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Applicant's election with traverse of Species A in the reply filed on 09/24/04 is acknowledged. However, there has been no ground of traverse. The requirement is still deemed proper and is therefore made FINAL

Applicant's election of Species A (claims 21, 22, 24, 31-35, 38, 39, 41, 43-45 and 48-52) in the reply filed on 09/24/04 is acknowledged. Because applicant did not distinctly and specifically point out the supposed errors in the restriction requirement, the election has been treated as an election without traverse (MPEP § 818.03(a)).

Claims 23, 25-30, 36, 37, 40, 42, 46, 47, 53 and 54 are withdrawn from further consideration pursuant to 37 CFR 1.142(b) as being drawn to nonelected species, there being no allowable generic or linking claim.

The nonstatutory double patenting rejection is based on a judicially created doctrine grounded in public policy (a policy reflected in the statute) so as to prevent the unjustified or improper timewise extension of the "right to exclude" granted by a patent and to prevent possible harassment by multiple assignees. See *In re Goodman*, 11 F.3d 1046, 29 USPQ2d 2010 (Fed. Cir. 1993); *In re Longi*, 759 F.2d 887, 225 USPQ 645 (Fed. Cir. 1985); *In re Van Ornum*, 686 F.2d 937, 214 USPQ 761 (CCPA 1982); *In re Vogel*, 422 F.2d 438, 164 USPQ 619 (CCPA 1970); and, *In re Thorington*, 418 F.2d 528, 163 USPQ 644 (CCPA 1969).

A timely filed terminal disclaimer in compliance with 37 CFR 1.321(c) may be used to overcome an actual or provisional rejection based on a nonstatutory double patenting ground provided the conflicting application or patent is shown to be commonly owned with this application. See 37 CFR 1.130(b).

Effective January 1, 1994, a registered attorney or agent of record may sign a terminal disclaimer. A terminal disclaimer signed by the assignee must fully comply with 37 CFR 3.73(b).

Claims 31, 32, 34, 38, 39, 43 and 48-50 are rejected under the judicially created doctrine of obviousness-type double patenting as being unpatentable over claims 18 and 46 of U.S. Patent No. 6,281, 952. Although the conflicting claims are not identical, they are not patentably distinct from each other because all of the recited features of the

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instant claims are disclosed in the above patent claims. Therefore, the instant claims are broader in scope than the patent claims and are anticipated by the patent claims. Also, it would have been obvious to a person of ordinary skill in the art to broaden the scope of the patent claims by omitting the structure details of the LCD of the patent claims. As to claims 43 and 48-50, the purpose of using color filters of different brightness in the light transmitting and light reflecting display sections is to compensate for differences in the number of times light passes through the liquid crystal layer in the light transmitting and light reflecting display sections, as apparent to a person of ordinary skill in the art.

Claims 24, 33, 35, 51 and 52 are provisionally rejected under the judicially created doctrine of obviousness-type double patenting as being unpatentable over claims 69 and 73 of copending Application No. 10/177,149. Although the conflicting claims are not identical, they are not patentably distinct from each other because all of the recited features of the instant claims are disclosed in the above claims of the copending application. Therefore, the instant claims are broader in scope than the claims of the copending application and are anticipated by claims 69 and 73 of the copending application. Also, it would have been obvious to a person of ordinary skill in the art to broaden the scope of the claims of the copending application by omitting the structure details of the LCD of claims 69 and 73 of the copending application.

This is a provisional obviousness-type double patenting rejection because the conflicting claims have not in fact been patented.

The specification is objected to as failing to provide proper antecedent basis for the claimed subject matter. See 37 CFR 1.75(d)(1) and MPEP § 608.01(o). Correction of the following is required: the specification does not disclose the feature “the light reflecting display section has a different transmittance than the light transmitting display section of the corresponding pixel”, as recited in claims 21 and 22.

The following is a quotation of the second paragraph of 35 U.S.C. 112:

The specification shall conclude with one or more claims particularly pointing out and distinctly claiming the subject matter which the applicant regards as his invention.

Claims 21, 22, 24, 51 and 52 are rejected under 35 U.S.C. 112, second paragraph, as being indefinite for failing to particularly point out and distinctly claim the subject matter which applicant regards as the invention.

Claim 21 is confusing because it is unclear how light can be transmitted at the light reflecting display section because metal is used as the reflective electrode. Therefore, the recited feature “the light reflecting display section has a different transmittance than the light transmitting display section of the corresponding pixel” is unclear. The same reason is also applied to claim 22. The remaining claims are also rejected since they depend on the indefinite claim 21.

The following is a quotation of the appropriate paragraphs of 35 U.S.C. 102 that form the basis for the rejections under this section made in this Office action:

A person shall be entitled to a patent unless –

(e) the invention was described in (1) an application for patent, published under section 122(b), by another filed in the United States before the invention by the applicant for patent or (2) a patent granted on an application for patent by another filed in the United States before the invention by the applicant for patent, except that an international application filed under the treaty defined in section

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351(a) shall have the effects for purposes of this subsection of an application filed in the United States only if the international application designated the United States and was published under Article 21(2) of such treaty in the English language.

Claim 21 is rejected under 35 U.S.C. 102(e) as being anticipated by Van Aerle et al.

Note Figs. 2-4 which identically disclose the claimed LCD comprising the light transmitting display section 10 and the light reflecting display section 6 (col. 2, line 58 – col. 3, line 14). As apparent to a person of ordinary skill in the art, the light transmittance is substantially zero at the light reflecting display section. Therefore, the light reflecting display section has a *different* transmittance than the light transmitting display section of the corresponding pixel.

Applicant cannot rely upon the foreign priority papers to overcome this rejection because a translation of said papers has not been made of record in accordance with 37 CFR 1.55. See MPEP § 201.15.

Claims 41, 44 and 45 are objected to as being dependent upon a rejected base claim, but would be allowable if rewritten in independent form including all of the limitations of the base claim and any intervening claims.

Claims 22, 24, 51 and 52 are not indicated as allowable over the prior art of record because the intended scope of these claims is unclear as set forth in the above 112 rejection.
