; that one was drowned in landing; that one settled near Boston; that one went "east," and one "southwest." The known facts in the histories of GEORGE of Dorchester, and of THOMAS of Huntington, L. I., and FRANCIS of Oyster Bay, L. I., (who are believed to have been brothers of George, and of whom some account is hereinafter given,) are substantially in harmony with this tradition: the one drowned may have been " Jo: [Joseph] age 26," mentioned in Chap. XII as an emigrant in 1635, of whom no later trace has been found. George's wife, JANE, was a sister of Roger Clap (known afterwards as "Captain" Clap), who came with the first party of colonists in the ship "Mary and John."

^{*} He is said by one of the historians of New England to have been "about torty years of age" at the time of his coming to America; and to have brought two or three children with him. If there were three children—as was probably the case—the eldest need not have been born earlier than 1629—the third, Ammiel, whose age is known, having been born about 1633. Roger Clap, brother-in-law of George Weekes, was born April 6, 1609. Thomas Weekes, of Huntington, L. I., was born about 1612, being 23 years of age at the time of his leaving England, 1635. Francis Weekes, of Oyster Bay, was born about 1616: [see Arnold's History of Rhode Island, p. 103.] In view of these facts, it seems reasonable to suppose that George Weekes was not over thirty years old when he came, instead of "about forty."

[†] He was of Salcombe Regis, about twelve miles east from Exeter, in Devonshire. This family may be of Danish origin: Osgod Clapa was a Danish noble at the court of Knut (Canute), King of England 1017-1036.

Mr. Weekes is spoken of as "a man in high estimation, of a religious family." He was evidently a man of superior culture for his time, and held a prominent place in the colony. He and his wife were admitted to the church Dec. 21, 1639; and he was "made ffree" May 13, 1640. He was one of the "Seven Men" (Selectmen) of the town in 1645, 1647, 1648, and perhaps in other years; and was frequently appointed to other positions of trust. He was a surveyor, as well as a farmer; and was often placed on commissions to lay out roads, to determine town lines and farm boundaries, etc. He was one of three trustees appointed by one Edward Bullock, who returned to England in 1649, and left his property in the colony to be administered for the benefit of his wife and children.

Mr. Weekes appears to have taken an especial interest in the cause of education; his name appearing in the town records more than once in connection with the subject of free public schools. In the old town records of Dorchester, now in the office of the City Clerk, Boston, is recorded a conveyance, made in 1641, of Thompson's Island to the town for school purposes, signed by seventy citizens, of whom George Weekes was one.*

The exact location of the house and lands of George Weekes is not known: James Blake (b. 1688, d. 1750), author of "Annals of Dorchester," prepared a map of the town, showing the several locations of the early settlers; which map was on one occasion produced in court for reference, since which no trace of it has been found.

William T. Carlton, Esq., of Dorchester, (now living,) has drawn up a map showing the location of some of the lands of

^{*} A fac-simile of his signature to this document (which was the best one of the seventy) is found at the head of this chapter, and in the dedication. the early settlers. According to this map, George Weekes owned part of "Lot No. 19" (the whole being 20 a., 2 q., 23 r.) in the "first division" of the "Cow Walk." The south line of this lot corresponded with what is now the north line of Harvard street, and extended from a point at or near the iunction of Harvard and School streets, 1,320 feet (a quarter of a mile) westerly,—such south line being now intersected nearly in the middle by the N. Y. & N. E. R. R., and is within a few steps of the Harvard street station of the said road. Lot No. 19 was owned by George Weekes and four others; and his share is supposed to have been the southern portion, bounded on the south by what is now Harvard street. It will be seen, from the inventory of his estate (Appendix A. 1) that he owned several other tracts of land. The one above described was probably the "home lot." The author visited this spot in September, 1884; also two large rocks about half a mile west (in West Roxbury Park), on which no doubt the Weekes boys played more than two centuries ago; also drank from a spring near by, where the boys of the olden time often slaked their thirst.

In the will of John Greenaway, 1652, his house lot of "five acres more or less," is described as lying "between George Weekes on the west and Richard Leeds on the east."

George Weekes died Dec. 28, 1650, as appears from the original inventory of his estate now on file in the Probate Office at Boston; a copy of which, made by the author, is given in the Appendix (A. I.). His widow married Jonas Humphrey, as his second wife; he died March 19, 1662; she died August 2, 1668, leaving a will, a copy of which is hereinafter given: (Appendix A. 2.)

The spelling of the name was changed to *Weeks* in the course of one or two generations; it is so spelled on the gravestone of Ammiel Weeks, in 1679; also in the signatures of the sons of Ammiel, in a document in the Appendix. Ammiel himself wrote the name as did his father; and the

ancient spelling is retained to this day in the Harwich branch of the family. The descendants of Barber (32), son of Hezekiah (26), write the name Wicks; their progenitor, Barber, having so spelled the name in consequence of being told that such was the correct form, and the children not thinking it worth while, when informed of the mistake, to correct it. It is to be regretted that the older and correct form of the name—WEEKES—has been displaced by abbreviated forms; and it is hoped that some of the descendants of George Weekes who will learn from this work how the name should be written, will help to correct the error, at least in part.

A part of the house in which George Weekes and family probably sojourned until they had one of their own, (being the house built by Roger Clap, brother of Jane Weekes), is still standing in Willow Court, Dorchester, and was visited by the author, Sept. 11, 1883.

The descendants of George Weekes, of the earlier generations, settled in the eastern and central parts of Massachusetts, in portions of which state many of the family are found at this day. One greatgrandson removed to Pomfret, Conn., but his descendants left that state about a hundred years since. Branches of the family are now found in nearly all the Northern, Middle and Western states; and there are a few in Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri, Louisiana, and the District of Columbia.

While some have been graduates of colleges, and a few have become clergymen, physicians, lawyers, etc.,—a large proportion have been farmers, many have been mechanics, a goodly number have been engaged in mercantile pursuits, and many members of the Cape Cod and Maine branches have been seafaring men.

It is a noteworthy fact, that the clergymen (five in number) were very nearly related to each other: Rev. William R. Wecks, D. D. (695), his brother Rev. David J. Wecks (696), their nephew Rev. Joseph Wecks (701), their cousin Rev.

Holland Weeks (775), and the son of another cousin, Rev. George A. Weeks (825). The first and third were ordained as Presbyterians, the second and fourth as Congregationalists, and the last as a minister of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

While of various shades of theological belief,—" orthodox" and "heterodox,"—the members of the family have been in general, so far as known, people of good character, and useful in a quiet way in the communities in which their lot has been cast; many of them holding positions of trust, both secular and ecclesiastical. Thus far, the author has not learned of any who have been especially a disgrace to the family; the nearest approach to it was the case of one poor fellow about two hundred years ago who was charged with having appropriated a cheese that did not belong to him. It ought not to be thought strange, if in a flock of so many hundreds, a few should have come short of what is altogether commendable; but, on the whole, the author's investigations have confirmed him in the belief that the descendants of George Weekes have a right to a just pride in their ancestors.

While few have been very poor, and while only a very small number have become wealthy,—whether poor or otherwise, no *ignis fatuus* of an "estate in England" awaiting claimants appears to have disturbed their contentment.

The general type of the family, as to physical characteristics, may be described as follows: of good stature, though not very tall; with light complexion, brown hair, sandy beard, blue or bluish-gray eyes, short nose, eyebrows somewhat prominent. Mental and moral characteristics: temperament distinctly intellectual, not passionate; of decided, self-formed opinions, expressed readily; well-informed, even when not "liberally" educated; wearing lightly the bonds of party, theological or political; not greatly ambitious, but interested in whatever concerns the public welfare; friendly and social, with a good sense of humor, though rather of the passive than the active kind; domestic in tastes and habits; deferential to woman;

with a strong sense of obligation, and faith in ideals; lacking the artistic impulse; and with the esthetic side of the nature less developed than any other. Individuals, of course, vary widely in their make-up, inheriting traits from the mother as well as from the father; but there does appear to be a distinct family type, with qualities substantially as stated.

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WILLIAM, 2 (George), b. in England, probably about 1628-0, was "admitted to ffreedome and tooke his oathe," May 3, 1665. There is no record of his admission to the church; his wife was admitted at the same time with his brother Ammiel and wife-May 18, 1656. Land was granted him by the town in 1652; in the same year he was paid for certain writing done for the town. He was fence-viewer in 1653 and in other years. In 1664, (about four years after the "Restoration,") he, with his brothers Ammiel and Joseph, and about a hundred others, signed a petition to the "General Court" (i. c., Legislature). requesting that measures be taken to have the rights and privileges of the people confirmed. In 1674, he was chosen "Clerk of the Writs," and Registrar of Births, Marriages and Deaths; and was the "bold innovator" who restored the practice of designating the months by the "heathen" names, instead of numbers. He held these offices at the time of his death, which took place December 13, 1677,—his will having been made three days before.* His widow, Elizabeth.+ married Timothy Mather as his second wife, March 20, 1678-0. On the 17th of September, 1680, she, as executrix for her late husband, William Weekes, conveyed certain lands to Capt.

[†] She may have been a daughter of Humphrey Atherton. Savage, in Geneal. Dict, of N. E., says that Atherton had a daughter "Catherine, sometimes called Elizabeth," who m. Timothy Mather in 1650 Now, as Elizabeth, wd. of Wm. Weekes, m. Timothy Mather in 1678-9, Mr. Savage may have supposed that he had married but one d. of Atherton, and that she was known by both names; while the truth was, that if Elizabeth was a d. of Atherton, he had m. the two sisters in succession.

Roger Clap, to satisfy a claim held by him against the estate.* She died Feb. 20, 1700–10, aged 70 years.

Ammiel, ^{2*} (son of *George*,) b. in England in 1633, was admitted to the church in Dorchester, with his wife Elizabeth,† May 18, 1656; was "made ffree and took his oathe" May 6, 1657. The earliest mention in the town records of his holding land, is in 1657. He was a constable in 1673; was one of a commission to run a town line in 1673, again in 1674 and 1678; he held other positions of trust at different times. It would appear from the inventory of his estate (Appendix, A. 5) that he inherited the profession of land surveyor from his father. He died April 20, 1679, aged 46. His wife Elizabeth was administrator of his estate. On the 13th of January,

There was no family named Gore in Boston at that time: John Gore, the first settler of the name, lived in Roxbury, and had no daughter Elizabeth. The only birth mentioned in the Boston records of a child named Elizabeth, who could have been in the 90th year of her age in 1723 (as was the case with the wife of Ammiel,) is that of Elizabeth, daughter of William and Elizabeth Aspinwall, b. Sept. 30, 1633; and she was not the first child born in Boston.

william Aspirual was, in 1629, deacon of the church at Charlestown, whence he removed early to Boston. Taking an active part in behalf of Mrs. Anne Hutchinson, (who was condemned and banished from the colony on account of her religious views,) he was disfranchised, disarmed and banished. He went to Rhode Island, and was the first Secretary of that colony. In 1642 he returned to Boston, and was reconciled to the church and state. He afterwards returned to England, where he died. The fact that Peter Aspinwall—probably a near relative of William, pethaps brother or son—was one of the sureties on the bond of Elizabeth Weekes, (above referred to,) gives color to the theory that she was the daughter of William Aspinwall.

1718–19, at age 85, she testified in regard to the identification of property of John Glover, and, on account of infirmity from sickness or from age, signed by affixing her mark O. She died April 10, 1723, in her 90th year.

The following are the inscriptions* on the gravestones of Ammiel and his wife, now standing in the southwest part of the old graveyard in Stoughton street, near Upham's corner, Dorchester:

The location of the land of Ammiel Weekes has not been ascertained. A tract including "Weekes' Hill," against which Thomas Davenport's land abutted, is supposed to have belonged to Ammiel; but this has not been identified.

He died at Enfield, probably not having yet removed to Northfield. His inventory was taken July 29, 1690, and the will probated Sept.

30. His widow died Aug. 12, 1690, and an account of "such things as were not taken in his inventory," was made, and filed at the same time with the probate of his will. As his will makes no mention of any children, the obvious inference is, that there were none. The West Northfield family, some account of which is given elsewhere, (Ch. X.) could not therefore have been descended from him.



GEORGE, (Ammiel, Ammiel, George,) b. Dorchester, March 20, 1689; r. to Boston, and thence in 1714 to Harwich, Barnstable Co. He m. Oct. 15, 1714, Deborah (b. May, 1687), d. of Ananias Wing. He was dismissed from the Old South Church, Boston, March 27, 1720, and joined the church at Harwich, "North Side," (now Brewster,) then under the care of Rev. Nathaniel Stone. He afterward removed to the south part of the town, where many of his descendants now live, and where he carried on a farm.

He was not "liberally" educated, but was well versed in the theological books of the day, and was very familiar with the Scriptures. In 1730, though not "ordained" by human hands, he commenced preaching to the Indians, who were located toward the south shore, and far removed from the meeting-house, which was on the north side of the parish of twenty-three square miles. Mr. W. built a house of worship for the Indians, at his own expense. Notwithstanding these facts, the pastor, Mr. Stone, objected, but does not appear to have insisted on a discontinuance. Learning, however, that Mr. W. had on one or more occasions preached to some of his white neighbors,—who no doubt were glad to assemble occasionally on a week-day or a stormy Sabbath, for religious instruction

and conference,-being, as they were, so far removed from their regular place of Sabbath worship,—Mr. Stone evidently thought that the dignity and importance of his office were at stake, and wrote to the "offender" a letter of admonition, in which he "minded him of the case of Uzza and Uzziah, who ventured on what belonged only to the priests." He also afterwards complained to the church in regard to the matter, taking these among other grounds: that "the commission in Matt. 28: 10 cannot be given to people in common, but to some distinguished qualified persons"; that Mr. W. had "no more if so much as early common education"; that "the making of the ministers of the lowest of the people is in scriptures disallowed"; that he had "thrust himself into the ministry"; that he had "preached to a people of whom I have the pastoral charge, without my leave, and against my declared mind"; that if one may preach to a part of "my flock," another may preach to another part, and "what then becomes of the pastoral office?" "yea, where is any flock for me to feed?" There does not appear to have been any charge of want of orthodoxy, or of any attempt to injure the influence of the pastor, or to keep any of "the flock" from the regular ministrations of the pastor. How gladly would the ministers of the present day welcome such a co-laborer; but we should not judge the men of the past too severely in the light of the present.

Some years later, Mr. W. seems to have taken pity upon an unfortunate woman,—probably more sinned against than sinning,—and taken her with her child into his own house, giving her shelter and employment, and treating her kindly. Some took offense at this, and would not come to the Lord's table with him; in view of which state of feeling he absented himself from the communion, presumably in order not to keep others away. On being called to account for his absence, he made explanations which were accepted by the church as in a measure satisfactory; but at the same time he was advised

"to dismiss the woman" from his house, and to "avoid her conversation as much as is convenient, or at least inform us of your reasons which prevent you from doing this if you think proper." There seems to have been no charge against him of any impropriety, except so far as his kindness to the unfortunate woman was deemed to be such; and whatever explanation he may have made seems to have been accepted. He, a plain unassuming man, was far in advance of his time in his ideas of the duties and privileges which belong to each member of Christ's flock; and he appears to have possessed more of the spirit of his Master than did some of those who found fault with him.

The fault found with him by the minister and others, for doing what he considered his Christian duty and privilege, in regard to both matters, was no doubt a principal cause of the clouding of his mind in the latter part of his life, which led to aimless wanderings about the country. He died from exposure to cold in the low ground south of Harwich Academy, known from the circumstance as "Weekes's Hollow" to the present day—being then over eighty years old.

A sermon preached by him in 1726, on occasion of the remarkable preservation of Ebenezer Taylor, who was buried for ten hours in a deep well, has been recently reprinted; with an essay entitled "A Parent's Advice to his Children," (in which he declaims and argues very earnestly against the great sins of wearing periwigs, and of extravagance in dress); also a sketch of his life by Sidney Brooks, a descendant.

It is related of him,—as showing his mechanical genius, and as illustrating the strictness of the views then prevalent in regard to the Sabbath,—that at a house where he, then a mere boy, stopped with his father to rest, on their seven miles walk to "meeting," on the "North side," he so carefully examined a wooden spoon, that he was able, with his father's tools, to produce a fac-simile on Monday; and that his father, while expressing admiration of his work, reproved him for breaking the Sabbath by his study of the model on the Lord's day. He fell from the hay-mow in his barn, and broke his neck, May 8, 1815.



JOSEPH, 3 (Ammiel, George,) b. at Dorchester, Sept. 3, bp. Sept. 8, 1667; m. Sarah (b. Feb. 14, 1662), d. of William Sumner, Jr., and s. of Deliverance (w. of his bro. Ebenezer), and widow of Joseph Turell, of Boston, (by whom she had Sarah, b. Oct., 1670, and Humphrey, b. May, 1681.) Joseph Weeks and his wife were admitted to the church, June 16, 1693. He was a "webster" (or weaver), by occupation. He was clerk of a military company in 1689; a constable in 1711. His wife d. Feb. 12, 1735-6; he d. Jan. 8, 1745-6; his real estate was divided between his sons Joseph and Ebenezer, who paid off the shares of their sisters. The "home lot" corresponded with the block now bounded by Washington, Norfolk, Withington and Euclid streets, (except the lot occupied by the old Dorchester Town Hall, now used as a Ward Room.) The house was on the east side, about midway between Norfolk and Euclid streets. The "pasture" of 18 acres, 1 qr., 25 r., and the field of 2 a., 2 qr., 24 r. (named in the inventory of his estate, Appendix, A. 8), together formed a parallelogram (except an irregularity at the southeast corner), bounded easterly by what is now Cemetery street, northerly by a line running from Cemetery street along the south side of the Catholic cemetery and so on to Lyons street, westerly by

Lyons street and the line of the same southerly to Jones avenue, southerly by Jones avenue and the line of the same extended easterly to Norfolk street, and southeasterly by Norfolk street. The "Dorchester" station of the N. Y. and N. E. R. R., is on this tract. The field of about 2\frac{1}{2} acres occupied the central one-third of the north part of the tract, and extended about two-fifths of the distance across it toward the south: the stone wall which inclosed this field at the time of Joseph Weeks's death, remained standing for about 130 years.* The inscription on the gravestone of Mrs. Weeks, in the old Dorchester graveyard, reads thus: "Here lyes buried ye body of Mrs. Sarah Weeks, wife to Mr. Joseph Weeks. She died Feb. 12, 1735, aged 74 years." The gravestones of her daughters Hannah and Experience are standing near her own.

EBENEZER, 5 (Ebenezer, Joseph, Ammiel, George.) b. Pomfret, Aug. 5 (16. new style), 1741; m. at New London, Feb. 2, 1764, Eunice (b. Feb. 1, 1742), youngest d. of Rev. George and Elizabeth (Lee) Griswold,* of Lyme, Conn.; l. at New London; r. to Brooklyn, 1777; to Steuben, Oneida Co., N. Y., 1791,—having, by deed of April 1, 1789, sold the farm of 160 acres, inherited from his father, to Capt. Joseph Scarborough, for £463, 10 s. in cash, and an annuity of £9 to be paid to his mother Anna Weeks during her life. (The farm lies partly in Brooklyn and partly in Pomfret, about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. E. from the village of Brooklyn, and in 1882 was owned and occupied by Lewis White.) His wife was admitted to the

church in Brooklyn, Feb. 20, 1791, a short time before their removal to Steuben; she d. at Steuben, Oct. 6, 1762; in 1797 he m. Olive, d. of Sampson Keyes, of Ashford, Conn.; he d. July 6, 1813; she d. in Vt. in 1817. The cellar dug and walled up by himself and son Ebenezer, at Steuben, in still in use, though with a later-built house over it, about two miles west from the village of Remsen. The graves of himself, wife, and son Ebenezer, are on the farm, a short distance from the house. He held the office of Justice of the Peace,—was known as "Squire Weeks," and frequently acted as umpire for his neighbors, who were in the habit of referring their disputes to him instead of going to law. No record of church membership has been found; but the records show that he was interested in the support of the gospel,—being frequently one of the "Committee" of the ecclesiastical society, and clerk at meetings of the society. He was also much interested in school matters.

At a suitable age, he was apprenticed to a printer at Whitestown (now Whitesborough), N. Y. A change in the business caused a removal to Lansingburgh; he purchased a portion of his term, and worked as a journeyman before or while preparing for college. He made a public confession of Christ, Nov. 6, 1803. He entered the College of New Jersey at Princeton in 1806, as a sophomore, and graduated with high honor in

1809, the three highest-of whom he was one, and the valedictorian,—being designated as "pari honore," (of equal honor.) He was employed as a tutor in the college for a short time; entered the Theological Seminary at Andover, Mass., in June, 1810; his stay, however, was very brief. His first sermons recorded in his Journal of Preaching (which was carefully kept during his life) were preached Feb. 10, 1811, at Cornwall, Vt., from Jer. 8: 20, and Jer. 7: 8. In December of that year he was called to the pastorate of the Presbyterian church at Plattsburgh, N. Y., and was ordained there Feb. 16, 1812,* and promised a salary of \$500 per annum. The disturbances caused by the war, prevented the church from fulfilling its contract, and he preached his last sermon there in June, 1814. Early in 1815, he took charge of Morris Academy, at Litchfield South Farms (now the town of Morris), in Connecticut. William and Edward, sons of Rev. Lyman Beecher, D. D., (then pastor of the church at Litchfield,) were among his pupils. The latter gratefully recognizes, and has expressed to the author, his great indebtedness to his teacher for his own accurate and thorough classical and biblical knowledge. the autumn of 1818, Mr. W. removed to Clinton, Oneida Co., N. Y., where he was engaged in teaching until July, 1820, when he took charge of the church at Paris Hill, in an adjoining town. He remained here until the summer of 1831teaching a school the last two years, in addition to his pastoral duties. In August he removed to Utica, teaching a school and preaching to a little church in the western suburbs. Early in the summer of 1832, he removed to Newark, N. J., having accepted a call to the pastorate of the Fourth Presbyterian Church at that place. In 1837, his income from this source being inadequate, he opened a school in his own house, which grew to be a large and flourishing school for a time. His

health becoming precarious, and the church becoming weak, he preached his last sermon (so intended) Sept. 7, 1845, from 2 Tim. 4:6-8. He continued teaching a few pupils until the autumn of 1847—his last work of this kind being the preparation for college of Wm. S. Karr, (Rev., D. D.,) now Prof. in the Theological Seminary at Hartford, Conn. During the most of his active life, he was both preacher and teacher: preaching somewhere on the Sabbath when in charge of a school; and often teaching young men in his own house while doing pastoral work. In theology he was a "Hopkinsian Calvinist"; in regard to church government, theoretically a Congregationalist, though generally serving as pastor to Presbyterian churches. He seldom wrote his sermons in full, but preached from a carefully-studied "brief," witten in shorthand; making free use of quotations from the Bible. As a teacher, he was thorough, aiming to train his pupils to think, not merely to absorb. He had a useful knowledge of eight or ten languages, ancient and modern. He was a frequent contributor to the religious periodicals of the day. He was the author of "Pilgrim's Progress in the Nineteenth Century," "Nine Sermons on the Decrees and Agency of God," "Scripture Catechism," "First Lessons in Greek," "Missionary Arithmetic," and a series of "Short Tracts." His "First Lessons in Latin" was printed on a domestic press by his sons, for use in his school at Newark. He was decided and outspoken on the great moral, theological and political questions of the day: an anti-mason; an early advocate of total abstinence; an earnest and outspoken "abolitionist," he had the honor of being interrupted by a mob while preaching to his own congregation in Newark, on the "sin of slavery," in the summer of 1834. He was a kind, genial man; was noted for his love of little children. He was a natural mechanic; at one time he constructed the apparatus needed for illustration, in giving a course of lectures on natural philosophy. The degree of "D. D." was conferred by Williams College in 1828.





MISCELLANEOUS NOTES.

It is thought that the items under this head may be of interest.

BAPTISMS.

It will be observed, that in early times it was the custom to baptize infants as soon after birth as was found convenient; some having been baptized on the day of birth, others when a day or two old, and so on; in one instance, the fact that the ceremony was delayed for "a forthnight," seemed to be worthy of note on the record. There may have been something of the idea of "baptismal regeneration," or of the notion that baptism is necessary to salvation, though perhaps not clearly defined, or not consciously acknowledged.

MARRIAGES.

The earlier marriages were by the magistrates, not by the ministers. This may have been by way of protest against the claim that marriage is a "sacrament."

NAMES.

Among the earlier names we find some specimens of the so-called "Puritan" nomenclature; such as, Deliverance, Experience, Grace, Mercy, Mindwell, Peace, Prudence, Renew, Repent, Submit, Supply, Thankful; also some Bible names not common in modern times; such as, Ammiel, Artemas,

Damaris, Deborah, Dinah, Dorcas, Eli, Eliakim, Ezekiel, Hezekiah, Jabez, Jared, Keziah, Lemuel, Lot, Narcissa, Obed, Ruama, Uriah. Besides these, we find some of the old-fashioned abbreviations; such as, Abby, Betsey, Betty, Sally, as well as more modern ones, like Addie, Carrie, Hattie, etc-There are also some "fancy" names; such as, Ardelia, Arvilla, Elizie, Lepha, Orzellous, Rocelia, Rosalthe, Rosilla, etc.

Middle names were not common until the present century. The earliest instance in the family was Joseph Weeks Withington,* b. 1759. The earliest Weeks with a middle name, was Silas R. (906), b. 1765; the next, Joseph H. (692), b. 1776. Only ten had middle names previous to A. D. 1800. The use of middle names, though common in Italy and 'Germany from an early date, has become frequent among English-speaking people only during the present century. A very few instances are known as having occurred as early as the latter part of the 13th century. In 1723, of 4900 voters at at an election in Lincolnshire, England, only five had double names. At an election in Yorkshire in 1829, there were but 87 such out of 1282 voters. No student at Dartmouth College, N. H., graduated with two names until 1776.



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
None are now living of generations previous to the 7th; of this generation, 43 are living, the eldest of whom, JOHN (1062) was b. in 1798, and the youngest, WILLIAM LYMAN (1101) was b. in 1834.

Such further information as has been obtained in regard to the foregoing settlers and their descendants, is given in the following pages.

JOHN, from Staines, Middlesex, England, where he had brothers Thomas, Robert, William,-said to have been related to Capt. Miles Standish,—was at Plymouth in 1635; was made freeman in 1636; in 1638 he sold his property there and removed to the island of Aquidneck, near Portsmouth, N. H. He was a follower of Samuel Gorton: made himself obnoxious to the authorities of the Massachusetts colony by his peculiar religious and political notions; was imprisoned for a time with Gorton and others; after being set at liberty, he went to Rhode Island, and settled in what is now Warwick, being one of the original purchasers from the Indians in 1642-3. He was killed by the Indians in King Philip's war, 1675. He had a son John: no record has been found of any other. His descendants are found in that region and elsewhere, and write the name Wickes or Wicks. In the only instance found by the author, where the name appears to be a copy of his signature, the form is Wickes.

THOMAS, of Watertown, was probably the same with "Thomas, aged 23," above mentioned. He finally settled at Huntington, L. I. A further account of him and his family will be found in subsequent pages.

Francis, of Salem, finally settled at Oyster Bay, L. I. Further notice of him and his descendants will be found later.

THOMAS, of Charlestown, was there in 1636; his w. Alice was admitted to the church Feb. 12, 1636; he r. to Salem in 1639; d. 1656; his wd. m. Nicholas Potter. Thomas had d. Bethia (b. 1642, m. John Archer), and Hannah (b. 1644, m. John Pickman); no sons; was a turner.

WILLIAM, of Boston, purchased a house and lot from John Sweet in 1644. He may have been the same who was at Salem in 1646.

JOSEPH was a landholder in Kent Co., Md., 1650; how long before that date is not known. His descendants are found in that state at the present time. He may have been the same with "Jo, tanner," before named.

ZACHARY, was admitted freeman in the Massachusetts colony in 1652; nothing further is known of him.

WILLIAM and JOHN, probably brothers, of Falmouth, Mass., appear there in 1662 and 1675. Some further account of them will be found in subsequent pages.

LEONARD and WILLIAM, probably brothers, appear at Portsmouth, N. H., 1656 and 1674, respectively. A further account of them is given later.

CHRISTOPHER, Boston, 1694, had wife Mary, and children: Christopher, b. Sept. 24, 1695; Mary. b. Sept. 29, 1697. No further record has been found.

RICHARD, of Attleborough, was probably identical with Richard, who emigrated from England in 1690. A record of his family is given later.

While, as has been stated, there have been, and are now, in England, different families of the name, having no connection with each other, and while there seems to be reason to believe that more than one of these were represented among the early settlers, yet it seems probable that some of the original immigrants were closely related to each other.

GEORGE, THOMAS and FRANCIS, were probably brothers; they all wrote their name WEEKES; they all came from England, and to Boston harbor, in the same year—1635; traditions among their descendants claim brotherhood; marked resemblances among their posterity tend to corroborate the theory. JOSEPH, who left England the same year, was probably the brother of these, who is said to have been drowned in landing. WILLIAM and JOHN, of Falmouth, may have been nephews of those named above; family likenesses among descendants indicate a probable relationship.

No records have thus far been found, showing from what particular place or places in England any of these early settlers came, except in the case of JOHN, of Plymouth, whose name was probably WICKES.

THOMAS WEEKES,

OF HUNTINGTON, L. I.*

[Name generally written Wickes by his descendants.]

THOMAS WEEKES (probably a brother of GEORGE, of Dorchester, of Mass., and FRANCIS, of Oyster Bay, L. I.) "aged 23," left England Nov. 20, 1635; came at first to Watertown, Mass., whence he went soon to Wethersfield, Conn.; then to Hadley, Mass., where he remained but a short time, returning to Wethersfield; he r. to Stamford, of which he was one of the original proprietors in 1640; r. to Long Island, and settled at Huntington. In 1662 he was admitted freeman and chosen constable. In April, 1663, he was one of three whose names were sent to Hartford for the Court to appoint two of them magistrates. He was one of the patentees in 1666. He m. Isabella, d. of Richard Harcutt, of Oyster Bay. His children, as below, were named in his will, dated June 30, 1670. He d. in 1671. He gives to his son Thomas, certain designated pieces of land; to Rebecca 40s., to her three children 20s. each; to Martha £4, and to her children 20s. each. The widow, and son John, were named as executors.

His sons changed the spelling of the name to WICKES, perhaps to distinguish themselves from the sons of Francis bearing the same names in the adjoining town of Oyster Bay; and this form is retained by his descendants, with few exceptions, so far as known.

^{*}It was not in the plan of the author, to include in this work the history of any family but that of his own ancestor; but at the solicitation of Mrs. Charles L. Alden, of Troy, N. Y., who had been for some time collecting data in regard to the family of Thomas, of Huntington, the results of her labors are inserted. The author is indebted to Dr. Stephen Wickes, of Orange, N. J., for valuable information,—the history of Eliphalet [16] and his descendants especially.

Many of the items in the early records are fragmentary and disconnected, and have been arranged according to apparent probability.

Many of the family are now to be found on Long Island, and in the counties along the Hudson River, some families having removed to the Hudson river valley on the evacuation of Long Island by the American army, in the Revolution.

The marriages and baptisms from 1723 to 1779, are mostly taken from a record kept by Rev. Ebenezer Prime, who was pastor of the church at Huntington during that period.

THOMAS,2 (Thomas,) b. probably in Oyster Bay, 1650 or 1651 (his age being stated in a deposition given by him in 1676, as "about 25 years"): probably the same as Thomas, "Ir.," who with w. FRANCIS WEEKES,

OF OYSTER BAY, L. I.,

In reasonable probability, a brother of GEORGE, of Dorchester, and of THOMAS, of Huntington, came from England in the same year with them—1635, and located at Salem, Mass. Sympathizing with Roger Williams, he went to Providence in 1636, being then about twenty years of age,* where he married Elizabeth Luther. He held the office of secretary of the colony. After 1641, he removed to New York, where three of his children were born. A plantation lot in Gravesend, L. I., was granted him, Aug. 10, 1648. In 1650, he was in Oyster Bay, L. I., and became a joint proprietor. He had children-Samuel, Joseph, John, Thomas, James, Elizabeth (m. Nicholas Simkins), Ann (m. Joseph Carpenter), Daniel: the names of five sons appear among the purchasers of additional lands from the Indians in 1685. His will (now in possession of John A. Weekes, Esq., a descendant, who owns the old homestead) is dated June 25, 1687. His descendants are numerous on Long Island, in New York City, and along the lower Hudson, with some in Connecticut and southern New Jersey. Some retain the old form of name-WEEKES, though the majority use the shorter form. The name is spelled in a variety of ways in the public records—Weekes, Weeks, Wicks, Wickes, and Wyckes; consequently the form of name cannot be depended on as proving the family connection.

NATHANIEL WEEKS.

The following history of the families in Hardwick and the neighboring towns of Ware and Petersham, was obtained, for the most part, in view of what seemed a strong probability that they were a branch of the family of George, of Dorchester; but when the evidence was found that such was not the fact, it was thought best to preserve such history as fully as it had been procured.

As nothing in regard to Nathaniel and his family, beyond the births of his children, is found in the Falmouth records,—and as a group with several of the same names, some of them of about the same ages, appears in the towns above named,—there seems to be no doubt but that the families are identical.

Samuel Haines (a descendant in the male line from Robert, Earl of Cornwall, brother of William the Conqueror), who settled at Winnicut (now in Greenland) in 1667. Leonard had children—John, 1668; Samuel ["Capt."], 1670 (m. his cousin Elinor Haines); Joseph, 1672; Joshua, 1674; Mary, 1676; Jonathan; and by second wife Elizabeth he had Margaret and Sarah, twins, 1679. He d. 1707. His descendants are numerous in New Hampshire and Maine; still, there are families in both these states whose connection with him has not been traced.

WILLIAM, at Portsmouth, testified, July 21, 1674, that he was 45 years old or thereabouts. He may have been a brother of Leonard. The Weekses of Kittery, Me., are thought to be his descendants; he may have been the ancestor of some of the Maine families whose line has not been traced.

The following families and persons are of the Portsmouth stock—mostly from the family of Leonard, though some may be descendants from William.*

Dec. 15, 1831, d. 1854), Cleveland G. (b. Dec. 18, 1833, Russell, Kan., 1885), Montraville (b. April 1, 1836, d. 1856), Helen M. (b. Feb. 9, 1840, Springfield, Ill., 1885), Edwin P. (b. Jonathan, (probably s. of Friend, of Norwich, above) r. from Woodbury (now Washington), Conn., to Wyoming, Pa., with w. Abigail, sons Jonathan, Thomas, Philip, Bartholomew, and two daughters, Abigail and another. The four sons named were in Wilkesbarre as settlers and original proprietors in 1770. Jesse (relationship unknown) was there in 1771. Jonathan, Jr., Philip, Bartholomew, and the two sons-in-law, were killed in the Wyoming massacre, July 3, 1778. The father and mother, with the grandchildren, were spared, and allowed to select a wagon and oxen, with which they returned to Connecticut. Some of the grandchildren afterward went back to their home in Pa. The children of Jonathan, Jr., were John (Greenfield, Saratoga Co., N. Y., 1795), Jerusha (in 1795 w. of Christopher Hyde, of Clinton, Duchess Co., N. Y.), Sarah, Joseph (at Greenfield, N. Y., 1795), Benjamin (twin with Joseph). The children of Philip (and w. Abigail, who m. 2d. Ishmael Bennett) were Lydia, Huldah (m. Comfort Carey), Philip (m. Aug. 1804, Amelia, d. of Capt. Robert Durkee, who was slain in

the massacre), who was at Wilkesbarre in 1795, Luther. In 1788, Philip, Jr., chose Thomas Weeks as guardian. Bartholomew had s. Thomas. There was another Jonathan (perhaps a nephew of Jonathan, senior), of Springfield, Pa., who devised lands to his three daughters, Lydia, Abigail, and Elizabeth (w. of Nathan Waller.) Lydia (perhaps d. of Philip) m. Silas Benedict, and d. 1796. Abigail m. Douglas Davidson, and was a widow in 1796. Thomas and w. Elizabeth were l. at Wilkesbarre in 1795. Abigail, wd. of Jonathan, senior, made her will in 1788, and d. 1796. There was a Daniel Weeks at Wyoming in 1797 and later.

Benjamin, s. of Jonathan, Jr. (above), was seven years old at the time of the massacre. He learned the trade of tanner and currier in Conn.; l. at Danbury; m. Ruth Smith; r. to Western New York in 1796; finally settled at Penfield, Monroe Co. He had John R., Benjamin B., George W., Ard D. (Penfield, 1883), David, Jane, Huldah. Benjamin B. had Orlo J. (Webster, N. Y., 1883), Loren R. Loren R. (Rochester, N. Y., 1883) has Herbert L., Percy B., Frank B., Clarence V., Orlo J. W., Jessie M. William H., Webster, N. Y., is s. of John R. The family is remarkable for being left-handed.

Zadoc, (b. 1771, d. 1833), Warren, Conn., had brothers Uriah, Shubael, and children,—Ansel (b. 1793, d. 1813), Horace (b. 1795, d. 1816), Alva (b. 1797), Deming (b. 1799, d. 1824), Hiram (b. 1802), Angeline (b. 1804), Lavinia (b. 1806), Irene (b. 1808), Hannah (b. 1810, d. 1813), Lucy (b. 1812). Alva (Warren, Conn., 1883) has sons Merritt, Deming, William, Henry. Hiram (Washington, Conn., 1883) has son Eli D. (Litchfield, Conn.), and daughters Emma A. (Evitts), at New Milford, and Chloe, Nancy, Esther, at Marbledale.

William A. (Rochester, N. Y., 1884), is s. of William (b. Pomfret, Conn., 1801), s. of Joseph, who had also David, Samuel, Joseph, Elizabeth, Mary, and brother Amos.



APPENDIX.

A.

ANCIENT DOCUMENTS.

The following are copies from the original papers; made by the author (except Nos. 5, 13 and 14). The mode of spelling and the use of capital letters and points have been carefully followed. In those early times there was no accepted standard of spelling; and it is found that the spelling varies in the same document, even when the writer was apparently a fairly-educated man for his time. Some of these differences, however, are the result of ignorance or want of care.

The letter u is quite generally found where we should use v, and the latter is often found where we should write u: but this interchange is not uniform.

Neither is the use of y^r for the, invariable: it will be observed that it is not used at all in Jane Humphrey's will. The character resembling our y, is simply a character for th, and is used in the older documents wherever the sound represented occurs, whether at the beginning or in the middle of words: and in these it was written just like y, as in later writings. The pronunciation was the, not ye.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT.

Articles of agreement indented made and concluded this fourth Day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, by and between Capt. Jonathan Weeks of Marlborough in the County of Middlesex and Commonwealth of Massachusetts on one part, and Heman Seaver of Groton in the County of Middlesex aforesaid on the other part, Witnesseth,

That I Jonathan Weeks do put my son David Weeks as an Apprentiss to Heman Seaver, to learn the Art, trade or Calling of felt making or Hatting and I agree that he shall faithfully serve the said Seaver till he shall arive to the full age of twenty one years which is about four years and six months excepting two months in each year viz. from the fifteenth of June till the fifteenth of August he shall be in the employ and under the command of his father and I the said Weeks do agree to find him all his Clothes till he is twenty one years of age; excepting four pair of thin shoes two fine shirts one pair of stockings hats and handsome wastcoats and Breeches till he shall arive to twenty one years of age and to find him arms Accutrements and uniform Clothing for Military Duty.

And I the said Heman Seaver do agree to employ the said David in the hatting Business and do my endeavour to instruct him in the same and find him sufficient meat Drink washing and lodging and Dotering and Nursing when sick excepting from the fifteenth of June till the fifteenth of August every year when he is under the care of his father and I agree to find him one pair of thin shoes every year for four years to come and to find him two fine Shirts and one pair of Handsome Stockings and handsome waistcoats and Breeches and hats for Meeting till he shall arive to twenty one years of age and I agree to give him three Months Schooling during said time.

To the true and faithful performance of the several Covenants and agreements aforesaid, the parties aforesaid do hereby respectively bind themselves and there respective hears executors and administrators each to the other, his executors and Administrators to the full discharge of the above agreements. NOTES FROM DORCHESTER CHURCH RECORDS.

In the early times, families did not sit together, as now; but individuals were assigned seats according to their supposed dignity—a committee being appointed from time to time by the "society" for the purpose. The young men and boys were usually seated in the gallery, when such existed; and suitable persons were appointed to "look after" them.

In the back part of the old book of Dorchester Church Records, are given the "seatings" in the meeting house. The date of this assignment is not given; but an examination of dates of marriages and deaths shows that it was probably made in 1691.

In the body of the house, "Widow Weeks" was the third in order in the third seat of the women, old seating; in the new seating, the first in order.

Joseph Weeks's wife† is the first named in the sixth seat in the body of the house, new seating.

Joseph Weeks‡ was the seventh in order of the ten men in the first seat in the south part of the east gallery, old seating; new seating, the fourth in order.

The wife of Joseph Weeks was the fourth in order in the second seat next the pulpit in the west or women's gallery, in both the old and new seating.

Elizabeth Weeks\$ was the sixth in order, in both seatings.

Names of persons to be catechised, in 1676, include Ammiel Weeks, aged 13; Ebenezer, 11; Joseph, 8; Mary, 20; Elizabeth, 18; Thankful, 15; Renew, 14; Jane, 12; Sarah, 8.

And now for the settling of my Temporal Estate, & such Goods, Chattles & Debts as it hath pleased God to bestow upon me—

I do order, give & dispose the same in manner & form following (that is to say), first, I will that all those Debts & as I owe in right or conscience to any manner of person or persons whatsoever, shall be well & truly contented and paid, or ordained to be paid within convenient time after my decease by my executors hereafter named.

Item—I give & bequeath to my well-beloved wife Hannah, a good bed & all its furniture, and the sum of \pounds 60 to be paid her out of the produce of the estate.

Item—I give to my son Joseph the sum of £5 over & above his equal share with his other brothers & sisters.

Item—I give & bequeath to my son Daniel a certain Lott of salt meadow at the South end, and all my right of upland, being what I bought of Samuel Wickes & paid him £11 for, lying at Sautuiague, to be & Remain to him, my said son Daniel, his heirs & assigns forever, & my will is that my said son Daniel shall have 11 lbs. less out of my other Estate than his other Brothers & Sisters, in consideration of his having the above said meadow and land; & further my will is that all the remainder of my estate of whatever kind or nature soever, both moveable & immovable—to be sold & equally

divided among my six children—Joseph, Daniel, Alexander, Ezekial, Jesse & Hannah: & further my will is, that if any of my children chance to dye before they come to lawful age to receive their parts or shares of my estate, their parts or shares so dying shall be equally divided among them that survive; & lastly I do nominate & constitute & appoint my trusty and loving Friends John Platt & Joseph Lewis to be Executors of this my last Will & Testament, giving & granting them jointly & severally full power to dispose of & sell my Estate both real & personal, & to give Conveyances according to law in as full & ample manner as I myself could have done in my lifetime, & in all respects to do what is requisite & necessary for the fulfilling this my last Will & Testament.

WILL OF DANIEL WICKES,4 (Joseph, Thomas, Thomas).

[It will be observed that the name is spelled in three different ways.]

In the name of God, Amen. I, Daniel Wyckes, of Charlotte Precinct, in Dutchess county, in the state of New York, being of sound and perfect mind and memory—blessed be Almighty God—therefore considering the uncertainty of this mortal life, do make and publish this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following, that is to say:—

I give my soul to God, who gave it—in hopes of a glorious immortal resurrection in and through the merits and sufferings of Jesus Christ, and my body to the dust from which it was taken, to be buried in a decent manner, at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named; and as to what worldly estate it hath pleased God to bless me with, I dispose of in the following manner:—

It is my will that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid by my Executors out of my moveable estate. Item, I give to my beloved wife Rebecca Wicks the two best beds and furniture belonging to them, that I shall die possessed of,—also at the disposal of my moveable estate by my executors, two of the best cows, and ten good sheep.

Also, I give to my son Jacob, £,60 in money.

I also give to my son Joel Wicks £,80.

Also I give to my daughter Rebecca Wicks £50, and the two next best beds and their furniture.

Also I give to my daughter Elizabeth Wicks $\pounds 50$ and the two next best beds and their furniture.

I also give to my daughter Hanna Wickes £50, and the two next best beds and their furniture:—All of which sums of money shall be in lawful money of New York, and to be paid as soon as conveniently can be after the disposal of my estate by my Executors.

Also it is my will and pleasure that my said wife Rebecca Wicks shall have the use and improvement of all my estate, both real and personal, that I shall die possessed of, after the just debts being paid, for the support and for bringing up and educating my two youngest children, until the same be sold; and I will that all my estate, both real and personal, I shall die possessed of (except the beds as before disposed of) be sold at the discretion of my executors, and the interest and one third part of the money arising from the sale of my estate, I give to my said wife Rebecca Wicks during her remaining my widow, in lieu and satisfaction of her thirds or rights of dower to my estate.

Also, I give and bequeath to my eight children, and their heirs and assigns forever, the money arising from the sale of my estate,—viz. Jacob Wickes, Zophar Wickes, Silas Wickes, Rebecca Wickes, Joel Wickes, Elizabeth Wickes, David Wickes, and Hannah Wickes, share and share alike,—except my sons Jacob, Zophar, Silas, Joel, and David, to have each twice as much as either of my daughters, Rebecca, Elizabeth, and Hannah, exclusive of the sums of money, &c., given them as above. But if any or either of them, my said children, shall die unmarried or without lawful issue, I will that his or her share or their share or proportion so dying unmarried, or without issue, shall be divided equally, share and share alike, among the survivors.

Lastly, I do nominate, constitute and appoint my said wife Rebecca Wicks and my sons Jacob Wicks and Silas Wicks and Isaac Bloom, Executors of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all former wills by me heretofore made.

In witness thereof, I hereby set my hand and seal this 15th day of July in the year of our Lord 1784.

Groves and gardens softly shaded, Stately mansions, snowy white;— But, alas, the vision faded, Faded from my ravished sight.


Then I grew so faint and tired,






















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
