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1. The following is a quotation of the appropriate paragraphs of 35 U.S.C. 102 that form the basis for the rejections under this section made in this Office action:

A person shall be entitled to a patent unless –

(e) the invention was described in (1) an application for patent, published under section 122(b), by another filed in the United States before the invention by the applicant for patent or (2) a patent granted on an application for patent by another filed in the United States before the invention by the applicant for patent, except that an international application filed under the treaty defined in section 351(a) shall have the effects for purposes of this subsection of an application filed in the United States only if the international application designated the United States and was published under Article 21(2) of such treaty in the English language.

2. Claim 1 is rejected under 35 U.S.C. 102(e) as being clearly anticipated by Lee et al. (U.S. Patent 6,429,049), particularly column 4, lines 1-4 therein.

3. The following is a quotation of 35 U.S.C. 103(a) which forms the basis for all obviousness rejections set forth in this Office action:

(a) A patent may not be obtained though the invention is not identically disclosed or described as set forth in section 102 of this title, if the differences between the subject matter sought to be patented and the prior art are such that the subject matter as a whole would have been obvious at the time the invention was made to a person having ordinary skill in the art to which said subject matter pertains. Patentability shall not be negated by the manner in which the invention was made.

4. Claims 13 and 14 are rejected under 35 U.S.C. 103(a) as being unpatentable over Lee et al.

The Lee patent discloses in general a process of making vias for semiconductor packaging including a step of exposing a copper oxide surface to a laser beam to remove oxide until a copper surface is exposed. More specifically, Lee column 4, lines 49-62 appear to disclose a process in accord with the present claims. While Lee does not specify the dielectric constant of the insulating layer in the prior art, this would appear to be a material property of a given substance. Because the actual substances used in the prior art and the claimed invention

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may be the same, the process as claimed would fall within the purview of what is described by Lee et al.

Consequently, a prima facie case of obviousness is established between the disclosure of Lee et al. and the process as presently claimed.

5. In a response filed June 9, 2003, Applicant alleges that the present invention can be distinguished from Lee in that the instant claims require "forming a wafer containing inlaid copper". In response, the examiner submits that a "wafer" involves nothing more than a thin flat layer, and that drawing feature 212 on Figure 8 of Lee discloses a wafer. Drawing feature 212a of Lee would in this case be the inlaid copper. Thus, no patentable distinction is seen between the disclosure of Lee et al. and the claimed invention.

6. Claims 8 and 9 are rejected under 35 U.S.C. 103(a) as being unpatentable over Lee et al. in view of Pramanick et al. (U.S Patent 6,143,650). This is a new ground of rejection.

The Lee et al. patent does not specify the temperature and time as recited in the instant claims. Claims 10 and 11 of Pramanick et al. indicate the presently claimed temperature and time to be conventionally used in the art of laser annealing of copper layers. Thus, to practice the Lee et al. process under the parameters as defined in the instant claims would have been considered an obvious expedient to one of ordinary skill in the art, given the disclosure of Pramanick et al.

7. In the June 9, 2003 response, Applicant stated that the examiner's previous rejection of these claims based on Lee et al. alone provided no facts upon which to predicate the conclusion


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that one having ordinary skill in the art would have been realistically motivated to arrive at the parameters as defined in claims 8 and 9. The examiner believes that the above-cited Pramanick disclosure remedies any deficiencies which may be present in the Lee patent with regard to instant claims 8 and 9.

8. Claims 2-7 and 10-12 are objected to as being dependent upon a rejected base claim, but would be allowable if rewritten in independent form including all of the limitations of the base claim and any intervening claims.
